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Third Time Lucky

Good afternoon to you all for this most important 1st Round Proper F.A. Cup game against our Third Division opponents Hereford United to whose officials, players and supporters we extend a cordial welcome.

This is the third time in three years we have reached the first round of the F.A. Cup. In 1975 we went out 3—4 away to Aldershot, in 1976 it was 0—1 away to Reading, but we are hoping that being at home today it will be third time lucky.

Whilst on the subject of luck I wondered whether our game against Hillingdon on Monday night in the Southern League Cup might prove—Number 13 unlucky for some—especially after ten minutes when we were two down.

Once again team spirit carried us through and the 2—2 draw extended our unbeaten run to 13 matches, here's to number 14 today.

Hillingdon's first goal came within one minute when Steve Brinkman again tried to play football in his own penalty box instead of whacking the ball away, however let us not forget that the Steve who joined us would not even have been back in the defensive positions he now takes up, his overall game has certainly improved. Another Hillingdon goal with another defensive blunder and we were two down in ten minutes, and John Sillett (Hereford's Manager) who was watching in the Director's Box must have thought his team were in for an easy game today.

As the game settled down, and Bobby Finch and Paul Thomas both adjusted to the pace after their long lay-offs through injury, we gradually got on top and in the last quarter of an hour of the half Chris Lightfoot only touched the ball once and that from a pass back.

The second half with the wind at our backs was only seven minutes old when a trip on Bobby Moss gave us a penalty and there it was George Duck's 217th goal for Wealdstone for the Club Record, there are a minimum of 33 games left to go, 29 in the league and four in cups, so with a goal a game George you can make it 250 at the end of the season.

After a further eight minutes a fine break lead to George laying on our equaliser for Pat Ferry to take a well taken goal, that left us half an hour to get the winner, but although we had all the play we could not get the goal which would have avoided the replay which is not yet fixed, but please check with future programmes and the press as with all the future congestion a date has not yet been allocated.

As I mentioned in Monday's programme, Debenham's are sponsoring a cup for the two teams from the 1st Round which go farthest, so this week they are displaying in their Harrow store a sports window with a picture of our team and a message of good wishes for our success today. I had a photograph taken with Malcolm Leach the Sports Department Manager, who is a long-time 'Stones supporter, and for anyone who has seen it in the Harrow Observer I don't want any comments about looking like the dummy in the window.

Today one of my life-long friends is getting married and my wife and I had accepted the invitation long before we knew whether we would be playing in the cup today, so with the help of Harry Benjamin's taxi driver friend Ralpho we are hoping to get to the game after half an hour merry and hopefully with us in the lead.

This week has seen Ken Wiltshire, Frank Ryder and other members of the Social Club in Majorca and we are hoping to see them today, Spanish strikes permitting—Ken and Frank and all helpers at the Social Club which so greatly contributes to club funds, deserve a rest and we hope they had an enjoyable winter break and their enjoyment continues today.

Whilst on the subject of help to the club funds let us not forget the Supporters Club who have recently made a donation of £120 and are also helping weekly to balance the books. Also a vote of thanks to them for paying for the replacement bulbs in the floodlights and particularly to Chairman Bert Wakefield for supervising the replacements on a cold windy morning last week.

Preparations for today's game with a hoped large gate have been very considerable and to all those who have helped and indeed will be helping today, we say a very big thank you, you are too numerous to mention individually but I am sure I speak for all when I say your efforts are much appreciated.

History in the Making

History is being made this afternoon with the first ever visit of a Football League club to Lower Mead for an F.A. Cup tie. Although this is our seventh appearance in the First Round we have only twice before been drawn at home and on both occasions our opponents were non-league clubs, Nuneaton Borough in 1966 and St Albans City in 1968.

Hereford United, our opponents on this occasion were founded in 1924 but have only been members of the Football League for the last five years. From 1945 until 1972 they were members of the Southern League and during that time they won two league championships. The first was in 1958/59 when the league was split into two divisions, East and West, and Hereford won the Western section. Their second success came in

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1964/65 when they took the First Division title to win back the Premier Division place they had lost the previous season. The 1971/72 season was to be their last as a non-league club and although they finished as runners-up to Chelmsford City in the Premier Division, they will probably be best remembered for their 2-1 F.A. Cup victory over Newcastle United in which Ron Radford scored the "goal of the season".

At the Football League's annual meeting in the summer of 1972 Hereford were elected to Division IV in place of Barrow and by the end of their first season in their new surroundings they had finished in second place behind Southport to gain promotion to Division III at the first attempt. It took Hereford only three more seasons to reach the dizzy heights of the Second Division as they stormed to the Third Division championship in 1975/76 ending up six points clear of runners-up Cardiff City. From the Southern League to Division II in four years was a remarkable achievement but their march towards the big boys of the First Division was brought to an abrupt end last May. Struggling for most of the season Hereford were to finish in last place even though they suffered only one defeat in their last nine league matches. So after just one season in Division Two Hereford found themselves back in the Third Division.

Things haven't been going too well for them again this season and despite a recent run of nine league matches without defeat, in which only two goals were conceded, Hereford are now near the wrong end of the league table. Their season began with two matches against Fourth Division Bournemouth in the Football League Cup. Hereford won the first leg at their Edgar Street ground by two goals to nil but were beaten 4-2 in the 2nd leg at Boscombe. The clubs returned to Edgar Street for the replay and it was the seasiders who won this time by the odd goal in three. In the league Hereford's away form has been disappointing, only two goals scored in nine matches on opponents grounds. Defeats at Chester (1-4), Plymouth (0-2) and Chesterfield (1-2) were followed by four goalless draws at Preston, Lincoln, Colchester and Bradford. However their last two away games have ended in further defeats at Shrewsbury (0-3) and Portsmouth (0-2). Six consecutive away matches without a goal is a run Hereford will be wanting to end this afternoon but Chris Lightfoot & Co., would like to see it extended to seven. Our visitors have scored nineteen goals in league and cup matches with four of them coming from Dixie McNeil, who has now joined Wrexham. Other

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scorers have been Spring (3), Carter, Marshall and Sinclair (2 each), Briley, Davey, Emery, B. Holmes, Ritchie and Sheedy (1 each).

Whilst we celebrate our third consecutive season in the 1st Round Proper it is worth recording that as a non-league club Hereford reached this round for 21 consecutive seasons. With the 'Stones hoping to enter the 2nd Round for the first time our friends from Hereford may be interested to know that our opponents in the 1st Round for the past two seasons have been Aldershot and Reading. What's so unusual about that you may ask? Well like Hereford both these clubs were in the bottom half of Division III when we met them, they both put an end to our cup run, and at the end of the season, **both were relegated.**

The moral would seem to be, if you don't want to go down to Division IV, don't knock Wealdstone out of the First Round of the F.A. Cup.

His name and Wealdstone will forever remain synonymous, particular in the minds of those who have been fortunate enough to have been spectating at Lower Mead during the reign of this loyal clubman. And welcome, Wealdstone supporters, to perhaps the most important and prestigious match ever to have been played on this ground. We really are a lucky bunch, for none of our predecessors on these terraces have had the opportunity of cheering on the 'Stones against Football League opposition in the country's premier cup competition. Just think of that! Not once in all the 77 years that this club has been in existence . . . truly a memorable afternoon.

The burden of carrying Wealdstone to victory, therefore, rests squarely on our larynxes, so let's have a repeat performance of the support that won the day against Maidstone in the last round. Let's all get behind the boys in blue and shout ourselves silly . . . after all, this may be our last opportunity for another 77 years! Let's make the most of it!

And we extend an equally warm welcome to the supporters of Hereford United, who will no doubt have made their way East in great numbers for this afternoon's intriguing encounter. We might well have been entertaining Hereford at Lower Mead in the Southern League had they not enjoyed a number of successes in the F.A. Cup five years ago, which subsequently elevated them to the Football League. Now, I wonder if say, Aylesbury will be thinking the same thing about Wealdstone in 1982 . . . ? We hope United supporters enjoy the facilities at Lower Mead: tea bars can be located at both ends of the ground, while both the club shop on the High Mead (open) terrace and the Supporters Club office (adjoining the Elmslie Stand) stock programmes, souvenirs and other paraphernalia.

Seats for the replay at Edgar Street on Wednesday night (should today's game finish all-square) can also be booked from the club office, and coaches leave Lower Mead mid-afternoon. But check at the office after the game for full details.

This afternoon's match comes as a true climax to a run of six successive home games, but there will be a lot of travelling to do next month! We have a "provisional" fixture arranged for Monday, December 5 at Nuneaton Borough, depending on the

outcome of our Challenge Trophy tie at Harrow Borough the preceding Saturday. If there is a definite conclusion, coaches will leave Lower Mead for Manor Park at 4.30 p.m. A definite away date comes the following Saturday, December 10th, at Weymouth, for which coaches leave Wealdstone at 9.45 a.m. (to leave plenty of time for a paddle. Don't forget your ice-pick!). There will be **no** transport running to Harrow Borough on the 3rd, as it is so local, nor for that matter to Hillingdon Borough for our Southern League Cup replay. Sorry, but perhaps supporters can arrange lifts for these fixtures.

And who knows, perhaps after all those away games (and today's match) we will still remain unbeaten . . . a record that seemed likely to be snatched away as Hillingdon came plundering on Monday, but after Wealdstone changed gear midway through the second half there was only one likely winner. Okay, so we didn't win, but that honourable draw served perfectly to underline the fighting spirit that is very much in evidence amongst the players at present.

Go to it Wealdstone, and let the accumulation of thirteen games be the battering ram that sends Hereford teetering to the very brink this afternoon. With our support they can do it.

Chris Lightfoot (Goalkeeper). An experienced keeper. Signed midway through last season, formerly with Romford.

Steve Hockham (Defender). Young player, signed early this season. Has been on the books of Crystal Palace.

Paul Thomas (Defender). Signed last March from Isthmian Leaguers Walthamstow Avenue.

Alan Fursdon (defender). Signed early last season from Dover after a long lay off due to an ankle injury. Now fully fit.

John Watson (Defender/Midfield). Formerly with Orient where he was capped for England Youth. Been with the club for four seasons and is now captain.

David Parratt (Defender). Signed early last season from Bedford Town. Has been successfully converted into a central defender.

Fred Barwick (Defender). Another young player signed this season, formerly with Spurs.

Micky Griffiths (Midfield). Signed midway through last season from Hillingdon Borough. Experienced player who has appeared for several clubs in the Southern League.

Steve Brinkman (Midfield). Local lad who has been on Arsenal's books. Signed midway through last season.

George Duck (Striker). The club's longest serving player and leading goalscorer. Experience with Millwall and Southend United.

Bobby Moss (Striker). Signed two years ago from Barnet. Versatile player.

Pat Ferry (Striker). Another experienced player in his first season with the club.

Keith Furphy (Midfield/Striker). Like several of his team mates another young player signed early this season. Has been on the books of Q.P.R. and Ipswich.

Bobby Finch (Midfield). The club's newest signing from Gravesend. Had a long spell with that club and Maidstone. Has also played in South Africa and with Q.P.R.

Ian Cranstone (Goalkeeper). A young keeper signed at the start of the season. Has always played well when called on for first team duty.

Hereford United Club History

Hereford United celebrated their 50th Anniversary in 1974/75 season and since being elected to the Football League in 1972, their progress has been quite remarkable: they were Fourth Division runners-up in 1972/73, their first season in the Football League, and Third Division Champions in 1975/76, although Second Division status was lost after only one season. However, Hereford United's promotion to the Second Division was achieved quicker than any other team in the past fifty years, since the League was reconstructed in 1921.

Formed in 1924, they originally competed in the Birmingham Combination but switched to the Birmingham League five years later and were elected to the Southern League in 1939. During their non-league days they never won a championship at top level but finished four times as runners-up in the Southern League.

Their forte was cup football and they set a non-league record by reaching the first round of the F.A. Cup 23 times in 24 years, before their election to the Fourth Division. They fought their way through to the second round 13 times during that period, the third round three times and the fourth round once. In 1971/72 they were named Sunday Mirror Giantkillers after eliminating First Division Newcastle United in a replay and then holding West Ham United to a goalless draw.

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In 1973/74 season they maintained their fine Cup record when they were paired with West Ham United for the second time in three years and gained a 2—1 revenge after drawing at Upton Park. Before their election to the League, they won the Southern League Cup three times, the Southern League Charity Cup and also reached the Welsh Cup final, before losing to Cardiff.

Hereford have always been fortunate in their choice of Managers and since the war their affairs have been directed by the great John Charles, former Middlesbrough and Northampton Chief Bob Dennison, ex-Villa and Torquay United Manager Alex Massie, and three former Arsenal players: Joe Wade, Ray Daniel and Colin Addison.

In 1974 they came under new management and the man in charge is former Bristol City assistant manager and chief coach, John Sillett, ex-Chelsea, Coventry and Plymouth Argyle.

Hereford's motto is "Our greatest glory lies, not in never having fallen, but in rising when we fall".

FIVE YEARS AGO

The corresponding Saturday in 1972—November 25th—saw Wealdstone visiting Canterbury City for a Southern League, First Division (South) fixture. The game marked the debuts of both centre-back Paul Docherty and striker Derek Gozney, who were two of the few Wealdstone successes on that afternoon in darkest Kent. 'Stones attack "would have been hard pressed to punch holes in a wet paper bag" according to the match report, but Derek Gozney was on hand to shoot the valuable equaliser to Canterbury's early goal, and earned struggling Wealdstone a much-needed point. Where is Gozney now? Playing for Croyley Dickinson's in the Watford and District League. Wealdstone team at Canterbury: Barr, Beyer, Burgess, Hale, Docherty, Cockell, Presland, Dyson, Connell, Duck, Gozney. Substitute Alick Brown.

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Hereford United Pen Pictures

Les Briley (Midfield). Born in Southwark, London and became an Apprentice Professional with Chelsea Football Club. Joined Hereford United in March 1976 and made his first team debut against Cardiff City in the Welsh Cup Final. Made 35 first team appearances last season.

Roy Carter (Midfield). Born in Falmouth and joined Hereford United from the Western League Champions, Falmouth, in February 1975. Made his first team debut against Halifax Town in the final match of the 1974/75 season. Last season made 25 appearances in the first team.

Steve Davey (Forward). Formerly an English Youth International, he spent eleven years at Home Park with Plymouth Argyle, the town in which he was born. Transferred to Hereford United in July 1975 and has since made almost one hundred first team appearances.

Steve Emery (Defender). Was United's first Apprentice Professional when the club was elected to the Football League in 1972. Made his League debut in February 1974 and has since made over 140 first team appearances. Born in Ledbury, nearby to Hereford, an injury early last season limited him to 19 first team appearances last season.

John Layton (Defender). Locally born, John is in his second spell with United, having also played for southern league clubs Kidderminster Harriers and Gloucester City. Made his first team debut for United in 1974 and has since made 80 league and cup appearances.

Julian Marshall (Defender). Born in Swansea and gained Welsh Youth International Caps. Although breaking a leg early in 1976, he recovered to make his first team debut against Notts Forest in March 1977 and finished with 15 first team appearances last season.

Andy Proudlove. Born in Buxton and became an Apprentice with Reading and later made his League debut for that club in 1970/71 against Scunthorpe. Was on loan for a period with West Ham before signing for Sheffield Wednesday and then later joined Norwich City. Transferred to Hereford United in May 1977.

Steve Ritchie (Defender). Born in Bo'ness, Scotland and started his professional career with Bristol City, before joining Greenock Morton in a player exchange transfer in 1973. Joined Hereford United from the Scottish club in May 1975 and made 34 first team appearances last season.

Colin Sinclair (Forward). Born in Edinburgh and joined Raith Rovers as an Apprentice after leaving school. Made his Scottish debut for Raith in 1967 against Glasgow Celtic. Made over 70 appearances for Raith before joining Darlington in 1971, for whom he made over 200 appearances before signing for Hereford United in October 1976. Is a former Scottish Schoolboy and Junior Scotland International.

Peter Spiring (Forward). Born in Glastonbury and started his career with Bristol City. Substantial fees took him to Liverpool and then to Luton Town, before joining Hereford United in May 1976 after a previous loan period. Made 38 first team appearances last season.

Billy Holmes (Forward). Born Balham. Signed from Wimbledon 2nd November 1977. Previously with Millwall, Luton and Barnet.

Peter Mellor (Goalkeeper). Born Prestbury, Cheshire. Signed from Fulham September 1977. Played in the 1975 F.A. Cup Final for Fulham v West Ham. Formerly with Burnley F.C.

Ken Stephens (Forward). Born Bristol. Signed from Bristol Rovers October 1977. Formerly with Walsall and West Bromwich Albion. Made over 200 first team appearances.

Phil Burrows (defender). Born in Stockport and signed professional forms at the age of 18 for Manchester City and continued his studies to become a Quantity Surveyor. Transferred to York City in 1966 and after spending eight years with that club, joined Plymouth Argyle and was transferred to United in August 1976. An injury kept Phil out of action for most of last season.
