Welcome to 2019... a new year and new hope after breaking the plastic jinx!

ood afternoon and today we extend the usual warm welcome to everyone connected with Dartford FC.

Well, what a start to 2018! The New Year dawned bright over Slough Town's impressive Arbour Park ground on Tuesday and the Stones suddenly rediscovered their mojo following that

abject end to 2018. Three points were as impressive as they were unexpected (not by me, obviously) and a rich reward for a system that allowed us to protect the back four and spring forward into attack with natural width on both wings.

As matchwinner Connor Stevens told our media team on the final whistle: "When we're at the races we can beat any team in this league and everyone was on their game today. Now we've just got to keep this form going".

Slough have a very direct approach, attempting to turn the opposition's defence with long balls but Connor and skipper Jerome Okimo were outstanding as they stood up to the aerial bombardment - helped by the tenacity and composure of Jake Sheppard and Remarni Medford-Smith. And behind them, of course, Northy was supremely agile and confident, one tip-over from a second-half freekick sending Slough to their knees in frustration.

We might have had a couple of goals more (keeper Jack Turner's save from his own defender Lee Togwell right on half time looking suspiciously close to the goalline) before Dave Pratt was inches from converting Simon Mensah's clever cross... but in the end that mighty leap and header from Connor (pictured above) was enough to start the New Year's party!

Scoring first was a crucial factor - it always helps to have something to bite on, a lead to defend and hopefully now we'll see more of the Wealdstone that won so convincingly at Dartford last



August. In possibly our best display of the season, two goals from Brad Bubb and a superlative strike from Jeff Monakana wrapped up a 3-0 win that made the rest of the National League sit up and take notice.

Our club needs leadership at the moment in every department, and it was great to see positivity from the management team on Tuesday. Onwards and upwards!

- ●Interestingly, the win at Arbour Park was our first on a plastic surface in a league game. We've lost at Maidstone and Sutton, and been walloped at Oxford City a couple of times but Tuesday was the first time the Stones looked really comfortable on it. Slough's surface is 4G however far, far better than Oxford and you can see why many clubs want to embrace the new pitch technology. Don't tell Fingers!

here was palpable relief at the final whistle at Slough after our well deserved one nil victory, with hugs involv-

ing the management team appearing to have greater resonance than the normal.

We needed that for sure. The stats had not been good. No league wins in five games, four league matches without a goal and after our heady win at Hemel which took us momentarily to second spot (pictured right), a slump down the table to 14th place. We'd also never won a proper game of football on plastic. The portents were not good. We already know about our abject defeat at Biggleswade in the Trophy

and once you get into a slump, confidence wanes and it is difficult to see where the next goal will come from - let alone a win. The two home defeats over Christmas hadn't helped the mood, as performances were a long way from where they should be. Slough in particular was awful.

o we went to Slough without much hope I suspect, certainly on the terraces, though I had some confidence that

we would win. Not by any logic of course but the fact that I had seen four other games live over the Christmas break, involving Stones and Chelsea, and the away team had

won all four!

The management team went with a bold line-up, set up to attack and after the first 15 minutes or so, we grew in confidence and started to be the better side. Their keeper pulled off a couple of great saves in the first half, including one fabulous one right on half time that kept the scores level.

Stones carried on attacking in the second forty-five and were rewarded with a goal, our first in the league for six weeks, with a fine Connor Stevens header. Yes, we had to weather a Slough fight back and needed a brilliant save from

Jonathan North at the very end to keep the scores level, but we could have been home and hosed had we'd taken one of the two gilt edge chances that presented themselves in the second forty-five.

As I said before, the selection was bold, but we also saw some decent football played on the ground that was as equally pleasing as the win. I should also mention that Slough's 4G surface was as good as they get and,

most telling, was that you didn't realise it was an artificial surface, unlike say the awful surface at Oxford

ow we need to continue in the same manner at the Vale; starting today, we need to improve our home form again. We haven't won a home league game since the fag end of October, when we beat Gloucester at the Vale.

In the post match interview, Neil Baker, the joint Slough Town manager, made an interesting comment. He basically said that they expected Wealdstone to come to the game at Arbour Park and play with the freedom we don't show at home, as the crowd gets on their (our team's) back at the Vale, as we saw on Boxing Day.

Whilst our home form has fallen off the cliff of late, our form away from home is still pretty solid with only one defeat in seven on the road. Our home record at the Vale has been poor since our promotion into the Conference South and whilst there has been an improvement under the current regime, it seems that the old fallibilities still exist. Our home crowds, particularly with expectations, can be seen as much as a curse as a blessing. That said, is it the crowd that is the problem or more defensive team selections? Food for thought certainly.

RICKETTS (pictured left with his partner Andrea Gibbs) was both a Guardian journo and a Stones fan who was loved

and respected by all who knew him. He was a familiar face on the tea bar side at The Vale alongside his fellow wit. Glenn Rodgers, after switching his allegiance from Watford half a dozen years ago. His Twitter profile was one of the

funniest and most humane, and his recent blogs (after being diagnosed with cancer) almost unbearably moving. Please remember him today.

LES BULL (pictured right) was well known to the Wealdstone fraternity throughout the 1980s when he was the first team kit man... and had the honour of being on duty in the Stones changing room at the 1985 FA Trophy final when (of course) we won the second part of the non-League double.

Staunch Stones fan Victor Klarfeld got to know him closely via the groundhopping scene when he used to attend games all over the country with Les and his best friend Paul White.

"He used to love waving his stick in the air when he didn't agree with the referee's decision and - being a dyed-in-the-wool Sunderland fan he got very animated at any mention of skunks, magpies, zebra crossings or in fact anything black and white! (Very Newcastle-averse was our Les)".

Victor missed the Slough game this week as he wanted to keep Les's friend Paul company at Wingate v Haringey. Paul was devastated at Les's passing but will be at today's game to pay his respects... as will we all.



WILLIE WATSON INTERVIEW

18 England caps and a shot like Bobby Charlton ...meet Willie Watson, a true Wealdstone FC all-time legend

We've an eight-page New Year treat for you in this issue! Tim Parks sits down to interview one of his favourite Stones players in history....

F THERE'S one little story that sums up the cheeky playfulness of John 'Willie' Watson - the man revered and feared throughout the Stones' first golden era of the 1970s - it's the one about Gibraltar and The Floodlights.

You've not heard it? Well, Wealdstone were winning the Southern League Division One South and the club rewarded Eddie Presland's team with a midweek break in Gibraltar - and a match against First Tower FC, the tiny nation's resident football team.

Willie takes up the story: "The pitch was right next to the airport runway, and at

some point the referee said 'There is a plane due in soon, so I'm going to give a long blast on my whistle and the floodlights will go out for a moment so the pilot can land safely. Then we'll resume the game'... well,

his whistle went with the ball at our end of the pitch, pitch black, and when the lights came on again me and Ray Fulton were up in front of their goal, sticking the ball in the net and falling over laughing. They didn't know what on earth was going on!"

Willie and Ray were the jokers of the team, but chalk and cheese on the pitch with Watson the midfield enforcer and 'Ginger' Fulton the artful wide man. "Has Ray still got his red hair?" I asked Willie.

"Yeah, but now he keeps it in a box by his bed".

atson's dry humour is the stuff of legend at Wealdstone.
But he earned respect on the pitch by having one of the biggest engines in the game, shrewd tactical awareness, a crunching tackle and a shot like Bobby Charlton.

Although cruelly overlooked at West Ham by manager Ron Greenwood

in his youth - and then, even more strangely being overlooked by the England non-League team in his seven years at Lower Mead - Willie finally reaped the international rewards when he was transferred to Yorkshire top-dogs Scarborough in 1980. His 18 caps for the semi-pro Three Lions, across six years are only bettered by Altrincham full-back John Davison.

Certainly, if playing for your country is a true measure of a footballer's ability, John "Willie" Watson is in a league of his own among the Wealdstone greats.

You have to be of a certain vintage to have watched and appreciated the man who patrolled the centre of the pitch like a man on a mission, earning the admiration of friend and foe as he protected the back four and worked to provide chance after chance for our celebrated forwards of that time.

et it was his fiery temper and will to win that, perversely, stunted his opportunities of making it in the Football League. Willie had a tough upbringing in East London's Stepney Green. "My dad was a boxer. My mum was a cocker spaniel" he joked, making light of the difficult days when his path in life seemed likely to follow his dad, Stephen, into working at the breweries off the Mile End Road, mixed in with a bit of boxing for money in the fairgrounds of Southend.

"Me dad wanted me to do a bit of boxing but I gave it up - I was playing football twice on Saturday for the school and for Senrab, and in goal for a team on Sundays, plus training four nights a week" says Willie.

"I must have had something cos I got

in the East London Boys team and we had some great players there. I was spotted by the well-known scout, Wally St Pier and he came round our house which must have been an eye-opener!

"He invited me to train with West Ham twice a week... but the best thing to come out of that was meeting Ginge Fulton on the tube. He was a Burnt Oak boy, and we met up at Stepney Green and travelled on to training together. It's a friendship that has endured!"

But Willie is rightly scarred by his experience of pro football. His bitterness at his treatment by "The Academy of Football" at Upton Park is long-lasting and understandable.

"I was in West Ham's reserves at the age of 15. One of the youngest-ever. I was in the same team as Trevor Brooking, Harry Redknapp and David Coss, but about 10 years younger. John Lyall was the youth team manager and he rated me. We played Gillingham at Upton Park on my debut and we won 6-0. I was on top of the world.

"I got picked to play for England Youth in the Little World Cup, along with my team mates Kevin Locke and John Ayris, and the next week the West Ham manager made a point in the programme of congratulating the other two... but not me. For some reason I wasn't his cup of tea. Maybe I was a bit of a rascal, too naughty, always getting into scrapes - it was just the way I was brought up. Whatever it was, I was slung out of West Ham."

It was now 1971. John 'Budgie' Byrne, ex West Ham, was manager of Durban City in South Africa and he offered an escape route to 'the seriousl y p*****d off" Willie Watson.

"It may sound like a strange move but it was great for me. It was real quality football. Johnny Haynes, the ex-England and Fulham skipper was starring in midfield - he could be horrible on the pitch but a real gent off it, a smashing bloke - while the team had four Germans who had been in the World Cup squad a year earlier. Hertha Berlin had been punished for accepting bribes and all their players had to find a game outside FIFA, and South Africa was ideal as they were also outsiders because of apartheid. So Durban City was chock full of internationals, top quality players... and me! It was a real education."

But after a year Charlton Athletic got in touch. "I had this persuasive letter from them and they convinced me that my future was back in London, So I returned. But I had a 'mare and very soon I was back at home wondering what to do."

■ is saviours, as it turned out, were a combination of Wealdstone manager Sid Prosser and George Duck.

"Sid was an old friend of Ron Greenwood, and Ron actually did me a bit of a favour when he was slinging me out of West Ham a year earlier. As a parting shot, he said 'You should get in touch with Wealdstone'.

"At the time I thought nothing of it. I'd never even heard of Wealdstone. I just wanted to get away from West Ham. But then Sid kept writing to my old address in Stepney Green, even when I was in South Africa, sending those old blue airmail letters and my mum kept opening them.

"My dad had fixed me up with job at the brewery. I wasn't convinced. But my mum iust said "At least this Sid Prosser bloke wants you, that must be worth something."

So I agreed to chat to

Sid, and first off I said 'to be honest, I don't know who you are, or where Wealdstone is. Who else have you got in the team?

"And then he mentioned George Duck. Now, I'd sort of known George for a few years as he was at Millwall and Spurs, playing the same level and I knew how good he was. So I thought 'well, if this Wealdstone are good enough for him, they can't be bad'.

"I went over to train and it was a good set up, a nice tight ground, good training over the road at Hamilton's and a good feel about it. I'd stayed in touch with Ginge Fulton and when he was released by Orient I got him over too. And Vince O'Kane who was an East London boy like me.

"Well, we had some great years didn't we? I won the Conference in the 80s with Maidstone but that Wealdstone team, that group of players were something else. I'd never enjoyed football as much before or since. Particularly winning the Southern League in '74, the team had such a good balance and flow to it and we knew where the ball was going as if by instinct. The first after promotion too. I was used year

> mainly at left back or right back but that season Eddie Presland (another Essex lad who used to give me a lift into training) moved me into midfield for the first time - at Dover, I think it was - and I thought I was terrible. I hardly touched the ball.

"I said to Eddie, 'I ain't done nothing all afternoon!' And he said: 'They ain't done nothing either Willie. That's all part of the game'."

rom that moment, Willie ■ Watson grew into the most powerful midfield presence in non-League football. He protected the back four, moved the ball seamlessly through midfield - literally over-powering the opposition - and enjoyed peppering shots on goal at the other end

The Stones' forward stars of that generation - Georgie Duck, Johnny Henderson and Bill

as the club built a reputation for fast, attacking football.

But the spiky, combative side of Willie's nature often bubbled to the surface. "It was always there, I'm afraid. I hate losing, whether it's at football or draughts and sometimes I stretched the laws."

His most high-profile moment was in the FA Cup 3rd round at QPR in 1977 when the referee booked Willie for one strong challenge too many - and the irate Watson knocked the card out of his hand!

oday, that would mean a straight red and a lengthy ban. Willie knows how lucky he was, but it could have been even worse. "If you look at the footage of that game, I was actu-

ally picking up a lump of mud to throw at the ref when he booked me! I was just so incensed.... the non-League clubs always seem to get the rough end of the stick in those circumstances and the decisions went against us. right through the 90 minutes.

"But we only had ourselves to blame. We had some players who could have hurt Rangers but they went into their shells a bit. We weren't on our game".

I mentioned Steve Brinkman as being an exception.

"Well, Brinky was a showman. A real talent. Ex Arsenal youngster. I was working for Brent Council by then, working in paying and Brinky was my sidekick. I also got jobs there for Nigel Johnson and Seamus Horgan. Very sad though as Brinky and Nigel died very young.... must have been working with me" he said ruefully.

So what was Willie's career outside football up to that point? "Well, before the Brent Council lark I was working in the sausage factory in Acton, Wolseley Sausages. I got the job through Adriaan Eglite, the Stones

National League), Willie was able to shine on the biggest non-League stage and soon Hull City were sniffing after our mercurial midfielder.... and also the Stones' up-andcoming left back Stuart Pearce.

"'Hull! I'm not going to Hull' I said when our daffy manager Ken Payne told me they were interested. I think Wealdstone were interested in the transfer fee. I was 25 and Stuart was 18, and I said 'I'm not going but you go. vou might enjoy it'.

"But me and Stuart agreed to travel up there, despite neither really wanting to go, and we arranged to meet at Kings Cross. I turned up and there was no-one there. So I got on the train anyway, all the way wondering what I was doing, and it was like an Ealing Comedy when I got off the train one end and Stuart got off at the other. He'd been on it all the time!

"We met the manager Mike Smith who put us up in digs, and then next day got on the coach for a trial match at Grimsby in pouring rain. Nobody spoke to us on the way down, Nobody. I said to Stu, 'They are no better than us. no wav' and when the game started we bossed it, me playing left mid and Pearcey left back and Brian Marwood playing right midfield. Of course they were all over us on the coach going back, but the money wasn't great (they offered #200 a week) and I was adamant I wasn't going. It didn't stop me winding Stuart up, and he nearly signed because I'd told him I WAS going to!"

remember the Hull fiasco well. I was a sports reporter for the Harrow Observer at the time covering Wealdstone (my dream job) and no sooner had I got to the bottom of the failed bid to land Willie and Stu Pearce than Scarborough - high fliers in the Conference - came in with a £10,500 bid for Watson.

It coincided with the Stones being knocked out of the FA Cup in a replay by Harlow Town. In fact it was no coincidence as the club had been 'robbed' of a cash windfall - the winners of that replay were to face Charlton at home in the First Round - and Chairman Fred Deanus quickly recognised that Willie could be the saviour.

"Fred told me 'You have to leave'. I said "I don't want to leave." He said that the club were in financial difficulties and so I said "Who is it then?' When he said 'Scarborough' I said I wouldn't even want to go there for a holiday.

"Their manager Colin Appleton came down to watch me but he chose a game when I was suspended. We sat next to each other in the stand!"

It was all happening at Lower Mead at that time. Ken Pavne was also sacked in the wake of the Cup defeat and it was appointment of new boss Allen Batford that finally tipped Willie into leaving.

"Allen had a winning reputation but I'd had lots of run-ins with his Wimbledon side in the 70s and his methods weren't for me. I took part in his first training session and it was like a game of tennis with the ball whacked backwards and forwards over the net. Not a lot of subtlety.

"So I went back to Fred and said I'd sign

rings out 'Willie! Willie Watson!' And it was Anniello lannone, who used to wind me up something rotten when he was playing for Weymouth against Wealdstone. Every game there was a run-in. We used to make iokes about him selling ice-creams and collecting the deckchairs on Weymouth beach.

"Now, years later he was visiting his cousin's Italian restaurant and invited me in. What a chance in a million!

ut back to Scarborough. Willie's time at Seamer Road was blighted by knee injuries and he ended up having arthroscopies (cartilage operations) on both knees

"I was there for two years until the summer of 1982. The condition for me signing was that I could stay living in Tring, just travelling up for matches and I could hire a car for every game, home and away from a garage round the corner from where I lived. I was still training at Wealdstone to

start off with - until Batsford got the hump, saying I was a distraction. So I trained at Barnet, where Barry Fry was manager, but just played in league games. I was let off Yorkshire Senior Cup matches!"

At the time I remember thinking that Willie would be back to haunt the Stones but he can't remember facing his old club at all until he signed for Dagenham. But that all came a bit later...

"A new manager came in at Scarborough, Jim McAnearney, and he wasn't happy that I played so few games. But I played more than I should have - squads were much smaller in those days and you just had to play through the pain.... I was suffering from a damaged cartilage at Scarborough for 12 matches but I wasn't going to be labelled a 'Southern Softie" so I just got on with it. Some games I could barely get through the warm-up!"

e was still training at Barnet, who were struggling in the Conference, and clearly coveted by their eccentric manager Fry - who announced one Friday morning in early 1982 that he had signed Willie on loan.

"I told him 'but I can't run - my knees are gone' and he said 'never mind that, you don't need to run - just tell the others they're f*****q useless and gee them up'. His coaching skills weren't the best, he just used to yell at the players, and they were just a mish mash. But somehow were scraped through FA Cup matches against Harlow (the big giant killers at the time) and Wycombe, and found ourselves facing First Division Brighton in the Third Round at Underhill in front of 4,000. It was on telly and we nearly won the game on the boggiest pitch you've ever seen. It finished 0-0 but we lost the replay 3-1. Gary Sargeant scored a cracking goal for Barnet after I'd won the ball in a tackle... only a year later Brighton were back at Wembley playing Man Utd in the FA Cup Final.

"But the funniest thing of all was that we had a decent left back at Barnet, Graham Pearce who wasn't getting games. Barry Frv didn't like Pearce but he stuck him in the team against Brighton to put him in the shop window. Sure enough, he played well and Brighton ended up buying him - and he played in that Cup Final the next year! That was typical Barry Fry".

for Scarborough if I got a signing-off fee - which he granted. I met Appleton in the Post House Hotel at Luton on the M1 and suddenly I was a Scarborough player!

"They were good to me though. Even though it was a strange start.... I was introduced to the players by their skipper Sean Marshall, who I'd last encountered when I was sent off in the league match at Scarborough a month earlier. I'd nutmegged him by the touchline and he went straight through me - so I elbowed him in the face. But he was nice as pie when we were team mates. He said he'd deserved the elbow for that challenge!

"It's funny how all the on-field shenanigans disappear when you're away from the game. Years after I'd stopped playing I was living in Tring, pushing one of my kids in a pushchair along the High Street in Bekhamsted and suddenly this Italian voice

Barnet couldn't afford to buy Willie, even with their Cup windfall and eventually Maidstone's chairman Jim Thompson came in with a $\pounds 6,000$ bid to bring him back closer to home.

"Bill Williams had just taken over as manager with Peter Taylor the ex-England winger as player coach. They finished well down the table the previous season but we had a three way battle with Wealdstone and Enfield for the Conference title in 1982-83... and I became a 'penalty king' like The Duck back in the Wealdstone days!"

Millie put away 18 penalties for Maidstone that season, plus four from open play but to this day he doesn't know why he was even taking them!

"We were awarded the first penalty in a pre-season game at Croydon and I was told to take it - maybe because I was the big-money signing - but I'd never taken one before. I actually kicked the floor, just scuffed the ball but the keeper mistimed his dive and the ball went in. It was a rubbish penalty but we got one against Bangor in our third league game and that went in too!"

He even scored twice from the penalty spot in a 2-0 home win over Barnet as Maidstone eventually finished Gola

Conference runners up to Enfield by a single point, with Wealdstone third. Allen Batsford's team had had a fabulous season after promotion from the Southern League and the games against Maidstone were both cracking affairs - goalless at Lower Mead but a sensational 3-0 win at Maidstone on Easter Saturday.

But Willie Watson was a notable absentee from both games. "Around that time I was suffering from a viral infection that kept flaring up. It went on for about 18 months which restricted my appearances. I would have loved to

played in those games because I had a lot

of friends still at Wealdstone - Stu Pearce, Robin Wainwright and Alan Cordice who I'd room with on England international matches. When Peter Taylor left the club to coach at Exeter City I took over his role - and the next thing you knew we were drawn against Exeter in the FA Cup and knocked them out!"

Willie was only touching 30 but his career was winding down. "I had an approach from Ken Knighton at Dagenham who admitted he'd never seen me play but wanted me to come over in a player/coach role....it was the season Wealdstone won the Conference and the Trophy and finally I managed to play against them, but our striker Steve Whitton missed three easy chances and we lost 1-0".

is last game was for the Daggers was at Swindon Town in the FA Cup. Dagenham won 2-1 but Willie broke his hand and at the end of that season he was offered the chance to become landlord of Shades, a pub in Lower High Street, Watford.

"I knew I couldn't play for much longer and being a coach in those days meant just being a dogsbody... although I took my preliminary badge (along with Steve Brinkman) just so I could say I had that qualification. Sounds a bit silly but I wanted to have proof that football was my trade" He was a publican for eight or nine years until the recession began to bite - so Willie took over another pub in Kings Langley while he did The Knowledge (licensed black taxi qualifications) and embarked on his cabbying career.

o what is Willie up to these days, now he's 65? "Well, I'm still a cabbie, had a black cab for 25/30 years now. I live in Toddington (in Bedfordshire, just by the M1) with my second wife Christine and drive down to London for work every day - around the hotels mainly - leaving home about 3am and driving back about 1pm. I've been doing it for a long time but not as long as The Duck... although he's given up driving for the moment and now works at Budgens in Abbots Langley, just round the corner from where he lives. I used to see him every day when we were both cabbying but now we meet up to play golf mainly. I've been a member at Grimsdyke Golf Club in Harrow Weald for 15 years now, but when I play George it's more often at Whipsnade near Dunstable... it's quieter there and people can't see how bad he is:)

"He plays golf like he used to play: Very studied and careful. Like his penalties, he makes a science of it. Even when he was playing football, he worked hard to get his balance just right so he could volley and head the ball so well. But his golf is definitely getting worse...

"My main thing now is going off middle-aged cruising! I'm not retired just yet but we love going off on theme cruises, particularly music ones. We've seen The Troggs, Yardbirds, Jerry and the Pacemakers although he's old enough to need one now! We're going around the Greek Islands next summer, plus the Caribbean in the New Year so we don't do too badly".

etween them, Willie and Christine have four kids and eight grandchildren. And coincidentally, three of them (Alex and Mason Yerby, 12 and 10 years old, and six year old Ralph Miles, who live in Maple Cross) are playing for Wealdstone Youth under Ronnie Welch. And yes, for the (much) older Stones fans among us, those boys are related to ginger-haired Dave Yerby who played for the Stones in the last amateur days at the turn of the 1970s.

So we could see a Willie Watson descendant back in a Wealdstone first team shirt one day. And no doubt as bad a loser as his grandad!


Willie for England

illie Watson's first cap came in 1979 at the inaugural non-League tournament, staged at Stafford Rangers. The amateur game had become officially unrecognised in the mid-70s but it wasn't until the formation of the Alliance Premier League in 1979 that it was decided to form a representative non-League XI - and Stafford, one of the inaugural members of the APL,was chosen to host the first tournament.

"I can't remember much about it, except that we won it" says Willie. 'Scotland, Italy and Holland were in it and we beat the Dutch in the final". With the Stones among the weaker teams in the League it was guite an accolade for our club captain to be chosen - and he was quickly made skipper of the England side too. An honour he held on to over the next six years, and 18 caps as England remained the strongest side in Europe. I recall travelling up to Scarborough in 1983 to watch England beat Scotland - and Italy beat Holland - on the same day, with Willie in majestic midfield form for his country (then a Maidstone player) while Wealdstone's Alan Cordice zoomed around up front to finish top scorer in that tournament. Scotland fielded striker Mo Johnson, who went on to make a name for himself with Watford and Everton.

The Stones' Neil Cordice and Paul Bowgett were also on the radar of the England selectors but missed out through injury.

"I told Keith Wright (the England manager) about how good Stuart Pearce was but he just said 'I've got a left back and that's John Davison'... well Altrincham's Davison was very sold and reliable but he was nowhere near as dynamic as Pearcey. I think he missed a trick there, but Stuart didn't do too badly in the end".

Opposition in focus



artford Football Club was formed in early 1888 by members of the Dartford Workingmen's club and for the first few seasons, played only friendly fixtures with the occasional foray into cup football. A run to the final of the Kent Senior cup in 1894 encouraged the club committee to enter Dartford as a Founder-Member of the Kent League for the 1894-95 season. It was in October 1895 that Dartford first played in the FA Cup. Two seasons later Dartford became Founder-Members of the Southern League, Division Two winning the Championship at the first attempt. Over the next few seasons Dartford fluctuated between the Southern and Kent Leagues but a financial crisis in the early 1900s saw the club drift down to the West Kent League. At the same time the club, which had used several pitches in the area. gained the use of Summers Meadow in Lowfield Street on a long lease

After the war Dartford Football was slow to get underway as the Summers Meadow ground was no longer available. However local business men appreciating the value of a good-class football team bearing the town's name completely re-structured the club and, from 1921 onwards, Dartford FC was run as a public limited liability company, unique in

English football until Tottenham Hotspur followed suit some fifty years later. A site was found in Watling Street in the neighbouring parish of Stone, which was to remain the club's home until a major financial crisis forced the sale of the ground in 1992.

For a decade and a half following the 1939-1945 War Dartford had little to show for its efforts except for a sparkling Kent Senior Cup win over Bromley in 1947. At the same time Bromley vied with Bishop Auckland as the premier amateur club in the land and the Lillywhites look a 2-0 lead in the final before Dartford struck back with three goals to lift the trophy. Included in the Dartford line-up that day was Ted Croker, later to become the Secretary of the Football Association. Soon after this win Dartford transferred Riley Cullum and Fred Alexander to Charlton Athletic for £6,000, which wiped out the club's debts entirely.

The 1980s was a period dominated by two managers with contrasting styles: John Still and Peter Taylor. By winning the Southern Division of the Southern League in 1980-81 Dartford had gained a short-lived place in the Alliance Premier League. Relegated after just one season but having tasted life at the top of the semi-professional game Dartford wanted more. John Still who had led Leytonstone/Ilford to a clean sweep of trophies, was the man for the job, in 1983-84 he steered Dartford to a fourth Southern League Championship and a resultant return to the Alliance Premier League (by now known as the Gola League). This time Darts stayed two seasons finishing third in 1984-85. Another periodic crisis was looming, and with Still departing in February 1986, Dartford were relegated once again.

In the wake of the Bradford fire and the Hillsborough disaster Dartford, like so many clubs, needed to either re-locate or upgrade their current facilities with the Board going for the latter option. Large sums of money were spent on planning and design fees, which burdened a manageable financial deficit with

crippling interest charges.

At the same time Maidstone United, who had sold their own ground, needed a suitable home to launch their ill-fated foray into the Football League and the Dartford board agreed to let Maidstone ground-share at Watling Street, the rent income providing a welcome boost for finances.

Within a few years Maidstone had gone into liquidation, most of their cash being taken up to gain the eagerly-sought Football League place. Ground improvements, which Maidstone United has paid for, were sold to Dartford at a cost (around £500,000), which pushed Darts' debts beyond manageable proportions. Watling Street was sold to pay off creditors and Dartford withdrew from the Southern League four games into the 1992-93 season.

The club's Supporters' Association, around 400 strong, came to the rescue, A private limited liability company was incorporated in November 1992 to manage affairs which meant, primarily, keeping the Youth team operating, an action which was rewarded when the Youth team beat Maidstone Invicta (the club rising out of the ashes of the old United Club) in the final of the John Ullman cup by 2-0 at Gravesend & Northfleet before a gate of 562. The continuing existence of the Youth team enabled Dartford to maintain both its Senior status and Full Membership of the Football Association.

In February 1993 former player Tony Burman was appointed Manager and with the club being offered a ground-share arrangement by Cray Wanderers, Dartford were able to make a successful application for membership of the Kent League. Spurred on by an average attendance of well over 300 Dartford finished that first season in sixth position.

With a view to the future Dartford negotiated a

ground-share with Erith & Belvedere in time for the 1994-95 season and a second Kent League campaign started with gates at a shade over 400. Early promise faded somewhat and the club finished in mid-table.

In the May 1996 came the welcome news that Dartford had gained promotion to the Dr

Martens sponsored Southern League, exactly one hundred years after the club first entered that competition. Unfortunately, Tony Burman was forced to resign as manager in the December due to business commitments but the club quickly promoted reserve team manager Gary Julians to first team manager.

In September 1997 a disastrous fire at Erith & Belvedere put the club's future and standing with the Southern League into serious doubt and with this in mind a new ground sharing arrangement was made with Purfleet in time for the 1998-99 season.

A new ground sharing agreement was arranged with Gravesend & Northfleet in time for the 2001-02 season.

The 2004/5 season saw the restructuring of non-league football. Dartford remained in the Southern League

Princes Park hosted its first game on Saturday 11 November 2006 when the Darts entertained Horsham YMCA in the Ryman League.

Dartford were moved across to the Ryman League Division One North for the 2007/2008 season and won the Championship. Having won the Ryman League title in 2009/10 - In 2010/11, the club made their debut in the

Conference South, finishing a creditable tenth. In 2001/2012 Dartford acheived promotion to the Nation League after beeting Welling in the Play Off final.

Following the club's relegation from the National League in 2014/15 the league campaign ended with the Darts just outside of the playoffs.

Dispite finishing in second place to Havant & Waterlooville last season Darford lost in the playoff Semi Final at home to eventual winners Braintree Town 1-0.

My first Wealdstone game was actually in the away end watching Bishops Stortford!

ne of the high spots of this season has been the impact on the club's social media of 19-year-old Brunel University journalism student Sam Watts.

And now he's the subject of WFC Fan in the Stand...although sadly he won't be around the club much longer as he has been 'poached' by a new London online publication where he'll chiefly be covering QPR. Declan O'Reilly will be taking over at the Stones alongside photographer Dan Finill.

Where do you live Sam? At Uxbridge campus (while at University).

What was your first game? Actually my first OFFICIAL Wealdstone game was in the away end for my local club Bishop's Stortford! Wealdstone won that day and I never knew I would be involved with the club to this extent. I got in touch with the club's former Press Officer, Nick Dugard, as he was seeking help with the club's media output. He left one week after I joined and suddenly I was thrown into the deep end! But it was too good an opportunity to pass up. My duties are focused on producing match reports, interviewing players and management, putting up press releases/club statements and communicating with everyone at the club in order to ensure a smooth weekly output of club media.

I'm lucky enough. Once you're hooked on any team it's difficult to stay away! I'm extremely excited about the new era of the club under Unai Emery (it's the first time I've seen an Arsenal manager other than Arsène Wenger). And of course I follow football 24/7!

Best football matches you've ever seen? Wow, that's incredibly tough and as much as I think I can't choose. Live? Definitely Arsenal beating Bayern Munich 2-0 at The Emirates. Atmosphere was unbelievable. And in terms of goals probably losing 3-4 to Liverpool, but I haven't seen matches other than Arsenal live! On TV it's impossible to choose. Any champions league final - Real Madrid 4-1 Atletico with Madrid 1-0 down in the 93rd minute.... y house is a veritable treasure

Searching for a different angle on today's visitors. I managed to unearth (in the West Wing haha) a whole stack of football club publications including this 45-year-old gem... the Dartford FC Handbook 1974 (pictured below).

People seem to imagine I have rooms devoted to All Things Wealdstone. Only one actually, but it is quite big. Probably only four bookcases and a pair of cupboards devoted to club paraphernalia... and I simply assumed that this book of Darts' derring-do four and a half decades ago had been thrown out after a bit of Spring cleaning. But happily it wasn't. And the memories of the mid-70s came flooding back through the pages of the book. when I was a teenager myself and the Stones' promotion to the top tier of the Southern League was opening up a whole world of new football experiences. That summer of 1974,

Wealdstone, having turned semi-pro just three years earlier, had won the DARTFORD Southern League First FOOTBALL CLUB Division South and were suddenly pitched into the Big Boys League - and Southern League Champions we really didn't know 1973 - 74 what to expect. Eddie Presland's side had won the division by 11 points from runners-up Bath City vet we were now taking on well-established non-League giants like Yeovil. Wimbledon, Chelmsford, Kettering and PRICE Nuneaton... and the reigning Southern League Premier Division Champions Dartford, All

those clubs were pulling in crowds of around 2.500-3.000 - at least three times what we were used to in the First Division - and we wondered if our beloved Stones would wilt in that hothouse atmosphere.

We hoped that the passion and noise generated at Lower Mead would help win

enough home games to survive. Would the skills of George Duck, John Henderson and John McCormick be good enough in that exalted company?

Well, we found out within three days of the new season kicking off - the Southern League computer (or piece of foolscap paper more like) throwing up two home games in succession. Weymouth on the opening Saturday at Lower Mead was a test, but a game we could win... but the Tuesday night would see

reigning champions Dartford come to town.

As a 16-year-old obssessed with my football team, this was the stuff of nightmares. What if we lost both games? There then followed tricky trips to Tonbridge, Kettering and Yeovil. We could be cast adrift at the bottom of the table before September arrived....

ut boy, how the Stones came of age in that first week. We fell behind against Weymouth after just two minutes in front of a 1.500 crowd - confirming my worst fears - but Duck and Henderson grabbed late goals to take the roof off the Cinema End and send the fans home delirious, relishing a 2-1 win.

But could we replicate that performance against Dartford? Their manager. Ernie Morgan had taken over the previous summer, ioining from Maidstone United whom he'd steered to the

Div One South title the year before we won it. His side had wrapped up the Premier Division title by a whopping eight points from runners-up Grantham. with Chelmsford third and Kettering fourth... and they'd also reached the FA Trophy Final that season, outplaying Morecambe for most of the game only to lose 2-1. I'd been at Wemblev that April afternoon and the Darts were hugely impressive, playing the ball around smoothly with star men Danny Light, Kenny Halliday and Bob Glozier to the fore. They also had Graham Carr - who went on to manage the hardnosed Nuneaton side - who was one of the most abrasive midfielders of that era, as a foil to the talented Light.

It was totally out of keeping when Carr's son Alan burst upon showbiz as a camp comedian!


nyhow.... Dartford at Lower Mead under the lights, Tuesday August 20, 1974. The first-ever meeting. The upstarts against the Champions. Darts had been beaten on the opening day at Kettering, 2-1, so were looking to bounce straight back but Stones (with Ray Fulton both now available after suspension) literally blew them away in the first 30minutes. It was football from a stratospheric level.

You look back now and wonder how we exerted any control in the middle with our 4-3-3 line up comprising

three attackminded midfielders in wide men Fulton and Johnny Henderson. plus the silky . plavmaker Derek Evans (who had signed from Trowbridge along with his

twin brother Terry). Up front was the other Evans, a prolific goal scorer, plus the marvellous Bill Byrne and George Duck who were arquably the best front pairing in non League football in the mid-70s.

So that was seven players looking to get forward. And the defence (attacking right back Chris Kinnear, ex-football league centre backs Eric Burgess and John McCormick and midfielder Jim Godfrey filling in at left back for the still-suspended Willie Watson) were also happy to join in!

McCormick actually got on the scoresheet at the wrong end to gift

Dartford their goal, but the game was already won by then with Fulton (an angled rocket from 18 yards) Byrne (a 22 yard screamer) and a diving header from Godfrey putting us 3-0 up at the break.

The Darts keeper from the previous season. John Morton, was now in goal for us - after his teaching job brought him North of the river that summer - and his replacement, the former ex-Exeter stopper Alan Clarke must have wondered what he'd stumbled into as shots rained in from improbable angles. Byrne finally made it four with a splendid

By the time we travelled to Dartford's old Watling Street ground for the return in April, the Darts (reigning

champions, remember) were all but relegated. Our season was all about unexpected highs and a few lows and that week in April was a good illustration... cramming in the last few games was a nightmare and the Stones travelled to new champions-elect Wimbledon on the Thursday night before facing the Darts on Saturday.

he Stones delighted our three coach loads of fans- any many more by road and rail - in the 2,900 crowd at Plough Lane as we shocked the Dons by winning 2-1, George Duck hitting the winner with a

sublime volley from Adriaan Eglite's cross. It was the only time that season that Wimbledon (the eventual Champions) were beaten at home and away... and the memory of our titanic 1-0 win at Lower Mead on New Years Day 1975 is instantly recalled by anyone lucky enough to be in the 3,200 crowd.

The Dons were a big draw (as they are today) and just four days later went to Division One high-flyers Burnley in the FA Cup 3rd round and won 1-0. That's how good Wealdstone were!

But.... two days after completing that double, another three coachloads of fans set off for Kent and the return meeting with the

I have to admit I'm a bit of a sucker for this sort of sentimental tripe in the Darts Handbook. The wonderfully named Dick Broad wistfully writes 'I don't suppose we shall ever see the like of the past season again' and do vou know. he was absolutely right. They nearly won the non-League double in 1974. Eleven years later someone would....

Conference in 1979 and the Darts joined us five vears later, only for both clubs to be relegated back to the Beazer Homes Southern League by the end of that

decade. Dartford came third, incidentally, the vear the Stones won that unprecedented non-League double in 1985.

Thus we were bracketed together for five years, with honours pretty much shared until

the disastrous sale of Lower Mead in 1991 saw us move to Vicarage Road - and demotion within a year to the Southern League Southern Division.

Dartford were happily pottering along on at the same level until losing their own Watling Street ground after their own disastrous ground-share with Maidstone. The club had to resign from the Southern League, retain a youth team and re-form in the Kent League while playing home games at Cray Wanderers and Gravesend among others... a story not unlike our own. But after many

years of planning, in 2006 the club was provided with the fantastic council-owned eco-friendly facility at Princes Park that was (and still is) the envy of many in non-League football. Thus it was that we were re-acquainted with Darts when they climbed back up through the levels to the Ryman League Prem in 2008. And despite Dartford's continued elevation - winning the Ryman and then the Conference South - they had not beaten the Stones in 10 games since their arrival at Princes Park, including the neverto-be-forgotten clash in the FA Trophy last-16 in 2012. In fact a total of 26 years all told. That is until two years ago!

e took on the Darts at Grosvenor Vale on January 28, 2017 on the back of that famous 2-1 win at Southport (another great FA Trophy memory) only to stumble and fall spectacularly flat on

our faces as Luke Wanadio, Ryan Haves and Elliot Bradbrook gave the visitors a deserved 3-0 lead at the break. And if you think our penalty-taking record this season has been poor... well, we missed TWO PENALTIES in the second half of this game as we fought to get back on terms. Danny Green hit the first far too close to keeper Deren Ibrahim after Omar Koroma had been tripped in the box, and then Koroma stepped up for the

second and, well, let's just say that in those predrone days Northolt aerodrome would have been inconvenienced as Omar's shot kept on climbing.

Dartford also beat the Stones here at the Vale last season in front of a 1,002 crowd. After our on-loan winger Iffy Allen was controversially sentoff three minutes from half time (yet another overturned decision), league leaders Darts fell

behind to a terrific Dan Fitchett header from Dave Pratt's cross and as the game moved into the last ten minutes it seemed the ten men would prevail. But increasing Darts pressure led to the giant Danny Mills- so often our nemesis - heading past Jonathan North, and then two minutes later the prolific Alfie Pavey converted another set-piece for the winner.

Yet we have never lost at Princes Park, the seven visits racking up five draws and two wins. ost Stones fanes will be aware that, following promotion to

the National League South, the club formed its own Community Trust in order to play a more significant role in the local community. Its 3 operatives are Nick Symmons, Frank Funnell and Mick Fishman.

The 3 projects launched and operated by the club involve Walking Football,
Tea Dancing and a joint football based activity and numeracy scheme for Year 3 pupils in local schools. Both

Walking Football schemes and that for the Tea Dancing have taken on lives of their own and are running very successfully. The Schools Project is a more complex animal and requires the involvement of a greater number of people in order to make it work. Having trialled it for

the first year and run it successfully the following year, The Trust was announced winner of the National League Trust Schools Project of the Year of 2017/18, and with the award came a £5,000 prize for the Trust to use to expand its activities. The award was presented to the Trustees at the last home match against Eastbourne Borough by Brian Lee, the Chairman of the National League Community Trust.

As well as the prize Brian also awarded the Trust the maximum amount of £20,000 which a club can receive each season from the National League Trust for community activities. These cheques will fund the WFC Trust's programme for this season, Donations, however, are always welcome!

During the course of the 3 academic years in which the scheme has operated, the Trust has provided the activity in 9 schools – St Bernadette's, St Joseph's, Camrose, Aylward, Roxeth and Glebe in the London Borough of Harrow, and Sacred Heart, Lady Bankes and Field End in Hillingdon. In doing so the Trust has already reached well over 1,300 pupils.

A massive part in the scheme's success has been due to the involvement and enthusiasm of David O'Farrell, the Head Teacher at St Bernadette's school in Kenton. David, a serious Fulham fan but also a fairly frequent attendee at Wealdstone matches, co-devised with his Deputy Head Kevin Bassett, the numeracy pack used in the scheme. The pack provides the school teachers ten pre-prepared football related maths lessons for year 3 children. The



schools are also provided with prepared question packs for every student in year 7. David's support for the scheme, particularly in selling it to other Head Teachers, has been invaluable.

Crucial to the scheme is the quality of the coaches and a big thank you must go out to

Jade Dempster and Paul Hughes, who were the coaches for the first crucial year, as well as to Eddie Oshodi, Omar Koroma, Nathan Mavilla, Matty Whichelow, Taofiq Olomowewe, Ronnie Welch, Liam Goulding and Dylan Kearney, who have all coached at the schools during the subsequent years. A big thanks also to Stones legend, Gordon Bartlett, who took over the role of Head Coach last year and helped raise the standard of what was on offer still further.

The Trust hopes to build on this success by continuing to offer the scheme to local schools and at the same time improving its content and delivery. "We are very proud of what we have achieved so far but it is no easy thing to construct a programme and recruit people with the suitable skills to carry it through. Whilst we have done well so far, we are not resting on our laurels and will work closely with our partners further to improve the scheme" said Trust Chairman Nick Symmons. One of the next steps is to convert the organisation into a registered charity so, beware; we will be looking for five new Trustees to make sure the new set up sticks to its charitable aims and objectives. The move to a registered charity should open the doors to more grant funders and hence open the programme up to more people and more diverse activities.

Wealdstone Football Club is proud of its Community Trust and what it has been able to achieve in such a short time in helping both young and old and in raising the club's profile within the local community.
