Chris Attwood, the England Beach Football star, is likely to sign once he's shaken the sand out of his turn-ups. Dave Ryan is away on holiday and misses the first three games (today, Tilbury and Chesham).

David Godfrey is still troubled by the bruised ribs he damaged way back on the ice last winter, and is ruled out today.

wealdstone fc ..the ground regulations

People are only allowed entry to the White Lion ground on matchdays subject to the following rules and regulations. The club reserves the right to eject from the ground any person who is considered to have committed any of the following acts:

- Entering the ground by any means other than through the proper turnstiles and entrances;
- Entering the field of play before, during or after a game without prior authorisation to do so;
- Being drunk, or under the influence of alcohol or drugs;
- Carrying items which may be considering danger to others, including cans, bottles or drinking glasses containing alcoholic beverages;
- Throwing any article onto the field of play;
- Climbing floodlight pylons, fences, stands or any structure or building;
- Using obscene or offensive language (racial or otherwise) likely to cause offence to others;
- Using violence of any nature.

The consumption of alcoholic drinks is only permitted INSIDE the social club bar and board room areas

enfield suspended

OUR great old rivals Enfield seem to be experiencing a few problems preseason — they have been suspended by the Ryman League for their opening two games for "financial and technical irregularities".

According to this week's Enfield Gazette, the club have failed on three counts. Firstly, they owe landlords Boreham Wood £6,000 plus VAT in back rental, and Wood chairman Danny Hunter has written to the League issuing a 30-day notice period for the club to leave. It costs Enfield £15,000 a season to share Meadow Park.

Hunter said: "I'm not interested in playing silly games any more. I want the full amount that is owed.. if Enfield

pay the £15,000 plus VAT then maybe there will be an option for them to stay. Or they can pay £6,000 and go and get a groundshare somewhere else".

somewhere else".

If Enfield share elsewhere it will cost them £1,000 a game as they have not declared a change of residence by the April 1 deadline.

The club also apparently owe the League £1,000 in unpaid fees, while their third failure is to return their application for 2003-04 membership without a signature from the club's Company Secretary.

Company Secretary.
Enfield, are, however, confident that their problems will be ironed out long before they visit the White Lion on September 9.

Injuries and unavailability have had a major bearing on selection and we've had a real problem in getting some cohesion with our team selections. It's been rather frustrating and a good example of this was the game at Whyteleaf recently where 20 senior players were unavailable for one

reason or another.

late points in the meantime. It's important to get off to a good start but Uxbridge proved last season that you can start badly and come with a late run - especially in a tight league which I believe will be the case this season.

ON THIS DAY SIX YEARS AGO ...

Aug 16, 1997: Wivenhoe 2 Wealdstone 1, Ryman League Division Two AN INAUSPICIOUS start to life in Ryman

AN INAUSPICIOUS start to life in Ryman Div 2 for the Stones, who had just been promoted on the back of that fabulous 3-1 win at Northwood three months before.

Paul McKay's cracking 22-yarder opener was not enough to stave off this first-day defeat in deepest Essex, the Stones imploding by giving away two penalties in crazy circumstances. On the half hour, with the visitors 1-0 up and cruising, Stuart Atkins needlessly handled a deep cross.

Then, shortly into the second half, Fergus Moore completely missed a hopeful Wivenhoe punt forward and Roy Marshall seemed to have come to the rescue as he hoofed his interception towards the car park. But! An eagle-eyed linesman had spotted the ball brushing Marshall's hand in mid-clearance and again the ref gleefully pointed to the spot.

We were behind and, despite the lively Mario Celaire coming on as sub and going close, it all ended a bit pear-shaped.

Never mind, the season turned out pretty well in the end as Stones took third place in the league and were promoted behind Bedford and and Braintree into Division One... where we've been ever since.

SEVENTEEN YEARS AGO...

Aug 16, 1986: Wealdstone 0 Stafford Rangers 3, Vauxhall Conference

AFTER falling away badly the previous season, defending our Conference title and finishing 10th, Stones looked good for another assault on the championship... until the final warm-up game.

Brian Greenaway, Bob Iles, Doug McClure, Derek Doyle, Dennis Byatt and Paul Bowgett were all injured in a friendly at Wycombe and not all had recovered as Stafford recorded this surprise opening day win at Lower Mead. Stones were on top for most of the game but, despite the prolific Mark Graves

and Neil Cordice coming desperately close, could not score. Rangers grabbed their few opportunities and Stones were suddenly plunged into six games without a win (3 draws, 3 defeats) until a 1-0 success at Cheltenham on September 6.

The season tailed off after the near giantkilling of Swansea City (1-1 at Lower Mead, 1-4 finally in the replay) and Stones just escaped relegation by finishing 19th. The next season we weren't so lucky

TWENTY-THREE YEARS AGO ...

Aug 16, 1980: Wealdstone 4 Telford United 0, Alliance Premier League

HOW the Stones have teased us through the years! Season 80-81 was classic Wealdstone.. this opening day hammering of Telford at sunlit Lower Mead had us all believing that, at last, our club were ready to mix it with the big boys of the Alliance.

Tommy Baldwin, the ex-Chelsea star, strutted his stuff, setting up goals for Nigel Johnson, Alan Cordice, Clevere Forde and even having a hand in the penalty that skipper Paul Bowgett converted. But it was another false dawn.

Baldwin played just three games, the Stones had a dreadful mid-season and despite rallying in April with three successive wins (including a Stuart Pearceinspired 1-0 victory at Champions-elect Kettering) we somehow managed to get ourselves relegated thanks to the famous last-day defeat by AP Leamington.

Yet, of course, Stones bounced back for

League and Cup – on offer in
that league.

In 1884, after a decade of domination at Middlesex level, the club won senior status by joining the Spartan League. Promotion to the Premier Division was achieved in their first season and in 1987 Yeading secured the League and Cup double in a record unbeaten league season. Election to the Vauxhall Opel League (Division Two South) followed and, in their inaugural season they shocked the football world (well, me anyway) by knocking the Stones out of the Middlesex Senior Cup, 3-1 in a replay after a 1-1 draw at Lower Mead.

By then, of course, their managerial team was Gordon
Bartlett and Leo Morris. The pair had led Southall to
Wembley in the FA Vase in 1986 (the young Les Ferdinand starring in a 3-0 defeat by Halesowen) but in 1989-90
Gordon steered Yeading to victory in the Vase (the first Middlesex club to win that trophy), beating Bridlington Town in a replay at Leeds' Elland Road after a 0-0 draw at

Wembley.
A magnificent season was rounded off by winning the Vauxhall Opel League Division Two (South) title.

Third place in Division One in season 90/91 was followed the next by the Ding becoming the first Middlesex Club to win all four County Cups at Junior and Senior level by securing the Middlesex Senior Cup with a 2-1 win against Wembley. And after reaching the Premier Division of the Diadora League Yeading got a biut of national glory by reaching the First Round Proper of the FA Cup for the first time. Division Three side Gillingham were held to a 0-0 draw in the game played at Hayes, but in the replay overcame the Ding 3-1.

Match of the Day

The 94/95 campaign — Gordon and Leo's last at Beaconsfield Road — saw an unbeaten 16 match run, including the scalp of Conference side Telford United in the FA Cup. That win took the club into the First Round Proper for the second successive season. This time Colchester United managed by George Burley were the visitors. Millions tuned in to Match of the Day and saw

Yeading hold the Essex side 2-2... but in the replay reality hit hard and the Ding exited 7-1! Former player Steve Cordery took over the management reins and led the Ding to a fifth place finish in the ICIS Premier Division in 1997, but 12 monthsd later theywere relegeted Over the next few seasons manager's Jim Melvin, Jon Turner

and Paul Sweales came and went struggling to get cohesive teams together. A new management team of Naseem Bashir and former Ding favourite, Johnson 'Drax' Hippolyte arrived in March 2001 with relegation from Division One looming. With management experience from Chesham United Reserve side the jointmanagers made some quick moves before transfer deadline and saw the Ding finish with a mid-table finish with just two defeats in twelve games to top of the league form table.

Bashir then left to become Assistant Academy Director at Reading FC leaving Drax in sole charge of first team affairs – but now assisted by coach Erskine Smart, Jason Tucker and

Dereck Brown.

A great pre-season last year was then, however, followed by the Ding losing their opening three games. A rally just before Christmas saw them in contention for promotion but a poor February and March saw League hopes fade. Silverware was still in sight however and reaching the Bryco Cup Final against Canvey Island, Yeading were huge underdogs but showed their strength and ability by deservedly winning 2-0 to lift

the cup. Away from serious matters, the club's Warren ground has also achieved national fame as the backdrop for a number of tv commercials and feature films notably Bend It Like Beckham (starring Keira Knightley and Yeading's own Commercial Manager Bill Perryman) and The Mean Machine (starring Ding defender Nevin Saroya alongside Vinnie Jones).

And, of course, Yeading FC was the venue as our jubilant supporters (SFC Wealdstone Reserves) lifted the Middlesex Sunday Junior Cup on that glorious May morning in 2002.



new season, a time for optimism and a renewal of the hope that every football supporter feels as August dawns. No matter what has happened during pre-season this is when it matters and when all the conjecture turns to reality.

Of course it might have been a sweltering summer with recent memories of South African captains dominating the England bowling or a glimpse of David Beckham's latest Far East promotional tour (what is he promoting again?). But here at Wealdstone FC we might be forgiven for thinking it would be nice if there was time to appreciate what is going on elsewhere.



Most supporters will know by now that not only did work start on the Prince Edward site in May but that progress has been dramatic. Howard's column elsewhere in this programme

covers this in much more detail.

The development has been a long time in coming and we are where we are with Prince Edward thanks to the hard work of so many people over such a long period. Whatever happens on the field this season, I'm sure many of us will have more than 'half an eye' on what happens just a couple of

miles down the road.

Two events in particular I think are worthy of note. The 'Turf Cutting' ceremony that we held in June was a major success with representatives of the funding bodies, the Council and our other partners all in attendance. This investment in time, talking to the right people does us no harm. This was evidenced by the smooth passage of our outstanding full planning application at the end of July and also some of the reported comments from members of the planning committee. These included one councillor saying how much he looked forward to Wealdstone playing Manchester United in the FA Cup at Prince Edward. This type of support is so important and we shouldn't underestimate it.

We must all remember that while much of the attention paid to the Prince Edward development will undoubtedly focus on the football club, it is the Prince Edward Playing Field Trust that will actually manage the site. This body contains representatives from other partners such as the Middlesex FA and the Harrow Sports Council and is there to ensure the whole development reaches its potential of bringing high class sporting facilities to the borough. I know that Howard is planning to write a monthly update in the programme but do ask any of us about progress at anytime or else take the short journey up to Camrose Avenue to see it for yourself — it is worth it!

So what sort of team will we have playing in the

new stadium, all being well just 12 months for now – and what division will we be playing in?

Our ambition remains to play at the highest level possible. We have been keeping a close eye on the changes planned for non league football and it seems we need to finish no lower than 7th to move into the Ryman Premier League (or equivalent). Yet this will only keep us at the same level as we are now... two leagues below the Conference.

This is our target.

However, I also need to be clear that we are not going to simply 'chase the dream' and throw money at achieving success. We cannot do that, even if we wanted to – the money simply isn't there. This board will remain prudent financially and whatever we achieve it will be on the basis of what we believe to be an affordable budget matching our long term health with our on-pitch aspirations.

We have actually been able to slightly increase the playing budget from last season and we believe Gordon and Leo have the tools to be successful. We will continue to try to generate extra revenue that can be put straight into the playing budget – although as we've said before any additional financial support will be gratefully received. We are delighted that Gordon has agreed to

We are delighted that Gordon has agreed to sign a contract with us for the next three seasons. Gordon and Leo have shown Wealdstone tremendous loyalty and deserve to see the benefits of that loyalty over the coming months. Gordon is an integral part of our football development plan and sits on the board of the Prince Edward Trust, and I know he is as excited as we are at the progress of the site.

One of planks of our future that is very much in

new stadium update

rogress at Prince Edward Playing Fields since May has been rapid. Having initially established the site compound and access, the contractors quickly cut and filled the car park

to formation level. Soil has been stripped throughout the whole of the 14-acre site, and this work has included removing all remaining hard standing formations including old tennis courts, rubble and concrete. These have all been broken down for reuse. The soil has been moved around the site in preparation for laying the new pitches. In all 103,000 sq m of top soil has been moved. It is estimated that the by the end of the project we

will move material equating to approximately 50,000 tons.

On 19 June we held the 'turf cutting' ceremony, which was widely reported in national and local press. We were delighted with the turnout, particularly from key partners such as the Mayor, the Leader of Harrow Council and representatives from our funding bodies. Subsequent discussions have also taken place both with the Football Foundation and the New Opportunities Fund about using Prince Edward as a 'flagship' example of their work. We are also planning to hold a 'topping out' ceremony in the near future

- more details of this will be forthcoming shortly. At the end of July final planning permission was granted by the Council to enable the heavy works, such as the completion of the spine and access road and build of the main stadium.

Tolent Construction, our engineering contractors, officially went on site last Monday August 11.

The first 5-7 weeks for Tolent will be focused on putting the foundations in for the stadium which is expected to take a clear shape by October.

The main stadium pitch is also beginning to take shape with the first level of 'make-up' already in place, with the Astroturf and some of the outside pitches already taking a noticeable shape. Attention over the next few weeks is focused on the access from the Camrose Avenue entrance, drainage and continuing to fill the pitches.

The pace of change at the site is truly incredible. There is a different scene every time one revisits and the photos on the various web sites do not do it justice. Supporters should take any opportunity to go and see the progress for themselves. Anyone with any questions about what is going on at Prince Edward can speak to any other board member at any time.



ALDERSHOT 1974....my first experience of Wealdstone in the big time! Having started watching the Stones in 1969, our trip to Aldershot in the FA Cup 1st Round should have been memorable for different reasons. Naivety ruled in those days, so a 13-year-old sporting four Stones scarves - including 3 of the blue turned purple silk variety - was a fairly obvious target for Aldershot's unofficial souvenir hunters. I was not alone, and truth be known I was pretty scared most of the afternoon, retiring to the coach well before the end of the game. The coach — which cost £1 return or 80p for us juniors - was fairly well populated by 4.30 that day (in

those days, games finished at 4.40). We were that naïve, it now seems so illogical to have thought that a coach driver could protect us from the local youth, but as it happened, we didn't get bricked that day. Worse perhaps was that somehow all the responsible adults of the day involved in organising our coaches failed to stop the younger generation from drinking so much alcohol. Unfortunately, a rather young Peter Worby (now chief turnstile operator) could not contain himself on the journey home (well, Aldershot is such a long distance from Harrow). His attempt at relieving himself into a bottle or can was mostly unsuccessful, and so fellow passengers (I was in front) were treated to rivers of urine flowing freely up and down as the coach stopped and started.

In those days, supporter Tony Platt helped clean out Venture coaches too, and used to collect loose coins that may have

Punishment, then the perpetrators of the worst, most repetitive, monotonous, tedious and pointless noise in non-league football provide the best one I've come across in years.

ALLIANCE PREMIER LEAGUE ..We were there when it started in 1979, later to become the Gola League and now the Conference. Our promotion into the Southern League Premier Division in 1974 played a crucial part in developing my geographical knowledge, suddenly north of Watford (or at least Bletchley) really did exist as we ventured into the Midlands, even as far as Telford. But the APL was a superb step, as coach journeys suddenly became train trips, to Barrow, to Scarborough, Northwich, and later Bangor and Gateshead amongst others. Supporter Kevin Bright was responsible for many a hangover, as he arranged for many of us to fill Continued page 33

our gallon containers up with Abbot Ale straight from the cask at the Merton Wine Store in Watford. Kevin, I recall would sup from a leather tankard he took with him and once got off the train at York en route to Scarborough before it had completely stopped and was duly nicked for the crime! ALAN ALAN CORDICE... A regular and fondly remembered chant hailing one of our greats. Although part of a great team, his pace was a major contributing factor to our success in the 80's. A memorable rendition of this chant came from a Mr David Morritt, I can still see him staggering into the back bar at Lower Mead singing "Alan Alan Cordice, score two goals on Monday." The reference I assume, but my memory is vague, related to the forthcoming second leg of the Southern League Championship in 1982, in which Alan Alan Cordice was to score nil. But we did beat Nuneaton 2-1 to pull off the Southern League "triple" "A,G,AGR, A,G,R,O... AGRO" ...another chant, not heard for many years now, but one which grew as I grew up in the 70s. As chants go, it was rather out of

place on the terraces at Wealdstone, only heard on occasion at "big games" where mobs of local Harrow youths would join the masses behind the goal and on Station Road after the game. On the whole, Vealdstone fans were a bit on the soft side in an era when occasional violence would mar football even at Southern League level. Trips to Barnet were always a little sad, as Stones fans would try and get lost in the ground rather than group together as usual, although actual "incidents" were few and far between. AP LEAMINGTON... the team that relegated us in that infamous match in 1981. See S for Sweetzer later in season. ABUSE.. A controversial topic indeed, but as long as I can remember, football supporters have been abusing each other, opposition players, their own players, officials and anyone else in or out of earshot for that matter. To what extent this abuse has moved from light hearted stick to mindless swear-

though, for all the distasteful abuse that we sometimes have to endure, without the gems that flow from the terraces with regularity, Wealdstone would be a dull team to support. Football alone has not been enough to ensure the club's survival through the traumas of recent years, and who on our terraces would swap places with any other clubs' supporters? KEN ALLEN... or Kenallen as he was once misprinted in the programme. We're back to Abuse again. Ken was one of the first goalkeepers I remember being abused, not least because he was in the region of 7 foot tall and a former jailbird. Bath City's No 1 pulled off a superb penalty save from George Duck (no less) on Adriaan Eglite's debut in November 1974, an early sign that Bath were going to become



t's not often that you read an obituary where nobody has a bad word to say about the deceased ..especially not in the world of football, where passion and emotion can spill over into ugliness and bile. But Dan Helen was different.

It was with deep sadness that we heard of his death at end of July: "A true loyal fan and a lovely bloke" in the words of so many of his friends at Wealdstone.

Dan, who died of a Leukaemia-related complication, was famous at club meetings for his vocal but considered contribution and his formal addressing of the head of the meeting "Mr Chairman Sir". He was Supporter of the Year in 1999/2000 and supporters club committee member for many years. This is what the people said about him....

danny helen wealdstone icon'

"Dan will be sorely missed. My wife, Beryl, remembers him fondly from a dinner held at the social club back during our days at Lower Mead. Dan was on the same table as us and he was delightful company, making Beryl's evening a most enjoyable one (she had been very nervous about coming with me to a function where she knew no-one). I'll also always remember his twinkling eyes as he made scandalous comments to the opposing goal-keeper! He will be fondly remembered".

"Terribly sad news. Danny was a key Lower Mead icon whose vocal presence at both Yeading and the White Lion always helped to remind me of the great games in the dark nights during the early 1980s, big games against Enfield and the truly brilliant, witty atmosphere of the Elmslie End. You couldn't find a more passionate advocate of the Wealdstone cause. He was also one of the reasons behind me taking up support of the Stones in the first place. Against Gravesend in 1979, I'm sure it was his shout of "hit it, McVeigh" to our right back (Jimmy of that ilk, who duly cracked home a tremendous goal) which helped inspire me to give the stones a go. Enthusiasm like that is always infectious. Can't believe he won't see the new ground. Awful news."

he Wealdstone show goes on the road after today, with tricky away matches at Tilbury on Tuesday and at Chesham United on Saturday.

The trip into Essex is dreaded by many of our fans, partly because of the drag round the M25 and partly because of our abject record in that county – witness last season when we managed to lose 2-0 to a lowly Tilbury side who weren't even playing at home.. they were ground-sharing at the equally unlovely East Thurrock.

Nevertheless we'll all be there at St Chad's Road, if only to find out if the Dockers are another Div One North side who have suddenly discovered a stash of cash to aid their rush towards a place in Level Three of next year's pyramid. We still intend to print maps to help our fans find these grounds, but technical problems mean it's a no-no today. But directions to Tilbury's ground are as follows:

Follow M25 to Junction 30 then follow the A13 signpost - ed to Tilbury. After 4 miles turn off to Tilbury & Docks (A1089). Leave the A1089 at

the next exit, signposted Chadwell St Mary, to the junction with the A126. Turn right to the roundabout and right towards Tilbury. The ground is 400 yards on the right. The ground is a 1 mile walk from Tilbury Town BR station.

Next Saturday sees a much more pleasant trip up into the foothills of the Chilterns for our first-ever League encounter (unless I'm mistaken, Couches please check) with Chesham United.

We very nearly played a whole season at Chesham three years ago, when our ground-share deal with Edgware looked to be on thin ice, and many will remember the marvellous night in April 1999 when we last played at their picturesque ground.Romford's pitch was deemed unplayable so they borrowed Chesham for the night... and we won 4-0 in an exhilarating performance. We seemed destined for promotion from Division One, but it wasn't to be....

The Bucks side were surprisingly relegated from the Premier Division last season after a desperate run of results in the last few months. Not that our fans will mind as this promises to be one of the most convivial away trips of the season... nice ground, excellent location, plenty of good pubs in the town centre, just ten minutes' walk away, and doubtless a fine summer afternoon.

The only time I remember travelling to Chesham for a game between our two clubs was in September 1973 for an FA Cup 1st Qualifying Round tie. The home side were in the Athenian League and Stones were assembling the Southern Laegue Division One (South) Championship side... but we were held 1-1 and astonishingly lost the replay 4-2 at Lower Mead to a much livelier Chesham team. So don't believe the old days were always great!

to Amersham then the A416 to
Chesham. Follow the road to
the roundabout at the bottom
of Amersham Hill, then turn
sharp left into Amy Lane then
the stadium, just up the hill
from cricket ground. It is
10 minutes walk from
Chesham underground station
(Metropolitan Line).
