 - Being drunk, or under the influence of alcohol or drugs • Using violence of any nature
 - Carrying items which may be considered a danger to others, including cans, bottles, or glasses containing alcoholic beverages
 - Throwing any article onto the field of play • Climbing floodlight pylons, fences, stands or any structure or building
 - Using obscene or bad language likely to cause offence to others • Hitting the side or back panels of the Bulla stand
- 2) No spectator ball games.
- 3) The consumption of alcoholic drinks is permitted INSIDE the social club bar, garden and boardroom areas.
- 4) Vehicles parked on the Grosvenor Vale site are at the owners' risk.
- 5) Wealdstone Football Club supports the FA's campaign on pyrotechnics (e.g. flares and smoke bombs). Any misuse of such items in and around the Ground will result in those responsible being asked to leave the ground and, in line with football authority guidance, may result in a report to the Police, potential prosecution and a ban from the Club of up to three years.

It's Stuart

'Good recruitment is not just about signing players.. they must fit our strategy for the football club'

You'd think that someone who played through two decades - indeed, the 19th and 20th centuries - for Wealdstone might have racked up more than just 11 appearances.

Stuart Maynard is now, of course, the Stones' assistant manager but 20 years ago he was with us briefly as a player in that awkward 1999-2000 season.

Trying to perform in that Wealdstone side must have been about as far removed as you can get from the current smooth-passing team!

"I'd just been released from pro football, from Watford who'd just been promoted into the Premier League.... but I quickly worked out what non-League was all about" said Stuart when I nabbed him for a chat last week. "I'd actually gone to play for Groningen in the Dutch league in pre-season but I was 19 years old and homesick

and was back in two months. In Holland it was all very technical, lots of ball work but then suddenly I'm back in England, playing for Isthmian Prem St Albans in a midfield that was pretty much by-passed. We were just picking up scraps - nobody would pass to you".

Bob Dowie was the Saints boss, and he allowed Stuart to dual-sign for the Stones after he'd been out injured for a few months. He was working as a builder and stood on a nail - and the wound became infected.

"If you look at that Wealdstone team now - it was the one that should have been promoted to the Ryman Prem the year before - there were some decent players. Rocky Baptiste, Lamby, Jonah, Dom Sterling, Noel Imber... I remember thinking that the squad was as good as St Albans.

"Maybe fitness levels were a bit lower, but that was the only difference".

Stuart, a neat and tidy midfielder, scored just one goal in his seven starts (and four appearances off the bench) in a 1-1 draw at Worthing but it was a long stale run of a dozen games without a win for Gordon Bartlett's side and soon he would be rejoining St Albans.

"I then had some good years at Aylesbury United, including a good FA Cup run which ended in an unlucky 3-0 defeat at Port Vale (details above). In the aftermath of that, the manager Cliff Hercules was forced out and his assistant Terry Back asked me over to play for Enfield. It was a bit of a shambles there with the chairman pulling the plug after just six games. There were just six of us on contract and the rest were kids so we just muddled through - but the best thing about my time there was meeting Deano (Brennan) for the first time.

"He was playing against us for Hitchin and had scored a hat trick, but we had a bit of banter on the pitch and he said 'you should come and play for us'.

"So we had a beer after the game and I went and signed for them. Robbie O'Keefe and then Kerry Dixon were the managers".

So did you learn anything from Kerry Dixon to take into management? "Absolutely nothing!" he laughed. "Well to be fair he was a big character but he'd earned his money at Chelsea and was really just in it for the enjoyment. He had our respect but tactically, no he wasn't the best!"

I suggested that he probably didn't have the sort of commitment that you need, watching football four or five times a week to keep on top of the game.

"Well that's true. Deano and I watch more like five or six games a week - tonight for example Dean's at Corby and I'm at Farnborough. Always checking out players.

"The clubs all know what we're up to and these days most of them at Isthmian and Southern League level don't have players on contract, so you can come in on a seven day approach. We also have 'Scout Seven' which is full-match video of National League games so we can work things out tactically."

Stuart and his family live in North Watford - and Deano not far away in Leighton Buzzard - so they're pretty much in each others pockets.

"We were on the same wavelength even when we were players" says Stuart. "In the dressing room we were talking about containing other teams and the ways to exploit them - then when we were together at Hemel Hempstead seven or eight years ago the chairman Dave Boggins asked us to take over

temporarily when the manager left. "We did okay - kept Hemel up in the Southern Prem by getting ex-Watford mates like Paolo Vernazza and Jamie Hand to sign, and Luther Blissett in as coach - but he appointed Colin Payne that summer. Payne lasted two years and then we were asked again - on a permanent basis. And it kicked on from there".

The new management team has obviously had specular success since pitching up at Grosvenor Vale.

So what is the magic ingredient when it comes to player recruitment?

"Hard work" says Stuart. "Getting out there to watch players. And realising that the players you sign have to fit our strategy for the club, and have the right character".

Me and Deano were technical players and we wanted to bring that philosophy into management. If you look at the Conference National now, it has definitely become more physical.

"People say that clever players like Billy Clifford and Greenie wouldn't cut it but they can play anywhere - a lot of our players could play in the Football League, I'm convinced of it.

"And Michael Phillips - I was so happy he signed for us from Maidstone. Crazy really

that he's at this level. That took a lot of work, but he makes the team tick. He allows people like Billy to play - in that very first pre season game when Michael made his debut, we noticed that no-one was running at our back four any more. He's hugely important to us.

"The danger of course is that League clubs will come in and try to take players off us. But this is such a good group - great togetherness and no cliques - that they are really enjoying what is happening here. They want to be a part of it"

And is the management philosophy a non-favouritism one? "Absolutely. You saw that Sanchez (Watt) started the season and then Mendy came in. And Dennon started the season on the bench. If you play well you keep the shirt, it's as simple as that".

It's a philosophy that has extended to the No.1 shirt, with Aston Oxborough retaining the gloves from Jonathan North despite being a loan signing.

"The Ox has been outstanding and although Northy is a legend and a terrific keeper he's not been able to get back in. Now he's out on loan and getting match fit again - the Ox made that one mistake against Havant, taking one too many touches but he's learned from that. He's a one-touch player now!"

Your name and age? Andy Bennett, age 59

Whereabouts do you live Andy? Ruislip, near the Polish War Memorial

When was your first Wealdstone game? My first Wealdstone game was an away match against Aldershot in the FA Cup in 1975. I was actually supporting Aldershot, as my sister used to live there! My first match at Lower Mead, I was also supporting the opposition, West Ham, in a testimonial game, I think it was Willie Watson's, and ended up a 0-0 draw around 1977 or 78. I actually liked the passion of the Stones supporters, and as I lived in Kingsbury at the time, I decided to come again.

Are you working, and where? I work at RAF Northolt, I have been there since 1999. I am the In-Flight Catering Manager. I look after all the food for Royals and VIPs that fly out from there.

Who or what persuaded you to come to a game? After my first visit to Lower Mead, I met some friends, John Fairman, and I worked with two other Stones supporters, Colin & Roger in National Westminster Bank, and after a bit of banter I decided to go to a few games with them.

Do you follow another team? I had a season ticket for West Ham up until 2000, and followed them all over Europe. As I said earlier my

sister lived in Aldershot, so I also go to a few games a season, especially to grounds I have never been before. I also follow Wasps rugby and have done since their days at Sudbury. I still go to away games, but I can't bring myself to go to 'home' matches at Coventry.

Is it easy to fit football in with your work/family commitments? I am lucky that my wife lets me go to any games I want to (I

think she's glad to get rid of me) - the only stipulation is family come first at birthdays, Easter and Christmas.

Do your family follow another team? One of my sisters and my brother supported Arsenal. I went to a few games with them, but, I just didn't get the same buzz as West Ham.

What is the main attraction of watching the Stones? I love going to Stones games as it's easy to meet up with mates and supporting my local team. You actually feel part of the club rather than just another statistic at Premiership teams.

Do you prefer non-League over League football? If you had asked me if I preferred Non League to League football ten years ago, I would have laughed But, I think I do now.

What is your all-time favourite Stones line-up (1-11)? Playing a 4-5-1- formation - lles, Perkins, Pearce, Bowgett, Connor Stevens, Massey, Green, Wainwright, Eisa, Alan Cordice, Beckford. I would love to see that team in their prime play together.

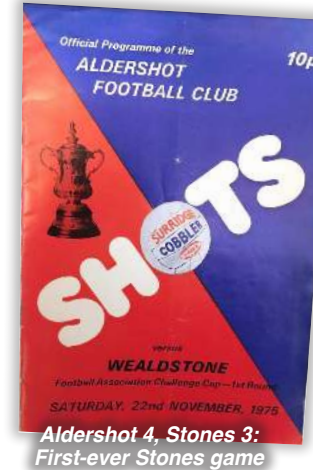
And your current favourite line-up? Playing a 4-4-2-formation - North, Arnold, Efete, Stevens, Okimo, Green, Clifford, Smith, Sheppard, Lafayette, Mendy.

Do you think the club can ever progress to the football league? It will be very difficult to play Football League here at Ruislip. I feel we need to get our own ground and be financially viable first.

Are your friends aware of Wealdstone? Are they surprised you don't follow a 'big club'? All my friends know I follow Wealdstone, and also come along. Most have a 'Premier' team.

What is your favourite stones game you've ever seen? Wembley in 1985, what a fantastic win and a great day out. The evening was a bit blurry the next day though.

What is the best game you've EVER seen? That's hard to pick, but I will have to go with West Ham v Arsenal 1980 FA Cup Final. Second Division underdogs, we scored early on,

and thoroughly deserved the win.

Who is your favourite current Stones player/s? North has to be high on the list, and Danny Green is getting there too.

Do you think more could be done to attract youngsters along to the Vale? I think we frightened a lot off with the price hike last season, which I think was a silly move. A lot of us older supporters seem to be 'scared' of the 'yoof' coming in. I think we should

welcome them, and show them the 'Wealdstone' way.

What do you think of the pricing for games at The Vale? Pricing at Wealdstone is very good, the season tickets are probably the best in the League.

Do you use the megastore or social club/catering etc? I buy a few things at the Megastore, I get a little miffed at having to buy the 5XL size but Macron is Italian, and they are smaller. I don't use the catering facilities, I never eat at any football/rugby/cricket grounds. As for the social club, yes I use that a fair bit.

Have you played the game yourself and any memorable moments?

I played football to County level at School, for Brent, Middlesex & North London Schools. I then found booze & women were more fun. I also played Sunday football, and managed a team called Apex Corner to 2 cup wins and their highest ever finish in the League (Hendon & District).

What's your favourite of the three kits this season? I have to be honest and say I do not like any of the kits this season. I am an old traditionalist, and prefer the plain Blue shirts of old.

And what do you think of the Stones programme? I think ours is superb, very good value and good quality.

FIRST HALF

Wealdstone were eliminated from the FA Cup in the Fourth Qualifying Round replay against Maidenhead United at The Vale on Tuesday evening.

Two goals from Josh Kelly, either side of a controversial Jacob Mendy red card and half-time, sent the Magpies into the First Round Proper. The game began at a relatively slow pace and the visitors capitalised after 15 minutes when Kelly timed his run to perfection and slotted past Aston Oxborough.

One goal could have quickly become two for the Magpies when Remy Clerima headed James Comley's cross goal bound; Oxborough dived to his right to parry the ball away from danger.

After a strong Stones performance on Saturday, the recovery from going behind was almost instant but Dennon Lewis' left-footed drive was dragged wide following slick build-up play.

Wealdstone needed to find a response and it almost fell to Danny Green on the right, the narrow angle allowed Chris Dunn to save at the near-post.

Alan Devonshire's side restricted the home side to half-chances throughout the first half, with Green's effort being the highlight of the opening period for the Stones.

Mendy seemed to have headed a long-ball back to Oxborough on the stroke of half-time, but referee Paul Howard deemed a foul on Remy Clerima and Mendy was sent off as the last man.

The red card sucked the life out of the already-uninspiring game overall and the Stones' FA Cup campaign was in jeopardy of coming to an end.

SECOND HALF

Wealdstone had to come out quickly in the second half and change the tempo, which would be difficult for any side that were down to ten-men.

The Magpies doubled their lead ten minutes after the interval as Kelly drilled a left-footed strike across goal, off the post and into the net.

It was an uphill climb for the Stones at this point, who battled hard for 180 minutes with no luck.

The tie could have taken a twist when Wealdstone midfielder Billy Clifford's free-kick from 25-yards forced an acrobatic save from Chris Dunn in the final 20 minutes.

Wealdstone kept going even in the closing stages, substitute Ashley Charles struck an indirect free-kick low which was cleared off the line ten minutes from time.

The game eventually petered out, with the Stones unable to emulate the late heroics that their opponents pulled off in the previous fixture just three days earlier.

With ten-men, there was no doubting the home side's commitment. However, a packed and experienced Magpies side allowed their National League quality to shine through in the end.

Opposition in focus

Tonbridge Football Club were formed in October 1947 following the suggestion of local businessman and founder chairman Mr. Herbert Portch, and were one of four clubs to be elected to the Southern League for the 1948-49 season. 'Jock' Dunoon, a former Chelsea player, was the club's first manager. The club took out a lease on the Angel Ground, formerly the home of Kent County Cricket Club and named after the nearby pub 'The Angel'. Hence Tonbridge FC became known as 'The Angels'. A crowd of around 5,000 turned up for the club's opening league fixture against fellow newcomers Hastings United but the match was lost 2-1 with Albert Ronson scoring the club's first ever goal. Progress was slow in the early days with the club rock bottom at Christmas and with Harold Hobbs taking over as manager from Dunoon and Marshall Raybould, but the club would improve their form in the second half of the season to finish third from last.

Throughout the 1950s the Angels would struggle to make any progress in the Southern League and a peak of 11th place was reached in 1949/50, the club's second season, however Tonbridge would prove to be a strong side in cup competitions. In 1949/50, the club reached the semi-finals of the Southern League Cup, losing 3-2 to Colchester United. In three successive seasons, 1950-51, 1951-52 and 1952-53, Tonbridge reached the First Round Proper of the FA Cup, only to lose each of the three after a replay. The Angels' opponents were Chelmsford City, Aldershot and Norwich City respectively. The Aldershot tie at the Angel Ground saw a record attendance of 8,236, while the Norwich City game was shrouded in controversy with a late goal at Carrow Road settling the tie. The first

trophy to be lifted came in 1951/52 with the Angels winning the Kent Senior Shield. Tonbridge would go on to win this trophy a further four times, in 1956, 1958, 1959 and 1964. Two Southern League Cup finals were reached and lost, beaten in 1954/55 by Yeovil Town and two seasons later by Hereford United, and two Kent Senior Cup finals were also lost in 1956/57 and 1958/59. The club were relegated from the Premier Division in 1961/62, but were promoted two seasons later finishing in 4th place after narrowly missing out the year before. However the club were then relegated back to Division One in 1965-66. The notable success of the 1960s was the achievement of reaching the First Round Proper for a fourth time, this time being knocked out 1-0 by Dagenham. The club also won the Kent Senior Cup for the first time in 1964/65

In 1972/73 the Angels won promotion to the Premier Division by finishing as runners-up to Maidstone United. In the same season the First Round Proper of the FA Cup was reached once again as Charlton Athletic were the visitors to the Angel Ground. A crowd of 7,770 saw Charlton win 5-0. Tonbridge won the Kent Senior Cup in 1974/75 while managed by former World Cup winner George Cohen. After struggling to stay in the Premier Division, the club suffered financial troubles and went into voluntary liquidation in 1976. Tonbridge Angels FC was then formed and allowed to complete the fixture list on the understanding that relegation would result at the end of the 1975/76 season, wherever the club finished. Another major problem loomed soon after. The club's landlords, the local council, wanted the Angel Ground for development. A battle lasting up to three years that went as far as the High Courts ensued before the club was eventually offered a new

ground at Longmead, its present home. The appropriately named Micky Angel scored the last ever goal at the old Angel Ground in 1980.

During the club's Kent League days, Longmead Stadium's record attendance for a competitive match was remarkably beaten three times in ten days during a memorable FA Cup run. After an abandoned 3rd Qualifying Round replay with Hampton in front of over 800 fans, the game was rearranged and drew an impressive attendance of 1,274. Just five days later the 4th Qualifying Round tie against Yeovil drew a crowd of 1,483. Season 1997/98 saw an attendance of 2,412 when the full Crystal Palace first team squad appeared for a charity match in aid of two local hospices, making March 30th 1998 a memorable evening in the clubs history. Still on the topic of records, the Angels' biggest win came about in the FA Cup in 1951 when Worthing were beaten 11-1. Two seasons before that a 2-11 loss at Folkestone in the Kent Senior Cup had given the club its record defeat.

The Angels briefly topped the Southern Division on their return to Southern League football in the 1993/94 season but settled for a mid-table finish, which was to be repeated the following season. The club struggled in the 1995/96 season with Phil Emblen resigning as Manager in February 1996 to be replaced by Bill Roffey and the club finished in 18th position. In 1996-97 Tonbridge had an improved season finishing in 8th place and in the summer of 1997 Paul Emblen broke the club's record transfer fee, moving to Charlton Athletic for £7,000. He was later transferred to Wycliffe Wanderers for £60,000. His brother, ex-Angel Neil, has appeared for Millwall, Wolves, Crystal Palace and Norwich City.

In 2008/09 the Angels finished third in the Ryman Premier but lost to Carshalton Athletic in the play-offs. The close season saw a major ground development. The old covered stand, which had been transported from the Angel Ground to Longmead in 1980, was a hollow shell except for a pathway and 200 temporary seats. It was completely refurbished and transformed into a smart 720 capacity all-seater stand.

Having defeated Harrow in the Semi's the

Angels won the play off final in 2011/12 v Lowestoft in front of a record competitive crowd of 2,411 4-3 to take their place for the first time in the Football Conference South Division - their highest ever place in the non-league pyramid. The Angels were to stay three seasons at that level, finishing as high as 9th in their first season.

Following relegation at the end of the 2013/14 season Steve McKimm who had been coach at Sutton United took over as manager and whilst his first season in charge saw a flirtation with relegation, there followed an immediate change in fortune with 4th place achieved in 2015/16 and a play off semi final appearance against East Thurrock United. Despite a 2-0 loss there was optimism for the 2016/17 season. That optimism was well founded with a 4th Qualifying round appearance in the FA Cup against Dartford and a promotion challenge that in the end saw the club one position and one point away from a play off place.

JONNY HENLY - GOALKEEPER

Signed in August 2017 from Hemel Hempstead Town following a successful loan period at the end of 2016/17 during which he achieved some Man of the Match performances for the Angels. Previous clubs include Reading, Aldershot, Oxford Utd., Welling Utd and Ipswich Town and he has also represented Scotland at U19 and U21 levels. Runner up for the Supporters Player of the Year Award in 2017/18 and 2018/19.

ALEX BENTLEY - DEFENDER

Alex joined the Angels in May 2019 and is an experienced defender who has played at Dagenham & Redbridge, Cray Wanderers, and most recently (AFC) Hornchurch where he made 288 appearances and whilst there was twice voted Supporters Player of the Year and Players Player of the Year in 2012/13.

LIAM SMITH - DEFENDER

An exciting young prospect who broke into the Angels 1st team from the club's successful youth system. Enjoys attacking the opposition down the flank when operating at full back, yet shows great maturity for one so young.

JAMES FOLKES - MIDFIELD

Returning to Longmead in June 2018 this popular and versatile player can operate in defence or midfield. Was with the Angels for nearly three seasons making 128 appearances before a spell with Grays Athletic. Up until the end of last season had clocked up 189 appearances.

JACK PARTER - DEFENDER

Originally joined the Angels in the summer of 2014 where a season later he was to form a formidable left flank partnership with then winger Nicky Wheeler. Departed the club during the summer of 2017, but when a left back vacancy arose, manager Steve Mckimm moved quickly to re-sign Jack in September 2017 whereupon he has forged an equally successful partnership with wideman Joe Turner. Voted Players' Player of the Year for last season.

SONNY MILES - DEFENDER

Came through the Angels youth system and apart from one season with local rivals Maidstone Utd from where he came back a stronger player, has stayed loyal to his spiritual Longmead home. Capable of scoring vital goals at set pieces and appointed 1st team vice-captain for season 2016/17. Captained the side with distinction for much of 2017/18 and part of 2018/19 due to injury to skipper Tom Parkinson. Awarded Managers' Player of the Year for 2018/19.

RIAN BRAY - DEFENDER

Rian joined the Angels in June 2019 from fellow club Hampton & Richmond Borough. He played youth football for Millwall which also included loan spells with Bishop's Stortford, Welling Utd., and Leatherhead. At the start of season 2017/18 Rian joined Hendon and a year later was to move on to Hampton & Richmond Borough where he made 45 appearances the most of any Beavers player. Voted Hampton's Young Player of the Year for 2018/19.

TOM PARKINSON - MIDFIELD

As a central midfielder Steve represented with distinction Hayes, Kingstonian, and Ebbsfleet Utd before joining Sutton in May 2008. Guided the Angels to a Bostik (Ryman) Premier play-off semi-final spot in 2015/16, the Emirates FA Cup 4th qualifying round in 2016/17 and promotion to National South via the Bostik Premier play-offs in 2018/19.

Tonbridge always remind me of Adriaan 'Coco' Eglite... and the Dutchman's eight-minute hat-trick

The memory of Geoff Hurst's World Cup winning hat-trick is indelibly printed on the brain of every sports-mad schoolboy who grew up in the 1960s. I am no different.

Even visiting Wembley for the very first time, for a schoolboy international a few years after the Miracle of '66, my eyes were drawn to the goalposts, to the crossbar that had ricocheted Hurst's shot down onto the goalline and away, and to the net that famously billowed in the final moments of extra time as Sir Geoff belted in his third goal.

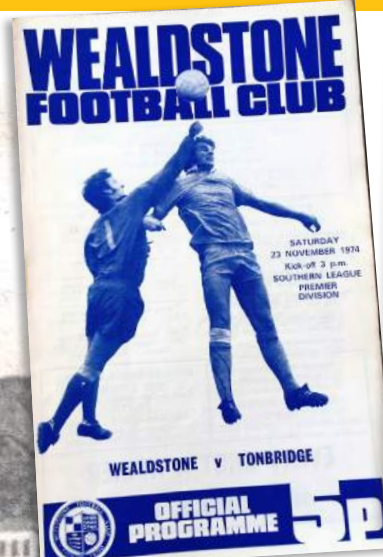
To this nine year old, the thought of even scoring one goal in a proper game was unbelievably exciting. To score a hat-trick was simply the stuff of dreams.

This mystical aura surrounding hat tricks has stayed with me throughout the intervening 53 years - and the most precious memories from my own modest footballing career in local leagues revolve around goalscoring. One hat-trick for SFC Wealdstone (our excellent supporters team) in an end-of-season Marathon Sunday League game under the lights at Lower Mead against big rivals Greenford Royals - on a real mudbath of a pitch, amidst thunder and lightning - still gives me a tingle just thinking about it.

No surprise then, that Wealdstone hat

tricks hold special importance for me. Add to that heady mix a hat trick scored in rapid succession and it's enough to make me go weak at the knees!

And so, in a roundabout way, we come to Tonbridge Angels, our visitors today. Yes, I know they are a reformed club after the original Tonbridge FC reformed in

information that Eglite was 'a product of the famous Ajax Amsterdam youth system' - especially when it transpired that the bandy-legged, bald-headed specimen who trotted out of the Lower Mead tunnel for his Tuesday night debut against Bath City had been signed from Isthmian Leaguers Ilford in East London! But it literally took just a few minutes for the 1,000-strong Lower Mead crowd to sit up and take notice.

Play was switched out to the left wing and Eglite - with his first touch - collected the ball facing his own goal, feinted to pass inside and instead flicked the ball back through his own legs in a bewildering change of direction. The City right back was left on his arse, peering comically over his shoulder as the stocky Dutchman made a beeline for the byline (leaving two more defenders in his wake) and crossed inches away from the head of the predatory Duck.

Was that the legendary Cruyff Turn we'd just witnessed? The same move and tactics that had seen Holland come so close to lifting the World Cup only a few months earlier now

being displayed in front of our own disbelieving eyes in the London Borough of Harrow?

Could watching Wealdstone ever become more glamorous than this?!

Over the years, we've seen countless very good players take months to endear themselves to us hard-to-please Stones fans. Yet Adrian Eglite needed just one well-practised move that brought the magic and mystique of continental football to Lower Mead, to instantly win us over. It was so extraordinary that the eccentric Harry O reporter Phil Sugden immediately christened Eglite with the epithet 'Coco' after the circus clown.

Not surprisingly, the nickname never caught on and in fact Eglite was far from a clown - he was a hardworking winger with a few tricks and a talent for cutting inside or outside, and either crossing or striking the ball hard and low towards goal.

I found an article on a fan's forum that claimed Eglite met a London girl on holiday, fell in love, changed his name to Adrian Taylor and moved to the capital. He then played half a season for Haringey Borough in the Athenian League - causing them to lose a stack of points for fielding an ineligible player - before signing legitimately for Ilford, who had assembled a decent side that reached Wembley for the last-ever Amateur Cup

in April 1974. They lost to Bishops Stortford, but began 74-75 with a decent FA Cup run that was ended by Southend United.

That was when Eglite was snapped up by Presland to perform his debut party piece against Bath.

The Dutchman went on to become an integral part of the entertaining, if brittle, Stones side of the mid-seventies. He switched wings with the effervescent Johnny Henderson, and with the battering ram Bill Byrne and goal poacher supreme G Duck in the middle we had a hell of a lot of firepower for a couple of memorable years.

h, the game with Tonbridge you are asking? What happened there? Quick fire hat trick wasn't it?

Yes indeed. Three goals in eight minutes of the first half that left poor Tonbridge as distressed and shambolic as a beached whale.

Wealdstone, thereafter, might well have had more. One must say that George Duck and Bill Byrne are still off target but with the example set by "Coco" - "shoot when you see the whites of their eyes" - they may be on the mark very soon.

Better days are ahead at Lower Mead. Wealdstone: Morton; Kinnear, Watson, Fairclough, Evans (D); Godfrey, Henderson, Fulham; Byrne, Duck. Eg-lite, Sub: Evans (F).

information that Eglite was 'a product of the famous Ajax Amsterdam youth system' - especially when it transpired that the bandy-legged, bald-headed specimen who trotted out of the Lower Mead tunnel for his Tuesday night debut against Bath City had been signed from Isthmian Leaguers Ilford in East London!

But it literally took just a few minutes for the 1,000-strong Lower Mead crowd to sit up and take notice.

Play was switched out to the left wing and Eglite - with his first touch - collected the ball facing

his own goal, feinted to pass inside and instead flicked the ball back through his own legs in a bewildering change of direction. The City right back was left on his arse, peering comically over his shoulder as the stocky Dutchman made a beeline for the byline (leaving two more defenders in his wake) and crossed inches away from the head of the predatory Duck.

Was that the legendary Cruyff Turn we'd just witnessed? The same move and tactics that had seen Holland come so close to lifting the World Cup only a few months earlier now

being displayed in front of our own disbelieving eyes in the London Borough of Harrow?

Could watching Wealdstone ever become more glamorous than this?!

Over the years, we've seen countless very good players take months to endear themselves to us hard-to-please Stones fans. Yet Adriaan Eglite needed just one well-practised move that brought the magic and mystique of continental football to Lower Mead, to instantly win us over. It was so extraordinary that the eccentric Harry O reporter Phil Sugden immediately christened Eglite with the epithet 'Coco' after the circus clown.

Not surprisingly, the nickname never caught on and in fact Eglite was far from a clown - he was a hardworking winger with a few tricks and a talent for cutting inside or outside, and either crossing or striking the ball hard and low towards goal.

I found an article on a fan's forum that claimed Eglite met a London girl on holiday, fell in love, changed his name to Adrian Taylor and moved to the capital. He then played half a season for Haringey Borough in the Athenian League - causing them to lose a stack of points for fielding an ineligible player - before signing legitimately for Ilford, who had assembled a decent side that reached Wembley for the last-ever Amateur Cup

in April 1974. They lost to Bishops Stortford, but began 74-75 with a decent FA Cup run that was ended by Southend United.

That was when Eglite was snapped up by Presland to perform his debut party piece against Bath.

The Dutchman went on to become an integral part of the entertaining, if brittle, Stones side of the mid-seventies. He switched wings with the effervescent Johnny Henderson, and with the battering ram Bill Byrne and goal poacher supreme G Duck in the middle we had a hell of a lot of firepower for a couple of memorable years.

Ah, the game with Tonbridge you are asking? What happened there? Quick fire hat trick wasn't it?

Yes indeed. Three goals in eight minutes of the first half that left poor Tonbridge as distressed and shambolic as a beached whale.

The Kent side had come into the game in a good run of form - as you can see from the report (left)

but Eglite (just a couple of weeks on from his memorable debut) had the strength and low centre of gravity that was ideally suited to the glue pot pitches of the 1970s.

We were just mesmerised by his power and determination as he walked off the pitch at

halftime already clutching the match ball in jest - and as Tonbridge took to double-marking the Dutchman after the break it was left to fellow winger Johnny Henderson to add the clinching fourth goal.

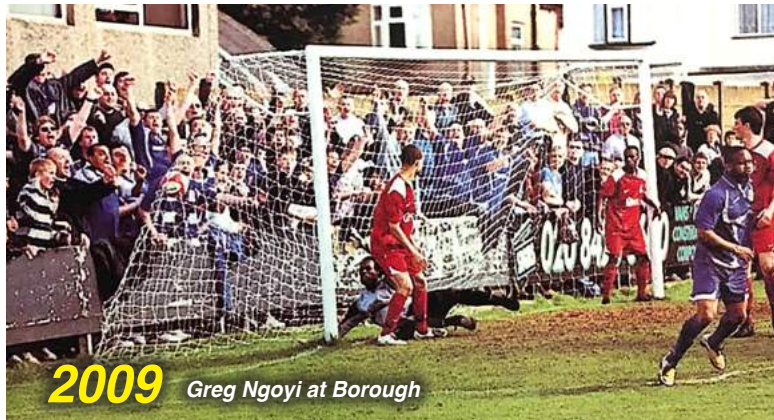
Eglite stayed with the Stones for just 18

months, scoring 15 goals in 45 starts and 13 appearances off the bench... not a bad tally for a wide man. He signed for Kingstonian in the summer of 1976, but then seems to have disappear off football's radar. You wouldn't think it would be hard to Google or Facebook

someone with as unusual a name.... but it is. The only references direct you to the Stones fans forum and a debate over the club's fastest hat trick (strangely enough).

Football may have forgotten you, Adriaan Eglite, but we haven't.

...and talking of quick-fire hat tricks, what about these ones?

Was Jermaine Beckford's stunning hat-trick against Enfield last Saturday - scored in the space of nine minutes after coming on as a late substitute - the most sensational in the history of Wealdstone FC?

In January 1973, the great George Duck scored a 1st half hat-trick against Bexley United on a Saturday, and repeated the feat against Salisbury City three days later. And in January 1975 our Dutch winger Adriaan Eglite scored three goals in (I think) 20 first half minutes against Tonbridge. But they weren't scored in such rapid succession as the "Becks" trio at Meadow Park.

His first, timed at 77 minutes, was a quick dart into space and a stroll around the onrushing Michael Collier, before rolling the ball into an empty net. Seven minutes later Brett Freeman crossed brilliantly from the left, just beating Collier to the ball, and Jermaine finished tidily from four yards out. Collier was stretched off, injured in that collision with Freeman - but his replacement Rob Munn was fishing another Beckford strike out of the net just two minutes later when he was beaten to the ball on the edge of the box and Jermaine had another open goal to shoot into. Fabulous!

On Saturday we travel to East Thurrock United for the final - and crucial - game of the season. Three points will be vital to ensure a place in the new Ryman Premier set-up for 2004-5 and no doubt you'll want to be at Rookery Hill to shout the Stones to victory. By car, the best bet is to take the A13 (Junction 30 off the M25) and turn off at The Manorway (A1014) to Corringham. Then just follow the map below. See you there!

So, was Eglite's eight-minute hat trick the fastest in Wealdstone FC history?

We don't have records covering all 130-odd years of WFC but in the professional era - since 1971 - Adriaan shares that honour with Messrs Jermaine Beckford and Richard Jolly, not a bad pair to be bracketed with.

Becks hit his eight-minute trio in the Ryman Div One North 8-0 win over Enfield in April 2004, in a game played at Boreham Wood FC on our late run to a famous play off victory over Dulwich.

They came between the 80th and 87th minutes, all the more memorable as he'd only come on as substitute a few minutes before!

Jolls' eight-minute moment of fame came at Concord Rangers in February 2011 (when he ended up with four and declined to take a late penalty that would have given him a record tally of five in a competitive

Stones match) although goals two and three came either side of the half time break so conceivably there was a minute or so of injury time to add to that.

It was a similar story for Greg Ngoyi whose brilliant hat trick at Harrow Borough in Easter 2009 came in nine minutes. His third goal came just after half time so again might have included some added time - but we didn't care about it then, and even less so now!

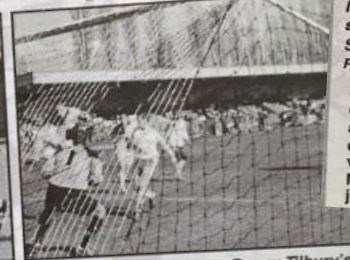
●When Ross Lafayette grabbed that terrific hat-trick at Weymouth on August 26, it **WASN'T** his first for the club as widely believed.

IF YOU are old enough to have enjoyed Enfield 0 Wealdstone 1 (Conference top-of-the-table clash, January 1983) and Enfield 0 Wealdstone 2 (FA Trophy Semi-Final, 1st leg, April 1985), how did Saturday's 8-0 whitewash of the Es compare? Pretty favourably, actually, was the general opinion among the old lags on the Meadow Park terraces. Maybe the game was not quite as important (although the rampant scoreline was as good as an extra point in our promotion quest) and clearly this Enfield side weren't quite as good as Eddie McCluskey's mid-1960s vintage but it still extraordi-

narily satisfying to thump ANY Enfield side. For the record, after a goalless 1st half, Danny Tilbury cracked a glorious left-foot opener on the volley; Gary McKeown's 20-yarder made it 2-0; Richard Jolly's Thierry Henry-like strike made it three; Tommy Williams whipped in cross set up Tilbury for 4-0; Tommy himself saw a 25-yard shot bobble under the unfortunate Collier for five; then substitute Jermaine Beckford came on and promptly scored three smart goals to wrap it up.


