Furthest Ever

Good afternoon to everyone for this most important Second Round Proper Match in the F.A. Challenge Cup, for which we welcome the Directors, Players and Supporters of Reading F.C.

It is now three weeks since I have written these programme notes and what a momentous period in the club's history it has been starting with the home game against Hereford for which my wife and I rushed in a taxi from our friends wedding to be greeted by Ken Wiltshire in the car park (I wonder if people realise how much of the actual football the Directors and officials miss due to the work they do on match days) who told us we were 1—0 down, Ken had heard the cheer for the Hereford goal which we gratefully learned the referee had disallowed.

I understand the first twenty minutes of this game was all Hereford and the rest I saw also had them on top most of the time but full credit to our defence and in fact all the team for fighting all the way to earn the replay at Hereford.

Wednesday 30th November 1977 at Hereford will go down as one of the great dates in Wealdstone F.C. history and I am sure that all who saw the game will remember it for a long time.

Barely had we taken our seats when in 86 seconds Hereford scored and we thought is this the end of our unbeaten 14 match run, and our interest in the F.A. Cup, however once again the team spirit and determination Alan Fogarty has instilled into the side held good and we held on and then settled down to play very well. A free kick on the right about 10 minutes before half time and without Hereford putting up a wall Keith Furphy drove the ball hard and low and in swooped Pat Ferry to get our equaliser.

Early in the second half Keith Furphy free on the left crossed a perfect ball and there was Bobby Moss (leaping like a salmon, his words not mine), to head us into the lead.

Within a further ten minutes another foul on Steve Brinkman gave us a free kick and this time despite Hereford putting up a wall Pat Ferry rose magnificently to Keith Furphy's great cross to give us an unbelievable but deserved 3—1 lead.

Alan Fogarty immediately switched John Watson to sweeper and when Hereford got a goal with about 25 minutes to go there were many who thought he had made a mistake and Hereford would equalise, but Alan proved right and we held out thanks to magnificent work on the field and

Chris Lightfoot's agility in goal. Everyone was magnificent with no one deserving any greater credit than anyone else, a truly wonderful team effort and was the finest performance of the club certainly in the four years I have been chairman and probably since our Amateur Cup victory in 1966.

From the sublime to the ridiculous in three days, Saturday 3rd December saw us at Harrow BOROUGH AND IN THE WORDS OF Alan Fogarty most of the players "were still reading the newspapers" and without taking anything away from our local rivals the three nil victory was earned against a very below form and worse still below effort Wealdstone.

Our defeat ended our 15 match unbeaten run and certainly brought us all down to earth after the exploits against Hereford.

The following Monday saw us away to Nuneaton and going for a draw based on defensive play appeared to be our best chance.

Three bookings of our players and none for Nuneaton, despite two thigh high tackles by Nuneaton players, indicated what we were up against and when a Nuneaton player "fell" from a challenge by Chris Lightfoot after a late back pass nobody was surprised when the referee awarded a penalty, this resulted in a 1-0 defeat which although territorily justified we would have preferred to have lost if indeed we deserved to lose at all, by something other than the penalty which was awarded.

Last Saturday away to Weymouth I was unable to be there, but I am informed that we played very well and after going down by what Alan Fogarty called two Micky Mouse goals, we fought back with a Bobby Moss goal and could have equalised.

The Weymouth manager paid us the compliment of being the best side he had seen at Weymouth this year, but with only 14 points from 15 games in the league we certainly have got to start getting points again soon.

Back to today which takes Wealdstone the furthest ever in the F.A. Challenge Cup and only one away from the Third Round when all the First Division sides come in, who knows it could be Anfield, Highbury or Old Trafford next, best of luck lads and give us your best and I am sure that will be good enough.

Our thanks to Johnny Ryan, our friend from the Harrow Country and Western for donating the ball again they are so expensive these days, I understand from George Perkins, our hard working Head Groundsman that if we win today Johnny will be expected to buy a sack full.

Also thanks to Brian Bennett of Bennetts Sports who has already donated track suits to the players and has now given Ron Sharp his own named track suit and special goalkeeping trousers for hard pitches for Chris Lightfoot, this gesture is much appreciated.

After my dart to the last Cup game I have now to tell you about a real dash to see today's game, Harry Benjamin, one of our Directors who is in the travel business, is going to Majorca on Friday (yesterday) and is flying home this morning to see the game and then is going straight back to the airport to return to Majorca this evening that is a real jet setting supporter.

Finally on 1st December we gave Alan Fogarty an official contract as Manager and we hope that today will be the first win since his appointment, and as in the past please give him and the players your support.

Record Breaking Win at Hereford

Bobby Moss who joined us three years ago from Barnet made his 150th league and cup appearance for the 'Stones in our F.A. Cup 1st Round replay at Hereford and celebrated with his 40th goal for the club. Bobby who played in the Football League with Orient and Colchester made five Second Division appearances for Orient in 1971/72 and a further seventeen for Colchester in the Fourth Division the following season. It was on Saturday August 12th, 1972 that Hereford United made their debut as a Football League club with a Fourth Division match at Colchester and by a strange coincidence Bobby Moss made his debut for the Essex club in the same match. He finished on the winning side on that occasion also as Colchester won by the only goal scored by Stephen Foley. Two more of our players have reached personal landmarks in their careers with the 'Stones in our last two matches. George Duck made his 300th league and cup appearance at Nuneaton and John Watson played in his 150th Southern League match at Weymouth. This game was also the 199th Southern League match in which George had taken part.

That 3—0 F.A. Trophy defeat against Harrow Borough at Earlsmead, our heaviest this season, brought to an end our longest run of matches without defeat since we turned professional. Our win at Hereford was not only our first over a Football League club but it had also extended our unbeaten run to 15 matches breaking the record we set up earlier this season when we completed a run of 14 games unbeaten with a 1—1 draw at Kettering.

This afternoon we appear in the F.A. Cup 2nd Round for the first time in the club's history and have as our opponents another Football League club in the shape of Reading Football Club. Most of you will recall that we met in the 1st Round last season at Elm Park and we were beaten by a John Murray goal in the 57th minute. Reading went on to win 2—1 at Wycombe before losing 1—0 at Hereford in the 3rd Round. Only five of the players who represented us at Elm Park, John Watson, Bobby Moss, Alan Fursdon, Dave Parratt and George Duck, are still with the 'Stones. All are expected to play this afternoon.

Reading F.C. were formed in 1871 and turned professional in 1895. Founder members of the Southern League in 1894/95 they continued to play in this league until when they became one of the original members of the newly formed Division III (South) of the Football League. Reading's only league championship to date was won in 1925/26 when they took the Division III (South) title to gain promotion to Division II. Five seasons were spent in the Second Division, in which their best position was 14th in 1926/27, but at the end of the 1930/31 season they were relegated and found themselves back in the 3rd Division where they were to remain until 1971 when once again they were faced with relegation, this time to Division IV. It took Reading five seasons to win back their 3rd Division place gaining promotion along with Lincoln, Northampton and Tranmere at the end of the 1975/76 season. However their return was short lived as after just one season in the 3rd Division they were relegated once again last May. A look at the league table elsewhere in this programme shows that our visitors are making a determined effort to get back into the 3rd Division again.

This afternoon's match will be Reading's 210th in the F.A. Cup, the first being over 100 years ago in November 1977 when they defeated South Norwood 2—0 in the 1st Round. Only Notts County of the present league clubs played so long ago. Reading suffered their heaviest defeat in an F.A. Cup match when Preston North End beat them 18—0 in the 1st Round in 1893/94. Their best season in the competition was in 1926/27 when they reached the semi-final only to lose 3—0 to Cardiff City at Wolverhampton. The Welsh club went on to beat Arsenal in the final at Wembley, the only time the F.A. Cup was won by a club from outside England.

Reading's season began with a 2—1 defeat at Watford in the Football League Cup 1st Round 1st Leg but in the 2nd Leg at Elm Park the "Biscuitmen" won 1—0. The replay took place back at Vicarage Road and resulted in Reading's heaviest defeat of the season, the score being 5—0. In the 1st Round of the F.A. Cup Reading beat Aldershot 3—1 at Elm Park, where on Saturday last they recorded their eighth consecutive home game without defeat with a resounding 3—0 win over Doncaster. A complete list of all Reading's results appear with our Division IV table. Reading have scored 30 goals this season, their marksmen being Earles (11), Kearns (5), Nelson (3), Murray, Peters, Williams, Cumming (2 each), Bowman, Sanchez, Davies (1 each).

Ian Cranstone spent a lonely afternoon at Lower Mead it was quite a different story as bottom of the Bracknell Town provided much stiffer opposition than their league position indicated. After a goalless first half it was a Steve Hockham penalty that put the 'Stones in front. Ten minutes after half time. Steve scored his second fifteen minutes later, Bracknell reducing the arrears in the closing minutes to enable the 'Stones to run out 2-1 winners. The team was the same as the previous week except that Chris Springle replaced Terry Boyle who travelled to Weymouth with the senior side. The substitutes were Paul Downes and Steve Lee.
