- Carrying items which may be considered a danger to others, including cans, bottles, or glasses containing alcoholic beverages
- · Throwing any article onto the field of play · Climbing floodlight pylons, fences, stands or any structure or building
- · Using obscene or bad language likely to cause offence to others · Hitting the side or back panels of the Bulla stand
- No spectator ball games.
- The consumption of alcoholic drinks is permitted INSIDE the social club bar, garden and boardroom areas.
- 4) Vehicles parked on the Grosvenor Vale site are at the owners' risk.
- 5) Wealdstone Football Club supports the FA's campaign on pyrotechnics (e.g. flares and smoke bombs). ood afternoon and a warm welcome to Darren Sarll's Yeovil Town.

It's been a tough period over the last few games and today will certainly not be any easier. Yeovil have some serious quality in their team. so we need to make sure

we're ready for what's to come and make sure we execute the game plan correctly so we come out of it with credit.

There's no hiding from the couple of heavy defeats we've taken recently, but we need to make sure they don't ever happen again. For anyone who watched the games, we actually started both really well. We should take the lead against Hartlepool and probably should have had another in that first 30mins.

Again, against Maidenhead the game was very even and we moved the ball well in the first half. A costly error from us meant we went in 1-0 down, but we then came out We're missing so 2nd half and should have made it 1-1 many..Liverpool around the 60 minute mark. We're not taking our chances, plus we're concedlose two players ing silly goals - and the lads having to and they look like play every minute of every game, so they won't make physically they're shot to pieces, which is why mistakes creep in.

the Champions Lge We've had players having to play injured, just so we can field a team and not incur fines etc. But I want to make it clear that none of them are giving up, or not giving everything. The best analogy I can use currently is cup football. Lower league teams can compete for large periods of games, but when the first goal goes in against them, their energy reserves become low, and often more goals follow. It can be perceived that they may not being trying late in games, but it's more that they can't quite cover the gaps as efficiently as they could when they had something to hang on to.

We've all been put in an impossible position. and the players are no different. But I maintain that they shouldn't be judged in this period, as they're giving everything in ridiculous

circumstances. They need a rest, but instead they're having to play a silly amount of games with no prospect to freshen the group up. Nobody else would like to be judged in this scenario, so we shouldn't use this period as a stick to beat the

players or anybody else with.

Goals will always change games and it's not surprising that we're finding it

hard to convert, as 90% of our goals from last season have been taken out the side for one reason or another. I'm not sure exactly how many Michee, Ross and Mo got combined last season, but it was a huge chunk of our goals that we've not been able to replace due to the situation we're in.

If you take that amount of goals out of any team, it's going to seriously hurt you. Chuck in the fact we're now missing Harbottle, Langston, Stevens, Meekings and Efete it's not surprising to see the problems we're encountering. Liverpool lose two players and they go from a team that

> won the league last season, to a team that look like they won't even make the Champions League this season. For us to lose all our experience, goals and key players, it becomes incredibly

difficult to combat.

e performed with credit against Aldershot in another tight game. The game changes around 5 mins before half time when

Dennon goes through to score, and is flagged offside.. see the picture below. At no point did anyone in the ground think he was offside, except the linesman. We've seen it back and not only is he onside, he's 2 or 3 yards in his own half!!! Mentally that's tough to take because when you come up short, you can stomach it, but those types of decisions just shouldn't be happening.

Ultimately sometimes these periods are tough to take, but actually make you stronger. If we use this period to unite, we will come out the other side better for it. All the decisions that have been made recently, are so we all have a club to support and get behind next season, so let's stick

# Craig Fasanmade

raig Fasanmade experienced the highs and lows, the joy and despair of National League football in the space of just five extraordinary days last month.

The 21-year-old striker, on loan from Hungerford Town, put the ball in the Barnet net with his first touch on Easter Monday after coming on as a substitute in the 68th minute.... but then was handed a straight red card in the defeat at Boreham Wood the following Saturday.

How did those experiences compare? "Well, I was buzzing after the Barnet game - it was only my 3rd appearance off the bench and to score within a minute was amazing. Not exactly a long-ranger though as Dennon put it on a plate!

"Then the game at Wood... I've watched the incident back a couple of times and I'm still not sure if it's a foul. I caught the defender with my arm but it was a natural movement. It was a 'Football League foul' if you like, with the defender (ex-Stone Tom Champion) making the most of it and referee took the bait a bit. It's something I'll have to learn from because this level is quite a step up from the National

League South - the pace of the game is much quicker so it will be quite a challenge for me to excel in the National League. But I think I'll adapt."

Craig's sheer pace has already drawn comparisons with the Stones' legendary front man Alan Cordice, who was the non-League 'Player of the Year' in 1985... and he was impressed both with the goals that Alan scored and the number of penalties he won for the club during those glory years of the 80s. In the Southern League winning season of 1981-82 he was brought down for 20 spot kicks, all but one converted by skipper Paul Bowgett!

"Well, I hope my speed and trickery will excite everyone at the Stones.. that's what I'm all about really. We haven't practiced sprints in training so far but I can't imagine

anyone's quicker" he said. Let's just hope Dennon's not reading this Craig!

asanmade (pronounced Fah-san-mar-day, by the way) has a Nigerian father, and a mother who is half Scottish and half Ghanian. He was born in North Somerset before the family moved to Oxford - where his football education began with the Reading FC Academy between the ages of 13 and 17.

"After I was released by Reading I took up a scholarship at Oxford City's academy, mixing football with a B-Tech qualification and playing in the

National League. I played against the Stones a couple of times - in the 3-0 win at Oxford three years ago, when City got a couple of late penalties, and then in the 1-0 defeat at Grosvenor Vale when Mich Efete got the late winner last season.

"That was a great atmosphere and great game to play in. The Wealdstone fans are really something! That helped with my decision to sign as I really wanted to play here, and also test myself at the higher level."

Craig joined Hungerford in the summer and was part of an over-achieving Crusaders team, under new manager Danny Robinson, that was standing in 7th place in the NLS table before the season was declared null and void.

"If we'd won the final game before the season was cut short we'd have been in line for making the play-offs through points-per-game. That

would have been amazing for a small club like Hungerford".

So does he think the coaching and preparation here at Grosvenor Vale will make the most of his abilities - as Hungerford so clearly did?

"Well, there's no doubting the football knowledge of Stuart and Matty" he says. "We do a significant amount of work on pattern of play, and I find it really useful to have a set basis for movements. For example, the fifth goal against Barnet was a classic up, back, then in and out passing movement that left Dennon on his own to score".

So have you always been a striker? I asked.

"I started out as a winger but I'd rather play through the middle... my game is all about running the channels, on the shoulders of defenders and hoping for the right delivery. I think I've improved my hold-up play but I love a low through ball behind the defence".

Craig is currently living the student life - having completed his B-Tech at Oxford City, he took

a couple of gap years and is now in his first year of studying Politics and Economics at Bath University. "I love Bath, and I actually like the football ground too! This has given me a chance to study the place (and not just football-wise) and we're back on campus now after three months stuck at home in Oxford."

Now Craig is hoping to have to choose between Hungerford and Wealdstone when his loan deal expires at the end of the season. The travelling might be less, but surely there's no choice?....

"I'm a simple man" he laughed. "I'll go wherever I can get a game of football and yes, hopefully the Stones will want me but I'll honestly be happy playing at either level. I'll leave it up to the people who matter, the managers and coaches"



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# MARTIN ALLEN Fan in the Stand

'I had a spare Saturday in March 1975 when Watford were away at Halifax, and came to Wealdstone v Chelmsford ...it was the best decision that I have ever made'

Your name and age? Martin Allen, aged

Whereabouts do you live? Rushden (as in Rushden and Diamonds) in Northamptonshire

Have you always lived in that area? No - I was brought up in Rickmansworth.

When was your first Stones game? 27th March 1975 - Wealdstone 2 Chelmsford 1. Prior to the match I had never heard of Duck, Watson or Moss but over the next few years they were to become heroes of mine. Funnily enough I have a Watford v Millwall programme from a match I went to as an 11 year old and in my handwriting on the programme I have entered the substitute's name - George Duck, not knowing that years later how much influence that name would have on my life.

Who first brought you along to a game? I came along with a friend. I was a Watford supporter and as I got older I started to go to away matches in the south of the country. I had a friend at school who was always talking about his local team - Wealdstone. He was always suggesting that I went along but it never interested me. Then on this particular day I had a spare Saturday as Watford were playing away at Halifax. For some reason (and I really don't know why) I got on the train from

Rickmansworth to Harrow on the Hill and descended on Lower Mead. It was the best decision I have ever made.

What were your first impressions of the club? I loved every minute of it, being so close to the action, being able to change ends at half time. I really felt that I had influence on the game. In the crowd behind the goal you really thought that you could suck the ball into the back of the net.

What was the first football match you remember ever seeing live? Or on TV? My dad took me and a couple of friends to see Watford play Bournemouth as a birthday present in 1966.

Do you follow any other team? No, just Wealdstone. I have no interest in the professional game

How devotedly? Home and away? Between 1976 and 1985 I only missed 3



games home or away. I didn't go to Italy for the Anglo Italian Cup and I missed a Southern League Cup match against Hillingdon Boro on


Christmas Eve that was organised at such short notice that I only found out about when the result appeared in the Harrow Observer no internet in those days!! I used to drive to away matches in my mini with Toby (Jackson), Phil Jeffreson (PJ) and his dad JJ. I can remember going one full season without a league away win so I must have been committed Currently I haven't missed a match home or away since 2011 excluding a handful of friendlies arranged at the last minute and obviously this season's matches behind closed doors - although I have seen everyone on the stream. I now normally travel with my wife Syl for Saturday matches although she won't venture out for evening ones (except for the Play Off match at Bath City) so I am then on my own. Syl will normally video every goal from behind the goal and the post on Twitter and these often get very complimentary comments from those unable to attend

What's the most memorable game vou've EVER seen? One of the first matches I ever saw on TV was the Brazil v Italy World Cup Final in 1970. What a brilliant eam Brazil were.

And the best Wealdstone game? I am going mention two matches. Firstly the FA Trophy Final against Boston United at Wembley in 1985. Secondly the Ryman League winning match at Margate in 2014. What a fantastic evening that became when Charlie Penney scored the winning goal! There have of course been many other great matches over the years, including those last season away at Havant and Waterlooville and at home to Bath City.

What was your favourite away Wealdstone trip? In the 1980s we played a friendly in Douai. France as part of the celebrations for its twinning with Harrow. After the match we all went to the civic reception organised in the town hall

a train for the North East. After the match I got the overnight train back into Watford Juncto work. The small but hardy band of supporter who made the trip even got a mention in



Secondly I work for the Royal Mail in the local sorting office. I therefore can chose my days of work and always make myself unavailable on days Wealdstone are playing. This does need a bit of forward planning. For example if we have a cup match on a Saturday I have to also make myself unavailable on the following Tuesday in case there is a replay that I need to attend

Have you played football yourself?

played for the supporters Sunday League football team. SFC Wealdstone in the 1980s. On the Wednesday before the FA Trophy semi final against Enfield in 1985 Wealdstone had a Capital League match at Dagenham (programme is reproduced on the left) and Brian Hall didn't want to risk injury to any first team players. As such, eight members of the SFC side were asked to represent Wealdstone in the match. At 0-2 down at half time the manager felt that we needed a bit more 'steel' in

midfield and so I was brought on to replace Lee Holmes - ves the same Lee Holmes who scored the winning goal for Wealdstone at Wembley a few weeks later!!! We eventually lost 2-3 to a very strong Dagenham first team. I seem to remember that it was a double substitution at half time but I can't for the life of me remember who the other substitute was .....

Coventry Sphinx, Bedford, Lincoln United, Langford, Aylestone Park, Raunds Town, Downham Town, Sleaford Town, Ampthill Town, Melton Town, Wisbech St Mary, AFC Rushden and Diamonds and finally the last match I have seen at Colnev Heath plus of course Bedford Town and Northwood.

I would like to say being a mid table team in the National League. # **YEOVIL TOWN**

# Welcome to our Visitors The Glovers

ounded in 1895, the club initially joined the Somerset Senior League and competed in a multitude of leagues up until the outbreak of World War II. During this time they won titles in the Southern League, Western League, Bristol Charity League, Dorset District League and Somerset Senior League.

The Glovers (named due to the long history of glove making in the town) played in the Southern League after the war ended, winning the championship in 1954-55, 1963-64 and 1970-71, before becoming members of the Alliance Premier League from 1979 to 1985. They spent the next three years in the Isthmian League, and were elevated into the Conference after finishing as champions in 1987-88. Relegated in 1995, they were promoted again two years later after winning another Isthmian League title. Yeovil won the 2002 FA Trophy Final and secured a place in the Football League after winning the Conference in 2002-03 under the stewardship of Gary Johnson. They then won the League Two title in 2004-05, before reaching the Championship with victory in the 2013 League One play-off final in Johnson's second spell as manager. However they suffered consecutive relegations, and were relegated once more following the 2018-19 season, ending their 16-season spell in the Football League.

Yeovil are one of the most successful non-league teams in the FA Cup, having defeated major Football League teams, most famously Sunderland in the fourth round in 1949, before going on to play in front of more than 81,000 spectators away at Manchester United in the next round. For some years, as the only Football League side in Somerset, they had few local rivals since Dorset-based side Weymouth declined as Yeovil climbed the divisions in the 1990s and 2000s.

It was in 1990 the club moved into their current



home 'Huish Park', with a capacity of 9,565. Much of the club's success has been in this stadium and is also home to the clubs Ladies team.

# 1. ADAM SMITH - GOALKEEPER

After a short stint on loan during 19/20, Smith signed for the Glovers on an extended loan deal until the end of the season.

### 13. MAX EVANS - GOALKEEPER

Young goalkeeper Max Evans is yet to make his first start for Town, but has previously enioyed a successful loan spell at Frome Town.

### 3. CARL DICKINSON - DEFENDER

The former Stoke City graduate joined Yeovil from National League rivals Notts County. Having represented Stoke in the topflight, Dickinson has also had spells with Leeds, Barnsley and Portsmouth on loan before joining Watford for a fee of £250,000 in 2011.

# 14. MICHAEL KELLY - DEFENCE

Born in Scotland, Kelly played for Aberdeen's academy before moving south of the border to represent Leicester City, but later departed the Foxes in 2016. A short spell back in Scotland followed as Kelly represented Hurlford United. After a successful trial period, Kelly signed for Bristol Rovers in 2017, and has made 46 appearances in all competitions for the Gas.

# 4. LEE COLLINS (C) - DEFENCE

Captain Collins joined the Glovers from Forest Green Rovers after guiding them to the League Two play-offs. He has made over 350 appearances in the Football League and now enters his second season in the National League with Town.

### 6. LUKE WILKINSON - DEFENCE

Darren Sarll's first signing having been together at Stevenage. He has featured for clubs such as Luton, Portsmouth and Northampton. Wilkinson featured in the National League's team of the season in 19/20.

# 32. JOSH STAUNTON - DEFENCE

After playing every minute for Halifax in their 19/20 campaign, Staunton ventured south to sign on in Somerset for Sarll's Glovers this Summer.

# 26. MAX HUNT - DEFENCE

After a successful short spell on loan, the towering central defender signed until the end

### 22. EMMANUEL SONUPE - MIDFIELD

A Tottenham Hotspur academy graduate, Sonupe never appeared for the Lilywhite's first team, and moved onto Northampton Town in 2016 following a brief loan spell north of the border at St.Mirren. First team football was hard to come by at the Sixfields Stadium so an initial loan move to Kidderminster Harriers became permanent, with the former England youth international netting 15 times in his first full season with the club.

### 11. MATTY WARBURTON - MIDFIELD

Experienced at non-league level, Warburton joined the Glovers on loan from Northampton in September, providing a new attacking spark for the Glovers.

### 9. RHYS MURPHY - FORWARD

The 28-year-old scored 28 goals in a superb last campaign at Chelmsford City in the National League South. He started out at Arsenal and spent time on loan at Brentford and Preston. Before a season overseas in Holland with Telstar. He returned to England to play for Oldham, Crawley where he scored 9 goals in 15 appearances, AFC Wimbledon winning promotion to League One and Forest Green. All before spells at York, Torquay and Gillingham, until joining Chelmsford where he starred for the Essex club.

### 19. JOE QUIGLEY - FORWARD

Joe Quigley signed for Yeovil just moments before making his debut against FC Halifax Town in October 2020. The 23-year old began his career in the Bournemouth academy, but after a number of loan spells across seven different clubs, Quigley decided to settle within the National League on a permanent basis signing for Maidstone United in 2018/19.

# 33. REUBEN REID - FORWARD

Spending the majority of his career in the South West, the 32-year-old forward has enjoyed stints at Plymouth, Forest Green Rovers, Torquay United, Exeter and most recently Cheltenham Town. Reid was part of the 12/13 League One play-off winning squad, netting six times in all competitions that season before a loan spell to Plymouth.

# 34. CHRIS DAGNALL - FORWARD

A familiar face to Yeovil fans, the forward joined the Glovers last October, making his debut against Woking in a 3-1 win at Huish Park.

The 34-yard old netted his first two goals in Green and White against Haringey Borough in the FA Cup, and also found the net against Torquay United and Welling United during his first spell in green and white.

### MANAGER - DARREN SARLL

The 36-year-old joined Yeovil in June 2019 and has the task of trying to get the Glovers promoted at the first attempt. He has had a 15-year coaching career where he has been at Brentford, Rotherham and Stevenage.

He had a 2-year spell as Stevenage first team manager, guiding the club to a 10th place finish in 2016/17 and producing talent such as Ben Willmott and Ben Kennedy. The former earning the club a seven-figure fee when he joined Watford. Watford is where Sarll has been most recently with his role as Head of Academy. In his first season in Yeovil, Sarll guided Town to fourth place, earning a play-off place, however the Glovers fell short against Barnet.

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# REWIND: ON THIS DAY BY TIM PARKS

Thirty years ago, the Final Day at our beloved Lower Mead. And how it could all have been so very different

Saturday April 27 1991, Beazer Homes Southern League Premier Division: Wealdstone 1 Cambridge City 1

Well, maybe not exactly 30 years to the day, but this weekend three decades ago was one that grown men (and women) still regard as one of the saddest days of their lives. The day that Wealdstone FC played its last competitive match at its iconic Lower Mead home. This mid-table draw with Cambridge.

The occasion was was immortalised in a booklet at the time - The Final Day - and more recently in a book collated by Roger Slater to commemorate what would have been the old stadium's 100th birthday this summer.

Older Stones fans grew up in that place. The close proximity to the pitch and the ribald crowd made for an atmosphere unrivalled anywhere at that level. As Kerry Miller's excellent book published in the mid-1990s, *The History of Non League Football Grounds* put it: "Lower Mead was not one of the pretiest of football grounds, shoe-horned into a space behind a cinema and a row of shops, but it had character and atmosphere by the bucket load".


On midweek nights particularly, even with only about 1,000 in the ground, the sound reverberated from the Elmslie End to the Cinema End. It was literally spine-tingling.

I saw my first game as á 12-year-old in 1969 and couldn't wait to go back

and couldn't wait to go barmy family were Chelsea
and Watford fans but
watching matches there
was a detached experience. Maybe it was the
greyhound track around
Stamford Bridge or
Vicarage Road. Maybe it
iust wasn't as vociferous.

Whatever the reason, my heart was lost to Wealdstone and, to my utter joy, I managed to engineer a career in journalism that pretty soon had me watching the Stones for a living for the





My brother's plans, drawn up in 1980 and Lower Mead (below left) photographed from the air around the same time

Harrow Observer.

For years, the club had sought ways to maximise its Lower Mead site - holding the valuable freehold - but for one reason or another every grand idea had gone up in a puff of smoke.

Meantime, my brother Guy was in the middle of his training as an architect and decided to choose the *Redevelopment of Wealdstone FC* as his main project, producing plans to fit in with any sightline objections etc... and the scale model is shown (above). It was all very feasible, with a bank of squash courts, flats and office space behind the main grandstand providing a

handsome income. The pitch would be turned around 90 degrees with the main structure and concourse standing on the area where the shops and Cinema End stand previously stood. Trees would be planted to hide the terraces and keep the stadium in a low profile.

The chairman,

David Morritt, proudly showed the scale model off to all and sundry but he kept quite about the fact that the shops and area next to the Dominion Cinema was NOT part of the cliub's property. And so sadly this scheme, like all the others in the previous 20 years, was doomed to failure.

Of course, with a site worth (conservatively) £12m at the time of the sale to Tesco's in 1991 you may wonder why Wealdstone FC ended up close to oblivion just a few years later. Maladministration, greed, incompetence are three words - plus financial insanity - that saw the Stones entering into a hastily-arranged groundshare agreement with Watford that summer. Add 'vanity project' to the mix as new chairman Alan Clifton played the role of strutting club 'owner' to the max.

It wasn't his fault that Harrow Council failed to identify ANY site within its borders to the desperate club. But it was his fault that he signed the ground away to Tesco's without first establishing an independent new home for the Stones. Yes, were were £1m in debt, but with an asset worth at least 12 or 15 times that it shouldn't have been too hard to find an alternative strategy.

Grosvenor Vale has been a marvellous home. It has real problems with access, and of course a short lease that prevents the club from fully developing the site, but it's a million times better than Vicarage Road.

The article I penned for the programme on the Final Day at Lower Mead (partly reproduced below) is cringingly hopeful for our ground share at The Vic. If only I'd known then that we would be throwing away some £3m on a two-year stay.

And opt course, there have been some ground and a Solarity and a greed to that one) that set us up for the Sola title; Duck's trio and a 25-yarder from Willie Watson against Telford in '76; Eddie presland's renomous freekicks against Barnet in '73; Danny Bailey against Alvechurch a couple of years ago; you could go on and on. Yes, we've had our money's worth from Lower Mead. Not bad entertainment for 21,650 over 69 years.

In my youth I spent long summers working on the ground along with others, repainting, resurfacing and weeding. I love this place but we've become blind to its imperfections over the years.

Incredulous, I've heard visiting supporters criticising Lower Mead as being: "a slopey pitch poked in behind a Cinema" and last year the News of the World, in a feature on our former player Stuart Pearce, described the ground as a "corrugated iron arena". I was horrified. Then I looked at Lower Mead, for once, with a critical eye and saw that it was true.

Perhaps this move will be our salvation for you can't stand still in football. This club has really been marvellously progressive over the years, embracing pro football when all around were umming and aching and then leaping headlong into the Alliance Premier League when to be honest we had no right to be there. The one time Wealdstone tried to tread water was after the 1985 'double' year ... and that was when the financial troubles started that have led to today's sad, sad final game at Lower Mead.

So let's make the best of it. Like a house, a football ground is only earth and mortar; it's the people inside who make it a home. Vicarage Road can spawn some great Wealdstone memories for the future, when folk will look back and say: Yes, I remember Lower Mead. But you can still get Wrigley's Spearmint Gum at Vicarage Road and the programme smells the same.

# The Stones and the Glovers are back in combat after 35 years.. and a host of earlier memories

ust imagine for a moment that you'd fallen into a coma 35 years ago - perhaps celebrating too enthusiastically and inebriatedly Wealdstone's famous capture of the non-League 'double'.

And then woken up this week.

You might flick through the newspaper (or even online if that's a concept quickly learned) to find out how the Stones were doing.

Ah, still in the Conference. Not doing brilliantly, but then take a look at some of the other clubs in that division! Notts County! Wrexham! Chesterfield! Hartlepool! Stockport! Torquay! Halifax!

Who's still in there from the mid-80s? Only Dagenham, Altrincham, Barnet and Yeovil. Ah Yeovil. They must have come back up again.

The truth, of course, is that Yeovil Town, opponents this season for the first time in 35 years, are a far different animal from the club we met pretty much every season from

the mid-70s to the mid-80s.

When Stones won the Gola League (Conference) famously in 1985, Yeovil were relegated that same season This was a real shock to the system for the club who were just a couple of votes away from being voted onto the Football


League in 1976, and (like the Stones) had joined the Alliance Premier League in 1979 in the hope that one day, promotion to the League would be automatic.

ur paths diverged. Our coma patient would be horrified to know that, just as the Stones were dropping from the Conference to the Southern League and thence to the bottom of the Isthmian League within the space of ten years, Yeovil were financing a new out-of-town stadium (Hiush Park) to replace their charming but dilapidated Huish stadium, and on their way not only into the Football League but all the way to the Championship by 2013.

Since then, of course, they have fallen from grace. Relegated three times, and now in their second season as members of the National League.

At one time there were six divisions separating our clubs. But the next few pages show what wonderful (and horrible) ups and downs there are in football

The fact it fell on a Wednesday night didn't seem to bother the regular 250 who followed the Stones away those days - not dissimilar to the numbers 47 years later, though in the 70s the majority piled onto the Supporters Club's 'Yellow Peril' coaches. clutching their green tickets lovingly written out by travel secretary Barbara

For me, it was a schoolnight and I was thus unable to travel. But how I wanted to be there! Four days earlier our beloved Stones had shocked the '72-73 champions Kettering Town by winning 3-2 on their own Rockingham Road ground in front of a 2,233 crowd.... and there was fervent belief that this side boasting the mercurial George Duck, Johnny Henderson and the effervescent Evans twins could repeat the dose to the highly-fancied Yeovil. How disappointed was I to read next morning the Yeovil 4 Wealdstone 1 scoreline in the Daily Express classified results small print. In those days there was always a chance that the smudged scorelines were wrong, and it wasn't until two days later that the Harrow Observer carried confirmation in its abbreviated report shown on the previous page. Although going by that report, and the glowing one in the next home programme it was clear that Eddie Presland's side had let nobody down in front of another 2,000 crowd.

Only a few weeks later we took on the highly-fancied Glovers in the return game at Lower Mead and as you can see from the big report (previous page) we were undone by the sheer professionalism of the Somerset side. It mentions the Yeovil offside trap and even now I still recall our heavy-legged centre back Eric Burgess somehow breaking clear on the halfway line as the trap suddenly capitulated. The veteran Eric had a 15-yard start on the defenders yet he seemed to be running in custard as they caught up and gently dispossessed him 20 yards from goal!

It was going to be a season of adjustment for the Stones vet, after a string of wins and draws in the New Year in front of crowds averaging close to 1,500, took us up to 4th place we eventually finished eighth.. but what a memorable season.

Programme lowlight: The cover gives more prominence to the following home game, against Plymouth (which actually was a 3.15pm kick off) than this one.

**Programme bingo:** The 'Out of Focus' column asking for more attention for smaller clubs from national newspapers.

Ahead of their time: Bury's 'Cemetery End Choir' who noticed in a previous programme that the club were short of a match ball sponsor for the final game and fronted up there and then. A protosocial media operation if ever there was one.

Any other business: Bury's social club, situated at the ground, closed at 3pm, hence the 3.15 kick off. They were the last league club to move to a 3:00pm start, holding out until well into the 1980s and only relenting because they were threatened with expulsion from the pools coupon.

What about the Stones: Something of a 2021 vibe to the scoreline as we lose away 3-6 to Slough Town in the Premier Midweek Floodlight League.

Wednesday 7 April, 7.30pm, Division 2

**Summary:** A fortnight on from one of the biggest games in their history, Cardiff shade this 'after the Lord Mayor's show' affair to keep their promotion push moving.

Programme highlight: The colour action cover photo was one of only two (Swindon was the other) in the league at that time.

**Programme lowlight:** Not mentioning the club's run to the last eight of the Cup Winners' Cup on the stats page, which included a home win over Real Madrid before bowing out on aggregate.

Programme bingo: A page about Roger Hunt, England World Cup winner of 1966 and now easily the household name of the Bolton squad.

Ahead of their time: The 'Follow the clues and win the money' quiz - if it wasn't answered one week, clues were added until it was. Great format.

Any other business: The advert for the forthcoming Wales v Scotland Home International, taking place at Ninian Park on 15 May. Best seats in the house £2, pay on the day standing 35p. Tell that to the young people today...

Programme bingo: Space to write in the goalscorers under the team line ups. Though it has to be said that allowing six for each side was a touch optimistic.

Ahead of their time: City chairman Harry Dolman, realising that the club needed to explore non-matchday routes to boosting revenue, had invested in a new stand with room underneath for bowling greens. The Football League Review, given away with the programme, thought it worth a two-page feature.

Any other business: Manager Alan Dicks was the brains behind 'All in the Game', a mid-1970s TV show that was a cross between 'The Big Match'

Programme highlight: The mention of Aldershot keeper Mike Dixon, who doubled as a match official for local Sunday league games. With modern day fixture scheduling, it would be impossible.

Programme lowlight: The 'Meet the Visitors' page. Surely it couldn't have been that hard to get the first names of two of the Northampton players.

Programme bingo: A predictable reference to Northampton's plunge from the first division to the fourth in the space of five years.

Ahead of their time: The Torquay chairman, quoted in the programme, who was in favour of four-upfour-down throughout the divisions. We never quite got it, but the introduction of the play offs went a long way towards creating more excitement for more teams at the end of the season.

Any other business: For a team whose entire league history had been spent at third division south or fourth division level, Aldershot enjoyed a modicum of cheer in 1970-71 by drawing Manchester United and Liverpool in the domestic cups. They eventually won their first promotion in 1973, and this version of the towns' club went out of business in 1992.

Huddersfield Town 0

**Summary:** Huddersfield were in the top division for the first time in 14 years, and this was the first fixture the fans looked for. With Town in no danger of relegation, it was their title chasing opponents who had most to lose here. **1** 

Programme highlight: When most programmes gave only basic information on match officials, Town's detailed biography of referee Lyden, down to the fact that Cambridge joining the Foo ball League the previous summer meant he had no longer taken a match at all 92 grounds, was most impressive.

**Programme lowlight:** While Huddersfield's excitement at the upcoming Anglo-Italian Cup was impressive, giving four pages to it was overdoing things. ②

**Programme bingo:** The respectful reference to visiting manager as Mr Don Revie was by no means limited to Huddersfield.

Ahead of their time: The Terriers' Titbits column reporting on new cars for Les Chapman and Frank Worthington was 21st century level trivia.

Any other business: For most clubs, Easter meant three games in five days. Leeds rearranged their Good Friday match against Stoke to a spare November midweek, but still played eight times during April including a two-leg Fairs Cup semi final.

Saturday 17 April, 3pm, Division 1

Leeds United 1 (Allan Clarke)

West Bromwich Albion 2 (Tony Brown, Jeff Astle)

Ref R Tinkler, Boston | Att 36,812

Summary: Leeds face an Albion side with no away win since December 1969, only to lose to a goal so offside it could have been scored in a neighbouring postcode. A frankly scary pitch invasio captured on Match of the Day - makes no difference.

Programme highlight: The item on West Brom's last visit to Elland Road included goal times - a level of detail most national Sunday newspapers didn't bother with.

**Programme lowlight:** Unlike other programmes, which had the Football League Review loose or stapled in the centre, Leeds bound it between two separate sections, making the centre spread impossible to read in one go.

**Programme bingo:** The cover advertisement for the next home game. Leeds weren't the only club to do so, but they were the highest profile example.

Ahead of their time: BBC commentator Barry Davies, whose summary of the offside goal - 'That is a decision, or a non-decision, that will be talked about for years' - has proved correct with the passing decades.

Any other business: Apart from the damage to their 1970-71 title bid, Leeds' punishment for the invasion was to play their first four home games of 1971-72 away from Elland Road, so various Yorkshire grounds hosted the faithful. Leeds dropped two points in those games, the same as in their 17 proper home fixtures, and missed out on the title by a point to Derby.



Monday 19 April, 7.30pm, Division 4

#### York City 0 Oldham Athletic 1 (Maurice Whittle)

Ref R Tinkler, Boston\* | Att 14,120

(\*As per programme, if it's correct and Mr Tinkler did take charge it means he was mentally strong enough to survive the Siege of Elland Road and referee a vital promotion battle two days later, so fair play to him).

Summary: Fourth-placed Oldham (86 goals and counting) visit York (76) in third. Ironically, a single goal - by a full back - is all they can manage between them. 69

Programme highlight: Quickly turned around match reports from Easter games against Darlington, Hartlepool and Chester.

Programme lowlight: The less quick Football League Review - its cover photo was of the League Cup Final almost two months earlier.

Programme bingo: The call to fans to attend the final home game would have been echoed by cash-conscious clubs throughout the league.

Ahead of their time: The editorial comment that both sides have an excellent chance of promotion' proved true not just for this season but also three years later when York and Oldham went up to the second division together.

Any other business: The attendance. York's seasonal best in the league by nearly 4,000, was also bigger than the crowd to see first division Southampton in the FA Cup fourth round.a twopage feature.

#### Arsenal 1 (Charlie George, pen) Burnley 0

Ref T Dawes, Norwich | Att 47,484

Summary: Leeds' wobble hands the initiative to Arsenal, but first they have to negotiate a banana skin at home to a Burnley side fighting for theirfirst division lives. 6

Programme highlight: The double-page photo spread of the previous week's 3-0 win at Nottingham Forest shows a team with its eyes firmly on the prize. 🕡

Programme lowlight: The pre-match entertainment. I don't know how the average 1970s football fan could contain themselves at the prospect of hearing 'Funiculi Funicula' and a selection from Mary Poppins. 🔞

Programme bingo: The photo of visitors Burnley would be appearing in an away programme for the 19th time this season, and the last before their relegation was mathematically confirmed.

Ahead of their time: Ken Aston's referee's column blazed a trail, in its own small way, for the later media careers of the likes of Mark Halsey and 


Any other business: Charlie George had missed over half the season through injury, but he soon made up for lost time. This was his second winning goal in consecutive home games, to be followed with the FA Cup final decider against Liverpool.

What about the Stones: A 1-1 draw against old enemy Hendon at Clairemont Road. Local derbies against the club, who we'd played every year for generations, were to be lost to professionalism.

Next time: Stockport, Bolton, QPR and Bournemouth






