

"ROBIN"

Robin Keith Wainwright was born on 9 March 1951 in Luton, where he still resides with his wife Heidi and his four children, Lee, Luke, Lara and Jake. Robin works at a Luton Sports Centre where he is the assistant Manager.

His footballing career began in 1967 when he joined Luton as an apprentice. He signed professional forms at the age of 17 and remained at Kenilworth Road for four years making over 30 first team appearances. He played under Alan Brown, Alex Stock and Harry Haslam before transferring to Millwall in 1972. He spent two years in the reserve team at the Den before moving to Northampton on a month's loan, before Bill Dodgin signed him and he proceeded to play 25 games for the 'Cobblers'.

At the end of that season, Robin decided to make the break from League Football and joined Dunstable, who were then managed by John Moore. Two years later he moved south to Hillingdon Borough who were managed by one Barry Fry. Barry left only 3 weeks later and was succeeded by Jim Langley whose reign lasted two years before Allen Batsord took over. In 1979, Alan Fogarty made a successful bid for Rob and his Wealdstone career began. He made his debut in our first ever Alliance match, at Worcester on 18 August 1979, and the No. 6 shirt has had a familiar name against it ever since . . .

F.A. Trophy Final v. Boston. A dream come true to play at Wembley and win the Final.

STEVE FOSTER: (30) Born Portsmouth. Portsmouth 127 apps 8 goals; Brighton 200 apps 8 goals; Aston Villa 17 apps 3 goals; Luton Town 111 apps 8 goals.

MARVIN JOHNSON: Born Wembley. Former Luton Youth player. Turned pro last season.

GARY COBB: (19) Born Charlton. 2 appearances. Broke through to the first team at the end of last season after many fine Combination appearances.

MARK STEIN: (21) Born South Africa. 32 apps 10 goals. 2 England Youth caps. Brother of Brian and Eddie Stein, who is with Barnet.

BRIAN STEIN: (30) Born South Africa. Formerly with Edgware. 410 app and 132 goals. 11 Full England caps and 3 under 21 caps. Division 2 winners 1982.

RICKY HILL: (28) 445 appearances 57 goals. 3 Full England caps. Division 2 winners 1982. Joined Luton direct from school and now in 12th season at Kenilworth Road.

DAVID PREECE: (24) Born Bridgnorth. 86 app 6 goals. Joined Luton December 1984, and scored on his debut against Aston Villa. Firm favourite with the crowd. Formerly with Walsall, where he made 134 appearances.

RICKY McEVOY: (20) Born Gibraltar. Eire Youth player. Debut v. Watford last season. Loaned to Cambridge Utd. for experience.

AARON TIGHE: (18) Born Dublin. Skilful left midfielder yet to make league debut.

WELCOME BACK "THE DOUBLE WINNERS"...

BOB ILES: Now holds the record for most league and cup appearances for a Wealdstone keeper, 188. Actually scored v. Orient in a Capital League match. Now with Yeovil.

STEVE PERKINS: "Polly" made 200 appearances for the Stones, scoring 2 goals! Formerly with Chelsea, Q.P.R. and Wimbledon, he is now assistant Manager at Tooting.

ROY DAVIES: The one and only Roy Davies made 142 appearances, scoring 10 goals. Threw his shoes over the stand at Lower Mead after the trophy was won.

DENNIS BYATT: A fine servant to this club, and now with 310 Wealdstone appearances. Previously with Fulham and Northampton Town.

PAUL BOWGETT: Formed a brilliant centre-back partnership with Dennis. Paul now has 398 appearances for the Stones and was captain for the Southern League Championship year and the 'Double Year'.

BRIAN GREENAWAY: This former Fulham player made 193 appearances for the Stones scoring 32 goals. Took the corner that led to our first goal at Wembley (!)

LEE HOLMES: 121 appearances and 35 goals in his 2½ years with Wealdstone. Scored second goal at Wembley. Also holds Trophy winners medal with Enfield. Now with Dagenham.

ALAN CORDICE: The incomparable Alan, now sadly retired, made 281 appearances and scored 97 goals. Defenders never stood a chance with his searing pace. 9 England Semi-pro caps.

ANDY GRAHAM: Goalscorer extraordinaire. Virtually every goal he scored was special, particularly his one at Wembley. Only 53 appearances, but 23 goals. Our loss is Wycombe's gain, his current club.

GARY DONNELLAN: "Donners" made 163 appearances and scored 36 goals at Lower Mead. Four seasons here before joining Yeovil. Button salesman.

MARK GRAVES: Superb goalscorer, scoring 138 in his 252 appearances for the Stones. Was leading goalscorer in each of his 5 seasons at Lower Mead. Now with Hayes.

NEIL CORDICE: Wonderful career at Lower Mead, and actually made his league debut with Robin Wainwright in August 1979. 96 goals in 331 appearances. Now with Yeovil.

NIGEL JOHNSON: Nigel made 262 appearances for Wealdstone, and scored 87 goals. Happy at either midfield or up front. Now with St. Albans City.

AND SPECIAL GUEST STARS:

STUART PEARCE: Little introduction is required for Stuart who has developed into one of the best defenders in Britain. Left Wealdstone for Coventry and is now captain of Notts Forest.

VINCE JONES: Vincent signed from Herts County side Bedmond and made 63 appearances before his transfer to Wimbledon in Nov 86 where he has certainly made name for himself!

When I was asked to write a few words about Robin Wainwright, I cannot honestly say that it is merely a pleasure but in fact a privilege and honour to speak about not only the player but the person, and also a friend.

I first knew Robin when he played at Hillingdon Borough in the Southern League, and that came about by his playing against Wimbledon who were in those days of the same status. How times change!! Not so in the case of Robin.

He was often regarded as a "luxury" type player, however, I make no secret of the fact that he immediately went onto the shopping list when I joined the staff at Slough Town F.C. but loyal Robin remained at what was then the most senior of non-league levels.

He was transferred to Wealdstone when Alam Batsford took over at Hillingdon, and as you all know, Alam became Manager at Wealdstone in December, 1980. This is not a point which should be brushed under the carpet, as it is a fact and part of football that some managers do not "fancy" certain players, and some players do not "fancy" certain managers, and although this was never in fact stated, I had my honest suspicions that neither of these characters, and they are both characters, would have bought shares in the Mutual Admiration Society! I remember quite clearly making a bee-line for Robin, as it had also arrived as coach, and informing him that I had already read his mind, but that he should remain at Wealdstone. this proved to be one of my most important speeches, and I think one of Robin's best decisions to date. As a result Wealdstone Football Club did pretty well also, because the examples of fitness, enthusiasm, discipline and general demeanour which were displayed rubbed off on to the rest of a very successful non-league squad, which I hope you will be welcoming back tonight.

He joined in every part of the game, including the social life, with Hildi his lovely wife, and in fact Lee one of his four children, who was just as a ball-boy as Robin was a player. I shall never forget one of our fancy dress players' discos when Robin arrived as a Zulu Warrior, complete with spear and shield and even then such was his dedication to the cause, he was totally unrecognisable. His other claim to social fame was in fact a speech made by him on the night of the famous "Double Celebration Dinner". The speech lasted about half an hour, told us absolutely nothing, and had everbody falling about laughing, but to this day we still don't know what we were in stitches about! Probably that secret thing in life called delivery.

Delivery is possibly one of those words which could be used to describe Robin. As a trainer, as a player, as an enthusiast, an organiser, a person, a father, a friend, and now a prominent speech maker, he has never failed, but always DELIVERED the goods with 100% effort and determination.

It is because of those fine qualities that I opened this article by saying that apart from giving me pleasure I was honoured and privileged to write about him. Robin Wainwright has been a credit to the game of football, and I offer him my heartiest congratulations on such a fine career. Let's all enjoy an evening never to be forgotten.

The word that comes to mind to describe Robin Wainwright is that he is a gentleman. Quite simply in a world of selfish and greedy footballers, his attitude and ability stands head and shoulders above others. Since joining Wealdstone in 1979, when a record fee for one single player was paid, Robin has grown steadily in the hearts of the Wealdstone supporters. Though this wasn't true in the early years, when Robin would be the first to admit he was not too popular on the terraces. The problem is that the average supporter likes a player who runs around like a headless chicken, because it appears he is trying so hard, rather than someone who can trap, control and pass the ball in one movement, throwing in a pirouette or two. However, Robin has managed to turn the crowd around, culminating in him winning the supporters' club player of the year award in 1986. He won the award if for no other reason than you know, whether we are winning or losing, playing well or badly, title-clinching match or Capital League game, that Robin is always giving all he's got.

Who can forget Robin's antics when we won the Gola League Championship at Kettering. When Andy Graham scored our winning goal, rather than celebrate with the players or the 700 strong army of travelling Stones fans, he decided to run towards the corner flag and then up the touchline celebrating wildly. Or when he was lifted and held head high by ecstatic fans after the FA Trophy semi-final, or his speech at the end of season players meal in 1985. But my favourite moment was when he led the sing song while crouched on a table, on Trophy final night in Morritts. That just emphasised how important it was for him to be successful for this club. Robin's so involved with this club that one of his sons is an ardent supporter, while two other of his childm have been mascots, even though they live in

The first thing I said was that Robin was a gentleman. He is one of the most approachable players in the squad, always willing to have a chat with any supporter, young or old. His friendliness was illustrated to me personally earlier on this season. On the day Wealdstone played Rayners Lane in a friendly, 'Stones were also involved in a five-a-side competition at the Luton Regional Sports Centre in Stopsley. Robin is the manager at the Centre and has organised the competition for the past three years. With the Stones already involved in a match, our small squad was stretched beyond the limit. So, Robin invited three supporter's club players to make up the side, alongside himself, Paul Bowgett and Robbie O'Keefe. Wealdstone only failed on goal difference to qualify for the final stages, even with the three SFC Wealdstone players. Even in such a "friendly" competition, Robin's will to win was unbelievable, he was shouting at and encouraging players all the time. The most impressive part was even though he was involved the whole day in organising and running the tournament, he still found time to see if we were alright, enjoying the event and personally thanked us for coming along and helping him.

So Robin, I hope you have a very successful night, and how about a sing-song at your Testimonial disco?


