It's hard to believe today has finally come around.. after 17 years of nomadic wandering, our beloved Stones are finally playing a competitive match in a place we can call home. And doesn't it feel good! A huge vote of thanks is due, first of all, to the board for having the vision, just six months ago, to seize the opportunity of taking on the debts and lease of Ruislip Manor FC. And then of course, it was a herculean effort by the hardy band of fans (and officials) to transform the dilapidated Grosvenor Vale into the stadium you see today.

Okay, it's not the Emirates Stadium or the new Wembley, or even Lower Mead but you won't find anyone walking around without a big smile on their face since that magnificent opening night a few weeks ago. I'm one of those who was unable to help with the groundworks, painting and overhaul of the ground during the summer. All I had seen were updated photographs of the progress on the club's website... so you can imagine my joy at arriving at a sparkling Vale for the Watford friendly. I was bowled over at the change since the Field of Dreams game in early May.

Staggered at the amount of work that has gone on... new hardstanding laid; crush barriers installed; terrific new signage; state-of -the art goals and nets; renovated changing and physio

rooms; everywhere benefitting from the sort of TLC that hasn't been lavished on this ground for decades.

It was a great bonus, of course, that the 800-odd crowd were treated to such an exhilarating game. Well, first half anyway as three goals rocketed into the Gun Turret End net to get the Wealdstone feelgood factor up and running. And great to see our new signing, former Spurs junior David Hicks, grabbing the historic first goal at the Vale with a tremendous 25-yard strike. Although it made me feel a bit ancient as my eldest daughter Charlotte was a classmate of his at Chace School in Enfield!

That goal was followed by an equally good swivel and smash by Ben Alexander before Watford's French defender Cedric Aveline completed the scoring with an own goal just before the break... and the new ground is already turning up a few strange statistics as we have yet to score in the Grosvenor Vale end net.

Yes, it's true... the Hampton friendly finished goalless and, against Hemel Hempstead last Saturday we were again unable to hit the target at that end. The Gun Turret goal was again seeing lots of action however, with Steve Hughes and Ryan Ashe both smashing in contenders for the Goal of the Season in the second

If you fancing seeing Ashey's goal, incidentally, our winger Nick Salapatas has his performances videoed and they can be watched on his own website. A bit of a first as far as I am aware... and you can also view the Sky Sports footage of the Watford game on YouTube. Splendid ironic commentary too! But that was then, and this is now...

Today is another huge occasion for Wealdstone Football Club as we welcome Tonbridge Angels, their officials and supporters for our first true home game since April 1991. The Kent side have been one-off rivals ever since we turned professional in 1971 and will be formidable opposition this afternoon. They completed the double over us last season and were one of the most impressive sides to visit Chestnut Avenue, beating us 3-1 when we in the middle of a decent spell.

Our journey to the Longmead Stadium had ended in bitter disappointment in November when Tonbridge snatched two late goals (the second after our keeper Sean Thomas had been carried off) to take all three points after Ben Alexander had put us in a

commanding position. This was also Alan Massey's last game of his loan spell... no doubt he and Sean will be out for revenge today.

The Stones have a really tough start, in fact, as we face three of the form sides in the opening week. After today we go to Short Lane, Ashford on Tuesday night—a ground where we were beaten with embarrassing ease last season—and then to Billericay Town next Saturday, another stadium where we have never won. But this is a new era! Hope spring eternal and we hope to see hundreds of blue & white-clad fans on our travels in the next few weeks as the Stones march on to glory.

A big welcome to today's Match Sponsors. Emma Bailey and Mike Kane will have the pleasure of the Directors attention for this special game, and I hope they enjoy the pampering this afternoon. Thanks also go to Howard Krais for sponsoring the Match ball. I hope you all bring us luck!

Enjoy the game today and see you back here on Bank Holiday Monday, August 25 (3pm) when we face Boreham Wood.

## Angels fly high

For the new season of 1948/49, the Southern League welcomed four new clubs, Chingford Town, Hastings United, Kidderminster Harriers and Tonbridge. This was a remarkable move for Tonbridge, as the idea of forming the club had only been raised ten months prior to the start of the 1948 season.

The founding of the club had been at the suggestion of local businessman Mr Herbert Portch and he became the club's first chairman. The club took out a lease on the Angel Ground, so named after an adjacent public house, which had previously been a home to Kent County Cricket Club, and being in the town centre, just two minutes walk from the railway station.

Fate threw together Tonbridge and Hastings United, both clubs making their Southern League debuts on August 21st 1948. Tonbridge netted first, a goal from Albert Robson, but the Sussex Club went on to win 2-1. Tonbridge's first season in the Southern League ended with an inauspicious third from bottom placing.

In the early seasons, The Angels, an obvious nickname did not blaze a trail in the League, but cup competitions brought some cheer. In 1949/50 the club reached the Southern League Cup semi-finals, only to lose 3-2 to Colchester.

In three consecutive seasons, 1950/51, 1951/52, and 1952/53, Tonbridge advanced to the 1<sup>st</sup> Round Proper of the F.A. Cup, only to lose reach time in replays. Their opponents were Chelmsford City, Aldershot, and Norwich City respectively. The last match at Carrow Road, was settled by a late goal, which many thought should have been disallowed for off side. It was to be 14 years before the club again reached the 1st Round, where they lost 1-0 to Dagenham. Charlton Athletic, then in the old Division 3, were the F.A. Cup visitors to the Angel Ground in 1972, returning to The Valley as 5-0 victors.

Kent County competitions brought silverware to the Angel ground, by virtue of both the first and reserve teams, but in the wider based competitions, the club was fated to be "Cinderella". The Angel's Southern League Cup ambitions were snuffed out in two finals. 1954/55 by Yeovil, and 1956/57 by Hereford United.

The 60s and 70s were in the main, "run of the mill"

times, with occasional promotions matched by relegations. Some cup honours were attained, although nothing earth shattering, despite having some fine individual players and distinguished managers.

During 1975/1976 the club went into voluntary liquidation, Tonbridge Angels FC emerging from the chaos. Another major problem loomed soon after. The club's landlords, the local council, wanted the Angel ground for development. A battle in the High Courts ensued before the club was offered a new ground, its present home, at the north end of Tonbridge.

So what was begun by Albert Robson in 1948 was ended by Micky Angel, when he netted the last goal scored at the Angel Ground, during a 2-2 draw with Hounslow on 21st January, 1980. The remaining home fixtures for the season were played out on borrowed ground. Longmead Stadium staged its first game on August 18th 1980, a Southern League Cup match against Crawley watched by a crowd of 707.

Despite having a new home, finances proved a problem to the club. On field promise in the 80s produced no real success apart from another Southern League Cup semi final appearance in 1987. Season 1988/89 proved to be a disaster. Finishing second from bottom, The Angels bade farewell to the Southern League after 40 years, and were relegated to the Kent League.

Despite being the best supported team in the Kent League, the championship, and with it a return to the Southern League, failed to materialise, although the Kent League Cup was lifted twice. 1992/93 was the year of the Angels. At last the title was won and the newly established reserves won the Kent League Division 2 Cup, and the Youth Team reached the Kent Youth Cup Final.

So in 1992/93, Tonbridge returned to the league which they had graced for so many years. Subsequent seasons have seen improvements both on and off the field. During the club's Kent League days, Longmead's record attendance for a competitive match was set when an F.A. Cup 4th round match Qualifying against Yeovil draw a crowd of 1,483. Season 1997/98 saw an attendance of 2,412 when the full Crystal Palace first team squad appeared for a charity match in aid of two local hospices, making March 30th 1998 a memorable evening in The Angels history.

During 2000/2001, new stands were erected behind each goal and plans are advanced for further ground

developments. Alan Walker was appointed manager at start of season the 2002/2003, and he left the during season club 2003/2004, being replaced by player manager Tony The club then Dolby. achieved a third place finish in the Southern League Eastern Division with a total of 88 points, being beaten for second place on goal difference by Histon. Mike Rutherford has joined the club as assistant manager. The club was relocated to the Isthmian League Premier Division at the start of season 2004/2005, but was relegated to the First Division at the end of the season

At the start of season 2005/2006, Nick Sullivan was appointed as chairman of the club, which saw the club successfully promoted back to the Premier Division. The promotion was achieved via the play offs, with wins against Tooting Mitcham, and Dover Athletic. The management team of Tommy Warrilow and Cliff Cant joined the club at the start of November, 2007, following the departure of Tony Dolby and Mike Rutherford.

A new ground record was set for the Longmead Stadium on 12<sup>th</sup> January, 2008, when 2,281 attended our 2<sup>nd</sup> Round proper FA Trophy tie against AFC Wimbledon. During the summer of 2008, major development work has taken place at our Stadium, including the fitting of 720 new seats to our West Stand.

Obviously, that money would make a huge difference to our financial situation, but we must be realistic and except that we are highly unlikely to see that for sometime. However, we should be a few grand better off after today when he makes his 50<sup>th</sup> appearance for the club and that will help as we continue to build firm foundations on and off the park as we slowly but surely climb our way back up the non league ladder.

Despite this probable income, we still cannot compete with the big spenders in this division and my targets for the season must be realistic. ## Confused? You will be...

### Your guide to the National League System Season 2008/9

Steps 1-4: Promotion and Relegation

The Football Association have confirmed the procedures relating to promotion and relegation at the conclusion of season 2008/2009. Set out below are the details of how this will operate, taking into account the changed structure for this season. Therefore, the following procedures will apply:

#### Step 1 and Step 2

The clubs finishing in the bottom four places at Step 1 at the end of the playing season will be relegated to a feeder pool and placed in the most geographically appropriate division at Step 2. They will be replaced by the clubs finishing in 1st position in each of the divisions at Step 2 together with a further two clubs which win a series of playoff matches involving those clubs finishing in a play-off position (normally positions 2 to 5) in each of the divisions at Step 2. In exceptional circumstances where a club in positions 2 to 5 does not meet the criteria to enter the play-offs they should be replaced by a club finishing in the next Clubs finishing below eligible position. position 7 would not be considered.

#### Step 2 and Step 3

The clubs in the bottom three places in each of the two divisions at Step 2 at the end of the playing season will be relegated to a feeder pool and placed in the most geographically appropriate division at Step 3. They will be replaced by the clubs finishing in 1<sup>st</sup> position in each of the divisions at Step 3 together with a further three clubs determined by a series of play-off matches involving those clubs finishing in a play-off position (normally positions 2 to 5) in each

of the divisions at Step 3. In exceptional circumstances where a club in positions 2 to 5 does not meet the criteria to enter the play-offs they should be replaced by a club finishing in the next eligible position. Clubs finishing below position seven would not be considered. The promoted clubs will also be placed in a feeder pool and placed in the most geographically appropriate division at Step 2.

#### Step 3 and Step 4

The clubs in the bottom four places in each of the three divisions at Step 3 at the end of the playing season will be relegated to a feeder pool and placed in the most geographically appropriate division at Step 4. They will be replaced by the club finishing in 1<sup>st</sup> position in each of the divisions at Step 4 together with a further six clubs to be determined by a series of play-off matches involving those clubs finishing in a play-off position (normally positions 2 to 5) in each of the divisions at Step 4. In exceptional circumstances where a club in positions 2 to 5 does not meet the criteria to enter the play-offs they should be replaced by a club finishing in the next eligible position. Clubs finishing below position 7 would not be considered.





It was apparent that the fortunes of RMFC were at an all time low; whilst we were offered the opportunity to take over RMFC we rejected this on the basis that FA Regs do not allow such things. We also had no desire to either take over RMFC or to consider a merger.

We also learnt that Ruislip Manor Sports & Social Club Ltd were the leaseholders and also in financial trouble. At a Board Meeting we decided that we would secure the medium term future of Wealdstone FC by acquiring RMSSCL and after two months of intense work with numerous meetings we eventually did this in early January at an EGM of the limited company. I am extremely grateful to Fred Deanus and also Steve Bowen (who at the time was Chairman of RMSSCL) for all of their help and assistance. Quentin Fox and I spent countless hours on the legal side of things and joined by our friends and colleagues Dominic Whyley and Paul Rumens the four of us made a substantial financial commitment. It was a proud day on 13/1/08 when we called a public meeting at Ruislip and announced the news to the supporters, shareholders and interested parties who attended.

If I had thought the couple of months leading up to this day had been tough then I was mistaken – things got tougher for all of us. Whilst we had been aware of certain substantial debts owed by RMSSCL there was, as you can probably guess, more lurking in the woodwork. There is no point whatsoever listing the various problems that

we have encountered over the past seven months (the programme would not be big enough!) but it is certainly true to say that Paul, Quentin, Dominic and I have all questioned on many occasions why on earth we took on what we did. I guess the reason really is that all 4 of us are passionate about Wealdstone FC because from a financial and time point of view it really does not make sense.

We did manage to successfully negotiate an outstanding court case (well done Q) that could have cost us far more than it eventually did and only last Tuesday I successfully concluded several months negotiations with Scottish & Newcastle UK. I am grateful to their Regional Manager Ben Stanton for his help.

It was in early April that Ray Kemp agreed to take on the position of General Manager of RMSSCL, ably assisted by Tony Short. Considering that Ray lives in Leicestershire then his commitment to help out is fantastic – it's at times like this that you realise what friendship is all about. Respect, mate. Gradually, we are turning things around on site. # Brown bomber blasts 'bridge

Saturday 19 August 1972 Southern League First Division (South):

#### Wealdstone 1 Tonbridge 0

WHEN you are a 15-yearold football fan there is simply nothing as important as match day—especially when it's the first home game of the season, the sun is out, your team have made a decent start to the season and you fervently believe that THIS could be the season for promotion.

To be honest, for me, nothing's really changed in the intervening 36 years. Except a sort of heroworship for Mickey Brown, our ace striker of that era who bagged the only goal of this absorbing contest at Lower Mead.

What about George Duck? I hear you ask. Surely if anyone is worth worshipping from that era it's the mercurial George? Well, dear reader, the 20-year-old Mr Duck had only just been signed, from Spurs via Southend & Millwall, and the Elmslie End faithful hadn't really clocked his talent at that stage.

**Tim Parks** looks back 36 years to when the Stones took on today's visitors Tonbridge in an early-season Southern League fixture...

Indeed, in Phil Sugden's match report of the match in the Harry O, Duck was praised as a skilfull forward with the ability to provide penetrating passes for the bustling Brown. George was even touted as a midfielder when our big centre-forward Bill Byrne returned from holiday. "I expect Byrne and Brown to forge a partner-



ship up front in manager Syd Prosser's favoured 4-2-4 formation, with Terry Dyson and Ray Whitaker on the wings. Dixie Hale and John Furie did not dominate the Tonbridge midfield and the silky passing of Duck might provided muchneeded creativity" wrote Sugden, who was not yet exposed as being a hamper short of a picnic.

Now, writing of George Duck in that vein seems ridiculous. At the time, he failed to score in his first five outings and it was not until September 2nd that he notched his first goal in a 4-0 win over Bideford at Lower Mead. After that point he just didn't stop....

Coach Prosser switched to 4-3-3, dropped Whitaker and played George, Mickey Brown and Bill Byrne up front with the result that Ducky netted 38 times, and Brown 20-odd.

But, going back to the Tonbridge game, Brown was They might have had three more

still my teenage hero—despite overhearing a Kent fan, on the way into the ground, remarking that: "Oh, they've got that little fat forward playing for them today".

Well, a little bit porky he might have been but Mickey Brown, now in his late 20s, was still a handful at that level. The former schoolboy sprint champion had played professionally for Colchester and could spank the ball with tremendous power, and little backlift, from the fringes of the penalty box.

Reporter Sugden reckoned he should have had a penalty in the first half (see picture) when Brown was flattened by a strong tackle when he seemed certain to score "and lay on the ground prostrate for several minutes".

Our Tonbridge fan probably though that, like a Weebles Wobble, he simply couldn't get up again. But Mickey had the last laugh when ex-Spurs double winner Dyson was held back by a Tonbridge defender as he threatened to break free.

The ref gave a quick free kick which Dyson threaded through the visitors' defence for Brown to smack the ball low and hard past keeper Ray White and into the Cinema End net.

The crowd of erupted and Stones had sewn up a fine win over Tonbridge, who had won their opening two matches. The Stones, beaten 3-1 in a tough opener at Bath City (and in front of over 3,000 people), had won 3-0 at Dunstable Town in midweek and briefly topped the table in September... but despite having a free-scoring attack the defence was as leaky as the Gun Turret End cover at Grosvenor Vale, and we had to settle for an eventual 8th

For Tonbridge, defeat at Lower Mead was just an early-season blip and they finished promoted to

the Southern Premier Division as runners-up to Maidstone United, just three points behind. Manager Prosser shored up Wealdstone defence the following summer and, with Duck netting an amazing 64 goals, we stormed to the Southern Division title with games to spare. The " little fat forward" meanwhile, played his last game for us in March 1973 and moved on, funnily enough, to Tonbridge.


'He also turned out for Maidstone, against us, in Premier Division clashes in the seasons to come and, as you'd expect, the Elmslie End were terribly kind about his expanding waistline and diminishing speed. But I still quite liked him.
