- Carrying items which may be considered a danger to others, including cans, bottles, or glasses containing alcoholic beverages
- Throwing any article onto the field of play • Climbing floodlight pylons, fences, stands or any structure or building
- Using obscene or bad language likely to cause offence to others • Hitting the side or back panels of the Bulla stand

2) No spectator ball games.

3) The consumption of alcoholic drinks is permitted INSIDE the social club bar and boardroom areas.

4) Vehicles parked on the Grosvenor Vale site are at the owners' risk.

5) Wealdstone Football Club supports the FA's campaign on pyrotechnics (e.g. flares and smoke bombs). Any misuse of such items in and around the Ground will result in those responsible being asked to leave the Ground and, in line with football authority guidance, may result in a report to the Police, potential prosecution and a ban from the Club of up to three years.

Firstly on behalf of everyone at Wealdstone Football Club I would like to start by paying tribute to those of our supporters who cheerfully gave up their Saturdays to carry out improvement works to the ground.

On the pitch Gordon and I have focused a) on keeping the players we wanted from last year's squad that did so magnificently in the final 3rd of the season (and I think we pretty well kept everyone we wanted to and in the face of a lot of interest from other clubs too) b) bringing in new players who can 'add something different' (only time will tell but the defence and the wing positions already look stronger to me than last season).

As my fellow directors keep reminding me the playing budget is again quite high but if we aim to be a footballing force sometimes you have to 'roll the dice' and this season particularly (with Ebbsfleet now mercifully gone) I feel we are more than capable of at the very least holding our own with any one in this league.

Pre-season training on grass at Harefield Academy has been

excellent and as the evenings get shorter we will be moving on to the floodlit full-size 3G pitch at Harefield which is a top surface. I am very confident that the players are as fit and well-trained as at any time in the history of Wealdstone FC.

Gordon and Scott know they have my 100% backing and I genuinely believe they have the ability (and most importantly the hunger) to make us genuine promotion contenders. I know that all the players some of whom have played at very high levels feel exactly the same.

One thing we have to do this year is substantially improve our points record at home. Last season even if our home form was only 'upper middling' we would have easily been top 5 because of our superb away record but it is at home where we need to be regularly doing the business - this will help swell gates hopefully to around the 1,000 mark and also will get local businesses wanting to be part of the Wealdstone feelgood factor. From a personal front I

would like to thank everyone who has me feel so welcome at the club and will do my best to repay your faith by giving you a football team (and a stadium) that you the most loyal supporters in non-league football deserve.

Let's all get behind Coxy and the lads. 3 points please.

ANY NEW CAMPAIGN ALWAYS BRING WITH IT FRESH EXPECTATIONS

Good afternoon everyone and a warm welcome to Adam and his Concord team for the start of another new season.

I'm honestly not sure if these summer breaks get shorter or we have to cram in so much more these days. Time just seems to have flown by since the end of April, but with this season starting the first week of August, we had the boys back in training the last week of June so it's actually only a seven weeks break.

The beginning of any new campaign always bring with it fresh expectations. Last year, I went on record as saying a top eight finish and the hope of the play offs was my personal expectation, with the new group we had assembled. We did finish eighth, but I can honestly say it felt like a poor season and we had underachieved. This year we need to build on those foundations and ensure we improve. If we can, and with the new rules in place, a top seven finish will guarantee us a play-off position.

Looking at news from around the rest of the league, I feel Hemel, Eastbourne and Chelmsford have done some

As usual, someone has quietly gone about their summer signings and will hit the ground running and you always have to be aware of the experience of the relegated sides. It's probably going to be wide open and if you add Hungerford and Poole, who will probably build on last season and Gloucester who have moved over for the North, I've already mentioned half the teams in the league.

We worked hard to make sure we got pre-season right this year. Peter and I went over to Harefield Academy at the end of last season and decided their facilities would make preparation for more beneficial than training on the side pitches here at the Vale. The balance of the fixtures needed to be right, training had to be more intense and also ensure personnel could attend sessions on a more regular basis. I'm pleased to say, all the above, despite a couple of set-backs, has helped put us in better shape than previous Conference South campaigns.

Eight pre-season games has given us enough time to whittle the squad down, use various formations and hopefully gain some good match fitness. Good wins against the young professionals of Fulham, Reading and Watford, a win at Bedfont and then competitive draws against Maidenhead and Slough. As I write, we still have a tough test as we go to Hitchin on Saturday. Our only negative was the defeat by Hampton in the County Cup Final with a number of players unavailable and an unbalanced looking squad. We looked very

flat and I must say that was a big disappointment, giving the ball away too often and showing a lack of real determination. Hopefully that we serve as a kick up the backside before the real stuff starts.

The summer has seen the departure of three long serving players in Tom, Wes and Jonny. All three have been a major influence in our Ryman Championship winning season and help establish ourselves in the Conference South. All three are excellent characters and good clubmen who always gave everything to the cause out on the pitch. Tom got an excellent offer to join Hemel, but Jonny and Wes both realised that their personal circumstances had changed considerably since they joined us and could no longer guarantee the commitment we required to be successful at this level. We thank them all and wish them well for the future.

As some depart, others replace and we welcome a few new faces to the Vale this season with Josh, Benji, Shaq, Abs, and Liam. I hope they all have a long and most importantly, successful stay at the club. We also see the return and of ex skipper Jimmy Gray coming back on the management team. He has gained great experience as manager of St Albans and Barton and I feel he typifies the desire and mental strength we need to help us succeed.

I feel it only fair to mention to the fans some of the joys of managing. I appreciate how easy it looks and anyone who plays Championship manager will never appreciate the real life situations and problems that arise. I write these notes with just over a week to go and after

Thursday's training before our last warm up game at Hitchin. Ideally, we should now just be putting the finishing touches to our preparations, but just this week has seen Matty, Liam and Coxy sustain injuries and Ryan Sellers has been informed his ankle ligament damage looks like a four week lay-off. Our Cup Final team was decimated with no Ryan, Greenie ill and Abs and Shaq cup tied which left us with only 13 signed players. Mustafa's international clearance has continued to drag on and has now turned out to be far more complicated than first thought. Other targets like David Ijaha and Ryheem want to pursue playing at a higher level for now. Finishing on a positive, after interest from numerous clubs Ciaran has decided he will not go on any more trials and concentrate on his Wealdstone playing career.

The roller coaster is about to begin once again and I can assure you the will be some bumpy periods along the way. I really hope we can all enjoy the ride, but remember to keep results in perspective and don't let the negative vibes make the situation worse than it actually is. I know we have a minority group of 'doom and gloom' merchants, but don't let those voices drag the rest of us down. We have something very special at this football club and the envy of many, so let's make damn sure we continue to push it forward and get us back to where we want to be. We are in this together, management, players, board and fans so make sure you do your bit, get behind the lads on the pitch and let's have a real go for it.

with our new member of the
coaching staff James Gray

Welcome home Jimmy, it's been a while...

Gordon said you were always welcome back at Wealdstone when you left. Are you happy to be back?

Yeah, I'm over the moon to be honest. I think I've been away about six or seven years now, done my own thing and an opportunity has arisen, Gordon's invited me in and I'm looking forward to a new challenge to be honest.

You was Gordon's captain before, are you happy to be back working with him again?

Yeah. I've known Gordon a long time now, I know how he works, obviously I'm coming back in a different capacity but I'm pretty honoured to be honest, to be coming in to a club that's really close to my heart, I had a great three/four years there and I'm looking forward to the challenge of trying to get them to the promised land of the National League Premier.

When you joined last time the club was close to hitting the play-offs and they came close again last year, do you think you have unfinished business here?

Yeah I think so. Gordon's got together a cracking squad here that had a little dip during the middle part of last season but they finished really strongly and I know quite a lot of the players down there, he's got a lot of experienced players that know that league and I think they can have a good crack

at it this year, obviously I think the expectation from people down there is that they should be pushing at least for a play-off position this year which is exciting for me to come and be part of. I'll bring my experiences of what I've down over the past four/five years in management and hopefully I can add something to it.

You're also working with Nick Archer again who was your chairman at St Albans, is it better being a coach where the pressure of being a manager is taken away, can that help your coaching skills excel a bit more.

Yeah I think so. When you're a manager at a big club like St Albans like I was, the coaching side of things had to take a little bit of a step back because there's so many day-to-day things that you deal with that are nothing to do with training side of things so to get back into the coaching side of things and see if I can improve the boys along the way with the experience that I've got I'm hoping I can add something. Nick Archer was good to me, was a great chairman when I was down at St Albans and he's a real football man so linking up with people that I know is going to make my transition **quite easy really.**

Do you think you'll fit into the role OK, because you've been manager elsewhere and had a good season last year at Barton Rovers where you just lost out in the play-off final, is management an option you're looking to return to later?

At this moment in time this role suits me down to the ground because I've got a lot of things going on outside of football where I couldn't commit to full-time management at Barton

Rovers, it was a hard gig for me really, day-to-day, week-to-week down there, it just felt right for me at the minute

Like you said, it's been about six years since you left, what's changed since you were last here?

Oh it's changed massively. Obviously when I was last here in the Ryman League I think we missed out on the play-offs that season quite closely when I left but I've been back down there as a manager and a supporter to watch the boys and also have a look at what's going on down there. The ground and facilities, everything is geared up down there I think, it's looking a lot better, the ground looks a hell of a lot different compared to the first game I played down there when we just moved into Ruislip, it's got three or four new stands, the bar is thriving and the support has grown a lot since then days as well so. I think everything is geared up but it's a tough league to get out of for starters but I think everything is there and in place where we can go on and have a good season this year.

The last laugh was with Concord though. We met again a month later in the semi-finals of the play offs and 1,055 watched open mouthed as it was Rangers' turn to be played off the pitch, somehow clinging on for extra time and

then winning the tie with a late goal. Concord won the final at Lowestoft to clinch a place in the Vanarama South, and since then honours are pretty much even.

There is still an undercurrent between the teams, however, that makes every clash a spiky one!

Today sees the earliest-ever start to a league season for us, and as such there isn't a great deal of choice to be had but I've managed to unearth a couple of competitive fixtures from August 5 in the past.

v Harrow Boro (Middx Charity Cup 1975)
Drew 2-2

WE HAD just endured a long hot summer and in those days an even longer wait to see the Stones back in action. We had just finished a decent first year in the Southern Premier coming 8th so expectations were high as we approached the new campaign.

Things were a lot different in those days - we only had in effect three warm up games before the serious business got underway with the first of those not until August 2nd, a far cry from the current situation. That August 2nd game saw us journey up to Boston (not United but their lesser known Midland League rivals) to be stuffed 4-2.

However, Boro at home in the Middx Charity Cup the following Tuesday would give us the opportunity to get a win - or so we thought. The Charity Cup format was in a group basis with just one club out of ourselves, Boro and Hendon going through and with Harrow's status at least two levels below us in those days nothing less than a win would do. We began well and took an early lead through Johnny Henderson and every-

one sat back expecting a comfortable victory. However the defensive frailties that were to become a regular feature that season soon reared their ugly head and we found ourselves 2-1 down going into the dying embers of the game. Stones turned the screw in their hunt for an equaliser and Henderson was on hand to smash home the late leveller at the Elmslie End.

It was the first ever Stones v Boro game I had witnessed and the first time I became aware of the rivalry between the clubs...

well, at least on their part. There were over 600 at the game that night with probably 10 from Boro celebrating wildly, with someone playing the Bugle at the prospect of a win against us. Even at the age of 14 I considered it to be over the top - and I think others did too because from what was a fairly low key game it was quite noticeable that the atmosphere and noise from the Stones fans increased considerably and the equaliser was met with thunderous applause.

What happened next? Well, we travelled to Hendon the following Saturday and lost 2-1 so were eliminated from the cup. We actually started the season surprisingly well, particularly at home where we remained unbeaten until Boxing Day and reached the 1st Round of the

FA Cup before losing at Aldershot (who were then in the 3rd tier of English football). However post Christmas we absolutely fell apart and actually finished in a relegation spot, only to be reprimed by Dunstable's demise.

(Harrow Cup) 1995: Won 3-1*

THIS was the inaugural Harrow Cup - and I think the only time it was played. It was a 4-team tournament played over a weekend with Harrow Borough and Edgware completing the quartet.

This was in fact Gordon Bartlett's first competitive game as manager having taken over in the summer, joining from Yeading. Whatever happened to him?!

That summer of 1995 saw the club beginning to emerge from its darkest days. Four years after leaving our beloved Lower Mead, we had suffered two miserable ground-share years

at Watford and then went into chronic depression the following two years, playing at the wilderness which was Yeading - with unquestionably the worst Wealdstone side ever.

However, August 1995 saw us back in Harrow with a groundshare at Edgware, GB came on board as a well respected up and coming manager and things started to look a lot better.

A comfortable 3-1 win was achieved over Rayners Lane with two goals from Paul Sheldrick and one from Troy Birch and a new dawn had begun.

What happened next? Well, we played our 2nd game of the tournament the following

day against Boro and lost 3-1. We had a whole new team that displayed plenty of grit and determination but ultimately the extra quality of Boro told. Of course, by this time we had slipped so far down the pecking order that it would have been a shock had we beaten them. This game was during a period where Boro were able to dominate us on the pitch and we just had to swallow it.

Our financial struggles had made us easy prey for those looking to turn over what was still a big name in non league football and it was incredible to think that only 10 years earlier we were the top non league side in the country.

However we survived, and the story continues....

Remembering John McCormick.. Stones' sensational signing in the summer of '73

WEALDSTONE and Crystal Palace would not, on the face of it, seem to have much shared history. The statistics on the opposite page bear that out.

But let me take you back 30 years to August 1973. The Stones were about to start their third season of Southern League Division One football and, although the attack and midfield were potent (George Duck went on to score 64 goals that year) it was the Blues' defence that had leaked goals badly the previous season.

And with skipper and centre-back Eric Burgess away on holiday until the end of August there was a pressing need for a dominant central defender.

I was a mere slip of a lad in those far-off days, but clearly remember returning from a family holiday to find the Harrow Observer lying on our doormat (along with a rainforest of the usual letters and bills) with the back page headline ... "Stones snap up Palace star McCormick"

Yes indeed, our little club had audaciously landed the signature of stylish 36-year-old centre-back John McCormick, who had been ever-present for the Eagles in the old Division One just a year before, appearing week in, week out against household names like Peter Osgood, Martin Chivers, Joe Royle, John Radford, Frannie Lee, George Best, Denis Law and Bobby Charlton.

He had even found himself facing Italian World Cup stars Luigi Riva and Domenighini of Cagliari, and the great Inter strikers Mazzola and Boninsegna when Palace played in the

1971 Anglo-Italian tournament!

Admittedly the Stones in those days had a bit more sway and financial clout. But we were still two steps removed from the Football League, and six steps away from the players we idolised on *Match of the Day* and Sunday afternoon's *The Big Match*. It was like Gordon Bartlett and

Nick Symmons persuading Tony Adams to come and play at the White Lion.

Every big gun in those days had a big, muscular No.9 and, for Palace, John McCormick was the man to keep them quiet. To quote the Palace website:

"If a player is described as 'craggy', the chances are that he's a tall, red-head."

ed Scottish centre half, and John McCormick was a perfect example of the species. Big Mac was ever present in the 1968-69 promotion side, along with Jackson and Kember, and kept his place until being dropped to accommodate Bobby Bell in 1973, at the age of 36. Although physically very tough, he was by no means a dirty player, and set an example to his colleagues with his supreme application to the job.

When heading a ball either in defence or attack he seemed to use every muscle in his body for maximum power, and was the last player ever to let his head drop if things were going badly. No one would claim that he was the most skilful of players in possession, but his timing in the tackle was always accurate and efficient, and his positional sense compensated for the occasional waywardness of his partner, Mel Blyth.

As a traditional 'stopper' he was one of

the best, and would have deserved a place in any Palace side since."

So how did McCormick fit in at Lower Mead? He was absolutely brilliant for us, as you might expect! He may have been classed as a stopper in top flight terms, but in the Southern League Division One South he was like Rio Ferdinand meets Franz Beckenbauer, carrying the ball out of defence and spraying passes wide to our excellent full-backs Chris Kinnear and Willie Watson.

That pair, with McCormick and the debonair Eric Burgess (brother in law of Anthea Redfearn, Mrs Bruce Forsyth, the Posh Spice of her day) bottling up the middle, helped the Stones win the league at a canter. His professional, uncompromising attitude was the perfect balance to the flair players we had at that time – and Paul Fairclough, the current

England non-League team boss who was a 'Stone in the 70s, recalls in the Wealdstone Book how "Big Mac" taught him to deal with players who were giving him verbal grief.

"He said, at the next corner just stick your elbow in his mouth. I did, there was a crack, and the player never bothered me again".

John was a rock for the next two seasons in the Southern Premier Division, but suffered a bad leg injury when we went down 4-3 at Third Division Aldershot in the FA Cup 1st round in November 1975 (another great day, another great story) and never fully recovered.

We would have liked to have tracked him down for this article but he was last heard of in his native Glasgow some years ago, where he was in the licensed trade. He'd be 66 now but still a top man, and hugely respected by fans of both clubs.

Concord Rangers originated from a team of boys headed by Steve Lant. They played friendly matches during 1966 on a pitch along the Canvey Island seafront close to the Concord Beach hence the name Concord Rangers and the nickname The Beach Boys.

1967 – Albert Lant, Steve's father and current Club President became the team manager and took the club into competitive football. The Club joined the Thundermite Boys Football League.

1973 – Concord joined the Vange and District League and during this period they won several league and cup honours.

1979 – Concord became the first winners of the Essex Sunday Junior Trophy managed by current Secretary Chris Cerie with a 4 – 0 win over Bishops Park from Brentwood..

Saturday football was introduced

to the club when Concord joined the Mid Essex League and played their home games at Waterside Farm on Canvey Island.

1985 – Concord secured some land at Thames Road, Canvey Island, the club developed the clubhouse and ground with Jack Smith, current club treasurer being the mastermind behind the project, he organised the funds, labour and materials and worked many hours himself on the site. A special mention goes to the late Clive Smith (Jack's brother) without Clive's machinery and labour Concord's pitch would not exist also Martin Gill, Steve Barnes, Brian Godfrey, Lee and John Slater, Rob Fletcher (Electrics) all contributed.

1988-1989 Concord joined the Essex Intermediate League and was Divisional League and Cup Winners.

1991-1992 Concord joined the Essex Senior League and achieved the following.

1996-1997 Essex Senior League Cup winners defeating Ford Utd 1 – 0.

1997-1998 Essex Senior League Championship winners
Manager – Lee Paterson

1999-2000 Harry Fisher Memorial Trophy winners defeating Burnham Ramblers 3 – 2

2002-2003 Essex Senior League Runners-up

2003-2004 Essex Senior League Championship winners
Manager – Ben Embery
Danny Heale is the winner of the Don Douglas Trophy this season for the Leagues top scorer with a

tally of 32 goals.

Founder Albert Lant retired after 25 years as Chairman in 1992 to become the Club President. Current Club Treasurer Jack Smith then held the Chairman position for two years, Grant Beglan who is the CEO at Aspect Contracts, Concorde's main sponsors, then became Chairman and also held the position for two years. Antony Smith is the current Chairman and is very hands-on in his approach, under Antony's guidance the Club has seen fantastic progress these past few seasons both on the playing side and also on the development of the ground.

2007-08 Concord Rangers 40th Anniversary season

Danny Scopes and Danny Cowley become joint managers and managed the team in this

important year for the Club and they had a magnificent year, Concord ended the season winners of the Essex Senior League. Gordon Brasted Memorial Trophy winners and were Essex Senior League Cup Finalists. Concord also reached the Qtr-final of the FA Vase this season before losing 1 – 0 to Lowestoft Town who went on to reach the final which was played at Wembley Stadium. Concord's Danny Heale won the Don Douglas Trophy for the second time as the Leagues top marksman scoring a magnificent 46 goals and setting an Essex Senior League record. rom the Essex Senior League we would have been happy with a mid table position at the end of our first season in the Ryman League Div 1 Nth. The Management team of Danny Scopes and Danny Cowley managed to get the best out of our players and we achieved a Play-off position having finished 5th. We then went on to beat East Thurrock Utd, who had finished in 2nd spot 1-0 in the Play - off semi-final, Danny Heale scored a magnificent goal to put us through to the final and play Waltham Abbey. Concord was only 10 minutes away from playing in the Ryman Premier League this season having gone one up through Fabien Batchelor but Waltham Abbey's Harry Elmes scored in the 80th minute to take the game to penalties which Concord finally lost 5 - 4.

2009-10 Concord win the Ryman League Div 1 Nth Play-Off final 3-1 against Enfield Town to gain promotion the Ryman Premier Division.

2010-11 Concord had a very good first season in the Ryman Premier Division, finishing in 8th position, our aim at the start of the season was to avoid relegation therefore reaching 8th spot was very creditable but just missing out on a Play-Off position by two points was a great team effort.

2013 -14 Having been promoted last season, Concord was looking for a position that would enable them to stay in the Conference South after seeing both AFC Hornchurch and Billericay Town relegated after just one season. Manager Danny Cowley, his Assistant Glen Alzapiedi and the Players surpassed the Clubs expectations by finishing in a very respectful 9th position and to cap a very good season Concord won the Essex Senior Cup Final against Conference Premier, Braintree Town, the final was played at Dagenham & Redbridge's ground.

2014 - 15 A fine achievement in winning the Essex Senior Cup for 2nd successive year winning 5 - 0 against Billericay Town in the final and finishing 7th in the

Conference South, the only negative this season was to see the Manager Danny Cowley and Danny's brother Nicky his assistant move on to pastures new with Conference Premier Braintree Town, both had done brilliant jobs for Concord taking us from Essex Senior League to the Conference South in six seasons.

2015 - 16 Adam Flanagan became Concorde's new manager and did a good job in his first season at National League South level having guided Brentwood Town to the Ryman League Premier Division prior to joining Concord. Adam achieved a 10th position in the National League South which was a respectable position for the Club as well as winning the Essex Senior Cup for the 3rd year in a row.

2016 -17 Concord had their most difficult time in the National South but managed to avoid relegation by finishing in 18th position.

Jordan Brown –

Left back signed by Concord Rangers this summer for the second time, having first spent time at Thames Road on loan last season from Welling United (who themselves signed Brown despite interest from The Beachboys). Brown is a former West Ham youth who spent time on loan at Aldershot before joining Crewe, and can count Barnet, Boreham Wood, Whitehawk and Dulwich Hamlet as former clubs.

Steve King –

Dominant centre-back who became an integral part of The Beachboys defensive unit after signing initially on loan from Welling United back in late 2009. As well as being a key figure in the Concord side, Steve has also represented both the regional & national Fire Brigade team. Kingy recently reached 300 club appearances, he weighs in with his fair share of goals (usually from set pieces), and is widely regarded as one of the strongest headers of the ball in non league football.
