In total, Pete made 255 appearances including friendlies (190 starts and 65 as a sub). scoring 79 goals including only four penalties, two hat-tricks and against Lewes- a famous four in a 6-1 win.

He has a nine month old daughter Isla and lives in South Ruislip occasionally finding his way back for a game or a beer in the RSC (as socializing is a top hobby!).

Peter Dean - modestly would normally prevent me from picking myself but I would love to turn back the clock and play in this team (and if I wasn't who would do Jolls' running?)

Tom Pett - match winner, quick, direct and could turn the game in an instant - he was nearly as good as his missus...
