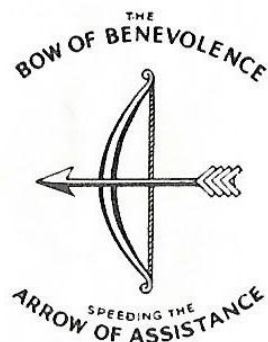

MANAGER'S COMMENTS

Good afternoon Ladies and Gentlemen. Four goals in the back of our net against Peterborough in the League Cup. After our previous performances this season, no one in his right senses would have laid the odds on Peterborough putting four goals into our net, at home at that, even allowing for the fact that Alex Stepney was away on International duty. With due respect to all concerned, it was just one of those games where everything seemed to go wrong, so from our point of view it is best forgotten. Credit, of course, must be given to Peterborough for the way they took their chances. Even so I think most people will agree, the score was somewhat flattering, considering we had probably 75 per cent of the play. The score of 4-1 was a very false reflection of the overall play. Let us hope that this is not repeated when we meet Peterborough again in a couple of weeks time. Rest assured that the boys will be all out to avenge our defeat.

Once again the opposition has been "robbed." Anyway this seems to be the opinion of most newspapers after our match against Brentford last Saturday. This has been the cry after so many of our other games. The opposition have plenty of mid-field play and are considered unlucky when they have failed to score. But, there are two questions I keep asking, and to which I would like the answers: No. 1—which side makes the most chances? and No. 2—which side scores from them? In most of our games so far this season we have confined the opposition to shooting from long range. This applied once again on Saturday at Brentford, when Alex Stepney had only one save of any sort to make in the whole 90 minutes. In contrast we hit the crossbar, and on at least two occasions were through with just the keeper to beat. If this is "robbery" then let us hope the trend continues. The time to worry is when chances are not being created, and the opposition is putting the ball in our net. At the present moment our boys are giving us 100 per cent plus, and this with the wonderful support they are receiving from the Supporters, means that we shall continue to give as good as we take. If this trend continues, eye brows which have already been raised will be raised still further before the end of the season. Even if we may not produce in every match the class of football one would like to see, at least we do endeavour to provide good entertainment and effort on the field. Let us hope you will enjoy today's game.

We were somewhat surprised at all the hallabalu in the Press relating to incidents at the game against Brentford. For the information of all concerned, no one kicked Alex Stepney, and Alex did not kick a spectator. The first Alex or ourselves knew regarding the incident described in the papers was when the Police told us after the game. Spectators must, of course, learn to behave themselves. It is unfortunate that there is a small minority of Football followers who cannot control their enthusiasm and keep it within the bounds of cheering, singing and such, but must erupt into unseemly behaviour bordering on violence and hooliganism. We

do not want this to happen here at The Den. Similarly we will not tolerate running on the pitch. This **MUST STOP** and **STOP NOW**. The youngsters had been warned on the score before. There will be no more warnings. If it happens today, then they will have to pay full price at the next home match. It is the running on the pitch which leads to all these other incidents which one reads about, although in our opinion many of them are grossly exaggerated.

OUR VISITORS

We have very much pleasure in welcoming to The Den this afternoon the Officials and Players of Wealdstone Football Club, the Isthmian League Club, who must be congratulated on reaching the First Round Proper of the Football Association Cup. This is the second time for them since the War. They lost by the only goal to Port Vale at Burslem on the previous occasion. To reach this stage of the Competition this season they accounted for Hertford Town, Harlow Town, Stevenage and Oxford City. The Wealdstone Club have a well equipped ground accommodating 13,000 with covered accommodation for 2,800 and have very good floodlighting. In addition they are well provided on the entertainment side with Bars, games rooms and a dance hall. They have three current Amateur Internationals in their side and most of their players have gained County Honours. We hope they enjoy their visit to The Den and that we all see a keen and exciting tussle.

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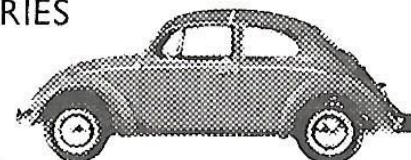
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SEATS IN THE STAND
