Our Turn to Win This Time?

So for the second year running the luck of the draw has brought Wealdstone and Barnet together for the First Round of the Southern League Cup. It was exactly a year ago on the 21st August 1976 that our friends from Barnet triumphed here by two goals to nil with first half goals by Ray Aggio and John Fairbrother. When the two sides met at Barnet three days later for the 2nd leg only a brilliant save by Wilf Woodend in the first minute prevented George Duck from reducing the arrears. Wealdstone, without the injured John Morton and suspended Bobby Moss, Danny Light and John Watson, were out of luck as within three minutes Barnet had increased their aggregate lead with a somewhat fortunate goal. Gary Williams was the scorer, the ball hitting him in the back and rebounding into the goal without him knowing too much about it. Our fate was sealed before half time when John Fairbrother scored his sides goal to give Barnet another 2—0 victory.

Wealdstone and Barnet have met on 89 previous occasions with the Hertfordshire club winning 42 times to Wealdstone's 34, with 13 matches drawn. Barnet have scored 222 goals and conceded 190. Most of our previous encounters were in the Athenian League in our amateur days and rather surprisingly only 13 of our meetings have been in cup competitions.

The very first meeting of all was one that Wealdstone supporters will not want to be reminded of. A Middlesex Charity Cup match played at Barnet in April 1927 produced the biggest victory either side has recorded in those 89 matches, the final score being Barnet 12 Wealdstone 2. Our next cup clash wasn't until March 1930 when we won a Middlesex Senior Cup Semi-Final 3—1 and went on to beat Haywards Sports in the final after a replay. Ten years later in April 1940 we again met in a semi-final, this time

the London Senior Cup which saw us enter the final with a 2-1 victory. Our opponents in the final at West Ham's Upton Park ground were Walthamstow Avenue who won by five goals to nil. The next four cup ties between the two sides were all in the F.A. Cup, in October 1945 we lost 3-0 at Underhill, and in the 1st Qualifying Round in September 1953 two goals by Ken Bodfish helped us to win 2—1 on the Barnet ground. Another eight years were to pass before, in September 1961, the two clubs met at Lower Mead in the 2nd Qualifying Round and a 1—1 draw resulted, Sells scoring our goal. In the replay at Barnet we were well and truly beaten 9-0. Our next two cup meetings brought us two more victories, in August 1964 we won the 1963/64 London Charity Cup Final 2-1 (Farrell and Haydon scoring our goals), and in September 1973 we won 4-1 in the Preliminary Round of the London Challenge Cup, Eddie Presland and George Duck (3) scoring our goals on this occasion. And so we came to last season when Barnet took all the honours, winning those two Southern League Cup matches and also knocking us out of the F.A. Trophy after we had drawn 1-1 at Underhill in the 3rd Qualifying Round. In the replay that followed Barnet adapted to the heavy Lower Mead pitch much better than we did and deservedly won through to the next round with a

Our visitors hold one unique record in the F.A. Cup. In the First Round Proper of the 1970/71 competition they defeated Newport County 6-1 at Underhill to record the biggest ever win by a non-league club over a Football League club in the F.A. Cup. Barnet's team that day was McClelland, Lye, Jenkins, Ward, Embery, King, Powell, Ferry, Adams, Gray and George. Their scorers were George (3), Ferguson (o.g.), Powell

Barnet have made three new signings for this season, Jimmy Greaves who scored 15 league goals for Chelmsford City last season, Midfield man Gary Borthwick from Aylesbury, and ex-Hendon central defender Steve Ragan. Jimmy Greaves (36) who retired from first class football at the end of the 1970/71 season scored 491 goals during his playing career with Chelsea, Tottenham, West Ham and Milan. Of this total he scored 357 league goals (every one of them in the First Division) and 44 in 57 England

Young, strong competitor and rated very highly and is seen by Meadows as the work rate in midfield and the job of retaining and regaining possession. Formerly with Harrow Borough.

Jimmy Greaves. A household name who must have more pen pictures than any other footballer this decade! Joins the club from Chelmsford where he made his 'return' to football on a more regular basis. Regarded as the finest goalscorer of all time now a successful businessman who is looking forward to another season in the Premier with what he described as a very attacking side.
