In 2001/02 Wealdstone came away from Woodside Road with 3 points thanks to goals from Dennis Greene and Danny Tilbury, which was followed by a hard fought 1-1 draw at the W.L.G. in February 2002 with Mick Swaysland scoring for the Stones.



Season 2004/2005

As I sit down to write this article outlining the plans for the future I can't help but take a minute to reflect on the outcomes of last season. On the pitch it was possibly one of our most successful ever with trophies and a promotion won with the last kick of the season on an exceptionally emotional night at Dulwich Hamlet. It's nights like that which are the reasons we all do it.

Off the field the PEPF seemed to be progressing well until our development partners Stadia management Ltd got into financial difficulties. Work stopped on the building in the first week of April just some four days before the structure would have been made watertight. Since then we have had to sit back and watch the site become somewhat overgrown and a little dilapidated; however the board and project team have continued behind the scenes. The Scarborough Development Group have been signed up as our joint venture partners and many hours have been spent investigating what needs to be done to bring the scheme to fruition. Much time has also been spent negotiating a new financial basis for the project with Scarborough and Harrow Council. Our latest proposals are with the council at the moment and we should hear the councils view in early September. There is approximately four months work and four million pounds expen-

diture outstanding.

We are taking steps to ensure that all the good work on the pitches is not lost and a cutting programme is being instigated at the PEPF next week. Remedial work to secure the building from damage from vandals has also recently been undertaken. If you've passed the site on the tube you will also have seen diggers back on site building the environment agency's flood relief scheme.

I am still optimistic that we will be back on site this year and that the facility will be opened during the playing season. As a club we will have to decide whether we play the whole season at Edgware or whether we move in mid season but that's one for later.

Realism

Whilst it was fantastic to go up last year we must approach this season with a sense of realism. It will be a very competitive league and I know many sides have invested heavily for success. Unfortunately we must remain prudent and focus on the new stadium and our long-term future. This of course will put pressure on our very loyal management and playing staff to do the 'biz' on the field. Lets hope we have another great season. Regards **Nick**



The irony will not be lost on those that were there on that barmy night in Dulwich at the beginning of May, but had Wealdstone been able to hit a barn door from twelve yards during the season proper, the need for the play-off match against the south Londoners would have been superfluous.

In true Wealdstone style, why have a boring and predictable top six place when you can underachieve throughout much of the season, then have a glorious late surge that is then dashed at almost the final hurdle with defeat at home to Hemel in front of our biggest crowd of the season, only to sneak into a play-off that we eventually win on penalties. I think we failed eight times during the season from the spot, yet, apart from Dave Ryan's first strike, every Stone penalty unerringly hit the back of the net. Ask any Stone fan what they would have preferred: promotion with a top six finish or that night in Dulwich, and the latter would win every time. Not sure if the management would have agreed, though.

The atmosphere at Dulwich was electric. Indeed it may have played a very important part in persuading one player to stay at the WLG rather than take a more fucrative offer at another club. The Hamlet fans played their small part, but our huge support that night was truly amazing. To think we took more supporters to South London at just two days notice than we had attracted at any home game last season. To emphasise why Wealdstone are the biggest club in the borough, if you ever needed it, we took more than DOUBLE the total crowd at the Harrow Borough play-off match the day after against Kingstonian. I know that Attic and Terry are going to feature the match at Dulwich at length elsewhere in the programme, so I will not wax lyrical any further.

The team were fantastic in that run towards the end of the season, proving conclusively that they did have the stomach for the fight that matched their undoubted ability. Wins at Arlesey and at home to Wingate in three days stood out for me. Both teams are physical and

we rarely seem to do well against sides of that nature, but two wins set the stall for the final charge.

While Richard Jolly rightly took the plaudits for his goals, three players proved pivotal in our "promotion": Gary McKeown, Andy Carter and Danny Butler. Butler didn't settle well to start with, maybe even trying to get a route back to Northwood if rumours were to be believed, but he provided a real strength at the back just when we needed it. Andy Carter seems to have his critics at this club; one wonders why as he seems to save us week after week, and his performance in the play-off was sensational. McKeown's been there and done it, but his calm assuredness in the middle of the park was central to our good form.

Danny Butler has now moved onto Hendon. Strange when you consider the big bust up he had with the then Northwood manager Tony Choules was the reason why he came to Wealdstone in the first place, and Choules is now manager of Hendon. Money makes strange bedfellows, I suppose. I don't blame any player that moves for more money; some rely upon the funds they earn from football more than others and Butler will be difficult to replace, as we have already seen in the pre-season friendlies.

A mystifying element though is that Butler left us to go to Hendon. The atmosphere that night at Dulwich or even Thurrock and Maidenhead is something that Hendon will never be able to create. Hendon also turned down promotion to the new Conference South citing financial concerns at the travelling. Fine, the officials of a club should always have the club's long-term future at heart but surely they could have put out a team of players that fitted within their budget, whatever it is but it is considerably bigger than ours. If they went down, so be it, but they may never get the chance again. It smacks of no ambition. Had the Wealdstone board told our manager, players and above all supporters; "sorry chaps, we'll have the smallest budget in the premier division by far, so we are not going to take our position in the higher division," there would have been mayhem. The unmentionables from the edge of the borough once, believe it or not, won promotion to the Conference. The blazers decided that they would refuse to accept the invitation into the premier competition for non-league clubs – they have never come close again nor, in my opinion, ever will. To cap it all, Hendon are to move to Copthall Stadium, a desolate, soulless athletics stadium. Maybe Danny just likes peace and quiet!

Doesn't the new fixture list look great? Instead of the likes of Maldon Town, Chatham Town and Beaconsfield, we will have trips to Dover, Chelmsford and Salisbury. No doubt some will think the highlight of the season will come on 25th September. Well, ridiculous scheduling - why wasn't it on Boxing Day - or not, does not hide the fact that for a true derby match - the olden day tussles with Barnet and Enfield spring to mind immediately - you need two to tango. Fire and brimstone from one set of supporters, even if we will make up ninety percent of the crowd, just isn't anywhere near enough fun. I will be interested in seeing whether the darts team will have any supporters below the age

The season will be tough. Our tiny budget has to compete against teams that have mountains of money to spend, and in one case are even full-time. Realistic ambition is that by the time we go down to Salisbury on the last game of the season – anyone that has been on booze trips to Salisbury before will know that they are fantastic, fun-filled drunken frolics – Wealdstone are safe from relegation. It will be interesting to see what the ambitions of the management are.

Finally, footballers come in for plenty of criticism from the media and such like, but I would like to say what a credit to the club both Marvin Morgan and Gary Burrell were at the junior section's end of season presentation. Nothing was too much trouble for them, handing out the trophies, having photographs taken with the boys and signing autographs even.

To be perfectly honest I was never that interested in football as a child. Apart from a few trips to Wembley for England games and the occasional, usually laughable attempts at playing for the School team, I was never going to become someone who's frame of mind for the week could be determined by how my team had faired over the weekend. I was much happier playing with my train set, playing with fire and messing about with cameras. (Nothing's changed there then! ED). The year was 1984 and a group of schoolmates started telling me how much fun it was going to 'that football team who play behind the ABC cinema' and it being a place where supporters used to sing, get drunk and go absolutely mental when a goal was scored. I reluctantly took up their offer and attended a game in February against Enfield in the Gola League. Wealdstone won 2-1, I was hooked! I attended a few more games that season and began to recognise a few more faces in the crowd from school and even a few older lads from the 13/21st Cub Scouts, whose behaviour was even worse at football than it was on patrol camps! The next season of course was the stuff of legends and culminated in that afternoon at Wembley where we achieved what no other team had managed and won the non-league double, I also had my first taste of away games that season. The half time interval during our Trophy semi final at Enfield being particularly memorable! However, the decline of the team was fairly rapid. Out went my heroes like Alan Cordice, Mark Graves and Andy Graham and in came the likes of Mike Pittaway and Martin Hirst! The next few years saw me attending virtually every home game despite the gradual fall in standards, attendances and the fact non of the original group of school mates I had been dragged along with attended any more. Most of them were now spending their Saturday afternoons at Highbury or even worse, Vicarage Road. And it was Vicarage Road that I began spending Saturday afternoons watching Wealdstone, as we had managed to

secure a wonderful deal there, so good in fact, that within 2 years we were off to Yeading where I was a regular home and away for some of our darkest moments ever. The 6-0 home defeat to Newport in front of barely 150 fans stands out as being the worst of all time. Things began to finally look up though as we once again moved homes, this time back to the Borough of Harrow and into the White Lion ground at Edgware. It was not the football that had kept me coming to games though. It was without a doubt the supporters. A different class and far more genuine and passionate than the average prawn sandwich connoisseur to be found at Premier League grounds these days. After all the heartache, the future indeed looks bright. Keep the faith.

Best Moments:

Easy to say I know, but without doubt the play off at Dulwich, which had me buzzing for several weeks afterwards. That to me is going to take a hell of a lot to beat. Others include the 3-2 win a home to Dover in 1989 where several supporters who these days are the first to condemn bad language etc but would have been quite happy to commit GBH against a match official that day! The 2-0 win at Wivenhoe in 1992 when we were due to go out of business. We knew it too and spent most of the game signing 'we'll never die' in a show of solidarity and mutual bonding that has not been seen since. Finally, that 1-0 win at Braintree in 1998 having lost 3 on the bounce and ultimately set up our winning run in to achieve promotion from Division Two. We took around 250 fans there and was possibly, along with Dulwich our best vocal performance or modern times.

Noel Imber: Very assured and his save at Braintree was one of the best I've ever seen

Jason Shaw: Just seems to keep going on and on! His attitude is first class.



Dominic Sterling: Was too good for us unfortunately. Has made a name for himself at Aldershot.

4. Dave Ryan: On his day, simply immense as we saw at Dulwich.

Roy Marshall: The cool old head at the back that made younger and far faster forwards look no hopers.

Gary McKeown: Obvious pedigree and the catalyst to our promotion run last season.

welcome to our visitors WOTTNING

Worthing FC was founded in February 1886 and played home matches mostly in the People's (now Homefield) Park until the Club moved to Beach House Park in 1889. The early years were spent playing friendlies and competing in the Sussex Senior Cup, in which our first tie on November 27 1886 resulted in a 1-0 home win over Brighton Hornets.

Worthing reached their first Senior Cup final in 1891-92 (losing 5-3 to Brighton Hornets) before winning the 1892-93 final 2-1 against Eastbourne at the County Ground, Hove. This was the first of a record 21 Senior Cup wins, the most recent being in 1999.

Worthing were founder members of the West Sussex Senior League in 1896, along with their local rivals Worthing Athletic (founded 1891). The first of 7 championships was won in 1898-99, qualifying Worthing to play the East Sussex League champions Brighton Athletic in the Sussex Charity Cup donated by the Royal Irish Rifles. This match was lost 2-1, but we went on to win the RUR Cup (as it became known) 13 times (including twice jointly with Horsham).

In 1899-00 the club entered the FA Cup and FA Amateur Cup for the first time.

In May 1900 Worthing and Worthing Athletic merged and in 1901 the Club moved to its current home at the Sports Ground. The team of 1903-04 contained 3 players who would become full internationals, S.S. Harris and E.G.D. Wright for England and Charlie Webb for Ireland.

Worthing withdrew from the West Sussex League for the 1904-05 season, so as not to be in competition with the newly promoted Worthing Rovers (founded 1901). We rejoined the League in 1905 after merging with Rovers during the summer. In 1907-08 Worthing reached the quarter-finals of the FA Amateur Cup, where we drew 1-1 away to eventual winners Depot

Battalion Royal Engineers, before losing the replay 1-0 before a crowd later claimed to number 4,500.

After World War I. in 1919-20, Worthing competed in 2 leagues, being founder members of the Senior Division of the Brighton, Hove & District League and rejoining the West Sussex League. The following year we helped found the Sussex County League and resigned from the West Sussex League in protest at a rule change. The County League championship was won for the first two seasons and another 6 titles were won during our stay in this league.

The FA Cup First Round Proper was reached in 1936-37, Worthing losing 4-3 at Yeovil & Petters United. This year also saw the first of 3 AFA Senior Cup finals reached, Worthing losing 7-1 to Harwich & Parkeston at Bromley. The other 2 finals were both lost to Cambridge Town (4-2 in 1947 and 3-0 in 1949).

In 1948-49 Worthing joined the Corinthian League. Little success was had in this league, finishing bottom 4 times. The best season was 1949-50, when a highest placing of 5th was achieved along with reaching the Corinthian Memorial Shield final for the only time (losing 2-1 to Erith & Belvedere at Eastbourne).

The Corinthian League became Division 1 of the Athenian League in 1963 and Worthing enjoyed immediate success, being promoted as runners-up to Leatherhead as well as reaching the Athenian League Memorial Shield final (losing 2-1 to Chesham United on aggregate) and winning the AFA Invitation Cup (3-I away to Harwich) for the first of 4 occasions.

Three seasons were spent in the Athenian League Premier Division before two successive relegations saw us languishing in Division 2.

Worthing started their revival in 1971-72 by returning to Division 1 as runners-up to Staines Town and the following season reached the Athenian League Cup final, losing 2-0 away to Amateur Cup finalists Slough Town after extra-time.

Worthing left the Athenian League in 1977 to become members of the newly formed Isthmian League Division 2.

Barry Lloyd was appointed manager in 1981 and the Division 2 title was won in 1981-82, with prolific goalscorer Micky Edmonds scoring 53 goals. In 1982-83 we won the Division 1 title and reached the 2nd round of the FA Cup, losing 4-0 at Oxford United. The next 2 seasons saw Worthing finish as runners-up in the Premier Division to Harrow Borough and Sutton United. At the end of 1984-85 the Club's main stand burnt down and, apart from reaching the last 16 of the FA Trophy the following season, a decline set in. Barry Lloyd left to join Brighton & Hove Albion in 1986 and the following year Worthing were relegated from the Premier Division. Four years later we had a disastrous season, finishing bottom of Division 1 with only 10 points and having conceded 157 goals.

Ex-Northern Ireland international Gerry Armstrong was appointed manager in 1991-92 and the following season Worthing became the first Club to win Division 2 for a second time, having dropped only 12 points from the last 27 matches.

In 1998-99 we were finalists in the Puma Cup; had our record unbeaten away sequence; completed a league "double" over local rivals Bognor for the first time since 1939; won the Sussex County League Reserve Section; and won the Sussex Senior Cup for the first time in 2 1 years.

Welcome to the first game of our new season in the restructured Ryman Premier League against a strongly fancied Worthing side who did so well, particularly towards the end of last season.

Our play off success last May, which looked an impossible task at the beginning of March, has proved what can be achieved with the right mental approach, work ethic and team spirit. That's undoubtedly the combination which brought the success and now given us the opportunity to compete with the 'big boys' of the Premier. We go into this campaign as the underdogs, being the only team to qualify through the play offs and with probably one of the lowest budgets in the Division, but that has not stopped us in the past and I don't intend to let it happen this year.

That promotion place left us wondering what the re-structure had in store for us and to be honest we have come out of it very well in terms of travelling Poor old Hemel and Chesham have some horrendous journeys by being in the Doc Martins section but we have ended up with loads of local derbies to look forward to and I'm sure the fans are looking forward to the Harrow Borough games.

The squad has remained pretty much the same with the exception of Danny Butler's departure to Hendon. We will not only miss his playing ability, but also his strong character, which had such a major influence in our success last season. I'd like to thank him for his short spell at the club and wish him well for the future. As usual, we've had lots of new faces around during pre-season and with two games to go this week and a few decisions to be made, I will resist welcoming anyone until my next programme notes.

Personally, I think pre-season has gone really well despite a couple of setbacks. The attitude of the players and quality of the work was excellent during the first few weeks on the stamina and fitness. Then through no fault of our own, we lost three friendlies, the Cheshunt weekend tournament and the Hendon match which completely threw our preparations. A 4-0 win in our first game at Flackwell, a couple more good training sessions, all the players seemed happy, most of them had signed and despite a goalkeeping problem with Carts away and Charlie injured, I was reluctantly (don't tell the Mrs) heading off on holiday happy and content with the way things were shaping up.

Text messages kept me in touch with proceedings whilst I was in the States and it certainly wasn't good reading. Leo, Fred and Roger kept me up to date and despite the shock of the scorelines as they came through, their brief explanation of the circumstances and general feelings, I remained pretty upbeat and positive. Improvements and return of players against Edgware and Maidenhead made better reading and I arrived home last Friday, refreshed after a good break looking forward to getting back into things again. A 5-0 win against Bishops Stortford only enhanced my positive feelings, particularly with some of the football we produced and with a busy schedule this week and hopefully a couple of new signings, I can't wait to get underway.

What are our expectations for this season? I'm sure we will hear numerous different thoughts on expectations, but we have to be realistic... we are going into the unknown.

On reflection, we under achieved for long spells of last season because we put ourselves under too much pressure. We expected promotion from day one and when results went the wrong way, too many people only saw the negatives, criticism increased, the confidence drained and the vicious circle had taken over. Hindsight is a wonderful thing, sitting in 6th place, our good performances against Leyton, Yeading, Hemel and Boreham Wood in early December all ended in defeat by the odd goal and the 'doom and gloom' had taken over. We were better than all of them during those games, but the physiological effect was devastating and we promptly collected only 15 points from the next 13 games.

Actually, we put ourselves through hell for those few months, but with continued hard work and belief, it just goes to prove what can be achieved, even when things do look so bad.

This season will be difficult and all of us have a duty to be positive and try to bring the best out of everyone at the club. We are the small fish in a big pond and I know we will have some tough games, but if we are going to compete and stride forward we must learn from all our experiences...both good and bad.

My personal expectations only go as far as the end of September. My initial target is to get 50% of the points on offer, which gives a reasonable platform and time to judge the standards of our new environment. However, I feel we should look beyond just results. That feeling of success at Dulwich last season came from ten months hard work by an awful lot of people and I certainly want to feel that emotion again. If all of us involved at this club could set themselves new standards and give that little bit extra; who knows what we could achieve. With the new stadium now almost certain to be ready before the end of the season, we must strive to be in the highest position possible and lay the platform for further progress in the future.

The management and players certainly need to set themselves personal targets and goals for this year. Generally the attitude to training has been excellent so far, but it mustn't slip. Our reaction when things goes wrong must be better, set pieces, work rate, concentration, time keeping, appearance and discipline all need to be improved. Every member of staff and player knows they have a particular area which needs to be improved and if we can all be that little bit more professional about our tasks, who knows what we could achieve again this season.

Alex Welsh, an ex' Wealdstone goalkeeper who played for Leo and me at Hounslow, always said "you need a fire in your belly to be a success".

Well, as we start the new season, hopefully all the fires have been lit, it's now up to each individual to keep them burning. Motivation comes from within; the rest of us can only help.

With everyone getting behind the team, let's hope our players fire is still burning brightly as the season reaches its climax.

a view from the attic

Monday the 3rd of May 2004 will go down as many a Wealdstone fan's most memorable and emotive game of the modern era. It was of course; the night that Wealdstone took their place in the Rymans Premier Division, an achievement that only 1-month earlier had looked impossible. However, our excellent winning run which included the convincing wins over fellow promotion hopefuls Arlesey, a bad tempered game against Wingate and Finchley and then the 8-0 - thrashing of Enfield set us up to virtually guarantee promotion against Hemel Hempstead. The result was not good though and this left us needing to win our final League game of the season at East Thurrock United to put us in a 'play off' against the 7th placed team in the Ryman's League Division 1 South. A professional performance saw us win 2-0, which meant we would play Dulwich Hamlet away 2 days later on the Monday evening in a 'winner takes all'

Monday dawned an overcast and rainy day. By midday, it was still raining fairly heavily, doubts began to surface as to whether the game would be played and some people even started to make suggestions about when the rescheduled game would take place. However, by 2 o'clock, the rain had subsided and glorious sunshine was upon us. The news from Dulwich was that their pitch was draining well and only another heavy and prolonged downpour would cause any further doubt. Several Stones fans now began the short journey across London, and met up in the 'Fox and Hounds' pub which is about a 10 minute walk from the ground. Kick off neared and the well-watered travelling support made their way to the

On entering the ground around 5 minutes before kick off, our vast numbers were readily apparent. Many faces who have not been seen for a few years were recognised. The Wealdstone players took to the field of play and were greeted with a pretty rousing reception and the first songs of the evening were loudly aired. The game kicked off with Wealdstone playing controlled and attacking football, although Dulwich looked dangerous on the break with their two fast and skilful for-

wards causing our back line all kinds of problems. And it was almost Dulwich who took the lead after 20 minutes but a superb triple save from Andy Carter kept them at bay. After a sustained period of Wealdstone pressure, a corner was half cleared to Martin Carter who looked up and sent a superbly crafted lob over the stranded keeper to send the large contingent of away fans into pandemonium! Rather than ease off the gas, the Stones poured forward and could easily have been 2 or 3 goals up at the break.

The second half started with the Stones looking the better team again, but disaster struck not long into the half when a break down the left by one of their pacy forwards resulted in a tap in for one of their midfielders. The game evened out although there was only set of supporters who were making all the noise, although credit must be given to the Dulwich fans for at least trying. Just as the Stones were beginning to get on top with about 10 minutes remaining, another break down the left saw Andy Carter parry a fierce shot but luckily for Dulwich the rebound fell to one of their forwards who made no mistake. The response from the Stones fans was to raise the roof and we equalised not long afterwards with a free kick from 20 yards being driven home by Dave Ryan to spark the 2nd scene of celebrations of the night! The clock wound down and the referee blew up. Extra time

Almost immediately after the restart, Dulwich had the ball in the back of the net but the referee had spotted a handball. The rest of the first period of extra time was very tense with both teams not really mounting any meaningful attacks. The second period saw the Stones finish stronger with sub Ben Alexander twice testing their keeper. The referee blew up after 120 minutes and one could almost here the collective sigh from the Wealdstone fans as this meant a penalty shoot out, and penalties were something the Stones had made a fine art of missing all season!

With 80% of the Stones contingent and manager Gordon Bartlett now packed behind the goal, Dulwich struck first giving Andy Carter no chance. Dave Ryan, who had been mag-

nificent all evening placed the ball on the spot, but he fired weakly into the arms of the keeper. Dulwich made no such mistake with their 2nd spot kick. Everything was going to plan! However, Danny Butler drove our 2nd kick home and the next 4 penalties were put home convincingly, Tommy Williams and Gary McKeown being our scorers. This meant though, that Dulwich only had to score their 5th and it was game over as far as Wealdstone's promotion plans were concerned, with some Stones followers packing their scarves away, their player blasted his spot kick against the bar and from this moment on, you could sense there was only going to be 1 winner. There was still our 5th kick to be taken though, but Martin Carter fired into the far corner giving the keeper no chance, Sudden death.

The Dulwich spot kick taker seemed hurried and took a short run up. The result was inevitable; Andy Carter dived to his right to save with ease. Up stepped Richard Jolly who until the last minute, didn't realise his kick would mean the difference between the mediocrity and tedium of level 4 or the relative glamour of level 3. He put the ball confidently on the spot and then in superb style, drove the ball past the despairing dive of the keeper to trigger the most passionate celebrations I have ever personally witnessed in any game of football. The hoards of blue and white swept over the barriers and onto the pitch to join the players in a magnificent celebration. This went on for a good 20 minutes with players and fans alike dancing with joy and some even weeping, overcome with emotion that we had finally achieved a promotion that had been denied to us in 1999.

My final thoughts are firstly, the magnificent composed performance from the players and then the nerve shown by our spot kick takers. And secondly, the fans; to have taken well over 300 supporters to a game that was only arranged 2 days earlier was an achievement to be proud of. The support from the terraces was magnificent. One player who has played at a much higher level was quoted as saying "absolutely brilliant support" as he celebrated with a fan. It was one of those nights that makes all the heartbreak seem worth it.

On that note I'll say goodbye, get behind the lads today from the off and let's have a winning start to the season.


