WHERE HAVE ALL THE CROWDS GONE?

WHEN I was a youngster, in the early sixties, I used to go along and watch Wealdstone play invariably there was a large crowd there at Lower Mead, and whenever the opposition was really local, say Enfield, Barnet or Hendon, the crowd went up to several thousand.

Today the Borough of Harrow can boast, with no exageration at all, two of the finest non League football teams in the country - Wealdstone, one of the top five teams in the Alliance Premier League, and hence outside of the Football League, and Harrow Borough, champions elect of the Isthmian League Premier Divisions, one of the toughest of all competitions.

And neither of them can attract more than a few hundred hardy supporters along to their

matches. Why?

It can't be that the fans want to watch a successful side, otherwise they would have flocked along to see the Stones or the Boro, both have done consistently well for several seasons and, indeed, on occasions when they have enjoyed Cup runs large numbers of people have turned up - only to stay away again next week.

Perhaps people prefer to go and watch League soccer. That's possible, but League crowds are also falling, it costs more in travelling and entrance fees to get to a League match and there is the

ever present problem of crowd trouble.

I think the answer is probably that there are far more alternative attractions these days than there ever were twenty years ago. It cannont be denied that most soccer grounds are designed with spartan facilities and few luxuries - they need improving, certainly, but with video games, squash clubs, foreign holidays and luxurious restaurants the norm rather than the exception for most people, they are just not prepared to accept second class treatment - and that, I'm afraid to say as one who is still a regular match-goer, is just what they are served up.

Football won't win the fans back until it stops thinking it has a divine right to expect them to turn up and realises that it must offer them more than forty five minutes each way and a cup of bovril for

their admission money!

WILL THE DOOR OPEN ?

WITH the end of the season rapidly approaching, and the Alliance Championship still wide open, the day will soon be here when an Alliance side will attempt the impossible . . . Promotion or for a better word election to the Football League.

Our league is about to complete its fifth season in existence. Whatever has been said over the years, there is no doubt that for progressive clubs like Wealdstone, the formation of the Alliance was justified.

While non-league standards, as well as Football league standards have fallen, the Alliance has if anything improved, witness the difference between the Alliance and the Southern and Isthmians

But the longer the door to the football league remains closed, the less interested people will become in the Alliance. A typical example was in season 1982/83 when Hayes of the Isthmian League were given the opportunity of joining the Alliance, they declined as they saw further progress unlikely.

Quite what a club has to do to become one of the elite 92 is difficult to see. Remember Altrincham in the first two years of the Alliance? More baffling is a statement from the Football League Secretary last month to the effect that a football league club which ceases to exist will not be replaced. "It is the intention to reduce the league in order to make it more manageable". Are they waiting for 30 Clubs to go bankrupt??

The one ray of hope was a proposal in the summer of 1983 by Ken Botes the Chelsea Chairman for the top Alliance Club to replace the 92nd Football League Club, providing the facilities etc. were of the approved standard. It was narrowly defeated. Roll on the Football League A.G.M. I can't wait.

DAVE RYAN - Goalkeeper: Has missed just one league game in the Alliance in four seasons. This is Dave's seventh season at the Drill Field after signing from Southport. Recruited by Manchester United straight from school but his progress was hampered by injury. His popularity at the Drill Field guaranteed him a record testimonial in 1981/82. 63 APPEARANCES LAST SEASON.

DAVE FRETWELL - Right Back: In his third season with the Club, Dave has a wealth of Football League experience with Bradford City, for whom he made over 300 senior appearances, and Wigna Athletic. 59 APPEARANCES LAST SEASON.

MARK DEAN - Utility: Vic's most recent signing having joined the Club from Chester just before the start of the season. 18 years old Mark will be looking to establish himself in the side, has the ability to play in a number of positions and certainly has a bright future in the game.

KEN JONES - Central Defender: Ken has clocked up 850 appearances for Vics and is now in his fifteenth season at the Club, deservedly receiving a third testimonial this term. Signed from Ellesmere Port Town after starting his career with West Bromwich Albion. Ken has been voted Vic's "Player of the Year" on four occasions and is the Club Captain. 61 APPEARANCES LAST SEASON.

JEFF FORSHAW - Central Defender: Also having a testimonial this season after 5 years at the Club. 6° 4°° tall Jeff is particularly strong in the air. Signed from Stalybridge Celtic he has also had spells with Portmadoc and Winsford United. 53 APPEARANCES LAST SEASON.

PAUL BENNETT - Midfield: Paul signed for Vics in the summer of 1982 from Port Vale after making more than 60 Football League appearances for the Potteries Club. Ended his first season at the Club with Vic's only goal in the F.A. Trophy Final at Wembley. A versatile performer Paul can also switch to defence if required. 55 APPEARANCES LAST SEASON/8 GOALS.

JOHN ANDERSON - Striker: Signed from Chester in October 1981 where he played in their Third Division side. His direct attacking style quickly made him a favourite with the Drill Field fans, tends to save his goals for the important occasions! John began his career with Stalybridge Celtic, later moving to Everton where he spent 3 years. 49 APPEARANCES LAST SEASON/6 GOALS.

GRAHAM ABEL - Middfield: Although generally fouynd in midfield Graham can also operate in defence or attack. Signed from near neighbours Runcom where he played in their Northern Premier League side. After a spell in the Reserves he has claimed a regular first team spot. 40 APPEARANCES LAST SEASON/2 GOALS.

PAUL REID - Striker: A local lad, Paul's scoring exploits for Nantwich Town made him the Cheshire League's top scorer and prompted his move to Vics. Will be hoping to reproduce his 1981/82 form after an injury-hit season last term. 38 APPEARANCES LAST SEASON/16 GOALS.

COLIN CHESTERS - Striker: His second season at the Drill Field, Colin will no doubt be looking to repear last terms goal scoring exploits when he was the Club's leading scorer with 34 goals. Not suprisingly voted Vic's "Player of the Year" by the fans. Colin was signed from Crewe Alexandra in August 1982 having previously spent 4 years at Derby County. 53 APPEARANCES LAST SEASON/34 GOALS.

PHIL WILSON - Midfield: After spells with Blackburn and Tranmere early in his career Phil spent six years with Runcom before joining Altrincham and the Mossley, for whom he appeared in the 1980 F.A. Trophy Final against Dagenham. Signed by former boss Stan Storton at the start of the 1980/81 campaign. 56 APPEARANCES LAST SEASON/4 GOALS.

TONY MURPHY - Left Back: Enjoyed Vic's Wembley visit in May as much as anyone after losing in three previous semi-finals. Signed by Stan Storton, Tony also had spells at Runcom and Bangor City with Stan. He is a strong tacklet who likes to join the attack. 57 APPEARANCES LAST SEASON/2 GOALS.

PHIL POWER - Midfield: Seventeen year old who made his first team debut last December against Gateshead after impressive displays in Vics reserve side.

PLAYER PROFILE -**GARY DONNELLAN**

GARY was born in July 1962 at Kensington and now lives in Cricklewood. He attended school at Finchley and now works as a sales representative – more commonly know as a button seller. Gary arrived at Wealdstone at the beginning of this season having previously played for Chelsea, Watford and Reading.

TIM PARKS RECALLS "MR. CLEAN" OF THE 60'S

WHO remembers Alf D'Arcy?

With a surname like his, he represented the aristocracy at Enfield FC in the 1960's, and was certainly the creme de la creme when it came to gamesmanship.

Everything was done on the referee's blind side: shirt pulling, elbowing, controlling the ball with his hand, even applying an extra slick of Brylcreem.

He was the oiliest, greasiest, smarmiest and cleverest defender of his era. Enfield fans loved nim; everyone else hated him.

Small boys went to bed at night dreaming of untimely ends for Mr. D'Arcy. Skewered on a railing surrounding the pitch, perhaps, or involved in a fatal coach crash on the way home from Barking.

Yet he has a delicious sense of humour which mirrors his own philosophy during those golden Isthmian League years: if you could win fairly, fair enough; if you could win by cheating, even better.

In the bar at Enfield recently I heard this story about him, which in my opinion, knocks all the famous Shankleyisms into a cocked hat.

It goes thus: Enfield were playing llford one cold, icy Boxing Day afternoon and Mr. D'Arcy had his hands full with the well-known llford centre-forward of the time, Alfie Christmas.

After half an hour Christmas broke through with just D'Arcy to beat but, after rounding the defender, he miraculously found himself on his face. The referee, apparently unsighted, refused to give a penalty.

Ten minutes later Enfield themselves took the lead through a dubious spot-kick and Christmas, still annoyed at the earlier decision, complained rather too loudly. The referee gave him a stern talking-to.

Just two minutes later, however, Ilford mounted a tremendous six-man attack with Christmas heading powerfully goalwards from the winger's cross. The header beat the Enfield goalkeeper but D'Arcy caught the ball in the crook of his arm and volleyed clear – and the referee, again curiously unsighted, waved play on!

It was too much for poor Mr. Christmas, who roundly abused the official and earned himself a booking. But, just as the centre-forward was reluctantly walking over, D'Arcy brushed by the referee and said in a stage whisper: "I should watch this one referee, he'll tell you his name's Santa Claus."

Christmas gave his name and was sent off for mickey-taking!
