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ALAN CORDICE - A TRIBUTE

I believe it was Manager Ken Payne who introduced Alan Cordice to Wealdstone Football Club. Certainly I can well remember Alan's first appearances when expectations of his ability were already high due to the success at Lower Mead of his brother Neil.

Alan's blistering pace was immediately noticeable. But we had seen other players who had shown pace, only to then fail where it mattered - in front of goal. What lay ahead for Alan and for us...? Little did we realise, or even faintly hope, in those early games, what lay ahead for us in terms of pure entertainment and excitement! There is no doubt to me, as was the case with the great George Duck, that at Wealdstone we were privileged in that we not only had a very special player on our books but that we had a player we saw perform at his peak and actually WIN things for the Club and himself. No way was Alan Cordice, as with others, playing for us in the twilight of a career established and preserved at "another" club. Alan has given Wealdstone FC the best years of his playing career and we, as spectators, have been lucky enough to have enjoyed those years. And, of course, the story is not yet finished because, as in a "fairy tale" the great man returned to us last year and he has shown us that he has lost none of his appetite for the game, nor little of that awesome pace!

Alan, of course, has achieved many things at Wealdstone. Not least a fine spell as an England Non-League International player. Alan was instrumental in winning us promotion back to the Alliance Premier League under Alan Batsford - what a great season that was! There is no doubt that the playing system initiated by Batsford and built upon by Brian Hall suited Alan perfectly - the "long ball" played into space designed for Alan's pace and poise on the ball.

One of the great things I always admired (and still do) about Alan was his temperament. He was constantly "chopped, "hacked" and "scythed" but usually he got the better of his agricultural-like opponent defenders, usually in the area, and usually resulting in a converted penalty!!

Yes it was Alan, let's not forget, who won us the Southern League championship Shield versus Nuneaton. His was the final penalty that won us the "shoot out" and the coveted Shield! Happy days! The number of truly memorable goals are too many to mention. As you've probably gathered by now, I could go on and on! Suffice it to say that Alan will go down as one of the all time greats of this Club of ours. Absolutely deservedly so.

And if you're reading this article Alan, remember we still need you mate, don't end the story yet Here's to Alan Cordice, a Wealdstone great!

PS. My greetings to Brian Hall and his Yeovil team tonight. It should be a great reunion - Wealdstone past-v-Wealdstone present (well almost!).

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ALAN'S RECORD WITH WEALDSTONE

Alan joined Wealdstone from Norwich City during the summer of 1980 and has played in more than 300 games scoring over 100 goals. A summary of his time at Lower Mead season by season follows:

1980/81: Alan made his debut on Saturday 2nd August 1980 in a Middlesex Charity Cup tie against Edgware Town here at Lower Mead. The match ended 1-1 with Fred Barwick scoring our goal. Alan's other team mates that day were Ian Cranstone, Paul Brannigan, Tom Murphy, Paul Bowgett, Robin Wainwright, John Watson, Paul Robinson, Nigel Johnson and Clevere Ford. A fortnight later Alan made his league debut scoring our third goal as we beat Telford United 4-0. We had to wait another six months before Alan scored his second goal in this 33rd major game for the club. Altogether he played 47 of the 49 league and cup matches we took part in and scored six goals plus another two in a friendly against Wycombe Wanderers.

1981/82: Having been relegated at the end of the previous season we won everything the Southern League had to offer. Alan played a major part in our success making 58 appearances during the season and finishing up as our leading goalscorer with 38 goals, 26 of them in the league. During the early part of the season we hit 26 goals in just six successive League and F.A. Cup matches, Alan's share being 12 including a hat-trick against Dunstable. In March he scored four times in a 6-0 win against Folkestone.

1982/83: A successful return to the Alliance Premier League saw Wealdstone finish in third position. Alan made 49 appearances in league and cup and scored 20 goals. Although Mark Graves finished ahead of Alan in the goalscorers chart many of his goals were made by Alan Cordice.

1983/84: Another good season for Wealdstone, fourth position being achieved in the Alliance Premier League. Alan made exactly 50 appearances in various league and cup matches and scored 11 goals.

1984/85: Our "double" season, the League Championship and F.A. Trophy. Alan again played a major part with 55 appearances and 17 goals. Two of these goals were vital as we beat Scarborough (1-0) and Runcorn (1-0) here at Lower Mead on Saturday and Sunday 30th & 31st March 1985 respectively. Alan hit all three goals in our 3-3 draw with Worcester City and completed a wonderful season by being voted "Player of the Season" by members of the Supporters Club.

1985/86: The season turned sour for Alan on Wednesday 30th October 1985 in a Capital League match against Gillingham. Crashing into the wall in front of the Elmslie Stand he received a nasty injury which put him out of the game for over four months. He returned to make just four more appearances late in the season. Altogether he played in 21 matches and scored 3 goals. At the end of the season Alan decided to retire from the game, his record since joining Wealdstone in 1980 consisting of 281 appearances and 97 goals.

1987/88: There was great news for all Wealdstone supporters when it was revealed that Alan Cordice had been persuaded to come out of retirement and play once again. His first match back was on Saturday 19th December 1987 in an F.A. Trophy tie at Banbury United which ended 2-2. The following Saturday we recorded our first away win of the season 2-1 at Dagenham, Alan scoring one of our goals. In our final G.M. Vauxhall Conference match of the season Alan scored his 100th goal for the club as we went down 3-1 at home to Maidstone United. During the season he made 15 appearances and scored three times.

1988/89: To date this season Alan has played in 38 matches and scored nine goals. He made his 300th appearance in our Capital League Fixture at Aylesbury United on Wednesday 31st August. Four days earlier Alan had come on as substitute in our match at Bedworth and scored our first goal in a 2-1 win. Until recently this was our only away win in the league this season. Unfortunately another serious injury, this time at Merthyr Tydfil, has put Alan out of action for the last couple of months.

We hope it wont be too long before he returns to the action and adds to his record of 334 appearances and 109 goals for the 'Stones. Since we turned professional in 1971 only five players (Robin Wainwright 427, Paul Bowgett 422, George Duck 370, Dennis Byatt 345 and John Watson 341) have appeared more times and only George Duck (251) and Mark Graves (138) have scored more goals.



BRIAN HALL ... ON ALAN CORDICE

Good evening and hello again to those of you that I haven't spoken to for some two and a half years now

It is once again a pleasure to pen a few lines about one of the all time Wealdstone Favourites - Alan Cordice. It is also indeed a privilege to return to Lower Mead with Yeovil Town, and we all thank you for the invitation. I am certain that "All our Yesterdays" will be brought up during the evening, and no doubt previous Wealdstone v Yeovil encounters will be discussed at great length. And why not? They were

days not to be forgotten - not yet anyway! They were the good days of healthy competition and I believe they were ENJOYED! I would like to re-live those past occasions this evening, and ask EVERYONE here to ENJOY themselves to make it a happy night for Alan.

Alan Cordice is a player who has provided hours of enjoyment to most non league followers. To me as a Manager I derived the same plesure, but often tinged with frustration. I'm not sure whether it was Alan that frustrated me, as because of his speed, many sides persistently played him offside.

Many strikers or goalscorers are often referred to as "prima-donners" or "posers" inside the game, but this could never be said about Mr Alan Cordice. I have witnessed the 'treatment' handed out to him on the field, and have been in the dressing room afterwards when repairs have been carried out. But by the next game, that name would appear in the programme sending shudders of fear into the opposition dressing room. Yes, I will confess that he was probably one of a few players that I would select even if he was only 80% fit. He terrified defenders with his pace and normally by the 70th minute had run them into the ground and scored a goal or two into the bargain!

Despite rumours (often brought about by envy!) Alan was never a difficult player to handle or motivate - He did it himself. He was, and is, a winner, and a winning part of the jigsaw in a team made up of winners.

An absolute credit to the England Semi-Professional side an absolute credit to Wealdstone Football Club, and an absolute credit to Football. The biggest tribute that I personally can pay is the reply I once gave when asked about him. It was "Alan Cordice? Whew, what a player!"

INTRODUCING THE WEALDSTONE XI

In addition to our present squad of players, we welcome tonight some players of the past.....

Paul Bowgett:

Originally with Tottenham Hotspur he moved to Wimbledon and played 41 times for them. Joined Wealdstone in August 1980 and was Captain of "double" winning side. Left Wealdstone at end of last season to take up post of Player/Manager of Baldock Town. Made 422 appearances for Wealdstone scoring 65 goals, and was voted "Player of the Year" in 1981/82.

Robin Wainwright:

Joined Wealdstone from Hillingdon Borough in the summer of 1979. Gained league experience with Luton Town, Cambridge United, Millwall and Northampton. Was our 1985/86 "Player of the Year" and made 427 appearances for Wealdstone scoring 43 goals. Now with Paul Bowgett at Baldock.

Mark Graves:


Superb goalscorer scoring 138 goals in 252 appearances for Wealdstone. Signed from Plymouth Argyle at start of 1982/83 season having made 33 Football League appearances for the Devon Club. Voted "Player of the Year" in 1982/83 he was leading goalscorer in each of his five seasons at Wealdstone. Now with Hayes.


John Watson:

Joined Wealdstone in 1973 after experience with West Ham, Charlton & Durban City. Made 341 appearances for us. Scoring 12 goals and was "Player of the Year" in 1976/77. Transferred to Scarborough in November 1980 for what was then a record transfer fee between two non-league clubs of £12,000.

Roy Davies:

Made over 100 appearances for Reading, Torquay & Wimbledon before joining Wealdstone from Hayes in January 1982. Had an outstanding game for us in F.A. Trophy Final against Boston at Wembley Stadium in 1985. Appeared 142 times for Wealdstone and scored 10 goals.

INTRODUCING YEOVIL TOWN

Peter Conning: Yeovil splashed out a club record fee of £13,000 on 3rd March to secure this highly rated midfielder from Weymouth.

Denny Mundee: On loan from AFC Bournemouth. Previously with QPR, as an apprentice and Swindon Town.

Guy Whitingham: Signed from Waterlooville last November. Free-scoring striker. Micky Spencer: Striker signed from Wokingham Town in January.

Len Bond: This experienced and popular 'keeper was snapped up from Bath City during the close season. Born locally, he has also seen service with Weymouth and Exeter City, where he now lives.

Neil Cordice: One of a number of ex-Wealdstone 'double' players on the books. Only just made it though coming on in the 89th minute at Wembley in the Trophy Final. Previously with Wycombe Wanderers, Northampton Town and Flackwell Heath.

Mick Doherty: Yeovil splashed out a club record fee of £11,000 to bring this free-scoring striker back to Huish last March. His goals helped to clinch the Vauxhall-Opel League Championship and AC Delco Cup. Previous clubs include Maidstone, Weymouth, Basingstoke and Reading.

Gary Donnellan: Was with Watford and Chelsea before moving to Reading, where he scored five goals in 44 appearances. Another Wealdstone 'double' player, he joined Yeovil the season before last making his debut on 28th February 1987.

Phil Ferns: Signed from Aldershot in June 1986, he previously played for AFC Bournemouth, Charlton Athletic, Wimbledon and Blackpool making over 200 appearances in total. The Clubs penalty taker with 100% record, he is currently sidelined with a broken leg sustained in a pre-season friendly at Farnborough.

Bob Iles: This experienced 'keeper joined the club last season, making his debut on 9th September 1987. He played for Poole Town, AFC Bournemouth and Weymouth before being transferred to Chelsea, where he made 14 first team appearances. Another Wealdstone 'double' member.

Tiv Lowe: Close season signing from Saltash Utd., this left-sided player is a regular with both the Royal Navy and Combined Services teams. Previously with Dorchester Town and Wimbourne.

Gerry Pearson: Gained Football League experience with Sheffield Utd., before moving into non-league football with Barnstaple Town, Bideford, Weymouth and Maidstone Utd. Joined Yeovil Town from the Kent side as a striker in September 1985 but is now equally at home in midfield.

Jimmy Quinn: Midfielder signed from Bognor Regis in December 1987. Strong, combative player, he was previously with Maidstone Utd.

Paul Randall: Scored 63 goals in 177 games for Bristol Rovers before his transfer to Stoke City for £200,000. Moved back to Eastville, scoring another 33 goals in his second spell. Joined Yeovil in March 1986 and has topped the scoring charts in the last two seasons.

Steve Rutter: Another commanding figure at the back, he was signed from Wealdstone in February 1987. Previously with Rushden Town, Kettering Town and Wellingorough. Jeff Sherwood: Transferred from Bath City for a fee of £5,000 during the summer of 1987. Joined Bath from Taunton Town after a short spell with Bristol Rovers where he made 18 appearances.

Paul Thorpe: Made his debut for Yeovil Town on 24th September 1984. Previously with Newport County, Bristol Rovers and Torquay Utd., this big central defender is popular with the fans for his all-out effort.

Andy Wallace: Yet another former Wealdstone player, he joined the Club in March 1987. A midfielder, he has previously seen service with Metropolitan Police and Kingstonian.

Steve Tapley: Steve joined Wealdstone from Fulham and proved to be a most capable fullback. Since joining Yeovil he has suffered a serious achilles tendon injury but is now happily restored to fitness.

ALAN CORDICE : A TERRACE FAVOURITE By Sudhir Rawal

The emotional and rapturous reception Alan Cordice received at Banbury from the travelling 300 Wealdstone fans for the FA Trophy match in December 1987 showed how much affection they have for him. Alan has always been a player close to the heart of the Elmslie End.

His speed, agility and ability to recover from having the proverbial kicked out of him endeared him to the crowd. There is nothing the fan on the terraces loves more than a player who tries, and Alan always gave his utmost. I remember Brian Hall once saying that Wealdstone's tactics were simple, Dennis Byatt was to boot the ball towards the corner, while Alan ran after the ball. Once he had got it, he had to wait until the rest of the team had caught him and then pass it. It seemed silly for a team to rely on, to revolve around one player, but it was true.

His greatest season coincided with Wealdstone winning the double. Alan was honoured with the greatest accolade when he was awarded the non-League player of the year in 1985; can a player have deserved it more? His best game, in my opinion, was the FA Trophy Fourth Round match against Frickley Athletic. Not only did he set up Andy Graham's 16 second opening goal, but he scored two others. He was sheer class that day and the Frickley Manager, Sean Marshall, stated simply that Alan was the differene between the sides, as he was on so many occasions.

Alan's failing, if any, was his inability to score - though a near one goal every three matches isn't bad for one who creates rather than one who finishes. Who can forget the 1981 match versus Aylesbury United, when Alan beat six Aylesbury defenders only to fire over a gaping open goal from two yards out?

A feature, ironically, of Alan's career had been how few injuries he had sustained, especially considering he was used for kicking practice week in, week out. When Alan retired it was after sustaining an injury in a rather mundane Capital League match. He chased a long despairing ball, as only Alan could, and clattered into the wall at the Elmslie End, now known as the memorial wall by the Elmslie End. The injury seemed minor, but Alan eventually retired.

When Alan returned eighteen months later, he had, of course, lost the Olympian pace, but in its stead was a more intelligent player. He replaced the speed with the use of his vast experience and many considered him a better player. The injury time winning goal at Bromley in the FA Trophy in January was a classic Cordice inspired goal. Having received the ball well inside our half, he raced away towards the Bromley goal. He reached the byline with no Stones players in sight. He waited, as usual for the others to catch him and then crossed the ball for LaRonde to crash home and send the 400 visiting Stones fans into a state of bedlam.

Alan, it has always appeared, has a great affection for the Club and, more importantly, the supporters. He has taken them to heart, as they have him. Good luck Alan, and may we see you in the famous blue shirt of Wealdstone again soon.

Welcome to Lower Mead for this evening's opportunity to pay homage to one of the Club's most talented, respected and well-loved servants. For me the unique success of our Double-winning side was attributed to two factors - the players' ability to do what Brian Hall told them without unnecessary embellishment, and the possession of the longest upfield clearances in the League coupled to a forward who seemed able to reach them first no matter how much further away he was than the opposing defender. This basic tactic would have had little chance of success without the extraordinary skills of Alan Cordice who has thrilled the Lower Mead faithful in his two spells here. We are proud to have had the pleasure of seeing Alan Cordice in a Wealdstone shirt for so much of his distinguished career, a career that has seen him deservedly earn England Non-League Caps and the Non-League Player of the Year award. Seeing Alan return to action at Banbury after his long break from the game brought a tear to my eye and I hope that he will soon be back in a Stones attack that is currently sadly lacking his experience and still considerable ability.
