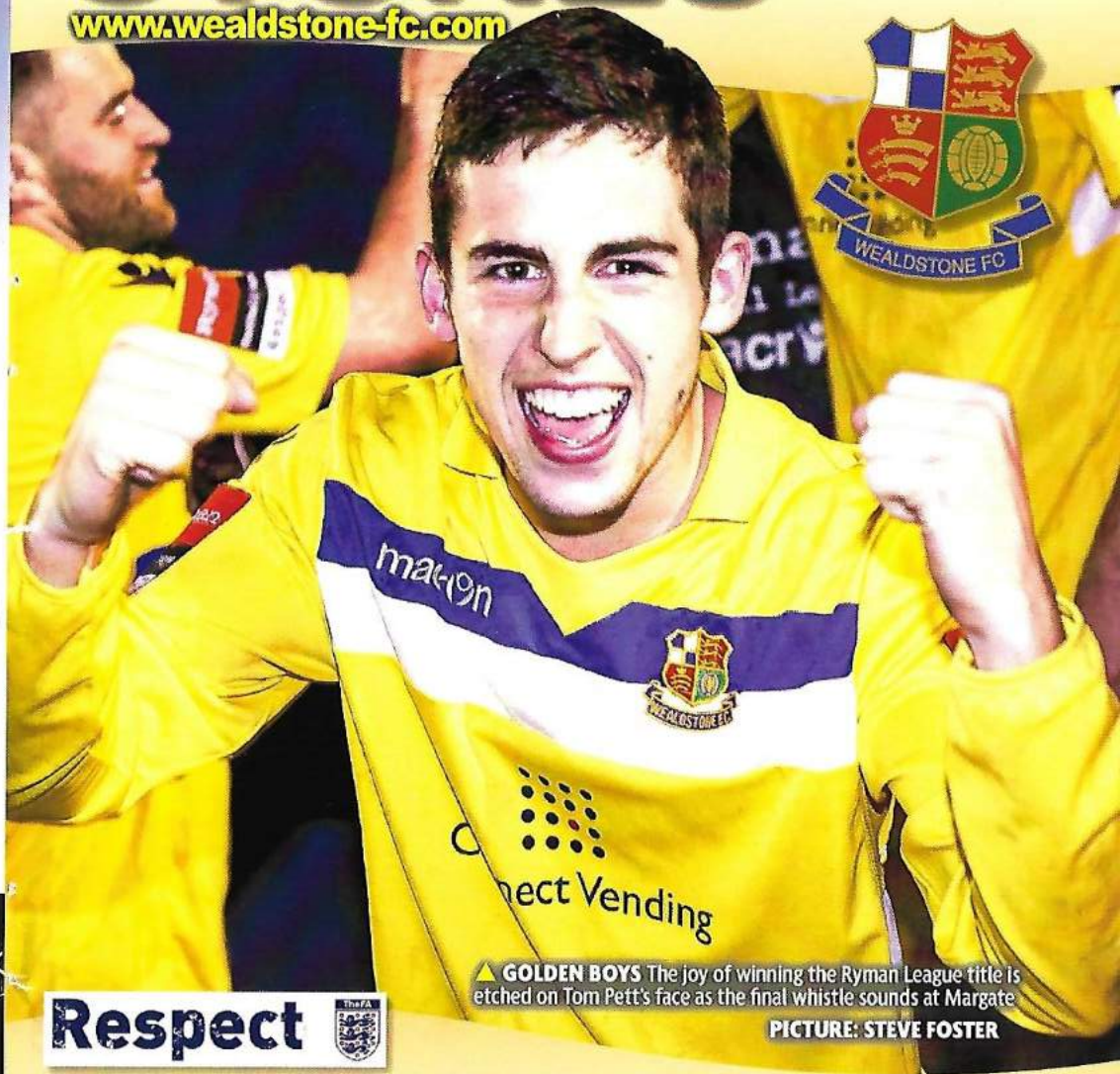

- Carrying items which may be considered a danger to others, including cans, bottles, or glasses containing alcoholic beverages;
- Throwing any article onto the field of play;
- Climbing floodlight pylons, fences, stands or any structure or building;
- Using obscene or bad language likely to cause offence to others;
- Using violence of any nature.

2) No spectator ball games.

3) The consumption of alcoholic drinks is permitted INSIDE the social club bar and boardroom areas.

4) Vehicles parked on the Grosvenor Vale site are at the owners' risk.

5) Wealdstone Football Club supports the FA's campaign on pyrotechnics (e.g. flares and smoke bombs). Any misuse of such items in and around the Ground will result in those responsible being asked to leave the Ground and, in line with football authority guidance, may result in a report to the Police, potential prosecution and a ban from the Club of up to three years.

## Match Report: Margate

# CHAMPIONS



Wealdstone are the Ryman League Premier Division champions. After a couple of weeks when the proverbial fat lady had teased us by warming up before disappointingly failing to break into song the crown was claimed on a nervous but ultimately joyous night on the Kent coast. And in something of a fairy tale the goal which sealed the title was scored by a young man called Charlie Penny. The teenager from South London, released by parent club Millwall during this loan spell at The Vale and who was dropped to the bench for this critical occasion popped up with the winner seven minutes from time. Victory meant events at Hampton where their only challengers Bognor were beaten were rendered irrelevant.

In keeping with recent weeks Stones looked weighed down by expectation from the start and Jonathan North needed to be alert with five minutes played, sprinting from goal to hack clear as Charles Ademenko closed in. Gordon Bartlett's men responded briefly with Tom Pett's cross headed over by Scott McGleish, but they were largely under the cosh and were mightily relieved to escape punishment on 24 minutes when Sam Rents' excellent cross from the left found Jefferson Louis unmarked at the far post. It was the sort of chance the experienced front-man has made a habit of burying down the years yet he shot wide from just a few yards out. Perhaps the footballing gods were preparing to smile on the men of the Vale. Moments later McGleish's

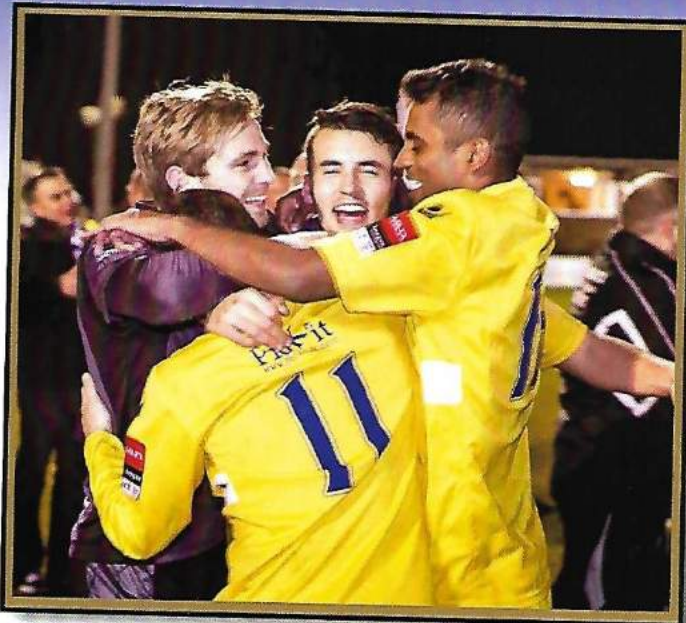
troublesome calf gave way again and he hobbled off to be replaced by Penny.

The only side who could deny Stones the title, Bognor were 2-0 down by now, but this news had not filtered onto the pitch where the visitors continued to struggle. Pett forced one save from Nikki Bull, but North produced a better one to deny Charlie Allen and Gate were close again before the interval when Ademenko's shot was deflected wide by Sean Cronin.

Stones emerged more composed after the break and Scott McCubbin went close with a shot from just outside the box as the visitors got more of a share of the ball.

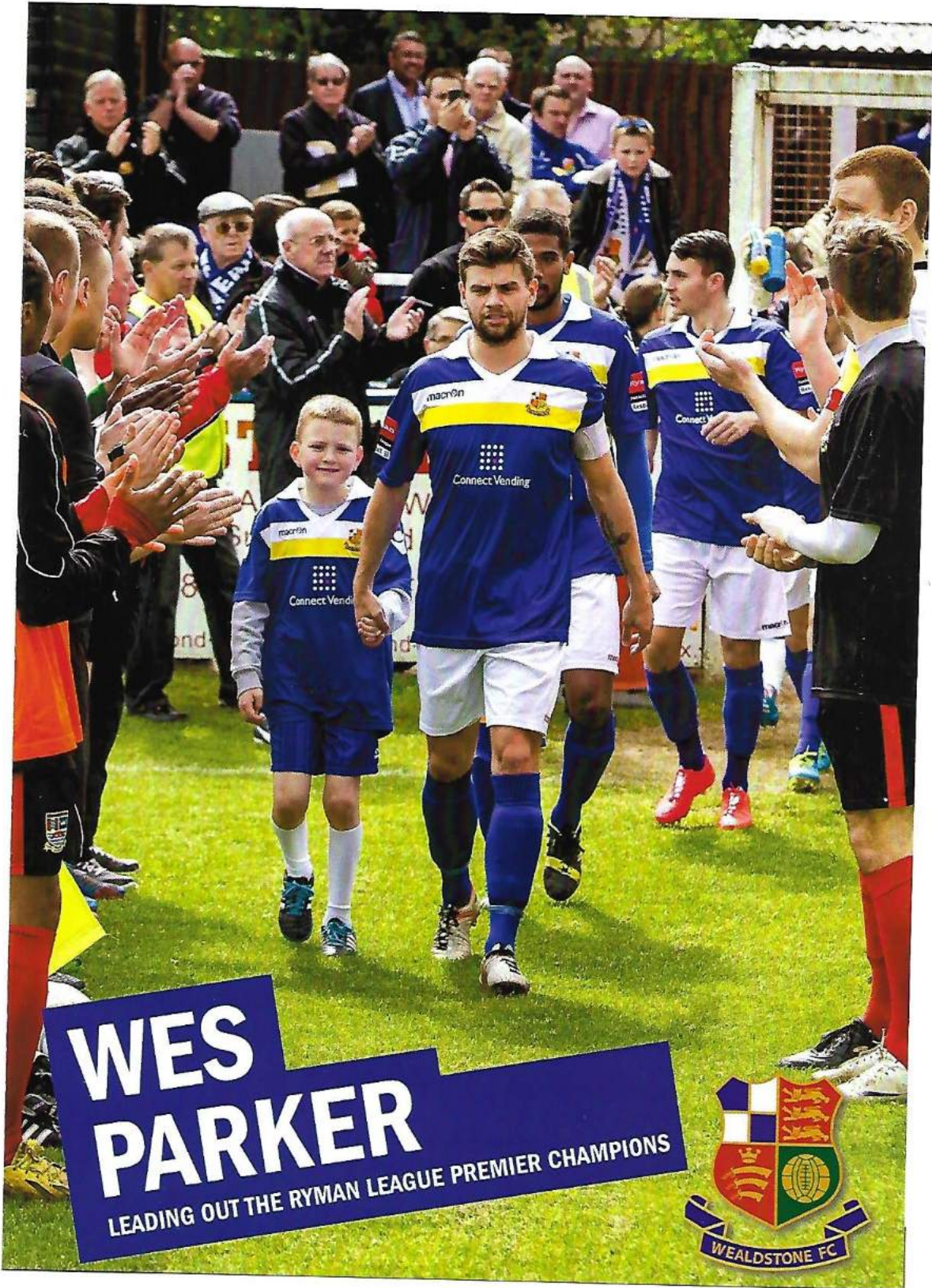
Hearts among the fans were lifted further by news of Hampton making it 3-1 at the

Beveree meaning promotion was tantalisingly within reach. A fourth soon afterwards cranked the volume another notch, but Margate caused a few flutters when Louis headed wide with 12 minutes to play. However, The roof lifted off with seven minutes left as Stones scored the goal which surely clinched the crown. Pett did the damage with an incisive run and when he slipped in Penny he rounded Bull and slid the ball home. The rest of the game was played in a party atmosphere and there was a lovely touch from Bartlett as stalwart Peter Dean was brought on from the bench to savour the last few minutes. The final whistle cued the inevitable pitch invasion, but it was all good natured on a historic night for the club. The Conference South awaits.

## Opposition History: Canvey Island



The Club was founded in 1926, but unfortunately most of the early records of the Club were lost in the devastating East Coast floods of 1953. The Club were very successful during their days in the local leagues, winning many cups and league championships in the process. During these years, the club appointed Denis Neville as manager, his first job after leaving his position as the Dutch National Team manager.

However, the club had drifted away towards the end of the 1980's, and the very existence of Canvey Island FC was in serious doubt. When it looked as though the end was near, local businessman and former Canvey player Jeff King took over as manager, as well as helping to generate funds to take the club forward.

Canvey enjoyed a meteoric rise up the football pyramid, the success starting in 1993 where The Gulls won the Essex Senior League and reached the semi-final of the FA Vase.

The Club then gained promotion to the Isthmian League in 1994 and won promotion from Division Three and Division Two in successive seasons. In 1995/96 after beating Conference team Hednesford Town in the FA Cup they reached the First Round Proper and drew 2-2 with Football League team Brighton & Hove Albion at Park Lane in front of a then ground record crowd of 3,400. The replay was lost at Brighton in front of a crowd of over 7,000. As well as winning Division Two the team were also winners of the Carlton Trophy and Thames-side Trophy.

The season 1998/99 was yet another exciting one for the supporters as the Club won the Division One championship and the Essex Senior Cup, beating Leyton Orient in the final. Season 1999/2000 was the Club's first season in the Premier Division of the Ryman League and they finished a very creditable fifth in the League and retained the Essex Senior Cup, defeating Purfleet in the Final.

The following season had seen the team win the FA Trophy by beating Forest Green Rovers 1-0 in the final in front of over 10,000 people at Villa Park and thousands more watching live on television. To win the FA Trophy they had to beat four Conference League teams in succession - Stevenage Borough, Telford United, Chester City (over two legs) and Forest Green. In previous rounds Canvey defeated Harlow Town, Northwood and Bilston Town. Earlier

in the season the Club had another great FA Cup run and after beating Braintree Town, King's Lynn and Cambridge City they were drawn against Port Vale from the Second Division of the Football League. In an exciting match at Park Lane they drew 4-4 after being 4-2 down with only two minutes left to play. However, even better was to follow as they went to Port Vale and beat them 2-1 after extra time. They were then drawn at home to Football League neighbours Southend United. To accommodate the number of people wishing to see the game, Canvey agreed to transfer the match to Southend's Roots Hall ground. A capacity crowd of 11,400 people saw the game, with record gate receipts for a game at Southend, and Canvey were narrowly beaten. These tremendous cup runs took their toll in the League. With a large number of matches being postponed on opponents' grounds because of waterlogged pitches, it meant they had to complete the season with ten league games in fifteen days and consequently dropped points that may have taken them to the league title and a place in the Conference League. However, it was still a fine performance to finish runners-up in their second season in the Premier Division.

The Club had enjoyed a then record-breaking season the following year when they reached the Third Round Proper of the FA Cup for the first time. On the way they beat five teams including two from the Second Division of the Football League, Wigan Athletic at the JJB Stadium, and Northampton Town in front of a full house at Park Lane and five million television viewers on 'Match of the Day Live'. Burnley finally knocked them out in a memorable game at

Turf Moor. They finished runners-up in the Ryman Premier League, despite winning thirty games and scoring 108 goals, and in defending the FA Trophy the team had a fine run before narrowly losing away to the eventual winners, Yeovil Town. The team did, however, end the season with silverware when winning the Essex Senior Cup, beating Dagenham & Redbridge in the final.

Canvey had another fine League season the previous year, finishing runners-up in the Ryman Premier League. Although this was another superb performance, finishing thirteen points clear of the third placed club, it was tinged with disappointment as it was the third season running the Club had finished runners-up in their quest to reach the Conference League. Towards the end of the season the Club had a ground record attendance of 3,553 when playing the eventual champions Aldershot Town in a midweek League game. However, the disappointment was a mark of how far the Club had progressed over the last decade, since winning the Essex Senior League.

The next season saw Canvey reach the goal they had been working towards for the previous four years, as they won the Ryman Premier League by a margin of nineteen points. Canvey also reached the FA Trophy final and the 1st Round of the FA Cup. The League was clinched at Easter with seven games still to play and the team finally finished with a total of 104 points. The FA Trophy run included wins over Conference teams Farnborough Town and Telford United, in the two-legged semi-final, before losing 3-2 in an exciting final at Villa Park against Hednesford United. After a fine run in the FA Cup the team was narrowly beaten at home 3-2 by Third Division neighbours Southend United, after a 1-1 draw at Roots Hall.

Canvey's first season in the Conference they finished in 18th position in the League table, achieving their initial aim of consolidation. The season started well with a draw at Carlisle United, in front of a 7,000 crowd, on the opening day and just one defeat in the first seven games, against the eventual champions Barnet. After this the Club lost some key players through injury for several months and struggled in the middle part of the season but came back strongly at the end to seal their status for a second season. The following season saw the club achieve it's highest ever league position, as they earned a respectable 14th place. However, the lack of success compared to previous seasons had taken its toll on the attendances, so much so that Jeff King made the decision to withdraw his financial and footballing interests from the club. However, the supporters of the club rallied together to allow the team to continue playing the following year in the Ryman League Division 1 North.

John Batch take over as manager for the 2006/07 campaign, with his reserve side from the previous

season making up the bulk of the squad. A learning curve for all concerned very nearly ended up in promotion, though The Gulls narrowly missed out on a playoff place, finishing 6th on the last day of the season.

Canvey went one better the following season, gaining promotion to the Ryman Premier League through the Playoffs. A run of 5 wins from our final 6 games earned us a place in the playoffs, and after beating AFC Sudbury away 3-2 after extra time, The Gulls travelled to Redbridge for the final. After the match finished 1-1 after extra time, Canvey won a nailbiting penalty shootout 5-4 to earn promotion. During this season, Canvey also knocked out Ryman Premier League side Maidstone United from the FA Trophy, and reached the final of the Essex Thameside Trophy.

The 2008/09 season saw The Gulls return to the Ryman Premier League after an absence of 4 years. After being in and around the playoff positions for the majority of the season, Canvey eventually finished in a credible 12th position, completing a memorable double over rivals Billericay Town in the process (4-0 at home, 4-2 away). The following season was a disappointment in comparison, with Canvey in and around the playoffs at Christmas only to fall away and finish 16th come the end of the season, a place which they consolidated the following year.

The 2010/11 season was a vast improvement, and a superb second half of the season saw Canvey finish in 6th position, missing out on the playoff places on goal difference.

Manager John Batch stood down in January 2012, with the club lying in 10th place in the Ryman Premier League. Then first team coach Glen Alzapiedi took over as manager, with Batch remaining with the club in his role as a Director.

In April 2012 The Gulls won the Essex Senior Cup for the first time in a decade with a 1-0 victory against League One side Colchester United at Thurrock FC's Ship Lane. Having defeated another Football League side, Dagenham & Redbridge, on penalties in the semi-finals, a headed goal from Rob King with 7 minutes to play won Canvey the cup without having conceded a goal throughout the competition.

Alzapiedi left the club in July 2012 and was replaced by former-Canvey captain Steve Tilson, who led the club to an 8th place finish. However, Tilson and his assistant Craig Davidson were relieved of their duties at the end of the season, with popular striker Danny Heale given the job shortly afterwards.

### What or who persuaded you to become a Stones fan?

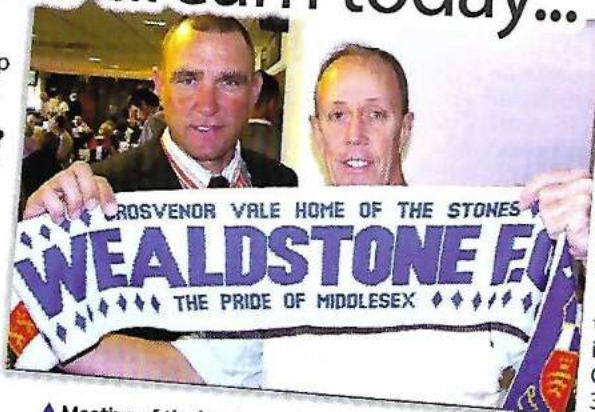
Not sure if anyone persuaded me but i was certainly impressed at my first game. The support as always was superb.

## Match Report: Kingstonian The Hangover



Sometimes football has a nasty habit of biting you in the most awkward of places and often when it is least expected. Saturday at The Vale was one of those unfortunate occasions and played out in the most ironic of circumstances.

Wealdstone had just been rightly and proudly crowned Champions of the Ryman Premier only a few days previously at Margate. The scene was set for the joyous crowd of just under 900 to fully celebrate a coming home and to put the icing on the cake against, albeit, a tough looking encounter with play off hopefuls Kingstonian. And although things started off in the expected way with a fine

guard of honour by the K's players welcoming the triumphant Stones players onto the lush Vale pitch, things went badly awry with the early and shock dismissal of 'keeper Jonathan North.

Happily, of course, in the bigger picture, this result is rendered meaningless except that, significantly, Stones excellent goal keeper Jonathan North will now be suspended and unavailable for the Middlesex Senior Cup Final on Saturday May 3

North collided with Ks Matthew Drage in the area when attempting to punch the ball away but with the big centre half collapsing like a sack of spuds the Referee Mr Howard had no

hesitation in showing North a straight red and awarding the penalty much to the amusement of gloating Ks fans in the Bulla Stand end whose insulting taunts toward Glen Little as he left the stage did not go unnoticed.

Substitute Sean Cronin on in place of the sacrificed Jonny Wright, bravely donned the keepers gloves - not for the first time in his Wealdstone career - but this time there was to be no happy ending as Stones were eventually given a bit of a hiding by a Kingstonian side that were never going to let this golden opportunity pass them by to cement their play-off place. Stones shape and momentum

went pretty much out of the window in a torrid first half as the away side took full advantage.

Stones rallied well in the second half and even dominated possession but the K's picked off the home side on the break making full use of their numerical advantage. Stones biggest problem was holding the ball up long enough for a deep midfield to form attacks and young Penny struggled all afternoon against hulking defenders who out muscled him time and again.

After Ks Andre McCollin had dispatched the penalty it was pretty much one way traffic in the first half despite Wealdstone's valiant efforts to pull the game around.

Things got worse for the home side a few minutes after the

penalty drama when, ironically, Matthew Drage flicked the ball in at the near post from a corner leaving Cronin helpless and picking the ball out of the net for a second time.

But Stones galvanised themselves really well in the second half and Luke Pigden's long range strike was saved brilliantly by Rob Tolfrey. Charlie Penny finally wriggled free and also went close but with a man down the away side were able to break very effectively and always looked likely to add to the scoreline. But despite Cronin pulling off a great save, McCollin added his second and Ks third on 66 minutes and the scoring was wrapped up by sub Sam Akinde at the death with a tap in with Stones defence under constant

pressure late on.

So not what the Stones faithful expected or wanted but at least they will not have to worry about play-offs and that dreadful tension and drama this time around because, for them, it's all done and dusted.

## History set in stone: Terry Hissey

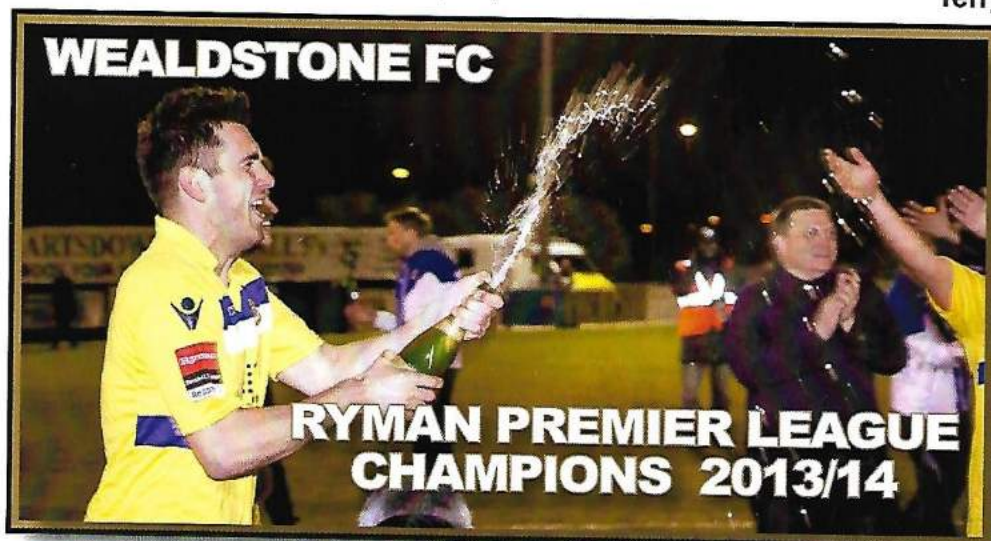

# Who remembers Nick 'stepover' Salapatas and his party tricks at Hendon?



**Saturday April 26 2008,  
Ryman League Premier  
Division: Hendon 1  
Wealdstone 2**

ONLY a week earlier, this final game of the season, at Hendon's atmospheric old Claremont Roar ground, promised to be a grim afternoon for the relegation-haunted Stones.

But after we had beaten Leyton 2-0 on the penultimate day at Northwood (our last-ever match ground-sharing) the news came through that all our rivals had lost... and so, for the first time in four years we went into the last game of the season without the worry of falling through the Prem Division trapdoor. Plus we had the prospect of moving into Grosvenor Vale that summer... a daunting prospect, given the amount of work that needed doing to bring the stadium and pitch up to scratch, but still an exciting one.

Thus, the trip to Hendon turned into a bit of a party. Unless I'm completely bonkers, I also seem to recall that it was the occasion of a fundraising walk that day. We certainly had around 200 fans at Claremont Road and all the pressure turned onto our hosts, who needed victory to secure a play-off place and the chance of promotion to Confer-

ence South, after a season in which they had been in the top five for all but a couple of weeks.

The Greens had beaten runaway champions Chelmsford 2-1 and Staines Town 2-0 in their two previous games - thanks to three goals from Davis Haule - to, er, haul themselves into the frame. See what I did there? Veteran striker Davis Haule was the Hendon dangerman... but the Stones, playing with a joyous sense of liberation, played some lovely football to fully deserve the shock win.

Haule, of course, joined the Stones the following season in

tandem with the inspired loan signing of one Marvin Sordell from Watford, and their goals were the main reason our first campaign at Ruislip was transformed from disaster to success.

But back to that spring afternoon at Claremont Road. Most people remember it for the devastating impact that debutant substitute Nick Salapatas had on the game - Gordon Bartlett making a double change with 20 minutes remaining, Salapatas coming on for the ineffective Graeme Montgomery and the lively Ben Clarke replacing James Gray. We had taken the lead

through a Dean Papali penalty – and our ex-AFC Hayes hitman had a terrific record from the spot - though the award was a little strange, defender Jack Page fouling Peter Dean as they jostled in the six-yard box following a contested freekick.

But back to Salapatas. Suddenly we had a Greek, orange-booted winger performing tricks up the left wing in direct contrast to the lethargic Monty. Salapatas's step-over count had reached double-figures by the time the youngster struck the decisive blow with seven minutes of normal time left on the clock. Dean attacked down the Wealdstone right, rolling the ball across the penalty area into the path of Salapatas, whose curving first-time strike flew past Wilmot, crashed against the inside of the post and into the net.

'Niko' certainly milked the applause, and rightly so for he had exploded onto the Wealdstone scene in brilliant fashion. Hendon pulled a goal back in stoppage time but their play-off dream had already died elsewhere, with Ramsgate winning their game to join Staines, AFC Wimbledon and AFC Hornchurch in the play-offs.... which the Wombles won to join Chelmsford City in Conference South. How many light years away did that seem in 2008?

### WHAT HAPPENED NEXT?

Well, Nick Salapatas appeared a few times

early next season for The Stones – our first season at Grosvenor Vale – and showed a lot of promise, particularly at Dartford where we snatched a 2-2 draw thanks to his clever wing-play and two goals from Steve Hughes. But

then he just sort of faded into the background in a classic case of 'no end-product'. The Vale is pretty scenic but have a look at this (below)... that game took place in what must be one of the most idyllic settings in world football. Kisamokis Stadium, in Chania, Crete, overlooks the Aegean Sea. And no terracing or stands on that side of the ground to spoil the view!

Good luck Niko, see you back at the Vale in a few years for a bit of Wealdstone 'Legends' action....

# Memories are made of successful promotion campaigns

Finally, congratulations are in order from your Rotherham correspondent. It wouldn't be a Stones season - even one with a monumentally successful outcome like this one - if they didn't put the fans through the wringer a bit, so the shredded nerves before the big clincher at Margate were sort of inevitable. But the record books won't show the nerves. What they will show, as they invariably do, is that the best team won the league and the rest is just so much hot air. So, if this doesn't sound too much like something from Harry the Hack's Non-League Notebook, well done Wealdstone. I'm delighted for all and any who were part of it.

Despite my interest in all things WFC, which is now into its third decade, I've only experienced promotion in person once. That was in

This article celebrates promotions - and Wealdstone have just been promoted. You may have heard about it.

1998, on a Tuesday night against Edgware at the White Lion. Despite being nominally the away side of the groundsharing duo, Wealdstone provided about 98% of the support. More importantly they provided 100% of the goals, two of them to be precise, to set up a joyous drink up in the Change of Hart after the game that the players fully participated in. Not surprisingly, my Millers promotions across 42 years are a bit more numerous, and I can remember them all with the same mix of

accuracy and affection with which Andie McDowell's character lists her old boyfriends in that scene in *Four Weddings and a Funeral*.

For the first one, from the fourth tier in 1975, I was 10. It was most memorable for being coupled with a Sheffield Wednesday relegation, eliminating at a stroke the two division gap between us and making sure we would meet the following season in league action for the first time since I was born.

The second, in 1981, followed five

nondescript years in the old third division, when we rose above the mediocre just once. That was in 1977, when we suffered the heart-break of missing out on goal difference after choking a promotion that looked nailed on with six games to go. But in the summer of 1980, things changed. We brought in Ronnie Moore and Tony Towner. We smashed our transfer record twice. We won the league by two points, the first time we had finished top of anything for 30 years. It was also the first season ITV had been allowed to show highlights in the traditional Match of the Day slot on Saturdays, and the final game, the 2-1 win at home to Plymouth that sealed the title, was shown on Yorkshire TV within six hours of the final whistle.

The next two promotions, 1989 and 1992, were both from the basement after we had slid all the way back down to the bottom division. I got excited at the time, but it was tempered by a feeling that it was a bit of business to get us back to our natural level.

By 2000, our next promotion and another from the old fourth division,

I felt rather differently, The 1997 relegation team had been the worst in the history of the club and it was obvious that Ronnie Moore – now back as manager – faced a rebuilding job. To his credit, he missed out on the play offs only in the final game of his first season, and got us to the play offs themselves in his second. I was so gutted at that defeat I promised myself I would watch all 46 games of the millennium campaign. And I did – seeing both the 2-1 win at Hartlepool that got us up and the less than savoury 1-1 draw with Swansea that deprived us of the title on the final day.

After a summer of hoping we could do enough to finish 20th, we then went straight up to the Championship. And if Radio 4 ever allows you to take a DVD of a football match onto the desert island with you instead of a book, Rotherham 2 Brentford 1, complete with Alan Lee’s last minute winner, would be my choice.

All of which led to the longest wait between promotions so far – 12 years until April 2013. I was on the way back from holiday, so I missed the Aldershot game. For the first

time, I got the good news from Jeff Stelling, then spent the rest of the night waiting for the Football League Show and watching the goals on YouTube.

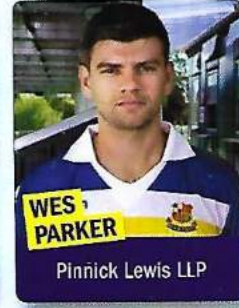
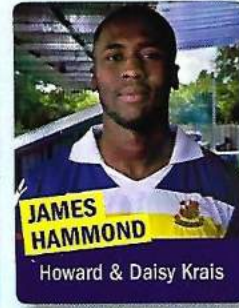
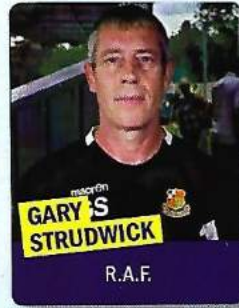
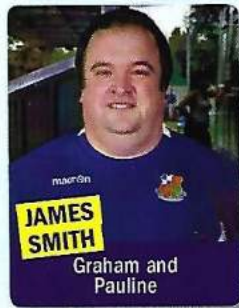
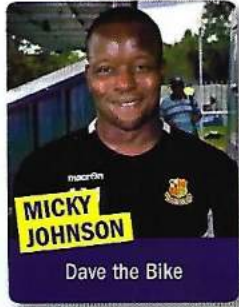
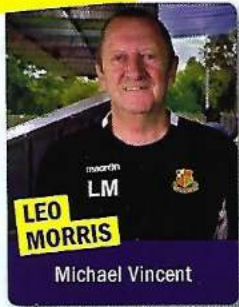
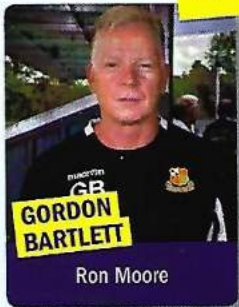
