THE STONES INTERVIEW BY TIM PARKS



'I'd scored 30 goals before Christmas last year and I'm sure it would have earned me a move to a League
Green (a small village between Dartford and Maidstone) to meet the others at the Holiday Inn, Brentwood.

hen it comes to car shares, forget Peter Kay. Put Danny Parish, Charlee Hughes, Jorome Slew, Kundai Benyu and Jack Cawley in the same motor and the banter of the Essex/Kent Wealdstone crew is off the the scale!

glow of netting Maldon's opening goal in the sensa-tional FA Cup giant-killing of League Two Orient

"Yeah, it's a long way to travel, about an hour and a half round the M25 for training and matches but you'd be amazed how quickly the time passes when we get together" says our 21-year-old summer capture from Maldon & Tiptree, Danny Parish.

He drives up from his home in New Ash


"Charlee lives out near Maldon, and Jack's that way too, while Jorome and Kundai are in East

London so its a good place to meet. You get used to the travelling; we train twice a week in the evenings,

and the opposition. It's a professional environent and I'm really enjoying it."

Danny was part of the juggernaut Maldon & Tiptree team who took the Ryman Div One North by storm last season, finding themselves 14 points clear at the top of the table when the season was null-and-voided in March.

"We were only a couple of wins away from being mathematical champions" says Danny, with the hurt still evident in his voice. "I had scored 30 goals before Christmas and I'm certain that would have earned a move to an EFL club in normal conditions. I was playing for Maldon but training at Colchester all last season, and my agent was taking to lots of clubs. But Covid-19 changed everything and suddenly clubs were reluctant to take chances".

t was Maldon's historic 2-1 FA Cup First Round win at League Two Orient last November that made football sit up and take notice. "It was an amazing team performance and I loved playing up front in a three with Charlee and Jorome. We switch positions all the time, coming inside, going outside, coming deep, and it's so hard to defend against. They didn't know who to pick up."

Alongside Danny's 30 goals in the truncated season, Charlee hit 29 and Jorome 29 - and how many times have three strikers shared 90 goals, let alone in a shortened campaign?

It was obvious the level eight Essex club wouldn't be able to hang onto their celebrated trio... so how marvellous that they have all ended up here at Grosvenor Vale?

"As I'd said, my agent was talking to several clubs but Wealdstone reached out and, in all that uncertainty, it's a great move for me. I was talking to Charlee, he was keen to sign too and we ended joining together. And when Jorome committed himself too, well it it's like the Three Musketeers all over again!" laughed Danny.

"But we're not daft, we knew we weren't just going to walk in and start playing. We've had to be patient - there are so many good players here, particularly front players.

"It is frustrating though. I believe in my ability and I know I can score goals at this level."

Danny caught the eye of Brentford as a 13-year-old playing in the Dartford district team, and he sent the next tree years making the 120-mile round trip from the family home in Kent to West London. "It was disappointing to be be released at 18, but I went and played for my local Southern League side Ashford United and scored 24 goals in 26 league games. Then it was on to Maldon & Tiptree".

So what is the biggest difference for you in the

the three-division step-up to the National League? "I think it's the intensity" he said. "You have to be so sharp, strong and concentrated otherwise you don't survive. It's physically tougher too. But I've worked hard to get to where I am and I'm deterined to be successful".

What's your favourite position, Danny? "Up front as a No.9, but not a target man because I'm not the biggest! I loved playing as one of that front three for Maldon & Tiptree, because me, Charlee and Jorome kept switching positions which is very hard to

defend against. We'd come inside, or move out side, or go through the middle. We scored over 90 goals between us last season and there were still a dozen games to play!

"But I think I'm also effective playing in a two with a bigger target man".

Was your goal in the FA Cup win at Orient last November the best you've ever scored? "Maybe not the best, but in terms of what it meant to the club and the fans, and the fact that they were four levels higher than us in the football pyramid. It was a great day for everyone and I'll never forget it".


Who has had the biggest influence on your career? "Definitely my dad Wayne" said Danny. "From the moment I was scouted playing for the District team in Dartford at the age of 13, right through the five years I spent at Brentford, it was Dad who drove me to every session in West London - a 120-mile trip every time up from Kent. He is amazing".

So is your dad sporty too? "Well he was a decent local footballer and cricketer, while my grandad was a boxer in east London back in the day - the Docklands champion no less".

A bareknuckle fighter? "I don't know but I wouldn't be surprised. They were hard back then!"

Your name and age? Peter Goldsmith, 47 Whereabouts do you live? Live in Beaconsfield now

Have you always lived in that area? No, I was born in Watford and then lived in Pinner from aged three until my mid-20s. Moved around a bit since then including Kent......

Where do you work? I jointly run a small sports marketing agency called M2 Sports, primarly focussed on sports sponsorship sales, acquisition and activation.

When was your first Stones game (against whom and any memories)? I think my Dad, Norman, took me when I was four. in the late 70s but I can't remember who it was against. game when we won the league which was brilliant.

Do you follow any other team? I also follow Liverpool so it's been a pretty decent season all round this year! I tend to get to a couple of games a year and really enjoy it - the pace and skill levels of the Premier League are amazing to see live. That said, the feigning injury and what seems like yellow card for every foul isn't so good.

What's the most memorable game you've EVER seen? That's a hard one! Aside of Stones games, England beating Spain in Euro 96 and the penalties with a certain Stuart Pearce scoring one, and the first Liverpool Newcastle 4-3 were outstanding but you can't beat actually being there. WREXHAM AFC

Wrexham Football Club is the oldest club in Wales and third oldest professional football team in the world.

ormed in 1864, the 2014/15 season marked the 150th birthday of the club. Wrexham's home stadium – Y Cae Ras (The Racecourse) – is the world's oldest international stadium that still hosts international games, only long gone venues in both London and Glasgow pre-date it.

Wrexham Football Club was formed by the members of the Wrexham Cricket Club at the end of season dinner in October 1864. The cricketers had wanted a sporting activity for the winter months, and with football becoming more and

more popular the Cricket Club secretary Edward Manners purchased a football, and the newly formed team played its first ever match that same month against the Prince of Wales Volunteer Fire Brigade making Wrexham AFC, one of the oldest teams in the world!

In 1877/78 the FAW inaugurated the Welsh Cup competition, to run on similar lines to the English FA Cup. The first Welsh Cup Final was played between Wrexham and Druids FC on a neutral venue at Acton Park in Wrexham, where Wrexham won 1-0. Thanks to the lack of money at the fledgling FAW, Wrexham did not receive their trophy until the following year.

Wrexham first played league football in 1890 in the Combination League, a competition they played in, apart from two seasons in the Welsh League, until 1905 when they joined the Birmingham & District League.

In 1921, Wrexham were elected to the newly formed Third Division North of the Football League, with their first game being against Hartlepool United at the Racecourse in front of 8,000 spectators.

The club first appeared in their now-familiar red and white shirts for the short-lived 1939/40 season.

Wrexham reached the Fourth Round of the FA Cup in 1956/57 where they played Manchester United's Busby Babes in front of a record attendance of 34,445 people despite a 5-0 defeat. Later that season Wrexham won the Welsh Cup for the first time in 26 years.

Under player/manager Ken Barnes Wrexham won promotion for the first time in their history in 1961/62, the same season that they recorded their record score in a league

match, beating Hartlepool United 10-1 on the Racecourse.

John Neal's arrival as manager saw a considerable improvement in the club's fortunes.

In 1969/70 he led them to promotion and two years later into European football for the first time following another Welsh Cup victory. The Robins' first European match was against FC Zurich and resulted in a 3-2 aggregate win for the Welsh club.

In the 1973/74 season, Wrexham made their first appearance in the FA Cup quarter-finals before losing 1-0 to First Division Burnley at Turf Moor. Two years later they also appeared in the quarter finals of the European Cup-Winners' Cup before losing to the eventual winners, Anderlecht, by just one goal over the two legs.

The 1977/78 season was to be arguably the greatest in the club's history, when they reached the quarter-finals of both the FA Cup and the Football League Cup. They also won Welsh Cup and the Third Division Championship to gain promotion to the old Second Division for the first and only time in the club's history.

The 1984-85 season saw Wrexham, under manager Bobby Roberts, beat Portuguese giants FC Porto in the European Cup-Winners' Cup on the away goals before losing out to the crack Italian side AS Roma.

Brian Flynn took over the club in 1989, and would remain as manager until 2001. In January 1992, Wrexham produced arguably their greatest ever piece of giant-killing, when they knocked the previous year's Football League

Champions Arsenal out of the FA Cup with goals from Steve Watkin and Mickey Thomas.

Under Flynn's leadership the 1992/93 season saw Wrexham promoted to League Two, and in 1995 won the Welsh Cup for the very last time in 1995, and in 1997 Wrexham reached the quarter-finals of the FA Cup for only the third time in the club's history.

Following the turn of the Millennium, Wrexham changed their nickname to the Red Dragons as it was felt the club needed to bring out more of its Welshness

However, the club were to face troubled times when in November 2004 they became the first ever club to be docked ten points by the Football League when they plunged into administration following a takeover by two property developers. One bright spot followed when the club won the Football League Trophy by beating Southend United at the Millennium Stadium in Cardiff

The club came of administration in 2006, but both on the field and off the field events did not improve, and the club were relegated from the Football League in 2008 after 87 years as a member club.

In November 2011 the club was taken over by its fans, when the Wrexham Supporters' Trust became the first ever Trust to take over a professional football club as a going concern.

On the field, the club reached the Conference Play-off's on three occasions, the last in 2013 saw the club lose to Newport County at Wembley Stadium, just six weeks after they played at the same venue for the first time, when they beat Grimsby Town in the FA Trophy Final, becoming the first Welsh club to win the trophy.

Wrexham Football Club celebrate its 150th Anniversary in the 2014/15 season with a second FA Trophy final appearance, but this time they lost out on penalties.

Wrexham's Key Honours:

Winning the Welsh Cup a record 23 times (and runners-up 22 on a further occasions)

Upon his return the left-back made his Wolves debut in the League Cup. Having signed a 12-month extension in the summer of 2011, Reckord went out on loan to Scunthorpe United and Coventry City. Following the expiration of his Wolves deal in the summer of 2014, Reckord signed for Ross County. The Stockport-born detender began his career with Manchester City coming through the youth ranks before signing professional terms at the Etihad in 2015. James signed for Wrexham in 2019

Defender Cleworth began his footballing career playing youth football for the likes of Frodsham and Connah's Quay before being recommended to Wrexham at the age of 12.

6. JAY HARRIS - MIDFIELD

7. ELLIOTT DURRELL - MIDFIELD

Elliott Durrell began his career in non-league with the youth set-up at Hednesford Town before heading to AFC Telford United.

He joined the senior set-up with AFC Telford United in 2007 before a loan spell with Rushall Olympic in 2008. Later that year he returned to his former club Hednesford. Durrell spent six years with the Pitmen, with a brief loan spell at Evesham United, In January 2014, Wrexham manager Andy Morrell targeted the Shrewsburyborn midfielder and snapped him up. In the summer of 2015 he departed the Racecourse and signed for Tamworth before returning to non-league's top tier in 2016 signing for Chester FC. After impressive performances for Chester,

After his contract expired in 2019 and with the club in serious financial difficulty, Durrell left Moss Rose and eventually penned a short-deal with York City. Young began his career when he joined Plymouth Argyle as a nine-year-old. He worked his way through the age groups and played reserve team football whilst still a schoolboy. After three years in the first-team Young left Home Park and would go on to join Torquay in the summer of 2014. He spent four years with United before departing to join Wrexham on a 2-year deal.

10. DEVONTE REDMOND - MIDFIELD

Jarvis landed in North Wales on a deal that would take him to 2021 and would make his debut 24 hours after the signing was complete against Woking in the National League.

13. MARK CARRINGTON - MIDFIELD

The versatile midfielder began his career with Crewe Alexandra before earning his first senior deal in 2006 having been with the club since the age of seven. In 2009 Carrington joined MK Dons plying his trade with them for two seasons. His next move came in 2011 as he headed north of Hadrian's wall to join Hamilton Academical. He made a handful of appearances before heading back south and signed on at Bury. He joined the Dragons on non-contract terms in September 2013

14. PAUL RUTHERFORD - MIDFIELD

Rutherford began his career with Liverpool before signing youth forms with the old Chester City in 2003. In 2009 he joined Barrow.

Following four years at Holker Street Rutherford signed for Southport. With the Sandgrounders he made over a century of appearances in the National League before opting to depart in 2016 and join Wrexham.

29. JORDAN DAVIES - MIDFIELD

Coedpoeth native Jordan Davies came through the youth ranks at Wrexham. At the beginning of the 2016/17 campaign, Davies was loaned out to Bangor City in The youngster appeared on the bench for the Dragons before midway through January was snapped up by Premier League outfit Brighton & Hove Albion, making his reserve team debut against Middlesborough at the AMEX. In the summer of 2020 Davies departed the South Coast. Amidst interest from a plethora of clubs and trials in the EFL, he opted to sign for his hometown club on a 2-year deal.

9. JORDAN PONTICELLI - FORWARD

Attack minded Ponticelli began his career with hometown club Coventry City. 19. ADI YUSSUF - FORWARD

Tanzanian international Adi Yussuf began his career with Leicester City in the Foxes development side signing professional terms at the King Power Stadium in 2011. In the summer of 2011 he was snapped up by Burton Albion for two seasons and moved on to Lincoln City in 2013. With the Imps he made just two appearances before fruitful loan spells with Gainsborough Trinity, Harrogate Town and Histon. After a season with Lincoln he moved on to Oxford City before earning a move back to the EFL with Mansfield Town. He was loaned out to Crawley Town in 2016 before leaving Mansfield permanently in January 2017 for Grimsby Town. Following half a season with the Mariners, he came to the National League with Barrow for a season and later Solihull Moors. ONLY HERE FOR THE DAY

Welcome to the Red Dragons' fams ...especially Wrexham born & bred TIM EDWARDS, who knows The Vale rather better than most...

oday's visiting fan is no stranger to The Vale. 41-year-old Tim Edwards covered the Stones for four years between 2006-10 as Sports Editor of the Harrow Observer, but he'd already been a dyed-in-the-wool Wrexham fan for a dozen years.

Where do you live Tim? I live in Summerhill which is just a few miles away from Wrexham town centre, and a 20 minute walk to the football ground.

Have you been there long? Just over seven years but I've lived in the area most of my life.

What was the first Wrexham game you remember? Wrexham vs Maidstone United in the early 90s. All I can recall is the ref, Gurnam Singh, being absolutely atrocious as I stood on that cavernous kop end.

What Inspired you to go along? Once I caught wind of the fact I had a local team that was professional and I had reached an age where curiosity got the better of me...that was it. Plus those massive floodlights lure you in!

Do you follow another team? At club level, no. It's sacrilege. But I follow Wales home and away.



What is your greatest moment following Wrexham? Many will point to that FA Cup win over Arsenal but winning the LDV Van's Trophy in the Millennium Stadium (new Wembley was still being built) in 2005 was special.

Is the fan base big and passionate? Yes on both counts. We've an unbelievable history and our attendances were regularly

five figures in the club's heyday. And despite being in the fifth division for an eternity we still command an average of 4k plus and will draw double that for bigger games.

How many supporters would make the trip to Ruislip in normal conditions? It's a new ground to visit for us and I would expect us to take a minimum of 500 in normal circs.

What do you think you'd do if there are no away fans allowed in? Listen to the live commentary and hope for the points. I'd rather stay safe than stay dead.

What is your club's 'natural' level, do you think? I've often pondered this. I'd see us a a just below mid-table Championship side if there was a natural order. But as I write this we are subject of takeover talks from Hollywood stars Ryan Reynolds (below, watching the live feed of the oepning game at a movie studio)) and Rob McElhenney. It's all a bit surreal but if the takeover happens then anything is possible for Wrexham.

Much will depend on what the initial £2m will be spent on - a proven goalscorer would be

logical. Then it will depend on their long and short term plan. If it happens Wrexham will be the biggest cash-rich club outside of the Premier League. That is a staggering fact in waiting.

Cautious? Yes. Excited? Yes. Going up? Ask me when we play the return leg against you!

Have you come close to promotion back to the EFL in recent years? Yep. Several times. But a combination of playoff bottling and sheer misfortune means we're still here. We once finished 2nd on 98 points....Fleetwood and Jamie Vardy beat us to the title. W*****s.

How terrible was it to be relegated to non-League? Heartbreaking. But it shows no club of any stature is immune to such things.

Is there a stigma attached? To non-league? I don't think so nowadays, especially with so many former league clubs battling it out within it. It's harder to get out of this division than it is to stay in League Two.

What do you know about Wealdstone FC and its history? Lots. I covered the club for a while when I was the Harrow Observer sports editor. Great club, passionate fans and it came

as no surprise that you finally got back to the top level of non league football. Nick Dugard, Paul Rumens, Howard Krais and of course Gordon Bartlett were a joy to work with.

Any famous names you associate with the club? Well, I interviewed Vinnie Jones at the Vale when he did an after dinner speaking event there. He was a bit of a t**t to be honest. I asked him if he still had his Welsh tattoo on his chest and he said "yeah, I can't f*****g rub it off unfortunately". As a proud Welshman that rubbed me up the wrong way but the last thing I wanted was a ruck with a token jetlagged hard nut. He was hopeless for Wales anyway.

Stuart Pearce, Britt Assombalonga and Jermaine Beckford are other names that spring to mind when I think of the Stones.

Do Wrexham have any celebrity or high profile fans? Until the recent Hollywood connection, Robbie Savage, actor Ted Robbins, presenter Tim Vincent, Mark Hughes and a guy you might know called Bootlegger. Him and the Wealdstone Raider are going to

be quite the match up.

Who has been the club's best manager in recent years? Andy Morrell led us so close to the title. We amassed 98 points and somehow didn't go up. And he wasn't a massive snake like Sam Ricketts was (he left us to manage Shrewsbury).


Who are the Red Dragons players to watch out for this afternoon? We've enlisted 10 new players and counting at the time of writing this, and as we've been unable to see them in the flesh it is hard to say! On paper this is the best squad since the 98-points season. Jay Harris is a bastard in midfield and we've managed to get local lad Jordan Davies back with us permanently after his spell with Brighton & Hove Albion. Anthony Jeffrey looks like he has afterburners on the wing too. Crikey, we've got some talent in abundance this season.

And finally.... How important is football to you? It's a rite of passage, a past time and a lifelong love. It's very important but it isn't life or death. Bill Shankly was talking out of his a**e when he said otherwise. Football should enrich your life, not consume it.

Our final season at the top table ...and the visit of Lincoln showed just what we were going to miss out on

Saturday October 17, 1987, GM Vauxhall Conference: Wealdstone 0 Lincoln City 0

he year 1988 wasn't a very clever time to be relegated from the GM Vauxhall Conference.

The previous campaign, 1986-87,

was the landmark first season that the Conference had managed to negotiate automatic promotion and relegation into the Football League and poor Lincoln made history by being the first through the trapdoor, replaced by Conference champions Scarborough. Lincoln had been 7th in the Fourth Division table at the turn of the year, looking to maybe

win promotion through the play-offs but a disastrous run in the New Year saw them relegated.

But they remained full-time under manager Colin Murphy, and this visit to Lower Mead was our first real taste of welcoming one of the 'big' ex-Football League sides to our non-League world.

Of course, 1987-88 was a disaster for the Stones as we were deservedly relegated from the top tier and thus missed out on the procession of well-established pro clubs that were to plummet into the murky waters of the Conference/National League in the

forthcoming years. As supporters, we had been thrilled to face Football League sides like Swansea, Southend, Hereford and Reading in the previous decade - all in front of crowds between 3-5,000 - and the influx of well-supported teams into non-League would have stimulated the dwindling interest in the Stones from the good folk of Harrow. Or would it?

It's a moot point that the demographics of Harrow were changing and perhaps our eventual move to the more footballing environs of Ruislip is the best thing that's happened to our club. But for Covid-19. Grosvenor Vale would be hosting 2.000+ crowds this season now that we are facing the raft of ex-League sides including, of couse, this afternoon's visitors Wrexham

Anyway, back to 1987 and a decent crowd of 1,107 came through the gates to witness a surpris-

ingly competitive display from the Stones under new manager Terry Burton. The former Arsenal coach had replaced the hapless Colin Meldrum a month earlier but he seemed as incapable of bringing in new players.. although if the loan signing of Brentford's towering centre back Terry Evans had been extended, who knows what might have happened? Evans' debut was a goalless draw at Bath a week earlier, and his second and final league appearance was another clean sheet against Lincoln. Evans went on to have a fine career with the Bees, captaining them to

Jennings, a defender in his own stellar non-League career - and who had the contacts at this level that the previous two incumbents hadn't - largely managed to stop the haemorrhaging of goals by signing quality left back Mark Harrison and the defensive shield of Everald la Ronde. But we finished second bottom and we've never been back.. until now!

Underdogs prove bookies wrong

For Borough there can only be delight at a job well done. For 'Stones there must be despair bordering disbelief after a match that was extraordinary by any standards.

Even before the kickoff the egg-throwing that eventually led to both teams being led off the

teams being led off the field for eight minutes by referee Terry Maber had reared its juvenile head. But, although such disorder was to lead to more serious consequences later it.

serious consequences later, it was the least of 'Stones' problems in a first half that could not have gone better for Borough if chairman Peter Rogers had scripted it himself.

Sow

For following a couple of early abortive Wealdstone attacks, the man who had possibly more to play for than anybody else, George Duck, popped up to sow the first seeds of what was to lead to Wealdstone's destruction.

Following Boro's second corner in a minute, David Pearce — like Duck an ex-Stones player — got his head to the ball at the far post and Duck rose unchallenged to pick his spot

with a perfect header that gave Boro a sixth minute lead.

For Duck — who hit 250 goals in a Wealdstone shirt during the 1970's — there can have been few more sweeter moments on a Lower Mead pitch he knows so well.

That early goal set the scene for what was to become the pattern of the match—a seemingly neverending stream of Wealdstone attacks that, partly through misfortune and partly-through some superb Boro cover, was never to provide the end results they so often deserved.

Even though towering Boro centre half Dave Howell did a great job throughout, Stones' fleet-footed striker Alan Cordice still caused enough panic in the visiting defence to send any 'keeper into a physchiatric ward.

But through it all the Borough defence held unswervingly to their task. Whether it was the Cordice brothers weaving their spells down the flanks and around the 18-yard box, or full back Stuart Pearce popping up for the odd flurry at goal, the back four did their job with a winning mixture of single-minded determination and utter desperation.

Nigel Johnson headed wide following Alan Cordice's cross to the far post; Pearce's jinxing run into the box brought the best out of keeper Les Currell at the near post, before the same player's free kick also needed a vital stop.

At the other end Harrow's most talented ball player, Steve Jones, was taking more stick than a hockey ball. It always looked only a question of time before someone was booked for one of the many fouls on the talented Jones, and Robin Wainwright earned that dubious distinction after 26 minutes. Wainwright was

Two minutes later the hill that Wealdstone had to climb turned into a mountain as, following Ray Metz's cross, the towering Howell sent a searing header from 16 yards past startled 'Stones 'keeper Goddard that put Boro two up.

Denied

Still 'Stones came forward, and still they were denied; Paul Waites' ball into the box looked for all the world likely to be turned into a goal by the ever-present Alan Cordice before Cliff Rapley cleared the ball off the line.

Then minutes later it seemed inconceivable that Nigel Johnson's almost lack-adaisical shot when unmarked could fail to end up in the corner — but keeper Currell stuck out a left foot to send the ball round the post.

Stones finally broke through when it seemed that they were going to run out of time as well as patience.

Neil's cross found brother Alan, and after his shot had the sting taken out of it, the ball stuck temptingly in the mud and Currell had no chance with Nigel Johnson's shot.

The score — with a good three minutes overtime on most people's watches was as richly deserved as it was late.

When Tony Doherty felled Alan Cordice thirteen minutes into the second half 'Stones appealed long and loud for a penalty. Referee Maber become the most unpopular man at Lower Mead by awarding a direct free kick on the 18 yard line and Pearce's shot wasn't far wide of the upright.

Perhaps it was only fitting that the man who started the demise of 'Stones should finish the job. As Boro embarked on a breakaway, Steve Jones beat Colin Hardman on the left flank and Duck, faced with a desperately on rushing Goddard, beat the 'keeper and sent an agonising ball just hard enough to meet the empty net.

Tuesday 1 September, 7.30pm, Division 2

Swindon Town 1 (Arthur Horsfield)

Watford 1 (Ron Wigg)

Ref W Gow, Swansea | Att 16,176

Summary: Teams better known for Cup exploits share points in second season after promotion.

Programme highlight: Colour action photo on front cover, a rarity back then.

Programme lowlight: The ad space reserved for British Rail Inter-City. This was Town's third home game and the artwork still hadn't turned up. Maybe it was delayed just outside Reading.

Programme bingo: The Personality Spot page. Big player photo, autograph, bit of Q&A, space filled. Swindon legend John Trollope in this case. 2

Ahead of their time: Back page advertiser Martyn Lynshaw Ltd, supplier of 'spectator seating in high density polyethylene' at a time when few clubs made more than a token offering for the non-vertical spectator and all-seater stadiums were practically science fiction.

Any other business: Swindon, League Cup winners in 1969 as a third division side, were not allowed to enter the Fairs Cup because of their status. They played a consolation prize game against the Italian League Cup winners the following season, won it, then did the same in a larger Anglo-Italian competition in the summer of 1970, and became the first English team to hold two European trophies simultaneously.

Cliche: 'We should be beating teams like them' **Stones:** We lose 0-1 at home to Leytonstone.

Wednesday 2 September, 7.30pm, Division 1

Crystal Palace 1 (Queen) Blackpool 0

Summary: An early relegation four pointer ends in a home win as tempers flare on the pitch.

Ahead of their time: The Women's Page. Ladies' football had been banned after the First World War and even 50 years later the authorities barely gave it house room.

Any other business: The game included a mass punch up, involving among others the home side's combative Scottish striker Gerry Queen. When it made the match report, an unnamed but legendary Guardian sub editor saw his chance, and readers woke up to the headline 'Queen in brawl at Palace'.

Ahead of their time: Classic passive-aggressive eco-warrior stance in the Q&A from scorer Cliff Jackson who cites traffic jams on the way to a game as pet hate despite contributing to them.

Any other business: Torquay eventually binned Friday night games for even more unusual and exotic Saturday evening fixtures. For years they were the only team whose results were announced during Match of the Day.

Any other business: Ivor Broadis was once Carlisle's player-manager, starting in August 1946 at the ripe old age of 23. In 1949 he sold himself to Sunderland for £18,000. It's not clear whether he couldn't deny himself the chance to play at a higher level, or if he simply fell out with himself...

The only football ground in the world with its own WW2 gun turret.. the fascinating story of the Vale's most distinguishing feature

the Sports Ground, Originally part of Sherleys Farm, land was sold off for development in the early 1930s as the Ruislip estate was being developed, and part of this plan maintained the field at the end of what became Grosvenor Vale. This was subsequently sold to the Air Ministry and became the RAF Sports Ground and home to the RAF Apprentices teams.

There was no stadium however, (as shown in the photograph far right, taken just before WWII started), but a centrally located football pitch surrounded by an

track. Much of the local housing athletics was yet to appear. The Ruislip Manor football club at this time incidentally played on the next far down the road, New Pond Farm, in the area where Ruislip Gardens shops now stand - it wasn't until around 1947 that they took over the

Grosvenor Vale ground, on lease from the Air Ministry.

In 1936 as part of a Government move to prepare for war, three major underground depots for Ammunition Storage (10-35,000 tons each) were developed to hold incendiary and standard bombs as a reserve. These

were each supported by Ammunition Parks (local storage across the UK to directly support bomber groups and Satellite sites, of which Ruislip was one of eight).

By the time WWII started, the RAF Apprentices seem to have moved away from the as yet undeveloped site and the field lay dormant until 1940, when following a directive from the Air Ministry and the anticipation of Luftwaffe bombing raids the Light Anti-Aircraft Gun Tower and ancillary building were constructed as defences for the Munitions Store.

It seems that only 81 towers of this type were built and less than ten are believed to exist today, which was part of the reason that 'our' tower gained a Grade II listing in May 2013, meaning it cannot be demolished nor changed in any way. In fact, it needs permission if it is to be repainted.

he tower was designed to raise a 40mm Bofors gun above trees and buildings in order to achieve an all-round field of fire. By late 1940, this design had been superseded by a simpler, steel-framed type. Of equal importance at least is

the remote Magazine building. Built to differing specifications, often in adapted Anderson shelters, few have survived in any condition.

The gun turret comprises two elevated platforms, approximately 5m high, located immediately adjacent to each other, leaving a narrow gap between them at platform level. The Bofors gun would have been mounted on the larger platform and its range predictor (to calculate enemy aircraft speed and height and thus ensure the accuracy of the gun) on the smaller one. Internally, the range predictor platform has two floors and the gun platform just one. An

external concrete staircase along the south-east elevation provides access from the ground floor to the first floor ammunition store in the range predictor tower (the entrance door in the south-west elevation is bricked up) and then up to the roof. At ground level, the range predictor tower has a pillbox-type room with a low ceiling.

The gun platform has a single highceilinged room on the ground floor. This room and that in the extension to the rear of the range predictor platform would have housed the operations room and generator. Between the two platforms is a full-height 'entrance lobby' with an entrance in the south-west elevation.

e cannot say 100% that it ever saw action, but a look at the Bomb Map of the area in WWII (pictured below left) would indicate that it almost certainly was fired in anger and indeed may actually have been the target for a particular bombing raid between October 7th 1940 and 6th June 1942, when a string of High Explosive bombs were dropped directly across the playing fields with no others in close proximity!

Post war, Ruislip Manor FC moved into the site and over a number of years established the football ground in the corner of the site where it remains today, slowly developing a post and rail pitch, then a main stand, dressing rooms and later the clubhouse - the original building being extended a number of times. The stadium certainly looks a lot different today!
