attack" says Elliott, who grabbed 11 goals in his first 24-game spell with the Sussex club. And he will also never be forgotten by the Hampton fans who saw him score a hattrick in 15 minutes on this ground - against the Stones - on New Years Day 2018!

It must be frustrating for the 6ft 2in target man to be currently sitting on the bench, but he remains confident in his ability. And confident that he can change Bobby Wilkinson's mind by the scoring the goals to earn him a regular start.

"I can understand how hard it is to be the manager but all I can do is impress him, and the fans, by making myself a nuisance of myself when I come on and keep getting the ball in the net."

Elliott's minutes-to-goals ratio for the Stones is spectacular. He came on for the last 20 minutes against Bath City and scored twice (one a penalty); came on for the last 20 at Chippenham and scored; and started the Middlesex Cup game against Uxbridge and scored again.

I asked him if he'd be boosting that goal average by taking more penalties in the future?

"Ha! I will if I'm on the pitch" he said.

"I'd been out of the game almost two years after undergoing cartilage operations while I was playing for Eastbourne Borough. I carried out my own rehab - I'm a personal trainer so I know how these things work - and did it slowly and carefully, so when Alan Dowson (Hampton manager) came in for me he was surprised how fit I was.

"I wasn't sure if I was match fit but I made my debut for them on New Year's Day here at Wealdstone... I got a hat trick in 20 minutes so it wasn't a bad start!

"I got a lot of stick from the players last month when I signed for the Stones, especially Northy. To beat him three times was quite something, he's such a good keeper. I knew I'd have to be on my Ps and Qs that day."

But despite that amazing start, and another goal not long after, last season tailed off into one long story of being sat on the bench.

"We got into the Conference South play-off final against Braintree but lost 4-3 on penalties (yes, Elliott scored his spotkick in the shoot-out) and The Iron were promoted to the Conference National.

"But I was fed up with being a bit-part and decided I was going to take a year out. My friend Ricky Gabriel was playing for Braintree earlier this season and I gave him a lift to their game, and was just planning on watching when their manager Brad Quinton spotted me and said 'Why aren't you playing for anybody? Come down and train with us, we need another striker'.

"So I did. And was picked for the bench. And so it started again and well.... I was very happy when Bobby came in with seven-day approach and brought me to

himself. "No! That many? Have I really? I'm not going to have as many as Jefferson though, that's just unreal!"

Despite being a same size, and employing the same physicality to his game, Elliott also shares the same childhood passion for Arsenal and also played against them as a youngster - just as Big Jeff famously had in the FA Cup for Oxford Utd, way back when.

"My game against Arsenal was only a pre-season friendly but it was my most memorable match. I was just starting out at Barnet (he signed a three year deal with the Bees in 2008 after netting 20 times for their Protec youth team) and I was buzzing to come on against their first team at Underhill in front of a sell-out crowd. It was amazing: they had people like Theo Walcott and Andre Arshavin who were just electric - it was like watching remote control humans, they were so good.

"But I was feeling sharp and it was beyond my dreams when I managed to score a goal past Fabianski, bending the ball into the corner of the net. It was at the top end of the ground but I ran all the way back to the other end, past Arsene Wenger, to celebrate with my dad behind the other goal! I was thinking 'Sign me Arsene, sign me, but he didn't .)"

Barnet were in League Two at the time and Elliott made eight appearances (his debut against Brentford) without finding the net as the Bees struggled to avoid the drop back into the Conference. He went out on loan to Farnborough, Lewes, Hemel Hempstead, Ebbsfleet and Havant & Waterlooville before a threeclubs-in-three-years spell with Kettering, Dover and Concord Rangers.

It wasn't until he joined Hendon in the Ryman League that he started scoring



regularly - 11 in 24 games which brought a move to Eastbourne, where again he hit 11 goals in the same number of appearances. Then came the cartilage ops that have restricted his starts ever since...

E lliott was brought up in Archway and still lives in that North London area on the Wood Green/Muswell Hill borders with his missus Corinne and their two children - a seven year girl and two-year-old boy. His family are all close which is very useful for child care.

"It's not really a problem for me - when I left Barnet at the age of 21 I realised I had to either try and stay in the full-time game or find a non-League club and get a 'proper' job.

"I started helping my dad in his carpentry business but it wasn't for me. Personal fitness training was the perfect fit; now I work out of two gyms, Futures First near Liverpool Street and The Zone which is close to where I live at Wood Green. It means I can stay in good shape even when I'm not playing".

So talk us through the last few minutes at Chippenham? You so nearly changed the game again!

"Yeah, I scored one but I could have had a hat trick.... and I'm not quite sure how I didn't. My first chance was a header, headed off the goalline but it came back to me - and I was leaning back and skied it over the bar. Then I was in on the keeper who spread himself well but I just got too much on it, and it went over the bar again. The goal I was quite pleased with... it was at an angle and the keepers hate it when you lift it into the roof of the net.

"Fummy Shomotun made the goal though - his feet are so quick it's a joke! I don't for the life of me know

why he's on loan and not playing for Barnet... maybe he's trying too hard to perfect other bits of his game when he should be concentrating on how good he is at going past players and delivering. That's what he's good at.

"But I've had times in my career when I've been flying but then it crashes down so quickly. Football's like that."

Well, I am basically a Harrow boy, although I was born in Edgware, lived in Kenton for my first four years, then moved to Wealdstone (Grant Road) until about 13 - and this is where I lived when older boy John Patterson, later a local cabbie, whose 'gang' was in, first took me aged about eight or nine to Lower Mead and showed me how to get in without paving (This seems to be a theme

fans and wasn't over-keen on the red and white ones. Hence I became a Luton Town supporter that day. We lost then and have rarely stopped doing so in the following sixty seasons. The red and whites were, of course, Nottingham Forest, who went on to win every-bloody-thing the game has to offer. A few years ago my son Steeven moved to New Zealand. He lives in Wellington Phoenix, the only Kiwi team in the A-League - who I now get up early regularly to see lose on BT Sport live on Saturday or Sunday mornings.

Do you prefer lower-League football? Supporting these teams, OF COURSE I love lower and non-league football. I can think of no disadvantages in supporting lower league sides - it enables you to poke fun at those glory-chasing supporters who declare undying love to teams playing in towns or cities they've seldom or never visited. How do you fit football in with family and

working life? Like most other supporters I fit everything else around watching my football teams, rather than vice-versa. It is easier to do now that I am semi retired - mind you, I somehow managed to be on the Board at

Wealdstone for ten vears when I was working most of the hours God sent for William Hill Has football has alwavs been a big part of your life? Oh ves. I played until the age of 45, and was manager and chairman at different times of Hatch End FC. a local Sunday side for a good number of years. I slightly distrust anvone who doesn't have some kind of football loyalty. What is your most memorable game? That is undoubtedly Wealdstone's incredible 6-5 win over

Stevenage in which they were 5-3 down with about eight minutes to go, during which time Hugh Lindsay helped himself to a hat-trick, one of them remaining in my memory as the hardest-struck free kick I have ever seen, which crashed in from (as I remember it) about a hundred yards out.....and that with a ball boasting a lace.....

What gets your goat watching football? I absolutely detest the rule which makes

a fouled player with an injury go off, thus giving the team who fouled, a numerical advantage for a possibly significant time... plus I hate the 'toss' at the start of a game in League games. It should be abolished, with the home team always choosing which way to kick, while their opponents will have the same advantage when they host the return match. I'd keep it for Cup games, though......

Did you play at a decent level? My own playing career was lengthy but not at an elevated level. I was good enough to play for Harrow as a schoolboy, and later for the Sunday League representative team my club was in, but I went to rugby-playing Harrow

County School, then when I left, started work immediately for the local Weekly Post paper. I got that job only because I agreed to play for the editor's own team in Lewisham, for which I became top scorer until he decided he'd better get me reporting on local matches for the paper on Saturdays.

I played for Wealdstone Athletic in my mid to late teens, where we became the first club ever to turn out for matches in an all-black kit (pictured below), somehow acquired from dubious sources by our dodgy manager of the time, which completely

mind-boggled the refs. We were banned from doing it by the end of the season we started doing so.

Most memorably, I managed a team to a Middlesex County Cup Final only to be beaten by a team who had played an ineligible player in their semi final yet were allowed to remain in the competition. We lobbied for the beaten semi finalists to play us in the final and eventually at least succeeded in having the outcome of the Final voided with no one awarded the trophy....thus endearing myself to the Middx FA for which, ironically, both of my sons would subsequently work for.

How do you enjoy the Vale as a venue? It's a traditional non-league ground with big enough crowds to create an atmosphere but rarely big enough to provoke serious disturbances. I appreciate the ability to walk around the ground if necessary or desired, but accept that for games such as the recent Torquay match, segregation is sometimes required. My preferred place to watch from is with a

couple of mates from the away-team side of the dugouts - perfect for providing those away managers/coaches and players, ensconced there with some useful information and opinions as the game progresses.....

What's the strongest current line up, in your opinion? I have reached the stage of support for Stones where I have no strong opinions about the line up, mainly because every time I watch a game now there seem to be new players I've never heard of before!

But I consider Jonathan North to be easily our best, most consistent player, and am very surprised that no one has come in for him (maybe they have and he doesn't want to go) from a higher level. His astonishing double save from the penalty v Torquay would have been shown over and over had it happened at a higher level, and he is remarkably consistent. I also enjoy watching Godfrey Poku, who I saw many times when he was at Luton for a couple of seasons, and thought he had something about him. Hopefully he'll settle down and stay longer here than he seems to have done at a large number of his other clubs, for whatever reason(s).

Over the years there have been some real greats to watch playing for Wealdstone -Hugh Lindsay (already mentioned): Eddie Dilsworth: Simon Garner, Brian Jones. Robin Wainwright, both Cordices - but, to be fair, I've always supported the club, rather than specific players.

What's your most memorable away game? I'm not that big a fan of away matches, but

loved that win at Braintree back in the late 90s, courtesy of Simon Garner (right), when they were our bitter rivals for a while, and have always remembered experiencing the largest burgers I've ever seen at Tonbridge Angels. I also recall following the Stones to every game during their run to winning the Amateur Cup Final - and was behind the goal when Barking's keeper went down injured after a corner in an earlier round. 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

GARNERING A CULT HERO by Graham Sharpe

He's alright, is Simon Garner.

Well, I knew he would be as soon as I discovered that he had the same birthday as me - even if I've had it for a year or two longer! And then when we were playing at East Thurrock a couple of weeks back he confirmed that he had magical powers.

I was standing alongside the injured Lee Walker and Chris Walton. What had been a scrappy, battling game was heading towards a goalless draw. Garner looked over and saw the crippled pair and gestured to them, asking how long remained. They signalled back there was only a minute, or two, to go. Garner nodded, as if to say, right now's the time to get going. Almost immediately a long ball came over to him, he brought it down on his chest, showed an impressive turn of speed over a few yards to cut into the box and square the ball across to be converted for the only goal of the game. Then he wandered over on his way back to the kick-off, indicating that he'd done enough to justify his presence on the park.

Mind you, his influence since joining the club would be no surprise to anyone who has seen his entry in the prestigious Footballers Factfile, an annual official PFA publication by Barry J Hugman, which gives pen pictures of over 2,000 professionals.

Garner's entry reveals he was born 23-11-59 in Boston - presumably not the one famous for its tea-parties, that his height is 5'9" and weight 12 stone 11 pounds (perhaps a pound or two more at the moment!) Says his write-up, "In spite of his infrequent appearances in 95/96 - the manager was reluctant to rely on a player who could not last 90 minutes - he still had an almost mesmeric hold on the Wycombe supporters. Skilful, subtle, inventive, his forward play was a joy to watch and he is still one of the best brains in the game. He retains a first class attitude and strong desire to win and will continue to be an excellent influence on whichever team captures

By the way, full marks to Layne Patterson who first became aware of Garner's availability.

I have to make mention of the home Braintree game which I'm sure will be fully covered elsewhere. This game has gone straight into my 'top five' all-time Wealdstone games if only for the sublime enjoyment I, and everyone else who went to the away game, will have derived from the extreme discomfort and humiliation of their 'keeper who had so delighted in baiting our fans at their place. He was a broken man at the end of the game, and it could not have happened to a more deserving case.

The old 6-5 FA Cup victory over Stevenage back in 1965 will always be number one in my all-time list, but the Braintree slaughter is up there with the best. I also enjoyed one of their director's telling me at half time in the game that they were short of their leading striker, to which I replied, "The words 'cares' and 'who' come to mind but not necessarily in that order." (He was a sub and came on in the second half but failed to make any impression - Ed). There had apparently been some ructions in the Braintree them 6-0! camp a few days before that game which can't have helped them, but rarely have I seen a

Wealdstone are through to the 1st Round of the FA Trophy after beating Concord Rangers 3-2 at Thames Road. Stones were dominated the tie for the most part but had to fight of a late comeback from the home side to reach the next stage.

After 14 minutes, Wealdstone took the lead with a finely executed goal. Bradley Hudson Odoi picked up the ball on the left side and curled a cross to the near-post in the aftermath of a corner, finding Okimo who glanced it in.

Concord Rangers responded positively, though, increasing the pressure but only shooting from range. Wilson took a powerful effort to the stomach from Concord's Danny Green but stood strong, as did Connor Stevens. Concord pressed and Liam Nash forced Jonathan North into a save down to his right, but Wealdstone looked extremely quick on the counter.

Stones' attacking assets struck again on 23 minutes, with Fumnaya Shomotun making it 2-0. The floating number 10 drifted in and out, using Rhys Tyler as distraction on the overlap, before cutting inside and curling a wonderful effort into the top left corner. It was quite a remarkable contrast to the previous week.

Defensively Stones were resolute, their passing and movement was rapid, and their game-plan was executed in good fashion. Concord's last efforts saw Nash putting a tame header wide towards the end of the half, but at half time, it was almost the perfect scenario for Stones.



Concord made a well needed substitution at half time. Green was replaced by Sean Clohessy, and their urgency was significantly lifted.

As much as Concord Rangers tried to respond to a dreadful first half, they seemed to struggle and Stones went 3-0 up to put the game into a supposed lack of contention. Rhys Tyler found space down the right and appeared to have lost it, but Shomotun picked it up and floated a cross to the back post for Stones' David Pratt to nod in on 63 minutes.

Perhaps it was the complacency that allowed Concord a way in. Within 6 minutes of the third goal, it was 2-3. Nash smashed a ball low into the mix of players and captian Lee Minshull stabbed it in before Alex Wall took the ball down on the left side and whacked a rising effort into the top right corner leaving North static.

Wealdstone had taken the foot of the gas and stooped to cruise control with Concord's supporters urging their team to complete the comeback. They very nearly did on 83 minutes when Clohessy's free kick was hooked just over by Wall.

EASTBOURNE BOROUGH





ounded as Langney Football Club in ■ 1965, Eastbourne Borough Football Club has now moved into its second half-century. It has been a remarkable history, not quite unique- for many clubs in non-League can look back with pride on their small beginnings and genuine grass roots. But the Sports-Borough story has been quite a journey....

If you've visited us in past seasons, you may recall that the club is on the eastern fringe of town. Back in 1965, there was an Eastbourne and a Langney – and almost literally a stretch of open land between. Originally a boys' team who had outgrown their age group and wanted to stay together, the Club initially joined the Eastbourne & District Football League. The team played on local recreation grounds before moving to Prince's Park, near the Eastbourne sea-front. By 1973/74 the club had scaled the Eastbourne & Hastings League, and was beginning to look for a future beyond parks football. "They'll never be more than a parks team!" was the infamous comment of one verv senior official in Sussex football - but they proved him wrong....

Sussex County League.

In 1983 Langney Sports were elected as a founder member of Division 3 of the Sussex County League, and swiftly moved up through the divisions, rarely finishing outside the top four in Division one, and respected as a force

to be reckoned with. Finally, after some closerun campaigns, the 1999/00 season, under management duo Garry Wilson and Nick Greenwood, saw the Sports take the Sussex County League title, gaining promotion to the Dr. Martens League (Eastern Division) where after a season of consolidation at the higher level, the Club finished a creditable ninth in the table.

Climbing the Pyramid.

Meanwhile, off the field, the Sports were laying sound physical foundations too. From those itinerant early years on local parks pitches, the club had always had the vision of a more permanent home, and audaciously they had approached the local council with the improbable project of turning Priory Lane then a mere expanse of empty marshland into a proper stadium. The County League years saw those plans beginning to be realised. Then during 2000/01 the club received a £117,000 grant from the Football Foundation to go towards further development of Priory Lane. At the end of the season the Football Committee made one of the most crucial decisions in the club's history: the change of name to Eastbourne Borough FC. Stalwarts had their reservations, but the new name reflected the club's status as ambassadors for the whole town, and not only the original Langney. But to loyal supporters, we are and always will be still The Sports! Season 2002 saw the club win the Sussex Senior Cup for the first time, beating the holders Lewes 2-1, and within two seasons there was further promotion to the Dr Martens Premier Division. Within another year Borough were elevated to the newly inaugurated Conference South.

Conference Football Comes To Eastbourne.

2004/05 proved to be a most successful season as Eastbourne Borough reached the Play-Off Final. Over 1,000 Borough supporters made the 500 mile round trip to Stoke City for the North v South Final against Altrincham, but it wasn't to be, losing 2-1 in an exciting encounter.

The following campaign was disappointing, but the Club achieved another milestone reaching the 1st Round proper of the FA Cup for the first time, with the reward of a home tie against League Two club Oxford United. Cheered on by a record crowd of 3,770, and in front of the Match of the Day cameras, Borough dramatically forced a 1-1 draw with a twice-taken last-minute penalty. Story-book stuff! The replay, though, was lost 3-0 at the Kassam Stadium.

The 2006/07 season saw the squad adopt a change in direction with Garry Wilson placing an emphasis on "quality' not "quantity' and finished in 7th place, 4 points off a play-off berth.

Buoyed by the previous league season the club started the 2007/2008 season in high spirits and it was to prove a most successful campaign with Eastbourne Borough beating Hampton & Richmond Borough 2-0 in the Play-Off Final at Stevenage. The triumphant night had completed a remarkable rise from recreation ground football to the pinnacle of non-League, the Conference Premier.

The Pinnacle of Non-League Football.

The 2008/2009 season was another step into the unknown for the club, with the opening Premier fixture a home game with Rushden & Diamonds. Any doubts re: competitiveness of the squad, infrastructure of the club, the approach to only segregate when deemed appropriate, or the support of the Eastbourne public were dispelled by the end of the day. Notable results during the season included a double over Forest Green Rovers, a home win over ex-league club York City, success over Wrexham and an incredible 4-0 win at Woking. The season proved to be most rewarding with an impressive mid-table finish, amongst the 'giants' of the non-league game.

2009/10 was a tough season after a bright start, AFC Wimbledon and eventual FA Trophy winners Barrow were defeated at Priory Lane. But a three and a half months drought for a league victory left the Sports needing victory over champions Oxford United in the final game of the campaign. With 6 minutes to go and the scores level at 0-0, and results going against them elsewhere. Borough appeared to be heading for the drop. Then a final minute penalty, coolly converted by Simon

Weatherstone, sparked wild scenes and another season in the Premier was secured. **Relegation Comes to Priory Lane -**2010/2011

The Sports' 3rd season at National Conference level finally proved too much for the side and the club suffered its first ever relegation.

Back in Conference South the Sports had the honour of kicking off the first ever match at the Amex Stadium, against Brighton and Hove Albion in a held-over Sussex Senior Cup Final. The 9.500 attendance remains the biggest crowd that the club has played in front of. There was much optimism for the 2011/2012 season, but after a bright start the season became a struggle, and after only one league win in 12 outings the club parted company with Garry Wilson and Nick Greenwood. The decision for the club was difficult and painful. The decade (plus) of their tenure had seen unprecedented success but the decision was made and Tommy Widdrington took the reins. New Start

Tommy Widdrington was to oversee a new phase. He remained at the club for five seasons until April 2017 – a phase of mid-table stability in the National South. Equally important, the club's infrastructure was strengthening, with conversion to a Community Interest Club, the opening of an Academy, and a splendid new 3G pitch installed at Priory Lane. Tommy moved on and Jamie Howell was appointed manager ahead of the 2017-18 season.

More than a Club

Borough's first aim, in the new 2018-19 season, is no different from our opponents: maintaining the status. The National South is a high-quality division and a challenging one, and we love competing in it. With seven playoff places once again available, the season is sure to be very open right till the end, and like everyone the Sports would love to be in the mix.

55 YEARS AGO THIS WEEKEND... STROLL

hen you've been following a football team for a few decades - and accumulating a houseful of programmes and press cuttings, in my case - certain names swill around in your subconscious, evoking half-remembered games and occasions.

I'm fortunate that many Stones fans have passed on their own collections (my wife will routinely disagree on this) and only a few weeks I opened an envelope to find the programme pictured on the far right. And that was an extraordinary coincidence... For on those rare occasions when I'm not watching football, working or catching up with my family I love to jump on my trusty old Claude Butler (ooeer missus) and pedal off into the Hertfordshire/Bedfordshire countryside. And just recently, on one such adventure my interest was piqued by the glimpse of an enclosed football ground, with a small stand and floodlights, just half a dozen miles from where I live in Harpenden.

It was hard to collect my thoughts. The runway at Luton airport was just a few hundred yards away and the roar of jets was a shattering change from the peace and quiet of the cycle path I'd left just moments before.

So what was this football ground, you're wondering? None other than the once-upon-a-time home of Vauxhall Motors FC, the venue of the match and the programme I'd received that very morning. Quite remarkable, as David Coleman would have said. I knew a bit about VMFC, of course.

I'd seen us play the Luton-based works team

Silva, and once in our penultimate year as amateurs (1969-70) when we again shaded it 3-2 at Lower Mead in a qualifying round of the Amateur Cup.

But I was always intrigued by the concept of a 'works team'. The Met Police side has exploded that myth in recent years (not even one copper in the present XI but still bankrolled by their sports and social club and ultimately the taxpayer) but even back in the 1970s and 80s supposedly closed-shop works teams had welcomed all and sundry ... as long as they were good enough. Back in 1963, when the Stones travelled

the 20 miles up the newly-laid M1 to Luton they were facing a genuine amateur Vauxhall Motors team who worked - to a man - at the car manufacturing plant.

he Vauxhall team played in

the Spartan League (probably two levels below our Athenian League Premier division 'giants') and made quite an occasion of this Amateur Cup first round tie. Their Park Street ground was neat and tidy, with a small wooden stand and an enclosed pitch and pavilion- there are no details of the attendance but Stones' travelling support would have been in their hundreds for such a local game. I'd imagine over 1.000 crammed into the tinv ground and now, 55 years later peering over

the security fences and hedges, it's not difficult to imagine the smell of an upset in the air

Disappointingly, it's impossible to get more than a distant glimpse of the former Vauxhall ground. It's now owned by a sporting trust, has been laid with atstroturf and is principally used by college teams and Luton Town ladies

The once-thriving sports hub of Vauxhall Motors is now sold off, part of the 20-odd

acre site now a Premier Inn and part a Baptist College. And of course Vauxhall Motors FC is no more in fact they disappeared as long ago as 1991 when the head honcho of the Vauxhall sports and social association decided that his favourite sport. hockey, was a much better bet for the Luton site, kicking off the football section and laying a first generation plastic pitch for the iolly hockey players.

It was particularly devastating as VMFC, after years of trying for promotion to the lsthmian League, had finally been accepted when the league expanded to three divisions -and had just won promotion from Division Two as runners-up to champions Stevenage.

It was also ironic that the league was then sponsored by Vauxhall! (Who interestingly dropped their sponsorship within a year of the football club's demise).

But back to 1963. The Stones, as mentioned, were one of the leading lights in the amateur game despite being snubbed for membership of the Isthmian League... yet our record in the Amateur Cup (the only real measure of a club's standing) was truly abvsmal.

Between our first campaign in the cup in 1922 and the trip to Luton, the Stones had competed for 41 years (save for a five-year CONTINUED OVERPAGE

Admittedly, the team disposed comfortably with Vauxhall Motors

but so they should have done! As the programme highlighted, we fielded four amateur internationals and on the day two goals in each half secured the 4-0 win. The evergreen Viv Evans got two and England Good afternoon Ladies and Gentlemen.

Vauxhall Motors Recreation Club and especially the Football Section, extend a very warm welcome to the players, officials and supporters of Wealdstone F.C. on their first visit to The Brache Estate.

Founded in 1899 Wealdstone played in the Willesden and District League, London League and Spartan League before being elected to the Athenian League in 1927.

Of the current side, six are internationals, four English and most of the others have made big names in representative soccer. W. Creasey, C. Townsend, J. Ashworth and H. Lindsay are the English 'caps' and the latter three represented their Country as late as last Saturday against Wales at Bangor.

For the information of our Wealdstone friends, Vauxhall have played in the Spartan League since 1946 after many years in the South Midlands League.

Our only claim to fame in the F.A. Amateur Cup was in 1957/8 when, after playing through all the qualifying rounds, we were defeated by Ilford in the quarter finals. Hounslow, Devizes and Bromley were beaten in the Competition proper and nine games had to be played in all.

Eight times since the war the Final of the County Senior Cup has been reached, winning on five occasions.

In closing we hope you have an enjoyable afternoon's football and it is a pleasure having you.



Would the Amateur Cup torment ever end? Of course it did, in glorious fashion at Wembley Stadium three years later when Hendon were put to the sword in front of a delirious 45,000 crowd.

So just two more years of heartbreak. Tales for another day.

VAUXHALL Motors FC is often confused with Cheshire outfit Vauxhall Motors FC, based in Ellesmere Port - also a works side for the company which was founded when Vauxhall opened a car plant in that town in (coincidentally) 1963... the year we played the Amateur Cup game detailed above.

The Cheshire side enjoyed much more success in its first 40-odd years, rising from local football to the Conference North and knocking QPR out of the FA Cup in their first ever appearance in the First Round in 2002. But running costs became too steep and despite staying in the Connie North for its inaugural 10 seasons, VMFC were forced to resign and join the West Cheshire League where they still compete. STATTO CORNER: in 1987 Warrington Town (whom we met in the F.A. Trophy last February) played BOTH Vauxhall Motors teams in the same season. They faced the Ellesmere Port side in the Cheshire Senior Cup and then, a few weeks later



beat Vauxhall Motors Luton in the fifth round of the FA Vase en route to Wembley (where they lost to St Helens Town). Come to think of it, St Helens v Warrington in a football final must have been equally confusing!

HERE was a free paper given out around the Borough of Harrow called **All Sport Weekly**, which carried match reports and news during the season on the local sides - though mainly about Wealdstone. I was looking back through a couple of old

copies (to be honest, to see if I got a mention at my last club Uxbridge, but I didn't) and I noticed that the 'Stones fans were mentioned almost every week. They'd brought in my old Yeading gaffer Gordon Bartlett as boss and he rang me and asked me to go along for the start of the 1995-96 season.

A club that had taken a voluntary demotion to Division 3 seemed a big step down, but there was a passion about the place. Gordon was building a brand-new team (as just about every player had left) and yes I got a bit more money to go there, but that

will mention Hertford Town! – see below). Thankfully, that day I was fine and I was still buzzing with a pint in my hand after the game.

I signed league forms and as the season loomed large we ended our pre-season schedule with a four-team tournament to be played at Harrow B*rough and Edgware over a weekend (not guite up to the standard of The Emirates Tournament, eh!) We beat Edgware on the Saturday and were set to face the club's most local rivals Harrow B*rough in the Sunday final. B*ro were the senior side being two divisions higher up the league and although Wealdstone lost by a couple of goals, to play a friendly in front of a couple of hundred partisan fans was a great boost with the first league game a week away. I'm sure both of the B*ro fans enjoyed it too.

he league season started away to Cove and we won 9-1 with me playing left

back. It was a great start for a whole new side, and it really was a new team, only a midfielder called Roddy Braithwaite played from the previous season's side. Well over a hundred 'Stones fans travelled down and that was more than most Ryman Division Three clubs would get week in week out. It was still a time of change, though, as Gordon looked for the right formula and the right mix on the field, so there were still new faces coming in. To be honest, perhaps he tinkered a bit more than he needed as he sought the right balance which eventually cost us.

On a personal note, I wasn't the star player I and a few others thought I would be, having dropped down from the first division. It meant the fans had a few doubts. 'The jury's out' was probably fair after the first few games, but they soon saw I was steady, turning in 7 or 8 out of 10 performances every match.

Wealdstone FC was then (and still is) a different beast. The fans build the pressure and players either sink - many do - or swim. I wanted and needed the fans and the buzz they gave me, but I still had to overcome them mentally to get to the top of my game. Now I don't play for them yet they still bloody get to me! Many have watched me at other clubs as a player, always saying hello and I've always been pleased to see them. In fact, when the news broke about me becoming a manager, I reckon more than half the

congratulations messages by text and on Twitter were from 'Stones fans, so I must have done OK there. eh!

That first season I started as left back and though I didn't mind that, I was hardly a wingback bombing up and down the line. My best games were to come at centre half, but the full back slot gave me the chance to use a range of passes in and out of the midfield or long to the forwards. It wasn't strange to me, it was just a bit more restrictive and I didn't get the chance to win as many headers! I was steady but wasn't setting the world alight (and despite the odd big win, nor was the team) but I was there week in. week out. When the results or the team performance aren't great it can knock you back into your shell a little bit and I'm still no different in that.

he side got to mid-season and like Uxbridge previously, were still inconsistent. We lost to Leighton Town, Windsor & Eton and Horsham in a short spell and that was a signal for a couple of new bodies to come in. One was to become a good mate, the mercurial talent, wide boy and nutter that was (and still is) Lee Walker, aka The Devil. At least, the devil if he didn't like you but a smashing bloke if he did and thankfully, we're still good friends today.

Looking back, he started unbelievably quietly. It took him a couple of games to get used to us, the system and the crowd. Their first impression was always scepticism. No half measures. Wealdstone could have signed Bobby Moore the day after he won the World Cup and he'd have had to prove himself to the fans. Then as now, players have to start to prove themselves as soon as the team is read out. No bedding in, no finding your feet. It really is sink or swim from your first touch in the pre-game warm-up.

The club and the fans have been through the proverbial wringer since topping the Non-league tree with a Conference and FA Trophy 'double' in 1985. They were the first club to achieve the feat but were denied promotion to the Football League under the old 're-election' system (a couple of seasons before automatic promotion came

in). Then they tripped over the top of the mountain, slid down and spent the best part of twenty vears trying to scratch their way back up. (As I write, they're almost there finishing in the top half of Conference South and definitely on the up).

They'd stopped falling at least when I joined, but only because there wasn't much further to go. They'd lost their ground - and then the money that was due in a fraud - and had been homeless nomads since 1991, plaving in front of fewer and fewer fans in a financially-strangling half ownership of Watford's Vicarage Road, before escaping just about intact to play in front of even less fans further from 'home' at Yeading FC's Beaconsfield Road ground. Falling

crowds and falling income were topped by increasing travel costs in the Beazer Homes League Southern Division, and the decision was made to take a voluntary transfer to the Isthmian League. A league at the same level, but much more South East and London orientated. The problem was. no-one of similar status. i.e. Division One would swap, so Wealdstone had to start at the bottom of the league in Division Three.

his was Wealdstone. Ever looking to the positive the publicity machine took over: New Manager, great squad, new ground (a share at Edgware, at least), then a 9-1 win away from home at Cove in the first match of the season. As if there wasn't enough hype around the club, the bloody Chairman went public in the local paper telling the world that we would win promotion at a canter. Christ. most of us didn't know everyone in the squad's first names! There were more promises in the papers by Christmas of promotion, success and a new era of Wealdstone returning to the top of the non-league ladder. Just the four divisions to win and over a hundred places to climb, then. No half measures!

The 20 of us in the dressing had to cope with this as our reality. Walks (pictured below) made a big difference as he changed the dynamic in the squad. He wasn't afraid to dig people out, but he'd include everyone in the banter as well, it was a bit all for one and one for all. or perhaps more accurately, all for Walks and Walks for all.....

After a couple of games to settle in, he also struck up an affinity with the crowd and that actually helped a few others by taking some of the pressure off. It also helped me as my relationship with the crowd strengthened after a spell where things had been a bit rough, in particular after an FA Cup tie. I'm known for a few high points in my career but there have been a few lows along the way and Hertford Town away in the FA Cup was one of them. We were drawing but on top. I sprinted down the left wing (really!) and cut inside then tried to knock the ball wide to young winger Gavin Hart but the intended pass was intercepted. They broke away and with no defender to beat on our left-hand side, scored the winner. Another cup run over. The fans dug me out for a few weeks for that one. It was a game we should have won and worse still we had a player's night out planned for the evening. (Weeks? As I said before it was over 20 years ago, and I go to Wealdstone now to watch a match and someone will bring it up!)

In true non-league tradition, it had all gone sour for me on the pitch but after a few

liveners the evening went OK! We were up in Northampton so we all stayed over and the next morning met up early to get away. I was stood in the hotel lobby with Steve Bircham and a few of the lads when all we could hear was retching from the gents. Moments later, out walked our verv own Mr Bartlett. Players 1 Manager 0.

We were in the mix for the promotion places throughout the season and we had some good results, but late on we stuttered and lost a couple of games at home. We just missed out, finishing fourth by a couple of points and really, we were still a work in progress. Instant success with a new side is rare and we were no exception, but a good base had been built for the following year...
