players entrance with his great mate Lew Sheppard (who is happily still going strong at 87), doling out sweets, reminiscences and some downright silly comments! He will be badly missed.



# **EE** gets to grips with performances an and off the pitch as glimpses of Wealdstone's DNA start to re-appear

vents quite often take over what you were going to write. I'd formulated in my mind guite a lengthy article on the boardroom manoeuvrings but I can only really start at Kingfield Road, Woking. Our win at second placed Woking, who were on an eleven match unbeaten run and in prime position for the title with their games in hand, was magnificent and the perfect performance away from home.

The re-iiqqing of the team gave us a physical presence that saw Wealdstone bully Woking across the pitch, which seemed to better suited for a bucket and spade than a game of football. What a wonderful phrase! A Wealdstone team bullying the opposition, that isn't something you have heard too often in recent years about a Stones side. From the top where David Pratt's selfless running set the tone. to the midfield dominating their battles. but also mixing it with composure and no little skill, to the steely defence which set out their stall to ensure nobody went

through. Oh, and there was an absolute world class save in there to from Jonathan North. As financial pressures have taken their hold and the squad diminished in number, the togetherness and the world against us attitude has come to the fore. Now unbeaten in 2019, which would have been unthinkable after the results in December, and remarkably we have lost only one league game on the road since the end of August, I think it was described as a masterclass by the team and the management and I am sure that nobody would disagree with that. Whilst the team undoubtedly did their job on the pitch, the 200+ away fans certainly did theirs off it with some fantastic support, the biggest away following, bar Watford, at Kingfield Road this season so far, with the welcome return of the youth too. I should also mention their forum. You think ours goes into overdrive when we lose; pop into the Cardboard; it's comedy gold.

Onto more weighty matters: around a fortnight ago, news was released that

the board had taken a vote removing Peter Marsden as chairman. In view of a worsening financial situation at the club, which came to the fore at the meeting held in November and the release of the accounts for 2018, it may have not come as a surprise that something had to happen. In fact concerns

over the finances was raised a vear ago. The finances for 2018 are much worse than the simple numbers in the accounts, when you consider that the losses were masked by near 100k income from player sales and the Trophy run. It will seem rather strange to the outside world that a football club is jettisoning a person

that has invested 350k into the club. As supporters we should incredibly grateful to Peter who has invested so much of his own money and who is an affable, charming and generous man to spend time with.

However whilst football sometimes feels like a place where normal financial norms do no exist, even a football club has to operate as a business and financial stability is an absolute given. To match ambition and sustainability is the \$64,000 question and how it is achieved has baffled

football administrators over the years. The role of the board, as custodians of the club, is to ensure that it is around for the next hundred years and not just the next five. Whist people may come to a football club's rescue in the professional game, if the finances go south, it doesn't happen

> too often in non-league football. If the finances deteriorate, vou plummet down the leagues, whether forcibly or voluntarily. The prevailing mood amongst our supporters certainly seems towards financial stability rather than chasing a dream and step up to the next level which we are clearly not ready for financially and facility wise.

We want to do as well on the pitch as possible, it isn't at the risk of the club as a whole. Difficult and painful decisions have to be made sometimes. At the moment the team are doing their bit on the pitch, so it is time for those upstairs to ensure that club has a healthy and rewarding future, to work collectively and corroboratively to ensure that when we do step up to the Conference National, we are ready to stay there.

# Opposition in focus



Billericay Town Football Club was formed in 1880 making it the 11th oldest club in Essex. It moved into the Romford & District League in 1890 competing in this league until 1914.

After the 1st World War, BTFC entered the Mid-Essex League where they remained until 1947. Between 1947 and 1966 they played in the Southern Essex Combination League. In 1966 they became founder-members of the Essex Olympian League.

Five years later, in 1971, Billericay Town Football Club became founder-members of the Essex Senior League and the clubs six-year stay in that competition saw them win the Championship three times and be Runners-Up twice (and third the other season). The League Cup was won four times and they were Finalists once. In addition they won the League Challenge Cup the only time that it was competed for.

Whilst members of the Essex Senior League, the club won the FA Vase in 1976 beating Stamford 1-0 after extra-time at Wembley Stadium. The following season, 1976/1977, the club again reached the FA Vase Final. After a 1-1 draw at Wembley, the replay was played at Nottingham Forest F.C. Billericay Town emerged victorious with a 2-1 victory over Sheffield, reputedly the oldest club in the world.

Billericay Town also became the first Non-League club to win the Rothmans Merit Award in 1978 for "having made a worth-while contribution to the wide spectrum of the game in 1977/78" - the only club previously to have won this Award was Liverpool, the previous season, when they were the European champions

Progressing to the Athenian League in 1977, Billericay won the Championship and the League Cup in their first season. They became Champions again in 1978/1979 and were elected into the Isthmian League.

Billericay Town became the first club to win the F.A.Vase for a third time in 1979 when they defeated Almondsbury Greenway 4-1. This match was notable for a hat-trick by Doug Young - the first hat-trick in a Cup Final at Wembley Stadium since Geoff Hurst's in the 1966 World Cup Final.

The Club then competed in the F.A.Trophy until 1989/1990 when the F.A.Vase was again entered and the Quarter-Final was reached, losing 0-1 to the eventual Finalists, Bridlington.

After their success in the Athenian League, Billericay's league successes continued in the Isthmian League when in their first season they won the Division 2 title with a winning margin of 17 points, scoring 100 goals in their 36 league matches. The following season, in Division 1, they finished as runners-up to Bishops Stortford - the first time in the history of the Isthmian League that a club had won promotion in two successive seasons on entry into the League.

Billericay then had five seasons in the Premier Division before being relegated in 1986. They then spent two years in Division One before again being relegated - this time into Division Two North.

Following re-organisation of the League, Billericay finished in third place in the newly formed Division Two and so gained promotion to Division One. That season, 1991/1992, they finished the season with an unbeaten run of 15 games, including winning the Essex Thames-Side Trophy. Full Membership of the Football Association was achieved in 1993, twelve years after obtaining Associate Membership in 1981.

Promotion back to the Premier Division was obtained in 1998. The club finished runner-up in 2004.2005 before losing in the playoffs, they again reached the play-offs in 2006/2007. In what probably ranks as the most remembered game in recent years, Billericay beat local rivals Chelmsford in the semi-finals on penalties in front of a crowd of over 2,000. The final however ended with a less successful penalty shoot out and defeat to Bromley.

In November 2007, the club staged its biggest ever competitive game at New Lodge – reaching the First Round Proper of the FA Cup for the third time, Billericay finally drew league opposition for the first time in the form of Swansea City. The Blues took a first half lead before going down to two late goals.

The 2010/11 season saw much local success. The first team lifted the Essex Senior Cup for the first time in 35 years and the club were in fact triple County winners as the youth development programme was rewarded with the Under 18 and Under 16 sides also winning their respective County Cup competitions. This success was built on in 2011/12 as the club finally secured promotion to the Blue Square Bet South as Ryman League Champions.

However, it proved to be a one season stay, despite a good start, the second half of the season was blighted by poor weather and despite hanging on until the penultimate game, a return to the Ryman league beckoned.

Subsequent seasons have seen the club steadily rebuild itself. A mid-table finish in 2013/14 was followed in 2014/15 by a respectable 8th place finish in the league.and appearances in the final of the Essex Senior Cup and the semi final of the League Cup. The 2015/16 campaign saw the club enter April in the play-off places, eventually finishing 9th.

The club's profile changed in 2016 with new owners and the arrival of a number of new recruits to the playing staff. A push for the play-

offs fell just short but Town lifted the League Cupwith a record 8-3 victory in the Final. This however provided a springboard to the clubs most successful season ever – runs to the first round proper of the FA Cup and to the last 8 of the FA Trophy were followed by a treble – retaining the Isthmian League, victory in the Essex Senior Cup, and finally in the 74th of 75 competitive game, the Isthmian league title to secure promotion.

Sooo unfair football's increasingly
unequal playing fields

o, last week we completed the double over title-challenging Woking. Shall we do that again, everybody?, We completed the double over title-challenging Woking! Yay! But as many of us noted on the day, we had to do so on a beach. Is it fair to us that we had to adapt to sand in order to overcome Surrey's finest? Well, as with so many aspects of theoretical fairness in football, it's not so cut and dried anymore.

It's one small step from beach to plastic, and let's face it there was a huge sense of relief when we finally won a competitive game on plastic at Slough on New Year's Day. I was speaking to some Bromley fans the other day who confirmed just how easy it is to get used to so-called 3G or 4G pitches. forgetting they're not grass. But it's also fair to say that it's not the same for the opposition, and it just looks and feels wrong. Why should clubs with entirely different forms of playing surface

gain an advantage? A week or so back. Hendon called off a game against Margate because it had been snowing. Well, I say 'snow' - there was half an hour of briefly arctic conditions, after which things settled down significantly, unlike the actual snow. The match was postponed at 7:00pm, with my spies informing me it was called off was

because their pitch is particularly sensitive to having brooms on it to brush the snow off. True or not, the snow asted half an hour at best, so God alone knows that the referee was thinking. Imagine being a Margate fan and finding out minutes before kickoff that your trip had been in vain just because a proprietary carpet format can't be cleaned in a certain basic manner. And plenty of managers have made reputations about the many ways in which they're treated unfairly, carpin on about this fixture scheduling scandal or that poor choice of referee.

The obvious king of the put-upon is Jose Mourinho, erstwhile special one turned "currently available for fresh challenges".

Mourinho's entire modus operandi seemed about developing a sense of "us against the world", plenty of it involving bitching about the latest perceived injustice or personal slight, however

# IT'S DRILL BITS!

WEALDSTONE v BILLERICAY 02.02.2019









oday's fan feature is a bit different... like 'Kettering Punchbag' a few years ago, this Stones fan is unwilling to divulge his real identity... so we'll just have to call him by his nickname 'Drill Bits'. His moment of fame came in the 4-2 win at Harrow Borough eight years ago when he cavorted on the pitch with goalscorer Peter Dean (pictured right and above). Hats off to you, Mr Bits!

Where do you live (general area): Harrow. Are you working (and where?): I'm a ganger (a bit like a working foreman) for a construction company, working mainly in the London area.

*First Stones game attended?* FA Cup 1st Round v Southend United at Lower Mead November 1979, aged 12.

# WHY WE LOVE NON-LEAGUE

# Quirky, warts-and-all Conference football v. the faceless, plastic Premier League? This still rings true, four years later...

FOUR YEARS ago I wrote this article, trumpeting the : team looked good apart from Wood showing values of non-League football over the ever-morebloated, obscenely-financed professional game. Having experienced a couple of years of properlyfunded football here at WFC (thanks to the largesse of outgoing chairman Peter Marsden) I think it is even more relevant today. We now enjoy ability of probably the highest-ever level for 30 years while retaining the 'family' atmosphere that makes a visit to the Vale such a great occasion. This is the original

was having a quick browse on the St Albans City forum to gauge their reaction to losing to Boreham Wood last weekend, when I chanced upon the very kernel of our love for the non-League game. The sentiment that's at the very heart of why we're all here this afternoon.

Somebody with the user name 'Non-League Fan' had written (in amongst the generally positive postings on the Saints' 2-0 defeat against the league leaders): 'This was my first game at Saints and at £15 to watch Conference South football with a limited view, grotty seats, scaffolding on the terraces and a 20- minute wait in the tea line, where there was just one guy in the van on his own.

'The game itself was pretty terrible, neither

they had that little bit extra, something out of nothing. I was that disappointed that I felt I had to post. Sorry Saints, I just expected more especially with that price tag. I'll be going back to watch League football.'

It occurred to me that I've never, ever seen a similar posting on the Stones Forum. Not even in the dark days of Northwood, Yeading and Edgware. Obviously the football served up was pretty dire, but those attending knew what they were buying into. The price tag attached was minimal. It was love for the club that brought you

This season is new territory, and there have been plenty of new faces attracted by the higher standard of football, the higher standard of catering and the all-round improved experience at the Vale. Many of our results (and often the performances) have not reflected the higher pricing but I've yet to hear anybody say they won't be coming back and our crowds have remained around an average 750 despite our patchy form on the pitch.

I live just up from road from St Albans so I'm finely attuned to the goings-on at Clarence Park.

They had a terrific end to last season, winning the play-offs

> to ioin us in Conference South, but then lost an awful lot of goodwill by jacking their ticket prices (already the highest in the Southern League Prem last year) to £15, the highest in this division.

If that wasn't the Saints shooting themselves in the foot, it was certainly a savaging with the toenail clippers. Every game since has seen the valuefor-money comparison, and many visitors (including



ber 1968, with Sid Carter scoring in a 6-1 win against Bromley

Trophy game two months ago) refuse to buy anything else at the ground. That's if they attend in the first place. which is even a stance taken by St Albans fans who admit they pick and choose depending on the weather

and the opposition.

Can £3 make that much difference? It is often pointed out that foregoing that second beer (or third or fourth) would save the extra

cash. Or a couple of coffees that morning. But that misses the point that fans' backs are up even before the game starts. And hence that negative posting by 'Non-League fan', who later saw the irony and said 'Maybe I should change my name tag now?'.

**WEALDSTONE v BILLERICAY 02.02.2019** 

As you'd expect, he/she brought a welter of replies from other Saints fans. One, in particular, beautifully summed up my own feelings on football at this level.

'Very interesting views, non-League Fan. I watched plenty of league football that's been awful, turgid, dreary stuff and yesterday's game was not that. It was open, pretty evenlymatched and won by the team that could take chances over the team that didn't.

'If what you enjoy is the technical precision of a Premier League game then perhaps the honest : lenge anyone to tell the difference between endeavour of non-league football is not for you. I know plenty of Premier League (and even Championship) fans who simply don't understand why I would want to 'waste my time' watching people who plainly aren't the best at what they do. Personally, I find Premier League football sterile, tactically cynical and overly calculating. It's football with 95% of the joy squeezed out of it.

'I'm trying to think back to what attracted me to Clarence Park once I'd moved into the area. I think it was initially the convenience of being able to decide at 2.30

> whether to go to a game or not. It was the ability to stand wherever I liked and move about. And it was the commitment of the players, and no little skill too. And, over time, it's been a pleasure to watch certain players improve. I suppose there's been an element of 'newness' to it all too. I'd been to a lot of non-league grounds over the years but to rediscover them and visit some new ones while actually supporting a team has been fun.

'Personally, I love the unique, quirky charm of Clarence Park. It's part of the reason I chose guess it all depends what you're looking for. I've Saints as my non-league team and I'd be sad if the club moved to a purpose built Lego stadium. Away trips in the league have become soulless, dreary affairs over the past decade or so. particularly in the top two divisions. There are too many identical out-of-town stadia. Stewards telling everyone to sit down. I chalsay, Southampton and Middlesbrough, Leicester and Derby...

> I love the character of many of the non-league grounds I've visited in the past year or so. Give me a creaky wooden stand built in the 1920s any day!'

That posting by 'Recent Convert', who is presumably just that, has it in a nutshell.

It's all about balancing the drama, the technical perfection and the soap opera of the Premier League against the more prosaic delights of an afternoon at The Vale. After spending £40 or £50 on a ticket, battling through crowds to reach the mega stadium, will the game contd overpage>>





match the anticipation? Will you take solace in an inedible £8 hot dog or a £5 pint? Will the feeling of being ripped-off outweigh the memories of a mundane game? Will you end up feeling like a customer or a fan?

I won't bore you with the many benefits of watching Wealdstone, but for me one of the least obvious ones is the family aspect.

Then I was growing up in the 70s, you could go with a gang of mates to any one of a dozen games on a Saturday afternoon. Just turn up at White Hart Lane, Highbury, Stamford Bridge, Loftus Road, wherever and get in through the turnstiles for the equivalent of about a fiver. Those days are clearly long gone.

Premier League football in the 2010s is more like theatre and it's the ordinariness of the game that I miss... not ordinary in the sense of the actual matches being ordinary because they never are. even at non-League level. No, ordinary in the everyday availability of football. That 'just turning up' aspect of Wealdstone.

These days more and more people are just turning up' at the Vale: Old faces from the 1980s, returning with their children and grandchildren; new faces, attracted along by the atmosphere and facilities; groups of youngsters, enjoying a day away from parental control and becoming the new lifeblood of our club.

My brother-in-law is an academic, a psychologist and therapist - and an Arsenal fan. He has been hopelessly hooked on the Gunners since the age of 12. He offered an insight into youngsters' obsessions, explaining that adolescence is a powerful tool and that the learned behaviour of following a football team around that age stays with many people for life.

'What, even a non-League team?' I asked him. 'Probably more so', he said. 'It's all about accessibility. The top clubs are pricing out their core support, attracting people who won't have the sort of devotion you learn at adolescence. Your club, on the other hand, will only grow'.

Listen to that, St Albans. Listen to that, Wealdstone. And listen to that Boreham Wood. who have now spent half a dozen seasons in the Conference South, gradually strengthening their team until it is in a great position for promotion to the Conference National. But all on crowds of 250.

If we can build on this humble start in Conference football and sort out the lease we could be in a fantastic position in four or five years. We're doing a lot right but have got nowhere near realising the Stones' true potential.

Wealdstone 'till I die? Absolutely! But not until we're back where we belong. **TIM PARKS**

# ...while our Toby's got a bit of explaining to do...

Surely that's not our long-serving badge-selling supporter Toby Jackson? Either that or he's got a very distinguished lookalike.

February 2, 1974, FA Trophy 2nd Round Proper: Wealdstone 5 Hastings United 2

ne of the great pub discussions among Wealdstone fans and indeed, fans of any club - revolves around the 'greatest games' question.

We've certainly peered into the near and distant past in this publication, dissecting the merits of the FA Cup wins over Stevenage (1965, 6-5) and Reading (1977, 2-1) versus the Trophy wins over Cambridge United (2012, 2-1) and Billericay Town (2018, 5-2).... not to mention the double-wham at Wembley and Kettering Town in 1985.

But today we recall possibly the most **EXTRAORDINARY** football match I've ever seen. In my near-50 years of following our great club we've only (to my knowledge) had a mention on the BBC News twice: once in 1970 after our FA Cup qualifying round tie at Leighton Town was stopped to allow the referee and players to search for a lost contact lens (it belonged to our defender Rob Williams, and was quite a rarity in those days) and then after this FA Trophy 2nd round win over Hastings in 1974.

You may rightly think it was a quiet news day - but how often does one football team walk off the pitch in protest? That was what happened on this crazy afternoon, when three penalties were awarded in succession by Weybridge referee D.W. Waterman and Hastings skipper John Ripley led his team off

the Lower Mead pitch. Shades of the famous England v Argentina World Cup game eight years previously, when

the Argentine skipper Antonio Rattin was sent off and his team mates followed him in unprecedented scenes.

The two games were even compared on the BBC Sport news at 5pm after this Hastings game.

Both incidents were futile protests- and both were the result of unusual but totally correct decisions by the individual referees.

And if you think that players today have

little respect for the officials, well it was worse in the 1960s and 70s when match officials were lenient to the point of subservience.

Certainly Rattin would have been dismissed long before German referee Rudolf Kreitlein finally ran out of patience... the skipper had fouled, been booked and then contested every decision - even spitting on the turf in contempt - before the ref sent him off.

The game was interrupted for eight minutes until Argentina were persuaded by England's FIFA representative (and referee) Ken Aston to return. Incidentally, England's Jack Charlton was also booked during the game but didn't

know about it until he read the newspapers the following day! As a consequence, Aston and Herr Kreitlein got their heads together to recommend the yellow and red card system that FIFA eventually brought into use around the world.

# Hastings walk off as third penalty results in second half fracas

ONE OF THE most sensational games seen at Lower Mead for many a season saw Hastings United captain John Ripley lead the Sussex side off the field, four minutes after the interval after the club's number seven John Jefferson, had been sent off by referee D. R. Waterman, of Weybridge.

The incident occurred after Hastings full-back Harry Cunningham had handled for the second time in 48 minutes and referee Waterman had awarded a third penalty to Wealdstone — all three awards producing goals from that deadly spot-kick taker

All three penalties were obvious, to say the least, but the third offence was the most blatant for Cunningham pulled down a Henderson shot with two hands when a goal

Mr. Waterman immediately pointed to the spot and the garrulous Jefferson protested overmuch. He was at once booked the third Hastings name to go into the book

refused to depart and Mr.

Was it a record? Other players may have scored from three penalty kicks in one game, but has any player scored a true hat trick? Three successive goals from the spot.



# Hungerford's programme? Well, I particularly enjoyed the whole page devoted to a league table when the league hadn't even started!

hose of us who purchase our home programme will be well aware of its quality and content. We have long been blessed, or should I say spoilt, with a magazine product that delivers week in and week out. It is against the standard of our programme that I measure the offerings produced by other clubs.

By necessity, my 2017/18 programme review did not include our last match of the season, away at Whitehawk. This was in actual fact a quite magnificent effort – my guess is that it was a one-off end of season special to "celebrate" their relegation from the National League South. It took the Wobs Award for best away programme though, pipping Chelmsford City. Tim has once again asked me to review our away programmes, so here goes....

# **HUNGERFORD TOWN**

Last year I assessed the Hungerford offering as being the worst programme of all. You would think it would be hard to get worse but Hungerford have certainly achieved this! I'm staggered to see a club at our level producing something as poor as this. £2 gets you just 16 pages but with absolutely no original content apart from a Welcome from the club president and some notes from the manager. It was even a double header produced for their matches with us and also Chelmsford City. Bizarrely, Hungerford saw no need to even include their own team line-up, let alone ours or Chelmsford's. I particularly enjoyed the whole page devoted to a league table that showed all 22 teams having zero wins, draws, losses at home, zero wins, draws, losses away from home, zero points and zero goals scored or conceded.

Another whole page devoted to providing full statistics of the entire 16 man squad helpfully showed that none had made any appearances or scored any goals in either league matches, FA Cup, FA Trophy or even County Cup games.

You will struggle to find a programme worse than this. **Score: 0/10.** 

# **BILLERICAY TOWN**

A £3 programme this (for 52 pages) but

a definite improvement upon last season.
Let down a little by an unexciting cover and perhaps slightly lacking in original content but a very professional affair, nicely laid out. Good use of the centre pages where there is a colour photo and I liked the layout style of the reports/photos of recent games.

Score: 7.5/10

# **DARTFORD**

Another professional looking programme that sells for £2.50, again for 52 pages – but this certainly flatters to deceive. At first glance it looks pretty good but a closer inspection reveals a distinct lack of content. Lots of photographs and some nice lay-out in parts but sadly, pretty much a complete lack of interesting words to actually read. With 23 pages of adverts I guess the Commercial Manager might be pleased but it's an uninspiring effort.

Score: 7/10 (slightly generous due to the £2.50 selling price!).

# **OXFORD CITY**

At first glance this looks like it might be an ok programme. The front cover, whilst not exactly "standout" is perfectly acceptable and it's printed on decent glossy paper. Open the cover and Page 3 is an index page coupled with the usual (and necessary) Directory of Club Officials. However, the index gives the reader a clue regarding the lack of content this programme contains. Apart from the usual Manager's Notes, which in fairness are better than many, there is little else to read in the programme unless you want to read about Oxford's previous match or about Wealdstone's history and squad. The more I looked through this programme, the worse it seemed . . . . . . so an end score of

There is also a full page team photo that I guess Dulwich supporters get to look at each week - plus it takes both of the centre pages to list the 2 team line-ups. In a throw-back to programmes of a bygone age a whole page is devoted to simply listing all the Clubs in our division together with their addresses and phone numbers - marvellous. It's unusual nowadays to see a results page that doesn't include player appearance information on a match by match basis - that's a bit odd. I'm liking the historical side of the programme though with Part 54 of the Dulwich Hamlet

I think the programme sneaks a 6 due to its low price. **Score:** 6/10

# **EAST THURROCK UTD**

I'm suspecting that this programme is probably the work of one person and also printed and compiled "in house". I like the way the editor has set out his stats and credit too for the attractive way the 7 pages of "Meet The Stones" has been laid out. There's not a lot by way of original content though apart from a couple of half pages from the Club Secretary and Team Manager so, all in all, this is a low scorer.

Score: 4/10 (an improvement on last season's 3/10 though).
