- 2) No spectator ball games.
- 3) The consumption of alcoholic drinks is permitted INSIDE the social club bar, garden and boardroom areas.
- Vehicles parked on the Grosvenor Vale site are at the owners' risk.
- 5) Wealdstone Football Club supports the FA's campaign on pyrotechnics (e.g. flares and smoke bombs). Any misuse of such items in and around the Ground will result in those responsible being asked to leave the ground and, in line with football authority guidance, may result in a report to the Police, potential prosecution and a ban from the Club of up to three years.

So, they think it's all over, but is it?

he National League unsurprisingly voted for the top division to continue, whilst iointly the North and South divisions voted to null and void. Well, the majority in the North voted to N&V, though most in the South, with their owners seemingly willing to continue to subsidise their losses, voted to carry on. Steps 3-6 have now ceased, though intriguingly not null and void, so there is still likely to be some reorganisation and thus promotion and relegation in the downstairs orders. In the NL thirteen teams voted to carry on, seven to null and void, one. Wrexham, abstained and two didn't bother to vote. The seven that wanted to go down the null and void route are likely to be Dover, Kings Lynn and ourselves for sure, probably Barnet too, with the other three likely to come from Woking, Aldershot, Weymouth and Dagenham. All unsurprisingly at the wrong end of the table.

What does the vote in the top two levels actually mean? On the face of it, it means that Step 2 is null and void and there will be no relegation from Step 1. Hurrah cry Wealdstone fans, especially as we haven't won a league

match since December 12th, but hang on a minute and don't get too comfortable as eighteen clubs from Step 2 have thrown their toys out of the pram, threatened legal action if the season doesn't continue and there is no promotion and relegation to Step 1. Technically there is a space at Step 1 as Macclesfield didn't take up their place and there could be more depending on whether clubs refuse to play on and what action the National League will take thereon. As I write, step 2 is still null and void, but whether the eighteen carry on in a mini league to determine if any teams are promoted, we still don't know. Will the eighteen open themselves up to relegation at the bottom of that group? If this challenge was successful. much like last year's play-off debate about elite status, it would be rather funny if the most vocal failed again to be promoted. Some now at step 2 wantin to continue wanted to null and void last season when it suited them better.

We are all still in limbo land as neither the National League hierarchy nor the Football Association are saying much. When leadership is needed most from the very top, there is

a vacuum of silence. As a club, Wealdstone continue to have to spend money it really can-not squander for a season which may or may not carry on in a meaningful way. Dover have already picked up their ball and gone home. Kings Lynn are threatening to do the same but not until they played Barnet, whom they thumped, and Weymouth with whom they drew, which would have improved their points per game quotient. Will they continue in March nobody knows and we await developments?

On the news of the vote and with no further clarity from the National League,

Rory Fitzgerald and the board issued a very sensible, well thought out and reasoned statement outlining Wealdstone's position. Basically, we are between a rock and a hard place. We have three options, neither of them particularly palatable and some effecting the integrity of the league and our status within the top level of non-league football. Not only is it about paying for running costs, but we have capital expenditure to consider increasing the capacity at the Vale for ground gradings requirements in the midst of a pandemic. We have no income coming through the door but have to continue dipping into reserves to pay our way. Loans? No thanks and irresponsible for a club to take out one without the means to pay it off. What lender in the real world would give someone a mortgage when they have no job? The BELTS in the NL are almost universally funded by their rather wealthy owners, so another loan is hardly going to make a difference to their business model. A quick look through Companies House and various football clubs' financial statements show a litany of huge loans being owned to owners and accumulated losses. Notts County. for example, owe £8m, an actual reduction of £3m as the change of ownership saw some of the loans written off. Even traditional nonleague clubs like Maidenhead and Woking have

monies owed to their owners or third parties in excess of £1m and nearly £4m respectively. Halifax have announced that they have taken a loan from Sport England having been debt free since 2008 when the club reformed. Is it really right that clubs are being forced into this position by the regulatory authorities? The loans

under discussion at the moment are only for funding until the end of March. What happens about April and May? Fans are unlikely to be in until the very last couple of games. More loans?

The whole thing is a farce, with supporters none the wiser and those entrusted with keeping the football club solvent and around for many more years to come, equally baffled with what should be done. Do we furlough? Do we play kids and non-contract players? Do we just shut up shop? No idea at the moment which is just a crazy situation to find ourselves in.

TIM PARKS STONES INTERVIEW

Matty-Saunders

Meet the man who's helped get the Stones back on track.. and who hopes to be around long-term to further his impressive coaching career

love the tactical buzz of setting up a side to try to outwit the opposition, and then having the ability to spot how you can change things ingame to win the match. I actually love that more than playing.... it's like a puzzle you have to

solve and I think Stuart and I can have success together" I managed to grab half an hour with the

Stones' new No.2 Matt Saunders, whose candid live interview after the Sutton game revealed that all had not been well on the management side for some time. The dynamic 31-year-old was quick to explain his relationship with caretaker boss Stuart Maynard.

"I'm happy to talk honestly about what we expect from the players and where Stuart and I may have gone wrong since taking over in the last few weeks" said Matt. "That's been harder for Stu as he was part of the previous regime but believe me, he is hugely respected by the players and he deserves that.

"You can see from the Torquay and Eastleigh games that they'll run through brick walls for him, and he's very astute .. at Torquay for example, he spotted that their winger, Whitfield, was causing problems so he tweaked Jacob Mendy Mendy's position and



Mends stopped him from playing. And even scored himself".

The pair, though, attracted some criticism for the way the team was set-up for their first game in charge after the departure of Dean Brennan: the 4-1 FA Trophy defeat at Darlington.

"We were in two minds and, let's be honest, from the perspective of losing the game we were wrong.

Maybe if we'd dropped half the team and adopted the tactics we used at Torquay we wouldn't have lost.

"But what would those half dozen players have thought if we'd axed them? We'd maybe have lost them for the rest of the

season. We thought they deserved a chance for the longevity of the group but what really cost us was the lack of energy in the side.. that was shocking. Darlington's front four were very good, National League standard, and they

took advantage.

"And it was probably a mistake travelling up the night before because it took our players out of their regular routines, and that contributed to the lethargy. That's why we're always going to travel up on the day in future, as we are tomorrow (to Wrexham) because it keeps the players in their natural rhythm."

att's not got a bad CV as a player, coming through the Fulham youth system and being part of the squad under Roy
Hodgson that reached the UEFA

Cup Final ten years ago, losing to Atletico Madrid after extra time. He was on the bench a couple

of times in that run to the final, but never appeared for the first team and was

loaned out to Lincoln
City in League Two for 18 appearances and three goals. Then came
41 EFL appearances for Dagenham

& Redbridge (4 goals) before a five-year stint in non-League for Whitehawk, Dover and Aldershot, but primarily

for Hemel Hempstead across two spells.

"I just kept getting injured, and gradually fell out of love with the game" said the midfielder. "Obviously I played for Dean & Stu at Hemel, and when they came to Wealdstone they asked me over to help out on the man-

"That evolved into becoming the Academy manager here at the Stones, starting last season while I helped out with the coaching too.

agement and coaching side.

"But promises I'd been made weren't honoured, so I moved back to just running the Academy set-up which I really enjoy... though of course I'm very happy to now be back involved with the first team.

"I don't know whether we'll still be here next season, but I think that Stu and I are a good combination and you can be assured we'll put everything into it.

"Football is basically my life - I've just split up from an 11-year relationship with my girlfriend - and to be honest with this job being so demanding I'm not sure how I can fit anything else in just now!"

att spends pretty much every waking hour at The Vale, with the academy coaching taking place on the grass outside pitches (or on the 3G pitch at the Mid-

dlesex Stadium the other side of Ruislip) and the students' college work in the hall, plus coaching in the evenings for the first team and that endless research into the opposition.

"Being coached by Roy Hodgson and Ray Lewington (left) at Fulham was an education in itself" says Matt. "I was always inquisitive as a player.

even as a 21-year-old and it was interesting to watch them - they were (and still are) a good combination. Ray would do most of the coaching, the ball work and be very upbeat while Roy came over to take a few sessions and drum into players what he expected of them.

"The best example of that was one weekend when Fulham had lost really badly and Ray was all happy and vibrant and trying to lift the players - while Roy was just livid. He admitted he couldn't do what Ray Lewington had just done because he was so angry!

"After the Darlington defeat Stuart was a bit like that, really giving the lads a telling off while it was my job to get them motivated for the next game, to get them to use that hurt positively for the match at Torquay.

"I think we can play both roles, and get the best out of the players.

"As for personal ambition - well, I just want to coach and manage at the highest possible level. It's a delight to work with the talented lads we've got at Wealdstone - Jacob Mendy Mendy, for example, who'd I'd love to see make a career in the game, now spends his days labouring and training in the evening and Danny Parish is another we've got to protect to give him the chance of being the top player he promises to be.

"We were looking at his stats the other day and his season's been so in and out I think he's got six goals from six and a half games. That's not a bad percentage!


CHANTING. Always better if it includes gratuitous industrial bad language. Effing great!

BOREHAM WOOD

Welcome today to our near neighbours The Wood

Poreham Wood Football Club celebrated its 70th Anniversary at the end of the 2017/18 season, having been formed in 1948 following the amalgamation of Boreham Rovers and Royal Retournez. The anniversary was celebrated in spectacular style with an appearance at Wembley and also beating a Football League club for the first time ever in the FA Cup – more later on both!

First though, back to our formative years and the club gradually progressed through the Mid-Herts, Parthenon, Spartan and Athenian Leagues. Under the Chairmanship of local man Bill O'Neill and the management of fellow local man Mickey Hunter, the club moved forward by winning back to back promotions at Athenian League level, before being elected to the Isthmian Football League in 1974/75, under the management of another local man Micky Lennon.

In 1976/77 the club won the Isthmian League

Division Two Championship by sixteen points and then had a five-season spell in the Premier Division during the late seventies and early eighties. It then enjoyed another much more successful spell in the Premier Division during the nineties under the Chairmanship of Phil Wallace and the managerial expertise of Bob Makin. That sadly ended in relegation at the end of the 1999/2000 season under the then new Chairman Danny Hunter who remains our Chairman to this day. However.

the club did bounce back immediately from that disappointment and once again gained promotion to the Isthmian League Premier Division, as Isthmian League Division One Champions in 2000/01.



Following the Football Association restructuring of non-league football in 2004, Boreham Wood competed for the first time in the Southern Football League, playing in Division One East for two seasons. Winning the championship in 2005/06 the club was promoted again and returned to the Isthmian League Premier Division for the 2006/07 season.

Alongside the championship success in the 2005/06 season the club went on an incredible run in the FA Trophy, reaching the Semi-Finals. We are very proud to say that, at present, we are still the

lowest ranked team to have reached the last four of that prestigious tournament.

The 2009/10 season was also a highly memorable one for the club, as it saw us finish 4th in our Isthmian League Premier Division campaign and take part in a League Play-Off for the very first time. After defeating Aveley 1-0 away in the Semi-Final, the club went on to beat Kingstonian 2-0 at home in the Final and, under the shrewd management of lan Allinson, we deservedly took our place in the Football Conference South.

A poor start to our inaugural 2010/11 Conference South league campaign saw us initially struggle to compete at that level and we sat bottom of the table around the Christmas period. However, with clear leadership and further investment from our experienced Chairman, our

manager Ian Allinson, our dressing room and our supporters all came together. We rallied and recovered well to finish in a very respectable 14th place.

The 2013/14 saw a long relegation battle for the majority of the season but a strong finish saw us end up in 13th place. Another cup run saw us again reach the First Round proper of the FA Cup, and that culminated in us holding Football League One side Carlisle United to a 0-0 draw at Meadow Park. The replay ended in heartbreak, though, as we led 1-0, only to miss a penalty before two late goals saw us bow out of the competition 2-1.

In 2013, we got the go ahead to build a brand new 870-seater West Stand. The project was finally completed in May 2014 at a cost of around three quarters of a million pounds. The stand was officially opened by Mr Arsene Wenger in front of a bumper crowd of 3,400, in a specially arranged friendly against an Arsenal First Team on Saturday 19th July 2014.

The 2014/15 season was, at the time, the most successful in Boreham Wood Football Club's history. After leading the Conference South for the majority of the season, a controversial defeat at eventual League Champions Bromley cost us the title and so we took our place in the end of season Play-Offs.

After playing magnificently to beat Havant & Waterlooville 2-0 away from home, and then

drawing 2-2 at home in a two-legged Semi-Final, we faced the then big spending and strongly fancied Whitehawk Football Club at Meadow Park in front of a partisan 2,200 crowd and eventualy winning 2-1.

The 2015/16 season was undoubtedly a historic season for the Wood with us competing at the top table of non-league football for the very first time in the newly named National League. By the October we had lost our very successful long-standing manager lan Allinson to his increased work commitments. We had replaced him with Allinson's experienced, but young, assistant manager Luke Garrard who was just 30-years of age and we continued to struggle and adjust to football at that level and faced a relegation battle that took us to the very last game of the season.

The following season, 2016/17, saw the club improve further, with an 11th place National League finish but the best was still to come one year later.

During that 2017/18 season the club finally realised two ambitions, the first of which was to beat a Football League club in the FA Cup. That happened on Saturday, November 4 2017 with a 2-1 victory over famous FA Cup winners Blackpool. That would have been the highlight of a normal season. but 2017/18 was anything but that for Boreham Wood FC as a great run of league form ended with an amazing 4th place finish in the National League. That meant yet another appearance in the Play-Offs and this time in the new format where six clubs were involved. In the eliminator round we beat AFC Fylde We then faced Sutton United away just three days later winning 3-2 - Boreham Wood were going to play at Wembley Stadium! A place in the Football League was at stake but it was not to be, losing 2-1 to Tranmere Rovers but the memory of the day, the walk down Wembley Way and seeing over 4,000 fans supporting the club will last forever in the memory of everyone connected with the club.

Our club facilities are utilised on a daily basis, 52 weeks of the year. The club houses the largest sports education programme in the whole country, which has now been established for well over a decade. It is a programme that boasts over 600 scholar/students for the next academic year and 2018/19 season.

Optimism in our future has long returned to Meadow Park and we hope it will now lead to greater home support, greater sponsorship and, of course, further investment as we continue to progress.

In his 5 years at Gosport, Nathan helped them gain successive promotions to the National League South, as well as a trip to Wembley in the FA Trophy Final. Ashmore was then snapped up by Ebbsfleet helping them gain promotion to the National League.

2. DANNY WOODARDS - DEFENCE

Previous Clubs: Chelsea, Exeter City, Crewe Alexandra, MK Dons, Bristol Rovers, Tranmere Rovers. Danny joined the Wood in July 2015 with plenty of Football league experience having made over 250 appearances with spells at Exeter City, Crewe Alexandra, MK Dons, Bristol Rovers and Tranmere Rovers. Woodards has made over 150 appearances for the Wood from when he joined in 2015.

3. FEMI ILESANMI - DEFENCE

Previous Clubs: AFC Wimbledon, QPR, Dagenham & Redbridge, Ashford Town, Dagenham & Redbridge, Histon (Loan), York City, Boreham Wood, Dover Athletic. Boreham Wood secured the return of Femi Ilesanmi, in June 2018. The left-back originally featured for the Wood in the 2016/17 campaign, where he started all but three matches under Luke Garrard and he only missed four matches last season.

a pivotal role in the latter's promotion to the Conference. Champion would also have a spell with Cambridge and a second stint at Barnet. He again achieved promotion to the Football League with Cambridge, captaining the side in their first season back in the division.

50-year flashback

Norwick Gty Football Club

Scene 1970-71

2021 marks the 50th anniversary of our step up to professionalism. To mark the occasion we are 'live blogging' our final season as an amateur club using a programme from each of the 92 Football League clubs in 1970/71. This time it's matches 53 to 54.

Saturday 30 January, 3pm, Division 2

Norwich City 2 (Ken Foggo, Trevor Howard)
Birmingham City 2 (Phil Summerill 2)

Ref J Homewood, Sunbury-on-Thames | Att 11,964

Summary: A second drawn game of the season between two evenly matched teams who were to win promotion together 12 months later

Programme highlight: With Norwich only three points off the promotion places, the Second Division Survey page highlighting what their rivals were up to was essential reading.


Programme lowlight: For Carrow Road regulars an advert promoting the sale inside the ground of Tolly beers, made by a brewery with massive links to arch enemies Ipswich Town, must have been a slap in the face to say the least.

Programme bingo: The Sporting Quiz was scarcely unique, but with questions like 'who knocked Stowmarket out of the FA Amateur Cup' and 'who is to be Norfolk's 1971 cricket captain' it was definitely one for home fans only.

Ahead of their time: The designer of the club's canary badge, displayed prominently on the programme cover. A relative rarity when most clubs still relied on insignia influenced by civic coats of arms and similar.

Any other business: Birmingham's two goal man Summerill finished top scorer in 1970-71, with 21 goals in all competitions. A far more recognisable name from that Blues team, however, is Gordon Taylor, subsequently head honcho of the Professional Footballers' Association.

What about the Stones?: A 1-3 loss at Lower Mead to Grosvenor Vale's former occupants Ruislip Manor in the Middlesex Senior Cup 1st Round.



Plymouth Argyle 2 (Mike Bickle, Keith Allen)
Barnsley 1 (John Evans)

Ref P Walters, Bridgwater | Att 5,464

Summary: Plymouth put some daylight between themselves and the bottom four with a home win in a hastily rearranged fixture.

Programme highlight: The photo of the equaliser against Rochdale in the previous home game has a lovely wintry lower division feel about it.

Programme lowlight: Another photo, this time Halifax defenders in a mass appeal for offside against Argyle midfielder Johnny Hore, proving there's nothing new under the sun in attempts to influence match officials.

Programme bingo: The mention of the postal strike and the effect it would have on club competitions. Something fans all round the country would have to get used to in early 1971.

Ahead of their time: Home Park View's assertion that 'too many draws can be a drag'. Not half. Plymouth ended this season with 22 stalemates in 46 games, a new Football League record.

Any other business: Argyle's kit, white with a broad green stripe across the chest and narrower black stripes either side, was unique in the top four divisions. A year later they changed to green with white sleeves, becoming the only green-shirted team in the 92 and thus the only one not to need a change strip.

Swansea City 1 (David Gwyther)

Doncaster Rovers 1 (Stuart Robertsonl)

Ref D Smith, Stonehouse | Att 9.260

Summary: A game brought forward from Saturday to avoid a clash with Wales' Five Nations rugby match against Scotland. A game where Wales weren't even at home...

Programme highlight: For locals, the presence of the name 'City' on the cover. They had changed their name from Swansea Town in the summer

Programme lowlight: Manager Roy Bentley using his column to criticise coverage of his team in newspaper reports. Never complain, never explain, Roy, 6

Programme bingo: In this case, literally programme bingo! With the chance to win a colour TV (a big thing then) for a year. At which point the company presumably repossessed it.

Ahead of their time:

The Swansea team of 1933-34, featured in the Swansea Record series, who finished above Manchester United in the old second division and beat them at home. In 1982 they would equal the second half of that equation in their first ever top flight season.

Any other business: The crowd against Doncaster was not beaten in the final three months of the season, so maybe the local rugby fans made a difference after all

Saturday 6 February, 3pm, Division 1

Nottingham Forest 2 (Ian Storey-Moore, Graham Collier)

Southampton O (Archie Irvine) Ref B Daniels, Rainham | Att 18.009

Summary: In a battle of two teams facing big FA Cup games the following week, struggling Forest see off their top six opponents 🕖

Programme highlight: The sense of excitement surrounding Forest's FA Cup trip to Tottenham

the opposite of what you'd expect now.

Programme lowlight: The size of the thing. There must have been something in the midlands water that led Forest, Wolves, Coventry and others to produce programmes like tablecloths.

Programme bingo: The centre spread ads were like a survival kit for young blokes. Brewery ads, coach travel, football boots, shoes...and a recruitment ad for the Royal Navy.

Ahead of their time: The 'Inside the City Ground' opening line: 'Truly these are glory days!" would be more suited to the end of the decade between Forest's consecutive European Cup wins.

Any other business: Scorer lan-Storey Moore averaged almost a goal every other game during more than 200 Forest appearances, starring as they finished within four points of the title in 1967. He left in 1972 following a bizarre transfer tug of war, eventually joining Manchester United after Brian Clough had already announced him as a Derby player.

What about the Stones?: We travel to Woking for an Isthmian League fixture - and win 2-1.

Next time: Port Vale, Aston Villa, Liverpool and Birmingham



No.1: Wealdstone FC strike partnerships WORLD'S NO.


ow here's an odd one. A thankfully brief but dark period for the club was the two- season imprisonment it suffered out in the hinterlands of Yeading, during which Fred Callaghan played fast and loose with the size, makeup and quality of the squads he slung together.

The second season, 1994/95, was immeasurably better than its predecessor, but still pretty poor by normal standards. It did, however, showcase for a time the considerable talents of strikers Simon Quail and Tim Buzaglo who, for the 25 matches they played together, banged in 34 goals – 18 for Quail and 16 for Buzaglo; and had Tim Buzaglo not had his career ended by a brutal assault of a Clevedon defender, who knows how many more goals he might have

contributed to the team's efforts. There still remained 13 league matches to play and the prolific striker had averaged well over a goal every other game. On any measure the goalscoring exploits of Tim Buzaglo and Simon Quail for that brief period should qualify them for consideration as a deadly duo.

And so began the 22 year stewardship of Gordon Bartlett which threw up several fine goalscorers, some duos that appeared to operate effectively to a greater or lesser extent, and one or two trios of strikers.

His first season in charge (1995-96) had Paul Sheldrick notching 32 goals from 51 matches, although he started in only 32 of them. A very decent little goalscorer, Shelly spent much of the following campaign either injured or on the bench and then

disappeared from view. 2 seasons later the club's goalscoring chart read **Keith Boreham** 24, **Dennis Greene** 22 and **Brian Jones** 20 goals. Given the league within which the club was then competing, this was a pretty fearsome trio of strikers to have to face with Boreham being the classic goalpoacher, Greene all guile and cunning and Jones pace and quick feet. Individually and collectively they were a pure joy to watch,

The 1998/99 season (in the Ryman Division One) offered up another trio of goalscorers working in tandem. The end of season goalscoring charts showed Carl Holmes on 21, Brian Jones on 21 and Mick Swaysland on 21. Carl didn't operate as a genuine forward but in an

his powerful shot and late arrival in the penalty area for numerous headed goals. Jonah's pace and trickery from the right wing continued to allow his goalscoring to flourish while Sways was the classic centre forward intent on getting off efforts on goal. These were three very different players in style.

If the measure for a deadly duo was just goal returns then a case could be made for **Mick Swaysland and Marvin Morgan** in the 2002/03 season in which Mick scored 25 and Marvin 23 goals. I guess it must have been tricky for defenders to deal with Mick's traditional centre forward's eye for goal and Marvin's pace and glorious barely-controlled flailing limbs.

By this time the club's 21st century George Duck had arrived at the club — Richard Joily. The very next season he scored 32 goals, with Marvin chipping in with 18; the following season 29 with another emerging talent, Jermaine Beckford, nabbing 14 goals; but the very next season saw Jolls and Becks forge themselves into a formidable partnership. Playing in a totally dysfunctional team

made up of half a squad of Gordon Bartlett and half a squad of Andy Lease players which failed to jell, Jermaine hammered in 35 goals and Jolls 21.

This was particularly impressive given that by mid-February neither player was still at the club, Jolls having gone to Heybridge Swifts and Jemaine to Leeds United. Goals literally came from nowhere else!

The 3rd highest scorers that season were Garry Burrell, Josh Cooper and Dave Ryan all on four goals. They were a classic double act with Jolls a clever, instinctive "fox in the box" and Jermaine a pacey, skilful, explosive frontrunner: and they did link up with both setting up goals for each other. Most certainly they were a deadly duo.

ichard Joly did of course go on to become the club's second most prolific goalscorer in its history behind George Duck. In the 2011/12 season he notched a remarkable 48 goals. Third top scorer that season was a young Britt Assombalonga with 11. Not a major return on the face of it, but he only played 13 games while on loan from Watford, and in that brief window Jolls notched 10 goals.

A 21-goal return from 13 games for the pair was very impressive.

Stepping back a little to the 2006/07 season and another short term partnership was thrown together that proved to be vital to the struggling club at the time. The Stones had moved across the pyramid for that one season into the Southern league Premier Division, with very little money with which to recruit payers, and plying our trade in Northwood's deathly ground sandwiched between a park, allotments and a graveyard, and before crowds of just 250, the team wasslowly sinking towards relegation.

Manager Bartlett, not for the first time and certainly not the last, pulled off three master strokes in persuading Scott Donnelly to keep playing following his release from QPR and obtaining on loan 2 young Watford players, John-Joe O'Toole ad Theo Robinson. While Donnelly and O'Toole



stiffened up the midfield, **Robinson** joined **Dean Papali** up front for what turned out to be a partnership that eventually turned around the season.

Both Dean and Theo were young, quick and decent finishers. The partnership yielded 24 goals in 18 matches. At the start of April with 8 matches remaining, survival was most definitely in the balance. 7 of those games yielded 4 wins, 2 draws and 1 defeat in which the team scored 18 goals with Theo and Dean contributing 13. By the time the last game at Kings Lynn arrived, the 1-0 defeat was irrelevant as survival had

been secured 4 days earlier with a 4-2 win at Yate Town.

espite the club having gone from strength to strength in recent years with two promotions, both of which being title winning campaigns, no goalscoring partnerships have so far emerged. Scott McGleish, Jefferson Louie and Ross Lafayette have all scored significant numbers of goals, but the rest have been largely shared out. Brilliant, feared individual goalscorers turn up very rarely. For Wealdstone we have enjoyed the exploits of Charlie Bunce, Matt Farrell, Hugh Lindsay, George Duck, Mark Graves and Richard Jolly.

Feared goalscoring partnerships are rarer still. Henryk Mikrut and Henryk Wegzrky, George Duck and Bill Byrne, and Richard Jolly and Jermaine Beckford must surely qualify as Wealdstone's "deadly duos". A case can be made for all those other partnerships mentioned here, but they would be subject to discussion and, no doubt, disagreement.

s a post script we should very briefly look at the other side of the coin forwards who have combined at Wealdstone who, on the evidence of goals scored, must have filled the hearts of opposition defences with anything but terror, more likely perhaps the opportunity to enjoy a pipe full of shag tobacco while donning a smoking jacket and slippers.

The first place to look has to be the 1970/71 season, the club's last as amateurs, in which top goalscorers John Ritchie (14) and Alan Pentecost (7) would

hardly have given opposition defenders sleepless nights. But they were prolific in comparison to the team that was relegated from the Alliance Premier league in 1981 in which Neil Cordice top scored with 9 goals followed by Paul Bowgett on 8 goals.

Our relegation season from the Gola League in 1988 saw the excellent Tom English top score with 13 goals with

Frank Bate, Tony Lynch and Samson Olaleye joint second top scorers on 4 each. Unsurprisingly, however, the prize for the least feared set of goalscorers rests with Fred Callaghan's vast squad in his first season in charge, 1993/94. Top scorer that season was Richard Mellor on 7 goals with Neil Cordice and Colin Tate joint runners-up on 6 goals each. To be fair, the players identified here were not necessarily poor; in fact many were good or very good indeed. Sadly they were operating at the time as part of very poor teams. A coup of a grotesque kind would have been to have bridged a 10-year gap and brought together the mighty twin spearhead of David Gipp (38 appearances, 3 goals) and Dylan Evans on 12 appearances, 0 goals,

Quite simply a dream team.

...but 49 years ago the boot was on the other foot as Stones giantkilled

Tuesday October 12th 1971, FA Cup 2nd Qual Rd replay: Wealdstone 0 Boreham Wood 2

HE first time the Stones took on Boreham Wood in the (semi) professional era was in our very first season of Southern League football... and it was an unmitigated disaster! Perhaps people around the club were still remembering the 7-1 thrashing we handed out to our Hertfordshire neighbours at Lower Mead a dozen years earlier, in the second round of the London Senior Cup. For when our name came out of the FA Cup hat against The Wood in the second qualifying round, to be played at their Broughinge Road ground, there was no dismay from either the Stones - who were odds-on favourites against the Athenian League amateurs - or Boreham Wood, who were rubbing their hands with glee at the prospect of a 1,300-plus crowd. And then another thousand-plus in the replay.

This was 44 years ago when I was barely a teenager, but I well remember wondering if I could cycle to this distant



footballing outpost. I decided I couldn't, and was genuinely surprised to read the result (a 1-1 draw) in the small print of the Sunday Express results column the next morning. But then joy at the prospect of a Tuesday evening replay under the lights at Lower Mead, and the doubtless

repetition of the 7-1 result of a

y memories of that night are still pin-sharp. The humilation of losing at home to inferior but more enthusiastic opponents was a recurring theme

in the early 1970s (minnows Leighton Town in 70, Wood in 71, Chesham in '73) but this was the first I'd witnessed and the recollection of our midfielder John Furie thumping his penalty kick hopelessly high and wide still makes me angry.

Not just because it was a turning point in the game but because the only true star in the Stones team - former Welsh international at Spurs double-winner Cliff Jones - should have been taking it but had flown off to play in a lucrative exhibition game in South Africa, in breach of contract. That row rumbled on in the wake

of this embarrassing defeat. Jones was forgiven but only played a few more games until Southern League Prem 'giants' Cambridge City came in with a £200 bid and the winger was transferred. That doesn't equate to

big money (probably worth around £3,000 today) but I think Jones had soured his name with manager Alan Humphries and it

was no surprise. WHAT HAPPENED NEXT?

Well, the Stones had been expected to make a big impact on the Southern League, as Wimbledon and Barnet had done before us when transferring over from amateur football, but this first season in the First Division North was pretty grim. Humphries' quicklyassembled team of old has-beens and never-weres was broken up by new boss Sid Prosser in early 1972 and we recovered to finish in mid-table. The ex-St Albans manager signed a raft of new

players over the next two years including icons like George Duck, Willie Watson, John McCormick and Bill Byrne - players who feature in most long-time fans' all-time team -

Heavens weep as fans despair

The night shame came to Lower Mead Stadium

WEALDSTONE crashed to one of their most humiliating defeats in their 71 years history on Tuesday evening as young, full of running Athenian League Premier Division side Boreham Wood sent them tumbling out of the F.A. Cup with a display the professionals rarely looked capable of matching.

The amateurs' victory was brilliantly organised in build-up and clinical in its execution. Their manager and coach, having watched and noted the defects in 'Stones game last Saturday, completely changed their tactics for the occasion and were proved so

right.

In the first half of the game at Boreham Wood, the amateurs had spent an apprehensive first 50 minutes seeing dangers that never really existed and saying to themselves: "How can we possibly beat this professional set-

A draw had freed their minds of that problem and where on Saturday they had spent the first half back pedalling, they were at "Stones from the first minute on Tuesday.

Having started at a fair gallop one must saidly record that they were able to maintain their pace until the end, whereas the majority of the Wealdstone professionals had dropped their leads long before that time and accepted adost cause.

In a game played in pouring rain. Woods chased everything in sight while the majority of the home players wandered over the soaked surface likemen without hope. And as the rain deluged even harder at the end in doubt weeping tears of sympathy for 1,058 paying spectators, they finally retired in more than disorder.

Then came the final humilia-

WIDE OPEN

They were wide open at the back; were harassed beyond be lief by Woood's big striker Les Varney, whose enthusiasm finally got him booked in the second half, and quite unable to deal with the supreme wing work of John Smith who played havoc with the home defence every time he got the ball.

To make matters worse. Stones could not even take advantage of a penalty awarded — a little harshly I thought — when Townend, in no position to force his way past three defenders, was thumped down in the box by a fourth.

John Furie took the kick and the best he could do was leave a tell-tale mark on the white background of the Harrow Observer advertisement high above the cinema-end goal.

Before then Barr had saved at point-blank range from Varney, had furned a John Draper drive aside and Smith had sent a sizzling free-kick through Barr's hands only to see his

shot rebound from an upright.

'Stones could conjure up only spasmodic raids with Brown, the only really dangerous home forward, having one shot kicked from the line and another splendidly saved by

Smith's in-swinger, perfectly flighted, was powerfully met by Micky Jackson whose header went in off the bar.

Stones pulled off Watson, pushed on Cooper as sub and although they might complain they deserved a penalty for a blatant handling offence, they

were by now clearly reading the writing on the wall. The result was finally put

The result was finally put beyond all doubt four minutes from time when a splendid freely moved on by Smith for Beasant to shoot through the narrowest gap from an acute angle—a fitting goal to give Boreham Wood a victory they thoroughly deserved.


