THE TONES INTERVIEW

Nikola Tavares

Stones' new(ish) defensive star explains how his family left South Africa behind to fulfil his dreams of football success

ik Tavares is a young man on a mission. The South African-born defender was so determined and confident that he would make it in the pro game that he flew to London at the age of 13 or 14 with his dad Paulo - and the pair spent a month at the Premier Inn, South Mimms while looking for a route into the game!

"The target wasn't to join a London club necessarily, but anywhere in Europe" explained the focused 22-year-old. "From what I remember I went on trial at Reading but it was Brentford who offered the scholarship. Then it was like 'alright, let's go for it'.

"Me and my dad went back to Cape Town, packed our bags, and then me, my mum and my brother flew out to the UK and settled down in Welwyn Garden City. My dad then closed his business in South Africa and joined us shortly after.

"It was quite a sacrifice, quite a gamble but my parents believed I was good enough to be successful".

Nik was an outstanding athlete, and big for his age, growing up in the Table View area of Cape Town. It was an idyllic childhood just ten minutes from the ocean.

"I also played rugby but had grown up watching the Premier League games on TV. The goal for most of the youngsters was to play in the PSL Nik shows the strength and aggression needed to deal with Woking's powerful Innih Effiong in the season opener at Grosvenor Vale

in South Africa but I knew that the coaching and academy systems in Europe were much better".

And so, with the particular support of his dad Paulo (who had played pro football in South Africa and for Boa Vista in Portugal) the Tavares family took the plunge and moved to Welwyn Garden City, in Hertfordshire.

"It was a long drive down to Brentford every day for training but then, when I was about 16 or 17 I moved into digs near the club's training base in Osterley".

rystal Palace saw the potential in the young, aggressive defender and moved in with the offer of a two-year contract.

"I had a good grounding at Palace: The manager Roy Hodgson, was so nice to everybody and the coaching was very good, very structured. And I was on the bench for Premier League games against Bournemouth twice, once against Burnley and at Anfield against Liverpool...and though that was a real thrill, with a decent chance of getting on the pitch, I bailed out because I didn't want to wait any longer to make a breakthrough. I was 21,



had not made a senior appearance and you can only wait so long.

"Ultimately it was disappointing because you were just waiting for players to become injured or suspended. I wanted to build my footballing CV and start my career."

o the South African-born defender came on trial last January to a Wealdstone side then managed by Dean Brennan, "The timing wasn't right for me then, but then the Gaffer Stuart got hold of me again in March, got me in on loan and I was thrown in the deep end, making my debut a few days later at Solihull. To be honest I lacked match fitness and was under-prepared, not having been involved at Palace through the Covid break, and got injured after an hour.

"So that was me done for the season really. The advantage was that I had those months, and the rest of the summer to really get myself in shape and I feel that my fitness and sharpness is where I want it to be".

He certainly came into the club under the radar and certainly none of the suppporters guite knew what Nike had to offer. They do now!

(Okimo)" he said.

Tavares has been a revelation with his keeneyed, first-to-the-ball defending and he can also step in and bring the ball out of defence. "I know I played that first game at full back but centre-back is my favourite position" he says. "I think I'm good in one-on-ones and our system of play is a good fit for me - Stuart and Matty are young and ambitious and the way we are asked to move the ball and progress through the thirds is enjoyable".

He played a lot of under-23 football at Palace (and was skipper in one of his two seasons) so how does that compare to the National League?

"The main difference is what's at stake. There is no pressure in the U-23s; it's all about showing quality on the ball while in the NL there is nerves, anxiety and a real desire to win. That's the edge that means NL teams will beat u-23s teams more often than not.. physicality and the ability of protect the ball, and just maturity I suppose is the difference "

So had Nik ever heard of Wealdstone FC before joining earlier this year? "Not really, although I knew Danny Parish from my Brentford days and Michael Phillips from my time at Palace. I think the club is well run and, playing wise, we have good cover in all positions. And Dan Finill's video work is class!"

THE SHOTS

n March 25th 1992, Aldershot FC became the first Football League team to fold during the season since Accrington Stanley in 1962. From the ashes came phoenix club Aldershot Town, who were formed on April 22nd 1992 and managed by ex-Aldershot FC centre back Steve Wignall.

The "new" Shots began life in Isthmian League Division 3 and opened the 1992-93 season in a carnival atmosphere at the Recreation Ground against Clapton. Braces from Mark Butler and Steve Stairs secured a 4-2 win in front of 1493 fans, which was more than watched their predecessors' last home game at the same ground. The campaign finished with the Shots as champions by a commanding 18-point margin, whilst strikers Mark Butler and Steve Stairs scored a combined total of 62 goals in all competitions.

A second successive promotion (via a third-place finish) followed in 1993-94 together with a run to the FA Vase quarter-finals.

Steve Wignall departed in January 1994 to take charge of Division 3 side Colchester United and was replaced by ex-Nottingham Forest winger Steve Wigley. Despite a strong finish to the 1994-95 season, the Shots missed out on a third successive promotion on goal difference. Following fifth- and seventh-place

finishes over the next two seasons, Wigley left to take up a post in (former club) Forest's youth set up in the summer of 1997.

Following a spell under the caretaker management trio of Andy Meyer, Mark Butler and Joe Roach, Enfield boss George Borg was appointed in September 1997 and his first season yielded



increased crowds and the Isthmian League Division 1 title. In 1998-99. the Shots won both the Isthmian League Cup and the Hampshire Senior Cup. In 1999-2000, they retained the latter trophy, won the Isthmian League Charity Shield and ended the campaign as runners-up to Dagenham and Redbridge in the Isthmian League Premier Division.

A fourth-place finish was claimed in 2000-01, whilst November 2001 saw a club record crowd of 7500 fill the Rec for the 6-2 defeat by Brighton and Hove Albion in the FA Cup first round. Following a run of poor results and

> pressure from fans, Borg resigned in mid-January 2002.

> Borg's assistant Stuart Cash took temporary charge before Terry Brown left his post at Hayes in late March to come to North East Hampshire, thus beginning a five-year love affair

with the Shots fans. Following a third-place finish and a third Hampshire Senior Cup win in 2001-02, the squad was overhauled and, having attained top spot in mid-November 2002 the Shots remained in top spot to claim the title and, with it, promotion to the Football Conference; they also retained the Hampshire Senior Cup.

Disappointment followed in 2003/04. when the Shots were beaten on penalties by Shrewsbury Town (after a 1-1 draw) in the play-off final at Stoke City's Britannia Stadium.

More play-off heartache was experienced in 2004-05, this time in the shape of a shoot-

out defeat at Carlisle United in the semi-finals. The next two seasons were disappointing for the Shots (13th and ninth places respectively being secured).

In March 2007, Terry Brown resigned to take care of his wife, who had been ill for some time. Assistant Manager Martin Kuhl took caretaker charge for the remainder of the season.

in 2012-13 Former Botherham United boss Andy Scott was brought in but couldn't stem the tide and relegation back to the Conference Premier (the club's first such event) was confirmed at end of the season as the Shots eventually finished rockbottom of the table.

On May 2nd 2013, just five days after their

relegation from League 2, Aldershot Town officially entered administration with reported debts

The Shots began the 2013-14 season with a 10-point deduction as a punishment for the aforementioned entry into administration. With a hastily-assembled squad (some of whom were signed in the hotel the night before the season's

On July 31st 2014, Aldershot Town announced that they had paid off all of their debts, which enables them to exit the auspices of the CVA after just 12 months - a massive two years ahead of the required date! The icing on the cake came with the additional news that the club had made "a modest profit" in the first year of trading under the new owners.

The 2015-16 season was another one of disappointing performances with the Shots finished the campaign having scored just 23 home league goals, equalled the club record for fewest home league wins (7) and most home league losses (12) as well as setting new club records for most league losses in a season (22) and lowest average home league attendance (1607); the season was also the fourth in succession in which the aforementioned crowd figure had dropped.

A new-look side for 2016/17 secured fifth place in the table and a Play-Off semi-final against Tranmere Rovers. Unfortunately, The Shots lost the home leg 3-0 but at least restored a great deal of pride with a battling 2-2 draw in the Prenton Park return.

In 2017-18 the squad picked up where they left off and spent the majority of the season challenging for the title eventually finishing 5th in the table losing to Ebbsfleet in the

play offs.

2019/20 saw the Shots placed 18th when the season was abandoned due to the Corona Virus pandemic.

Last season The Shots finished in 15th place in the National League.

1. MITCH WALKER - GOALKEEPER

Joined from Dover Athletic in June 2019. He spent seven years with the Whites, amassing a total of 279 appearances and helped guide the Kent side to promotion from the National League South. He started his career at Brighton & Hove Albion, making one solitary first team appearance, keeping a clean sheet in a 1-0 League One victory over Yeovil Town in 2010, he also spent time out on loan at Eastbourne Borough and Welling United whilst at the Seagulls before joining Dover in 2012.

2. GEORGE FOWLER - DEFENCE

Originally joined the Shots from Ipswich Town on loan in September 2017, after several extensions to his loan he joined the Shots on a permanent deal in January 2018 after making just one first-team appearance for Ipswich which was against Crystal Palace in the EFL Cup.

3. LEWIS KINSELLA - DEFENCE

Lewis came through Arsenal's Academy before moving to Aston Villa's Academy in 2011. Had spells out on loan at Luton Town. Signed permanently with Colchester United in 2016 before moving to the Shots iin 2018

5. KEVIN LOKKO - DEFENCE

A product of the academy system at Norwich City and was part of the FA Youth Cup winning team during the 2012–13 season. Since then, the 25 year-old has had spells with a number of National League clubs including: Welling United, Maidstone United, Dagenham & Redbridge (loan) and Dover Athletic (loan before made permanent). Lokko has also had spells in the Football League with both Stevenage and Colchester United during his career, before most recently moving to his most recent former club Harrogate Town.

6. KODI LYONS-FOSTER - DEFENCE

Kodi has represented England at U16 level and has also featured in the Academy's of Tottenham Hotspur and Aston Villa. He joined Bristol City from Villa in 2016 but didn't make a senior appearance there and spent time out on loan at Guernsey. He joined the Shots in 2017 after a successful trial but left the club at the expiration of his contract in January 2018 after making seven appearances. He then joined Whitehawk on a permanent deal after an initial loan period from Aldershot before joining newly-promoted Braintree Town in the National League last summer.

7. ALFY WHITTINGHAM - MIDFIELD

Whittingham joined the Shots from Hungerford Town in July 2019. Prior to that, he spent three seasons at Havant & Waterlooville w, he also spent time out on loan at Hungerford Town, AFC Totton and Petersfield Town. He is the son of Portsmouth legend Guy Whittingham.

8. TOBY EDSER - MIDFIELD

Toby played youth football at Charlton Athletic, came through Nottingham Forest's academy and signed full professional forms in 2017. He had loan spells at Woking, then Port Vale before returning to the Cards for a second loan spell last campaign. The 21-year-old had been on trial with the club prior to the 20/21 season and made a clear impact, contributing to a number of goals and assists, prompting Danny Searle to make the move for him. The midfielder signed a new deal ahead of the 2021/22 season as he looks to continue his strong level of performance with the Shots.

9. MO BETTAMER - FORWARD

Joined The Shots from Barnet FC in October 2019 on a contract through to the end of the season. Bettamer scored six goals in just 15 appearances for both his and current Shots manager Danny Searle's former club Braintree Town

10. JACOB BERKELEY-AGYEPONG - MIDFIELD

Following a short loan-spell before making the move permanent with National League South side Dartford FC where Berkeley-Agyepong impressed during his time with the Darts, Berkeley-Agyepong returns to Aldershot Town having played over 20 times for Dartford FC and scoring 7 times in the process. The former Crystal Palace man became a full senior international, representing Grenada for their 2021 CONCACAF Gold Cup. He would go on to make his international debut on 13 July in a CONCACAF Gold Cup group match defeat against Honduras before representing his country two more times since.

11. CORIE ANDREWS - FORWARD

Andrews is a product of the academy system at Premier League side Crystal Palace, spending 10 years there and earning the Academy Player

of the Year in 2014, before being rewarded with a professional contract at the age of 17. Since then, the 23 year-old has had spells in non-league with a number of clubs including: Margate, Whyteleafe and most recently Kingstonian before moving to League One side AFC Wimbledon. The forward joins The Shots (initially on loan until January 2022) off the back of a campaign where he played a part in AFC Wimbledon's survival in the third division of English football, (alongside former Aldershot Town player Ethan Chislett), as Andrews looks to reignite his non-league scoring form with us here at The EBB Stadium.

12. CHRISTIAN OXLADE-CHAMBERLAIN - MIDFIELD

Oxlade-Chamberlain is a product of the Portsmouth FC academy system, earning a professional contract with Pompey in 2014, before making his first-team debut professional debut on September 2015. Since then, the 23 year-old has had spells in non-league with a number of clubs including: Wimbourne Town, Salisbury FC, Eastbourne Borough, Poole Town and National League South side Oxford City before moving to fellow National League side Notts County

13. RYAN HALL - GOALKEEPER

Hall is the Academy's number 1 keeper and his impressive performances in Academy matches and training with the first team saw him called up to the bench for the Shots

17. IBRAHIM AKANBI - FORWARD

Akanbi joins the club from Maidstone United. During his time with the Stones, the 24 year-old was their top scorer in the 2019-20 season. The former Crystal Palace youngster also joins the club, knowing some familiar faces already, having been in youth systems with the Eagles with recent addition Jacob Berkeley-Agyepong too.

18. WASSIM AOUACHRIA - FORWARD

Aouachria joins the club from EFL League One side Charlton Athletic. Born in Roubaix, Northern France, the striker played for his local club Aubagne from the age of six. Since then the forward was scouted by Ligue 1 side Marseille, who signed him at Under 14's level in 2013. However, Aouachria moved over to England for a new challenge with Charlton Athletic in 2019.

19. REECE MILLER - FORWARD

Miller progressed through our Academy back in

2020, going on to make his original first-team debut against Notts County back in March of the same year, before a short spell with Farnborough FC on a non-contract basis midway through last season. This in turn, saw the young forward come back to the Shots towards the end of last season.

21. BEN SHROLL - DEFENCE

Exciting academy prospect Ben Shroll has committed to the club for the 20/21 season as he joins the first-team squad!

22. GILES PHILLIPS - DEFENCE

Giles started his career at FC Barrington USA before signing with Queens Park Rangers in 2019. Phillips then spent the 2019/20 season on loan at Wycombe Wanderers before being released by QPR at the end of the season, where he joined Wycombe permanently. Phillips joins the Shots on a short-term loan until January 2021

23. JAYDEN HARRIS - MIDFILED

Harris is a product of the academy system at Fulham and has had a brief loan spell at Woking during the 19/20 season.

25. ELLIS WATTS - MIDFIELD

The young attacking midfielder joined the Shots academy originally after being part of League Two side's Newport County's youth system and after developing well in our under 23s

26. ALFIE SAUNDERS - DEFENCE

Saunders joins the first-team squad having graduated through our academy system, impressing during his time there too.

27. TOMMY WILLARD - FORWARD

Willard joins the first-team squad having graduated through our academy system, having previously been a part of Barnsley FC's youth system.

28. GEORGE SHERIDAN - MIDFIELD

Sheridan joins the first-team squad having graduated through our academy system, having been with the Shots academy set-up for a number of years.

29 JOE RABETTS - DEFENCE

Exciting academy prospect Joe Rabbetts has committed to the club for the 20/21 season as he joins the first-team squad

When I was 16, I had a season ticket there for £20, so you can see the difference. Been to see Watford a few times, due to how close It is, but it all depends on money for me, I just love football.

How do you fit watching Wealdstone into your family/ working life? Quite easily, I have no job at the moment, so for me i fit it in quite nicely depending on money and I have yet to have a family and settle down and all jazz, so my time is free!

Are you involved in football media? Not exactly, but I work on radio at hayes fm as a producer/presenter so I get to

I believe we do a fun day at the club so something like that could be good for the local residents and the surrounding areas. Local buisnesses are also another thing!

and finally... Where, and at what level of football, do you think the Stones will be playing in five years' time?

Well if its anything like the Football Manager game I had with the Stones, we were in League Two! Back to real life and I think probably Conference South!

Where do you now live? I've been living in Harefield, the last four years with my wife and dog.

Thing's Ain't What They Used to Be

When I first started watching football it was the Chopper era, defenders and bikes. Wealdstone FC was my local club, once of the Isthmian League, and champions of the Southern League First Division (South) in 1973/4 thanks almost entirely to our star striker, George Duck. Cold, foggy, smoggy Saturday afternoons. Dodgy floodlights. Standing in those baggy trousers with pockets in line with your knees, blue and white scarf, even wearing rosettes. Unbelievable. We'd all cram in behind one goal. The away fans all stuck behind their goal. And huge aching voids on the terraces in between. A cup of Bovril . . . and Bovril crisps, just in case we hadn't had enough of a beefy fix.

Players with shinguards that wouldn't have been out of place on Russell Crowe in Gladiator. And boots that a miner would have felt safe in, huge studs, leather as thick as your arm, doused in dubbin (whatever happened to dubbin?), not the ballet pumps they ponce about in these days. Nobody ever cracked their metatarsals. Or at least they never complained about it if they did. We didn't even know what a metatarsal was – a dinosaur, maybe?

The great thing was that you could see wonderful players. Back then the professionals kept on going long after their glory days. Jimmy Greaves turned out for Brentford and then Barnet. And at a pro-celebrity match you'd get Bobby Moore – Bobby Moore – turning up at Wealdstone for a kickabout. Then, when their legs finally gave up, they'd go and open a pub – Tommy Smith ran one called the Anfield Iron, naturally.

Oh, and we had our own hard men at Wealdstone.

Some chap who was to become internationally renowned as Psycho – known as Mr Stuart Pearce to you and me – joined in 1978, and Vinnie Jones played for the club in the mid-'80s. Now I'm not saying I miss those days of hard men and harder knocks, but at least there were no pampered strikers rolling around in supposed agony just because the centre back looked at them funny. There'll be a category created for them by BAFTA soon. You mark my words.

REWIND >>>> ON THIS DAY BY TIM PARKS

Oh the abject and ironic misery of FA Cup defeat in the rain... to Chesham

TUESDAY SEPTEMBER 18 1973. FA CUP 1ST QUALIFYING **ROUND REPLAY: WEALDSTONE 2 CHESHAM UTD 4**

t's amazing the finer details one can recall almost 50 years later! Arriving at Lower Mead pretty much soaked through for this FA Cup replay under the lights, having decided to wear a new 'waterproof' jacket that patently wasn't. The jacket was Royal Blue, which was good enough for 15-year-old me, although I was loathe to ditch the 'parka' coat that had been a lucky omen for every other Stones match I had seen that season - we were still unbeaten when I'd been wearing it.

But after all, we were only playing 'little Chesham' who had only survived the battering we had given them at their own Meadow ground the previous sun-baked Saturday thanks to lashings of good fortune. I

bought my 5p match programme (pictured below), a little soggy as the constant. heavy rain slanted under the overhang of the programme booth, and read that the pitch had received "72 hours of watering to make it playable for tonight's replay, as the players are fed up with playing on rock-hard pitches".

Well it had bucketed down all afternoon - but luckily we had strikers with perfect names for such aquatic conditions like George Duck and Derek Otter! (okay, I made the last one up).

It would be just typical to find that we couldn't cope with a slippery surface, after three straight wins in blazing sunshine had Stones top of the Southern League Division One South. Wearing my parka hadn't always been the wise choice but 15 is the age to be making such mistakes and anyway, sweat and grime is part of the charm of the teenager (I told myself).

The game kicked off in front of a decent Tuesday night crowd of 1,000. Too many mistakes, no luck

'Stones again get F.A. Cup K.O. from amateurs

Wealdstone 2, Chesham United 4

IT WAS, a Wealdstone supporter told me last Saturday morning as he prepared to travel to Chesham, a little unkind of me to bring up the unhappy subject of Borehamwood in our Saturday line-up column. It could not, he strongly asserted, happen again.

Well, I take little satisfaction from recording that it could — and did, at Lower Mead Stadium on Tuesday evening when by half-time all those appalling memories of a scoreline reading Wealdstone 0, Borehamwood 2, on the night of October 12, 1971, came flooding back. For the third season running Wealdstone crashed out of the F.A. Cup to an amateur side and in the end they were well beaten.

Let it be said right away that nothing went right for Wealdstone. Everything, but everything, flowed Chesham's way — and their officials were the first to admit the fact.

Chesham were ahead by a dubious goal after only four minutes and how a referee 10 yards from the scene can give a doubtful score on the word of a linesman 60 or so yards away, is something that only Mr. J. W. Godfrey, who was in the middle, can tell us.

Thereafter Wealdstone, attacking with frenzied, passionate desire to put matters right, had half a dozen efforts cleared from the line in the first half and three more in the second.

But a reminder to those who were bemoaning these facts long after the game. Defenders are paid (or not paid, according certain stipulations) to keep their goal intact wherever possible.

It is one of the mysteries of soccer that if a home defender clears from the line he is a hero, if a visitor performs the same honest job of work he is a villain.

Another simple fact is that goals count, near misses don't. Statistics show that in this game Chesham got the ball in the net five times (one was disallowed) and Wealdstone twice.

Something else perhaps emerged from a depressing night with rain falling steadily for most of the match. When 55tones started the second half 2-1 down, most of the approximately 1,000 crowd expected them to take over, show professionalism and teach their visitors what football is all about.

HEADS DOWN

This they were never able to do. Too many heads had gone down and much as this may hurt manager Sid Proser, there was not enough fight. Too namy players appeared not to want the ball and too many were half a yard slower than he opposition.

Training methods, they told us before the season started, would make Wealdstone the fit-

their efficiency in defence and one or two of their back-men were lucky to escape harsher decisions than were meted out by Mr. Godfrey.

Wealdstone's tale of woe started in the fourth minute when McKenzie made a hash of Taylor's free-kick which ran up his arm and onto his shoulder before he scrambled the ball away.

Chesham appealed frantically for a goal, Mr. Godrey consulted a far distant linesman and allowed the score. Was it a goal? From where I sat it was impossible to say.

SURVIVED

For the next 25 minutes the ball was never out of Chesham's half and seldom out of their penalty area. Time and again Wealdstone seemed certain to score, mainly through Duck, but somehow goalkeeper Cole and his men survived.

Cole and his men survived.

Ultimately Chesham gave away one free-kick too many.
Dyson bent his cross beautifully and this time Duck's head gave Cole no chance.

Chesham survived another five minute storm but then, quite suddenly, the fire went out of Wealdstone's work and they gave away a goal.

Burgess should have cleared a through ball. McCormick could have. Both hesitated and Beaven nipped into shoot low and accurately.

Nothing to worry about said the experts. Stones will take over. They couldn't and didn't. After 61 minutes McKenzie, found himself in no man's land with Beaven and Taylor bursting through. The 'keeper hauled down Taylor and Peck stepped up to slam home the penalty.

MISSED

Two minutes later Watson completely missed his tackle, leaving Beaven to run into an acre of space and cross for Taylor to head in.

Watson was withdrawn and Fairclough went on and minutes later Stones were virtually down to ten men when Fulton took a nasty knock in a tackle.

Finally the home side pulled another back when after Brown had been fouled for the umpteenth time Dyson first timed Kinnear's free-kick into the net. Hopes were raised momen-

Hopes were raised momentarily, but the fire had gone and once more there was no way back for Wealdstone.

Perhaps the unhappiest part of the night was to hear those who had cheered so wildly when Barnet were thrashed last week, jeering and hurling that too often heard taunt — "what a load of rubbish" — although it was just that or time.

Long-in-the-tooth fans will regale you of stories of the 1968 FA Amateur Cup semi-final, staged at Fulham's Craven Cottage, when Isthmian League titlechasers Wealdstone were humiliated 2-0 by a Chesham side nominally three divisions below them. You could have had 1,000-1 on Chesham to win the trophy when the competition began back in September 1967 but they went all the way to the final only to be pipped 1-0 by the mighty East Londoners Leytonstone (below, Chesham's 16-game run to the final; a bit like Emma Radacanu last week!).

So how had this Stones side - who ended the season as winners of the Southern League Div One South by 11 points from runners-up Bath City - been humbled by 'The Generals' again?


Accepted wisdom of the time was that the young, zippy Chesham side were just too quick and boisterous to be contained by the more experienced Stones. We'd brought in the 30-something John McCormick at centre back from Crystal Palace (virtually everpresent In Div One the previous year) alongside the ex Colchester pro Eric Burgess, while Duck, Willie Watson, Ray Fulton and John Henderson had all been with good League sides before being released as youngsters.

And yet this same team had walloped the much-lauded Barnet (of the Southern League Premier Division) 4-1 in the London Challenge Cup only a week earlier.

Maybe it was an off night. All I know is that, 48 years later, ANY victory over Chesham is sweet... even the 4-1 pre-season friendly win at The Meadow a few weeks ago!

OH YES, WE'VE MET BEFORE

Only two goals the last time we met? We were expecting seven at the very least!



he was a wonderful mirror held up to 1975 when the Stones and The Shots came face to face at The Vale in January for the clubs' first competitive meeting for 46 years. The breathlessly exciting FA Cup First Round tie at The Recreation Ground in '75 ended 4-3 to the Third Division (League One) side.. and that scoreline was repeated early in new year 2021 in another thrill-aminute-encounter.

> It was just a shame that nobody was allowed in the ground to watch the seven-goal feast. I was up in the commentary box, trying to explain the difference between the throbbin Rec for the cup tie (when seven coaches of Stones fans added to the atmosphere of the occasion) and the bleak empty stands at the Vale... but then the game exploded into life with the Shots taking an early lead through the ever-dangerous Joel

The Stones were still just about in in mid-table at this time and in the Third Round of the FA Trophy - and had captured Josh Meekings from Inverness Caledonian Thistle. The big defender settled down a porous defence and Stones were looking lively through Dennon Lewis and Moses Emmanuel - and Dennon blasted a sensational equaliser from a tight angle in front of an empty Bulla to level. And then Alex Dyer took a Michael Phillips pass and sidefooted past Shots keeper Mitch Walker to put the Stones ahead.

The crowd was on its feet (in the gantry, anyway) and three points were a real possibility. But Aldershot were incisive on the break and even the presence of Meekings couldnt prevent Jermaine Anderson scrambling in a leveller. And then moments before the break Nouble set up Chike Kandy to blaze past Moore for 3-2.

Meekings had twisted his knee - the recurrence of an old injury - and he didn't appear after the break... or ever again a Stones shirt, come to think of it. Rees fired in a fourth for the Shots in the 76th minute and although Michee Efete won a penalty a few minutes from time, Emmanuel's goal was just a consolation. And provided an uncanny 3-4 echo of 1975.

Three months later, on April 24 both clubs were pretty much going through the motions as relegation was off the table and (for those in the bottom half at least) nobody was willing to throw money at the season. Both the Stones and the Shots were furloughing left, right and centre and bringing in loan players as cover, which led to a rather tame clash at the Rec, again behind closed doors. A fine 25-yarder out of the blue from Harrison Panayiotou - along with a stoppage time goal from Joel Nouble - sunk the Stones 2-0, but that was regarded as a decent result after losing 7-2 to Hartlepool and 6-0 to Maidenhead in our two previous games. Thank goodness that's all behind us!



WEALDSTONE

Facing Southern League opposition in the First Round of the F.A. Cup is of special interest to Aldershot as this was the first competition the Club applied to join successfully in 1926. Wealdstone have not had such a long association with the Southern League, having turned professional in 1971-72 and entering the First Division North that season.

Before this Wealdstone had been members of the Athenian League and in 1966-67 reached the final of the now defunct Amateur Cup and defeated Hendon at Wembley.

In 1972-73 they were transferred to the Southern Section of the Southern League's First Division and the following term won promotion to the Premier Division. They are currently enjoying an unbeaten run of success in League and Cup matches and are making an historic first appearance in Round One.

Last Saturday their leading scorer George Duck scored his 17th goal of the season and the term before last he broke the club's post-war record with 64 goals. Altogether he has scored more than 150 for them. Signed from Southend United when Wealdstone turned professional, he was formerly on the books of Millwall. Off the field he is a schools football teacher.

There are a number of other former Football League players in the squad — notably public house keeper centre-back John McCormick, a Scot who was at Crystal Palace and earlier with Aberdeen and Third Lanark. Others with League experience are midfield players Vince O'Kane (once of Charlton Athletic) and Bobby Moss (who was at Leyton Orient before going to Barnet). Another midfield man, Ray Fulton, came from Orient and is a stonemason by profession.

There are a number of other former Football League players. Striker John Henderson was once on the books of Cardiff City before coming from Bedford, Chris Kinnear, the youngest in the side at 21, hails from West Ham and figures at right back, while Paul Fairclough, the sweeper, has also appeared for Liverpool Reserves.

John Watson, the left-back, won England youth international honours as a teenager when he was associated with Millwall, while striker Adriaan Eglite claims an Amsterdam birthplace and experience with the mighty

Car salesman Bill Byrne toured Japan with Middlesex Wanderers a couple of years ago before turning pro-fessional with Wealdstone. The club's two goalkeepers are John Morton and Roy Mackenzie, the former having been at Dartford previously and the latter the senior choice before displaced by Morton.

Wealdstone's squad is completed by midfield players John Lewis and Jim Godfrey. Lewis is a close season capture from Romford, while Godfrey was with Barnet. The club's manager is Eddie Presland, a full-back with Crystal Palace and West Ham in his playing days and an Essex County cricketer in the summer. His coach is probably even better known - Terry Dyson, a member of the Spurs forward line in their League and Cup double

season of 1960-61. An enthusiastic band of followers is likely to accompany them today as well, and has been estimated by a club official as being in the region of 1,000.

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Today I would like to plead with our fans and comment on this disease which is ruining the greatest game in the world, summed up in one word - Hooliganism.

This nation, which consists of England, Scotland, Ireland and Wales, is a football nation, and football is in our blood. That is why, in my opinion, it is our national sport and we would be lost without it.

So I plead with you hooligan fans (who may be reading these notes), not for the good old days but for today and the tomorrows of football. If you would just stop for a moment and think, it was your parents who made this game what it is today for you, their children, to enjoy, What, I ask, are you going to leave your children? It won't be much if things carry on as they are at present and the clubs are forced to bring in security and safety measures such as pens for spectators, identity passes to get into grounds, and so on.

Yes, what are your children going to say? That's right first time: 'Our parents must have been a right lot of hooligans."

How we stop this disease I don't know. The only thing I can suggest is that we all begin by looking at ourselves and following this quote: 'Always imitate the behaviour of the winner when you lose.

So I ask you, please, please, stop this disease and begin today, here at Aldershot, by being an example to all the visiting supporters with your behaviour, and make your ground a fit place for people to come and enjoy football.

Today we welcome Wealdstone Town and their supporters in this First Round proper of the F.A. Cup — which ends at every footballer's dream place, Wembley. It is Wembley that the players have in their minds when they go on to the field to do battle, because that is what it will be, they say - the Cup brings the best out of the teams. If that is so, then every supporter should see a good game today.

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
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




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




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Saturday 25 October 1975

My first sighting of the Shots was, inevitably, away to my local team Rotherham United. I wasn't alone. This was the first league meeting between the two teams. Unless they were around for an FA Cup tie in the 1930s, nobody else had seen them in direct opposition either.

Until 1973, Aldershot had spent their entire Football League history in the fourth division or the third division (south), with Rotherham in the second, third, or third division north. That summer Aldershot won their first promotion, passing the Millers on the way. Until Rotherham got back up two years later, it was classic "never the twain".

The match ended 2-2, with Aldershot's John Richardson and Terry Bell cancelling out goals by Alan Crawford and Paul Stancliffe.

But the real story of me and Aldershot in the 1970s took place the following season. I was 11 and had just started at the comprehensive up the road. One day, a kid in my class came in with a book I'd never heard of, a proper tome. It was called the Rothmans Football Yearbook and he had borrowed it from the local public library - it wasn't even restricted to the reference section - and, knowing I liked football, lent it to me.

I had ambitions of being the

next Brian Moore and thought learning all the players in the league would be a good start. The book had even arranged the clubs in alphabetical order for this purpose. So I started with Aldershot. And, with my mate asking for his book back a few days later, pretty much finished there as well. As football was to teach me often, the gap between fantasy and reality can be poles apart.

You October 4th

However, the upshot is I can still recall a surprisingly large number players from that side of '76, or at least their names. Murray Brodie, Jack Howarth, Joe Jopling... Neil Warnock was most fascinating because he was ex-Rotherham. I wonder whatever happened to him.

But Howarth was my favourite, mainly because he shared the name of the actor who played the old boy Albert Tatlock in Coronation Street, leaving me with mental images of a flat-capped, pot-bellied pensioner going toe to toe with the uncompromising lower division defenders of the time.

Ten of the Aldershot players who played in this game also lined up against Wealdstone in the FA Cup four weeks later.

Friday 18 October 1991

In the modern era, we football fans of a certain age have had to get used to certain unpalatable things. VAR checks and expected goals totals at the top end of the game for instance. Further

down, gripes are more likely to concern online programmes, and, well there's no getting away from it really, the expunged fixture.

It's the ultimate limbo experience. The same conundrum as whether a tree falling in an unpopulated forest makes a sound. In short, did the game you attended, that you have fully formed memories of and where you had conversations with other like-minded people, really take place? As recently as 2019 I cycled the 20-odd miles to Ware on the opening Saturday of the season to watch Wodson Park play Ampthill Town. Wodson resigned from their league before Christmas. But if I tell people I saw the game, and there is no record to support it, how can I prove I'm not making it up?

At Football League level, expungements (is that a word?) have been rare. By the time I arrived in Aldershot to see Rotherham's latest instalment in trying to secure an immediate return to the third tier, the last ones had concerned Accrington Stanley's uncompleted season nearly 30 years earlier. There had been the odd FA Cup tie replayed behind closed doors after hooliganism the first time round, but the league, seemingly, was inviolate.

Until now. I wouldn't know it for almost six months, but I was about to watch a non-fixture, because this was the season Aldershot dropped out of the league themselves.

Of course any minor inconvenience I may have suffered pales into insignificance against the pain felt by Aldershot fans that season, which ended

with them losing their club over a sum of money that seemed trivial at the time and looks like peanuts now. But like Newport before them and AFC Wimbledon later, they were to prove that what does actually kill you makes you stronger.

For the record, Rotherham won this game 1-0. I know because I was there.

Tuesday 16 August 1994

Aldershot reformed more or less straight away as Aldershot Town, and joined the Isthmian League. They were already making short work of progressing through its divisions when I saw the new incarnation away at Berkhamsted, a ground I'd wanted to visit for a long time after seeing it on numerous train journeys out of Euston. (Alas no programme cover, so the one below is from the Shots' 94/95 season.)

To say the fan base had got behind Aldershot's phoenix club was an understatement. Here, they were on at least three sides of the ground and probably made up 90% of the total attendance. With the fixture feeling like a home game, the team responded accordingly and strolled to a 3-0 win. I have no record of the scorers but I have a feeling that Steve Stairs might have scored at least one and possibly two.

If he did, it's appropriate indeed that a man called Stairs was leading the long climb back to Aldershot's historical level


