

A happy EE looks back at last Saturday's impressive win

ow, what a start to the campaign. The hard yards and graft put in over pre-season was there for everybody to see as Stones demolished Weston 4-1. The team, as the management team had promised, were fitter, stronger and also faster than a Wealdstone team has been in years. From these early viewings it will be a side that supporters will warm to as it has a great work ethic with players continuing to harry the opposition late into the game, pressing Weston back and not allowing them to play, despite the heat and being in control of the game. Supporters want players that work hard for the cause rather than play when they want to. The chairman last season wrote in his end of season programme notes that we wanted players that were 7/8 out of tens week in, week out rather than those that oscillate between 5 and 9 and it certainly appears that we have that in the showings so far.

I along with quite a few, thought we may struggle for goals but that was soon put bed as Stones took the lead after only ninetyseconds, added a second by the sixth minute and were 3-1 up at half-time. Whilst we added a fourth in the second half, we could

: have easily doubled the four goals that we got having hit the woodwork three times and missing a couple of sitters. The three forward players were a real threat, all scoring, with man of the match Poku and Ahmidi providing real steel in the middle of the park. The centre back partnership of Stevens and Okimo were imperious. Grant provided a real bite with his tackles at left back, maybe a little too much, whilst Northy could have got his deckchair out and enjoyed another blistering hot day, so little did he have to do. Naturally nobody will be getting carried away. There will be days when it doesn't pan out how the management team want and perspective will be needed. It was one game against a side that likes to play football and can be lightweight. There will be much sterner tests ahead, with games against Billericay and Woking setting the benchmark of what will need to be achieved on a consistent basis throughout the season, but it was certainly a promising and welcome start. Of course, supporters are fickle souls, so as the season goes through the inevitable rollercoaster of emotions, opinions sway back and forth, staving off the forum when we lose is a given for our players!


Prior to the season starting, our media

team released a number of interviews with players but also some of the management team. The players' stuff was standard fare, but the interviews with Jamie Leacock and Mike Percival were particularly illuminating. Both had done impressive interviews at the very last game of the season where they gave their thoughts on the season, but also how it had taken the whole season to learn about the club and the expectation levels. The pre-season interviews focused on the preparation work that had been done and the need to sign men. Our double winning side was full of men across the pitch not fancy dans that could just play but could also disappear as soon as it got tough, so did the Ryman League winning side as well. It would be great to hear more from Messrs Leacock and Percival

throughout the season as their calm and measured tones carry gravitas and thoughtfulness in their interviews. Elsewhere in the league. Billericay won

at a canter at Truro (Torquay) with Jake Robinson scoring four. As much as there is a circus that operates around their owner/ chairman, there is no denying that they have an exceptionally strong squad which has strengthened in areas that they looked weaker in, defense primary, and for less money. Their budget is still extraordinary but as long as their chairman/owner long as their chairman/owner cause rather than allows their manager to actual manage, they will be the team to beat. The gate on the Devon coast was given as 367 and by all accounts was inflated by free-admission to Torquay fans. What a mess that whole episode is? We

spent seventeen years on the road but none of it was more than five miles away from our hometown and gates still plummeted. Truro face a more than 200-mile round-trip for home games and you have to wonder whether they will ever play again in their home county. The Stadium for Cornwall

is really for the Cornish Pirates and even if Truro do play games there, they will be second fiddle in a stadium way too big for them. It could possibly mean the end of our trips to the Sailors Arms in Newquay and its 4am closing times! That would be a shame.

Tonight's visitors Woking had a 97th minute penalty winner at East Thurrock that lead to some interesting scenes at the end of game. Their forum reads like a Wealdstone one after an "incident"! Our fans have always had a great relationship with Alan Dowson, not only has he taken the stick that he regularly got at Kingstonian well but his post match interviews are legendary. especially when sub-titles are added for the benefit of

non-Geordies. Some decent gates as well, for Connie South level, as both Chelmsford and Welling attracted four figure crowds. though it appears that Torquay fans haven't learnt the non-league protocols of changing ends.

## Matt Lench

'I've never played at The Vale before but I'm told the atmosphere here can be electric... I really can't wait to start playing'

HIS was a first! I've been interviewing people for 40 years, from Eric Morecambe through Terry Venables, Graham Taylor and Ossie Ardiles to Bobby Wilkinson, but never had anyone come up with the line: "Sorry, you'll have to hold on for a moment, I'm just playing up to the 14th hole."

Even Tiger Woods would have struggled with the etiquette of that situation.

To be fair to Matt Lench, we had been trying to talk over the phone for about 10 hours. Five missed calls and misread texts led to our new midfielder trying to call me in the middle of the 14th fairway of a fourball with pals.

I was blissfully unaware of the situation, although the puffing and blowing did sound a little strange.

"Where are you. Matt?" I finally asked.

"Ah, I'm up in Scotland playing golf at St Andrews - well, at Crail anyway which is just down the coast" he admitted. "Maybe not a good idea. My mates are getting a bit peeved". So we chatted again an hour later with Matt very apologetic. "I'm carrying an



injury at the moment so it seemed a good time to get away for a couple of days" he said before the away friendly with Swindon Supermarine.

"Every year, me and some of my mates from primary school jump in a minivan and head up to Scotland to play golf for a few days. We don't take it too seriously - not until they got fed up with me on the phone today anyway!"

Matt pulled a muscle at the top of his quad in pre-season training - and aggravated it after just a few minutes of the opening friendly at Bracknell. "It was really frustrating. I probably shouldn't have started that game but I was so keen to show people what I can do. Bobby Wilkinson has given me the time off to heal but I hope to be involved for the Maidenhead friendly next week."

o what is the Matt Lench Story? And how did we come to capture Slough Town's FA Cup hat trick hero of last season?

"Ah, where to start?" he said. "I live in Clapham now but I was brought up in Sarratt,

near Watford, and played for Sarratt Rebels and Bedmond Ajax, a youth team my dad Michael started up. And I was briefly in the youth system at Watford and MK Dons, but my best time was at Harefield FC in the Allied Counties Youth League... we had a really good group of players and won the league and Senior County Youth Cup. But I was a late developer: I was only 5ft 3ins when I was 17 and kept being put in at right back.

"Then I grew to 5ft 11 and went to Chesham United under Andy Leese, and then Hitchin Town where I played 187 times in four years.

"We styled ourselves as 'The Best Sunday League Side In The Country' because we had spirit and tenacity but a small budget. We reached the Southern Premier play-off semi-final but lost to Bobby's Hungerford side.. maybe that's where I caught his eye. The following season we reached the play off final again, only to concede a last minute penalty that led to extra time and a cruel defeat.

"And then it was off to Slough, a bigger club. It was a memorable season getting promotion, plus our FA Cup run. We lost to Rochdale 4-0 in the Second

Round in front of the BT cameras but we loved the exposure... that's what it's all about as a non-League club".

he 25-year-old Matt got his fair share of the plaudits after another season of 15 goals from midfield, including a hat-trick in the 6-0 beating of Gainsborough Trinity in the First Round (and later being handed the match ball, right).

The previous week he'd also scored three in their FA Trophy win over Kidlington. And the predictable media frenzy before the game with Rochdale led to Matt being quoted as saying 'I'd love to get through and draw Man United - just to see if Jose Mourinho would park the bus against Slough Town. I think I could do a job on Pogba!"

So why, having helped fire Slough to promotion to the National League South, did Matt decide to join the Mighty Stones?

"Ha - the big question!" he laughed. "To be totally honest, I played 51 games last season

but it just wasn't a fit. Don't get me wrong, Slough are a good football club with a lot of potential but somehow it didn't quite work out. Who was right, who was wrong? I admit I was late for training a few times and my job often got in the way - I work for a media agency (Blue 449, a subsidiary of the French Publicis Groupe) as a planner/buyer, sorting out TV ads and it can be pretty full-on. It clashed with my football last season.

"Now I've arranged flexible hours at work and promised Bobby that I will be available. He won't tolerate me being late for training fair enough!

"He got in touch with me at the end of the season and I was immediately excited at the prospect of coming to Wealdstone - my dad is primarily a Fulham fan but he just loves watching the game and knows all about the club. He's been to a lot of big Stones games over the years so I know all about the history and the potential.

"And what about the fans?" he asked. "I hear they are a bit special and a bit loud - lots of them too!"

"They love the triers, especially the talented triers" I told him. "Just work hard".

Said Matt: "Tell you what I love about the club already is this group of players.

"I went to Bournemouth for the training weekend not really knowing what to expect, and not really knowing

any of the lads, but by the end of the weekend I felt 'This is what I envisage a football changing room to be like' - welcoming, and everybody rooting for each other, friendly, professional and singleminded. And Bobby the manager is really straight-down-the-line.

"I can't say how excited I am to play my first proper game. I've never played at Grosvenor Vale and the pitch looks fantastic, and the stadium too. I'm told the atmosphere can be electric and I want to experience that. I really can't wait to get started."

"One last question, Matt: Who's got the longer hair? You or Freddie Grant?"

"Freddie!" he admitted. "It's unbelievable - I've never played for a team where someone has got longer hair than me. He hides it well though, tied up in a sort of bun... the big question is how I'm going to wear my hair this season? You'll have to wait and see!"

# From the Matchday Operations room



ood evening everyone and I hope you are enjoying the season so far.

I am contributing to this opening programme for 2 reasons...

Firstly our perennial request for help! We are always in need of people to assist with the operations on match days.... stewarding, turnstiles, car park management are examples of what you assist with..not necessarily every match, but now and again would be very helpful. Do catch me or Nick Dugard if you can spare some time, which will be much appreciated.

The second reason is also a request and concerns us all. You will all be familiar with what is expected of us whilst following our great club. The Ground rules and regulations are displayed within the ground and are included in every match programme. It is disappointing to record the fact that on no less than 5 occasions last season we were required to respond to the Football Association to explain events that had occurred, and what remedial action we were taking.

We pride ourselves here at Wealdstone on 'low key' stewarding. We did face some tough challenges during last season, particularly when a high volume of visiting supporters were present. The singing of that song, concerning WW2 events, offended quite a number of spectators, including visitors who had no allegiance to either side, and MUST stop. So please do not even think about it. Channel your energy into supporting our team which is what we all desire. So please, refrain from behaving in this way! Any continuation will lead to ejection from the ground and who wants that?

This level of football requires significant safety measures, and we will be introducing random searches upon entry when we feel it is appropriate. This is for the benefit of everyone. Feel free to alert a steward if you feel it is necessary..we will act promptly to prevent a situation developing. Everyone has a right to watch a game of football free of intimidation and fear so please act sensibly and here's to a successful season on and off the pitch!

say all of us

h yes, 4-1 – you can't go wrong with a decent 4-1. It's the kind of score line that suggests near total domination. Perhaps there's been an early brace, followed by another goal late on. then maybe a small and ineffectual fightback from the oppo against the run of play, followed by a final goal - perhaps completing a striker's hat-trick - to seal the deal. Or maybe it's a first half rout which sees us four up at the break, before we take our pedal off the metal and let them get a derisory "consolation" late on? Or, of course, could it be an early strike for our opponents that's then utterly and joyously cancelled out by four clinical Stones strikes, turning the match around entirely? Yep, 4-1's a decent score line alright. And perhaps when you think of 4-1 you, like me, automatically bring to mind England's 4-1 thumping of the Netherlands in Euro 96. That 4-1 had everything - periods of domination, sublime goals and, just for the hell of it. a consolation goal with the devastating-stroke-hilarious effect of causing Scotland to finish outside of the top two in the group.

Naturally, 4-1, is a perfectly decent score line with which to begin the new league season, as we did last weekend here against Weston-super-Mare. It was the sort of score that had me thinking: what on God's green earth can I come up with for the Woking programme? I'm totally out of ideas. Ah, but hang ON a minute...

So here it is, a - ahem - "deep dive" into the club's history with 4-1 victories it is. Strap in everybody.



It turns out that our 4-1 win against Weston-super-Mare ten days ago was our 140th 4-1 victory of all-time, meaning we've now scored 460 and conceded 140 for a total of 700 goals in 4-1 victories over the years.

Our first ever 4-1 win was away to a club called the Metropolitan Railway on 28th October 1899. It was another four years before we recorded out next 4-1, at home to Hyde

& Kingsbury. And just over a month after that, we recorded our third 4-1, at home to Stanmore on 28th November 1903.

4-1 is a rare-ish score. In recent times we've typically recorded just the one 4-1 win in a season. (Actually, we had two last season; here against Poole, and then on

the final day of the season at Whitehaw - both league fixtures). The last time we went an entire season without a 4-1 was in 2012/2013.

Our 4-1 against Weston was the fifth time in Stones history that we've opened the season with a 4-1, our first such opener occurring in the 1949/50 season at home to Redhill (more on them later) in the Athenian League. The others? Folkestone Invicta in

07/08: Bromley in 01/02; and Cambridge City in 52/53. An opening 4-1 win does come with the sugges-

tion that we've managed to get our preseason right and are set fair to do well over the course of the following

nine months - but just so you know, those last four times in which we've opened with a 4-1 have not, alas, led to title success come the following Mav.

But having a 4-1 in a season in which we have gone on to win the title? That's definitely a thing, for example

our 4-1 away to Dulwich Hamlet in November 2013, which saw 'that' goal from Glen Little, continues to live long in the memory. We won by 4-1 twice in our our Athenian League winning year one 1952. We won 4-1 on 5 occasions during our Southern League season in 1973/74. We won by 4-1 on 3 occasions during our Southern League title year in 1981/82, but just the once when we won the Isthmian League Division Three in 1996/97. (We didn't need a 4-1 at all in our double year of 1984/85.)

Taking all of our 116 seasons of competi-

tion thus far, we've managed to record at least one 4-1 win in 76 of them - meaning that for forty seasons we failed to rack up a single 4-1 win. Not only that, but in 36 of those remaining 76 seasons we only won 4-1 once. This leaves just 40 out of 116 seasons in which we've won 4-1 on more than one occasion. A notable period of 4-1 excess came in our title-winning 1973/74 season, which saw us winning by 4-1 on six occasions in cup and league.

We also went 4-1 crazy in 1923/24 and 1938/39, with four such score lines in each of those seasons.

Over the years we've beaten no fewer. and indeed no more than 91 teams by a 4-1 score line. The team we've beaten by 4-1 on the most occasions? That'll be Redhill, who we've 4-1'd on six occasions. We first 4-1'd them in 1937, and we last did so in 1962 - all being Athenian League fixtures. If you include Enfield and Enfield Town together, they've also been on the end of six 4-1 thrashings.

We've done well in our decade at The Vale recording 8 4-1s in that time. We only 4-1'd once at Chestnut Avenue (vs. Harrow Borough, Boxing Day 2005 - our only 4-1 ever against our local rivals), did so ten times at the White Lion, just once again at Vicarage Road and a full seventy times at Lower Mead. We also managed just one 4-1 at The Warren, vs. Weymouth in April 1995, our pen-

> ultimate fixture there. Look into my eyes, not around the eyes, you are feeling very sleepy.

In terms of competitions, because yes, we're really continuing on with this, we've won 4-1 on six occasions thus far in the National League South; 16 times in the Southern League; 21 in the Isthmian League

(that 4-1 in 2013 being our very last in that competition); 7 times in the Amateur Cup, 6 in the FA Cup and just twice in the FA Trophy. But by competition, 4-1 wins for the Stones have occurred the most - 24 times - in the Athenian League, our last 4-1 being away to Redhill on 3rd November 1962.

That's about it for our 4-1 wins. Join me next time for two more pages on our 1-4 defeats... or actually, no, likely as not I'll save you from two score-related articles in a row. But for now, here's to another 4-1 win tonight!

Opposition in focus



Joking Football Club, known as the Cards (from the Cardinal red of the red and white halves), was formed in 1889. The Club joined the West Surrey League in 1895/96, winning the title by one point on the final day of the season. However, within 21 years of being formed, the Club was in danger of folding for financial reasons. The turning point came when, in January 1908. Woking played Bolton Wanderers in the First Round of the FA Cup. having battled through five qualifying rounds. Despite losing the away game 5-0, the Club made it into the national press. Bolton Wanderers, impressed by the minnows they had defeated, travelled to Woking for a friendly match the following season, which kept the Club solvent.

In 1911 the Club joined the Isthmian League, maintaining their place in the top division for 72 years and finishing as runnersup to Wycombe Wanderers in 1956/57. That achievement was eclipsed the following season when, in front of a 71,000 crowd, the Cards beat Ilford 3-0 in the last FA Amateur Cup Final to be televised live. Sadly, the Club then went into decline, culminating in a first-ever relegation in 1982/83. By the end of the 1984/85 season the Club had plunged to Division Two South of the Isthmian League. It was during that season that former player, Geoff Chapple, was appointed as manager. Although he was not able to save the Club from relegation, the renaissance was underway. Just missing out on promotion

at the first attempt, the Club clinched the Division Two South title in 1986/87 and, after two third place finishes in Division One, they were promoted back to the Premier Division at the end of the 1989/90 season.

The next season saw the Club become part of FA Cup folklore. Entering the competition at the Fourth Qualifying Round, they beat three Conference sides to set up a Third Round tie away to West Bromwich Albion. Recovering from being a goal behind, Woking triumphed 4-2, thanks to a superb team effort and a never-to-be-forgotten hattrick from Tim Buzaglo. To be drawn out of the hat with a home game against Everton was beyond everyone's wildest dreams. The tie was switched to Goodison Park and. against a team packed with internationals. the sides were separated only by a solitary Kevin Sheedy goal. Over 34,000 people remained in the ground to give the players a rapturous standing ovation.

Promotion to the Conference was achieved in 1991/92. The Isthmian League title was clinched in early April, with seven games still

to be played. Nearest rivals, Enfield, had been swept aside 5-0 in a scintillating display of flowing, attacking football and the season ended with the Club 18 points clear of the Londoners.

> The new season kicked off with very few of the all-conquering championship side in the lineup. After a shaky start a very respectable eighth place finish was achieved. The following summer saw Chapple make one of the most inspired signings in the history of the Club. Clive Walker, the former Chelsea, Sunderland, Fulham and QPR winger, was signed from Brighton & Hove Albion and he was to prove the catalyst in the most successful period in the Club's history. The FA Trophy was won in 1994, 1995 and 1997 and the Cards also achieved five successive top five finishes in the Conference, including being runners-up in 1994/95 and

The Club also continued to enjoy fine FA Cup runs. Barnet were defeated in successive seasons. In 1996/97 the Cards beat Millwall, then top of Division Two, and Cambridge United, who were challenging for promotion from Division Three. The Third Round draw paired the club with Coventry City. The game was closely fought, with the Premiership outfit 1-0 ahead with only seconds remaining at their Highfield Road ground. Then Steve Thompson struck to earn a replay. Although Coventry City ran out 2-1 winners at Kingfield, courtesy of a cruel own-goal, many people felt that Woking had more than held their own.

At the end of the 1996/97 campaign. having just clinched the FA Trophy for the third time, Geoff Chapple and his coach, Colin Lippiatt, left the Club and joined Kingstonian, John McGovern, the former Derby County, Nottingham Forest and Leeds United midfielder, was appointed. Hopes were high that he would lead Woking into the League but, although the Club finished in third place, his style of play and his personality did little to endear him to the fans. A poor start to the 1998/99 campaign led to his dismissal. Brian McDermott, the former Arsenal player, joined Woking on a non-contract basis and achieved a temporary

upturn in fortunes, guiding the team to a ninth place finish.

However, the Club struggled again in 1999/00 and McDermott was relieved of his duties in March 2000. Colin Lippiatt returned and secured a 14th place finish. The 2000/01 season saw yet another poor start. The signing on loan of Chris Sharpling proved crucial in enabling the Cards to pull clear and achieve another 14th place finish. The team struggled once more in the 2001/02 season. Defeat in the FA Cup, by Newport County, saw Colin Lippiatt stand down and become the number two at the Club, with a certain Mr Geoff Chapple back as manager.

Hopes that the duo could restore Woking's status at the top of the non-League game proved sadly unfounded. Colin Lippiatt departed in January 2002 and Glenn Cockerill, the former Southampton midfielder. joined as Chapple's assistant. The season ended with the Club just one place above the relegation places.

In the meantime very significant events had taken place off the field. The downturn in the Club's fortunes had led to a financial crisis. With the Club facing administration or worse. successful businessman and long-time fan, Chris Ingram, came to the rescue, becoming Chairman in February 2002. He continues to own the ground, with the Club enjoying a 125-year lease at a peppercorn rent, but his financial backing of the Club and involvement in its running ceased at the end of the 2010-11 season.

The 2002/03 season saw the Club get off to its best-ever start in the Conference. However, 'black September' brought seven consecutive defeats and a rapid descent into the relegation zone. Geoff Chapple resigned and Glenn Cockerill took over as manager, initially on a temporary basis. After an incredible sequence of results winning and losing alternate games in a run of 12 matches and then embarking on nine consecutive draws – it all turned on the last day of the season. Woking went into the final game second from bottom, knowing that even a win over Telford would not quarantee their Conference status for 2003/04. However, a convincing 3-0 win for the Cards, plus victories by arch rivals Stevenage Borough, at home to Southport. and Farnborough Town, away to Nuneaton Borough, ensured relegation for those two defeated clubs and a massive sigh of relief

The Club went full-time in the summer of 2003. The fans' hopes were borne out by a much better season, with the Cards achieving a ninth place finish, having been on the fringe of the play-off places until the last



The reprieve proved only temporary, with the following two seasons producing more disappointment, culminating in the Čards' relegation in summer 2009 from the BSP after 17 years in the top flight of non-League football. In summer 2008 Frank Gray and Gerry Murphy assembled a young squad but the Board became disillusioned with the style of play and apparent lack of ambition and they left the Club by mutual consent shortly before the season ended, with the Cards finishing in 17th place. The appointment in May 2008, of Kim Grant, the former Charlton striker and Ghanaian international, as Head Coach, with Phil Gilchrist as his Assistant, proved disastrous. A poor start to the season led to Grant's contract being terminated after only seven games, with Gilchrist taking temporary charge. Gilchrist was confirmed as Manager shortly afterwards but, while he steadied the ship, the Club still found itself facing relegation with six games to go. Graham Baker was appointed caretaker manager but, with other clubs making the best of their games in hand, he was unable to lift the Club above fourth from bottom.

Baker was confirmed as Manager just



before the season ended and set about building a new side to compete in the Blue Square South, with Jimmy Dack as his assistant. A storming end to the 2009-10 season saw the Cards clinch 5th place. Dover Athletic were beaten in the play-off semi-final but the Cards lost to Bath City

in the final.

The Club went part-time in summer 2010, with Baker and Dack both being awarded new two-year contracts. But, in spite of good runs in the FA Cup and the FA Trophy, both decided to leave the Club in January 2011, with Garry Hill taking over the reins till the end of the season, with Steve Thompson as First Team Coach. A dramatic upturn in league fortunes took the Club into 5th place, but the Cards lost to Farnborough in the playoff semi-final.


The revival continued apace in the 2011-12 season, with the Cards reaching the top spot in late September and staying there throughout the campaign in spite of being pushed hard by Dartford. The BSBS title was won by nine points, with only five games lost all season.

The Cards finished in a comfortable 12th place in their first season back in the Conference Premier, playing an entertaining brand of football, and did even better the following season, ending in 9th place after showing great form in the second half of the campaign. The 2014-15 campaign saw the Club finish in a commendable 7th spot, missing a play-off place by only three points. Garry Hill maintained his record of top-half finishes the following season as the side ended in 12th position. But the summer of 2016 saw the loss of some experienced players and the side struggled throughout the 2016-17 season, eventually averting relegation thanks to generally improved form from the new year onwards, finishing in 18th place.

In May 2017, following an announcement that new investment would take place in the Club, Anthony Limbrick was appointed manager, with Jason Goodliffe joining him as assistant manager shortly afterwards. The Club also announced that it would be moving gradually to full-time status.

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## WOKING REWIND BY TIM PARKS



It was April 1971. Decimalisation

(when the British currency moved from pounds, shillings and pence to pounds and pees) was just three months old and the British public was outraged that shop prices were being 'roundedup' by exorbitant amounts.

The new coins had been in circulation for three years, for people to get used to, to but D-Day itself was a terrible shock. Housewives would carry around decimal converters in their handbags - a revolving cardboard wheel that showed the 'fsd' equivalent to the new price tags - and everywhere you went the cry would go up: 'What's that in old money?'

Well, if that sounds like a bygone age it was the last time Wealdstone and Woking met in a league match. Yes. 47 years ago!

was 13 at the time and remember being concerned that my pocket money wouldn't cover any increase at the Lower Mead turnstiles.

It cost 9d to get in as a junior (that's nine old pennies, the equivalent of 4p after D-Day) and although the price was held until the next season it had risen by a whopping 11p once we'd kicked off in the Southern League Div One North in August!

It was exacerbated by Wealdstone turning pro that summer. It was a few months of upheaval in every quarter of life but exciting as the Stones grasped the expensive nettle of professionalism and raised their prices accordingly (from what I remember, adult prices

jumped from 1/6d for İsthmian League football to 30p for the Southern League... double the money! Although if you take the rate of inflation as a guide to what 30p is worth today, it should cost £4.30 to get in today).

As a result of bravely leaving behind the era of 'shamateurism' there were a few heavy hearts at the thought of abandoning old adversaries such as Woking.

And the Surrev club will always hold a place in the affections of Stones older fans, like myself, for being our last opponents in an amateur match at Lower Mead, Yes, April 1971, The

school Easter holidays.

Some matches always stick in the mind and this one definitely does. I had been out bike-riding in Northwood with my pal Mark during the day and so anxious about getting

home in time for the game that he decided to come along too for his first WFC experience.

As a Chelsea fan he maybe felt he was slumming it - but right from the start. Stones clearly wanted to end the home amateur era with a bang. Neither ourselves or Woking were any great shakes: both rooted in midtable, there was absolutely nothing

riding on the game and the crowd was also unremarkable for this landmark occasion barely 600 - but there was more intensity in our performance than in any other game

that season. I haven't managed to unearth the match report, just the programme notes (above) but the crucial moments are crystallised in my mind. More so than most of what happened last season! Woking, and especially their keeper Dave Collyer, kept the rampant Stones at bay in the first half

and, with the benefit of hindsight, they were probably all playing with one eve on winning a professional contract the next season. We had promising young players in Bob Williams, Garv Austin and Tommy Mahon at the back. Dave Yerby in midfield and John Ritchie up front but all bar Mahon were jettisoned by man-

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ager Alan Humphries in the summer.

One player who was definitely leaving of his own accord was the veteran Charlie Townsend, our England and Great Britain Olympic midfielder. He was scheming and probing throughout the game and as we changed ends, kicking towards the Elmslie End for the second half, he suddenly opened up a chasm in the 'Cards'

> defence. Our longhaired No.10 Alan Pentecost danced through the gap, rounded Collver and put us 1-0 ahead!

There was only one winner now and Ritchie (the former Arsenal youngster who went on to star for Enfield) made it two from close range. With ten minutes left Townsend got away on the right and played a delicious cross into the near post for Ritchie to glance in No.3 with his head.

The crowd were delighted. A few weeks later we beat Wemblev 5-1 in the President's Cup second leg at Lower Mead (winning 5-2 on aggregate) and we all went home convinced that we'd smash it when

the new pro era started. What happened next? Er, unfortunately 'smashing it' wasn't quite the case. Our 'new' team turned out to be mainly old lags and cast-offs from Hillingdon Borough and the dire warnings from the Wealdstone old guard seemed destined to come true (74 year-old WFC President Harry Luck and 66 year-old Chairman Jim Rogers had both resigned rather than see the club 'cast adrift in perilous financial waters'.) But of course the ship was steadied and we won promotion to the Southern League Prem, beginning a glorious era that may have never happened if the naysayers had had their way.

Interestingly, talking to one-time Supporters Club activist Ray Kemp last season, he regaled me with the story of April 1971. The club briefly considered joining the pro ranks, mainly because FA investigations were ongoing into the illegal payment of amateurs and we were in the firing line - but then the old guard advised that it would be financial suicide on our dwindling attendances of 400-500.

"The supporters were adamant though, that we didn't want to be stuck in the stagnant waters of the Isthmian League. We wanted promotion and relegation, and excitement" said Ray. "So a few of us organised a petition and took it around the terraces for a home game just as they were considering ruling out the move to the Southern League - and over 400 of the 500 crowd signed it in support to turning pro. Ken Wiltshire (the Club Secretary) tried to get me banned from the ground but we were determined, and they could hardly say the fans were in favour of staying as amateurs afterwards. Fans' democracy in action!"

Just eight years later Wealdstone were invited to become members of the new Alliance Premier League (the forerunner of the Conference) and again the club 'went for it' after the supporters (with Ray and Mark Chamberlain foremost) organised another 90%-backed petition.

our years after that eight-goal thriller of a replay, we were drawn to play Woking at Lower Mead again in the final qualifying round.

By now, the Cardinals were muscling in with the big boys of Enfield, Wycombe and Sutton at the top of the Isthmian League (and were in fact top of the table by the time this November 3rd clash came around) while the Stones had accepted the invitation to be a founder member of the Alliance Premier League (forerunner of the Conference National). Thirteen Southern Prem clubs like ourselves were invited, and seven from the Northern Premier League - while the Isthmians rejected even the suggestion of having clubs transfer across.

Just a couple of years later, Enfield saw sense and joined the APL - along with Wycombe and Sutton shortly afterwards.

The Stones, under new manager Ken Payne, had a tricky start at the higher level but went into the Woking Cup tie in a rich seam of form (including a 4-4 at Bath and a 5-0 win over Yeovil)... and a Bobby Moss goal saw us deservedly through in front of a 1,400 crowd. Our reward was a home tie with Third Division (League One) Southend United. The figures were interesting: a 3,100 crowd, 1,550 programmes sold and a further 1,200

posted out to collectors; but the only statistic worth knowing was a 1-0 defeat via a bizarre overhead kick from centre back Alan Walker.

As a certain Tim Parks wrote in his supporters club notes, 'Our FA Cup story in the 70s began with a 2-0 win over Metropolitan League side Hatfield Town, and ended with an unlucky 1-0 defeat by a Third Division Southend.. progress that everyone at Wealdstone can be proud of".
