A dip into Wealdstone folklore... those incredible eight days in 1985 that won Stones the Conference title

N two days time it will be an astonishing 30 years since the Stones effectively booked their place at Wembley to set up the historic non-League double.

Yes, three decades since the blue and yellow army marched on Enfield's Southbury Road ground for the first leg of the FA Trophy semi-final. Three decades since a superlative performance, and goals from Neil Cordice and Andy Graham, snatched the 2-0 away win that saw us through to Wembley after a nerve-jangling 1-0 defeat by Enfield in the second leg. Three decades since hundreds of

Stones fans danced on the streets of EN1, finally recognising that football's first-ever Conference-Trophy double could actually be on the cards.

But we're not going to trot out the old cuttings from that day. Oh no. Even more importantly, we have uncovered a stash of press reports which record the famous five-wins-in-eight days in March 1985, which set up the possibility of the club getting anywhere near the Gola (Conference) league title.

The Stones had triumphed against all odds when winning the Southern League South title three years earlier despite a monstrous backlog of games. We played 21 matches in 47 days in March and April - unbelievable! - and lost just two of them, and in that mix was a five-wins-in-nine days spell as Allen Batsford's side played Saturday, Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday, Monday, Wednesday, Saturday for two gruelling months.

But these epic games in March 1985 will live longer in the memory. It was played against a backdrop of largely unfair criticism

At the other end Paul Cotter, holding the fort in the continued absence of Bob lles, did well to save a header by Doher-ty and then turned round a shot from Steele.

In between, an effort from Wealdstone's Graham was parried by the keeper and hooked off the line by Nick Preston.

A minute from half-time, Wealdstone added their second goal. Donnellan broke quickly and laid the ball off to Neil Cordice who rifled his shot past Bond. Eleven minutes into the second half, Weymouth clawed their way back into

towards Brian Hall's men, with our pragmatic but points-gathering style drawing few admirers. And when we lost 3-0 at home to strugglers Yeovil Town on Tuesday March 19 - despite the thrill of seeing Ian Botham turning out, and scoring, for the Somerset side - it seemed our goose was cooked.

The 600-strong Lower Mead crowd trooped home perplexed that the team they'd seen book a place in the Trophy semi-finals just three days earlier with a buccaneering beating of Frickley could wilt so meekly against Yeovil.


But behind the scenes, Hall was seething. And he clearly transmitted that anger to the team as the make-or-break week started with the Saturday visit of mid-table Weymouth to Lower Mead.

"I had to drum into them what a great opportunity this was to write their names in the record books, and how they'd look back on it with regret if they passed up this chance" said Hall in later years.

"I was desperate not to let them become sidetracked by dreams of playing at Wembley. That would take care of itself in the following weeks: we had to focus on the next period of games and it took a lot of organising and team planning."

"Altrincham are no mugs. They are a good side and it was always going to be a hard, physical game. But my players were magnificent.


"It seems that the tougher the opposition the tougher we become and the better we play. It was a superb win and it has given the boys their confidence back again. They now realise they can beat the

When Wealdstone did eventually master the offside trap, the chances started to flow.

Alan Cordice shot straight at the 'keeper from a Vince Jones corner, Gary Donnellan saw an effort held by the 'keeper and Lee Holmes blasted wide from a Cordice cross.

Cordice latched on to the ball on the right, headed for the bye-line, beat two players and fired in a cross which Graham met with a thunderous near post header that flew into the roof of the net.

The goal spurred Altrincham into action and they mounted a series of attacks on the Wealdstone goal.

Their pressure was rewarded after 54 minutes when Ronnie Ellis stabbed the ball home after a corner had been flicked on at the near post.

Two minutes later Cordice looked set to restore Wealdstone's lead, but he was pulled down from behind by Jeff Johnson as he raced for goal, a challenge which brought a booking for the Altrincham defender.

Cordice was again stopped on his way to goal in the 65th minute, this time in the penalty area. All he got was an indirect free kick, which Holmes tapped to Paul Bowgett but his chip was deflected over.

Ten minutes later Altrincham brought on Graham Bennett and the substitute almost scored with his first touch, a dip ping cross-cum-shot from the left.

Wealdstone struck what proved to be the winner 11 minutes from time.

Steve McCargo pushed the ball for ward for Cordice, who left his marker for dead and sprinted through to beat the advancing 'keeper with a venomous shot.

Altrincham put Wealdstone under the cosh for the last 10 minutes, but the Stones held out thanks to a combination of true grit and a little luck.

tremendous position.


I've mentioned these grand supporters of ours earlier. It is with a lot of pride that we give the names of those who made the trek to Gateshead and by the time we have played Scarborough on

breaking point with the prospect of away games at Altrincham and Gateshead on the Monday and Wednesday night after the tricky visit of Weymouth. The 15-man part-time squad would be staying overnight in a small hotel at Whitley Bay before the Gateshead game, but successful negotiations with employers meant that at least everyone was available.

The big bonus was the excellent team spirit fostered by travelling and living together for pretty much a whole week. Hall was aware that if they came through this period unscathed, the benefits could see his side on the glory on two fronts.

Privately, though, the manager later admitted (from the five games) that he was hoping for maybe three wins, plus probably a defeat and a draw. Altrincham away was the crux: the Manchester side were four points clear at the top of the table going into this crucial period, and the bookies made them title favourites with Bath City and Enfield also more favoured than the Stones.

The three points awarded for an away win that season (with just two for victory at home) made those long hauls to Altrincham and Gateshead absolutely pivotal. The team knew it and the fans knew it, with 30-odd (more than those listed by Colin Pope in the programme) making the overnight train trip to Tyneside. adding to the 60-odd who were at Alty to see Andy Graham's terrific header wrap up the points.


The weekend 'double-

header' against the powerful Runcorn and Scarborough sides, both at Lower Mead, put the seal on an astonishing week.

With both teams running out of free Saturdays, Scarborough decided (with the league's agreement) to stay overnight in Harrow after their match at Enfield on the Saturday, and face the Stones at Lower Mead on the Sunday morning.

As it turned out, the Yorkshire side did us a huge favour by winning 4-3 at fellow title- chasers Enfield in a real topsy-turvy game.

Cordice brightens Stones' dull day

A SUPERB goal from Alan Cordice was enough to give Wealdstone two points against Runcorn and maintain Stone's push for the title.

This Sunday morning clash was only agreed the previous weekend - and it caused a bit of a quandary for yours truly, who was then secretary of SFC Wealdstone, the supporters' Sunday football team. We were chasing the Marathon League Div 4 title and had also run out of spare dates.

The league were less than helpful. "This is a Sunday morning league so you'll have to play at 10.30 like anvone else" said the intransigent League secretary when I asked if we could move it to an afternoon kick-off. Our players were adamant that they didn't want to miss the Stones game - every single one was a die-hard supporter and even now, 30 years later, all but a few of that team can still be spotted at the Vale.

So I phoned the secretary of our opponents

(108 Sports Club) to ask if they would mind switching to a 3pm start and they agreed... it was just a matter of then pleading our case to the Marathon League and happily they relented. It was quite a novelty for everyone... and we ended the perfect weekend by winning the game 4-1 on our cramped **Boxtree Lane** pitch behind the Harrow Weald bus garage!

We went top of our table just three hours after the Stones had

also shot to the top of the Gola League for the first time since November... and neither team would ever relinquish that position.

Sunday soccer is just the tonic

Wealdstone 1, Scarborough 0

ALAN Cordice shot Wealdstone to the top of the Gola League with his second goal of the weekend at Lower Mead on Sunday. He struck with the vital goal after 32 minutes to knock the wind out of a Scarborough side that was still buzzing from a splendid victory at Enfield the previous day, writes Paul Jacques.

It was Wealdstone's first Sunday fixture since March 1974 when a crowd of 1.300 watched them beat Poole Town 3-2 in their Southern League Championship season. Scarborough's visit attracted a gate of 903 - well above Wealdstone's average - but two games in as many days had clearly put a strain on the players.

This Sunday experiment failed to produce a classic on the field, but cocka-hoop Wealdstone won't worry too much about that. In the end, Scarborough could do little to prevent Wealdstone opening up a two point lead at the top

Boro started brightly enough with David Bowman shooting just wide, and John Hannah finding space in the Wealdstone box, only to see that ball hooked off his feet for a corner.

Scarborough had a narrow escape after 12 minutes. A cross from Brian Greenaway found Neil Cordice and he sent a powerful header into the back of the net, only to see the effort disallowed for offside.

There was no reprieve in the 32nd minute. Andy Graham touched the ball through to Alan Cordice who galloped clear of his marker, went round keeper Graeme Crawford and planted his shot into an empty net.

Indeed, it was Alan Cordice who proved to be the thorn in Scarborough's side. Harry Dunn, Graham Hartley and Kenny Dennis were all booked for fouls on the Wealdstone striker as Scarborough's frustration became more

Scarborough, who won just two first half corners and only one after the interval, posed few threats to the Wealdstone defence.

Skipper Paul Bowgett was missing with flu, but Steve Perkins coped well at the centre of the back four.

Scarborough's best, indeed only, chance of the second half came in the 68th minute. A cross from Nigel Rose was met by Bowman but his effort was headed off the line by Roy Davies.
