Death of the Long term Manager?

■he 2017/18 season won't be remembered with much fondness by Wealdstone or Arsenal fans (a run to a semi-final of a cup competition aside). But it was momentous for one reason: the end to the tenures of the two longestserving managers in the English game.

In August 2017, Gordon Bartlett stepped down as Wealdstone manager after 22 years at the helm. At the end of last season, Arsenal parted company with Arsene Wenger following a near 22-year reign.

If that wasn't enough, Paul Tisdale, the third longest-serving manager in the country at the start of the 2017/18 season – and briefly the longest-serving manager in the game after Wenger's departure – left Exeter City at the start of June after almost 12 years

It now means that Jim Bentlev of Morecambe is the longest-serving manager in the top four leagues, having been in charge of the League Two club since May 2011

While longer-term managers are still more common in the lower reaches of English football, longevity is rarely prized and the days of managers being in charge for two decades or more (particularly in the top four leagues) are surely long gone.

Mauricio Pochettino, now in his fifth season as Spurs boss, is the eighth-longest serving manager in the country despite only joining the North London club in May 2014. Jurgen Klopp, meanwhile, is the 14th longest-serving manager after less than three years in the Anfield hotseat.

It's sometimes said that young English managers don't get enough of a chance to prove themselves, especially in the Premier League, but Burnley and Bournemouth have shown plenty of loyalty to Sean Dyche and Eddie Howe, who have been in charge of their respective clubs for more than 5 years. It has helped, of course, that these clubs have been on an upward trajectory during this time, including promotions, successful fights against relegation in the Premier League and, latterly, comfortable mid-table finishes or even better than that.

Eight of the top 10 longest-serving managers, in fact, are English, with the likes of Neal Ardley (AFC Wimbledon), Gareth Ainsworth (Wycombe Wanderers), Keith Hill (Rochdale) and Darrell Clarke (Bristol Rovers) mostly benefitting from a desire for stability and consistency. Tottenham. too, have reaped the rewards from allowing Pochettino to build a side capable of challenging after years of false dawns and disappointments.

But this is the exception rather than the norm. To show how fragile managers now are, we only need to look at how many have taken on their roles this year alone. Out of 92 teams in the Premier League and Football League, 43 took over in 2018, with 22 only in charge since May 2018.

This is partly reflective of the pressures involved with modern management, with expectations higher than ever and patience in short supply in a world of social media. trigger-happy owners and knee-jerk reactions to poor performances. And partly a result of managers moving up in the world: their previous clubs suffering as a result of their success.

Many clubs, particularly in the Premier League, panic if relegation seems on the cards and try and precipitate a reversal in fortunes by employing fresh blood. Sometimes it works, sometimes it doesn't. Other clubs employ short-term or stopgap solutions - see Everton and West Ham last season for examples of that – as they try and work out what direction they want to take.

There is an argument for a refresh every so often, to stop things getting stale or complacent. Sometimes new ideas and fresh ways of thinking are needed. Sometimes a manager has taken a club as far as he possibly can. Neal Ardley, who's been in charge of AFC Wimbledon for nearly six years, alluded to this in a recent interview with the Evening Standard. "I have been at the club more than five and a half years. You can get a bit stale in the job and I am sure at times the fans get bored of me," he said. "Where you have got, not stuck in your ways. but into a routine...there was a lot we wanted to change. And sometimes a refresh for the players, yourself and the staff is good."

There is certainly a danger of the rot setting in when a manager has been in place for too long. The best managers evolve. change and adapt. Sir Alex Ferguson was a master at creating new title-winning teams, adopting modern methods and keeping things fresh with the necessary player and backroom changes; Wenger managed much the same for large chunks of his reign. David Moves worked wonders on a shoestring budget for more than a decade at Everton, but has been unable to recreate that longevity wherever he's been since.

While change is sometimes entirely necessary, it's also the case that many clubs hire and fire at will, desperately hoping that by the law of averages - they'll strike it right eventually. Some clubs have been through a ridiculous number of managers in recent times - Leeds, Forest, Birmingham and QPR spring to mind – with little to no improvement shown. After a few bad results, fans get restless, the media amps up the pressure and littery owners/chairman feel the need to act.

That said, a short-term approach can sometimes work out well. Watford, for example, seem to have mastered the art of changing their manager pretty much every season (and turning over tonnes of players) and still comfortably surviving in the Premier League. Chelsea, meanwhile, have been serial trophy winners since Roman Abramovich arrived in West London in 2003, despite having 13 different managers during

The latest incumbent, former Napoli boss Maurizio Sarri, recently said he wants to be in charge of the club for the next 10 years, but with Chelsea's recent history that is surely pie in the sky thinking.

The downside of the hire and fire approach is a club lacking identity or a connection between the manager, players and fans which is certainly an accusation that could be aimed at Chelsea and Watford, and other clubs who have dispensed with managers like they're going out of fashion.

Allowing a manager to build a club in his mould, to build a legacy, to become synonymous with a team in the way Bill Nicholson, Sir Alex, Sir Matt Busby, Brian Clough, Bill Shankley, Wenger, Bob Paisley and Sir Bobby Robson did, seems out of fashion now. Of the current intake, only Klopp, Pochettino and Pep Guardiola look likely to get close to stamping an indelible mark on the team they manage. Who knows, Unai Emery might be given 22 years at the Emirates, but 'Emery out' banners appearing by December seems more likely!

Gordon Bartlett, in his own way, was synonymous with Wealdstone FC for many vears, but his longevity was probably due in part to the club's unique circumstances - dropping to the bottom of the football pyramid and slowly but surely working their way back up without a ground for many of those years, with barely a budget to speak of and a drastically diminished fanbase. It also helped that, for most of his reign, the club was on an upward curve; he oversaw promotions, memorable cup-runs and play-off near misses. There were a few close calls with relegation - and a few times when he was on the verge of leaving for one reason or another – but the loyalty went both ways and club and manager were an ideal fit for a long period.

In this day and age, it seems unlikely that we will ever see a manager stay in post for 22 years again. Some might say that is no bad thing – that familiarity eventually breeds contempt and longevity leads to complacency, frustration and dissatisfaction - but others may mourn the death of the long-term manager and despair at the shorttermism and irrationality of many clubs in their quest for instant gratification.

REDDIE GRANT is unashamedly ambitious.

The 21-year old is under no illusions as to what it takes to succeed in in the game, and how to achieve it - and he's set himself a target of moving up the football pyramid by 2020.

"Yes, my No.1 priority for the next two years is football: Eating well, training hard, going to the gym. Then I'll know where I'm at.

"It was a conscious decision to come to Wealdstone from Oxford City because it's a massive club at this level, and it's in a good area to get noticed. And playing in a good team, which I'm convinced we'll be this year, will help me get noticed.

"Hopefully I'll move up a level by the end of the season - it certainly won't be for the lack of trying!"

The bubbly left-back has certainly drawn the long straw this summer. Outside of football he's working at the Lagoona Aqua Park in Reading, which wasn't a bad place to be when we spoke in pre season with the thermometer touching 31 degrees. "Yeah, it's

really good fun - basically it's a giant inflatable with slides, parked on the lake. Very cool! My plan is to work here in the summer, and in the winter I'll go back to my job working with special needs kids in schools. And train hard!"

I told Freddie that I'd just spoken to his ex Oxford city team mate Godfrey Poku for another interview, and what a top man he is.

"Poks is a legend!" laughed Freddie. "We were really buzzing when we found out that Wealdstone wanted to sign both of us. He runs all day and loves a tackle and is so easy to play with.

"But the thing about Godfrey is that he looks like the way he plays - big and strong and no-nonsense - while I don't! I've got to stop looking like a boy and more like a man, even if I'm actually aggressive and tenacious.... that's just the way you have to be in this league.

"My main asset is my fitness and determination. And I think I've got a decent left foot. My aim, every game, is to be better than the winger I'm playing against, and not let anyone past me.

"One of the things I've noticed is the great range of people in this team- the funny ones, the quiet ones, the serious ones - but we've all got very close, very quickly. The training weekend at Bournemouth was a great laugh and really helped bond the team. Now we're all on the same page and our

spirit is really, really good. We really don't want to get beat.

"The manager has impressed me as well; Bobby's really enthusiastic and has a great philosophy. I think we're going to go places".

before making it to the first
team squad.

"I never got to play in the first team but was involved when we won promotion from league two.

Then the disappointment of being released... but Oxford City came straight in for me and

I decided to get as many games for them as I could, preparing for the next level. I played about 80 times over the last two years. Now I'm ready to keep moving up and up".

Freddie grew up in Reading (and still lives there, with his family) so I didn't expect him to know much about the history

of our club - but he knew of all the young stars who have been showcased by the Stones on the way to a glittering career.

"You know who'll probably be sponsoring your no.3 shirt?" I asked him. "Stuart Pearce - he's done it every season since I can remember ".

"No way! Stuart Pearce? That's amazing! That's the mark of this club - great players who don't forget their roots. When do I get to meet him?!"

I've got a feeling Freddie will be around long enough to be


Bobby and his team are working hard for success on the pitch and off it changes are happening. The aquarium bar is being renovated and there is a new scoreboard

and deserves a lot of credit for these.

I, myself, am part for a team that is putting together a fundraising scheme to be launched shortly and be combined with the Q&A which was originally planned for preseason. I am hoping that in the next few months you will see much more communication coming out from the board. I have also been asked to become the club's respect director which is a new role this year created by the National League. For

sponsorship. Rory Fitzgerald is leading these



10. Ensure any use of flares or pyrotechnics is reported to the League Office after a match – Home or Away - along with the Match Result Form by the Club Secretary.

11. To oversee how supporters or anyone at a match behave and where this falls below the standards set by the Club, to deal robustly with such actions, using the Club Safety Officer, Police Liaison Officer or

any other nominated person in the club; and to apply action in compliance with Ground Safety Regulations.

Each time there is an offence it is reported to the FA who subsequently charge the club. Last season there were too many of these incidents which in the short term increase our stewarding costs and workload however eventually there will be a fine from the FA. Last season we spent considerably more on stewarding than was budgeted. This money needed to be spent to ensure the safety of the supporters but it was money that came directly out of the playing budget. Our club is based on volunteers who work very hard to deliver what you see on a matchday but what you don't see is the effort behind the scenes before a ball is kicked. Having to deal with these incidents take a lot of time and effort and takes away with being able to drive the club forward.

This season we have already been charged by the FA for the fan who ran on the pitch against Woking. This is a clear breach of the ground regulations and the offender has been identified and banned from the ground until January.

Going forward any future pitch invaders



Going forward any future pitch invaders will be subject to a one-year minimum ban. This is not something that the board takes likely but we must take proactive approach to ensure that future occurrences are minimised. I know that this will not impact the vast majority of supporters reading this as they are responsible fans who do not want wish financial penalties on the club. Football is a passionate game which is played and watched in high spirits but in this case, there is literally a line that cannot be crossed. Please expect further official announcements on this front.

better for non-league

he definition of madness, as I'm sure we are all familiar with by now, is doing the same thing over and over and expecting a different result. So sure, the non-league game has been carefully restructured over the last two decades, with new IT making it ever easier for local fans to connect with their local clubs. But still, every season we continue to start the non-league campaign in August, just like all the other professional leagues. And because of this. we lose any opportunity to capitalise on the unique identity and (ugh) "brand" that nonleague football so clearly has.

Obviously there's so much to be said about the sense of freshness at the beginning of each season. It's about renewal, rebirth, unchartered opportunity, awakening. Every August the future's bright. Forget the arithmetic - the trifling fact that just two of 22 can ultimately progress upward; at this stage, anything's possible. Logic goes out the window. Last year's 19th is this year's title. Things might. They just might.

So a season's start is always an exciting thing. Indeed this year there's even a whole new tier of leagues. My point is that I think we throw all of this novelty away. The non-league game's uniquely individual sense of annual renewal is drowned out by all the colour supplements, screaming Sky Sports



pundits, the minutiae leading up to transfer deadline day and all the other mass media coverage that surrounds the sport's big boys.

Here's my issue: By the first weekend of September, we in the National League South will have completed fully one sixth of our league campaign already. This despite August being the only full month that families with children can go away on holiday. It's surely borderline insane to start the season when so many impressionable members of football's next generation of supporters are all out doing other things with their parents: families forced away from home during the the school holiday period of late July to the first week of September.

What non-league football needs is to say sod it, let the fully professional game have August. Let them shout loudly about Mourinho this. Klopp that, Let's instead loudly trumpet our own unique start tine and make the first weeks of September the start to the semi-pro season. Below are my reasons why.

1 Local connections

For a tier of football that depends not so much on history but on developing an association between local people and their local clubs, a September start would offer a clearer, more distinct identity to the nonleague season. It wouldn't get lost amongst all the professional game's fanfare and hoopla. Non-league day could be the first day of the non-league season, tying in with the early September international break. A separate, fresh start to the football season. A nice little phase-shift: Same sport, different diary. "The return to

make that psychological connection between supporter and club. Start when the schools start back. Connect the season to conkers; fix the season to the sights and smells of impending autumn. Liniment. A sense of change in the air and not all that incongruous, mid-summer heat.

3 Making May matter

A September start would allow May to be a month of fresh footballing drama following on from the final days of the professional sea-

son. A September start would mean an end of the season on the final May bank holiday. So yeah, you heard me - actually playing throughout the full month of May. Next to no international concerns to consider for our players, so why not? Perhaps have the play off finals on that final Spring Bank Holiday weekend, or indeed the weekend after. For followers of the professional game, whose seasons will have finished earlier, it would be an opportunity to support their local team's last push for promotion or whatever having closed the book on their own club's exploits.

4 A better showcase

I know the BBC in particular does well by the FA Cup. Instead of some random choice of FA Cup preliminary round tie, imagine this on Football Focus: "On today's programme an interview with Fulham new boy Andreas Schurrle, the top 10 reasons why Mourinho's on his way out - and as the non-league season begins, we look at the clubs and players to watch." A distinct identity, distinctively profiled. It would be as if the 'regular' game had been added to. More opportunities to promote the uniqueness of non-league.

5 A scout's paradise

Having the non-league season end in the last week of May would allow big club scouts,

without the distractions of other divisions, to scout players at their peak in their most important matches.

Look, I know this proposal is far from perfect. For instance, I'm well aware that there's no obvious way to include the FA Cup in a round seems to start earlier

each year. But I refuse to believe something couldn't be arranged. The non-league game is going ever greater guns these days, no doubt fuelled by traditional fans' anger over being ripped off by the professional game's ticket and TV prices. But it's still operating in the shadow of the big boys. Shifting the season out of phase by a month or so could make for a very positive change indeed. Because the definition of madness, as I'm sure we are all familiar with by now, is doing the same thing over and over and expecting a different result.

CONCORD RANGERS Opposition in focus



oncord Rangers originated from a team of boys headed by Steve Lant. They played friendly matches during 1966 on a pitch along the Canvey Island seafront close to the Concord Beach hence the name Concord Rangers and the nickname The Beach Boys.

1967 – Albert Lant, Steve's father and current Club President became the team manager and took the club into competitive football. The Club joined the Thundermite Boys Football

1973 - Concord joined the Vange and District League and during this period they won several league and cup honours.

1979 - Concord became the first winners of the Essex Sunday Junior Trophy managed by current Secretary Chris Crerie with a 4 - 0 win over Bishops Park from Brentwood..

Saturday football was introduced to the club when Concord joined the Mid Essex League and played their home games at Waterside Farm on Canvey Island.

1988-1989 Concord joined the Essex Intermediate League and was Divisional League and Cup Winners.

1991-1992 Concord joined the Essex Senior League and achieved the following. 1996-1997 Essex Senior League Cup winners defeating Ford Utd

1997-1998 Essex Senior League Championship winners Manager – Lee Paterson 1999-2000 Harry Fisher Memorial Trophy winners defeating Burnham Ramblers 3 – 2 2002-2003 Essex Senior League Runners-up 2003-2004 Essex Senior League

Championship winners Manager - Ben Embery

Danny Heale is the winner of the Don Douglas Trophy this season for the Leagues top scorer with a tally of 32 goals.

Founder Albert Lant retired after 25 years as Chairman in 1992 to become the Club President. Current Club Treasurer Jack Smith then held the Chairman position for two years. Grant Beglan who is the CEO at Aspect Contracts, Concords main sponsors, then became Chairman and also held the position for two years. Antony Smith is the current Chairman and is very hands-on in his approach, under Antony's guidance the Club has seen fantastic progress these past few seasons both on the playing side and also on the development of the ground.

2007-08 Concord Rangers 40th Anniversary season

Danny Scopes and Danny Cowley become joint managers and managed the team in this

important year for the Club and they had a magnificent year, Concord ended the season winners of the Essex Senior League. Gordon Brasted Memorial Trophy winners and were Essex Senior League Cup Finalists. Concord also reached the Qtr-final of the FA Vase this season before losing 1-0 to Lowestoft Town who went on to reach the final

which was played at Wembley Stadium. Concord's Danny Heale won the Don Douglas Trophy for the second time as the Leagues top marksman scoring a magnificent 46 goals and setting an Essex Senior League record. Club President. Albert Lant won an outstanding achievement award from the Essex County Football Association for 40 vears unbroken service to Concord Rangers. 2008-09 Having gained promotion rom the Essex Senior League we would have been happy with a

mid table position at the end of our first season in the Ryman League Div 1 Nth. The Management team of Danny Scopes and Danny Cowley managed to get the best out of our players and we achieved a Play-off position having finished 5th. We then went on to beat East Thurrock Utd. who had finished in 2nd spot 1-0 in the Play - off semi-final, Danny Heale scored a magnificent goal to put us through to the final and play Waltham Abbey. Concord was only 10 minutes away from playing in the Ryman Premier League this season having gone one up through Fabien Batchelor but Waltham Abbev's Harry Elmes scored in the 80th minute to take the game to penalties which Concord finally lost 5 – 4.

2009-10 Concord win the Ryman League Div 1 Nth Play-Off final 3-1 against Enfield Town to gain promotion the Ryman Premier Division.

2010-11 Concord had a very good first season in the Ryman Premier Division, finishing in 8th position, our aim at the start of the season was to avoid relegation therefore reaching 8th spot was very creditable but just missing out on a Play-Off position by two points was a great team effort.

2011-12 After a poor start to the season

with some key players unavailable due to injuries. Concord did not manage to play their normal style of football for several months into the season but after being in the bottom four for quite a while Concord put in an undefeated run of twelve games and at one time managed to get into a play-off position but unfortunately tailed off towards the end of the season and finally finished in 14th position.

2012-13 A remarkable season for Concord winning the Ryman League Cup Final 3 -2 against Dulwich Hamlet and winning the Ryman Premier League Play-Off Final 2 - 1 at Lowestoft Town to gain promotion to The Conference South, Concord reached the Essex Senior Cup Semi-Final losing 2 - 0 to Gravs Athletic

2013 -14 Having been promoted last season. Concord was looking for a position that would enable them to stay in the Conference South after seeing both AFC Hornchurch and Billericay Town relegated after just one season. Manager Danny Cowley, his Assistant Glen Alzapiedi and the Players surpassed the Clubs expectations by finishing in a very respectful 9th position and to cap a very good season Concord won the Essex Senior Cup Final.

2014 - 15 A fine achievement in winning the Essex Senior Cup for 2nd successive vear winning 5 - 0 against Billericav Town in the final and finishing 7th in the Conference South, the only negative this season was to see the Manager Danny Cowley and Danny's brother Nicky his assistant move on to pastures new with Conference Premier Braintree Town. 2015 - 16 Adam Flanagan became Concords new manager and did a good iob in his first season at National League South level having guided Brentwood Town to the Ryman League Premier Division priorto joining Concord. Adam achieved a 10th position in the National League South which was a respectable position for the Club as well as winning the Essex Senior Cup for the 3rd year in a row. 2016 -17 Concord had their most difficult time in the National South but managed to avoid relegation by finishing

in 18th position.

2017-18 Concord had another difficult time in the National South eventualy finishing in 17th position.

rom the sub-lime to the ridiculous...

Last week we faced Woking here at the Vale. with a shared history going back over 55 years, while today we take on Concord Rangers who only started playing senior football in 1991.

Yet there have been several momentous clashes between our two clubs since we first met 'The Beachboys' in 2011 - in fact that very first meeting was simply astonishing...

January 29 2011, Ryman Prem: Concord Rangers 1 Wealdstone 6

WHEN Gordon Bartlett made his dramatic move to bring prolific old boy Richard Jolly back to the Stones, no one could have foreseen how the striker would transform the team in the space of a one-month loan spell.

This was his third game back in a blue shirt, Sutton United happy to let their former AFC Wimbledon striker regain his mojo in front of goal... and five games later they were clamouring to get him back to Gander Green Lane! We were rooted in mid-table. Jolls'

game saw us beat Hendon 1-0 with an own goal, and he got off the mark in the next game, a 2-1 win over Hendon.

Then came this bitterly cold afternoon in deepest Essex, against a Concord Rangers outfit that had lost only one of its previous eight matches. But the Stones were magnificent! Our brand of neat, albeit sometimes

fragile, quick-fire passing football was ideally suited to Jolly's deadly poaching abilities in and around the box and he ended the game with FOUR goals to his name. Peter Dean, in

> his favoured striking role, got the other two including a well-taken penalty after Concord's flustered goalkeeper Dale Brightly was sent off for bringing down Jolls. Remarkably, if Jolly had taken the penalty himself he'd have been the first Stones player to score five goals in a league match since the club turned professional in 1971. Mark Graves is

the only other player during the last 47 years to net five for Wealdstone but that was in a friendly against Wimbledon (now MK Dons) back in 1983. Jolls was on fire in his loan spell, and followed up with a hat-trick in a 4-2 win at Maidstone United in the next game, and

finally two goals in the 3-3 home draw with Canvey Island. Ten goals in five games: Has there ever been a better loan spell in professional footbal? Wealdstone line-up at Concord: North. Hammond, Massev, Parker, Cronin.

he most high-profile meetings came at the end of the 2012-13 season when our clubs were jockeving for position in the the Ryman Prem play-offs.

We faced off at Grosvenor Vale in March and it was the Stones who emerged triumphant 2-1 winners thanks to two goals in the last two minutes - Esmond James levelling from Lee Chappell's corner. and then in injury time. Tom Pett chesting down an Alex Dver pass to fire a dramatic winner. It was tough on Concord who had seen Leon McKenzie red-carded for

allegendly headbutting Sean Cronin, and then taking the lead through James White in the 70th minner.

Much acrimony followed at the final whistle, with their abrasive management team (the Cawley brothers) subjected to some taunting... but Concord were to have their revenge just a few weeks later....

Wednesday May 1st 2013, Ryman Prem play-off semi-final: Wealdstone 1 Concord Rangers 2 (after extra time) THIS was an agonising defeat for the Stones, having set up a home play-off semi-final after finishing third in the league behind Whitehawk and runners-up Lowestoft Town.

But it was a cruel reversal of fortunes from the previous clash with Concord, the Stones this time playing all the football but conceding an 88th-minute leveller that took the game to extra time. It followed the trend

front of a mammoth home crowd: 1.005 packed the Vale, the first home crowd of over 1.000 since the 1987-88 Conference relegation season when he had 1.700 for the visit of Barnet, 1,300 for Wycombe and 1,100 for Lincoln City. We reproduce the Essex Evening Echo report that gives a fair summary of the heartbreaking evening...

'CONCORD Rangers booked their place in Monday's Ryman Premier play-off final against Lowestoft with a heart-of-a-lion comeback win over Wealdstone after extra-time tonight. The Stones were good value for

their 62nd minute lead through the prolific Richard Jolly, but a late leveller from Steve King and an extra-time winner from Tony Stokes sent the Beachboys through. Wealdstone were completely dominant for the opening 20 minutes with their best effort seeing Southend loanee keeper Luke Chambers pull off a wonder save to push Chris O'Leary's deflected effort over the bar. O'Leary had already headed down and wide from a corner when he should have scored.

Concord settled after that but were lucky not to fall behind five minutes before the break when the hosts hit the bar twice in quick succession - Alex Dyer swished a half-volley against the face of the woodwork and Peter Dean put a very presentable follow-up shot into the side netting.

Then Dean - drafted into the starting line

up at the last minute following an injury to Wes Parker in the warm up slid an effort onto the bar when Lee Chappell flicked on Scott McGleish's leftwing cross.

Concord were better after the restart so it was a body blow when they fell behind in the 62nd minute - James Elmes was harshly booked for a foul on the edge of the box, and Chappell curled in the dead ball for the evergreen Richard Jolly to glance home a header.

Then Stones should have been out of sight when Jolly sprung the offside trap and cut the ball back for McGleish who had time to take a touch and produce a shot which Chambers did brilliantly to tip on to the bar. That was the game-changing moment and there was no doubting the nerves permeating around the 1,055-strong crowd as the game entered the final stages.

The equaliser came with a minute to go when a ball into the box was only halfcleared and Leon Gordon's scuffed shot from the edge of the box made its way through a host of bodies and was turned in from close range by King.

After a nip-and-tuck opening half to extra time Concord took the lead four minutes after the restart through their talisman Tony Stokes. The 29-goal man did not start the game because of illness but replaced McKenzie with Concord chasing the game and was on hand to turn the ball home from close range after King's header had been clawed off the line by keeper Rikki Banks.

It sent the samll band of travelling Concord fans into delirium as they started to contemplate Monday's showdown at Crown Meadow against Lowestoft Town. Wealdstone (4-4-2): Banks; Hammond Moore 120), Massey, Cronin, Chappell; Dean (James 116), O'Leary, Dyer, Godfrey; Jolly, McGleish.

Concord (4-4-2): Chambers; Lampe, King, Fry (Easterford 73), Glozier; Gordon, White, Elmes, Robinson (Hallett 63); Greenhalgh, McKenzie (Stokes 80).

Lowestoft, beaten in the play-off final for the previous two years were certain that this would be their day... but the 2,500-plus Bank Holiday crowd were stunned by goals from Steve King and Leon Gordon with Scott Mitchell pulling one back late in the day. Thus Concord were promoted to the National League League and manager Danny Cowley said: "We are not the best team in this league, we haven't got the best players in this league, but we have got the biggest spirit and the most character." 1982

Saturday November 22 2014, National League South: Wealdstone 1 Concord Rangers 0

TRADEMARK header from Scott McGleish - from a brilliant Sean Lucien cross - was enough to secure a vital first home win for the Stones in our debut Conference South season.

We had made a wretched start, no wins in the first nine games and also knocked out of the FA Cup in the 2nd qualifying round by... yes you guessed it, Concord Rangers after a replay.

But boss Gordon Bartlett was slowly getting new players in and we had won 2-0 at Chelmsford the previous Monday night. Concord were tough and combative but a tremendous save by Jonathan North from Jordan Chiedoze changed the complexion of the

game - we broke to the other end and a mazy run and cross from Lucien was seized upon by the reliable McGleish (left).

The Stones' season was up and running and we went on a tremendous 11-game unbeaten run going into the New Year. We finished midway and saved a season that was looking like an unmitigated disaster.

The one time we beat Bath.. we lost on agg!

his was a remarkable result on a balmy evening down in the West Country.

For those Stones fans who were around 30-40 years ago I don't need to elaborate on our record against Bath over the decades which was simply appalling - in fact it's very rare in football that when you play a side as often as we have Bath, that so few wins are achieved.

I can state without any fear of contradiction that Bath are a true bodev side for us and although we've managed to turn it around a bit in recent years we are still

miles behind in the head to head record.

Hence the wonder when. on this occasion, we managed to do

the impossible and came away with a 1-0 win courtesy of a low Fred Barwick strike from the edge of the box.

All too predictable I'm afraid. A week later in the return leg at Lower Mead we lost 2-0 and crashed out of the cup 2-1 on aggregate. Enough said.

Bitterfleet memories

2014: Ebbsfleet (away) National League South: Drew 0-0

Bank Holiday visit to Ebbsfleet in the early weeks of our debut season in the Conference South was a daunting prospect at the time.

They were full time and packed full of experience and quality, whereas we were trying to find our feet at this level with a side that soon became apparent was not up to the task. Although Ebbsfleet's ground has undergone some changes in recent vears it was still as I remembered it from the 70's for this game and for various reasons was always one of my favourites.

The game was played in heavy rain throughout which made good football tricky and of course challenges that were slightly mistimed ended up looking reckless. This happened several times - and it went against Ebbsfleet after about 15 minutes when McMahon slid in on Luke O'Nien and caught him with a clumsy looking challenge. Out came the red card and we had a man advantage for the rest of the game. However we seldom made use of it and with their quality it just evened things out. Things could have

been worse though for us as another ill advised sliding tackle in the box just before half time saw Ebbsfleet awarded a penalty. Luckily North guessed right and turned Charlie Sheringham's spot kick around the post. A good point even with the extra man.

WHAT HAPPENED NEXT?

We quickly went into a nose dive and didn't win until our 10th attempt. However the Autumn saw a much changed team slowly draw away from the bottom and finish in mid-table respectability.
