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OBITUARY - ARTHUR ROGERS

With great sadness the club learnt last week of the passing of lifelong Wealdstone supporter at the age of 92. Arthur was from Rayners Lane and had been a lifetime Stones fan. Whilst not being a name that might be known to many he will be instantly remembered by a number of our longstanding fans as the man with the pipe - particularly those who had the misfortune of standing downwind when he lit up on the terraces! Arthur first started watching the stones in 1946 and other than for two years spent on national service, had seen games every season since. He listed his highlights of his Stones watching years as being the Athenian League championship of 1951-2, in his view Wealdstone's best team, the Amateur Cup win, the 1984-85 double and the recent promotions. Over the years he witnessed most of Wealdstone's greatest players however his favourites were Henryk Wegrzck, Phil White and Bert Dyke in the 50's, Matt Farrell, Charlie Townsend and Hughie Lyndsey in the 60's and more latterly Robin Wainwright and Stuart Pearce. Despite his years Arthur still attended matches whenever he could and was still an active agent for Teamdraw, having at one time had over 100 workmates, friends and family signed up in the 1990's.

Our thoughts are with Arthur's friends and familiy at this difficult time.



went into lockdown 3, no more crowds and more importantly little income. Funding from HMG hasn't still been settled, but we now know that it will be loans and not



Josh Meekings

'Key to defending? It's communication and a real will to keep the ball out and just stop the through you. I think we'll tighten up and soon start to

improve things' hen vou're conceding more goals than (almost) anybody in the National League, a no-nonsense defender like Josh Meekings is exactly what you need... and the 28-year-old is delighted to be joining the

Wealdstone cause.

"I'm really pleased with the way my signing was handled" said the six-footer as we managed to grab a (hands-free!) chat on his drive down the M11 from his Suffolk home on the way to receive some physiotherapy on a troublesome hip injury a couple of weeks ago.

"I was disappointed to have to come off in the Aldershot game - I had a hip operation a couple of years ago and there's not much cartilage around the joint, so when I made a tackle in the first half it just jarred my hip. It wasn't a groin strain as people seemed to think, and the physic session at London Wasps (where Stones players are treated) should help a lot".

Unfortunately, it didn't respond as quickly as

we'd all hoped and Josh has been sidelined until making a re-appearance as sub at Sutton United..and, fingers crossed, he should be in contention for tonight's game.

his National League debut, winning this ball from Mo

Josh made his debut in the FA Trophy win over Gloucester and immediately his experience, communication and athleticism came to the fore as we restricted the National League North leaders to just speculative shots from long range.

As is well-chronicled, he's had an impressive career in the Scottish League after leaving his boyhood club Ipswich as a 19-year-old and moving to all the way to Inverness Caledonian Thistle in the Highlands, prompted by the fact that former Tractor Boys legend Terry Butcher was in charge of the League's newest club.

"Russell Osman was my coach at Ipswich

and he recommended me to Terry because I wasn't being given a chance there. And that was a great move because Cally were in the Scottish Premier League among the big boys and the standard of football was high. and Inverness is just a lovely place to live".

he Cally Thistle story is an inspiring one. The little Highland League club only formed in 1994 thanks to the merger of the two local clubs and they were handed a place in the Scottish League Division Three along with neighbours Ross County.

Within ten years, Thistle were in the Scottish Premier League after three promotions! Their crowds leapt from 1,200 in that first season to over 5,000, but after things stabilized the club were back in Division One (now known as the Championship) by 2008. Butcher was now in charge and, after he had guided Cally back into the Scottish Prem, little did he know it but the signing of Josh Meekings would precipitate the best few years in the fledgling club's history.

"We really punched above our weight; we did incredibly well" said Josh modestly, describing the Highlanders' amazing 2015 when they finished third in the table behind only Celtic and runners-up Abder-

deen. Cally Thistle finished nine points ahead of fourth-placed Dundee United.

They also won the Scottish Cup at Hampden Park, beating Falkirk 2-1 in the final to spark wild celebrations in normally-sleepy Inverness.

"Was that the highlight of your career so far?" I asked him. "Oh, undoubtedly. Although there was a bit of controversy surrounding our win over Celtic in the semi-final - and I count myself a bit lucky to even have had the chance to play in the final" he confessed

Now, even I as a non-follower of Scottish football had the old memory banks stirred for a moment. So I plunged into Google and there was the full story of Josh escaping a red card for a deliberate handball on his goalline, and then a one-match ban being applied restrospectively .. and then that being rescinded to allow him to take part in the final.

"Yes, I was fortunate" he admits. "The handball all happened in a moment but it wasn't seen and we went on to beat Celtic 3-2 in extra time. We were actually favourites in the final, as we'd finished 3rd in the Prem and they were in the Championship, but that was a brilliant moment at Hampden".

It's worth watching the win over Celtic, Virgil Van Dyke and all, just for the debate over Josh's handball. The commentators all insist it was deliberate but his arm was in a natural position in my view. He was just balancing himself. The non-decision of the referee was exacerbated shortly afterwards when he then sent off Celtic keeper Craig Gordon for flattening a Cally forward as he raced through! Pictures from that game are overpage.

Josh was equally lucky only a year earlier, when he was sent off as Inverness won their Scottish League Cup semi-final. His appeal was successful but Cally were beaten on penalties by Aberdeen in the final.

osh spent six years with Inverness, playing in the Europa League after their successes in 2015, before leaving for fellow Prem side Dundee in 2017. He was plagued by injury - including the hip injury that necessitated an operation in the season Dundee were relegated - but fought his way back to full fitness by the end of 2019.

Josh was club captain and had formed an effective partnership with Christophe Berra and

Jordon Forster, culminating in a run of five successive clean sheets, when the pandemic brought things shuddering to a halt.

So why did Josh who had been offered a contract extension - head south?

being in Dundee. I'd met my fiancee, Grace, in Inverness and we were living in Dundee with our little one (two-year-old Ruby) but just not enjoying it.

"I don't regret moving back to England as we wanted a clean slate but, looking back on it, I couldn't have chosen a worse time!

"There are just so many good players out there - my agent showed me a list of available players at the moment and you wouldn't believe some of the names. Really good players without clubs."

osh was brought up in Cavendish, a small village near Sudbury in Suffolk, and he and Grace and Ruby are now back living there at his parents.

"It's not ideal but it's a good base for us. I'm just pleased to be playing football again and although I've only trained a couple of times

with Wealdstone and been involved in a couple of matches you can tell that we've got some excellent players.

"My debut against Gloucester went well and I even got involved in winning two penalties! Our defending was good in that game but against Aldershot I think perhaps our first contact was poor and we didn't put enough pressure on the ball. I thought we were in control in the first half and not too stretched... but then the set pieces opened us up. When you're part time you don't have the chance to work on set plays so much but we have to improve defensively there.

"You have to have that will to defend, to stay aware and not let the opposition cut through you. And you have to communicate really well.

"It's a process now to build relationships with the others but I really think we can tighten up and move up the table".

I asked Josh how he'd ended up signing for the Stones. "Well,I'd been training at Leyton Orient and the goalkeeping coach there, Dean Brill, is pals with Wealdstone's ex-coach Kirk Rayment. The then-manager Dean Brennan gave me a call and here I am!"

And what did you know about Wealdstone before coming to Grosvenor Vale? "Well, the obvious really: The Raider. But I knew how well the Stones had done last season, and then looking into the club on the internet you realise what a rich history there is.

"And I know the crowds can be big and intimidating... if we ever get to see them again :("

Have you always lived in that area? No, before moving to Watford I had always lived around the Harrow area, first in Wealdstone and then in Kenton.

What were your first Impressions of the club? I think the first thing that struck me was the friendly atmosphere and the energy around the ground. I left that night a Stones fan for life and couldn't wait for the next opportunity to see them.

What was the first football match you ever saw live? Or on TV? My first live football match was the game against West Ham (mentioned above) followed over the next few years by some Stones home games and an England game at Wembley.

What's the best Wealdstone game you've seen? It would have to be Kettering away



in 1985, the day we won the Gola League with an Andy Graham goal. I will never forget the emotion of the day and the celebrations afterwards. To cap it all off I was lucky enough to get Nigel Johnson's shirt!

And what's the most memorable game you've EVER seen? I think it would have to be the Cup Winners Cup Final in 1994 when Arsenal beat Parma 1 - 0. It is the only time I have been to a major European final and to

also spend a few days in Copenhagen was an amazing experience. Earlier that season I had been to the away leg against Torino which has got to be my worst football experience ever. Watched over in the ground by Police for 3 hours before kick off only to witness what was probably the least entertaining game of football a neutral could ever watch. We were there because my wife Loraine is an Arsenal fan - she's had a season ticket for 30 years so football is a big subject of conversation in our house!

How did you get involved with the supporters club? I have been working in the I.T. industry for going on 20 years now and when I heard they were looking for someone to help out with their website and social media it seemed a real chance to give something back to a Club that has brought me so much enjoyment over the years.

What level of football do you prefer?

How do you fit watching football in with your family/ working life? I don't work evenings or weekends and with the kids grown up there is not much to stop me seeing our games. Dan has a season ticket as well and always attends with me when Uni allows.

I was really looking forward to some of the away games this season but with Covid-19 that will have to wait till next season.

passion for Arsenal I have been to way more Gunners games than I would care to admit.

Who are the best Wealdstone players you've ever seen? I can't hand on heart say they are the best ever Stones side but for me it has to be the team that played that memorable day at Kettering in 1985...

Bob Iles, Neil Cordice, Roy Davies, Dennis Byatt, Steve Perkins, Robin Wainwright, Brian Greenaway, Lee Holmes, Alan Cordice, Andy Graham, Gary Donellan Subs: Nigel Johnson and Vinny Jones.

What do you think of the bars and catering at the Vale? I think they are pretty much spot on, how can you resist the smell of the chips and you can get a beer within a few minutes of the game finishing.

Do you visit the Megastore? Adam does a

Wealcome to todays visitors from Hampshire The Spitfires

astleigh were formed by Derek Brooks on 22 May 1946, under the original name ofSwaythling Athletic.

In 1950, they joined the Hampshire League but it wasn't until 1980 the club changed itsname to Eastleigh FC.In 2003, Eastleigh won the Wessex League, after finishing fourth in their first campaign, andtransferred into the Premier Division of the Isthmian League with the formation of newdivisions. From then on, The Spitfires spent nine years in the Conference South, and were promotedinto the National League in 2014. In the club's debut season, they reached the playoffs but fell short in a defeat againstGrimsby Town in the semi-finals. Since then, the club has reached the third round of the FA Cup

twice, facing Championshipopposition. Recently, in the 2018/19 National League season, Eastleigh finished seventh and foundthemselves in the playoffs for the second time in their history. The Spitfires saw off Wrexham in a play-off eliminator thanks to a wonder strike from DannvHollands but lost on penalties in the semifinal at the hands of Salford City. who went on towin promotion to League Two.Last season, Eastleigh finished in 16th position after the season was curtailed due to thecoronavirus



pandemic. The club has undergone a full rebrand in 2020, with a new badge implemented to bring anew identity that the Spitfires can call their own.

Right Back Joe re-signed for Eastleigh in 2019 following his release from BristolRovers. In a two-year stay, he made 63 appearances with the League One club.He began his career with Portsmouth before spending four years with Bournemouth.After brief loan spells with Eastbourne and Aldershot Town, Partington joined Eastleigh on afree transfer from the Cherries.The experienced defender went on to win the Spitfires' Player of the Year in the 2015/2016season and scored the opener in Eastleigh's 3-2 loss against Bolton in the 2016 FA Cupthird round.He has been capped at youth level by Wales, making 21 appearances from the U17 to U21age groups.

3. MICHAEL GREEN - DEFENCE

Club legend and fan favourite Michael Green holds the most Spitfiresappearances in the current squad, and has the fifth highest appearances in the club'shistory. Green was signed from Port Vale in 2011 and has since played more than 370games for the club. He was part of the side that won promotion to the National League during the 2013/14season. After briefly departing the club in February 2017, he returned just a matter of weeks laterand has been at the Silverlake Stadium since. Green remains ever-important to Eastleigh's back-line, accumulating 38 appearances onroute to the National League play-off semi-final in 2018/19.

4. CAVAGHN MILEY - MIDFIELD

Miley joined Eastleigh in 2017 from Jersey side St Pauls, and has since appearedover 100 times for the club.Before moving to the Silverlake, he captained the Jersey Official Football Team whilst livingon the island and caught the eye of the Spitfires.The central-midfielder played in all bar four National League games in the 2018/19 run tothe playoffs.He was also selected for England C side against the Football Association of IrelandAmateur International XI in 2018.

5 PIERCE BIRD -DEFENCE

Bird is another new addition for the 2020/21 season, the second summer signingfrom Notts County. The 21-year-old started his career at Dunkirk before moving to the Magpies, where hemade 26 appearances at League Two and National League level. The centre-back is also capped at international level, with four appearances for NorthernIreland's U21s.

6. ANDREW BOYCE - DEFENCE

Signed from Grimsby Town in 2017, Boyce is a well-rounded and reliabledefender. During the 2014/15 season whilst at Scunthorpe United, he gained promotion to League One. As well as plenty of National League experience, Boyce is no stranger to playing in higherdivisions with over 50 appearances in League One and League Two combined. The centre-back joined the 100-club for Eastleigh as well last season, and has scored fourgoals in his four seasons with the Spitfires.

7. ABDULAI BAGGIE - MIDFIELD

Baggie is another summer signing ahead of the 2020/21 season, having joinedfrom National League South promotion winners, Weymouth.The 28-year-old winger has plenty of experience in both the football league and non-league, featuring for the likes of Tranmere Rovers, Stockport County, and Weymouth before joiningthe Spitfires.Baggie has represented England four times at youth level, before making five appearancesfor the Sierra Leone national side.

8. JACK PAYNE - MIDFIELD

Jack Payne became a permanent signing in 2019 from Ebbsfleet United, afterspending a brief spell on loan at Eastleigh the season before. Payne is a very experienced midfielder, playing in the Championship, League One and

Peterborough United.Payne's excellent vision and delivery makes him a threat when on set pieces, which he hasdemonstrated in his time at the club.

9. DAN SMITH - FORWARD

Dan Smith is an exciting new addition to the Spitfires in 2020/21. The young striker was signed from Isthmian League Premier Division side Bognor Regis, after a prolific season scoring 16 goals in 19 games. With competition from teams higher up the football pyramid, Smith is an excellent capturefor the club. The 21-year-old started his footballing journey in youth tournaments with Eastleigh, beforejoining Portsmouth in 2007 and rising through their academy, making his Pompey debut inthe EFL Trophy in 2019.

10. TYRONE BARNETT - FORWARD

Barnett left Cheltenham Town in July 2019 to make the switch to Eastleigh. The established Football League goalscorer joined the Spitfires with plenty ofexperience in his career, from the Championship with Peterborough United and Ipswich Town as well as spells in League One and League Two. The Posh paid Crawley Town over £1 million for his signature in 2012 and alongside current team-mate Jack Payne, the pair won the Football League Trophy togetherduring the 2013/14 season. He continued his goalscoring records in his first season at the Spitfires, finishing as topscorer with 12 goals in last year's National League campaign.

11. SAM SMART - MIDFIELD

Talented young winger Sam Smart joined the Spitfires from Evo-Stick South sideBasingstoke Town FC in July 2019, and has quickly become a fan favourite at the club.His electric pace and strong delivery make him a threat from the flanks, and his acrobaticgoal celebrations are much loved by the Spitfires supporters.Smart made 38 appearances last season in all competitions for the club, scoring three goals.

12. CALLUM BAUGHAN - DEFENCE

Baughan signed his professional contract with Eastleigh in the summer of 2018, after graduating from the academy. The versatile young defender is highly thought of on and off the pitch at the club, and hasbeen unlucky with two successive ACL injuries that kept him sidelined for much of the pasttwo campaigns. The young defender made his debut in a 3-1 win over Maidstone in 2018/19, and notchedan assist on his first start in a 3-3 draw with Boreham Wood in the final game of thatseason.

13. ROSS FLITNEY - GOALKEEPER

Experienced goalkeeper Ross Flitney has made over 200 appearances for the Spitfires in two spells at the club. He first featured between 2012 and 2016, then re-joined Eastleigh in 2017 from Bromley. Beginning his youth football career at Arsenal and then with Fulham, Flitney wasunderstudy to Edwin Van der Sar in the Premier League from 2003 to 2005. In the latter stages of his career, Flitney is now combining his position with beinggoalkeepercoach for the first-team and academy goalkeepers.

14. TOM BEARWISH - FORWARD

Bearwish has been at the club since 2017, progressing his way through the youthsystem all the way to the first team as a real example for Eastleigh Academy prospects. The forward has now made over 30 appearances for the first-team, with last season provingto be a breakout campaign for 'The Bear'. Bearwish bagged his first goal for the club with a last-minute winner against Torquay in September 2019, and increased his tally to four goals in all competitions during 2019/20.

15. ALEX WYNTER - DEFENCE

Wynter has made over 50 appearances for the Spitfires since signing fromMaidstone United in 2018. Spending his youth career at Crystal Palace, Wynter made his debut for the Eagles in theFA Cup at just 16-years-old. He is still the club's second-youngest debutant in their historyAfter several loan spells, he joined Colchester United permanently in 2015, featuring in bothLeague One and Two for the U's.He spent the 2017/18 season at Maidstone United, captaining the England 'C' team andhelping Maidstone survive in their debut National League season. Wynter was ever-present at the heart of Eastleigh's defence in his debut season for the Spitfires, making 45 appearances and scoring four goals in the run to the 2018/19 playoffs, which earned him the

Player of the Season award. After an injuryhit season in 2019/20, Wynter is back to full fitness for the 2020/21 campaign.

16. BEN SCOREY - DEFENCE

Another Eastleigh academy graduate, Ben Scorey was promoted from the youthset-up in 2018/19 and made his Spitfires debut in a 3-3 draw against Boreham Wood inApril 2019. Scorey has featured four times in all competitions for the club, proving to be a versatileoption in defence.

17. JOE TOMLINSON - DEFENCE

Joe Tomlinson became the first Spitfires signing for the 2020/21 season afterjoining from Hungerford Town in June 2020. The 20-year-old defender is an exciting prospect, proving to be a talent both offensively anddefensively at full-back. Tomlinson was Hungerford Town's captain at just 19-years-old in the National League South last season and was voted the league's Young Player of the Season. He already has over 70 non-league appearances, with seven goals and 15 assists, so far inhis career.

18. BEN HOUSE - FORWARD

Ben House is another summer signing ahead of the 2020/21 season. The 21-year-old striker joined the Spitfires following his release from Championship side, Reading. He spent 2019/20 on loan at fellow National League side Dagenham & Redbridge, scoringtwice in 11 games. Despite being born in England, he has represented Scotland at U20 and U21 level. House has settled in well at the Silverlake as the club's top scorer during the preseasoncampaign, and continued that form in the league. House's five league goals in the first five games earned him the National League Player ofthe Month in October.

19. DANNY HOLLANDS - MIDFIELD

Experienced centre-midfielder and club captain Danny Hollands has made over100 appearances in his three years with the Spitfires.Hollands began his career with Chelsea and spent three years at Stamford Bridge from2003.He is well-known on the South Coast having played for Bournemouth

and Portsmouth, whilst also featuring for the likes of Charlton Athletic, Gillingham FC, and Crewe Alexandraduring his career. Hollands scored a wonder goal against Wrexham in the 2018/19 playoffs semi-finals, beforefinding his form in front of goal last season, bagging 10 goals in the most prolific season offiis career.

20. RYAN HILL - MIDFIELD

Ryan Hill is another new addition to the Spitfires, signing during the start of theseason on a permanent deal from Hampton & Richmond Borough.Hill started his career at Beaconsfield, before being scouted by Stoke City and joining theiryouth academy in 2017.After a season with the Potters, he moved to Hampton & Richmond to gain regularfirst-team football, and impressed with his pace and trickery on the ball.Ryan's 2019/20 season saw him score eight goals and get 14 assists in 33 games.

21. LEWIS BEALE - FORWARD

Beale is an other product of the Eastleigh youth academy that has progressedthrough the ranks to the first team. A frequent goalscorer at youth level, Beale scored on his first start for the club last season, in a 2-1 win over Matlock Town in the FA Trophy.

24. TOM BLAIR - MIDFIELD

Tom Blair is the most recent addition to the Spitfires squad in the 2020/21 season. Fitting with the majority of this summer's signings, Blair is a promising young player whoimpressed in a lower division last season. Tom already became a clublegend at Dorchester Town at just 21-years-old, making 153appearances and scoring 30 goals in his five years at the club where he rose through theyouth ranks to become a vital part of the side. 'Blairo' brings more pace to the flanks and an eye for goal, as well as a more physicalpresence on the field..

MANAGER. BEN STREVENS

After a brief five games as interim manager, Strevens was named permanentEastleigh boss in November 2018. Strevens played over 100 times for the Spitfires as a player and his talent on the field has continued off it, as he was successful in taking Eastleigh all the way to the National League play-off semi-final in his first season.

No.1: Wealdstone FC strike partnerships ...the 'Deadly Duos'

For the first in this highly-anticipated new series we welcome Professor Sir Michael Fishman to the lectern. Sir Michael (right) is a well-respected academic, specialising in Wealdstoneology although he is best known for his seismic, off-the-cuff rantings at non-League football grounds the length and breadth of the country

o doubt most clubs have had them.Bruce Bannister and Alan Warboys, Bristol Rovers' "smash & grab" strike force of the 1970s; Toshack and Keegan at Liverpool; Greaves & Gilzean in Tottenham's glory years; Shearer and Sutton at Blackburn's title winning team; and now there is Harry Kane and Son Heung-Min for the current Spurs side.

These were and are partnerships that perfectly complemented each other's styles and strengths to make them feared by opponents... or maybe two forwards who simply banged in goals for no other reason that they were both deadly finishers. Arguably Liverpool's Sadio Mane and Mo Salah fall into that category.

So what about Wealdstone? Can we lay claim to feared goalscoring partnerships? Of course we can, but who and when? For those aware of the club's history the first place to look must be the Athenian

league title winning team of 1951/52 and the two Polish Henryks, **Mikrut and Wegzryk**. During that season the team amassed 110 goals with Mikrut and Wegzryk scoring 53 of them – around half. Were they a genuine partnership within which their talents dove-

It is a very long time ago but fortunately the club can still call upon the magnificent memory of the incomparable Lew Sheppard whose recall of that team remains acute.

He remembers that the 2 players did not act as a partnership in the way of, say,

Toshack and Keegan. Mikrut was a battling, pugnacious centre forward who could bang in goals with both head and foot but was particularly dangerous in the air.

Wegzryk was a slightly built inside forward with a lethal shot, more in common with the great Hugh Lindsay a decade or more later. They both profited most from wingers Phil White and Frank Bennett who delivered accurate crosses for Mikrut and pull backs for Wegzryk.

So the 2 Henryks were perhaps not a true partnership but most certainly a

deadly duo.

rior to the Henryks there had been Bert Dyke and Eddie Smith. Bert Dyke was an established inside forward of the time who regularly hit the mid-teens in goals each season, and when young Eddie Smith joined on loan from Chelsea between 1948 and 1950, between them they regularly found the opposition net.

In 1948/49 Smith notched 32 goals and Dyke 15; in the 1949/50 season it read Smith 17 and Dyke 8 goals. Again, according to Lew, in those days centre forwards were the main goal threat with the inside forwards and wingers expected to chip in with a decent return. He doesn't recall Smith and Dyke necessarily being considered a goalscoring partnership, the irony being that, after Dyke left Wealdstone, he continued playing for Finchley as a centre forward and bagged copious amounts of goals for that club. Had the 2 been utilized as a twin spearhead as is common in modern day football, they might well have forged a fearsome goal threat.

or the remainder of the 1950s following the title winning side of 1952 the waters are muddied to a degree by the arrival of winger Viv Evans who ended every season either top or near top goalscorer in, it must be acknowledged, fairly indifferent sides. By 1958 the club was fielding goal machine Matt Farrell, a battering ram of a centre forward who helped re-energise the team into potential

title contenders once again. Over four seasons he topped the club's scoring charts with Evans and various inside forwards chipping in with significant goal returns; but Farrell didn't form any genuine partnership of note.

The waters were further muddied with Hugh Lindsay's return to the club in 1962 with the slightly built inside forward regularly hammering in 30 goals a season, often leaving the recognised goalscorers trailing in his wake. A genuine case could be made, however, for Jim Cooley and Bobby Childs being viewed as a pretty lethal goalscoring duo in the Amateur Cup winning season of 1965/66.

Cooley bagged 31 goals and Childs 27, with Lindsay sandwiched between with 30 goals. Jim Cooley was a centre forward in the traditional mould of

belligerence, power and aerial threat. He could also hold the ball and bring fellow forwards into play. Bobby Childs was shorter and trickier but also with a significant eye for goal. For that one season they forged a genuine twin spearhead capable of tearing defences to shreds.

By the mid-1960s the idea of two genuine goalscoring forwards had become the norm. The year following the Amateur Cup victory, Cooley had been replaced by the returning Keith Searle to link with Bobby Childs foraging for goals. It proved to be a pretty successful marriage with Searle topping the goalscorers with 29 goals and Childs with 24. It was all change in 1967/68 with top rated centre forward Dave Swain moving over from Hendon and goal machine John McCormack being poached from Kingstonian, where in the previous season he had scored an astonishing 54 goals!

Lips were being licked by the Stones faithful but, despite it being a very good season with the team reaching the semifinals of the FA Amateur Cup, McCormack

was hampered all season by a recurring hamstring injury that limited his appearances and effectiveness, and he managed just 13 goals.

he 1970s brought the club's first unarguable deadly duo in George Duck and Bill Byrne. In pure goalscoring this was not a marriage of equals. Duck was the goal poacher supreme, while Byrne was a centre forward of guile and intelligence who set up countless goals for his colleague via set ups and clever flick-ons. The image of John Henderson crossing from the wing and Byrne heading the ball into the path of Duck to score is implanted



in the memories of those who supported the Stones at the time. It was a magical, magnificent partnership.

The triumphant teams of the early 1980s fielded some excellent forwards in Alan and Neil Cordice, Mark Graves, Ray Knowles, Nigel Johnson, Lee Holmes and, for a gloriously brief moment. Andy Graham: but could any combination of them be considered a goalscoring partnership? The best case can be made for Mark Graves and Alan Cordice. While it would be stretching credulity to assert that they oper-

ated in a Duck/Byrne style, it was nonetheless a fact that in their different ways they were fear-some goalscorers. Graves was a clever, stylish goal-poacher while Cordice's raw pace was simply unmanageable for most defenders of the time, and the chaos he created in opposition defences allowed the predatory Graves to feed off the tasty scraps that arrived.

Following relegation from the Conference in 1988 and as the club settled in



to a slow decline into relative obscurity, there appeared teasingly brief corridors of hope to offer the fans some transitory warmth in what proved to be a harsh footballing winter for the

club. Tommy English somehow hit the back of the net 13 times from 26 appearances during the relegation season of 1987/88; the mercurial Tony Lynch (left) blew hot and cold as he came, went, came and went again, and when blowing hot was like a furnace of quick feet and explosive shooting but when off his game frustrating and ineffectual. David Ven-

ables had an outstanding season in 1992/93 when scoring 20 goals for an ordinary mid-table team. Left wing back Sean Pearson

chipped in with 17 goals in that same season, but to call him and Venners a partnership would be well wide of the mark.

The World of Ball

Who are ya? One game that linked our past with our future

It's coming up nine years since a match that, to this correspondent's mind at least, helped re-establish the potential of our great club in the most exhilarating way.

It's a sunny late February Saturday, the days becoming visibly longer with the promise of an Olympic summer ahead, and we're walking up to Cambridge United's Abbey Stadium.

Fewer than four days have elapsed since we finally overcame Dartford at The Vale to book our place in the 2011 / 2012 FA Trophy quarter finals. No small feat, this; we haven't reached the guarters since winning the competition a full 27 vears ago. It's been literally a generation since we played a game at this stage of a national cup competition that we could actually go on to win.

As you'd expect, excitement levels are high for the game. But there's something else too; something about the scale of the fixture which harks back to our former status as one of England's top non-league sides. This game is bringing out an element of our identity that's been all but submerged since the survival-focused 1990s.

Perhaps Rotherham United and the 2010 FA Cup run gave those new to the Stones since our

move to Ruislip a glimpse of that 'old-school' identity; but this game, played away and with genuinely attainable silverware at stake, is something else entirely.

In 2012, the National League South, never mind the actual National League, remains mere aspiration. And this season, Cambridge are the biggest fish remaining in the competition, a relative footballing giant standing between us and the semis. Certainly there is no doubting our status as underdog, Isthmian Tier 3 against National Tier 1, on their patch. Yet we're in form, we have Richard Jolly - and we're smarting from having been branded a 'tin-pot' club on the Cambridge forum. Oh really?


So now we are within minutes of getting to the ground. After years of away trips to crowdless joy vacuums, what will it be like arriving on a genuine ex-league club's home turf? For too long we've watched on as automatic promotion and relegation to the Football League has allowed some of our biggest former rivals to play league games against Darlington and Doncaster while we rocked up at Barton and Banstead.

Slowly, the sound of the Cambridge crowd is carried to us on the wind. This is the difference, oh yes. This is what a big match is all about. A huge wall of noise from a genuine football crowd. big, loud and lively, seeking to intimidate little old 'tin pot' Wealdstone into submission before the game even kicks off. We're in for a battle royal here. Goosebumps.

Except... now wait a second, what exactly is that they're singing? Whose army, what colours? Can their gaffer's name really rhyme with 'Bartlett'? And slowly the penny drops...

That moment of realisation - that the wall of noise was, in fact, the Stones fans in full cry - is something I still reflect upon. What a thrill it was to hear us, out-singing a club like that, it triggered in me the kind of emotional response typically associated with issues of identity – a pang of pride via a sense of association. Those people, in that stand over there, making all that noise? Yep, that's my club, my people. And as Cambridge found to their cost two hours later, Wealdstone are not just some other non-league club to be bracketed with all the others. We're at non-league level, sure, with all its perks and privations – but we're just as much our own club as anyone else, at any level, across the country.

Too often I sense that some fans of league clubs see their non league club peers as part of an amorphous single "non league" family. They can't understand that individual club identity and loyalty is vital whatever the level. They see us all as brothers and sisters in arms, part of one big plucky non-league family, rooting for each other against the big boys. (A check of responses to the National League's loan-or-grant fiasco in recent days should put that one to bed.)

I also know people who assume that we fans of non-league clubs will also have a natural affinity with all other lower level clubs. Why don't we, for instance, root for plucky Crawley in the FA Cup? They were once like you, right? The answer is that, to a stones fan, Crawley are like, oh I don't know, Southampton are to a Chelsea fan, i.e. just another club. (Also, we have history with them as direct competition, so 'plucky' they ain't – see also Cheltenham, Stevenage, etc.)

None of this is to say we can't relate to others' non-league experience. When Marine's name was drawn to play Spurs in the FA Cup, the noise from the homes surrounding their stadium was wonderful to hear. And there is always going to be joy at the success of smaller sides in big games - we all want to be on the side of the Davids against the Goliaths (Unless it's an FA Cup game in which the giant is only feigning interest, using the fixture as a training exercise in support of league survival or European qualification.)

Just as with Cambridge in 2012, it seems that some fans of our 2020/21 league opposition can't reconcile their own clubs' identities as being associated with the likes of us. (Bitter ex what now?)

The Cambridge match was exhilarating, of course, Richard Jolly's brace setting up a two-legged semi against another ex-league club, Newport County. But it also felt like a turning point. Amongst our fans (Cambridge thought a mere fifty of us would turn up) were youngsters wearing yellow caps dating all the way back to that 1985 Trophy win, while others were wearing shirts from our more recent seasons – the past and present signalling our future, one in which we could genuinely aspire to the level we have since reached with Notts County, Wrexham and Chesterfield as equals. The Cambridge game felt like us moving out of survival mode and into something more optimistically inclined.

Whatever happens in this ridiculous season, wherever we end up, we have the history, the acumen and, yes, the strong club identity necesary to continue our forward momentum. All we need to care about is Wealdstone FC...



Memories of 'village side' Eastleigh back in 2004 when the ridiculed James **Beattie saw Stones'** wonderful 2-1 win

Bank Holiday Monday August 30, 2004, Ryman Prem: Eastleigh 1 Wealdstone 2

ASTLEIGH'S history is well chronicled elsewhere in this programme but it's extraordinary to think that they were playing in the Wessex League (step five of non-League) while the Stones were winning the Conference and FA Trophy double in 1985. In fact, just five years earlier they were called Swaythling FC and playing in the Hampshire League!

The club's climb to the top flight of non League football - and to the brink of promotion to the Football League after losing in the national League play-offs in their first season (2014-15) and also in 2019 - has been phenomenal. In tandem with that, the club's owners Bridle Insurance have renovated Eastleigh's Silverlake Stadium with impressive new stands and infrastructure.

Bridle were chief sponsors of Oxford United but when that club decided to instal a new chairman ten years ago, Bridle upped sticks and took their money to Eastleigh much to the surprise of Oxford and the delight of the Spitfires.

The first time the Stones met Eastleigh was when we were both moving in an upwards direction. The reorganisation of the non-League game meant that the Spitfires, finishing fourth in their first season of Southern League Divisio One (East) football after elevation from the Wessex League, found themselves moved across to the Ryman League Premier Division. The Stones had crept into seventh place in the Ryman League Div One (North) and, by virtue of the famous play-off win over Dulwich Hamlet, found





ourselves also in the rarefied heights of the Ryan Prem.

Believe me, for the penniless Stones and our ranks of success-starved fans, that was pretty damn exciting and the trip down to Hampshire is one fondly remembered by all. We only just survived that season - while Eastleigh's rocket-

fuelled rise continued with promotion to Conference South via the play-offs - yet remarkably we won 2-1, that sunny Bank Holiday Monday in late August.

We were leading 1-0 at that stage through a low Ben Alexander strike, and the smiles turned to scowls as the referee penalised Chris Cahill for a perceived foul in the box and Eastligh's Williams levelled from the penalty spot. But all was sweetness and light in the dying moments when Alexander's shot hit the bar, and when Gary McKeown played the ball back in Richard Jolly seized on the ball to fire in the winner.

Monday 30th August, Ryman Premier League Eastleigh 1 Wealdstone 2

From the depths of the poor Wealdstone performance against Northwood on Saturday came this battling performance that won three points in Hampshire on Monday.

And the depths of Hampshire it was too. Despite being so close to Southampton the Eastleigh ground is a quiet backwater, that is if you ignore the drummers practicing behind the stand. The village green feel is complete with ice cream van inside the ground as well

As for the game, the opening half was a particularly quiet affair of very few chances. Richard Jolly made a poor connection to a Martin Carter cross, and namesake Andy Carter in the Wealdstone goal had to come scampering out of his area to tackle Forbes as he burst clear.

James Fisher had replaced Gary Burrell, who was knocked unconscious in a challenge. The defender made a brave attempt to carry on for a few minutes, but a further knock saw him withdrawn.

Fisher, playing out of position on the left, then proceeded to have one of his best games in a Wealdstone shirt and might have scored but for his touch letting him down when bursting into the area after a tempting cross from Jolly.

Carter tipped over a shot from Chamberlain before, in the sixth minute of stoppage time added on after the Burrell injury, Ben Alexander picked up Gary McKeown's chip and fired past the gigantic lurch-like frame of the Eastleigh keeper Matthews.

Eastleigh were woken up by this goal and came out with purpose for the second half- almost immediately Smith's header hit the bar and Forbes fired wide.

Alexander's header did draw Matthews into a full length save but this was an isolated incident as Carter saved acrobatically from Williams and knew nothing about Stokee's shot that hit him and rebounded to safety.

Just when Wealdstone were getting a little respite from the pressure, a disputed penalty was awarded for a perceived foul by Cahill. This was particularly harsh as a similar claim had been turned down when Alexander was bundled to the floor earlier. Williams' penalty gave Carter no chance.

As the game entered the final minutes Alexander's effort was tipped onto the bar by Matthews, but as the ball was fed back into the box by McKeown, Jolly turned to score what turned out to be the winner, although Alexander could have made the game safe had he not sliced hopelessly wide when one-on-one with Matthews.

The only other clashes between the two clubs were this season, of course. Eastleigh took the National League points (ending our run of five successive wins) 2-0 back in November at the Silverlake while Stones gained revenge with the sensational 4-3 FA Trophy win here at The Vale just before Christmas. The Spitfires were 3-0 head at half time but Charlie Wakefield, Jack Cawley, Dennon Lewis and Jacob Mendy Mendy secured one of the great comeback wins in history.

Summary: On the first weekend of 1971, Walsall find there is no place like home as the wheels start to fall off Villa's promotion wagon.

Programme highlight: A message from the boardroom that despite no takeover bids on the table, "Walsall Football Club is certainly not about to fade away." That's good then.

Programme lowlight: Though meetings between this pair were rare in the previous 80 years, Walsall having to dredge up a Wartime League game from 1943 (drawn 4-4) as a highlight sounds a bit like barrel scraping.

Programme bingo: The same 'From the boardroom' message that started by having to deny rumours of there not being a club the following week asking for maximum vocal support in the next 90 minutes. Ah, that old chestnut

Ahead of their time: Aptly named Supporters Club columnist R E Sadler. This was clearly a man with the club's best interests at heart. Nowadays he would be club mascot Storming Sid Sadler and ride a horse round the pitch before kick off.

Any other business: Two months earlier, there was talk of moving the game to Wolves' ground. Even without social media, Walsall fans soon stopped that.

Programme bingo: The presence of two Atkinsons on the Oxford team sheet was a fixture in itself. By this point Ron and Graham had made nearly 600 league appearances between them, with the future West Brom and Manchester United boss having missed only 27 of Oxford's 383 encounters since joining the fourth division in 1962.

Ahead of their time: While many clubs had a reputation for customer engagement that comprised taking money over the turnstiles and little else, the launch of the fans' magazine 'The Supporter' by Oxford looks a master stroke from here.

Any other business: Oxford were relegated in 1976, but made it to the first in 1985 and won the League Cup the following year.

What about the Stones? Our last Amateur Cup campaign begins and ends with a 0-1 defeat away to Wycombe Wanderers.

Though considerable, neither comes close to record holders Bradford City, who went 77 years between top flight games from 1922-99.
