ing aware of the Stones was when Luke O'Nien went out on loan to Wealdstone from Watford and said he really enjoyed it. "My family are all very sporty but we didn't go and watch matches - apart

from when we were living right next to the Watford FC stadium, in Oxford Street which runs parallel to Vicarage Road, and one of the stewards used to let us kids in for free. I was talking about this with my mum the other day now and it was well dodgy - I think he had a bit of a thing for the boys. Don't know if he's still around now."

In the final year of his Hornets contract Dennon went out on loan to Woking, and then Crawley Town - where he was first introduced to the talents of Billy Clifford - before agreeing to sign for Falkirk in the Scottish Championship.

"That was a mistake. They wanted to play as a solid No.9 and that's not me at all unless you are clever on the ball and can use my pace and ability. But they wanted to just play hoofball and that league is much more physical than

"It's supposed to be the equivalent of League Two/National League but it didn't suit my game.

"I'm loving it here. We play tippy-tappy stuff and we've got the players to make it work and a manager to believes in the system and in the players. We could play a more physical game but where's the enjoyment then?"

I asked him what his favourite position was (not in a Love Island way).

"Oh, left wing all day long. I can play other positions but that suits me best - I can go inside and outside. We've got players like Greenie and Billy who can find you wherever you are. We play lots of team shapes and play-throughs in training and it's really paying off in matches".

o who's the quickest in the squad? "Me of course!" he

laughed. "I think thev'll all agree with that.'

I asked him if he'd always had that really quick-feet running style - not long-striding

but still incredibly rapid.

"That's just the way I've always run when I was at Watford the sports science coaches tried to get me to lift my knees up higher but that just slowed me down. You just have to stay natural."

And what about his favourite Wealdstone goal? "Mmmm... yes, the one in the FA Cup was good, at Farnborough when I hit it into the stanchion from outside the box. The video was rubbish though and didn't really capture it!"

Not the fourth goal against Bath in the 7-0? The one where Moses laid it off and you cut through before banging it high into the net at the near post?

"Yeah, I laced that one! I think sometimes, if you go near post it can surprise keepers at this level. Some coaches say you should always shoot across the keeper, for rebounds if he saves it, but it's a shorter distance to the near post and if you hit it well it can often fly in. I've got ten or 11 goals this season in 30 games and that's not a bad return. And ten assists - don't forget the assists!"

id the 7-0 win over Bath surprise vou after that tense 0-0 down in Wiltshire?

"Not really. That game at Bath was very technical, like a boxing match where you're trying to win on points and they managed to stop us playing our usual game. But we knew we had better play-

FULHAM FAN SAYS: THAT CROSS BY DENNON LEWIS FOR STONES' 1ST GOAL WAS EXQUISITE!





little example of the impact Dennon & Co are having at the Stones:
