ELM PARK VISITORS...WEALDSTONE

HAIL SUPER STONES - THE NON-LEAGUE TRIPLE CHAMPS

ELM PARK today plays host to the Everton of non-League football.

Wealdstone enjoyed a triumphant last season, winning the Gola League Championship and lifting the FA Trophy at Wembley. For good measure, they took the Middlesex County Cup to complete a unique treble.

Under a different system, the Harrow-based club might be playing Division 4 soccer this term. As it is, they are striving to retain their Gola crown—battling with the likes of Dartford, Kettering and Barrow in front of crowds of 700 at the Lower Mead Stadium.

Stones won the title in May with 62 points, four clear of runners-up Nuneaton. They were most successful on their travels with 12 victories — compared to just eight on home soil.

The FA Challenge Trophy saw success again with Wealdstone coming through five rounds and seven ties to make the short trip to Wembley for the showdown with fellow Gola Leaguers Boston United. They won 2-1 to cap the most glorious year in the club's 85-year history. In recognition of this, they received one of the six coveted Rothmans Football Awards for 1985.

This afternoon's FA Cup clash is the third between Royals and Wealdstone in the past decade. A first round tie at Elm Park in 1976 saw us scrape through 1-0 in an ill-tempered game.

John Murray scored the clincher on the hour while the visitors had Alan Fursden and John Arnold sent off near the end.

But the part-timers gained revenge a year later. After beating Aldershot 3-1, we travelled to Lower Mead and lost 2-1. Although Stones were beaten 4-0 by QPR in the next round, it still remains their best-ever run in the competition.

FAMILIAR

A familiar face in the Wealdstone lineup is Gary Donnellan, who made 41 League appearances for us between 1981-83 and scored five goals. He is best remembered for his hat-trick in the stirring 5-3 extra-time Football League Trophy win over Division 1 Watford. Another former Royal to have recently turned out for the club is midfielder Roy Davies (1977-78), who is now playing in Malta.

Most of Stones' senior squad have Football League experience, the majority with London clubs. But Mark Graves, top scorer for the past two seasons, originally hails from Plymouth Argyle.

Coventry City left-back Stuart Pearce was signed from Wealdstone in 1983. The Sky Blues paid £25,000 for him — a record for the Lower Mead club.

PAUL BOWGETT (defender): Club skipper. Formerly with Tottenham and Wimbledon but has now played nearly 300 games for Stones. A 30year-old sales manager in the entertainment industry.

ROBIN WAINWRIGHT (midfielder): League experience with Luton, Cambridge United, Millwall and Northampton. Also played for Dunstable and Hillingdon. A 34-year-old sports centre assistant manager.

BRIAN GREENAWAY (midfielder): A 27-year-old painter and decorator. Was at Fulham for six years before playing in Greece. Signed for Stones in August, 1983, and has made over 100 appearances for them.





LEE HOLMES (midfielder): A 29-year-old civil engineering technician who made his League debut for Brentford at Elm Park in August, 1979. Has FA Trophy winners' medals with both Enfield and Wealdstone.

ANDY GRAHAM (striker): Moved to Lower Mead via northern outfits Hyde United and Lancaster City. A 24-year-old history teacher. Scored the opener in last term's FA Trophy win at Wembley.



GARY DONNELLAN (midfielder): Former Reading player who made Royals debut at Southend in November, 1981. Joined Wealdstone in August, 1983. A 23-year-old button salesman.

MARK GRAVES (striker): Joined from Plymouth Argyle in August, 1982. At the start of this season had scored 102 goals in 153 matches. A 24year-old financial consultant.





ALAN CORDICE (striker): Current member of the England Semi-Professional squad and made debut for them against Italy in 1983. A 29-year-old glazier, formerly with Norwich. Brother Neil also plays for Stones.

VINCE JONES (midfielder): A 20-year-old painter and decorator. Served apprenticeship at Watford but joined Stones from Herts County League side Redmond in August last year.





STEVE PERKINS (defender): While captain of Chelsea's reserve side he fractured his spine, keeping him out of action for two years. Moved to Wimbledon then Wealdstone in January, 1981. A 30-year-old restaurateur.

DEREK DOYLE (midfielder): Signed at the start of the season from local rivals Harrow Borough. A 26-year-old self-employed painter and decorator, formerly with Brentford, Southall and Hayes.

THE last time Reading and Wealdstone met in the FA Cup was in the second round at Lower Mead Stadium, Harrow, on Saturday, December 17, 1977.

Wealdstone, then in the Southern League Premier Division, defeated Reading, who were seventh in Division 4, by two goals to one.

Stones, who had knocked out Division 3 Hereford in round one, took the lead with a goal scored by Keith Furphy direct from a corner in the fifth minute.

Despite heavy pressure, Reading were unable to equalise and fell further behind 20 minutes into the seond half. Alan Lewis conceded a penalty which was converted at the third attempt by George Duck.

Eventually, Pat Earles did pull back a goal for

Reading. But despite three near misses by Ollie Kearns in the last ten minutes, Wealdstone held on to their lead and were rewarded with a third round tie away at QPR.


They were beaten 4-0 at Loftus Road, but it was calculated at the time that Reading's defeat had cost the club about £10,000 in gate money.

HAS Trevor Senior set himself the target of scoring at least one Reading goal against each of this season's Division 3 opponents?

It would certainly seem to be the case because his goals against Wolves and Notts County brought his total up to 19 of this term's opposition.

He had previously added Brentford and Cardiff to his tally earlier this season, but November looks like being a bumper month for the Senior collection.

Darlington and Derby have escaped the Senior goal touch so far while today's visitors Wealdstone present another scalp for Trevor to aim for.

He has already scored at York so his blank last Saturday didn't matter too much!

Since Ian Branfoot was appointed as Royals

boss in January, 1984, Trevor's goals have become something of a good luck charm for the side.

He has scored 47 goals in 69 League games since Branfoot took over — and, remarkably, only one of those goals came in a game that Royals lost.

That one "wasted" goal was scored during our 5-1 defeat at Lincoln over a year ago. Even then, Senior could claim he did not know it was a futile goal as it put us into the lead — albeit only for a short period.

Obviously, the rest of the team would be advised to get Trevor on the scoresheet as often as possible to ensure we avoid defeat!

They certainly took note a year ago when we first pointed out this unusual statistic because he averaged a goal a game over the remainder of his injury-hit season.

Presenting another in our occasional series of personal articles. Club secretary Alison Meek takes a look at life behind the scenes during Royals' recent home game with Wolves.

IT'S 9.02am and already the switchboard is ablaze with calls coming through on every line.

On an evening match Jayne, our receptionist/telephonist, has the morning off and it therefore seems busier than usual. My first task is to start writing ground tickets for the numerous people who have ordered them. 'Wolverhampton Wanderers' is not the easiest of team names to write in a hurry, especially when one gentleman comes in for 15 of them! No sooner have I written a batch when more are required. I haven't quite mastered the art of answering the switchboard, writing and selling tickets and making the tea at the same time! I have been informed that two television crews will be turning up and the problem is where to put them all as each crew consists of five men plus equipment. The media must have guessed when the manager walked in as the phones start ringing again. All three are going and some bright spark in the background is shouting panic!" Easier said than done.

Brenda has just brought in the Executive Box programmes. As they need to be put in the boxes, I take the opportunity to go outside. It's an eerie feeling standing at the top of C Stand on a matchday when the place is still deserted. But it's nice to get away from the hustle and bustle of the office for just a quiet moment.

It's now 4pm and I am beginning to feel nervous about the game. Can we win our 14th successive League match or will this be the one that stops our run? One of the TV crews is in the managing director's office setting up their lights while the other is interviewing

someone on the pitch. Tonight's game is sponsored by Bratts, who will be making a presentation beforehand. They have just arrived at the same time as the 60-strong Ambassadors Band and the office resembles a sardine tin. Having shepherded everyone away to their respective places, Jayne and I start handing out more tickets. By 7.15 most of them have been collected and it is a lot calmer.

CHEERING

As the office is directly underneath the main stand, we can hear all the cheering. The man in the public address box rings down to say Wolves have just scored through Ryan. We can't believe it! While the game is in progress the turnstile operators return with the gate takings, which need to be checked, and we try to arrive at a crowd figure. Halftime arrives and the switchboard springs into life. One particular lad from Wolverhampton has phoned every five minutes since 7.30 for the latest score. Suddenly there are deafening cheers and plenty of stamping. Jayne and I rush to the switchboard to hear from the PA man which one of our players has scored (we know it's our team as the cheers are far louder). We hear the news that Kevin has just equalised and everyone is ecstatic. Someone guesses the final score will be 2-1 and we keep our fingers crossed. Trevor puts us into the lead and we start to celebrate only to be told nine minutes from time that Wolves have drawn level. Our elation subsides and then the final whistle blows. The switchboard is still ringing and Jayne says she hates telling callers the final score is a draw.

The gate figure has been reached and the place is full of Pressmen clamouring to be told it. I make a quick visit to the match officials before they leave, then Jayne and I prepare to go home at 10.30.

It's been a long and tiring day and it wasn't the score we had hoped for. But the excitement of a matchday just can't be beaten!



FROM THE MIDDLE.

THE CAUTION

AMONG the sanctions the referee has over and above the award of a free-kick, the caution comes in the middle in severity. Referees frequently give informal warnings to players (e.g. for an over-zealous tackle

where they are willing to give the benefit of the doubt). Yet the referee wants the player to know the matter has been noticed and (mentally) noted. That sort of warning is the first level: the final stage is the sending-off, the intermediate stage is the caution — a formal warning which is recorded. It is also reported by the referee to a higher authority, even in park football to the surprise of some

of the players.

Of the four reasons for cautions, the least common is for entering or leaving the field of play without the referee's permission (selfexplanatory?) and for persistently infringing the laws of the game. Persistent infringement is more difficult to define. Players always ask: "How often is persistent?" No easy answer. More than a couple of occasions but it doesn't have to be the same offence. The referee cautions when the player's actions make it quite clear he has no intention of playing within the

laws.

"Dissent" and "ungentlemanly conduct" are all too frequent. Dissent "by word or action" from the referee's decision has become part of the gamesmanship of soccer at all levels. Minor petulance and reflex comments are often tolerated by officials and some argue that the caution is used too little to underline the referee's authority. Others would like the law changed to allow a more direct and immediate punishment as in rugby (i.e. the automatic ten-yard

"Ungentlemanly conduct," as regular readers will know, merits an article of its own. It is something of a catch-all to cover those actions by players which merit a more severe punishment than just a free-kick (e.g. a worse than usual, premeditated tackle). Also, those actions not covered under the usual definition of foul play (e.g. gesticulating to prevent a player from taking

a throw-in).

The caution is serious because if a player goes on to commit another cautionable offence he will be sent off. The fact that it need not be the same offence helps to explain some of those puzzling decisions when a player seems to have committed a cautionable offence but ends up walking to the dressing-room. Often ungentlemanly conduct followed by dissent and punished accordingly.
