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TEAM SPIRIT

KEY TO HENDON'S ACHIEVEMENTS

HENDON will freely admit that they have got to Wembley on a shoe string. They have fought off the tremendous handicap of a glut of crippling injuries with limited resources and some shrewd switching of players. The greatest thing in favour of the

of players. The greatest thing in favour of the defending Finalists is "Team Spirit." It has never been so high.

But the team spirit has only been achieved by understanding and confidence between the players and coach, Bill Fisher.

The last-named took over from the tremendously successful Ron Burgess at the start of the season. When Burgess, the former Tottenham and Wales star, returned to professional football first as coach to Fulham and now as manager of Bedford Town, Hendon were riding on the crest of a wave.

They were Amateur Cup and Middlesex Senior Cup holders and Isthmian League champions, having enjoyed the most successful season in the history of the 58-year-old club.

The quiet, unassuming Fisher, with over 800 first team games for Hendon to his credit and a 1960 Amateur Cup winner's medal, has managed to preserve Hendon's reputation as being one of the greatest in amateur football.

He gained the complete co-operation of the players who have made great sacrifices to win the club through to Wembley for the fourth time since 1955. Players like Roy Sleap, who has threaded his way through all the defensive positions this season except goal, and John Evans have jeopardised their international careers by playing out of position.

Evans, a regular right half for Wales, and Sleap who gained England and Olympic honours as defenders, are now currently appearing at inside forward and former centre forward David Hyde, who won England caps as an inside forward and right winger, is at outside left.

FANTASTIC

HFC

HENDON'S record of injury this season has been fantastic. It started when Hyde broke his leg during the close season tour. Then skipper Cantwell had a spell in hospital for a leg operation, Roy

hospital for a leg operation, Roy Drake fractured a shin bone and both Jimmy Quail and David Bassett snapped a leg in two places, within 24 hours of each other.

Centre half Geoff Riddy also had a long spell of inactivity due to severely damaged ankle ligaments.

Founded in 1908, reputedly under a lamppost on a street corner, Hendon, then Hampstead Town, played in the Finchley League and then the Willesden League before being elected to the Athenian League in 1919.

In 38 seasons, Hendon won the Athenian League championship three times and were runners-up five times before joining the Isthmian League three seasons ago. In their first term they were runners-up and champions last year. Incidentally the club changed its title twice—from Hampstead to Golders Green in 1933 and to Hendon in 1946.

Holders of the Middlesex Charity and Senior Cups on several occasions, Hendon reached their first Wembley Final in 1955 when they were beaten by the famous Bishop Auckland. They were more successful when they returned in 1960 and defeated Kingstonian in what was considered a classic Final. Hendon won the trophy again last season when they beat Whitby Town.

PERSONALITIES



MANY famous personalities have worn Hendon's colours, including cricketers Leslie and Denis Compton, Mickey Stewart and John Murray, Dexter Adams, now coach of Southern League

professionals, Barnet, and, perhaps one of their most famous personalities, Laurie Topp, who gained 32 England caps before hanging up his boots.

There were also Charlie Drinkwater who went to Aston Villa, Roy Stroud to West Ham, and Billy Dare and Bob Thomas to Brentford.

The club which is based at Claremont Road, Cricklewood, only a few miles from Wembley, has the reputation of being a heavy ground side. But they have proved that they are at home in any condition and Wembley's lush turf suits them just fine.

Hendon, league companions of Wealdstone, think they have the edge on their opponents having beaten them twice in league encounters this season. But Wealdstone, who knocked Hendon out of the London Senior Cup two months ago, have other ideas.

Though Hendon are a fine defensive side they are also prolific scorers. They smashed the Isthmian League goal charts in 1964 and have topped the 100 league goal barrier for the past three seasons.

INTRODUCING HENDON

JOHN SWANNELL, Goalkeeper

England's first choice as goalkeeper for the past two seasons, is one of the key factors in Hendon's successful march to Wembley. Formerly with Corinthian-Casuals, this 26-year-old transport manager joined Hendon three years ago. A member of Hendon's Cup-winning side last year, Swannell gained his football colours when he studied at Manchester University.

DAVID HOGWOOD, Right Back

Although only 22, can be regarded as being one of Hendon's most experienced performers. By representing the Middlesex Youth team on 12 occasions, Hogwood equalled the record established by Johnny Haynes, and his fine play over the past two years has won him an England trial this season. A telephone engineer, made his debut in senior amateur football with Athenian League club, Wembley.

MICKEY COOPER, Left Back A product of Brentford Juniors, is the frailest and smallest of the team. Makes up for his lack of inches by his tigerish efforts and shrewd covering. A contracts engineer, 19-year-old Cooper, who played for Middlesex Schools when a pupil at Southall Technical College, joined Hendon last year. Made a surprise appearance at outside left this season, but full back is his best position and he could soon be gathering even greater honours.

DAVID SHACKLOCK, Right Half Twenty-year-old book salesman, created an impression with Hendon two years ago when he played right back for Cheshunt, who surprisingly knocked Hendon, then the holders, out of the London Senior Cup. Transferred to Hendon the same year, but after failing to gain a first team berth, tried his luck with fellow Isthmians Enfield. Returned to Hendon in December and his superlative displays in his few first team outings has earned

him a final place.
GEOFF RIDDY, Centre Half Twenty-five-year-old foreman printer, 6 ft. 2 in. Riddy has an added incentive to shine today, as he faces his former club. It was after an uneventful stay with Wealdstone that Riddy decided to switch to Hendon six years ago. After skippering a highly successful reserves side, he eventually got his first team break, and was made club captain on the strength of some fine performances. Riddy relinquished the honours as he thought

it was affecting his form, but went from strength to strength.

BOBBY CANTWELL, Left Half (Captain)

JOHN EVANS, Inside Right

Ex-captain of Loughborough Colleges, a 24-year-old physical education master at a Dulwich school, had the unenviable task of filling the breach created by the retirement of the great Laurie Topp.

DAVID SWAIN, Centre Forward

The wheel of fortune has taken a dramatic turn in favour of this flame-haired 23-year-old in recent weeks. Unable to compand a first toom spect with Hendon Swain was towing

in recent weeks. Unable to command a first team spot with Hendon, Swain was toying with the idea of trying his luck elsewhere, and his name was linked with Wealdstone among others. But his decision to continue the fight proved very beneficial, for he was given another chance to show his mettle. Once had a brief stay with Tooting and Mitcham.

ROY SLEAP, Inside Left A member of last year's cup-winning side, 26-year-old Sleap will be making his third appearance at Wembley. He was in the Barnet team which lost to Crook Town in the 1959 Final, and then joined Hendon from Barnet in 1960. After two record-breaking seasons with Enfield, Sleap rejoined Hendon four years ago. The most versatile

performer in the Hendon side.

DAVID HYDE, Outside Left Another broken-leg victim who notched over 60 goals to set a new Hendon scoring record last year, but has yet to hit peak form this season. Played six times for England, has also represented Middlesex, the Isthmian and the Athenian Leagues, and boasts three London Senior Cup medals, and two Athenian League Championship plaques. A former West Ham youth player this 24-year-old company representative was with Woodford, Tooting and Mitcham, and Enfield, before joining Hendon in 1963.





IT'S BEEN A LONG, LONG TIME FOR WEALDSTONE

66 YEARS IN FACT!

WEALDSTONE step out at Wembley for the second time this afternoon—but for the first as Amateur Cup Finalists. The previous occasion was 24 years ago

when their opponents in the Final of the Middlesex Red Cross Cup were an

all-professional side from Uxbridge R.A.F.
Between times the three-mile journey from their ground almost in the centre of Harrow has been long and heartbreaking, so much so that there appeared to be a jinx on the club. For although they have won the Middlesex Senior Cup nine times to Hendon's six and shared the London Senior Cup with Wimbledon three years ago only once previously have they reached the fourth round of the Amateur Cup.

That was as far back as 1949 when a record

home crowd of 13,504 saw them go down to Leytonstone, holders for the two previous seasons, in a replay. Succeeding years were disastrous and they played in the qualifying competition until last year when Alvechurch beat them after they had won at Bishop Auckland in the second round.

Yet the early post-war years suggested previous progress would be accelerated. Founded in 1900, Wealdstone bought the present ground in 1922 and left the Spartan

present ground in 1922 and left the Spartan for the Athenian League six years later. Fame was achieved when they shared 14 goals with Dulwich Hamlet in the F.A. Cup in 1929. But they lost the replay and there was a lean period until 1937 when they won seven Amateur Cup ties before meeting Hamlet in the third round. Over 10,000 saw a 1-1 draw at Lower Mead but again saw a 1-1 draw at Lower Mead but again Hamlet won the replay.

TELEVISED



MORE fame came in 1947 when a match against Barnet was the first amateur league game to be televised. Two seasons later consecutive F.A. Cup-ties against Edgware Town and Colchester United were screened and they reached the first round of that competition for the first time, losing 1-0 at Port Vale.

That was the only goal conceded by Danny willshire in 630 minutes of Cup football starting with a 4-0 win at Hendon. Danny's cousin, Mr. K. A. Wiltshire is now secretary of the club, incidentally.

But even when Wealdstone won the Athenian League championship in 1952 success in the Amateur Cup continued elusive and Mr. Vince Burgess was appointed coach in 1961 with a view to altering this.

Denied a career as a professional through injury sustained at college, Mr. Burgess passed the F.A. Coaching Course in 1957 and served Harrow Town before joining Wealdstone.

He achieved success when the London Cup was shared with Wimbledon and then last season, when the club joined the Isthmian League, they got as far as the third round of the Amateur Cup. But still Mr. Burgess was not satisfied and only six of that team

The changes worked and but for injuries and repeated international calls on England's link men, Charlie Townsend and Hugh Lindsay, the league position would be higher.

As it is between Christmas and the end of March only Hendon (a league defeat soon avenged by a London Senior Cup win) and Leytonstone (in the semi-final of the London Cup) beat them.

Earlier the club reached the first round of the F.A. Cup and gave Millwall a fight before losing 3-1 at the Den.

DETERMINATION



SO Wealdstone go into today's game with no feeling that they are underdogs. Perhaps the luck of the draw has helped them to Wembley without having to travel further from home than to Barking.

The determined courage exemplified in the captain, John Ashworth, and skill flowering in Hugh Lindsay and Charlie Townsend have justifiably brought them to grips with their traditional rivals in amateur soccer's greatest setting.

Long one of the best supported clubs in the south, Wealdstone at last stand at the threshold of their dreams. Dreams cherished by three of the principal officers for a combined total of over a century-the President, Mr. H. A. Luck joined the committee in 1928, the Chairman, Mr. J. Rogers, in 1932, and the Deputy Chairman, Mr. Frank Harbud, surpasses both. For he was a player in 1919.


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INTRODUCING WEALDSTONE

BRIAN GOYMER, Goalkeeper

Injury kept him out of Amateur Cup semi-finals during the past two years when with Barnet and Enfield. Highly regarded since he appeared for Barnet in the 1959 Final. Goymer is in merchant banking. Aged 25. Height 6 ft. Weight 12 st. 6 lbs.

MICKY DOYLE, Right Back

Fast, quick tackling, cool, his hobby is rock climbing, Doyle is a Lancashire lad who joined from Fulham in 1963. Electrical draughtsman. Aged 20. Height 5 ft. 9 ins. Weight 10 st. 12 lbs.

GORDON SEDGLEY, Left Back

Came straight into the side on joining from Enfield in August. Accurate dead-ball kicker and long-distance thrower, Sedgley is sometimes seen in the attack. Transport service manager. Aged 23. Height 6 ft. 1 in. Weight 13 st. CHARLIE TOWNSEND, Right Half

Has won 24 caps for England and Great Britain, he joined Wealdstone from Watford Juniors 10 years ago as a centre- or inside-forward. Converted to a half-back after

JOHN ASHWORTH, Centre Half (Captain)

Like Lindsay a member of the Kingstonian side beaten by Hendon in 1960, Ashworth's inspiring captaincy has done much to take the side to its first Final. 


