- 4) Vehicles parked on the Grosvenor Vale site are at the owners' risk.
- 5) Wealdstone Football Club supports the FA's campaign on pyrotechnics (e.g. flares and smoke bombs). Any misuse of such items in and around the Ground will result in those responsible being asked to leave the ground and, in line with football authority guidance, may result in a report to the Police, potential prosecution and a ban from the Club of up to three years.

From the Gaffer

Good afternoon and a warm welcome back to The Vale today.

We face Dover this afternoon and it feels like forever since we last had a home game to get excited about. Dover are a team who have had their problems as has been well publicised and although they've not picked up the points they'd have liked they are often losing by the odd goal. They've got an experienced manager and they have nothing to lose which is always a dangerous proposition.

Obviously the Needham Market game wasn't good enough, and as a team we all apologise to the fans for the first half performance. It was a typical cup tie where we made two mistakes defensively that we haven't made all season and gave them a two goal lead to cling on to. As poor as the first half was, the second half we created nine gilt edged opportunities and only took one, so even with the poor start we should still have won the game comfortably. The cup has a weird way of producing days like that though.

As disappointing as it was, and as much as it hurt all of us we can't lose track of where we are and how well we've done to this point. With the enforced break through Covid it's been a good time to reflect on how far we have progressed in a short space of time. At the end of last season we all just wanted a season where we were competitive and we have been much more than that. We've had some brilliant away days and we've also had days like the Barnet and Grimsby games that we've all enjoyed immensely at The Vale. At the back end of last season, if someone had said in January we'd be above teams like Southend and Maidenhead I would have bitten their hand off. What has also been pleasing is the manner in which we've done it. We've gained a lot of admiration and respect in this division because of our style of play and how much we

have dominated against huge teams in this division.

That will only help the club moving forwards because it's enabling us to be seen as a genuine National League team, rather than a team that's out of its depth.

It's been a frustrating last four weeks for everyone at the club because we've had to self isolate for the majority of that period. Since the Needham Market game we have only had one training session. We had to come straight out of isolation and into the Boreham Wood game, so we had no prep for that game and that's a huge ask for the players. On top of those issues we have had 6 main starters that were out for a variety of reasons so it certainly wasn't the ideal preperation. We are starting to feel like we are coming out the other side now and we're slowly getting our squad back to near full strength. We managed to get a very light recovery training session in on Thursday night in preparation for todays game but that only makes two training sessions in five weeks, so the guicker we can get back to normal the better.

A huge amount of praise needs to be given to the players because they have voluntarily committed to Zoom sessions over this period while they have been self isolating, so it shows you how dedicated and professional they are as a collective. Although we are a part time team we are gradually creating a full time mentality at the club which is vital for us going forwards.

There is a lot left to look forward to in this second half of the season and our objective remains the same. The squads only getting stronger and we need to secure our place and then slowly keep building on and off the pitch. Together we've had a huge amount of success in the last 3 years, and I believe we can keep defying the odds.

A win in '85 and a couple of semi-final appearances means that we have had some success too. When the draw for the third round was made, with due respect to Needham Market, many were immediately wondering whether the Harrow Council game in February would have to be moved as it was a Trophy date.

Of course, football doesn't work that way. Let's be honest our performance, if that's what you call it, was abject in Suffolk, the first half particularly.

All the intensity and desire came from the team two divisions below, mid-table two divisions below as well. Two mistakes, one a slip when we'd given the ball away further up the pitch, led to us being two down and in the first half I am not sure we had a meaningful chance, one that tested the keeper. That's damning.

In the second half we were better (though we could not have been worse) but ultimately lacked quality when it came to sticking the ball in the net.

onnor McAvoy made an instant impact for the Stones when he scored on his debut at Weymouth - but the young centre back was quite offended when I asked if that was a rarity!

"That was actually my fourth goal of the season" said the Fulham loanee, a bit miffed. "I've scored two headers and a penalty for the under-23s... although to be honest, when I played one game back with Fulham last month when Wealdstone didn't have a game, we won 2-1 at Burnley but I missed a penalty!"

I had a quick look at the video of that game (the week Stones had a free Saturday due to being knocked out of the FA Cup) and Connor was imperious for the whole 90 minutes. As skipper, he stepped up to take the late penalty with Premier League 2 (Div 2) leaders Fulham already 2-1

We were on a losing streak, but the youngster's key conversion of Charlie Cooper's second half free kick put us back on track. He featured in the wins over Grimsby, Barnet and Dover that hoisted Stones up the National League table and has noticeably grown in stature as the weeks have passed.

"I definitely feel that I'm improving with the physicality and intensity of this league- it's very different from under-23s football. And I think I'm still growing - I'm 6ft 1in now and I'll get physically stronger too. Though not too big to be able to get off the ground!" he said.

onnor reads the game so well, soaks up the advice from Jack Cook and Jerome Okimo and is now out-jumping 6ft 4in National League strikers. While his tackle to deny Barnet's Ephron Mason-Clark in the knife-edge game at the Vale is now the stuff of legend.

"I've always been a defender" says Connor, who has been capped by Scotland at youth level.





"I've enjoyed playing at full back because you can get forward, but tackling and destroying are what I do best".

He was brought up in Staines, where he still lives, and first played for the Staines Town grassroots side at the age of 7 before being scouted by Fulham when he was nine.

"It wasn't a hard sell because my family are Fulham fans!" he laughed. "So it's a bit of a dream for me to be playing for the club - like George (Wickens) whose family are Fulham fans too"

his 12 year old brother
James is in the QPR
academy.

What's been the highlight of his time at Fulham? "I'd say, probably when I was playing in the FA Youth Cup at Manchester City, and facing a front three who were worth about £20m between them. Plus the rest of the talent they had in that team. I thought I did pretty well against them and that felt good".

So what's the scheme of progression now? "We'll, this is my first loan and, like George says, it's the best thing I've ever done. I'm keen to stay at Wealdstone as long as they'll have me - my loan spell has now been extended to the end of the season... and then I imagine I'll have more loan clubs, probably in the EFL. And then with a bit of luck I can establish myself in the first team squad, wherever."

TRIBUTE TO JOHN JEFFRESON

Remembering the quirky, outspoken, strong-as-an-ox JJ... a lifetime of devotion to Wealdstone FC and his own fanatical family

e seem to have lost a lot of dyed-in-the-wool Wealdstone folk in the last year or so. Genuine fans who have spent a lifetime on the terraces watching the Stones.

John Jeffreson, who died last week at the age of 92, also gave us the gift of his sons Phil and Simon who are ardent supporters - as well as his first born, Chris. who passed away at a tragically young age (29) back in 1983.

JJ is probably best remembered most recently for his sterling help in transforming Grosvenor Vale into a stadium fit for National League football. For a man in his 80s it was astonishing and inspirational!

JJ had a long life and was loved and respected. And that's all we really want for ourselves.

We asked his son Phil (PJ) to give some nore details about his dad's life following the Stones...

When was your dad born PJ? Dad was born in I ondon on December 17th 1929

What did he tell you about his early experiences watching Wealdstone? He would tell me the score when he got home from the game, but I don't think I took too much notice until he took me to my first game when I was aged

11 on the 4th May 1974 when Wealdstone played Trowbridge (a match remembered for its gold programme cover as we celebrated winning the Southern League Division One title). Though I think I spent most of the match playing football behind the Elmslie Stand with some other kids. Simon (my younger brother) remembers his first game being in the early 80's when we played Enfield at home that was when he got the Wealdstone bug at the age of 12.

Who did he watch games with in those days? | am sure dad in the early vears would stand with Barbara Robson up by the supporters club shop at Lower Mead. In later years Dad would be with myself, Martin Allen & his wife Syl - then in his later years he would sit in the now-named Elmslie Stand next to the social club.

What was your life like growing up? As a family my Mum (Marjorie), Dad, Simon and me lived in Harrow, followed by

Wealdstone, and then Harrow Weald so it was always easy to get to games.

Did JJ take you to watch other clubs? Only Wealdstone.... he was an Arsenal / England fan but only from the armchair.

Where was he working and when did he retire? Dad took early retirement at the age of 62 after 45 years loyal service as a Bus Mechanic at London Transport. Once he retired he got more involved in working as a hobby on the Routemaster bus RM737 which he co-owned with a number of friends - they took the bus up and down the country where they won countless awards.

He also spent a bit more time at bingo and also, as documented, down at the ground working on ground improvements. Plus he was involved in the publication of LOTS (London Omnibus Traction Society)

Where was he living most recently? Dad moved to Hemel Hempstead with Mum in August 2019, but after Dad contracted Covid flu and Pneumonia in December 2020 they then moved to the Highview Care home in January 2021 on a permanent basis.

What did Wealdstone FC mean to him? Watching Wealdstone was a big thing to Dad and I certainly think he passed that on to me, But he handled defeat much better than I did! However, he never missed an opportunity to

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lambast the referee as he always blamed them for anything that went wrong on the pitch:)

Did he have any heroes among the players? What was his favourite era? Dad always spoke highly of the sides in the 60's and his favourite player without doubt was Hugh Lindsay - Dad would tell me constantly how he could score from 100 yards out! He always spoke highly of Eddie Dilsworth too, John Childs and he was a big fan of John Watson, George Duck, Stuart Pearce, Fred Barwick, Paul Bowgett, Alan Cordice from the 70s and 80s... and much more recently Jon North.

Did he mention his favourite games and great memorles of the past? The games he spoke about most was the 1966 FA Amateur final, playing at Torpoint (Cornwall) in 6 ins of mud, but the game he spoke about most was the FA Cup match v Stevenage in 1965 where the Stones were 5-3 down with seven minutes to go but won 6-5 with one of Hugh Lindsay trademark 35 yard free kirks

His other favourite games / away trips were Cambridge United away in the FA Trophy, Hereford away in the FA Cup... while the one that always brought a smile to his face was our trip to Douai in France in the mid-1980s with Martin Allen and his

dad who drove us to France and back. What a trip - and God did we drink and eat on that weekend! (See next page for more recollections of that trip).

Did he ever play the game himself? Or any other sports? The Jeffreson Family playing sport never really took off - other than my own illustrious career playing Sunday League for SFC Wealdstone and also Rickmanworth Sports.

Does he have any grandchildren? Dad had three sons: CJ from his first marriage to Margaret, and then myself and SJ with his second wife Marjorie. Chris Junior is the son of CJ who himself now has three sons, giving JJ three great grandchildren. Me and my wife Jackie have two children.

What was JJ's footballing philosophy do you think? Dad enjoyed winning at football, But he had very little time for playing out from the back! When I showed him some of the recent match highlights he almost blew a gasket; and I do remember (as does Martin Allen) Dad shouting "Stop messing about and get the f*****g ball forward!

What did he teach you about football and life? Dad led more by example really as he never had a day off sick from work, and when I was very young and Mum was at home with Simon and myself he worked two jobs to make ends meet. We learnt at an early age that we would have to wash cars and do paper rounds to earn any extra money - and that without doubt helped us to grow up quickly.

RIP JJ - What a guy!

Strong as an ox, I remember back in 2008 when we were getting the ground ready in our first season at the Vale concreting next to the players tunnel. I was leaning over at an angle of about 30 degrees smoothing the concrete as he stood behind and held onto me one handed by my belt. I had compete trust in him that I wouldn't go face first into the concrete because, boy, was he strong. He was 78 at the time.

My three favourite memories of JJ

Stones superfan MARTIN ALLEN recalls some wonderful times...

The day he was stopped by the police, driving home from Wealdstone (after the 1982 Ashford match when we won the Southern League and been in the bar celebrating all evening) ..as the officer was about to breathalyse him he got a more urgent call and had to just let him off!

The day JJ drove us to Northwich for an away game. He was a continuous smoker in those days and as JJ was filling up with fuel at The Dome roundabout in Watford on the way home after a three hour drive I said 'I don't know how JJ has manage to go so long without a

cigarette' - and as we looked out the car window he had the petrol hose in one hand filling up and a fag in the other.

I don't personally remember this, but he always used to tell the tale of our trip to Douai to watch the exibition game against Wealdstone . My dad had filled the car completely with secretly-hidden alcohol, wine and cheese. He would tell the story of how on the way back we got stopped at the border by the police who looked through the car but didn't find (or smell) anything unusual so let us go, and as we did. I did a 'wheelie' away from them on the gravel. I am sure he made that up but he just loved telling the story!

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Opposition in DOVER ATHLETIC

THE WHITES

over Athletic F.C. was formed in 1983 after the town's previous club, Dover, folded due to its debts.

The new club took Dover's place in the Southern League Southern Division, with former Dover player Alan Jones as manager and a team consisting mainly of reserve players from the old club. Initially Athletic struggled, finishing second from bottom of the table in the 1984–85 season. In November 1985 Steve McRae, who had succeeded Jones a year earlier, was sacked and replaced by Chris Kinnear.

Under Kinnear the club's fortunes turned round, with two top-five finishes followed by the Southern Division championship, and with it promotion, in the 1987–88 season. The team started strongly in the Premier Division, finishing in sixth place at the first attempt, and then winning the championship in the 1989–90 season. The club was denied promotion

to the Football Conference, however, as the Crabble Athletic Ground did not meet the standard required for that league. After finishing fourth and second in the subsequent two seasons, Dover won the title again in the 1992–93 season and this time were admitted to the Conference.

Although Dover finished in eighth place in their first season in the Conference, the following season saw the club struggling against relegation, and Kinnear was dismissed due to a combination of the

team's poor performances and his own personal problems. John Ryan was appointed as the club's new manager, but his reign was a short one and he was dismissed when the club lost seven of its first eight matches in the 1995–96 season. The club



submit their application for promotion before the required deadline.

Bill Williams took over as manager in 1997

and led the club to the FA Trophy semi-finals in the 1997-98 season and a best league finish to date of sixth place in the 1999-2000 season. Williams left the club to take a senior position with Conference rivals Kingstonian in May 2001. By now the club was in severe financial difficulties, with a number of directors resigning and debts exceeding £100.000. Amid the crisis the entire board of directors resigned,

forcing the club's Supporters' Trust to take over the running of the club and manager Gary Bellamy was sacked after just six months in the job. Former Everton goalkeeper Neville Southall took over but was dismissed just three months later, with





Clive Walker taking over in March 2002 with the club rooted to the foot of the table. The club finished the season bottom of the Conference and was relegated back to the Southern League Premier Division. The club's ongoing financial problems led to it entering a Company Voluntary Arrangement (CVA).

In Dover's first season back in the Southern League Premier Division the Whites finished in third place, albeit 17 points adrift of Tamworth, who claimed the one promotion place available that season. A poor start to the following season saw Walker replaced by Richard Langley. Dover finished the season in 19th place, before being switched to the Isthmian League Premier Division in the summer of 2004 following a re-organisation of the English football league system. The new season started with six successive defeats, which saw Langley sacked, and the financial problems continued, with the club coming within two months of being closed down. Dover were relegated to the Isthmian League Division One at the end of the season but were saved from possible extinction in January 2005 when former director Jim

Parmenter returned to head up a consortium that took over the club. Parmenter quickly sacked manager Steve Browne and convinced Clive Walker to return to the club to replace him and also arranged for the club's outstanding CVA

debts to be cleared, putting the club on a firm

financial footing for the first time in many years. Dover Athletic narrowly missed out on an immediate return to the Premier Division in the 2005-06 season, reaching the play-offs for promotion but losing out to Tonbridge Angels. The following season Dover again reached the playoffs but lost in the semi-final to Hastings United after which Walker did not have his contract renewed and was replaced by former Gillingham manager Andy Hessenthaler. In his first season in charge he led the club to the Division One South championship and promotion to the Isthmian League Premier Division. The following season Dover won a second consecutive championship and thus gained promotion to Conference South. In the 2009-10 season. Dover reached the playoffs for promotion to the Conference National but lost at the semi-final stage to Woking. The following season the club reached the third round of the FA Cup for the first time after wins over Kent rivals Gillingham in the first round and another League Two club, Aldershot Town, in the second round. In the 2012-13 season the club again reached the play-offs, but this time lost in the final to Salisbury City.

The following season Dover beat Ebbsfleet 1-0 to seal the club's return to the top flight of nonleague football for the first time since 2002. In the 2014-15 season, Dover went on another FA Cup run, beating Morecambe 1-0 in the first round and Cheltenham Town 1-0 in the second, to reach the third round proper for only the second time ever. However, they lost 4-0 at home to Premier League side Crystal Palace. During the following season, the team qualified for the playoffs for promotion to League Two.

During the 2020-21 season, the team only played 15 fixtures and as a result, the club had all of its results expunged and was fined £40,000. In addition, the club was handed a 12-point deduction for the 2021-22 season.

Former Southend United goalkeeper made the move to Crabble in August 2020. He first joined the Shrimpers in 2014 as a 15-year old, and then signed his first professional deal at the age of 18 in 2017. During his time with the Essex Club, Bexon spent six months on loan with Austrian club FC Kitzbuhel and a season with Harlow Town.

2. WILL MOSES - DEFENCE

Former Dover Athletic Academy defender who signed his first professional deal with the club in June 2021.

The 18-year-old made two National League appearances last season, making his debut away at Stockport County last October.

3. SAM WOOD (C) - DEFENCE

Our captain re-joined the club in July. The 35-yearold left-back originally joined us in August 2020 after leaving fellow National League club Bromley. The former Brentford, Wycombe Wanderers and Eastleigh, defender made 15 appearances and scored two goals in his debut season for us. During his career, Wood has also done some body doubling for Lionel Messi and Cristiano Ronaldo in adverts.

Former Gillingham midfielder who joined the club in August 2020 Bramble came through the youth ranks at Priestfield and signed his first professional deal with Gills in May 2019. While he was with Gills, TJ spent time on loan at Deal Town and East Grinstead Town. TJ has already made his international debut for Antigua and Barbuda in a 3–2 win over Bermuda in March 2018.

5. REDA JOHNSON - DEFENCE

Former Sheffield Wednesday, Plymouth Argyle, and Coventry City defender who joined as a player/ coach in June 2021. The French-born former Benin international centre-back left fellow National League club Eastleigh in February 2020. He joined the Spitfires from Coventry City in 2016 and made 85 appearances for them, scoring nine times. Johnson played 88 games for Sheffield Wednesday, 43 for Plymouth, and 34 for Coventry, where he was captain during the 2014/15 season.

6. JAKE GOODMAN - DEFENCE

Former Millwall defender signed for club in June 2021. The 6ft 2in centre-back, who signed professional terms with the Lions in 2012, spent last season with National League South club Ebbsfleet United after making the move across Kent from Bromley. He has plenty of National League experience to his name, having played a combined total of 117 games during time with Luton Town (loan), Aldershot Town (loan), Braintree Town, Maidenhead United, and Bromley. He's also played League Two football for AFC Wimbledon while on loan from Millwall.

7. KHALE DA COSTA - MIDFIELD

Winger who signed in June 2021 after leaving Tonbridge Angels in April. Da Costa joined the Angels in June 2019 from St Albans City and went on to make 46 appearances, scoring six goals. He started his football career in the academies at Fulham and Luton Town before going to play senior football at Ware Town, Hendon, Harlow Town, and Concord Rangers.

8. JAMES CATON - MIDFIELD

Winger who signed for us for a second time in June 2021. He originally joined us from Southport in February 2017 and scored two goals in two games in what were his only appearances for us. Widnes-born Caton started his career at Bolton before signing for Blackpool where he made two appearances in the Championship. He had loan spells at Accrington Stanley and Chester before signing for League One Shrewsbury in 2014. Further loan spells followed at Mansfield, Wrexham, and Lincoln City, where he scored three goals in 12 games.

10. BEN WILLIAMSON - FORWARD

Former Bromley forward joined us in June 2021. Williamson left the Ravens earlier the same month after joining them from fellow National League side Eastleigh in November 2019. He went on to make 52 appearances for our Kent rivals, scoring five times, including the goal that secured Bromley's play-off spot after beating Notts County 1-0. Williamson is no stranger to playing for Hess, having spent three years with the Spitfires, including when our manager was there. He can play anywhere across the defensive line or in midfield and he has played in the Football League for Yeovil Town, Peterborough United, Northampton Town, Dagenham & Redbridge, and Newport County.

17. TRAVIS GREGORY - MIDFIELD

Winger who earned himself a contract after impressing in pre-season ahead of the 2020/21 season. He spent time in the youth ranks at both Chelsea and Rangers.

18. HENRY WOODS - MIDFIELD

Midfielder who arrived on loan from Gillingham in July. Woods, who will wear the number 18 shirt during his time at Crabble, has made 13 appearances for Gills.

19. NOAH CARNEY - FORWARD 20. ADAM PARKES - GOALKEEPER

After ending the 2009/10 season as runners-up in the second tier of nonleague, Hessenthaler returned to Gillingham as boss for two campaigns, steering the Gills to two consecutive eighth-place finishes in League Two. A third stint at Gillingham followed two seasons later, this time as assistant manager, a similar role he held at Leyton Orient the following year, before being made manager at Brisbane Road in 2016. Dismissed by the O's later that same year, it wasn't long before Hessenthaler was back in football, joining Eastleigh before the start of the 2017/18 season, initially as assistant manager, before taking over from Richard Hill as boss just eight months after joining the club. 

46 years ago: The 'Terrible Trilogy' as Stones faced Dover three times in ten days..and lost them al

hen you've been following a football team for over 50 years there are some wonderful highs and hellish

How can you be a Wealdstone fan and not have woken up 'with a silly grin on your face' earlier this season (as fellow long-term addict Jon Taffel described it) after the 1-0 wins over Grimsby and Barnet (and Dover) launched the Stones into a comfortable place in mid-table?

Contrast that with the sort of lows that saw a desperate sequence of three defeats in 10 days against a Dover team - among the worst sides in the Southern League Premier Division - back in the mid-70s that I'm going to recount here. Yes, I know we're going back a long, long way. And yes, I know that that wasn't even the same Dover team, as 'Dover FC' was dissolved in 1983 (presumably for financial reasons) and quickly became the current 'Dover Athletic' in a heartbeat. Incidentally, it always puzzles me when historians insist that these 'new' clubs must be regarded as separate when they carry on playing at the same stadium, in the same league and with obviously the same fanbase, as in Dover Athletic's case.

Anyhow, back to 1976. I'm sure you want to hear a tale of misery just now that the Stones are back in the non-League 'big time'.

This Desperate Dover Trilogy would have been totally unexpected just a few months earlier as Eddie Presland's side, playing their second season of Southern Prem football after a superlative 1973-74 had brought the Southern League Div One (South) title and thousands of new fans to our old Lower Mead Stadium. It was the birth of 'Elmslie' Mania when that stand at the top end of Lower Mead throbbed to the chants and pubescent delight of hordes of teenage fans - many of whom (including myself, obvs) are still regulars today.

A good first season in the Southern Prem, finishing eighth, saw Presland re-sign the entire squad for 1975-76 and it seemed vindicated when Stones were third in the league at Xmas, after a glorious run to the 1st Round of the FA Cup had ended in a seesaw 4-3 defeat at Third Division Aldershot.

But then the team went over a cliff. Not the white cliffs of Dover, not yet, but as supporters we were staggered by the sudden ineptitude of a Stones team that won just once in 19 games between December 20th and March 17.

o what happened? Luckily, I had the Wealdstone goalkeeper from those dark days, John Morton, alongside me in the live stream commentary box last season and was able to ask him that same question - something that has puzzled me for some 45 years.

"Well, when you look back on it it was a combination of things but chiefly, it was the fact that

and Bobby Moss (recovered from a broken Right: The cash crisis and a fan's offer to help

we were very thin on the ground" said the 71-year-old John.

"We only had a squad of 14 or 15, and when Eddie Presland went to the board to ask for a couple of new players to get us back on track they said no. In fact, they told him he had to cut the budget! The club released my back-up keeper, Roy Mackenzie, and midfielder Vince O'Kane. It was all over the local papers so you can imagine that didn't help morale.

"And then you add in the fact that players routinely played with injuries in those days, so were often not really fit to play. I only heard about hamstring injuries, for example, since I stopped playing - in those days you had to actually break a bone to be unfit to play. In fact, in one of those three games against Dover you're talking about, John McCormick (our centre-half, ex-Palace) broke his leg and just carried on playing for a while until substituted!

"Presland saw him limping as he got on the team bus after the game and said 'Are you okay John?' and he just stamped his foot like an old racehorse and said 'Aye, I'll be right as

Wealdstone at danger level?

WEALDSTONE'S cash crisis, which has forced them to off-load players intended as vital cogs in a Southern League championship chase, has reduced the first team squad to near danger levels, it was admitted this week, writes Phil Sugden.

In answer to growing alarm among fans provoked by the dwindling size of the Southern League club's first team squad, now pared to 14 professionals, Wealdstone's public relations officer Colin Pope confessed that the number of players "left something to be desired."

A quid a head for a player

Phil Sugden's column and his sports page story on the sad plight of Wealdstone surely made good sense to the supporters of the club and to the directors.

I would like to ask the club's spokesman, Colin Pope, just what his board are doing about things.

As Mr. Sugden has warned, Wealdstone are heading for relegation.

Surely there must be a way to avoid such an unfortunate happening?

Hundreds of supporters

Hundreds of supporters would, I am certain, contribute a pound each at the next home game to help Mr. Presland buy a new player.

Why not try your friends in your next programme, Mr. Pope? I'll start you off with a fiver.

It is known that manager Eddie Presland, desperate to improve on last season's promising showing, was poised to sign at least two players before the economy axe fell.

And laster signing Samen

And latest signing Sammy Marlale, who may be the last player to join Lower Mead for some time, was intended as the first of several new faces to bolster the club's championship ambitions and dream of Football League status.

Although Stones are only one of many Southern League clubs struggling to scrape enough money together to keep going they now have one of the smallest playing staffs in the League.

"We take the point of your correspondence," declared Mr. Pope, "and agree that the numerical strength of the squad does leave something to be desired.

desired.
"Manager Eddie Presland feels the same but, alas, we are governed by available finances and regretfully the money just isn't available to provide the cover we would really like.

"Like everything else these days footballers are very expen-

"Most clubs are in the same position of course. Many have had to prune their playing staffs," he added.

But back to Dover. The season ended with the Kent side fifth from bottom while the Stones were fourth from the foot (four should have gone down) until Dunstable Town imploded and had to withdraw from the league.

So, when the teams met in the Godawful Trilogy in early February 1976 the fans weren't expecting too much in terms of entertainment. They got even less...

'Stones Cup hopes are swept overboard

WEALDSTONE'S last chance of riding the crest of a successful wave in a season saturated with failure was swept out to sea and sunk without trace at rain drenched Dover on Monday evening.

Full of possession but fatally short on punch 'Stones finally lost this Southern League Cup, quarter-final dash because they dithered at the back.

But it was up front that the Lower Mead outfit's challenge really faded in this frenzied but fumbling tie, played before a meagre audience of 218.

Thrashed 4-1 at the Crabble in the league five days earlier Wealdstone created, but squandered enough openings in the first 20 minutes to exact crushing vengeance.

With only six minutes gone Godfrey's free-kick was headed on to Duck who, with the goal

at his mercy, shot straight at the prostrate Gatsby's body. And after Morton had brave-ly thwarted the home side at the other end Lewis missed another

chance after 19 minutes.

Duck and Eglite combined cleverly to dissect dodgy Dover's defence but as the ball arrowed through to the midfiel-der's feet he drove directly into the spreadeagled Gatsby's path.

But missed chances apart Wealdstone stumbled into a

maze of their own making.

With Duck pushed wide Eglite acted for long periods as target man in the middle and whatever the Dutchman's talent it isn't winning the ball in the air or laying it off with consistent

And without Bobby Moss s polish in the middle 'Stones struggled to make any real impact going forward despite a lion's share of the ball. With Watson back in the side

in midfield, leaving Fulton at left-back, young Hanson was relegated to the substitute's bench in a move that provided more bite than in Saturday's listless display against Cam-

But 'Stones still lacked vital vision and direction

As sheets of rain began swir-

ling across the field it was Dover who sneaked ahead with an

After Watson and Morton had frantically prevented Dover snatching a second, Eglite blazed wide with a 71st. minute drive that should have hit the rifteen minutes from time

Hanson came on for Byrne but five minutes later 'Stones were

2-0 down and out.

Morton's goal-kick was headed back into the visitors's half and an inocuous cross swept into the box.


London Bridge departure, via Chatham, split in two at the Kentish town and of course I was in the wrong half of the train. I half-heard an announcement, definitely heard the sound of a train moving off and belatedy realised I wouldn't be at Dover in time for the kick off. Chatham Railway Station is not the most exciting place to be on a cold, misty Wednesday evening as you wait two hours for the next connection.

Finally, a quick cab dash from Dover Station to the ground saw my arrival just before half time - and I genuinely believed I had come to the wrong place and the wrong game as I approached up the steep incline to the eerily-quiet Crabble. The lights were on, but there seemed to be nobody home. I peered through the gates. There was one team in white, and one team in red shirts and blue shorts Then I recognised Stones full-back Chris Kinnear as he trotted over to take a throw in - ves! I was in the right place but why were we wearing such a strange strip? And why were there so few people in the ground?

There was barely a coachload of fellow Stones fans in attendance, a legacy of our dreadful recent run and the fact that the SL Cup never attracted much interest - and they couldn't explain the bizarre red/blue combination. Even worse, they told me we had gone 1-0 down only moments before (scored by the apty-named Breach) despite dominating the whole of the first half and missing chance after chance. And what had happened to me?

I was too debilitated (and embarassed) to tell the full story, and we watched on as Dover hit a decisive second goal through Coxhill. Johnny Lewis pulled one back in the 80th minute and we huffed and puffed to no avail.

It was actually a vastly-improved performance from the Stones despite the loss of McCormick, Bobby Moss from a broken nose and the suffering of flu victims John Morton and Bill Byrne. The only good news was that



there was spare seat for me on the coach going back to Harrow - and a right royal send off for the fans as the police turned up mob-handed to avoid a repeat of the previous week's stone-throwing shenanigans.

With just 218 fans in the ground they surely wouldn't have been too hard to restrain?

CHANGING FACE OF THE CONFERENCE

Non-league's top division is now a different animal

ere's an interesting comparison, the page below left is taken from the Enfield FC programme from the 1986-87 season, the last Conference season before automatic promotion and relegation between non-League's top flight and the Football League.

Enfield ran the story because it illustrated the fact that, despite only rating about halfway in the league table of crowd figures, they were the most-watched club away from home. thus making them 'the most popular club to watch'. Our own

home average of 617 was itself pretty dismal, yet we were the fifth most-watched team away from home

Every team listed in that table from 35 years ago was true 'non-League'. And the crowds reflected that. Compare those figures to the current season (below) and what a comparison!

Our home average of 1,534 today would have put us second in the crowd table in 1986. only five people below leaders Telford Utd. And as for Enfield... well, as they said about Accrington... 'Who are they?'

PULLING POWER! With this season's Conference campaign approaching the half-way point, it gives us an

opportunity to examine how the attendances have varied around the clubs.

The deceptive nature of home attendance figures is that they are not necessarily fully representative. Some clubs, such as ourselves, suffer from being close to other well-supported sides, or from being located in relatively small towns, such as Frickley Athletic. A much fairer comparison for crowd 'pulling-power' is the average gate that a club draws to its away fixtures. 




