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

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LOVE FOOTBALL. PROTECT THE GAME

Every football fan should feel safe when watching their team. But last season we saw a minority of supporters ruining the game for others. That's why we're supporting strong measures across football to tackle antisocial and criminal behaviours within football grounds.

These include entering the pitch without permission, carrying or using smoke bombs or pyros and throwing objects onto the pitch, as well as discriminatory behaviour and taking drugs. All of these are illegal, dangerous and have no place in our game. For everyone's safety, clubs will report anyone carrying out these offences to the police, which can result in a permanent criminal record. These measures could also now apply to the parents or guardians of children involved in these activities.

From the start of the 2022/23 season, anyone who enters the pitch and those carrying or using smoke bombs and pyros will now automatically be banned by their club. These measures reflect the seriousness of the risks to fans and staff – pyros can burn at 2000 degrees Celsius and cause life-changing injuries, while entering the pitch endangers players, managers and match offcials – it is impossible for anyone to tell the difference between a celebrating fan and a violent attacker.

The football authorities are working with clubs and the Football Supporters' Association to make sure everyone feels safe on matchdays. We ask all fans to come together to show that those who commit these illegal acts do not represent the majority of supporters.

GROUND REGULATIONS

People are only allowed entry to The Vale on match days subject to the following rules and regulations:

1) The club reserves the right to eject from the ground any person who is considered to have committed any of the following acts:

Entering the ground through any means other than through the turnstiles or entrances

Entering the field of play before, during or after a game without prior authorisation

- Being drunk, or under the influence of alcohol or drugs - Using violence of any nature

- Carrying items which may be considered a danger to others, including cans, bottles, or glasses containing alcoholic beverages

• Throwing any article onto the field of play • Climbing floodlight pylons, fences, stands or any structure or building • Using obscene or bad language likely to cause offence to others • Hitting the side or back panels of the Bulla stand

No spectator ball games.
 The consumption of alcoholic drinks is permitted INSIDE the social club bar, garden and boardroom areas.

Vehicles parked on the Grosvenor Vale site are at the owners' risk.

5) Wealdstone Football Club supports the FA's campaign on pyrotechnics (e.g. flares and smoke bombs). Any misuse of such items in and around the Ground will result in those responsible being asked to leave the ground and, in line with football authority guidance, may result in a report to the Police, potential prosecution and a ban from the Club of up to three years. Smoking or Vaping inside the ground.

THE STONES INTERVIEW

lufela Olomola is going to live long in the memory. Not just because he's stolen all the Ls for a vowel-laden Scrabble score, but because his infectious attitude is exactly what the Stones need this season.

"I've had a lot of knock-backs in my career and I recognise now that I need to look hard at myself - I can only affect what I do, I can't blame anyone else and I've got back the hunger I had a few years ago" he confessed when we caught up for a (lengthy) chat after the Bromley game.

"And I can't thank the gaffer, Stuart, enough for believing in me. I'm so grateful for his trust in me, that I can be a main player and be handed the No.9 shirt".

That may sound incredibly humble for a young man who was in the Southampton first team squad, travelling to Europa League games and even making his Saints debut at the age of 18 in a League Cup win over Sunderland.

But he admits that - despite scoring regularly in the EFL when out on loan - a combination of bad luck and bad injuries meant that he was without a club in the summer for the first time after leaving Hartlepool.

"Those months were a struggle for me" said 'Fela' as he likes to be known. "I'm 24 now and just coming up to my peak years as a striker, that's why I'm so appreciative of Stuart recognising what I have to offer.

"And I'm ready to seize this opportunity - I was brought up in Harrow and it really feels like I'm coming home, that this is my club".

emember the David Sesay interview last season? The Sierra Leone international who was brought up in Harrow Weald? Well Fela hails from even closer to the club's original roots - he's from Headstone Drive!

The livewire striker laughed as he described how he is now back living within a long goal kick from our old Lower Mead ground.

"Yeah, yeah, I know all about Wealdstone - my dad Ola told me about the club and he's been the biggest influence on my

career. Lots of travelling and taking me to training and games since the age of six or seven - a big commitment!"

'Fela' went to Cedars Manor Primary School with Dave Sesay and first played youth football for Parkfield. Fellow fan Sudhir Rawal (who writes in this programme) was involved with Harrow St Mary Youth in those days - mainly through his goalkeeping son Nikhil - and he remembers HSM luring young Fela to play for their Harrow rivals as they were short of forwards.

"I played up front with Dapo Afoloyan (who now

plays for Bolton) and his dad and mine were good friends" recalls Fela.

"I played up a year and when I was eight I went on a big trial with all the best kids in London. and joined the Arsenal academy. I was at Hatch End High School when, at

16 I was offered a scholarship at the Gunners.... but there so many bright forwards I decided to try elsewhere.

"West Ham and Newcastle offered scholarships

but Southampton had the best academy and the best manager in Mauricio Pocchettino. It was the best fit for me, and though I had to go and live in digs down there my career really took off".

ela was made skipper iof the Saints' under-18s and handed a pro contract. And then he was on the bench for a Premier League game against Sunderland, at St Mary's, "It was a great period for me. I was in the first team squad and playing and training every day, involved in the Europa League set-up and travelled to Inter Milan as a squad player - and then I made my Saints debut off the bench against Sunderland (again) at St Mary's in the League Cup.

"I thought I might get a few minutes but Jav Rodrigues suffered a head injury after 30

> mins and I played the final hour in our 1-0 victory. What a great experience!"

Fela played up top with Lloyd Isgrove on a night when the veteran Jermain Defoe was playing for the opposition.

Did he mould his game on people like the ex-England star Defoe?

"That's interesting because he came alive in the box, a pure goal poacher" said Fela. "I see myself as more of a nine and a half rather than a No.9!" he laughed. "I like to get involved more in the game, be a bit

unpredictable... you might see me on the shoulders of defenders and running in behind, and then dropping a bit deeper to pick up the ball in the pockets".

"You were a bit of a poacher when you put us ahead against Bromley though" I told him.

"True!" he said, "That was the sort of goal you need if you're going to get 20 or 25 a season, and I just read where the ball was going to drop after their keeper had pulled off that amazing save from Max (Kretzschmar).

"Charles-Cooke (the Bromley keeper) was very decent, I can see why he's so highly rated" said Fela. "He made two more saves from me.

one from a freekick and one from a header that I really should have scored. You're coached to head back across the keeper but he read where I was going to put it".

t was that eye for a goal that endeared Fela to the Yeovil Town fans when he went to the then-League Two on loan at the age of 19, for six months.

"A bit like now at Wealdstone, I had a manager there who played a system that suited me and I got seven goals in 12 games - including two on my debut in a 3-2 win over Accrington Stanley at Huish Park. Two decent goals too... the first a sweet left foot finish on edge of the box, then a lob over the keeper. I was man of the match!"

Those figures helped Fela win a three-year contract at League One Scunthorpe, where he had former Stones star Abobaker Eisa for company. "Abo was great, a real handful for defenders and he told me about his beginnings at Wealdstone and how the club had nurtured him.

"But it didn't work out for me at Scunny. I started the first game against Coventry which we won, but I wasn't great. And then I didn't really get a sniff again for three or four weeks. I was offered to chance to go on loan again to Yeovil, where I was welcomed with open arms... but I don't know,

my hunger had gone. Maybe I was complacent having won a three-year contract at Scunthorpe. Whetever it was, it was part of my journey and I know now that you have to be consistent, mentally and physically strong, 100% of the time".

He scored three for the Glovers in 17 games but his game time at Scunthorpe was limited by a series of injuries. There was another loan at Carlisle, scoring five in 27 games but the gameplan (after boss Steven

Pressley was sacked) was 'a bit Boreham Wood" according to Fela!

"It was a direct, chasingthe-ball style under Chris Beech and I only started one game. Then Scunthorpe released me during the depressing Covid season and I went on trial at Hartlepool.... and scored four goals off the bench in the second half as 'Triallist A" in a pre-season game at Runcorn!"

hat performance was hard to ignore by the just-promoted Pool and manager Dave Challinor snapped him up on a one-year deal. "It wasn't a bad season in League

Two, and we had an FA Cup game against Crystal Palace, but after Challinor left for Stockport my face didn't fit" said Fela.

He played the last three games of last season against Sunthorpe, Swindon and Colchester but was then released... luckily for us!


"I'm really pleased I signed for the Stones. The coaching has been excellent, really innovative and everyone gets on in the squad. Football's not always like that!

"We had a good bonding session after the Bedford trip and it was tough to make my Wealdstone debut against QPR's first team but that was an interesting game.

"Then the opening league game against Bromley: That was always going to be a test and we knew we couldn't get into a fight with them 'cos they were so big they'd win! We just had to do what we do best, keep the ball moving and thankfully it paid off.

"But this is still very early days. We've achieved nothing yet and there are bits of our game that we have to improve. Personally I feel that nobody's seen the best of me yet. There's a lot to come!"

The spirit and sheer determination to keep the club alive when others were folding made me feel, and still does, that our club would always be special. This is why I wanted to put

SUPPORTER PROFILE: BERNARD BENHAM

The Fan in the

96-year-old Ben was in the Navy, sinking subs & seeing the sights, but his biggest passion is football and following his beloved Stones

ernard Benham - known as Ben right back to his days in the Royal Navy - is now 96 years old and possibly the longest surviving Stones fan.

Alan Couch and Lew Sheppard are definitely the oldest regular supporters but it is a pleasure today to chronicle the life of the almost-centurion Ben who now lives in Oxhey, close to Bushey Arches. Just 100 yards from my own dear Mum in fact, who coincidentally is also 96. Ben's daughter Caroline joked that we should perhaps set them up on a date... zimmer frames and all :)

Ben, like my mum Pat, clearly has all his marbles and he was such a globetrotter in his youth he might even have been to Elgin!

"I've had a great life and football has always been at the heart of it" he says. "I was born in 1926

in West Drive, Harrow Weald - it was originally stables in the farmhouse there, but it's still all fields at the end of that road, leading up to Grimsdyke. Good views all over London from there - I remember in 1937 seeing a terrific glow



in the sky and it was Crystal Palace burning down! A terrible sight and it destroyed the building completely".

It was around that time that young Bernard was at a loose end one Saturday afternoon and his Mum asked their neighbour (Sgt Garrard based at the Wealdstone police station) if he'd take 'Ben' to watch the football with his own son.

"I didn't know much about it but it was very exciting" he said."It was 1937 and Stones were a good Athenian

League side (they always finished fourth in the 18-team league around that time) and of course the crowds at

in their thousands.
"We stood on the
High Mead side, which

Lower Mead were big.





was later concreted - but I can't say I was a regular until I came out of the Navy ten years later".

Ben had been a young sea cadet at Kenton when the War started. His main memory was the Battle of Britain raging over London and Harrow Weald was a scary place to be with the Kodak Factory to the south west and Bentley Priory (wartime operations) to the East being targeted by the Luftwaffe.

"The searchlights at Belmont used to pick up the bombers but quite a few big 'uns fell in the nearby fields, creating big holes! Just a few horses were killed. As kids we collected shrapnel and the nose cones from the bombs".

When Ben was 16 he was drafted into the Navy. "They had lost so many trained signalmen and telegraphers they were keen to use our sea cadets training in semaphore - I joined HMS Foudoyant in Portsmouth Harbour, then went up to Chatham before I saw active service with the HMS Redmill in Scotland.

"We were patrolling The Minches - the sea lanes around the Inner and Outer Hebrides and caught one German U-boat trying to sneak through. We depth-charged it, blew it up"

Ben's next major action on Redmill was the race down the Irish Sea to help out at the D-Day evacuation of thousands of Allied troops from Normandy, northern France.

"We were trying to protect all the ferrying boats from the submarines and we caught a torpedo astern one morning. Hitler had brought in ten new subs encased in rubber which stopped our radar and sonic from picking them up... they just lay on the seabed while the ships passed over them, unawares. If he had ordered more of them, Germany would have won the war!

"As it was, we lost 49 men that day. I was lucky as I was at the front of the boat and the Americans managed to tow us to safety".

en's war wound down after 1945 with a memorable trip from Southampton to Algiers with 500 Wrens and WRAFS (female navy and airforce personnel) to Algiers. "I can't tell you what went on on that boat. But I was sad when I had to get off at Malta where we were involved in the Gibraltar air-sea rescue.

"We patrolled the flight path leading to the Americans' Air base at the Azores but spent most of our time fishing for sharks!


"Then It was over to Egypt where we drove jeeps around Cairo, to the Pyramids and Botanical Gardens."

Civilian life after being demobbed must have seemed a bit tame, but first of all the servicemen were all kitted out at Chatham Barracks with a suit, shirts, overcoat and trilby hat... the perfect outfit in which to return to Harrow Weald!

"The job I wanted was as a bus conductor at the Bus Garage but there were no jobs there - but they had no vacancies so I began what was to be a 45-year career on the railways at Swiss Cottage, as a porter. Then I trained as a guard on the Bakerloo

fter his return to Harrow, Ben took up his passion for Wealdstone FC again... a great time in the club's history as the Polish strikers Henryk Wegrzyk and Henryk Mikrut (both posted to Britain and staying on after the war) transformed the Stones into Athenian Championship material

"They were brilliant - one great in the air, the other great on the ground - but there were other stars like the winger, Phil White, who was signed by Orient and the fullback Tommy McGhee who went to Portsmouth in the league.

"The goalkeeper, Danny Wiltshire (pictured right) was also a star around that time. We had an EA Cup run that included a 1-0 win over Colchester at Lower Mead - with over 9,000 in the ground - and the only goal he conceded in seven game was the only goal of the First Round Proper tie at Third Division leaders Port Vale".

Apparently, at the end of that game small boys implored the heroic Stones team as they came off the pitch: 'Leave us your goalkeeper, mister!'

"I used to go with my mate Len Wiggins and his brother Cyril, walking down from Harrow Weald but you had to get there early to grab a good spot to watch the game. "

"Did you have a bite to eat, or a beer on the way?" I asked him.

"No, because Len was a teetotaller. I'd been in the Navy with him and he was very popular 'cos he never used his rum ration. Didn't use his tobacco leaf ration either!"

In 1951 Ben got married to Kathleen, his wife of 40 years until she died of cancer in 1991. They moved to a maisonette in Garston, North Watford and had four children - Caroline, Christine,

Denise and Stephen.

Unluckily for the Stones, that move meant he was more likely to go and watch Watford at Vicarage Road - though it wasn't such a hard switch in the early 50s as The Hornets also wore blue and white!

"After we'd moved to Watford I put in a works







transfer to the Watford Bakerloo depot, but that service was gradually diminished by Barbara Castle (the minister for transport) from 13 trains to eight, then down to four in total. It meant the last train left London at 7.30pm on Sundays!" he said, shaking his head.

He later worked at Stonebridge park and it was coming back from a night shift that he narrowly avoided the terrible 1952 Harrow & Wealdstone train tragedy.

112 people were killed and 340 injured one morning when the fast train from Bletchley collided with a commuter train that was waiting in the station.

"Our train was just approaching the road bridge when it happened... we all jumped off and went to help, with Americans coming over from the Ruislip airbase to help out. Funnily enough my sister Beryl was in another train approaching the station but hers pulled up short too. We both did what we could to help but it was a terrible, terrible sight".

o what's his view of the current Wealdstone FC? "Well it was a real mess up, by the sound of it, the sale of Lower Mead and moving to Watford" he said. "Totally different grounds. And what about the move to the Hive? Did that fall through for similar reasons? I've only been to Grosvenor Vale a few times and for health reasons I am pretty much confined to home. But I follow everything on the internet and Twitter - what great improvements have been made to that ground! I was there the last time for the 1966 Amateur Cup winners lunch reunion five or six years ago.

"And the ground had been transformed since then. I always like the slope at Lower Mead so I'm glad Ruislip has one too!

"That lunch was really good, really entertaining. Because I was at the final in 1966, right behind the goal where the late goals went in to seal the match against Hendon, and then I got the chance to talk to those players 50 years later. Really friendly too, and I had a good long natter with the famous referee that day, Norman Burtenshaw.

"I'd like to try and get along with my daughter Caroline for another home game - her four children and her grandchildren have all been to the Vale but I do stay in touch and cheer every win.

"You never forget your first love - I'm a Wealdstone fan and I always will be"

ollowing the demise of Halifax Town AFC at the end of the 2007-2008 season, a new Club was born and re-formed just in time for the 2008-2009 season. The new Football Club was placed in Level Four of the Non-League pyramid, taking a place in the Northern Premier League Unibond North One and it was called FC Halifax Town.

Time was short and the new Club was faced with appointing a new Manager and bringing a team together from scratch in only five weeks.


Jim Vince, a coach in the Crewe Alexandra Football Academy working closely with Crewe Manager Dario Grady and a former Manager of Witton Albion in the Unibond Premier Division, achieving two consecutive second places in the previous two seasons, was appointed.

Pre –season friendlies were hastily arranged and the first ever game by the Club was played at Tamworth, when 22 trialists made appearances for the Club, trying to catch the eye of the new Manager.

The first ever official game for FC Halifax Town was a home game against Bamber Bridge at the Shay Stadium. For the Halifax fans, it was an emotionally charged game; as they were so relieved to see their beloved 'Shaymen' play a real game of football again, after all the heartache of previous years.

Over 1,500 fans attended the game, watching a team that barely knew one another. Perhaps with a possible sign of things to come, the Club went in at half-time 0-0, but ended up losing the game 3-0. Not the best of starts!

Disappointingly, the team had a mediocre first season and for whatever reason, Jim Vince struggled to get things going with any real conviction on the




pitch, culminating in a far from satisfactory 8th place, even missing out on a Play-Off place. A new Club and striving for stability and continuity, reluctantly the Board had to make a change, with Jim Vince leaving the position prior to the end of the season and player, Nigel Jemson taking the club though to the end of the season.

Players who have gone on to play at a higher level include from that season include, Junior Brown in League Two at Fleetwood Town, Colin Daniel a loanee who is now playing in League Two also with Mansfield Town and Gavin Rothery at Guiseley.

An early appointment was made for the 2009-2010 season, with Neil Aspin joining from Conference North side, Harrogate Town.

Despite dropping two divisions, he was confident of a bright future for the Football Club and was ready for the challenge of moving the club further up the pyramid. A mixture of new recruits, players known to him and some already involved with the Club from the previous season, he set about trying to establish a successful team. As we all know, achieving promotion from any division is a huge challenge and the early pace setters were Lancaster City, scoring goals for fun with striker Jordan

a rich vein of form, gaining him a move to Crewe Alexandra and seemingly winning games, no matter what.

At one stage in the second half of the season, they held a twelve-point lead over the Shaymen, although Halifax had lost a lot of games through postponement due to the weather.

Fighting their way through the backlog, the ultimate period in the second season and the moment at which Halifax moved into pole position in the league was an eventful three match period spread over six days in the final third of the season. The first game was Garforth away on a Thursday night, two minutes to go the Shaymen were losing 3-1. A goal for the Shaymen pulled it back to 3-2. The referee announces four extra minutes and in the 91st minute another goal made it 3-3. Everyone was delighted, equalising so late and hopefully securing an unlikely point out from the game. What drama was to follow. With the last kick of the game. Richard Marshall thirty yards away from goal, produced an exquisite lob to beat the keeper for a 4-3 win. Despite Lancaster winning on the same night, they were told the Shaymen had lost, so what a shock when they got back on their coach, only to find Halifax had won so late in the game. A real night of drama!

Our next home game on the Saturday? You

guessed, Lancaster City at home at the Shay Stadium. In front of over three thousand fans, the afternoon was electric, and Halifax won the game comfortably, 4 nil and taking over the leadership of the division. The following Monday evening was a tough away game at Curzon Ashton who were also in the play-off places and Halifax recorded a stunning 5 nil away win. From then on, momentum carried the team to its first promotion as Champions, with 100 points and over 100 goals.

A step up to the newly sponsored EvoStik
Premier division. With some more astute signings
and the average age of the team being reduced,
Halifax tried to emulate the previous season.

Again, the Club achieved promotion and the Championship, with five games to spare, missing the 100 points by just two and again scoring over 100 goals. As in the previous season, the Club just missed out on the 1st Round proper of the FA Cup, losing to Wrexham in 2009-10 to a 97th pile-driver and 2010-11 to a 1 nil defeat against Mansfield Town.

A nice recognition for the Club was goalkeeper Jonathan Hedge being called in to the England 'C' squad as he had also been chosen in the previous season. The only blot on a wonderful season was the emotional loss of Neil's assistant Trevor Storton, who sadly died after a long battle with cancer. He was with the team nearly all the way, passing away just before our promotion was secured. Promotion was a fitting tribute to a wonderful man.

So, 2011-2012 saw the arrival in the Football Conference and the Blue Square Bet North division. Another tough challenge made all the harder with the departure of star striker Jamie Vardy, after only four games of the new season. Jamie moved to then Conference Premier, Fleetwood Town and soon to be Champions, making their way into the Football League for the first time in their history.

Jamie shortly made a second move to Championship Club, Leicester City becoming the first £1m non-league player. Despite that set-back on the pitch, the Shaymen battled their way to a play-off position, to meet Gainsborough Trinity. In the away first leg, a disastrous start being two nil down in the

first twenty minutes and seeing very little of the ball.

Two Lee Gregory goals, one just before half time and one midway through the second half brought the Shaymen back into the tie for the second leg. In front of over three thousand fans in the second leg, Town could not turn their superiority in to goals and lost to a set piece, one nil.

The season was also highlighted by finally achieving the FA Cup First Round Proper and what a draw. League One leaders Charlton Athletic who were to go up as Champions and the game also being chosen for national live TV broadcast. Managing to stay in the game one nil until the 80th minute was very creditable, but once Danny Lowe was harshly sent-off, the team eventually lost 4 nil. Nevertheless, what a great day and profile for the Club.

Understanding the league, a little more, Neil Aspin brought in one or two fresh faces for the 2012-2013 campaign and said 'goodbye' to some good players, who had helped the Club progress so much.

This season was the hardest for the Club since reformation, only due to the number of match cancellations, both home and away for a variety of reasons, but mainly the incredible amount of rain. The fixture backlog and numerous re-arrangements took their toll and Halifax would have to do well, playing so many games a week to secure a play-off spot.

This they did in fifth place and faced a local derby against Guiseley in the semis, who were in the playoffs for the third consecutive season. Chester FC had walked away with the Championship. After a 1 all draw at the Shay Stadium, Halifax managed a two-nil deserved win away at Nethermoor, with Gregory and Johnson getting the goals. So, to the

Final and a long trip to Brackley, who in their first season has done tremendously well and it was going to be a difficult tie. In a tight game perhaps dominated by the Shaymen, Lee Gregory scored the only goal of the game to send the fans in to raptures and earn a place in the Conference Premier division, for the first time in their history. A great achievement in five years with three promotions, but everyone involved with the Club knows this will be a tough campaign and despite that, everyone is up for

the challenge and look forward to welcoming everyone to Halifax and the Shay Stadium.

The following season FC Halifax Town finished 5th in the Skrill Premier and the play-offs beckoned again, this time with the chance of a Wembley final and promotion to the Football League. However, despite a 1-0 home win over Cambridge United at the Shay, a 2-0 defeat at the Abbey Stadium saw Cambridge head to Wembley.

Neil Aspin promised several changes over the summer, which he has duly promised. However, just a few games into the season, Aspin departed the Club having been in charge for over 300 games. Aspin's departure would kickstart the managerial merry-go-round that was to come in the next few years.

Gareth McClelland, Darren Kelly, and Jim Harvey all had spells in charge during the 2015/16 season. The season was to be one of mixed emotions as Town were relegated from the National League. A terrible start to the season was then met by a revival under Harvey but the damage was already done.

Despite the relegation, The Shaymen made it to Wembley for the first time in their history. FC Halifax Town beat Nantwich Town 6-4 on aggregate to reach the final of the FA Trophy. Grimsby Town were the opponents that day and an early second half goal from Scott McManus was enough to give the Town fans their dream day out in the capital as The Shaymen lifted the FA Trophy.

The 2016/17 season saw another manager in charge as Billy Heath took over the coaching duties and was able to guide Town straight back to the National League. Town had finished 3rd in the National League North and were promoted after winning the playoff final against Chorley.

Heath's second season in charge did not get off to a good start as Town languished near the bottom of the league. Eventually, the decision was made to part ways with Billy Heath and Neil Young was given the role of caretaker manager until Jamie Fullarton, was instated on a permanent basis.

Fullarton managed to save The Shaymen

from relegation in 2017/18 as they ended up finishing 16th.

In the 2018/19 season, Town

had one of the highest clean sheet records but struggled for goals and finished in mid table. However, Jamie Fullarton decided to leave

the Club in mid-July and former Oldham boss Pete Wild took charge for the 2019/20 season.

Wild guided The Shaymen to a 6th placed finish after 37 matches - due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the season was cut short in late-March. Halifax played the final televised National League game that season – a 1-0 loss to Ebbsfleet, this would be Town's last game up until the league made the decision to go ahead with the play-offs.

This resulted in Town playing Boreham Wood away in the National League Play-Off eliminator in July – four months after the season ended abruptly. The Shaymen unfortunately lost the match, after going 1-0 up through Tobi Sho-Silva, the Wood came back to win 2-1.

Wild is tasked with another season as the boss at the Shay and has had a summer overhaul ahead of the 2020/21 season.

The 2020/21 season was one that started with inconsistency for FC Halifax Town but three consecutive wins in early December ensured that the Shaymen's season got going.

It was an unusual season in that matches were played without supporters in the ground which affected FC Halifax Town as well as a plethora of teams up and down THE COUNTRY.

After the three successive wins, Halifax's form dipped slightly and this could have led to a derailing of the season however, 4 wins in March

on the trot meant that the Shaymen were at the upper echelons of the table and harboured ambitions of the play-offs.

These ambitions appeared realistic when after a 4-2 victory at home to Kings Lynn Town, FC Halifax Town sat 5th and in the

play off places but inconsistency towards the end of the season plagued them.

They had an outside chance of the play offs on the final day of the season at home to Chesterfield in front of their own fans but unfortunately lost 2-1 and the play off dream was over. The club finished 10th.

But despite that, it still represented a good season for the Shaymen in the oddest of circumstances and let us hope that the Shay is back to full capacity or somewhere near that by August.

Pete Wild, the manager, will take confidence from parts of the season and will look to for the new season, to eradicate the inconsistency from the beginning and end of the season.

Town had a great start to the season for the 2020/21 and got to the quarter finals of the FA Trophy. However, after defeat to Wrexham in the quarter finals, the season petered out and Town finished in mid table.

Last season, the Shaymen finished 4th in the table with the best home record in the Vanarama National League but lost out in the play-off eliminator against Chesterfield.

1. SAM JOHNSON - GOAL KEEPER

The goalkeeper is Halifax's longest-serving player, having first appeared for the Shaymen on-loan in the 2015-16 season - the same season he was part of the FCHT side that won the FA Trophy. Johnson then had a second loan spell in 2017 – during both loan periods the 6'7 keeper was contracted at Port Vale. In May 2017, the Valiants released Johnson and he subsequently joined Halifax on a permanent deal. Sam has since played over 250 league games.

2. TYLOR GOLDEN - DEFENCE

The full-back came through the youth ranks at Wigan Athletic, making his debut in the EFL Trophy against Middlesbrough U23s. Whilst with Wigan, Golden spent time on loan at Droylsden and Nantwich Town before being released in June 2020. Tylor joined from Salford City who he joined in 2020.

3. JACK SENIOR - DEFENCE

A left-sided player who can operate as a full-back or wing-back. Senior is Calderdale-born - making him popular amongst the fans as a hometown lad - he signed for the Shaymen in the summer of 2020. Before playing for Halifax, Jack began his youth career at a local amateur side, then getting snapped up by Huddersfield Town - where he spent nine years. The defender spent one of his nine years in the first team at Huddersfield, before joining Luton Town in 2016; he played 10 league games in three years. He has also had a loan spell at Harrogate Town and a permanent outing with Gloucester City before ending up at the Shav.

6. JAMIE STOTT - DEFENCE

Jamie joined from Stockport County. The centre-back began his career with Oldham Athletic, rising through the youth team before making four appearances in League One for the club. During his time with Oldham, the 24-year-old spent time on loan at Curzon Ashton in the National League North, AFC Fylde in the National League and Stockport before making the move permanent in July 2020.





9. EMMANUEL DIESERUVWE **FORWARD**

Emmanuel Dieseruvwe has joined the Shavmen following his release from League Two side Tranmere Rovers. Dieseruvwe began his career at Sheffield Wednesday, progressing through the youth ranks before signing his first professional contract in 2013. Whilst with Wednesday, the striker was sent on loan to Hyde, Fleetwood Town, and Chesterfield before signing with the Spireites permanently in 2015. In 2016 Dieseruvwe made the move to National League North side Kidderminster Harriers and had a brief spell with Boston United during the season before being released by Kidderminster at the end of the 2016/17 campaign. The striker was picked up by then National League North side Salford City. In 2019 Dieseruvwe opened the scoring in the National League play-off final against AFC Fylde, helping Salford reach the Football League for the first time in their history. Just a few months later Dieseruvwe netted Salford's first ever league goal in 2-0 win over Stevenage. Following his release from Salford in 2021, Dieseruvwe signed for League Two side Tranmere Rovers and made 12 appearances in all competitions before joining Grimsby Town on loan in February 2022.

11. SAM SMART - MIDFIELD

Sam joined the Shaymen from Eastleigh. The 23-year-old made 27 appearances in the National League last season, including substitute appearances in both games against Town. Smart began his career playing for

various local clubs before earning a move to Portsmouth and featured in their community development team. The winger went on to join Basingstoke. In 2019, Smart made the move to Eastleigh.

15. TOM CLARKE - DEFENCE

Clarke came through the academy at Huddersfield Town and went on to make over 100 appearances for the Terriers, mainly in League One. During his time with Huddersfield, Clarke spent time on loan with the Shaymen in 2008, as well as spells with Bradford City and Leyton Orient. Whilst with Huddersfield, Clarke was also capped by England at both under 18s and under 19's level. In 2013, Clarke joined Preston North End, then of League One. During his seven years with Preston, The defender helped them gain promotion to the Championship, winning the playoffs in 2015. Following his time at Preston, Clarke signed for Salford City and made 30 appearances in League Two for the Ammies as they finished in 8th place, narrowly missing out on the playoffs. Following the conclusion of the 2020-21 season. Clarke was released and went on to sign for Fleetwood Town in League One. The defender made 35 appearances in the league, helping Fleetwood to a 20th placed finish, only avoiding the drop on

goal difference.

Jordan joined the Shaymen from League Two side Stockport County. Keane has previously spent time at Stoke, Alfreton, Lincoln City, Nuneaton, Worcester City and Boston United before signing for Stockport in 2018. The versatile player, who can play in both midfield and defence, played a crucial role in their 2018-19 National League North title winning season. Keane made over 100 appearances for the 'Hatters', including 25 appearances in their Vanarama National League title triumph.

19. JAMIE COOKE - MIDFIELD

Signed last summer, Cooke was a real impressive sight for Halifax in Pre-Season. The Scouse attacking midfielder was picked up after a compensation fee was paid to Colne, and it was at Fleetwood Town where Cooke first came onto the scene through their youth ranks.

20. HARVEY GILMOUR - MIDFIELD

A central midfielder who has been at the Shay since the summer of 2021, Gilmour has played for Sheffield United, Tranmere Rovers & Stockport County before his move to Halifax Town. Gilmour's game time has been limited at previous clubs, but he has shown his attributes in plenty of minutes at FCHT.

25. JORDAN SLEW - FORWARD

A striker who joined Halifax last summer Slew was a one-million-pound signing when Blackburn Rovers acquired his signature from Sheffield United in 2011. The striker spent four years with Rovers – having loan spells out to Stevenage, Oldham Athletic, Rotherham United, Ross County & Port Vale. He then signed for Cambridge United in 2015, where he spent two seasons. Slew has since

turned out for Chesterfield, Plymouth Argyle, Rochdale, Boston & Morecambe – it was at the Shrimpers where he was in the side that won promotion to League One.

CHRIS MILLINGTON - MANAGER

New manager of FC Halifax Town – appointed May 2022





this was good news surely. Thanks Steve for the contribution though, I'm sure it was a labour of love and anyone who makes the effort is OK by me.


Just maybe I might now have a little more time on my hands due to my new found three-day working week.

'Love is in the Air' by John Paul Young (not to be confused with our own commercial supremo John Young).

Every home match thereafter, Love is in the Air would be broadcast from the Lower Mead tannoy box, sometimes both before the match and at half time. Such a football song. Chic Adams had taken over from Bill Emerson on tannoy duties at that time and it was he who spun the decks, occasionally interrupting Love in the Air to spin the other 45 from the Ariola collection, none of which were hits and therefore thankfully don't serve as painful earworms to this day.

You may not know that Love is in the Air was written by George Young, not related to John,

and also not the same George Young who served on the Stones' General Services Committee for years. Our George was memorable in his own right for his Sunday lunchtime raffles in the Lower Mead social club.

If you went to our FA Cup 3rd round tie at QPR in January 1978, you would have been treated to the Ariola flyer (pictured left) inside every match programme. It featured a ridiculous cartoon representing no football fan I've ever come across.

Where would we be without ARCHIVES? I'm desperately in

need of an updated player and season statistics booklet to supplement and/or consolidate the various pieces of literature produced over the years by the late great Roy Couch, Pete Worby and Roger Slater amongst others.

omething that can be referred to as required when some trivial event crops up that needs instant checking to satisfy curiosity. A good recent example was when Altrincham announced the signing of *ALEX* Samizadeh, with Wealdstone in 2018 listed among his former clubs. Now this was a name that didn't immediately stir any memories for me, but thankfully the flurry of twitter activity on the subject that followed revealed that he was a part of one of the Stones' more underwhelm-

ing triple signings in recent times, along with Pawel Kowalkowski and Ogo Obi. Alex and Pawel both featured in one of the most miserable days of the Wilkinson era, the Matt Ball defeat at Biggleswade. Enough said. All three would not go on to have distinguished Wealdstone careers, although that they have made it into this article is an achievement in itself.


ARTIFICIAL pitches, who likes them? Not me for sure, there's something very special about grass and I really don't think I'd enjoy watching the Stones play on these abominations every week. What can beat the spectacle of players covered in mud and sliding through puddles, not that we get much of that these days with current day pitches. I don't recall which match but I certainly have a memory of an almost certain goal being scored at Lower

Mead only for the ball to stick in the mud enabling the beaten keeper to recover and save. (It was George Urquart who rounded the Arsenal goalkeeper in the famous FA Challenge Cup game at Lower Mead in the autumn of 1971 - sad Fd).

Unfortunately the artificial pitch is something we are having to get used to more and more, and even our pre-season friendlies were blighted by playing on 3 such surfaces. The Hendon groundsman was especially precious about his new carpet, and truth be known he really wasn't happy about the footballers going

on it at all. It certainly wasn't good news Dorking and Maidstone getting promoted, and many hoped that Wood and Bromley would have managed at least one of the promotion slots between them. Whilst one can understand the commercial benefits, the artificial pitch is certainly a Room 101 entry for me.

AFC, or Association Football Club. An abbreviation synonymous with phoenix clubs, those who failed, folded and reformed, or some other such story. Gladly we've never gone down that route despite facing many challenges over the years. It wasn't always the way, and the first 'AFC' club may in actual fact have been AFC Bournemouth back in 1971, the intention being to appear 1st in alphabeti-

Rather than fight for their club, fans of Wimbledon decided to do their own thing after the idea of a trip to Milton Kevnes proved unpopular.

What really annoys me about this is that the consortium that was looking to take a football team to Milton Keynes approached a number of clubs. One of those Barnet, now surely that would have been a better choice?

nother nonfavourite amongst Stones

fans in the 'ĀFC' category would certainly be **AFC HORNCHURCH**, a boom-and-bust club that play in a horrible ground and inflicted some horrible results on us during our time at their level. Farn-borough also qualify for this horror category by association, although they re-formed without the AFC tag.

AVELEY – a good reason to enjoy being in the National League.

John **ARNOLD** signed for the club at the beginning of the 1976-77 season. The first sight of him for Stones fans was in the Harrow Observer pictured at pre-season training with a triallist who we later found out was Alan Fursden. See newspaper cutting above.

On his debut in a friendly against Torquay he was described thus in the Harrow Observer, 'skilful bundle of energy. looked an asset on either flank and in the middle.' A few months later both Arnold and Fursden were sent off on the famous I ennie Prince FA Cup defeat at Reading. with manager Geoff Coleman commenting afterwards that

'if Arnold had any brains he would be dangerous'. My friend Tim seems to think Arnold had such a big hooter he could cross the ball with his nose. I remain unconvinced.

We didn't really see much more of John Arnold: he only started 14 competitive matches scoring 2 goals in that FA Cup run, but I enjoyed watching him that season.

On the subject of Arnold, in my student days in Nottingham I ground-hopped to see **ARNOLD FC**, then managed by the late Ivan Hollett. Anyone remember his screaming goal for Poole Town in our 3-2 win one Sunday there in 1974 during the fuel crisis?

And.... that's your lot for this week, we'll be back next time.

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

Tuesday August 20, 1974, Southern League Premier Division: Wealdstone 4 Dartford 1

any people have an ability to remember names, scientific equations, bus numbers, the alcolohol percentage of beers or every stop on the London Underground system. Some of them anyway.

My ability is to remember dates. It comes in handy when you have a glut of children and grandchildren, and especially when one comes to researching matches from the past for this feature.

August 20th! Wow, what a day in Stones history a handful of games immediately spring to mind, and they seem to have a special resonance as the season has only just kicked off.

Hopes are still high of recovery after a poor start. And after a good start the hopes are skyrocketing for a stellar season. Such was the case 48 years ago when I was just 17 and besotted with the Stones... and so, so excited at how we'd started our debut season in the Southern League Premier Division.

The Southern Prem these days is two levels below the National League, but back in 1974 it was joint top of the non-League tree (alongside the Northern Premier League) and its clubs

nominally had the chance for promotion into the Football League. We had won the Division One title by 11 points from runners up Bath City, we had beaten Weymouth 2-1 at Lower Mead in our opening game and were now facing Dartford, the reigning Southern



It was a fabulous season though, full of highlights and big crowds: 3,400 for the visit of eventual champions Wimbledon and an average that has only since been surpassed by the 1,400 regulars here at the Vale last season.

We finished eighth. I'd settle for that this season!

es, this was the season the Stones finally won the 1sthmian Prem after two close misses in the play-offs. After the defeat to Concord Rangers at the Vale the previous May, and star players Richard Jolly and Lee Chappell deciding to retire and leave respectively, our chances looked slim.... and indeed the season started with three successive draws against Maidstone (away) and Bognor and Wingate & Finchley at home.

And Hampton always was a difficult place to pick up points. But luck was on our side at The Beveree in front of over 100 travelling Stones and a 429 crowd home defender Joel Ledgister picking up an early, pointless booking for handball and then repeating the trick in his own penalty area after 42 minutes. Penalty king Sean Cronin blasted

in from the spot.

Dancing winger/midfielder Tom Pett was the star that season and he came close three or four times

before our former defender Tommy Brewer decided to knock the ball into his own net from a Sivapathsunderam corner. Even so, we still looked nervous until the reliable Peter Dean won the ball from the home left back in three-way chase with keeper Rodney Chiweshe... he was caught hopelessly out of his goal and Deano sweetly shot home from out near the corner flag - and celebrated with the delirious

Actually, Petty was not THE main man that season and we had a brief glimpse of the aura of Glenn Little for the final 15 minutes at the Beveree. The former Burnley and Pompey star had joined from



Wrexham but was clearly only half fit... and it was a couple of weeks later that he announced himself by taking charge of the home 4-1 win over Enfield Town as we trailed 1-0. Never has a match been so transformed: Everything went through Little and he kept it up for the rest of the season as we won the title by an amazing 11 points. The same margin as the Southern League Division One South title-winning season in 1973-74. Uncanny!
