



#### LOVE FOOTBALL, PROTECT THE GAME

Every football fan should feel safe when watching their team. But last season we saw a minority of supporters ruining the game for others. That's why we're supporting strong measures across football to tackle antisocial and criminal behaviours within football grounds.

These include entering the pitch without permission, carrying or using smoke bombs or pyros and throwing objects onto the pitch, as well as discriminatory behaviour and taking drugs. All of these are illegal, dangerous and have no place in our game. For everyone's safety, clubs will report anyone carrying out these offences to the police, which can result in a permanent criminal record. These measures could also now apply to the parents or guardians of children involved in these activities.

From the start of the 2022/23 season, anyone who enters the pitch and those carrying or using smoke bombs and pyros will now automatically be banned by their club. These measures reflect the seriousness of the risks to fans and staff – pyros can burn at 2000 degrees Celsius and cause life-changing injuries, while entering the pitch endangers players, managers and match offcials – it is impossible for anyone to tell the difference between a celebrating fan and a violent attacker.

The football authorities are working with clubs and the Football Supporters' Association to make sure everyone feels safe on matchdays. We ask all fans to come together to show that those who commit these illegal acts do not represent the majority of supporters.

 Using violence of any nature

· Carrying items which may be considered a danger to others, including cans, bottles, or glasses containing alcoholic beverages

•Throwing any article onto the field of play • Climbing floodlight pylons, fences, stands or any structure or building

Using obscene or bad language likely to cause offence to others. Hitting the side or back panels of the Bulla stand

2) No spectator ball games.

3) The consumption of alcoholic drinks is permitted INSIDE the social club bar, garden and boardroom areas.

4) Vehicles parked on the Grosvenor Vale site are at the owners' risk.

5) Wealdstone Football Club supports the FA's campaign on pyrotechnics (e.g. flares and smoke bombs). Any misuse of such items in and around the Ground will result in those responsible being asked to leave the ground and, in line with football authority guidance, may result in a report to the Police, potential prosecution and a ban from the Club of up to three years. ood afternoon and welcome back to the Vale. I write these notes after what I felt was a dominant 1 – 0 win against FC Halifax and as we sit in 2nd place in the Vanarama National league table. I know its early days but the standard of football we have played against 3 of the more fancied teams in the league, Bromley the FA Trophy holders, Halifax play off quarter finalists and just relegated Óldham tells me this going to be an unforgettable season.

These things don't happen by accident and as a part time team it really is the result of so much hard work by the playing staff, directors, staff, volunteers and supporters. Dominic thanked many people

My job as chairman is to ensure Stuart starts the season with the players he wants. and I know hes delighted with the current squad with its exciting blend of experience and

youth.

Off the field there is renewed energy around the Vale and things are progressing well. The stadium improvements, primarily on the Vale club side, were costly but unavoidable following the incidences that led to the ground closure last year. Our capacity now sits uncomfortably close to the minimum stadium capacity of 4k for this level of football and plans are now being developed to increase the capacity further. The construction work that was undertaken takes time and we started the season with elements around the dugouts and a new disabled area still to be completed but this will be resolved shortly. As many of you know the lease with our

current landlord ends in 2023 but we remain confident that a new agreement will be signed in good time and we will keep you updated as things develop.

As a board we are continuously working on developing relationships with both businesses and other football clubs. We are delighted that Watford Womens team have chosen to play their matches at the Vale this season. The season started in

style with a 3-2 victory over Gillingham in front of an impressive 330 fans with a team that includes former England International, Arsenal and Chelsea forward Gemma Davidson. The atmosphere was terrific and I would encourage fans to come along to experience high level women's football with entry for Wealdstone

season ticket holders just £1.

We were also excited to host QPR for a pre-season friendly with over 2,5k in the Vale followed a few days later by over 1,7k fans in to watch Watford v Southampton. We received tremendous feedback from both QPR and Watford for the efforts put in to host the games and I would like to extend a special thanks to

Adam and his team from the Turf Doctors who have done an amazing job in preparing the pitch for this season in the most difficult of circumstances.

These games as well as being financially important make you realise how as a club we are growing, and it was great to see BT sports presenting pitchside during the FC Halifax game and they will be back to broadcast our upcoming

game against Woking live.

On the commercial side so many of our partners continue to support us including our main club and stand sponsors gpf Lewis, Rolfe East, Ruislip Windows and Doors, Hollywell and Nagle Flooring and we have also been delighted to announce significant new partnerships with amongst others OSMO and Shots Sports. We continue to develop

partnerships with local businesses and this season have a record number of companies sponsoring the club in one way or another, these are the partnerships that enable us to progress as a club.

Improving the match day experience for supporters remains a top objective and we supporters remains a top objective' were pleased to welcome in The Manhattan Grill Company to run the Match Day catering, initial feedback from the FC Halifax game suggests that they will be a real success.


# Name dropping in a bid to bond with the working classes EE looks North

f you'd watch the BT highlights show, not sure anyone would have known that a little, part-time club in Middlesex was second in the table, with three wins and one defeat. Of course, when they did show the Stones match verses FC Halifax, it was an interview with Halifax's underachieving manager which was aired rather than the one that won. We are, of course, used to not getting the plaudits which are merited. Not sure the presenters and analysers have actually heard of Wealdstone, though they did mention twice that the Hertfordshire team currently residing in the Seaxe county have had their best start for seventeen years.

The post-match interview with Chris Millington, the new manager at the Yorkshire club, saw him bemoan the dry pitch, as he did on the opening day of the season up the road. Of course, there was one team playing the ball around the ground and that side didn't seem to have too much trouble moving the football around the deck, dominating a game as much as any we have since our return to the National League's top division. We were comfortable as we could be with a single goal lead and had Rhys Browne added a second when through on goal in the second period, the outcome would have been more secure. Brownie once again made many punters happy with his goal and the rather generous odds being offered.



Ashley Charles was superb last Saturday, as he was at Oldham, Rhys Browne continues to cause defenders all sorts of problems, with Cookie being Cookie, we have seen some of our younger players impressing hugely. Mason Barrett has just come in under the radar and has put in a number of impressive performances, Deji Elerewe has come to terms with the pace and style of the game in the National League, and has twice stepped into midfield after a long period of possession by Wealdstone to set in motion the passage of play which lead to a goal. Dom Hutchinson excels at the right back position too. It's gone as well as it could so far, as I write on Sunday morning, with a long trip north to Gateshead awaiting us before today's game at home to Yeovil. Not sure too many of us saw our start after the debacle of a defeat at home

Elmsile Ender was among the first wave of football club magazines when it replaced 'Long Ball Down the Middle' as the Wealdstone fanzine in the mid-1980s. LBDTM's forerunner 'Wealdstone Whispers' was famously the THE very first football fanzine in Britain when it was published in

mill town. LS Lowry's paintings depicted life in the north west England, mainly in Pendlebury on the other side of Manchester to Oldham, but it was Wealdstone whose stroke work had the aesthete's admiration. Our football in the first half was sublime: pass and move, keeping hold of the ball, controlling the temp, and running rings around the former premier leaguers. Oldham Athletic. Supporters of vintage were suggesting it was the best forty-five minutes of football they had seen in decades: it was certainly the best since the mauling of Bath City 7-0 here at the Vale in the National League south promotion season. Whist we couldn't keep up the same domination in the second period after Athletic managed to pull an unfortunate goal back, we still seemed to have the game in our control and deservedly came home with the three points which made the nine hour plus return trip well worth it. We were clad like Brazil, we played like peak 1970s samba vintage in that first period. Our second goal, twenty-three passes, held possession for

over a minute, before we struck with speed and precision didn't even get a mention on BT Sport.

The evolution of "Stuball" has seen our fans now patiently watching the team move the ball around and back across the back, keeping possession, waiting for the move into space and then attack at pace. Last season, at the start of the season, the reaction of the crowd was very different. Everyone knows how we want to pay now, it works and at times, as at Oldham, it

can be sublime.

#### THE STONES INTERVIEW

Meet the former Lincoln star who's bringing his experience and ability to this exciting Stones team

# It's Sam Habergham

e's an interesting man, is Sam Habergham. The 30-year-old was a key player in the dynamic Lincoln City side of 2016-17 - the first non League team to reach the FA Cup quarter finals since 1914 and had been on the radar of the Stones equally dynamic management team for several seasons.

And with Stuart Maynard good pals with the Cowley Brothers (the brains behind that remarkable Lincoln side) the Wealdstone boss was confident he could land the strong and influential Habergham one day.

"Yes, there are a lot of similarities between Stuart and Matty Saunders and Danny and Nicky Cowley - the same energy and ideas" said the sixfoot defender when I managed to catch up with him the day after the epic game at Oldham.

"The main difference is that here at Wealdstone we can't get the players out on the pitch enough, being part time. Which makes the information and tactics that they manage to drum into the players that much more remarkable".

I asked him if he was finding that transition to being a part time player difficult. "Well I try to look after myself and I see it as a full time job - 'parttime' is just a word on a piece of paper, as far as I'm concerned - I don't see myself as a national League player and I'm still determined to get back into the Football League"

Sam has a business studies degree with a book-keeping element and he's been doing some work for a friend of his partner Chloe who has a beauty business. It's all very different from football but he likes that 'otherness' of the business world.

"My life has settled down a bit in the last few weeks" says the six-footer who began his career at the Norwich City academy.

"I was brought up in Great Ellingham in Norfolk, and after travelling around to play for Tamworth, Braintree, Lincoln, Grimsby and then Peninsula Power in Australia I was staying back at my par-

mens football, so I signed for Tamworth in the Conference. We only finished about 16th in the league but it wasn't a bad side and we had an FA Cup run to the 3rd round and a game at Everton where we lost 2-0".

He then switched to then-National League Braintree for four years, firstly under Alan Devonshire. The Cowleys were then promoted to manage 'The Iron' after their success at Concord Rangers - and very nearly steered the unfashionable Essex side into League Two before they were beaten in the play-offs.

Their exploits caught the eye of Lincoln City, a BELT mired in the National League, and when Danny and Nicky were lured up to Sincil Bank they quickly put in an offer to bring along their steady left back Sam.

"The next two years were probably the best of my career" he says.

"We were good and well organised, with Matt Rhead a good focal point up front but we also had some clever technical players.

"I remember we had 2,500 in for the first home game, which the club were quite pleased about,

but then within a month we had a 10,000 full house every week! We just kept winning and the confidence and momenturn increased".

The Imps ended the season as National League champions, but it is the FA Cup run for which they will be most fondly remembered.

"We beat Guisely, then Altrincham in the first

round proper, then Oldham (who were then in League One) in round two before drawing with lpswich in the third round and winning the replay" said Sam, warming to the theme.

"Then we beat Brighton who were the Championship leaders, in the fourth round. That was amazing enough but we then went to Premier league Burnley and won with a goal from Sean Raggett in the last minute".

Sam reckons he had 21 assists for goals that season - many from corner kicks - and it was his precise far post delivery, nodded back for Raggett

ents this summer while my fiancée Chloe was also back locally at her parents.

"I was travelling to the Stones matches and training from Norfolk, three hours each way!

"But now we've moved to Beaconsfield, much handier, and we've even got a baby on the way in November."

o what's the story behind Sam's rather circu-

itous route from Norwich to Brisbane?
"Well, I was at Carrow Road from the
age of seven until 17 when I signed a two-year
pro contract. They had back-to-back promotions
up from League One to the Premier League so it
was a settled and successful team... I was in the
squad but it was obvious that they weren't going to
change much.

"I was released at 19 and very keen to play

 who just managed to force the ball over the line before it was cleared - that won the game.

Lincoln were now treading where no non-League club had been in over 100 years, but the quarter final draw was unkind in handing a trip to the Emirates to face Arsenal.

It was a 60,000 full house and the plucky Imps held out until Theo Walcott's 44th minute shot was

deflected past the keeper by Sam as he stretched to block. And the Gunners added four more in a one-sided second half.

League Two, reaching the play-off semi final but losing to Exeter - and also reaching The Checkatrade Trophy final at Wembley" said Sam.

"I suffered a bad knee injury just before the play-offs, though that was just after we had enjoyed Lincoln's first ever appearance at Wembley... the Imps had 35,000 fans there and we beat Shrewsbury 1-0"

And did you provide the assist for that goal? I asked him.

"Yes! Well, a semi-assist as my corner led to a header that was saved before Elliot Whitehouse put it away".

From the glory of Wembley to long-term knee injury... that must have been the toughest couple of years of his career.

"It was. We worked it out that there were 1,000 days between my last game for Lincoln, and my next one for Grimsby Town. You might think that signing for their hated rivals would have been difficult but the City fans were really good about it. they knew what I'd been through in those injury years"

It was a short stay for just a few months at Blundell Park, just 19 games as Grimsby were headed for relegation, and Sam had to face up



to the fact that he might not find another EFL club.

"Danny Cowley asked me down to train with Portsmouth but I thought if I'm not going to play in the League I'll try something different... and a former coach at Lincoln was in charge of Peninsula Power in the Australian Queensland League and asked me over.

"We spent four months there, half the season, and it was quite an experi-

ence. Hard to compare with anything in the UK as soccer is not the No.1 sport there and there are lots of Asian players and other nationalities... it was athletic and technical at the same time".

There is a National League that encompasses the whole country, and three regional leagues below that with Peninsula Power in the Queensland League, mostly comprising clubs based around Brisbane.

"Despite being the second level in Australia we had reached the quarter finals of the all-Australia Cup. Maybe if they win it I'll get a medal!"

ut now he's putting his ability and experience to good use for the Stones, playing mostly in his favoured left-back position.

"As a youngster at Norwich, and in Australia I played on the left of a back three but here I like to be able to push forward... we've got a young and hungry squad and it's great to see how brave and confident they are on the ball, just passing it and passing it. Some of the football against Oldham was incredible!"

Stuart and Matt said that Sam's signing was as important for his know-how as much as his ability, and that showed as the Stones played out an often frantic last half hour at Boundary Park.

"I always try to help out the younger players and I've done all my coaching badges, so I've got a lot of knowledge to pass on.

"I'm really looking forward to it".

#### THE GLOVERS

ounded in 1895, the club initially joined the Somerset Senior League and competed in a multitude of leagues up until the outbreak of World War II. During this time they won titles in the Southern League, Western League, Bristol Charity League, Dorset District League and Somerset Senior League.

The Glovers (named due to the long history of glove making in the town) played in the Southern League after the war ended, winning the championship in 1954-55, 1963-64 and 1970-71, before becoming members of the Alliance Premier League from 1979 to 1985. They spent the next three years in the Isthmian League, and were elevated into the Conference after finishing as champions in 1987–88. Relegated in 1995, they were promoted again two years later after winning another Isthmian League title. Yeovil won the 2002 FA Trophy Final and secured a place in the Football League after winning the Conference in 2002-03 under the stewardship of Gary Johnson. They then won the League Two title in 2004-05, before reaching the Championship with victory in the 2013 League One play-off final in Johnson's second spell as manager. However they suffered consecutive relegations, and were relegated once more following the 2018-19 season, ending their 16-season spell in the Football League.

Yeovil are one of the most successful non-league teams in the FA Cup, having defeated major Football League teams, most famously Sunderland in the fourth round in 1949, before going on to play in front of more than 81,000 spectators away at Manchester United in the next round. For some years, as the only Football League side in Somerset, they had few local rivals since Dorset-based side Weymouth declined as Yeovil climbed the divisions in the 1990s and 2000s.

It was in 1990 the club moved into their current home 'Huish Park', with a capacity of 9,565. Much of the club's success has been in this stadium.

#### THE PLAYERS TO WATCH

#### 1. SAM JOHNSON - GOALKEEPER

Grant signed for Town in the summer of 2021 as the club's new number one goalkeeper. Formerly of Chesterfield, the shotstopper kept 10 clean sheets in 18 apps in Derbyshire before heading to Somerset.

#### 2. MORGAN WILLIAMS - DEFENCE

Williams enjoyed two short term loan spells with the club from Coventry City. # Travelling Fans in

The travels and travails of Wealdstone's very own Statler & Waldorf

TODAY'S fan in the stand is a bit leftfield.. with all the early-season travelling we thought we'd shine a light on the Stones fans who live far away from the Vale and cover vast distances to watch the team at home and away.

Don and Lee Cross are two of the best known, often setting off at the crack of dawn from their home near Hereford but today we feature former Wealdstone director ROGER SLATER who lives on the doorstep of Torquay United in Teignmouth, Devon, Not only that, but he regularly collects fellow fan ALAN HILL (WFC History website guru) from his Weston Super Mare home on the way, via the M5 and M4. This is their storv ....

iving in Devon and supporting Wealdstone may seem a little odd, but why change? Certainly not just because I moved down here seven years ago, having first watched The Stones in 1966 (though not regularly till about 1983). What is a little more extreme is following them home and away. It certainly sees some long days behind the steering wheel and with fuel prices as they are, it can get a bit bloody expensive though that is one area where more than regular wing man, Alan Hill helps out.

Alan and I travel together for home games and most away matches - even those on the south coast, as when the need arises, he can train down

Occasionally where timetables allow, we'll also join the train/beer/football crowd, but with the reduced timetables still in effect post

covid, those opportunities are getting more rare which I suppose is at least better for my liver.

Alan lives in Weston-Super-Mare, certainly in the West Country but still a 150-mile round trip from me, so the first hour of my journey home and away tends to be alone - or at least

alone in person, as Stonescast or We Have Ways of Making You Talk or The Old Front Line podcasts are the accompaniment of choice. (The journey home after dropping Alan off are somewhat different but more of that later).

> Early starts are common - with various bits and bobs to do around the ground and a need to avoid traffic, I'll normally leave around 9-30 for home matches and collect Alan just before 11, then, on a good day,





it's a couple of hours to Reading services for a pee (we are both mid-sixties, so you'll understand), a coffee and Alan's visit to terrorise the young ladies of Greggs as he purchases a Donut.

Home game journeys are in the main routine, though M4 roadworks and diversions have allowed me to build a varied library of route alternatives that can be pre-planned or taken up mid journey if the need arises. Anywhere from Cheltenham, Oxford, Swindon, Slough, Iver and Bath may be visited at least once or twice a season!

way travel, particularly within the wide expanse of the National League has seen mythical wings spread with day trips to Kings Lynn and Grimsby, Halifax and Altrincham, and even Dover and Weymouth among others. Some of those we've now lost, replaced by equally-arduous Oldham, Scunthorpe and Gateshead!

(Dover I'm not sad about as the painful drive cross country on what seem like farm tracks on a Tuesday night from Devon saw me driving up the A303/30 and around the M25 to the M2. The return journey resulted in five hours of the long and winding road, and for good measure the A303 was shut between Illchester and Honiton which meant farm tracks really were the only way home)....

What has been pleasantly surprising has been the ability to travel 'up country' with some ease. Trips to the north have been uncluttered by tourist traffic and mainly commercial vehicle free at weekends, and the services -if you pick the right ones – can actually be a pleasant break for fifteen minutes or so. The aim on some of the longer trips has been to arrive early and have a look round – Halifax for example was lovely – a nice town and an decent chippie topped by a fine and low cost antique centre where I managed to procure a bargain or two, subsequently sold on profitably to help refresh the travel fund!

I'm lucky I guess that I'm happy to drive and distance doesn't really worry me – indeed, I drove to Gateshead on Bank Holiday Saturday alone as Alan wasn't about – that was a 7am

ish start, aiming to have completed the 410 miles by 2pm. That way I get a coffee to unwind and clear my head pre-game. If I get away sharp after the match I should be home by midnight! I might have to re-listen to a few **Stonescasts** that day......

As far as inside the car goes, as you might expect from a couple of old gits, we put the world and the club to rights, we come up with the occasional really good idea that we often forget and we muse on the history of the club, how far we've come and how far (in pound notes) behind our peers we now are! Certainly, the appeal of staying in this division is far, far higher than returning to a Saturday at Canvey or a winter Tuesday night at Concord, though there are a few teams I'd like to see promoted to join us — Bath, mainly as it's always a bloody good day out......

he radio comes on, normally for Fighting Talk on Radio 5 or for some ancient comedy (our era) on BBC Radio 4 extra, though I have much of that stuff on an iPod too to fill in quiet spells, and occasionally I'll blast out some musical favourites — not sure they're Alan's favourites as in truth, Ive never asked, his wincing is clue enough....

Perhaps oddly we rarely listen to sport or commentaries or suchlike, though the journey to Needham Market last year was memorable for John Inverdale starting his show after Fighting Talk by pleading for anyone anywhere en route to some live sport to call in, preferably more than once, as he had a six hour show to fill.

With postponements everywhere, the highlight was to be a (Women's) Rugby match and I think a race meeting, both of which were postponed within about fifteen minutes of his show starting. It was by far the most entertaining part of the day....

Homeward-bound, our game will be spoken about for perhaps twenty minutes or half an hour, but rarely if ever more than that. We don't watch games together so get different views and as we chat with different people they'll likely get a mention on thew way home too. Sometimes the radio will come on but I'm not sure Alan will let me listen to live baseball from Toronto again on a journey back!

Sometimes I think he'd rather wait for a bus....

rior to the memorable trip to Oldham came what should have been a simpler outing to Eastleigh in Hampshire - a rare planned train/beer/football excursion wrecked by a strike by the railway union. No earthly way of getting back to deepest Devon the same day... but no matter! A quick venture to Trago Mills for the cheapest diesel (and it's Shell) in the country saw my trusty automobile refuelled at a measly (by current standards) £1.81 per litre, though the eventual journey west to east, some 75 miles less than a 'home' game, actually took almost an hour longer to complete.

Train trials and tribulations also

meant the passenger seat was sadly vacant, as wing man Hill was somewhat landlocked in Weston-Super-Mare. As for the match, brushing over the ridiculous decisions of authority that befell our beloved Stones in the East of Leigh where officialdom truly did rob us of a point, one thing that was certain from the performance played out was that Stones certainly had more in the tank – a promise of brighter things to come being evident, and of course a quick opportunity to prove that beckoned on the near horizon. Oldham!

Those formed of rotting pig meat (Old Ham, geddit?) were insistent that #teamslikewealdstone would struggle to muster sufficient numbers for a last supper on a Tuesday evening at the once-named coldest ground in England, and those that would be foolish enough attend were certain of an evening or pain and horror, as our mere mortals would be put to the sword by their illustrious superstars. None the less we travelled!

A 1:15pm departure accompanied by some old

Tony Hancock and The Goons got me to Sainsbury's Worle (Weston Super Mare) in good time to meet said Hill and at 2:30 we set off for a stress free journey into the unknown Greater Manchester conurbation – and stress free it was too, little traffic of note, pleasant weather if a little cloudy, but almost none of the rain or



drizzle that was predicted to beset the journey. I for one felt we would get something out of the game having seen the goals from their Saturday game v Dorking. I thought we could get the ball wide and around their full backs which seemed to be a bit of a weak link, though we both mused that in front of goal may be an issue with Fela unavailable after a hefty challenge that saw him subbed early in the preceding match.

e parked up among a few other travelling Stones in the hospital car park adjacent to the ground. Congregating pre-match by the still closed 'Away' turnstiles and quickly seeking calculators to confirm our twelve had swelled sufficiently to make a noise, we viewed the impressive structure that is the Joe Royle Stand at the Oldham theatre of aspiration...oddly with an element of confidence that the noses to be bloodied would not be ours.

Once the delayed entry had been permitted – the hosts deciding to open the gates to the away terrace later than elsewhere as such limited

numbers were expected. The capacious visitors end was welcoming if a little bleak, as was the tea bar, where welcoming staff offered refreshment that was equally bleak, the pies seemingly those that Dorking's travelling army had not purchased on Saturday! One or two brave souls tried a 'Wigan Kebab' which must

be as diametrically opposed to anything or Greek, Turkish or Middle Eastern extraction as it is possible to be. as it consisted of the previously attested pie (with any selected filling) served in a bap. All for an extra 50p, each sale surely accompanied by whining and spinning sounds as Turgut Alp sought a way to return from his permanent place of entombment to rectify such an assault on humanity and taste.

Sensible folk avoiding the comestibles on offer, we counted and recounted the throng as 'We've only got twelve fans' rang out in good voice from

the hundred and fifty-odd of us there, and Stones resplendent in a Brazil-like version of the yellow away kit (with blue shorts and white socks) took the field. Early exchanges even, Stones were impressing with some slick movement and passing which seemed to have unsteadied the hosts, perhaps their management and their preparation expecting us to park the bus with an occasional kick and rush foray forward.

They simply looked unable to cope, and when they had the ball the superb Jack Cook marshalled the backline, while Ashley Charles harried and hustled the midfield contingent. The result was that the ball seemed to prefer its time at our feet than theirs...

A decent Stones corner was cleared to Ferguson (I think) outside the box and saw Cookie remain forward, the resultant cross clipped in inch perfect, Cook then heading square across the box to Brownie who slotted home with some glee to send the (twelve) fans into complete uproar – whilst also silencing the home 6,800-odd aside from a sharp intake of breath. Be it twelve or the actual 150, the noise from the away terrace increased ten-fold as we reminded the hosts of their now non-league status, and ours as tinpot part-timers, digging back at the Old Ham fans forums that predicted we'd be

beaten out of site, Oldham likely collecting the three points in the warm-up and probably getting three more for having so many fans. (Heard it before, seen it before – will they ever learn?).

tones continued to play keep ball and were so proficient that one particular sequence was met by a series of 'Ole's' reminiscent of Leeds v Southampton (7-0 I think) in days of vore. Oldham got a touch or two here and there but with little impact and the ball returned to Hutchison just over half-way. It seems in my memory that the volume dropped - the Ole's certainly stopped - as he passed the ball backwards. Back it went again. eventually back as far as Howes with Oldham chasing shadows. Spread left then back to the centre and to the right the back line (including Howes) looked for an opening. The ball was moved back and forth as Stones looked to breach the home defence. Finally, a ball into Browne's feet from Hutchinson saw his close control shake off three defenders, he then sent the ball wide out to Kretszchmar who pinpoint-

ed a low cross inside the six yard box to Allarakhia who scored a second.

Just like watching Brazil didn't do it justice. It was better as the resultant video highlights prove. 23 passes and every Stones player involved, with the hosts not getting close. It was Brazil 1970 with Holland 1974 thrown in for good measure – but that is only for comparison – Stones were better, and the noise from the away end let them know it!

In truth the rest of the half was played out with Stones in control and it wasn't till the first minutes of the second half that Oldham actually looked threatening – they scored one, but soon after just like in the first half they faded lacking ball, space and ideas while Stones allowed them the middle of the park but snuffed out their

progress. Celebrations duly enjoyed at the end of the game, Hill and I began the 190 miles back to Worle. The journey back was circuitous to say the least, as closures of sections of the M56, M6 and M5 added 40 miles to the journey, but the conversation drifted back and forth on memories of the game and the occasion.

After a coffee stop I was back on the M5 with the baseball turned up and I was still smiling when I arrived home at 3:30am. Roll on FC Halifax Town!

# The Stones

o here we go again with the letter B.. and I'm happy to repeat myself here as **BATH** City was always one of my favourite awaydays, sadly no longer in the calendar due to our higher status. Better still, last time this was included it was also listed under **BOGEY** teams, and we have gladly laid that to rest.

Joe Turner started the change in fortunes with the only goal on my birthday at Bath's Twerton Park in 2014, a ground where we'd only won once in our previous 17 league visits. Our home record hadn't been much better. Since then we've had the upper hand and some of those matches will last in our memories for years to come.

Firstly the wonderful 3-1 win at Twerton Park in the 2019 play-offs, to me the greatest day of the Bobby Wilkinson era. An unlikely set of results on the final day of the regular season saw us scrape into the final play off place, something few of us expected when we went behind against Hemel. But we turned it around and aided and abetted by defeats for Dartford & Billericay who both started the day above us, we were off to Bath

the following Wednesday evening.

We had a fantastic turn out from our supporters and made a terrific noise despite being segregated on the uncovered terrace behind the goal. The team put in a mighty performance to match, and our 3-1 win was richly deserved. David Pratt's stoppage time goal that wrapped things up 1 still see in slow motion, still expecting him to miss. didn't, that was his Wealdstone moment. Bobby and myself clashed, not great fans of each other, but the congratulatory handshake I gave him in the bar afterwards was warm and genuine. If you have a spare moment, go and take a look at the match highlights again, I guarantee they will give you the shivers.

Secondly, Bath were also on the wrong end



# The Stones and the Glovers are back in combat after three decades..and a host of earlier memories

ust imagine for a moment that you'd fallen into a coma 37 years ago - perhaps celebrating too enthusiastically and inebriatedly Wealdstone's famous capture of the non-League 'double'.

And then woken up this week.

You might flick through the newspaper (or even online if that's a concept quickly learned) to find out how the Stones were now doing.

Ah, still in the Conference. And doing brilliantly, looking at some of the other clubs in that division! Notts County! Wrexham! Chesterfield! Oldham! Scunthorpe! Torquay! Halifax! Southend!

Who's still in there from the mid-80s? Only Dagenham, Altrincham, Barnet and Yeovil. Ah Yeovil. They must have come back up again.

The truth, of course, is that Yeovil Town, opponents again since we went up to the National League, are a far different animal from the club we met pretty much every season from the

mid-70s to the mid-80s.

When Stones won the Gola League (Conference) famously in 1985, Yeovil were relegated that same season. This was a real shock to the system for the club who were just a couple of votes away from being voted onto the Football League in 1976, and (like the


Stones) had joined the Alliance Premier League in 1979 in the hope that one day, promotion to the League would be automatic.

ur paths diverged. Our coma patient would be horrified to know that, just as the Stones were dropping from the Conference to the Southern League and thence to the bottom of the Isthmian League within the space of ten years, Yeovil were financing a new out-of-town stadium (Hiush Park) to replace their charming but dilapidated Huish stadium, and on their way not only into the Football League but all the way to the Championship by 2013.

Since then, of course, they have fallen from grace. Relegated three times, and now in their fourth season as members of the National League.

At one time there were six divisions separating our clubs. But the next few pages show what wonderful (and horrible) ups and downs there are in football....

### Fiery 'Stones give the points to Yeovil

Not so much a defeat as a sheer give-away. That is the fairest summary of this Southern League Premier Division battle, often entertaining and occasionally revealing flashes of brilliance, which resulted in another unhappy result for Wealdstone.

But, looking back on the night, one must admit that Wealdstone were a shade unlucky against what is probably the best team in the league, a side I would confidently tip to lift the championsl ip.

Yet Wealdstone played better than for some time. In the opening stages we saw George Duck looking like the player we knew last season.

The Evans twins, obviously attempting to impress all and sundry that they are far from being spent forces, both did well and Eric Burgess played with the fire and firmness we saw last season.

Godfrey had splendid mo-ments in midfield and I felt there were signs that any mo-ment now we may see a revival and a change in Wealdstone's fortunes.

One question mark continues to hang over the side. Are they fit enough at the moment? Practically every side we see at Lower Mead appears to be a yard or so faster. Yeovil were certainly that.

'Stones must also learn to combat the offside tactics used so successfully by many Premi-er teams. Duck, Byrne and and company were caught in Yeo-vil's trap so many times that the business became somewhat monotonous.

The fact it fell on a Wednesday night didn't seem to bother the regular 250 who followed the Stones away those days - not dissimilar to the numbers 47 years later. though in the 70s the majority piled onto the Supporters Club's 'Yellow Peril' coaches, clutching their green tickets lovingly written out by travel secretary Barbara Robson.

For me, it was a schoolnight and I was thus unable to travel. But how I wanted to be there! Four days earlier our beloved Stones had shocked the '72-73 champions Kettering Town by winning 3-2 on their own Rockingham Road ground in front of a 2,233 crowd.... and there was fervent belief that this side boasting the mercurial George Duck, Johnny Henderson and the effervescent Evans twins could repeat the dose to the highly-fancied Yeovil. How disappointed was I to read next morning the Yeovil 4 Wealdstone 1 scoreline in the Daily Express classified results small print. In those days there was always a chance that the smudged scorelines were wrong, and it wasn't until two days later that the Harrow Observer carried confirmation in its abbreviated report shown on the previous page. Although going by that report, and the glowing one in the next home programme it was clear that Eddie Presland's side had let nobody down in front of another 2,000 crowd.

Only a few weeks later we took on the highly-fancied Glovers in the return game at Lower Mead and as you can see from the big report (previous page) we were undone by the sheer professionalism of the Somerset side. It mentions the Yeovil offside trap and even now I still recall our heavy-legged centre back Eric Burgess somehow breaking clear on the halfway line as the trap suddenly capitulated. The veteran Eric had a 15-vard start on the defenders yet he seemed to be running in custard as they caught up and gently dispossessed him 20 yards from goal!

It was going to be a season of adjustment for the Stones yet, after a string of wins and draws in the New Year in front of crowds averaging close to 1,500, took us up to 4th place we eventually finished eighth.. but what a memorable season
