Anti-Semitism in focus and EE's part in its Wealdstone downfall

onight at the Vale, there is a legends evening for a couple of former Chelsea players in Paul Canoviile, a local lad raised in Hillingdon, and Nigel Spackman, with Canoville's compelling story of his time at Chelsea serving as a reminder of less enlightened times as a black footballer. I still remember being at sixth form college on the Monday after Canoville made his infamous Chelsea debut at Crystal Palace and the reaction of a couple of people who had been at the game. One's a UKIP councillor now so maybe it says it all. Yet, even as I write the day after our win over East Thurrock United, stories of racist abuse from the day before still make the headlines and, if anything, seem to be gathering pace. The newspapers this week have been awash with stories about racism in football. I will let Paul tell his own tale this evening, as he will do it far more eloquently than I can. Instead I am going to concentrate on anti-Semitism in football. Just as insidious but something that receives far less publicity.

At Wealdstone, even before it became right on and trendy to be anti-racist in football, we were at the forefront with a supporter base that reflected society as a whole far better than any other club; we actually had black and brown faces on the terraces. Not many, but we did and it was acknowledged across the non-league footballing world. Look across a picture of Whitehawk fans and for all their right on credentials, how many people of a dark hue do you see? Same for Clapton as well. I could go on. Our greatest ever player, and there is no argument about that, was black, in Alan Cordice, so even the closest racists had to keep shtum as Cordice was flying down the wing or scoring another goal leading us to the Double.

Anti-Semitism is obviously front and centre in terms of the political landscape at the moment with one of our major parties riddled with it right to the very top. When you have one of our main political organisations that is either unwilling or unable to deal with the problems within, we know that society has an issue. Maybe as the Jewish community is only 300,000 strong, they aren't considered a vote bank that needs to be courted in the same way as other communities are. Leaving this aside, in footballing terms, the use of the Y word has hit the headlines due to the use of the term by Tottenham Hotspur supporters. In 2014 legal proceedings were dropped against Spurs fans using the term and the Metropolitan Police have said that they will not arrest any Spurs fans for using the word, vet opposing fans doing exactly the same will be arrested and prosecuted. Whilst Spurs fans in the defence of using the word commonly use context, other teams' supporters scream hypocrisy in return. If they use it, why can't we, is the common refrain. I still think it is incongruous the sight of gentiles singing "Y*d armv" in somehow solidarity with their fellow fans. It may be an age thing even with Spurs fans as a couple of my business partners are season ticket holders there and they are very uncomfortable with the term, whilst their children have no problem with it at all. I appreciate it is complicated.

Indeed The World Jewish Congress, the Board of Deputies of British Jews amongst other Jewish organisations have all called upon Spurs to clamp down on the use of the word. I can't see how it is acceptable in the same way as you wouldn't use the N word or the P word. There should not be context. It is either right or wrong. It isn't any more acceptable for Spurs fans to use as it is for other clubs. Much of Y word coming to the fore again occurred after incidents at Chelsea this season, though this isn't limited to Chelsea at all by any stretch of the imagination. There's a Chelsea song which ends with a line "....Tottenham are a bunch of y@@ds."

Chelsea, a club owned by a Russian Jew. have come out strongly against anti-Semitism in the past and are at the forefront in this country with education campaigns on the matter, even taking some people accused of such behaviour to Auschwitz to educate them on the horrors of the Holocaust. There's a third generation Chelsea supporting freelance iournalist. Dan Levene, who also happens to be Jewish, who has been highlighting the fact that the song continues to be sung at games. He's not just started highlighting the fact recently and has been doing so for some time, but it seems to have reached the social conscious this season. Unsurprisingly he has had no end of stick on social media and even songs sung about him at games. Not sure how he hears all these songs though being sung from the press box as I have certainly been to Chelsea matches, especially away from home, where he has said the song was sung, when it clearly wasn't. That's a distraction as it clearly has been sund on occasions and the calling out has had an effect and the line as was is barely used now and only by the proverbial very small minority deliberately courting controversy. Those of us that watched Wealdstone

in the eighties will recall our matches with

Enfield and the songs that were sung when we played them. I am certainly not someone who judges past times by more modern day morals and sensibilities, but thinking back they were horrendous. Let's not kid ourselves, the vast majority of our supporters used to sing them. At

Wealdstone we have a large Jewish following, unsurprising when you look at our local hinterland, which covers parts of the country with the highest Jewish populations. When you talk to Jewish Stones fans about those times, you get a mixed reaction on how they felt. From wanting to walk out,

feeling very uncomfortable to not caring too much. Why Enfield and anti-sematic songs? Well back in the 80s, Wealdstone, Enfield and Barnet were three of the biggest non-league clubs in the country and by dint of geography and where the big London clubs took their support from, Wealdstone were little Chelsea, Enfield Spurs and Barnet Arsenal and that probably tells you why? How did it stop? It was actually down to Martin Lacey, co-editor of the EE fanzine. In the first edition he made a bold

irst edition he made a bold statement for those times that it should stop now. It didn't straight away, so in the next edition he said it again and this time, it did stop and for good. The power of calling it out worked.

As with racism we all have a responsibility to call it when anti-Semitism occurs. On the isolated incident when it did rear

its head, by some loon who reappeared from back in the day, singing the song in our Yeading/Edgware days, it was shut down immediately. We rightly have a proud record at Wealdstone.

There's another old cliché, one oft-quoted from the late Bill Shankley & that goes along the lines of 'Football isn't about life & death, it's far more important than that!'



In the last home programme we kicked off the tale of the Stones' greatest-ever goalscorer: George Duck, who netted 251 times in iust seven seasons, between 1972 and 1979. Part One covered his vouthful career as a

Spurs schoolboy, and his short-lived pro career at Millwall and Southend before making "The best decision of my life" and signing for Sid Prosser at Wealdstone ...

ne of the great things about Wealdstone was the banter and camaraderie - so different from my experiences in the professional game. I'd like to share some Great Wealdstone Memories...

"I'll never forget a 0-2 defeat at the very strong Bath side in October 1974 - me and Bill Byrne were both injured and had to sit the game out in the stand, and we had other players missing too, so to keep it at 0-0 into the last ten minutes was quite something. But then they scored a lucky goal and the big crowd erupted. And then an undeserved penalty in the last moments of the game.

"Our lads came off the pitch and John McCormick, our big, craggy Scottish centre back - who'd played in Division One for Crystal Palace under the Bath manager that day, Bert Head - took exception to the crowd's merriment and he wanted to go up into the seats and fight every last is ornamental clock high on the wall above

one of them. He was going mad, nostrils flaring, screaming: 'Attack the terraces!' - if he'd had a claymore it could have been dangerous!

"We managed to finally grab hold of him and he never lived it down - we never stopped laughing because it was so out of character. But boy, was he ever a hard player... there was one away game at Dover when he came off injured and I remember him stamping his foot down in the car park, just as we were getting on the coach for the return journey saying "Don't worry lads, I'll be okay for Saturday." But come the weekend he turned up with his leg was in plaster of Paris from his ankle to his thigh.. he'd broken his leg! Rest in peace big John.

"Then there was the time when we were training on a wet, filthy night at the territorial army drill hall just opposite the ground - it wasn't a big place and it had a big

"Barnet was a horrible place to go, a terrible pitch at Underhill and fans who always gave me stick.. they did make me laugh one Boxing Day, though. I'd scored and they were threatening they'd cut me up. 'Orange sauce, orange sauce, orange sauce" they sang - for a Duck, that's quite original.

"Football wise, one of my best memories was playing in Eric Burgess' testimonial against the Wolves first team in 1975. Eric's sister in law was Anthea Redfearn.

Bruce Forsyth's wife and what a night that was! Brucie kicked off the game, but then it got serious and I had the pleasure of playing up front with Jimmy Greaves, who was my all-time hero at Spurs. Wolves played for keeps, and had John Richards, Mike Bailey, Kenny Hibbitt, Phil Parkes and all their Div One stars on show and they beat us 5-2 - but I managed to get both our goals (one header, one penalty) and I was told afterwards that Greavesie had sung my praises. That's one accolade I will take to my grave."

he FA Cup run of 1977-78 was fantastic to be a part of. The club

had never reached the Third Round before (or since) and the 3-2 win at Hereford United in the First Round replay was a great night... I have mixed feelings because as a striker you want to be getting among the goals and it was Pat Ferry (2) and Bobby Moss who stuck them away in that game. (Although it was George, as the heavily-marked dangerman, who created the space for that pair to score -Ed).

We've mentioned George's thrice-taken penalty over the win over Reading in Round Two, but his main memory of the famous game at QPR in the Third Round is tainted by illness. "I had a chest infection a couple of days before the game - I couldn't breathe properly and really I shouldn't have played, but the manager (Alan Fogarty)

the ball into the net and then went and stood on that stone wall at the Elmslie End, up against the railings with my arms outstretched while the crowd celebrated... what a brilliant moment!"

s the 1970s wore on George was still scoring 25-30 goals a season but it was becoming more and more of a lone furrow. Eddie Presland and his No.2 Terry Dyson paid the price for a terrible second half of the 1975-76 season - the team slipping into the Southern Prem relegation zone just a few months after a glorious autumn had taken us up to third in the table - and were sacked after a 4-1 defeat at fellow strugglers Hillingdon Borough.

"I felt bad for Eddie & Terry but then the new managerial team of Geoff Coleman and Alan Fogarty straightened things out. We had a few good seasons but I had this nagging feeling that my best years were slipping away and I desperately, desperately wanted to play at Wembley. And win a trophy.

"Tell you what probably tipped me into leaving Wealdstone - it was a phone call from Eddie Presland, who had taken over as manager at Dagenham with Terry again as his No.2, just after he had been beaten in the FA Trophy semi-final by Kettering. They had been beaten by a Billy Kellock goal - they had come that close to Wembley.

"Eddie called me and said 'George, you are our missing link. If we had you in the team we can get to Wembley next year -I'm convinced of it".

'Well, I was still working at Willesden High School and every day we drove past the twin towers on the way to taking the kids to matches and training, and that pretty much made my mind up. I had lost faith in Wealdstone ever getting there and so when Eddie put an offer in, I told the Stones I wanted to leave. Nothing to do with travelling, as Wealdstone were moving into the Alliance Premier League that summer - that was just a coincidence - it was entirely down to my ambition and, One of my favourite all-time Stones pictures: Keith Furphy's right-wing corner is just about to drop into the Reading net and George (right) is ready to celebrate



as it turned out, that decision gave me my greatest moment in football."

he reaction among the Stones faithful was one of resignation. George had been such a brilliant. selfless serv-

ant of the club for seven years and nobody begrudged him the chance of a fresh start personally, I thought the team had become too reliant on one man to score the goals and that it might actually give the opportunity for youngsters like Nigel Johnson and Neil Cordice to shine.

The management weren't happy, however. George was told he couldn't train with the first team while negotations with Dagenham were ongoing. He had the indignity of turning out for the reserves in a Saturday morning pre-season friendly with Hendon Reserves at Lower Mead - a game that I remember well as I was trialling for the Rubs and had the thrill of playing for 20 minutes on the same pitch as the great George!

Within the next couple of days he was transferred to Dagenham and the money CONTINUED OVERPAGE

was insistent. I saw the video of their first goal the other day and I was on the spot and might have put in a challenge on Don Givens as he headed the ball goalwards - maybe if I'd been fit I might have done better. Although it was a soft header that put us behind.

"In fact I was ill for two of the biggest games in my time at Wealdstone - that one at QPR, and then for the home last-16 Trophy game with South Shields in 1974 when I had bronchitis. No chance of me playing in that one - we could only draw and then lost the replay - and I felt we had a really good chance of getting to Wembley that season.

"Other memories pop into my head unbidden... I remember the home game against Dagenham in the FA Cup 3rd Qual in 1975, on the way to playing Aldershot away in the First Round. That Dagenham side were one of the best in the Isthmian League but we were in



such great form at home I knew we had a good chance... we pummelled them in the second half but it stayed at 0-0, then Bobby Moss (a truth athlete, a committed player with a knack for scoring important goals) got the crucial first goal and with ten minutes left I got the ball on the edge of the penalty arc at the Cinema End and hit it right-footed off my laces just inside the near past Ian Huttley. The crowd went absolutely mental!

Year later, in the Fourth Qualifying Round we took on Maidstone United who were favourites. Jimmy McVeigh, who later played for us, gave them the lead but I managed to head an equalizer at the Cinema End.

"Then the second half was all Maidstone until Willie (Watson) got hold of the ball in midfield and showed what a terrific player he was, getting away from tackles and hitting a fierce shot that their keeper Derek Bellotti only half-saved. And who was there for the rebound? Me! I banged

immediately used to sign influential midfielder Robin Wainwright from Hillingdon Borough ... a signing that turned out t o have as much impact on the Stones fortunes in the next half-dozen years as George had at Dagenham. "I hadn't realised the club

transferred Robin at the same time" said George. "I was always impressed by him every time we played - great passer, great tackler, a very clever player and he should have had a longer career at Luton in the League. I played against him a lot of times"

ut now George had to prove himself to a whole new set of fans. "If I was nervous about getting off on the right foot for Wealdstone when I was 20, it was actually harder as a recognised goalscorer in non-League at the age of 27", he confessed. "Dagenham had bought a player who was supposed to quarantee them goals - I had a reputation that I had to live up to, and those first couple

of months were tricky as the team wasn't really gelling and I wasn't scoring.

"But, a bit like the turning point for me at Wealdstone, we had an early FA Trophy match away at Dorchester that could have been a banana skin but Eddie said to me" 'You'll see a different Dagenham today - the players will all have their serious heads on. They'll be focused'.

"And that is exactly what happened. We won 1-0 and I got the goal from close range, and from that moment I was okay".

He was, of course, rather better than okay. George's goals helped lift the Daggers to fifth place in the Isthmian League (behind Enfield, Walthamstow, Dulwich Hamlet and Sutton) and he shared almost 70 goals with strike partner Ricky Kidd.

Dagenham travelled to Cheshire to smash Stalybridge Celtic 5-0 on their next Moment of glory: George after scoring

the Trophy final after not scoring in the whitewash of Woking?

"No, I think those demons were behind me by then. Despite not scoring in the 5-0 win at Stalybridge, that was one of my best-ever performances and I was just happy to set goals up for the others. Same story in the semi-final.

"But as for the Wembley final... I just loved the whole day. We were buzzing with confidence. We had a stack of good luck telegrams in the changing room, including one from Wealdstone via 'Guinness Ray' (Ray Corner) and I've since found out that there were dozens and dozens of Stones fans in the crowd willing me to do well, and finally win the Trophy.

"We knew Mossley were going to be tough opposition - and we knew that Northern Premier League clubs had won the Trophy every single one of the ten seasons it had been going except the one year when two Southern clubs were in the final. So the odds were weighted against us... and we didn't mind that.

F W e had a couple of changes from our normal line-up midfielder Mark Wright (father of the TOWIE star of the same name) had banged his head in a car accident two weeks before the game and missed out, together with midfielder Jimmy Holder who hurt his knee in the semi-final.

"That left an opening for Joey Durrell to come into the side in midfield. Joey was quick, left-sided (ex West Ham) with knees like pistons and we had an understanding, so when he made that early run in the inside right position I knew he would check inside before crossing with his left foot. That gave me just enough time to get between the centre-halves and when Joe's cross arrived where I expected it, it was second nature to leap and redirect a powerful header into the postage stamp (top right hand corner).

"As soon as I headed it, I knew I'd scored. My inner 'geography' told me where the goal was, where the keeper

was and it was the best feeling in the world to know I'd headed the opening goal in a Wembley Final.

"I just took off on a run behind the goal to where all the Dagenham fans were, in that big arc of terracing, and I can't describe it, I really can't describe the feeling.

"It was the greatest moment in my career, undoubtedly. My formative days, my best days were at Wealdstone, but winning the Trophy was something I'd always wanted to do and it was a dream come true".

George might have had a hat-trick in the first half at Wembley as he overshadowed his strike partner Ricky Kidd. "Ricky was a feisty, stocky, tenacious player and he knew where the goal was. But he was gutted at not scoring in the Final and he let me know it!

"I had an early shot blocked on the line – I thought I'd scored – and then just on half time I got up to win a header and saw it stopped by an arm on the goalline, but the ref Ken Baker said I'd won the ball illegally.

"That might have been a crucial decision because Ian Smith equalized for Mossley just after the break. But happily Chrissy Maycock popped up with a winner in the last ten minutes and we'd done it.

"I was totally drained after the game. I could hardly stand up. But I'd played and won at Wembley. And scored a goal. Life couldn't get better than that!"

Biggest crowd for years... the crumbling terraces Sandy Lane are pretty full for the last game

Saturday April 20 2002, Ryman League Division One: Tooting & Mitcham 3 Wealdstone 2

HIS was a dark, terrible season

('my worst in management' according to boss Gordon Barlett, seven years into his 22 campaigns with the Stones) that ended with glimpses of sunshine.

Not so much this defeat at Tooting, who were playing their last-ever game at the atmospheric old Sandy Lane ground, but the discovery of several quite brilliant youth team players who had fought their way into the first team squad and ended the season promising hope for the future.

With a negligible budget, the nurturing of gems like Jermaine Beckford, Marvin Morgan, Tunji Bamgbola, Guled Aden, Joe O'Regan and goalkeeper David Godfrey was the only way forward for Bartlett - although he often seemed reticent to play the youngsters.

This 3-2 defeat in front of a 968 crowd (boosted by the nostalgia-mongers, the second-highest gate in the Ryman Div One that season) was more a case of the old guard as we lined up with Andy Carter in goal; Kevin Ramsey, Matt Perry, Fergus Moore and Justin Bowen across the back four; Carl Hunt, Martin

YEARS AGO Offering the goal threat. Jason Shaw, to Lee Walker and Tunji Bamgbola were on the bis ii bench.

As Roy Couch wrote in his programme notes the following week: "It was Tooting's last game at their home of 70 years and, of course, we did the decent thing by losing 3-2".

Steve Symes put The Terras ahead after nine minutes to excite the large crowd, only for young Matt Perry to level things up from the penalty spot just after half time. Two quick strikes from home striker Nigel Webb around the hour mark seemed to have put the game to bed, but Bryan Hammett had the distinction of netting the last goal at Sandy Lane to give the scoreline a closer look than it really deserved.

Pefeat was not so unusual for us that season: After winning six of the first ten games we looked set for a tilt at promotion, only to tail off alarmingly with just one league win (at Bromley just before Christmas) in 23 games! But Bartlett maybe didn't help himself by sticking stubbornly to

the same players - the mould was broken with a home game against league leaders Aylesbury at the White Lion ground when he was forced to play young Dave Godfrey in goal and gangling teenager 'Starvin' Marvin Morgan up front... we won 1-0 with Morgan neeting with an audacious shot on the run, while the tall and athletic Godfrey defied The Ducks almost single-handed.

Three days later the story was repeated at highflying Bognor, Martin Carter scoring the goal and Godfrey providing the heroics - and it would have been a hat-trick as we led 1-0 at Whyteleafe the following Saturday before

the game was abandoned in a downpour. What happened when regular keeper Andy Carter was fit again? Yes, he went straight back into the team and we lost 3-1 at home to Thame.

There followed one win in the next seven games until Godfrey was reinstated for the last game of the season against Staines at the White Lion Ground - where he kept another clean sheet as we won 1-0.

The penny seemed to drop as GB then fielded all his outstanding youngsters (including an outrageously talented front line of Beckford, Morgan and Bamgbola) in the Middlesex Charity Cup Final against the newly-formed Enfield Town at Brook House, and was so nearly rewarded as were denied victory by a combination of rank bad luck and poor finishing from the penalty spot as the game went to a shoot-out after finishing 1-1 after extra time.

The occasion of Tooting's last game prompted When Saturday Comes to send along reporter Andy Lyons, and this was his take on the afternoon....

"A Ryman League First Division fixture between Tooting & Mitcham and Wealdstone wouldn't normally draw a thousand people, or anywhere near. Most of the crowd on April 20 had come specifically to see the last competitive match at Sandy Lane, Tooting's home since 1932 and the last of the big non-League grounds left in London. Chairman John Buffoni has taken

the brave step of striking a business deal with Ron Noades, as a result of which the club will begin next season at a new stadium built on Crystal Palace's old training ground two miles away across south London.

The sale of Sandy Lane to developers has enabled the club to stay in business, but many will be sad to see it go the way of other famous grounds from the heyday of the amateur Isthmian League. Green Pond Road, home of Walthamstow Avenue since 1900, disappeared 1990 years ago when

the club was swallowed up as part of the multiple mergers that created Dagenham & Redbridge.

Dulwich Hamlet moved out of the vast Champion Hill in 1991 and are now based at a much smaller ground with the same name. Kingstonian, in administration after relegation from the Conference, left their old ground, Richmond Road, in 1989 for Kings Meadow, which is itself attracting interest from the aforementioned Ron Noades, seeking a new home for Brentford.

Today's visitors, Wealdstone, have fallen a long way since winning the non-League Double of Conference and EA Tophy in

Double of Conference and FA Trophy in 1985, and no longer have a home of their own, a fact touched on by some Tooting fans: "We've got two grounds, you've got none."

As a footnote, this wasn't the first time that Wealdstone had just happened to be the last team to visit a historic old ground.

On April 26 2008 we became Hendon's last opponents as they quit Claremont Road (and we won 2-1, spoiling their Ryman Prem play-off chances) while on Bank Holiday Monday, May 2, 2011, we beat Hanworth Villa in the Middlesex Charity Cup Final - which was the last game played at Hayes' old Church Road ground.

Hendon are still groundsharing (at Kingsbury) while Hayes, like Tooting, have a new ground... but somehow they're just not the same.

DULWICH HAMLET FC

Opposition in focus



fter one of the most eventful seasons in their 125-year history, Dulwich Hamlet set out on a new adventure this campaign in the Vanarama National League South.

Despite being locked out of their Champion Hill home at the beginning of last March in a well-publicised bitter dispute between their landlords and the local council, the Club remained strong and on the field the team maintained their focus and push for promotion under long-serving manager Gavin Rose. They were rewarded two months later when Hendon were defeated in a dramatic penalty shoot-out before a 3,321 crowd at their temporary headquarters at Tooting in the Bostik (Isthmian) League Premier Division play-off final to secure promotion.

Dulwich had worked extremely hard for their promotion after an incredible 111 seasons as members of the Isthmian League. Four playoff final defeats in seven seasons, including each of the previous two campaigns, had stiffened the Hamlet's resolve and backed by crowds of around the 1,400 mark, few would begrudge them their chance to have a crack at Step 2 football.

The Dulwich Hamlet story began way back in 1893, during the closing years of Queen

Victoria's long reign. Towards the end of the summer that year, Lorraine Wilson was handed the princely sum of one shilling and eight pence (less than 10p in today's coinage) by a couple of keen young footballers and asked to start a Dulwich Hamlet Football Club. 'Pa', as Mr Wilson was affectionately known, tackled the task with great relish and over the next thirty years he helped to build Dulwich Hamlet into a powerful force in the world of amateur football.

Life in the early days was fairly tough. The club's original ground in Woodwarde Road had no changing facilities. On match days the players used to walk half a mile through the streets of Dulwich Village to get from their dressing room to the pitch. Usually they had to carry the goalposts, crossbars and corner flags with them. One consolation was that the players' route took them through the gardens of the local inn where no doubt they paused on their return journey for a post-match drink or two!

Dulwich made their debut in competitive soccer when they joined the local Camberwell League in 1894/95. The following season the championship of that league's 'B' Division became the first entry on what has proved to be a long list of honours. Achieving senior status in 1900, the club proceeded from strength to strength and in 1904/05 they won the Surrey Senior Cup for the first time. They have now won the Surrey Cup a record 16 times, most recently in 1974/75. In 1907 Dulwich gained election to the Isthmian League.

During the First World War, the legendary Edgar Kail joined Dulwich. In his brilliant fourteen-year career with the Hamlet after that war, Kail scored 427 goals (including a club record of 53 goals in the 1925/26 season). He also played three times for the FULL England International side, scoring twice on his debut against France. Kail helped Dulwich to the Isthmian League championship in 1919/20, 1925/26 and 1932/33, two FA Amateur Cup triumphs in 1919/20 and 1931/32, and the London Senior Cup in 1924/25. Another Hamlet legend of that era was goalkeeper Bert Coleman who gained a FULL England cap in 1921, keeping a clean sheet against Wales. Dulwich's other major successes during their heyday between the wars were two more FA Amateur Cup wins in 1933/34 and 1936/37, and another London Senior Cup victory in 1938/39; they were also runners-up in the Isthmian League five times. Incidentally, their 7-1 win over Marine (Liverpool) in 1931/32 equalled the record score for an FA Amateur Cup Final.

Dulwich were guickly into their stride after the Second World War and in 1948/49 they were Isthmian League champions for a fourth time. In 1949/50 they lifted the London Senior Cup again, and it was in the same season that full-back Reg Merritt embarked upon a long career with the Hamlet during which he made a club record 576 appearances. One of the most popular players of the immediate postwar period was flying left-winger Tommy Jover whose career goals tally for Dulwich has only been bettered by Edgar Kail. Tommy completed more than seventy years magnificent service to the club, as player, official and latterly club President from 1985 until his death at the grand age of 91 in 2008. The club's main stand is now named in his honour.

Dulwich were runners-up to Wimbledon in the Isthmian League in 1958/59, but then went through a very lean spell which, apart from three good seasons in the mid 1970s, culminated in relegation from the top division. However, they bounced straight back under manager Alan Smith (who later managed Crystal Palace), winning the Division One championship at the first attempt in 1977/78. Midfield dynamo Chris Lewington was an ever-present that season and he repeated the feat in each of the next four seasons to complete a remarkable 290 consecutive appearances – another club record.

Since the phasing out of amateur football and the end of the FA Amateur Cup in 1974, Dulwich have been a semi-professional club

and competed in the FA Trophy. Twice they have reached the quarter-finals, losing to Boston United in a replay in 1979/80, then to Macclesfield Town, again in a replay, the season before last.

It was most appropriate that Dulwich were able to celebrate their centenary in 1993 by moving into a new Champion Hill Stadium. Their famous old ground, which was situated on the same site, opened in 1931 and for a long time was the mecca of amateur football. Numerous Amateur Internationals and other important matches were staged there, including the FA Amateur Cup Final between Kingstonian and Stockton in 1932/33 which attracted a record crowd of 20.744. Sadly, the old ground fell into disrepair over the years and in order to satisfy safety regulations several alterations had to be made which reduced the capacity considerably. Eventually, in 1991, the stadium was totally demolished as part of Sainsbury's redevelopment of the area.

After the heartbreak of defeat in successive play-off finals, Gavin Rose and his squad had another crack at promotion to the Isthmian League Premier division in 2012/13 and this time they displayed real mental strength, pipping a well-supported and talented Maidstone United outfit to the Division One South title. In an exciting finale to the season, Dulwich drew 1-1 with Burgess Hill Town in front of a 1,137 crowd to finish top of the table, one point clear of rivals Maidstone.

During Gavin Rose's reign as manager, a number of the club's young players have been snapped up by League clubs, including the likes of Erhun Oztumer (Peterborough United, Walsall and now Bolton Wanderers), Ethan Pinnock (Forest Green Rovers and Barnsley), and last season Reise Allassani who moved to Coventry .City in the Summer.

AFOLABI 'DIPO' AKINYEMI -FORWARD

Transferred from Stevenage Borough at the beginning of March 2018, following successful loan spells at Champion Hill in each of the past two seasons. Originally with Potters Bar Town, he made 16 appearances for Stevenage and also had loan spells at St. Albans City, Billericay Town and Bishop's Stortford.

CHARLIE ALLEN - MIDFIELD

Joined Hamlet just before the transfer deadline. The son of Martin Allen, he began his career at Brentford whilst his father was First Team manager there. He later had spells with Dagenham & Redbridge, Billericay Town, Notts County, Gillingham, Margate and Farnborough. After some time out of the game, he recently had a short spell at Grays Athletic.

MICHAEL CHAMBERS - DEFENDER

A former Hamlet youngster who returned to the fold during the summer of 2016. He broke into the First Team at Champion Hill in 2011/12 when his performances attracted the attention of several big clubs. Crystal Palace won the battle to sign the prodigious central defender, but his development at Selhurst Park was disrupted by injury and following his release he spent the 2015/16 season with Welling United in the National League.

NYREN CLUNIS - MIDFIELD

Was the Club's leading marksman in season 2010/11 and again last term. A graduate of the Hamlet's successful youth set-up, he made his First Team debut back in November 2009 and his first senior goal secured a 1-0 win at Fleet Town. He has since been a regular in the squad, making over 440 appearances and scoring more than 110 goals – he is only the seventh Hamlet player to reach a century of goals since the last war. Last season he cleaned up the Club's Player of the Year awards, winning each of the sup-porters', players' and manager's awards.

ANTHONY COOK -MIDFIELD

Signed during the summer from Ebbsfleet United, having spent part of last season on loan at Woking. His other former clubs include Cardiff City, Dagenham & Redbridge, Chelmsford City and Bromley. With over 250 previous appearances in the National League/National League South behind him he has brought vital experience to Dulwich in their first season at this level

PRESTON EDWARDS -

GOALKEEPER

Signed permanently during the summer of 2016 after spending the latter part of the previous season at Champion Hill on loan from Ebbsfleet United. An England C international, his other previous clubs include Millwall. Dover Athletic and Grays Athletic. He also had a loan spell with Boreham Wood two seasons ago. He set a new Club record in 2016/17 with 66 First Team appearances the most ever by a Hamlet player in a single season

GEORGE ESSUMAN - DEFENDER

Signed on loan from Torquay United in January for the rest of the season. As a youth, he had spells at Norwich City, West Ham United and Sheffield Wednesday. Since switching to the Non-League game, his former clubs include Dover Athletic and Margate.

NATHAN FERGUSON - MIDFIELD

Signed in August 2017 and went on to make 55 appearances last season, which was more than any other player. A former Dagenham & Redbridge youth, he made his name with Grays Athletic in 2015 and this led to a move to Football League side Burton Albion

NATHAN GREEN - DEFENDER

Signed in the summer of 2016 from Margate and made 59 appearances in his first season. Began his career at Croydon Athletic where he helped them win the Isthmian South title in 2010. Later had spells with Lewes, Billericay Town, Kingstonian (loan), Tonbridge Angels, Dagenham & Redbridge, St. Albans City (loan) and Dartford before joining the 'Gate

CONNOR HUNTE - MIDFIELD

22-year-old midfielder who signed for Dulwich in March, on Ioan from Billericay Town for the rest of the season. Once a professional with Wolverhampton Wanderers.

SIMON JORGENSEN - GOALKEEPER

Very tall Danish goalkeeper, aged 26, who signed for Dulwich last month. A product of

FC Copenhagen's academy, he previously played in this country for Accrington Stanley and Whitehawk.

JAMIE MASCOLL -DEFENDER /MIDFIELD

Jamie is currently on loan from Charlton Athletic. A former youth at Champion Hill, he made 18 First Team appearances in his first spell with Dulwich

MAGNUS OKUONGHAE - DEFENDER

Made over 200 appearances for Colchester United earlier in his career. Began as a youth with Fulham and has also played for Rushden & Diamonds, Crawley Town, Dagenham & Redbridge, Luton Town, Maidstone United and Welling United.

MICHAEL ONOVWIGUN- MIDFIELD

Returned to the Club during the early part of last season after making a couple of appearances for Dulwich at the start of the previous campaign. He also had stints with Kingstonian and Merstham in 2016/17 and a loan spell with Carshalton Athletic earlier this season.

ARYAN TAJBAKHSH - MIDFIELD

28-year-old midfielder who was signed from Maidstone United in February. His other former clubs include Cheshunt, Enfield, Hendon and Cray Wanderers.

QUADE TAYLOR -DEFENCE/MIDFIELD

Returned to the Club in September 2016 from Braintree Town. He previously made 12 First Team appearances for Dulwich in season 2010/11 after coming through the youth set-up, before being snapped up by Crystal Palace. He spent two years at Selhurst Park, followed by another two years with Bolton Wanderers, for whom he played one First Team League match against Birmingham City at the end of the 2014/15 season. He has also spent periods on loan at Welling United and Dagenham & Redbridge.

DAN THOMPSON - FORWARD

Scored on his Dulwich debut away to Gloucester City just before Christmas. Started his career at Hampton & Richmond Borough, making his debut at only 16 years of age and netted his first career goal three days later, against Woking. A year later he signed for Portsmouth, but made only a single First Team appearance, in a League Cup-tie. Since his release from Pompey, he has played for several non-league clubs including Bognor Regis Town, Burgess Hill Town, Tonbridge Angels and Braintree Town

DOMINIC VOSE - MIDFIELD

Joined Dulwich in August 2018. Began his career as a youngster with Fulham and West Ham United. Since then he has played in the Football League for Barnet, Colchester United, Scunthorpe United and Grimsby Town and in non-league for a number of clubs including Welling United, Whitehawk, Bromley and, most recently, Chester.

LUKE WANADI - FORWARD

Joined in February on loan from Aldershot Town for the rest of the season. This is his second spell at Champion Hill, having made 21 appearances for Dulwich back in season 2014/15, and he has also played for East Thurrock United, Hampton & Richmond Borough, Staines Town and Bromley.

GAVIN ROSE - MANAGER

Former midfielder who is the Club's longest serving manager, having taken charge of over 500 games since August 2009. Originally with the Club in season 2002/03. when he made 40 first team appearances whilst doubling up as youth team manager, he has also had spells with Wimbledon, Charlton Athletic, QPR, Southend United, Bromley, Gravesend & Northfleet and Walton & Hersham amongst others during his long career. In recent years he has been involved in running the Aspire Academy which specialises in coaching youngsters and he also had managerial experience with Beckenham Town whom he led to within a whisker of the Kent League championship. Under his guidance. Hamlet won the Isthmian South title in 2012/13, after reaching the divisional play-off final in each of the previous two seasons: and made it to the Premier Division playoff final three seasons running, defeating Hendon on penalties in last season's final to gain a coveted place in the National League South. In addition, they were guarter-finalists in the FA Trophy in 2016/17 and have twice reached the Isthmian League Cup Final during his stay. In 2012/13 he became the first Hamlet boss to win a Manager of the Year award.

test Stones 'keeper Jonathan North when his shot trickled into North's palms inside three minutes. Wealdstone took the ascendency seconds later when a dangerous ball from the right-hand side by Rhys Tyler was headed wide by Stefan Brown.

The game settled down after ten minutes, good skill and turn from Stones' Danny Green eventually fell to Brown who shot wide of the far post from the edge of the box.

A flurry of strikes from Green and Tarryn Allarakhia were blocked half way into the first half before Simon Mensah was fouled on the edge of the box.

Hampton countered from the Stones corner and Ryan Hill was able to cross to the far-post towards Sotiriou whose deflected volley bounced past North after 24 minutes.

The Stones would have been disappointed to concede against the run of play, Hampton almost doubled their lead two minutes later when a fierce left-footed strike from full-back Oliver Sprague dragged over the bar.

Half-time drew closer with a lack of clear-cut opportunities for each side which did not benefit the Stones.



Pressure began to mount on the home side, Rhys Tyler had his shot blocked in the box five minutes after the break.

It did not take long for Sotiriou to double his tally, the striker done so after 54 minutes when he capitalised on an error from Stones skipper Jerome Okimo.

There was life in the Stones when substitute David Pratt was fouled in the box and makeshift centre-half Smith converted from the spot with 25 minutes left.

The home side came again searching for a third, Tyrell Miller-Rodney almost found it in the 73rd minute when his strike from outside the box fizzed wide.

Another chance for the Stones was headed away by Hampton after Green's cross. The resulting corner was headed down again by Okimo but could not find a Stone at the far post. The Stones were searching for an equaliser when Monakana had his free-kick blocked by

Miller-Rodney with less than 10 minutes to go. The resulting corner almost found Freddie Grant who leaped highest at the far post before it was deflected wide for another corner.

Wealdstone youngster Femi Azeez almost found the away side's second goal seconds later when the Stones corner found the winger on the edge of the box but the finish could not beat Maynard-Brewer.





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
