





Michael Wale is not with us this week as his television work has had to take priority. Instead we bring you one of his articles that we have printed before but, as it concerns the always topical subject of "Crowd Support", we felt that it would make good reading again at this particular

First the facts: There were 17,045 people at Tuesday night's League Cup game against Bristol Rovers. Loftus Road's biggest crowd of the

Now the emotion: The match was nearly won by YOU the crowd. Not for many seasons has that famous Rangers' roar so lifted the team. Everyone afterwards was talking about the crowd. Even the referee Mr. Thomas from Glamorgan? Referees, contrary to what many people think, are human and after a game like to relax like anyone else. As Mr. Thomas was off duty at the time it would not be fair to quote him, suffice it to say that he was very complimentary towards the crowd, and when told the official 'gate' figure was amazed because he thought there were double the number of people because of the noise.

Then there were the players. In the dressing room afterwards they were amazed at the sudden awakening of the mighty Rangers' roar. Phil Parkes told me on Wednesday morning: "It gives you a lift, definitely. It seemed there were so many there. They got on to us when we weren't doing well and quite rightly, but then in the second half they got behind us. It really lifts a player and a team when that happens. After we scored and we were going at them for the last few minutes you couldn't hear yourself think.'

Gordon Jago, our manager, was also praising the crowd. Often in the past this programme has asked for your support. It might seem a stereotyped appeal aimed at every football supporter by every club. Not so. In London I have only really heard this team-lifting roar down in the East End with West Ham, and at Loftus Road. Its value to the club is immense. Referees and others involved with the game will tell you they have seen 'away' teams go to bits under the strain of a crowd rooting for its own side.

Bill Dodgin senior, the ageless and Bristol charming manager of Rovers, was in no doubt that the crowd made his team panic in the second half: "Until then we were playing football. Then they started

booting the ball around."

Most people have no doubt that as Bristol back-pedalled under that mounting crescendo of sound it was the crowd who forced their keeper Dick Shepherd into the fatal error of the night when he stepped outside his area. The result was Rodney Marsh's goal from the free kick, in the 85th minute.

There's a lot of psychology about football. Players train every day of the week for month after month. It is a job. Just as you need a 'lift' at work every now and again so do players. Management can supply,

and does, much of this but in the end it is the crowd that can really help make a player or a team. You only have to go to Anfield and hear the Kop in full song to know that. Players will tell you that the Kop can make an opposing player make an error, so great is their will power.
And the instant bellowing roar when a Liverpool player so much as touches a ball in a 'needle' game gives that player a yard extra in speed. The crowd can lift a team when it is searching for its second wind, it can also destroy. There has been at least one Rangers' player over the past years who has literally shaken with nerves out on the pitch as the crowd sapped away his confidence. Therefore, it is a responsibility to be a Rangers supporter? There is no doubt in my mind, after seeing many other Second Division teams this season, that Rangers are well into the promotion race, especially when you look at the fixture list and note that five of our last seven games are at home.

I always remember at Brisbane Road the last match of the 1961-62 season when the Orient had to win to go up to the First Division. At half time there came over the loudspeaker the nearest thing to an incitement to mutiny I've heard: "You've got to yell this other team off the pitch." said the voice. They did. Orient went up. That's what being a crowd is all about?

Well, this is the big one for Wealdstone! Few non-League clubs have more thoroughly deserved their place in today's third round of the F.A. Cup and the chance it gives them to equal a competition record. For, perish the thought, if the Stones should win this tie they would be claiming their third Football League scalp in one season — a feat never bettered in more than a century of Cup football.

No one here at The Bush should be foolish enough to write off that possibility. Wealdstone may be only moderately placed in the premier division of the Southern League but they have produced some mighty impressive F.A. Cup performances already this season.

After beating Maidstone 2-1 in the fourth qualifying round, they were drawn at home to Hereford United—the club whose famous Cup feats only quite recently earned them League status. That was the first time Wealdstone had met League opposition on their Lower Mead ground in the F.A. Cup, though this was the seventh time they had survived to the first round proper.

Hereford came out of that game with a 0-0 draw and, having missed one or two chances, felt very confident of success in the replay. When Hereford took the lead in the second minute it was probably the worst thing that could have happened to them for they lapsed into a state of over-confidence, the Stones came ranting back with three goals and, though Hereford pulled one back late in the game, they could not recover their

rhythm.

A home tie with Reading in the second round gave Wealdstone the chance of revenge for they had been beaten narrowly (0-1) by the Biscuitmen at Elm Park the previous season.

The Stones certainly made a spectacular start with a Keith Furphy goal after only five minutes – direct from a corner!

The Stones' second goal was also a little unorthodox in the sense that George Duck converted a penalty only at the second attempt. But this is how cup-ties are won and who knows what extraordinary incidents may be in store for us today?

For older Wealdstone fans, today's trip to The Bush must rank as equal to the occasion their heroes played at Wembley in the 1966 F.A. Amateur Cup final.

They met Hendon before a 45,000 crowd and, when Hendon took the lead after only five minutes, the Stones looked a beaten side. But they levelled the scores late in the game and then made a sensational finish with two goals in the last three minutes to win 3-1

The Wealdstone club was founded in 1900 but it was over half a century before they claimed their first major success in senior amateur circles. In 1952 they won the championship of the Athenian League.

They joined the Southern League in 1971 when the competition was enlarged and spent their first campaign in the regionalised northern section of the lower division. After a year they switched to the

southern section and, in only their third season in the competition, they won the championship of their section by 11 points and, with it, promotion to the Premier Division.

George Duck hit 41 goals that season – 19 more than his closest rival in the division.

Luck was with them in 1976 when they finished fourth from bottom. Normally they would have been relegated but the resignation of Dunstable created an extra vacancy to save their bacon.

Much of the credit for Wealdstone's success this season must go to manager Alan Fogarty who succeeded Geoff Coleman only this year. Mr Fogarty was originally appointed only on a temporary basis but results showed such a quick improvement that he was given the job permanently.

A qualified F.A. Coach, Mr Fogarty spent a great deal of time checking on new players and the present team includes many of the men he has signed over the past few months.

Though he has already rewarded the club for its confidence by guiding them to victory over Football League clubs for the first time in its history, he is ambitious for bigger things.

This was not, perhaps, the draw we might have chosen. For everyone knows we are on a hiding to nothing. We all know that a First Division club should beat a Southern League side but it doesn't always work out like that.

Our Statistics Wizard has assembled one of the best collections of club records in the Football League and uses it to look back on the other times we have played today's visitors. Today's match will be QPR's 3,060th professional match; our 213th appearance in this competition; and the first time that we have played Wealdstone.

QPR will be trying to improve on quite an impressive home record in this competition lately. We are unbeaten in our last 4 home cup matches, and have only been beaten once in our last 10 homes matches; this was in 1974 when we lost 0-2 to Leicester City in the 6th round tie.

The last time that we met a non-league side at Loftus Road was in 1973, when Barnet held us to a 0-0 draw (we won the replay 3-0).

Other non-league sides to visit here have not fared quite so well. We beat Poole Town 3-2 in 1966, Guildford City 3-0 in 1965, Bath City 2-0 in 1964, Hinkley Athletic 7-2 in 1962, Barry Town 7-0 in 1961, Walthamstowe Avenue 3-2 in 1960, Clapton 3-1 in 1957, Dorchester 4-0 in 1956.

In away matches, the last time we lost to a non league side was that dreadful day in 1957 when we were beaten 6-1 at Hereford. The defeat then, and our defeat by Walthamstow Avenue in 1954 (in the second replay) are our only defeats by non league sides in 42 years (in 26 matches against them).

We haven't scored more than 4 goals at home in this competition for 15 years (23 matches). The last time we scored 4 at Loftus Road was in 1970 when we beat South Shields.

Our record home victory in this competition is 7-0. We have achieved this twice. On 3rd November 1900

we beat Fulham by this score, and on 6th November 1961 we beat Barry Town by a similar score. We also beat Hinkley Athletic 7-2 on 24th November 1962. Our record score in this competition, strangely enough was achieved away from home. On 27th November 1937 we beat Bristol Rovers 8-1 on their ground.

Should a QPR player score a hat-trick, it would be the first time since 26th November 1966 when Rodney Marsh scored all three goals against Poole Town.


18 hat-tricks have been recorded by QPR players in

the 212 games played so far.
Two QPR players have scored 4 goals in a cup match.
On 20th November 1901, Millar scored all 4 goals
against West Norwood, and on 29th November 1924
Myers scored all 4 goals against Clapton Orient.

Should this match go to a replay, QPR would then have to attempt to win away for the first time in 8 matches. Our last away victory in this competition was on 3rd February 1973, when we beat Oxford United 2-0.

Of our current playing staff, Don Givens is our leading scorer in this competition with 8 goals. Stan Bowles has scored 5, Mick Leach and Dave Clement have each scored 3 and Ian Gillard and Gerry Francis have scored once.

3 players have appeared in 20 or more F.A. Cup matches for the club. Dave Clement has played in 24, Mick Leach in 22, and Phil Parkes in 20.



WEALDSTONE

CHRIS LIGHTFOOT (Goalkeeper)

Chris joined Wealdstone from Southern League Romford mid-way through last season and is a player of considerable experience in non-League circles. He has been performing with outstanding confidence during the Stones' great Cup run.

IAN CRANSTONE (Goalkeeper)

Young lan joined the club at the beginning of this season and, though he has made a few first-team appearances, he has been kept out by Lightfoot's consistency. But he has obvious potential and at least one League club is keen to sign him.

ALAN FURSDON (Defender)

Alan suffered severely with ankle injuries while with his previous club, Southern League Dover, but he has now fully recovered and holding the right-back position. Wealdstone signed him last season.

STEVE HOCKHAM (Defender)

Steve signed for Crystal Palace as an apprentice last season but was released this term to link up with Wealdstone.

JOHN WATSON (Defender/Midfield)

John, now in his fourth season with Wealdstone, has been appointed captain. He was once with Orient as an apprentice and, while at Brisbane Road, he won England youth honours.

DAVID PARRATT (Defender)

David is likely to be playing in the centre of Wealdstone's defence though he has only quite recently switched to this position. He joined the club from Bedford Town last season.

PAUL THOMAS (Defender)

Paul is the Stones' left-back. They signed him last March from Walthamstow Avenue.

FRED BARWICK (Defender)

Fred was with Spurs for five years before signing for Wealdstone this season. He initially went to White Hart Lane as a schoolboy in 1972 and later served his apprenticeship with them. He turned professional in October 1975.

MICKY GRIFFITHS (Midfield)

Micky is highly experienced in Southern League circles, having been with several clubs. Wealdstone signed him in the middle of last season from Hillingdon Borough.

STEVE BRINKMAN (Midfield)

Steve joined Wealdstone from Arsenal mid-way through last season. He had been signed by the Gunners originally as a schoolboy in December 1973 and in June 1975 he became an apprentice.

BOBBY FINCH (Midfield)

Bobby returns to familiar surroundings today for it was with us that he began his professional career. He is, in fact, one of only two Wealdstone players with League experience, having made his bow with us in 1967/68. He also played a few games for us in the First Division a year later. Bobby then decided to take off for South Africa, where he joined Cape Town. He returned to England to sign for Maidstone United and later signed for Gravesend. He joined Wealdstone this season.

KEITH FURPHY (Midfield/Forward)

Keith is another former Ranger. He spent last season with us after an earlier spell at Ipswich. He has been enjoying an enormously successful season with Wealdstone and it was one of his goals that put the Stones on the road to victory over Reading in the last round. Keith is the son of former Watford and Sheffield United manager Ken Furphy.

GEORGE DUCK (Forward)

George has smashed all the Stones' scoring records since his arrival from Southend in 1972 and he has now hit more than 220 for the club. It was George's twice-taken penalty that clinched victory over Reading in the second round. Once with Millwall, where he didn't make the League side, George moved to Southend in 1971 and made a few appearances in their Fourth Division side in 1971/72.

BOBBY MOSS (Forward)

Bobby is now in his third season at Lower Mead, having joined them from Barnet. Bobby hit what proved to be the winning goal against Hereford United in the first round of the F.A. Cup this season.

PAT FERRY (Forward)

Pat was Wealdstone's hero in the first round replay at Hereford. The Stones had been trailing to an early goal when Pat struck twice — on either side of the interval— to give the Stones the lead.

FAGUP SCENE By Tony Pullein Spotlight on the minnows

Today the F.A. Cup really gets under way in earnest as the giants of the First and Second Divisions join the survivors of the earlier rounds. And, though much interest will surround the likes of holders Manchester United, Nottingham Forest and Liverpool, the spotlight today really focusses upon the six remaining non-League clubs.

Apart from the fact that Blyth Spartans will be meeting Enfield – thus guaranteeing at least one non-League participant in round four – the draw was most unkind to all the other giant-killers. All four are

away from home today.

But three of them have the chance, albeit very slim, of equalling an F.A. Cup record. Scarborough, Wealdstone and Wigan have already knocked out two Football League clubs and would equal the competition record should they achieve further success today.

Scarborough have ousted two Fourth Division clubs – Rochdale and Crewe – but today face the formidable task of taking on Second Division Brighton at the Goldstone Ground in Sussex.

But Wigan Athletic may not be entirely without hope as they visit First Division Birmingham City, the club managed by former England boss Sir Alf Ramsey. Wigan base their strategy upon a solid defence which saw them chalk up 1-0 victories over both York City and Sheffield Wednesday and Birmingham, after their flourishing beginning to Ramsey's reign, are no great goalscorers themselves.

The most Wigan will be hoping for is a goalless draw. And, if they do manage that and get the Blues back on their own massive Springfield Park ground, then few people would give much for the First Division club's chances.

The side confidently expected to become this season's greatest giant-killers are

Enfield. They lost only one of their opening 26 matches in the Isthmian League and currently lead the table with an astonishing lead of 20 points over their closest rivals!

Enfield proved their worth by slaying Fourth Division side Wimbledon 3-0 in the first round and then went away and beat Northampton at the next stage.

Today they travel north to face fellow non-Leaguers Blyth Spartans. Enfield seem certain to win and could have one or two more surprises up their sleeves before they eventually go out.

Indeed, one or two fans have even gone so far as to back Enfield to reach

Wembley!

Tilbury are the side which is enjoying its second bite at the Cup apple. They were knocked out by Kettering in the first round but, when it was discovered that their opponents had fielded an ineligible player, the tie had to be replayed.

Tilbury won after a replay and then beat another Southern League side, Nuneaton, in round two. Today they travel to Stoke City with, I fear, very little chance of claiming further honours.

Cup holders Manchester United have not been looking forward to today's visit to Carlisle United – the first-ever meeting of these two clubs in any competition. Robbed of their own supporters because of a ban on away ticket sales – United can expect a hostile reception from some 22,000 Cumbrians' fans.

Lawrie McMenemy, manager of the 1976 winners Southampton, makes a nostalgic journey to Blundell Park at Grimsby today. He was manager of Grimsby when he was recommended to the Saints by Don Revie and, though he maintains that promotion is his sole aim this season, Mr McMenemy will be seeking to avoid any sort of shock exit for the Saints today.


