Stones are safe and heading for a points total few would have expected... after a season of many great memories. Job done!

nd of season brings the opportunity to reflect upon the previous nine months.

The target at the start of this season would have been to secure another campaign in the National League and probably gaining around fifty points.

By the close of play today, the later might have been achieved, but more importantly the former was secured officially with five games to go, even if most of us thought it was done and dusted after we beat Weymouth here at the Vale in the middle of March. Job done.

As we discussed on the last **Stonescast**, we have been pretty consistent throughout the season. Won the games in the mini league that mattered, struggled against the more agricultural sides in the middle of the table, whilst we have performed well against the top of table teams but generally fallen to a narrow defeat.





We do better against the better footballing sides. The management team have done a fine job, the "process" has worked, the duo have matured and learned on their journey as much has the team. We haven't gone on long runs of wins nor defeats - when we have lost badly, we have picked up a decent result pretty much the next game, the stats show that consistency has been the name of the game.

s fans, we have been fortunate to see football at the highest level that Wealdstone have played at. Yes, we have been in the National League before, but that was in a part time league, with only one season of relegation down from the then division three. Now, it's a full-time league with multitude of BELTs that have been stuck down here for years, with budgets three or four times ours, as we plough the furrow, with Altrincham (for the time being), of a part time club. No surprise that all three clubs going down are part timers.





'm not going to interview Jerome Okimo this season as it's only couple of years since I spoke to him the last time", I told programme editor Mark Hyde last week.

Then I had a look back and realised that it was FIVE years ago!

Time has flown by since Jerome was persuaded to return to the Stones in the summer of 2017 by the then-manager Gordon Bartlett.

'Not that I needed a lot of persuading" laughed the now-33 year-old Jerome, who had just spent a year fighting relegation from the National League with Braintree Town.

"That was a bit of a nightmare - I was living in Northolt and the journey round to Essex every day was dispiriting. And I didnt get on with the manager Hakan Hayrettin (who's just got Maidstone promoted back to the NL). So although I'd be moving to part-time football, coming back to Wealdstone was a

relief as I knew what a well-run and friendly club it was".

Supporters will recall Jerome being an integral part of the Stones side that won the Ryman League in 2014. And I remember, at the end-of-season presentation evening, trying to talk our star winger Tom Pett out of leaving the club for a career in the league with Stevenage. And trying to talk midfield maestro Glen Little out of retiring to take up coaching full time.

What we didn't know was that Jerome - our fast-raiding left back - was also on the radar of





Stevenage boss Graham Westley, and within weeks he was off on trial with the League Two club.

Wes Parker had scored

against Bognor Regis

"It was a great education for me. And I found myself making my League debut at Hartlepool in early August, up against Marlon Harewood!" he laughed.

If he could cope with Harewood (who scored bucketloads of Premier League goals with West Ham and Villa) he could cope with anything, and Stevenage reached the play-offs that season only to lose to Southend United at Roots

Westley decided to guit the game at the end of that season and Jerome's face didn't quite fit with the new manager... so Braintree stepped in for his unfortunate stint. He played every minute of every game as the Essex side were relegated back to the National League South. And although Hayrettin wanted him to stay on, Jerome quickly accepted GB's plea to return to the Stones.

It did mean he was back as a part-timer - but fortunately Brentford FC took him on as a coach

just as they were remodelling their entire football structure. "Brentford decided not to go with the usual academy structure. instead running with a B team (instead of under-23s) and with four teams of 16-19 vear-olds in an educational programme at the club's sports hub in Gunnersbury Park. There are two astroturf pitches, a gym and leisure centre" said

Jerome

He is now one of eight coaches in charge of the four teams, having passed his A Licence coaching badge last summer.

"So what does a typical week look like for you now?" I asked him.

"It's very busy! On Monday I'm at the gym in the morning, then coaching for two and a half hours in the afternoon. Tuesday means more gym work, then coaching again before I set off for a Wealdstone match or training in the evening. Wednesday is matchday for the 16-19 year-old so I'm involved in preparation of those teams, and travelling

> to wherever the match is. Thursday is training in the morning and then academic work for the

teenagers in the afternoon: and then Wealdstone train-

> ing for me in the evening. Friday is education all day for the 16-19 year olds. and that means covering for teachers and generally helping out. Saturdays is obviously the Wealdstone match for me, and then a bit of rest and rehab on Sundays".

"Does that all get harder as you get older?" I asked. 'Maybe psychologically, but I feel pretty good. I'm not that old!"

t seems only yesterday that Jerome was being welcomed into the club in the summer of 2013. The Stones had just missed out in the Ryman League play-offs and there was a bit of a clear out with cult figures like Richard Jolly and Lee Chappell leaving the club. Skipper Chapps was being replaced at left wing back, apparently, by the Chalfont St Peter defender Jerome Okimo.

As fans, we were asking around. We heard he liked to get forward and had a rasping left foot. Scores a few goals. Sounds quite decent.

And then, when the season kicked off at Maidstone United's brand new Gallagher Stadium

a few weeks later, on its brand new plastic pitch, there was Jerome running out at centre-back!

"I'd played there a few times at Chalfont but yes, that surprised me too!" he laughed. Yet he did a great job alongside Wes Parker as the Real Stones nabbed a 1-1 draw. Jerome - who now lives in South Ealing with girlfriend Miriam - had grown up in Northolt, playing for Sunday League sides like Ruislip Rangers and taking a B-tech course in football at the West London Academy near the Target roundabout.

"A guy called Danny Edwards was the head man, and he was also Chalfont St Peter manager"

said Jerome. "I played there for a few years before joining Wealdstone but what a great season that was".

'What have been the highlights for you since you returned in 2017? I asked him. "I remember you being played in central midfield for a while under Bobby Wilkinson..."

"Yes, that was interesting! It was really just like having another defender in there. I think I was in there to replace Sam Cox who didn't see eye to eye with Bobby, as you my remember. It was funny having three 'lefties' in there, though, with Danny Green and Ricky Wellard. I was obviously the playmaker!

ut the season we won the National League South was special. Especially that seminal game against Bath City... wasn't it the week after the Havant game? Great performances, as Havant were second in the table, behind us, when we went there and beat them and that put Bath into second place before we faced them. And then we beat them 7-0!

"And then the behind closed doors season, after promotion, when we won those five NL games in a row. I don't think we realised at the time what an achievement that was".

"Wasn't it in one of those games that you scored that amazing own goal, off your right foot wasn't it?"

"Thanks Tim! I was trying erase that from my memory! I think it was the Wrexham game we won 4-3, when I tried to clear if off my left foot when I should have used my right, and it beat Harry Isted at his near post. I'd rather remember the goals we scored that afternoon... Jacob Mendy Mendy was brilliant in those games".

So who has been your favourite partner at



centre-back?" I asked him. "If you could choose one to play alongside, who would that be?"

"Well, I'll give you three" he said. "Tom Hamblin, because he was so strong in the air, and a good talker, and because he became a close friend of mine. And then Connor Stevens, who is so mobile, and we struck up a good understanding. And finally of course Jack Cooke, who has been legendary this season.... so good in the air, and deceptively quick, and those long legs get him out of trouble all the time."

And who's been the toughest opponent this season?

"Wow, so many good players at this level... but I'd say Junior Moarias (here last Saturday with Dagenham) is very tricky and hard to get off the ball with his low centre of gravity; and Harry Cordwell at Southend was a tough customer too. And then you play sides like Stockport and Wrexham and they have good movement right across their forward lines and keep you on your toes. Very hard to handle."

Are Stockport and Wrexham the best sides then, in your opinion? I asked. "Yes... Stockport just keep on coming, they have so many entries in the box and their fans really get behind them to lift them. Chesterfield were decent too, and Notts County - but not as good as they were last season."

"And have you found this season enjoyable?"

"Oh yes, we love playing football this way but I can understand why the fans feel frustrated. You can feel and hear the frustration coming off the terraces - but we have to be patient and draw teams out, otherwise if you give up possession too easily you get turned over and that's when it gets dangerous."

Rhodrl: Not sure if it was a Wealdstone game or Chelsea or even Wembley FC. I went to a few games with my Dad that season.

Do you follow any other team? David: Chelsea. Rhodri: Chelsea too, but not that closely.

What's the most memorable game you've EVER seen? David: Still the one I remember most Dave and his son Rhodri at The Vale and (below) Stones (In light shirts) take on Leatherhead at Lower Mead in David's first Wealdstone game 44 years ago. Bobby Moss and debut boy Alan Doyle can't quite force the ball home at the Elmslie End

as a kid, Chelsea 4 Liverpool 2 in the FA Cup 1977-78 – most of the kids at school were Liverpool fans so Monday morning in the playground was great!

Rhodrl: Bath City which was my first away game, a 1 -1 draw 3 or 4 seasons ago .. as much for the day out as for the game. I now understood why people travel to away games.

And the best Wealdstone game? David: Southend

away on Good Friday a few weeks ago! Great atmosphere - okay a 'smash and grab' performance but so great to see Stones beat a big club in front of almost 6,000 fans away.

Rhodri: Same game, same reason.

Who introduced you to the Stones? David: My Dad Harry. .. he took me to games at Chelsea and Wealdstone as a kid. I've got to be honest, I stopped watching when they left Lower Mead but came back as I moved to Ruislip pretty much same time the Stones did.

Rhodri: My Dad.

What level of football do you prefer? David: I enjoy watching the top level games on TV but you can't beat going to games watching Wealdstone.

Rhodri: I prefer Wealdstone... supporting the local team (it's not like I live in Chelsea)

How big a part of your life is the game? David: A big part ... I love it .. the home games, the away days out.. hard to measure, but I enjoy the whole experience.

Rhodrl: Not a big part .. I enjoy going to games but I'm not a big football watcher out-

side of going to watch Wealdstone.

How do you fit watching football in with your family/working life? David: No problem fitting in with family life. It's a challenge with shift work ... some games I just cant make. As Rhodri comes to games too I guess its part of family life and gives my wife peace and relaxation for the time we are out watching games!

Rhodri: I have missed one or two when I've had too much revising to do before an Exam. But I go to majority of home games and some aways.

Where do you work? David: In Administration, office based shift work

Rhodrl: I'm in the 6th form at Bishop Ramsey studying for A levels.

How did you find following the Stones last season by the Ilve stream? David: Bearing in mind we had no other option I thought that the team behind it did a fantastic job relaying the games to us. Commentaries were a lot better than most of the if not all the clubs in the league. They were something to look forward to during a pretty miserable time – the games at times were a tough watch though!

Rhodrl: I didn't watch it during lockdown - but I did see the home Torquay game this season when it was behind closed doors and thought coverage was good.

How dld that compare to being back in grounds this year ? David: You don't how much you enjoy things until you are stopped from doing them. Been determined to see as many of the new grounds this season and had some great days out!

Who are the best Wealdstone players you've ever seen? David: I'll stick to best players .. Stuart Pearce (I remember his free kicks for the Stones) Billy Clifford, Richard Jolly, Godfrey Poku, Mendy Mendy, Jack Cook, Ross Lafayette. Rhodri: Jack Cook

What's the best away day you've experienced so far? David and Rhodri: Southend! For the day out and game combined. Hard to beat a warm day at the seaside, not too long a journey and an away win.

Do you think Stones can aspire to playing in the EFL? David: Not sure — I think they need to establish themselves at this level first ...the league seems to get stronger every year so that in itself is a big achievement. The management team have done a fantastic job this season. The board appear to have a sensible approach to it all.

Rhodrl: No... I'd like them to but don't think its realistic at the moment.

Where do you think the future of the club Iles? David: Tricky .. I'd go for stay where they are as long as possible and keep growing slowly. I think this level of football can be a money pit even for the most astute business people ...(Be interesting to ask Barnet fans if they would rather be back at Underhill or at the Hive).

Rhodri: To stay where they are, if they can.

Opposition in focus Kings LYNN TOWN

THE LINNETS

HE original club dates back to 1868 but ceased playing in the middle of the following decade. A new club was formed at a meeting on 30 August 1881, known locally as Lynn Town, and the name King's Lynn was not adopted until 1953.

Lynn won the Norfolk Senior Cup and went on to win it three more times at the end of the decade, in 1897 becoming founder members of the Norfolk & Suffolk League and were champions four times before World War I. In 1935 they were founder members of the Eastern Counties League. They left in 1946 to join the United Counties League, but returned to the ECL in 1948. During the 1949–50 sea- son they set the league's record attendance of 8,387 for a local derby with Wisbech Town, and also set their own record later in the season when 12,931 saw them play Exeter City

in the FA Cup. In 1953–54 they won the league and league cup, and at the end of the season stepped up to the Midland League. Four years later they joined the Southern League when it added a second division, becoming members of the South East Division for a transitional season.

In 1961–62 King's Lynn reached the FA Cup third round for the first and only time. After beating Chelmsford City 2–1 in the first round, they defeated Coventry City by the same scoreline at High eld Road. In the third round the

club were drawn away to Everton, where they lost 4–0. The club ended the league season by being relegated to Division One but returned to the Premier Division after nishing second in 1963–64. They were relegated again to Duv One North in April 1971... just in time to meet the Stones in our first season of semi-pro football.

In 1980 the club transferred to the Northern Premier

League for just three years, returning to the Southern League and winning the East Anglian Cup again in 1984–85. They were relegated to the Midland Division at the end of the 1986–87 season, where they remained until nishing second in 1995–96 and earning promotion back to the Premier Division. They were relegated

again in 2001-02, but returned to the Premier Division after winning Division One East in 2003-04. They won the League Cup in 2004-05 and qualified for the promotion play-offs in 2005-06 and 2006-07, but lost on both occasions. Although they were promoted to the Conference North as champions in 2007-08, they were demoted a vear later due to ground grading issues. Midway through their first season back in the Northern Premier League the club folded

due to financial difficulties.



The club was established in 2010 after King's Lynn was wound up in 2009, and admitted to the Premier Division of the United Counties League they finished runners-up in their first season and reached the semi- nals of the FA Vase, where

ng's Lynn have played at the Walks for their entire xistence, with the stadium name deriving from the historic park next to the stadium.



they lost 6–2 on aggregate to Coalville Town. After finishing as runners-up again in 2011–12 the club were promoted to Division One South of the Northern Premier League. They won Division One South at the first attempt, earning promotion to the Premier Division.

In 2015 the club were transferred to the Premier Division of the Southern League and lost 2–1 to Slough Town in the play-off final two years later The club were placed in the Premier Division Central for the 2018–19 season, going on to finish as runners-up and qualifying for the play-offs - and after defeating Stratford Town and Alvechurch, they were promoted to the National League North following a 3–2 win against Warrington Town in the super play-off final.

Amazingly, in their first season at this level the Linnets found themselves second in the league, two points behind leaders York City with two games in hand when the pandemic struck. The National League later decided the final league table would be based on points per game, resulting in King's Lynn being declared champions!

In 2020/21 the Linnets finished their first season at Naional Leahue level in 21st possition.

2. LUIS FERNANDEZ - DEFENCE

THINGS WOT WE LIKED THIS WEEK

e've been on the wrong end of some strange refereeing decisions this season - witness Mr Tom Bishop who has twice apologised to the club for jaw-dropping mistakes in games. And Stuart Maynard commented after the soft sending-off of Alex Dyer at Yeovil last Monday that blunders by officials have possibly cost his side ten points this season.

But sometimes your club is a victim of what can only be called 'an act of God'. Or otherwise 'an act of poor goal design'.

Famously, half a dozen years ago, Stones were denied victory at Eastbourne by a late headed equaliser that went through the side net and into Jonathan North's goal. You have to attach a bit of blame to our defenders who thought something was amiss but failed to notify the ref, and even Northy who said he was 'surprised to be beaten on my near post". It was really down to poor net-pegging, which Eastbourne later denied although it was bleedin' obvious from the match highlights that the ball went through the side netting.

Anyway.... fast forward to early last month and Chesham United, eager for points to aid their push for Southern League South division promotion, were at Walton Casuals. For old-school grass devotees like myself (and even, admittedly, with an interest in the very quirkiness of the goals themselves), Walton's Elmbridge Xcel Sports Hub ground quickly reveals itself (even in the name) as being very 21st century.

The ground opened five years ago and is also home to Walton athletics Club - thankfully not with an athletics track around the pitch, but with a mirrorimage main stand (much like Wingate & Finchley's unique design) that faces out onto the track on one side, and the football pitch on the other. A plastic pitch of course, for community use.

We also liked these Daggers fans last week. Skin-tight lycra is always a good look

Indeed, it ticks all the boxes.

Plastic pitch: yep. Offthe-shelf concrete and aluminium terracing: yep. Soul-less environment: definitely. Wheel on, wheel off goals: I'm afraid so.

Normally, this wouldn't matter. Most National League club have Has the ball fully crossed the line? No Nould it have fully crossed the line were it not for the awful design of the goal? Absolutely yes.

So technically not a goal, but a terrible injustice. Impossible situation for the ref.



temporary goals that they wheel on before the matches for a spot of goalkeeping/shooting practice. But these goals look very ugly and cumbersome.... and, well, now they are revealed as detrimental to the very game itself. I've seen videos of matches at Kingsbury's Silver Jubilee Park and at Worthing, where the whole plastic nature of the grounds makes acceptance of these temporary goals with their reinforced structure and, indeed, wheels, part of the new landscape.

Chesham United's picturesque Meadow ground is the very antithesis of this... and maybe that's why they were so up in arms on April 2 when THE INCIDENT occurred. Chesham striker Jayden Thompson Brissett opened up the Walton defence with a smart one-two and placed his shot wide of the home keeper to a point just inside the far post. The ball was undoubtedly going to brush the post on its way into the net when, instead, the ball was arrested by the triangular strut reinforcing the foot of the post and bounced back out,

across the six yard box and into the keeper's arms.

What could the referee do? For once, you have to have some sympathy for the official as he waved play on. Fortunately, Chesham won the game 1-0 and they went on to finish just one point outside a play-off position... though with a GD just one goal different to Weston Super Mare, who claimed fifth place. That decision might have radically affected their season.



51 years ago today: Wealdstone's last amateurs, round the back of the ABC

Friday May 7 1971, Presidents Memorial Trophy second leg: Wealdstone 5 Wembley 1

hen Wealdstone played their very last match as amateurs, on this day 51 years ago, I was just coming up to my 14th birthday. It seemed a good time for new beginnings.

At that same time you could feel the weight of history surrounding the club's decision to join the semi-pro ranks of the Southern League just a few months earlier. The Stones might have been having a ropey 1970-71 season but just five years earlier the club were established as Isthmian League top six heavyweights with average crowds of over 2,000 and exhilarating winners of the Amateur Cup at Wembley in front of 45,000 excited fans.

This teenager had already fallen in love with Wealdstone: the tight, homely, atmospheric Lower Mead ground just a short train ride from home in Hatch End; the legends of Lindsay, Townsend and Johnny Ashworth and the historic club, fallen on hard times but who still had a proud away following of hundreds on the Home Counties Isthmian circuit.

I'd only been to a few away games: to Leighton Town for an FA Cup tie the previous October (due to the coincidence of a caravan weekend nearby); to Tooting for a London Senior Cup tie in January (due to a visit to grandparents nearby); and then, funnily enough, to Grosvenor Vale to watch a Middlesex Senior Cup tie against Ruislip Manor (first away trip under my own steam, four miles from Hatch End on my bicycle).

All were unsuccessful. One defeat (Tooting) and two draws, both of which ended in handwringing home defeats in the replays.

But as the Isthmian season meandered to a close - the Stones in lower mid table- there was an unexpected treat in store as I perused the match programme for our final league game (against fellow strugglers Woking, a surprisingly upbeat 3-0 win). "Don't forget the President's Memorial Trophy games against Wembley FC to round off the season" I read. "With the first leg at Vale Farm on Tuesday".

Gosh, this was another away game I could get to. Just another couple of stops on the line from Harrow & Wealdstone, getting off at North Wembley. No Google maps in those days, just a dog eared London A-Z that would have to help me negotiate the route.

"Just mind you don't end up at Wasps!"

was awash with such competitions. The Stones had competed for the Uxbridge Hospital Cup, the NW Middx Invitation cup, the East Anglian Cup. the Battle of Britain Cup, the Mithras Cup, the Hitchin Centenary Cup, the AFA Senior cup, the London Charity and Challenge Cups, the London Senior Cup (plus of of course the FA Cup and Amateur Cup)... and in this 1970-71 season the

Stones also played in the Premier Midweek Floodlit League in which, confusingly, we played several teams who were also in the Isthmian

League.

This President's Trophy had only been played for three vears (to commemorate a former Wembley President, unsurprisingly) and was soon to become a victim of the more competitive Southern League season.... but to clubs like Wembley and, yes even Wealdstone, it was the only silverware on offer.

And it seemed, suddenly quite important. A couple of old boys next to me were discussing how two players were sent off for a punch-up in this fixture the year before unheard of, they said, had never seen it happen before at Vale Farm - when suddenly the very same thing was happening before our eyes.

The referee jumped between

the two warring players (Stones flame-haired Dave Yerby and the Lions' Billy Gill) and seemed set to just lecture them. But he then pointed to the dressing rooms.

"But it's a friendly, ref!" shouted one of the old boys. "Blimey, not that friendly" said his chum.

Former Wealdstone reserve Alan Jackett had already put Wembley ahead 1-0 and that's how it stayed but of course we still had the decisive second leg to look forward to.

o my 13-year old eyes this held all the glamour of the two legged European ties I'd grown up with: Newcastle winning the Cup Winners Cup in 1969 on aggregate, 6-4 against Ujpest Dozsa; Man Utd reaching the European cup final the previous year after beating Real Madrid 4-3 on aggregate.

Now the Mighty Stones would be facing the same second leg drama!

Well, for some reason (probably because the FA Cup final was being screened live on

Saturday May 8: Arsenal 2 Liverpool 1 if you're interested) the return leg of the PMT, as I like to call it, was staged on Friday May 7. Which makes it 51 years to the day.

And as I strode along Station Road that evening, up and over the railway bridge, past the Tai Mahal restaurant, the grocers (that also sold vinyl albums and dodgy magazines),

was a Friday night and the flocks of people weren't headed for the football ground next to the cinema, but actually INTO the cinema. The spy thriller 'Get Carter' with Michael Kane and Britt Ekland had just been released and was clearly even more of an attraction than Wealdstone v Wembley. Silly me.

Nevertheless, as I passed the popcornmunching hordes there was a decent 500 crowd inside Lower Mead for the momentous battle... and even better, the Stones pulled out one of the best performances of an admittedly abject season to thrash the Lions 5-1 (5-2 on aggregate). Especially, as the match report mentions, considering that all but one of the team would be jettisoned for the following semi-pro season.

A glorious new era, as it turned out. Within 15 years the Stones were the best part- time team outside the Football League and. incredibly, that fact is still true today.

I remember the queue here (when it was named the Harrow ABC) to see "Grease" in late August 78 was so far up the (side) road that we got to watch a bit of the first Wealdstone home game of the season at Lower Mead!

Two important bits of my childhood there but the football ground was destroyed and is now a supermarket I believe. The awful cladding went up on the fleapit before I can remember but my parents always sighed and complained whenever we passed it.

I last went there in the late 80s, just before I moved away for good - in fact, I think the last film I saw was "Hairspray."

Proof! A bit of Googling came up with this message concerning the queue snaking around the High Mead side of the ground. He/she should have given up and watched the whole game!

t's all a bit surreal, looking back on it. That week back in 1985 when the Stones were about to make football history - the first ever club to win the Conference and FA Trophy double.

The Gola League trophy was already secure

with a game to spare, thanks to the 1-0 win at Kettering Town on the Saturday (May 4). Our nearest rivals Nuneaton, Bath, Scarborough, Altrincham and Dartford couldn't catch us But the club had to squeeze three games into the next seven days before the Trophy Final at Wembley against Boston United.

The Bank Holiday Monday (May 6) took Brian Hall's side to nearby Barnet for our final Gola Conference league game. And the 7-0 defeat with a weakened side, though embarrassing, didn't matter.

But what about the two Capital League games that had to be accommodated? This new competition, designed to give run-outs to fringe players, had become an encumbrance - and there were home games against Barnet and Enfield to be

accommodated

Then came Brian Hall's phone call to Steve Marshall, a Stones official and also goalkeeper/ manager of SFC Wealdstone, the supporters club team who were top of the Marathon Sunday League Division Four. "Can SFC fill in for the two Capital League games Steve? You can have a couple of players to help out". Looking back,

'Hughie' must have been a bit miffed as one of the players was Ray Goddard, the ex-Orient keeper who was back-up to Bob Iles. Hughie wouldn't get to play against the

And so it was that, one day after the 7-0 annihilation at Underhill, that SFC Wealdstone (plus Goddard and striker Lance Pedlar) ran out at Lower Mead to face a - thankfully also makeshift Barnet side. And we beat them 5-0 thanks to a Pedlar hat trick and two memorable strikes from supporters Martin Allen and Gordon McKay.

On the Friday night (Trophy Final eve) we were asked to do it all again in the final Capital League game against an Enfield supporters team and smashed them 10-1! Enfield were so humiliated by the scoreline that they insisted the game be replayed with 'proper teams' the next week. They were beaten 5-1!

WE'VE MET BEFORE <<<< >BY TIM PARKS



Half a century years ago, **Stones visited Kings Lynn for** the first time.. and scored all three goals!

Saturday September 11 1971. Southern League Div One North: Kings Lynn 2 Wealdstone 1

t's amazing how useful football be in everyday life. My wife will routinely disagree with that but here's one very good example: nine years ago, when my daughter went into labour over two months early, the midwives at Enfield Chase Hospital went into panic mode as they realised they'd need an incubator and emergency care for little Daisy. The Enfield ward was full up.

"Where's the nearest hospital with a specialised baby unit?" demanded the doctor. "Er... Kings Lynn appar-

ently" said the nurse with one quick phone call and he said 'Where on earth is that? Can we get her there in time?"

"It's 101 miles exactly" I piped up.

The consultant looked round. "Well, that's okay then, that's less than 90 minutes away. How do you know that?" he asked, rather suspiciously. I was going to answer: "Peter Fuller, 1971" but thought better of it. There are times when mentioning a Wealdstone away game can be an unwanted distraction.

(The reason I knew that was because, in Pete Fuller's programme notes before the Stones' firstever visit to King Lynn, he casually mentioned that he expected to see a good turn-out of our fans at The Walks Stadium the following week 'as it's exactly 101 miles away, not far at all'. Those things stick in your mind).

Anyway, that was pretty much 51 years ago and probably the reason I remembered it was that it came fresh on the heels of Wealdstone quitting the amateur London-based Isthmian League for the exciting adventure of life in the semi-pro

Southern League.

I wasn't really old enough to be allowed to go to away games. But the tantalising thought of swopping trips to Tooting & Mitcham, Enfield or Barking for long-haul missions to Stourbridge, Kettering, Burton Albion, Banbury and yes, Kings Lynn (in



Norfolk what's more!) was tantamount to having Christmas Dav's presents and Easter Sunday's chocolate eggs all rolled into one.

o. obviously, I wasn't able to go to Kings Lynn on Saturday September 11

1971. And I had to wait until the Harrow Observer plopped onto our doormat the following Friday morning to glean even the merest of details about our boys' brave 2-1 defeat, all that way from

By that time I was excited about the prospect of travelling just a few miles down the road to watch the Stones in FA Cup First Qualifyng action at Harrow Borough the following afternoon. Borough were in the Athenian League which was, well, a step down from the Isthmian League which was (in my eyes anyway) at least one step down from the Southern League (Div One North) in which we were competing. We were sure to smash them out of sight.

My eyes scanned the report of the Kings Lynn game for confirmation of my biased views. And yes, look, we scored all three goals at Kings Lynn! Our large-arsed, Brylcreem-coated centre foward Gary Townend put one in the Kings Lynn net while Stones defender Bill Bailey and our goalkeeper John Barr took credit for both the Linnets' goals. So we won 3-0, really!

It only took 24 hours for the realisation to dawn that this Stones side really weren't very good. We toiled to a 1-0 win at Earlsmead with

Defence again in dire trouble

Wealdstone hit three, but still go down

King's Lynn 2, Wealdstone 1

WEALDSTONE scored three times at The Walks Stadium, King's Lynn, on Saturday, but unfortunately two of the goals were for the opposition as 'Stones gave their poorest display to date.

Although they topped their qualifying section of the Southern League Cup, it seems Wealdstone may find things tougher in the league. They have now played two league matches, lost both and conceded six goals while scoring two.

As has already been stressed. Stones must find a commanding centre-half. Bill Bailey had a nightmare game in this position and capped it all with an own goal.

Until something is done to strengthen this department all the good work by the forwards will continue to be cancelled out.

Stones had the advantage of an early goal to cheer them on their way when after four minutes Gary Townend accepted a simple chance set up by skipper Dixie Hale.

Despite a succession of blunders by the visiting defence. King's Lynn rarely looked like scoring with clever midfield build up breaking down through poor finishing and the agile Barr's ability to clutch high crosses.

Wealdstone, in fact, survived for 60 minutes before deciding to give Lynn the goals they could not get for themselves.

First Balley, hard pressed on the 18 yards line, pushed back only to find Barr standing behind him without hope of collecting.

And with 20 minutes to go the luckless Barr, who could not otherwise be faulted, could only pain Blockam's corner kick into his own net.

Wealdstone, in fairness, were handicapped in losing John Furie with an ankle injury after 30 minutes.

Substitute Cockell was rarely able to get into the game and as a result 'Stones forwards were too often seeking the ball in midfield to have time to move up.

Most disturbing aspect of Stones play was a poor work rate and terrible distribution, with the ball often given to the Lynn forwards on a plate as a result of close passing in dangerous positions.

Yet Wealdstone could and should have saved a point in the closing minutes when Watson, best of the visiting runners, set up a chance for Mahon.

The fullback's shot was blocked by home 'keeper Steel and Townend, with the goal at his mercy, smashed a shot against the 'keeper instead of side stepping for an easy chance.

Last minute penalty gives 'Stones points

FOR THE second time in five days Wealdstone left victory until the last minute and had to come behind to win the points, and when the Lynn players complained bitterly that that last-gasp penalty should have been no more than a free-kick for obstruction they had more than a few sympathisers among the home crowd, writes Phil Sugden.

Certainly Micky Brown was obstructed in the box, but whether he would have scored had not Lynn's Kerr stood in his path is open to debate, Personally I doubt if out-of-touch Micky would have netted.

What matters is that Brown, who had another dismal game, made no mistake with his spot-kick to register his 20th goal of the season, 'Stones won the points and have lost only one of their last ten games.

Stones won without ever really convicing despite winning 17 corners to Lynn's seven, having much more of the play and a dozen shooting opportunities. They climbed to the half way position in the league table without showing their best, perhaps because Trevor Watson was strangely subdued and certainly because Ray Whittaker's crosses were still badly missed.

After the energetic Byrne had twice gone close 'Stones again gave away a goal when Dave Cockell made a hash of his tackle and Brooks was left with the easiest of chances.

This produced a spell of all out assault from Wealdstone and Dyson finally crossed for Bill Byrne to soar high and head yet another fine goal.

Young Alick Brown, who had another splendid game, cheekily attempting moves which belied his years and experience, was so close with a flying header and a bullet-like shot and then John Pearce was out of luck with a shot which hit the bar.

Micky Brown showed his lack of confidence by passing when facing an open goal and Byrne was only inches out before that penalty, which will always remain doubtful in my mind, settled the issue.

he Stones made a little bit of history when beating Kings Lynn 3-1 in the return game at Grosvenor Vale last season: It was our first league 'double' at National League level for 34 years.

In fact, as we reported 'live' at the end of that livestream back in March last year, we didn't manage even one league double in our last season in the Conference (1987-88) and we had to go back a year to a pair of wins over Cheltenham Town for the last time it happened!

Although many people would rather brush the 2020-21 pandemic-ravaged season under the carpet, Danny Parish will never forget his Wealdstone debut as he scored all three goals at the Walks Stadium when the clubs met in October last year.

That Tuesday night trip came just three days after Dean Brennan's team were bundled out of the FA Cup at the 4th Qualifying Round stage by Hayes & Yeading, 2-0 at The Vale. It was a humbling afternoon when H & Y showed much

more appetite for victory... and Brennan consequently made six changes to his team to face the Linnetts.

It was probably the best livestream experence of the season for Stones fans, envious of the dozen or so officials allowed to take their places in the cavernous main stand.

We were leaping about at home when a fast counter-attack after iust six minutes saw Dennon Lewis square the ball to Ross Lafayette - and his deft flick set

ive months later, the reality of a nonrelegation season and the furloughing of players meant there was little at stake when the teams met again at Grosvenor Vale apart (as mentioned earlier) the opportunity for that historic league 'double'.

It was duly captured when Danny Green, with a rare right-footed goal, and Lafayette with a smart

finish from Jacob Mendy-Mendy's cross put us 2-0 ahead at the break. Then JMM slapped a fine left-footer past Mair from the edge of the box to tie up victory... despite Michell hitting a late consolation for his third goal of the season against the Stones.

And so to today. And the opportunity for the Stones' THIRD league double of the season (after Barnet and Dover) following our 1-0 win at the Walks back in September thanks to Charlie Cooper's 25-yard snap shot (pictured left). Let's finish the Vale season in style!

Past encounters with today's visitors as recounted by someone who was there

Saturday 6 December 1997

The FA Cup first round has always been one of my favourite days in the fixture calendar. As television companies have recognised, it has every plot you could imagine, as well as one or two that would be laughed out of a script meeting for being too implausible.

But however intently I study the 40 games that make up the now extended first round weekend, there always seems to be one that passes me by. In this respect the 1997-98 competition is Exhibit A, and Kings Lynn were my blind spot. In terms of their progress, I wasn't even aware they had been in the first round - where they beat fellow

Southern League Premier side Bromsgrove Rovers 1-0 at home - until I saw the draw for the second. The reason I suddenly became all too aware was because said draw had given them an away trip to face my team, Rotherham United.

Well, not exactly. At that stage it was still Rotherham United or Burnley. We had drawn 3-3 with the famous old Clarets on the Saturday, so it was still up in the air. Burnley's days of winning the first division title and competing in Europe may have been behind them, but they still had a magnificent stadium and enough clout to persuade former England international Chris Waddle to try his hand at management. It wouldn't have taken the Kings Lynn fan base long to work out which team they would rather be going toe to toe with next time out.

As it was, Rotherham spoiled everybody's party, winning 3-0. Despite ending up with the less glam-

orous draw, Kings Lynn were still well represented in South Yorkshire. When I turned off the M1 there was a long line of coaches being held for the last leg of the journey, and once inside Millmoor the old Railway End looked busier than it had when hosting several lower division league sides over the years. One of the KL crowd even managed to set off a flare. Buoyed up by the travelling support, the team responded and enjoyed a goalless first 45 minutes. Moreover, they missed probably the best chance of the half.

But Millers boss Ronnie Moore knew his way round an interval team talk and within 10 minutes of the restart Rotherham were 3-0 up. A similar scoring burst in the final quarter took the game even further out of Kings Lynn's reach and by the time the final goal went in, they had scored six times in 35 minutes, all by different players. I'm not sure I've ever seen this happen anywhere else. So in the end it wasn't to be for Kings Lynn and they missed out on a home tie with Sunderland four weeks later. I'd like to think they remember the Rotherham game with some affection though. Not for what happened on the field after all, nobody enjoys watching their team get pumped - but for the pre-match excitement, the sense of occasion, and the numbers that travelled. There were nearly 6,000 present that Saturday, in a season when Rotherham's league average was 3,648, which tells you the non-league side's supporters' contribution to the proceedings. Kings Lynn went on to have a decent league season, finishing eighth. But with the cup game done and dusted, I forgot about them for a couple of decades. When they returned to my radar, that would be for an FA Cup game as well.

Tuesday 24 September 2019

I've always enjoyed spotting potential cup replays. Back in the day I could sit for hours with the draw for one of the Trophy, Vase or FA Cup (qualifying)

rounds - which could sometimes be a couple of hundred games or more - picking out possible midweek engagements for a couple of weeks hence. In a good round I'd have a short list of four or five, and after that it was all in the lap of the gods. But it's a much diminished activity now. The Trophy and the Vase have done away with replays altogether. In the season just finishing, it has still been possible in the early stages of the FA Cup, but it can't be long before the powers that be tell us there is no room in the calendar for two non-league clubs to face off on a perfect autumn evening. After which they'll no doubt add their latest variant of gimmicks such as the 36-team Champions League and 48-team World Cup. and assume we'll all be too stupid to notice.

With all this in mind, watching Kings Lynn v Alfreton in the FA Cup second qualifying round replay during a week's holiday in Norfolk three years ago already has an end of an era feeling about it. If so, it was a nice one to go out on. I was able to spend the hours leading up to the game in an attractive and historic town, the ground was reasonably central, the social facilities were great, the crowd (712) was decent and the game was good too. What's not to like? I wrote in a previous Random Sightings that the best outcome of a match for the neutral has to be the 3-3 draw. But if you're partisan, what can beat a 2-1 win after goalless first half and going behind just after the restart?

That's what Kings Lynn gave their fans here. After Jason Killock put Alfreton ahead on 51, Adam Marriott levelled six minutes later and Nathan Fox clinched it with 13 to go. When my last hurrah comes, I'd love it to be after a game with a scoring sequence like that. And if anyone wants to remember me, fair enough. No minute's silence, though, because it's too respectful. And no minute's applause, it's too manufactured. But a minute's grumbling at 0-1 down? That'll do me, every time.

(Barring possible pieces linked to Scunthorpe United and Oldham Athletic next season, this is the last of these columns --no, really, this time we mean it -- thanks Steve! Ed.)






