 Throwing any article onto the field of play Climbing floodlight pylons, fences, stands or any structure or building
- · Using obscene or bad language likely to cause offence to others · Hitting the side or back panels of the Bulla stand No spectator ball games.
- 3) The consumption of alcoholic drinks is permitted INSIDE the social club bar, garden and boardroom areas.
- Vehicles parked on the Grosvenor Vale site are at the owners' risk.
- 5) Wealdstone Football Club supports the FA's campaign on pyrotechnics (e.g. flares and smoke bombs). Any misuse of such items in and around the Ground will result in those responsible being asked to leave the ground and, in line with football authority guidance, may result in a report to the Police, potential prosecution and a ban from the Club of up to three years.

From the Gaffer



It is however important that we don't get too down after defeats, and equaly not too high when we win. This is even more important now as rather than building on the good performances we've had we are having to patch up the team to get through to the end of the season and remain competitive when we can. It's almost impossible to plan and prepare ahead currently as we didn't know which players were going to be available until Friday afternoon.

From the day we walked in the door as a caretaker management team, we've had to reduce the squad from around 25/26 players, down to 12/13. So at a time we needed and wanted to strengthen the group, we've had to go the opposite way. It's incredibly frustrating for us a team and as a team but it's 100% the right move for the future of the football club.

Through no fault of any one at the club we are having to furlough players and are unable to bring in reinforcements unless they're playing for free. It is necessary and it's all with a view to giving ourselves the best chance possible for next season. It is now a case of making the best of a diabolical situation that the National League have forced us into.

We have picked up 8 points from 9 league games which in itself is a minor miracle when you consider how much we're having to overcome. Teams like Weymouth have gone full time in the last 2/3 months and haven't furloughed 1 player yet, and they don't intend to.

This club has, and will always overcome difficulties and this situation is no different. We need to stick together, be realistic about what we expect from the remainder of the season, and hopefully tonight can put a smile back on people's faces. We are here to win, and we will demand everything from the players and from ourselves to make sure that happens.

Comedy turns to farce as the Step 2 refuseniks concoct a bonkers plan, and then the FA fail to get around to making a decision

n Friday the Football Association Council was supposed to ratify the decision made by the FA Alliance Committee to reject the proposal of the Step 2 mini-league, with that level null and void.

Step 1 (our divison, the National League) would continue with no relegation. But, of course they didn't.

In fact, it may well be that they weren't even asked to vote on the matter. Even Twitter's Ollie Bayliss, the font of all knowledge on such matters, doesn't know why it wasn't voted upon... or maybe it's just that the votes haven't been collated yet? Confusion continues. Us Brits are great at comedic farces, aren't we?

So, what was the plan concocted by the Step 2 refuseniks to continue playing football? In short, it was as follows...

- Clubs play each other once;
- •Two promotion places, one automatic and one play off;
- No relegation from Step 1;
- •Clubs start with their PPG average multiped by fifteen BUT:
- All clubs start with at least twenty points;
- All clubs start with a zero-goal difference.

There was an interview with one of the cochairmen at Gloucester City on BBC Radio who explained the plan. To sum up, he said that rather than everyone start with nil points, which really is the only way to do any sort of league, it was to start with a sort of 'handicap' points system, whereby they looked at PPG from games played so far, and then allocated a 'starting points' level for each club.

But even that didn't really work because the gaps between top (Dorking, pictured below)) and bottom (Welling) was too great, so then they tweaked it so that Welling United were

6 points off 7th place from the start, which explains why every club starts with at

least twenty points and why a club like the Wings - twenty seven points behind leaders Dorking - would even be interested in playing the mini-league.

In another season, they would be relegated but through this contrivance, they could find themselves promoted with

an incredible run of results.

Unlikely of course. You can see why no rightminded committee could even countenance such a potty idea. It's plainly bonkers. Oh, and no relegation from the mini league either. Cake and eat it comes to mind.

o, even though the FA Council haven't even voted yet, let's assume, yes, a big risk I know, that they eventually will and

ratify the decision to reject the plan. So, where does it leave those clubs at Step 1 (like Wealdstone) that have been saved from any possible threat of relegation but have little or no chance of getting into the play-offs?

To cut costs, obviously, and save their dwindling cash reserves for next season.

Clubs will start, if they haven't already been,

furloughing players. Whether it is morally the right thing to do, you can argue all day, but clubs will need to ensure that they are still around to play football next season and reducing costs is the only way.

We already know clubs have furloughed players and staff; we have. Barnet and Kings Lynn have towards the bottom end of

the table, with Woking saying that they will also once they are out of the FA Trophy.

We even have the bizarre situation of clubs higher up the table furloughing players and then signing even more to their roster. As the season comes to a conclusion, games could well become farcical with teams loaded with youth team players and trialists playing against full time professionals.

t's not going to be pretty, before we even worry about the integrity of the competition with titles being won depending on whom

you still have to play. And the National league will then need to sort out what they are to do with the very thorny question of what to do with Dover?

To recap, Dover have taken their ball home and their mother isn't allowing them out to play after tea.

If the National League does nothing at all, then

there will be uproar from all of the clubs that carried on playing, paying wages and incurring debt that will take years to pay off.

So will they be forcibly relegated a step or two, will there be a points punishment instead, which will need

National League going to do about Dover? If unpunished the other clubs will be furious' to be hefty enough that means that they are likely to be relegated next season in any case? Then how does the league even up the numbers in the top division? With Macclesfield's demise. we are already short of one team and only three were to be relegated. It feels like that depending on what happens to Dover, only two may go down next season with four travelling the other way.

found myself asking the question before I'd intended to. Way before I'd intended to. It was the sort of thing you'd ask once you were comfortable in each other's company, for it could easily be taken the wrong way.

"So Dan" I began, less than halfway through our 45-minute chat, when we were talking about his time as a flying left-winger at Sutton United, "there were some highlights being shown at half time of the Sutton-Stones game five years ago, and I noticed that you've got quite a bit bigger",

There was a moment's silence at the other end of the phone.

Then he replied: "Yeah to be fair there's

been a bit of lockdown weight that I've put on, and I saw some of those highlights and I looked a different person then". I breathed a sigh of relief. An angry Dan Wishart would not be a comfortable proposition.

"You're still very mobile though, and the gym work must make you really tough to play against; when you came back in for the Boreham Wood and Halifax games - and then off the bench against Kings Lynn - they just couldn't get past you" I said. It was true: Wishy as a fullback is a powerful, determined opponent and of course he's lost none of his ability on the ball.

"There are pros and cons" he admitted.

"I'm 28 now and I probably don't have the same energy levels and endurance as a few years ago but, on the other hand, it's often a psychological game and people look at me and think they probably don't want to get involved in a physical battle".

've watched Dan evolve as a foot-baller over the years and he's scored more than his fair share of goals against us.

"Yeah, Wealdstone were one of my lucky teams to score against and my first for Sutton was against the Stones half a dozen years ago".

He rifled one in from outside the box past Jonathan North in that 1-1 draw and again hit the net with a freekick in the return game at Grosvenor Vale which Sutton - on their way to going up as NLS champions - won 2-0.

"I also scored down here last season when I was playing for Maid-

stone. The keeper, Oxborough, saved one chance I had at the far post but then a few minutes later there was an identical chance and I stuck it away".

When I spoke to Dan the news had just broken about the permanent appointment of Stuart Maynard and Matty Saunders - and he was quick to praise the improvement in coaching and application over the past few weeks.

"They're both very thorough. I've been at clubs - like Sutton for example - where we just played five a sides in training, endless five a sides - though it worked for us as we all knew what to do once the game kicked off. He we do pattern work, marking, organisation and drills and It's helping get the confidence back.

"Nothing is left to chance and of course I'm enjoying it more as I'm being picked. This has always been an enjoyable bunch of players to be around though, and that's what many people don't get about football.... they just see the 90 minutes and whether you've won or lost but there's so much that goes on behind the scenes, training and travelling that can make it a happy place or an unhappy place. This is definitely a happy place".

an Wishart's football life began with the vouth team Yiewslev Predators, close to his family home at Haves End. He now lives in Slough - just round the corner from Billy Clifford - but was born in Hillingdon Hospital and credits his dad, Chris, for being his mentor as he ferried him to youth team football on Sunday mornings.

"He taught me how to play and was a decent player hilmself at local level. He's told me who played for but I've forgotten!"

The Predators became part of the Hayes FC youth set-up, and then Hayes & Yeading when those clubs combined in

the mid-noughties. Dan went on to figure for Hayes & Yeading Reserves before making his first team debut at the age of 17.

H & Y were in the Conference National then, groundsharing at Woking and when they were relegated to the NLS he was off up the M1 to play for two seasons with Alfreton Town in the Conference's top flight.

Loan spells at Margate and Eastleigh followed before Sutton snapped him up on the eve of their NLS title-winning season. He finiushed that 2015-16 campaign named in the Divisional Team of the Season and ewas also capped for the England C team against Slovakia

"I had a couple of great years there but I wasn't involved in Sutton's FA Cup run that led

to the home games with Leeds and Arsenal. Forest Green, top of the Conference, came in with an offer in October and I wanted to prove that I could play at a higher level, so said ves.

"Forest Green were set-up as an EFL Club. Everything about them is professional and I didn't want to have regrets about missing the chance to go there... we got up through the play-offs and then I played about 70% of the League Two games next season.

"But I fell out of love with the game about that time. I came back to Sutton, had a bit of a word with myself because my career wasn't heading where it should have been... and then went to Maidstone United in the National League and

was relegated! That should have never have happened with the players we had _ Michael Phillips and Michae Efete were there too - but the club got though too many managers with too many conflicting ideas."

ou must enjoying playing on plastic then? I asked him. "Yes, Sutton and Maidstone... well, we train on 3G pitches all the time but I think maybe it's not too good for the knees. It's the way forward for non-League clubs, but the pitch here at Wealdstone is a great surface. Having played here for Maidstone last season was a big deciding factor for me to sign in the summer... we only lost 2-1 but Wealdstone were in control the whole game and played the sort of total football we'd played at Forest Green; clever passing, good movement and I want to be involved in that sort of team".

So is your best position now at full-back, I asked him. "Yes, I think so. I love a bit of confrontation, a bit of edge and the games against Boreham Wood and Halifax had that -

a real intensity. The Kings Kynn game was more like a training match, all pretty passing and no-one really getting stuck in....it's those games when you miss the crowd to give you a lift.

"Ask any player and they'll tell you that they feed off the crowd and we're desperate to get them back in the stadium. We want to put the joy on people's faces.

"I feel sorry for the players that are retiring from the game just now because they were denied that buzz from the crowd - imagine if you hung up your boots this season and how flat it would be?

"Age is not on my side and although I'd love to get back in the League it's not the be-all and end-all. I'd just like to leave a bit of a legacy where people say: 'That Dan Wishart wasn't a bad player". That's all. I'd be happy with that."

NORMAN GOLDSMITH

Today's featured supporter is a bit special: Norman Goldsmith was treated to sponsorship of the recent Halifax game to celebrate his 80th birthday by his son Peter; we knew all about Pete's allegiance to the Stones but his dad goes way, way back to the 1950s. So this is Norman's story, in his own words...

was born on March 4 1941 wich makes me 80 and a bit. Along the way I've acquired two metal knees and a new aorta.


I've lived in Pinner since 1976 with my wife of 53 years, Pauline. We have one son, Peter, who is also an ardent Stones supporter. My early years were spent in Kensal Rise where I do, in fact remember a couple of Mr Hitler's Specials flattening two terraces of three houses each in the next street. We moved to Willesden and then, on getting married, to Carpenders Park.

My first Wealdsrtone game, in 1950, was was as a visitor with Willesden FC for whom my dad was secretary. My first impressions were that Wealdstone were a 'big' non-league team with a good set-up in a big stadium (Lower Mead). I was impressed. Stones. however, won the game.

My career started at the age of 16 as a lowly


junior clerk at Willesden Council. Later I got their support for a four-year college course to quality as a Public Health Inspector (now known as Environental Health). A few years later, while at Camden Council, I was sponsored for a three-year post-graduate master's course in management studies. Wanting to utilise this, I progressed to a CEO's job at a large housing associations, followed by a couple of directorships. I later returned to environmental health and some consultancy work, eventually retiring

at 69... since when I've helped out as a voluntary front desk officer for the Metropolitan Police. I'm currently laid off because of the pandemic.

My early years were spent playing football on Stonebridge Rec for the school side and in the park on Sunday afternoons. Boots came in one colour (brown), had hard toe caps, leather nail-in studs and high ankle supports. The ball was heavy leather with a tie-off bladder and a lace. I still remember heading that lace!



playing I needed a Saturday afternoon my son, became a fixture under the at Lower Mead. They were great days"

Those Sunday afternoons, with no kids around, were an opportunity for parents (including mine) to renew their wedding vows. I found this out later in life.

eaving primary school, my sport took place generally on Saturdays with football and cricket in season. No time for watching. I was playing local youth team football and, from the age of 12, men's cricket.

After I started work I founded a men's football team at Willesden Council - a few clerks. a couple of distmen, surveyors, engineers and

a grave digger were among our team. Eniovable times, elation at unexpected wins and tours to Belgium and Holland were the highlights, though unexpected spectator time was presented when I suffered a serious knee injury.

I still remember a football match I had to hobble to on my crutches: Wealdstone v Hendon in the Amateur Cup Final. 1966. Was this my conversion to becoming a Stones fan? After my knee recovered I went back to playing for the council team, had part of a season at Rayners Lane and also a spell at Kingsbury Town. I did also represent the London Council at both football and cricket for number of vears... days off work to play sport. Sheer

My Wealdstone-watching began after my retirement from playing, in my late 30s which for the mathematician, was in the late 1970s. I needed a Saturday afternoon sports fix in the winter and had a young son who also needed distraction... so we became "under the clock" fixtures on the High Mead side at Lower Mead and assisted Vale Shearer - who remembers him? - in putting the minute hand on the clock. My addition to the Wealdstone ranks was confirmed, and the club has given me a lot of pleasure over the years. The disappointents have only served to highlight the good moments.

o what is the best match I've ever seen? Well a group of us bought tickets for the 1968 European Cup Final at Wemblev when the finalists were not yet known. Magic happened: Manchester United versus Benfica. None of us sold our tickets and... what a game. Eusebio is my top gentleman of football.

And what is my best Stones game? I've been watching the team too long to have a 'best game' but I do have favourites. Probably the best of those revolve around the double side of 1984-85 with the highlights being the league decider at Kettering, and the Trophy final at Wembley. Last season's squad would have given the Double Boys a run for their money however, with their quality and the sheer

Being a traditionalist, I still miss Lower Mead. Those midweek games on a quiet evening when the bantering between Denis Byatt and the fans was of top, but dubious, quality. Other memories are an evening game at Dartford with their manager Peter Taylor getting angrier and angrier;

The Cards

oking Football Club, known as the Cards (from the Cardinal red of the red and white halves), was formed in 1889. The Club joined the West Surrey League in 1895/96, winning the title by one point on the final day of the season. However, within 21 years of being formed, the Club was in danger of folding for financial reasons. The turning point came when, in January 1908, Woking played Bolton Wanderers in the First Round of the FA Cup, having battled through five qualifying rounds. Despite losing the away game 5-0, the Club made it into the national press. Bolton Wanderers, impressed by the minnows they had defeated, travelled to Woking for a friendly match the following season, which kept the Club solvent.

In 1911 the Club joined the Isthmian League, maintaining their place in the top division for 72 years and finishing as runners-up to Wycombe Wanderers in 1956/57. That achievement was eclipsed the following season when, in front of a 71,000 crowd, the Cards beat Ilford 3-0 in the last FA Amateur Cup Final to be televised live. Sadly, the Club then went into decline, culminating in a first-ever relegation in 1982/83. By the end of

the 1984/85 season the Club had plunged to Division Two South of the Isthmian League. It was during that season that former player, Geoff Chapple, was appointed as manager, Although he was not able to save the Club from relegation, the renaissance was underway. Just missing out on promotion at the first attempt, the Club clinched the Division Two South title in 1986/87 and, after two third place finishes in Division One, they were promoted back to the Premier Division at the end of the 1989/90 season.

The next season saw the Club become part of FA Cup folklore. Entering the competition at the Fourth Qualifying Round, they beat three Conference sides to set up a Third Round tie away to West Bromwich Albion. Recovering from being a goal behind, Woking triumphed 4-2, thanks to a superb team effort



and a never-to-be-forgotten hat-trick from Tim Buzaglo. To be drawn out of the hat with a home game against Everton was beyond everyone's wildest dreams. The tie was switched to Goodison Park and, against a team packed with internationals, the sides were separated only by a solitary Kevin Sheedy goal. Over 34,000 people remained in the ground to give the players a rapturous standing ovation.

Promotion to the Conference was achieved in 1991/92. The Isthmian League title was clinched in early April, with seven games still to be played.

The FA Trophy was won in 1994, 1995 and 1997 and the Cards also achieved five successive top five finishes in the Conference, including being runners-up in 1994/95 and 1995/96.

At the end of the 1996/97 campaign, having just clinched the FA Trophy for the third time, Geoff Chapple and his coach, Colin Lippiatt, left the Club and joined Kingstonian. John McGovern, the former Derby County, Nottingham Forest and Leeds United midfielder, was

appointed. Hopes were high that he would lead Woking into the League but, although the Club finished in third place, his style of play and his personality did little to endear him to the fans. A poor start to the 1998/99 campaign led to his dismissal. Brian McDermott, the former Arsenal



player, joined Woking on a non-contract basis and achieved a temporary upturn in fortunes. guiding the team to a ninth place finish.

Significant events had taken place off the field. The downturn in the Club's fortunes had led to a financial crisis. With the Club facing administration or worse, successful businessman and long-time fan, Chris Ingram, came to the rescue, becoming Chairman in February 2002. He continues to own the ground, with the Club enjoying a 125-year lease at a peppercorn rent, but his financial backing of the Club and involvement in its running ceased at the end of the 2010-11 season

The Club went full-time in the summer of 2003. The fans' hopes were borne out by a much better season, with the Cards achieving a ninth place finish, having been on the fringe of the play-off places until the last few weeks. Again, only a poor finish the following season deprived the Cards of a play-off place, but a final placing of 8th with 68 points was the best achievement since 1997/98. Disappointingly, the Cards failed to mount a challenge for a play-off place in 2005/06, finishing in 11th place. 2006/07 was another season of underachieving and, despite bringing in fresh faces during the January transfer window, d the Cards finished in 15th place.

The reprieve proved only temporary, with the following two seasons producing more disappointment, culminating in the Cards' relegation in summer 2009 from the BSP after 17 years in the top flight of non-League football.

A storming end to the 2009-10 season saw the Cards clinch 5th place. Dover Athletic were beaten in the play-off semi-final but the Cards lost to Bath City in the final.

The Club went part-time in summer 2010, with Baker and Dack both being awarded new two-year contracts. But, in spite of good runs in the FA Cup and the FA Trophy, both decided to leave the Club in January 2011, with Garry Hill taking over the reins till the end of the season. with Steve Thompson as First Team Coach. A dramatic upturn in league fortunes took the Club into 5th place, but the Cards lost to Farnborough in the play-off semi-final.

The revival continued apace in the 2011-12 season, with the Cards reaching the top spot in late September and staying there throughout the campaign in spite of being pushed hard by Dartford. The BSBS title was won by nine points, with only five games lost all season.

The Cards finished in a comfortable 12th place in their first season back in the Conference Premier, playing an entertaining brand of football, and did even better the following season, ending in 9th place after showing great form in the second half of the campaign. The 2014-15 campaign saw the Club finish in a commendable 7th spot, missing a play-off place by only three points. Garry Hill maintained his record of top-half finishes the following season as the side ended in 12th position. But the summer of 2016 saw the loss of some experienced players and the side struggled throughout the 2016-17 season, eventually averting relegation thanks to generally improved form from the new year onwards, finishing in 18th place.

In May 2017, following an announcement that new investment would take place in the Club, Anthony Limbrick was appointed manager, with Jason Goodliffe joining him as assistant manager shortly afterwards. The Club also announced that it would be moving gradually to full-time status.

2018/19 saw the Cards promoted back to the National League after beeting Welling 1-0 in the play

Craig is a former Woking academy graduate who returned to the club after a ten-year absence in 2018 to become his boyhood team's first-choice goalkeeper. Previous Clubs include Carshalton, Hampton & Richmond, Cambridge Utd. Eastbourne, Whitehawk, Macclesfield & Barnet

31. MARK SMITH - GOALKEEPER

Mark started his senior career at Brentford before joining Woking's local rivals Aldershot Town in 2016. He made a handful of appearances for the Shots in the National League before becoming a regular at Eastbourne Borough in the National League South. After a brief spell with Billericay Town he joined Dartford, where he spent the entirety of the 2019/20 campaign.

2. JACK COOK - DEFENCE

Jack began his career at Charlton Athletic, where he spent two years in the youth team, before leaving the professional game to focus on his studies at Brighton University. During his time at university he continued to play for Isthmian League side Worthing, where he caught the eye of Dowse, leading to him joining Hampton in 2017.

3. JOSH CASEY - DEFENCE

He began his career with neighbours Aldershot Town in 2009. From there, he moved to Salisbury and Bashley, before linking up with Dowse for the first time at Kingstonian in 2013. He spent two years with the K's, reaching a play-off semi-final, before moving to Hampton in 2015.

5. BEN GERRING - DEFENCE

Started his senior career with Weymouth back in 2010, after leaving boyhood club Plymouth Argyle. However, it was only after earning a switch to National League club Torquay United in October 2015, that he truly began to establish himself. He spent the best part of two seasons with the Gulls. A move to Truro preceded a short-lived spell at Billericay Town followed at the start of the 2018/19 campaign before he joined up with Woking

6. MOUSSA DIARRA - DEFENCE

Moussa joined the Cards for a third time in January 2021. He begun his career with St Albans City and Hemel Hempstead Town, before joining Dowse at Hampton in early 2015. He joined Dover Athletic in the summer of 2018 but after falling down the pecking order moved on loan to Woking before making the move permanent four months later.

12. NATHAN COLLIER - DEFENCE

Woking fans caught a first glimpse of the player when he made his debut for Dartford in the National League in August 2012. He spent the following year at Eastbourne Borough before joining Dowse and Hampton & Richmond in 2016. Nathan joined Woking in 2017/18.

16. KYRAN LOFTHOUSE - DEFENCE

On loan from Oxford United. Kyran joined fellow Oxford youngster Malachi Napa and Slavi Spasov at Woking in late October 2020, signing a short-term loan deal. The pacey wide player, who is comfortable at either as a right-side winger or at right-back, has already made two appearances for the U's this season, featuring in both the EFL Cup and EFL Trophy.

24. LEO HAMBLIN - DEFENCE

Leo is a second-year academy player who was awarded a first-team contract in the summer of 2020 after impressing in pre-season.

4. CHARLIE COOPER - MIDFIELD

Charlie joined Woking in the summer of 2020 after impressing manager Alan Dowson during a brief trial period. The ball-winning midfield player spent last season with fellow National League side FC Halifax Town. He started his senior career at Birmingham City & enjoying time on loan at York City before joining Forest Green Rovers.

8. KANE FERDINAND - MIDFIELD

Kane extended his stay at the Laithwaite Community Stadium into a fifth consecutive season in the summer of 2020. The midfielder began his senior career at Southend United in 2010 then moved to Championship side Peterborough United followed in 2012.He spent time on loan at Northampton Town, Luton Town, and Cheltenham Town before joining Dagenham & Redbridge in 2015 then East Thurrock United that September.

10. MAX KRETZSCHMAR - MIDFIELD

Max signed a new contract in the summer of 2020 ahead of a fourth season with the club. He started his career with Wycombe, where he graduated from the club's academy, playing 85 times for the Chairboys' senior team across a three-year period. After a year with Woking under former manager Garry Hill, he joined Hampton & Richmond Borough, coached by current Cards' boss Alan Dowson.

11. MATT JARVIS - MIDFIELD

He started his career with Gillingham, making his Football League debut in what is now

the Championship in November 2003. Championship side Wolves swooped in 2007. It was at Molineux where he enjoyed the most successful years of his career. He was a key part of the side which won the second-tier and promotion to the Premier League in 2009. From Wolves, he moved to West Ham United in 2012, where he made another 78 Premier League appearances before injuries started to take their toll. He joined Norwich City in 2015 but after featuring 21 times spent over three years sidelined with knee, hamstring, and hip injuries.

15. JACK SKINNER - MIDFIELD

Jack signed for the first-team in the summer of 2019, after graduating from the club's academy.

18. BEN DEMPSEY- MIDFIELD

On loan from Charlton Athletic. Ben joined the Cards for a second loan spell in October 2020, shortly after the start of the new National League season. A tough-tackling central midfield player, he originally enjoyed a month's loan starting in February of the same year, making an immediate impact and helping the team to two wins and two draws in five league outings before the season was cut short.

Tommy joined the Cards in the summer of 2020 after a successful trial. A former Woking academy player, he started his senior career with Pagham before joining hometown club Bognor Regis Town in 2017. a surprise move to Scotland beckoned in January 2019 as he joined Hibernian.

22. JOHN GODDARD - MIDFIELD

John re-joined Woking for a second spell in the summer of 2020. Before joining Woking, he started his career with Hayes & Yeading United. His Football League career also started strongly after he swapped Woking for Swindon in 2016. Has also represented Stevenage, Aldershot Town & Ebbsfleet United.

26. JAMAR LOZA - MIDFIELD

Jamar joined Woking for a third time in December 2020. Having previously enjoyed two successful loan spells with the club during the past two seasons. The Jamaican international began his career with Norwich City for whom he made six first-team appearances. HAs represented Maidstone United, Billericay Town, Chelmsford City & King's Lynn Town

7. DAVE TARPEY- FORWARD

The experienced forward began his career in the Hellenic Leagues with Henley Town before his performances earned him a move to National League South side Basingstoke Town in 2007. Has played for Hampton & Richmond, Farnborough, Maidenhead and Barnet.

9. JONTÉ SMITH- FORWARD

earned his first professional contract at Sutton United in 2010. Following a move to Crawley Jonte enjoyed a spell with PS Kemmi in Finland and Flekkeroy in Norway before returning to England with Gloucester City in 2015 then Lewes in 2016 before a move to Oxford United then Cheltenham.

17. SAM EVANS - FORWARD

Sam is a second-year academy player who signed contractual forms with the first-team in the summer of 2020.

19. NIKO MUIR - FORWARD

On loan from Hampton & Richmond, Experienced striker Niko joined the Cards on an initial onemonth loan deal in March 2021.

23. JAYDEN WAREHAM - FORWARD

Jayden is a highly-regarded second-year academy player who joined the Cards youth setup on a two-year deal in the summer of 2019.

25. SAM ASHFORD- FORWARD

On loan from Crawley Town. Versatile forward player Sam, who can play out wide or through the middle as a central striker, joined the Cards on loan until the end of the season in March 2021.

MANAGER. ALAN DOWSON

Alan, better known as 'Dowse', took over as Woking manager in May 2018 following the Cards relegation from the National League. Despite starting the season with just one contracted player as well as a whole host of other issues to be resolved both on and off the pitch, Dowse enjoyed a superb first season as boss, earning an immediate return to the top flight of non-league football with promotion via the play-offs.

Alan's previous management positions inc. Walton & Hersham, Kingstonian & Hampton & Richmond. As a player Alan represented Milwall, Fulham, Bradford, Darlington, Slough, Gateshead and Walton & Hersham.

The World of Ball
Stop tinkering! - let's limit any changes to football's laws

From the 'kick-in' to the latest tweaks to offside, football's administrators have at best a patchy record over the past 30 years when it comes to changing the regulations

The 1994-95 season was not a good one for Wealdstone - and I'm pretty sure I'm understating the fact. It was our second and last season sharing with Yeading at their ground, The Warren, a stadium near impossible to get to by any other method than car. When you arrived, part of a crowd that struggled to surpass 150, you watched turgid Southern League Southern Division football so utterly execrable on our part that we ended up third bottom of the league. Wealdstone's very should was being sapped and urgent, revolutionary action was required.

Behind the scenes, a project to re-boot the club back in the borough of Harrow was taking shape. But even though it involved us choosing to relegate ourselves three divisions, said project still proved far more successful than another project that same season - one that, thankfully, we escaped being part of by one season.

Taking a good kicking

Back at Earlsmead, indeed at any other Diadora Isthmian League ground that season, clubs were obliged by FIFA to participate in a season-long experiment. The idea was that when the ball went out of play on the touchline, teams could opt to kick the ball back into play instead of throwing it in. Incredibly, this project involved the Japanese, Belgian and Hungarian leagues with the Isthmian League being England's representative competition for the purpose (even the Isthmian League Cup games were played with the kick-in rule in place).

To put it mildly, the idea was controversial. Intrigued by the idea and depressed by the experience of a typical Wealdstone home fixture that season, your correspondent - oh God, I'm so, so sorry - paid to watch... to watch... damn

it, to watch Harrow Borough play a league fixture using the kick-in. (Obviously I supported whomsoever Borough were playing - Staines Town, I think.) Basically, teams would try to kick the ball off an oppo player into touch anywhere in the half they were attacking in order to create what was effectively a long free kick. The game was a stop-start nightmare; managers hated it, and the spectacle was of long balls launched into the box and little else; it was ugly and tedious.

This was one of two fundamental changes to the game proposed during the 1990s. The other, introduced two seasons prior to the kick-in debacle, proved far more successful. Making a pass-back to the goalkeeper illegal was the result of a FIFA review that decided the recent Italian World Cup finals tournament had been too dull. In practice, it ensured the ball stayed in open play and helped stretch the game. 25 years on, no right-minded administrator of the game would consider going back to a game in which play could be snuffed out by the keeper picking up every ball passed back to the keeper.

Offside goes completely hat-stand

So, big idea changes to the game can succeed and fail. Fine. But what on EARTH is going on with the offside rule this season?

This idea that a player can be deemed to be offside but only adjudged as such when the ball goes dead is borderline insane. What possible value is there in a referee's assistant keeping his or her flag down despite the full knowledge that one or other player has been in an offside position? You get the ridiculous situation of goals scored or chances missed, all the final-stage action you want to see, but all it completely bogus because as soon as the ball goes dead the flag

will go up and it'll all have been for naught. Why not save everyone the time, and avoid unnecessary injury (as happened recently with Liverpool's keeper) by sticking the bloody flag up at the time the infringement occurs?

It's the latest in a long line of tampering, tweaking and tinkering with the offside rule, and it's surely amongst the most egregious examples of an idea that can't possibly have been though through before its introduction. But unlike the back-pass or the kick-in experiment, the dicking about with offside has become something of an annual pastime for the game's administrators. Add to it the jaw-dropping lack of consistency applied by video assistant referees over in Stockley Park, home of the VAR command centre that is, funnily enough, only a couple of miles west of The Warren, and if anything even more soulless than that ground.

We now see offsides for an hilarious millimetre's difference between an attacker's upper arm and a defender's leg, the kind of thing no human eye would have seen and thus no human would have complained about had the game continued and the goal allowed.

Recently we've seen obvious, glaring penalties declared not to be so by a video assistant referee because of some ludicrous distinction between what is and isn't the purview of referee. Cue experts and pundits throwing their hands up at the utter absurdity of it all, and rightly so.

Not sure I really need this third subhead

So what does all this say about the rules of the game? Essentially, that you fiddle with them at your peril. Most changes are partial successes at best, many end as total failures.

Hell, even competition formats are tinkered with in absurd ways. I'm still waiting to see how on earth a 40-team World Cup finals tournament is remotely possible, while I note that next season UEFA is introducing a third European club competition, the European Conference League, into which England will submit, amongst others, the League Cup winner. It's like going back in time to the days of the European Cup, UEFA Cup and UEFA Cup-Winners' Cup.

What comes around, it seems, goes around. So, the FA, FIFA, UEFA et al – stop tinkering!

9.22 train home to Hatch End.

Just this once. I was prepared to spend an extra 28 minutes shivering on the Northbound platform, warmed by the memory of the 92nd minute goal (officially 89 mins) that secured an unexpected two points and sent us on the way to the heady heights of 12th place.

o what happened to Alick Brown? I put Pete Worby, super sleuth, on the case and he came up with the full stats, as expected. Young Mr Brown made 49 starts and nine substitute appearances for the Stones across those two and a half seasons (far more than I had imagined), and was eventually loaned out to Hillingdon Borough. Boro were a division above us at the time, in the process of being relegated from the Southern League Prem, and in fact we passed them going in the opposite direction a few months later.

riting this very column before the Stones met Woking in August 2018 the first league match-up between our clubs in 48 years - it was tricky to recall many memorable encounters. The odd FA Cup clash perhaps. And certainly Wealdstone's last season as amateur Isthmians when Alan Humphries' desperately mediocre side actually managed to rack up a league double against the mid-table Cards.

In fact the uninspiring 3-0 win at Lower Mead in April 1971 was the club's final match outside the professional ranks.

But as for clashes seared on the memory? This was all to change in the space of one season as the sides met in three epic encounters two years ago. It was to end in unexpected drama and you could have got seriously long odds on Bobby Wilkinson's Wealdstone going all the way to meet Woking in the play-off semi-final.... for the Cards had spent all season locked in a two-way contest for the National League South title with Torquay United, and automatic promotion, while the Stones' stuttering challenge for a play-off place seemed to have fizzled out with three defeats in four games at Torquay, Hampton and at home to Dulwich.

Our hopes had been raised by an unlikely

league double over Woking - 1-0 at Grosvenor Vale on a balmy August evening thanks to Matt Lench's late penalty and then, even better, a terrific 2-0 win at a stunned Kingfield in February with Tarryn Allarakhia and Dave Pratt's opportunist goals.

The Cards fans might have been forgiven for thinking that the Stones were their bogey side especially after just half an hour of the playoff semi final when Wealdstone led 2-0. I think both sets of fans were incredulous!

Stones had only just crept into the knockout stage on that crazy last-day win over Hemel Hempstead. At 4pm, trailing 1-0, we were 11th in the table. At 4.45pm, after Jake Sheppard's outlandish winner, we had somehow overtaken four clubs and ended up seventh! And with an away eliminator at our own bogey side, Bath City.

Stones took 500 fans to Wiltshire on the Wednesday evening and scored an unbelievable 3-1 win to set up the big game at Kingfield the following Sunday.

nd so the stage was set: A towering header from Freddie Grant and a cool finish from a corner by Connor Stevens had the 650+ Wealdstone contingent dancing in disbelief. But there was still a long hour of football to play. And while full-timers Woking

had had eight days to rest and prepare for the game. Stones had half a dozen walking wounded from the battle royale at Bath including goalkeeper Jonathan North who almost had his head taken off by a brutal challenge from home striker Ryan Brunt.

Stones management spent the four days between that win and the game at Kingfield in a desperate search for a keeper - and play-off rules decreed that any specialist replacement could not be brought in from a higher level. Which left the yellow jersey filled by Mark Scott, the former Slough keeper who had broken his neck in a NL South game two years earlier and was finally back playing for Chertsey Town after a long lay-off.

Did Northy's absence affect Stones chances? Well, it certainly didn't help as Woking threw everyone forward in a titanic second half. Scott was buffeted and unable to

get to the corner from which Diarra headed Woking's first goal, with 20 mins to play, and he had no chance when Max Kretzschmar broke Stones hearts with an 86th minute leveller from close range.

oking had all the momentum and extra time would have meant only one winner. But Stones were denied the chance to extend the game three minutes into injury time when a high up-and-under was nodded on to a clearly-offside Jake Hyde, who lifted the ball over the slowly-advancing Scott and into the net.

The crowd went bananas. The official (shared) attendance was 2.027 but Kingfield can seat 2.500 and pretty much every seat looked full to me. And the claim that there were less than 1,000 on the terraces was just laughable. There were over 3,000 in the ground for the play-off final the following week as Welling were beaten 1-0 and promotion assured. But that's a minor gripe and cannot disguise the pride felt by the 700 or more Stones fans who trooped along to Kingfield that afternoon, underlining our claims to be the bestsupported club at that level away from home... claims backed up by the phenomenal following at Havant last season.

What a shame our fans are locked out at present. But how good will next season be!


Programme lowlight: At this distance, new signing David Ford posing with what appears to be a foot-long cigar seems somewhat ill-advised.

If he didn't get the most uniquely personalised chant of all time, he should have.
