



Stones' crowds getting ever younger... and yet ever bigger! We are doing something right

kay, we lost to Barnet but think of the positives: Our first league match at the Vale, back in 2008, attracted a crowd of 387 and we averaged 408 in that first season in HA4.

Last Saturday, we had over 3,000 for a league game for the first time since 1975 - with a mediocre away support and Stones are now averaging 1,628, the best since our amateur days.

Losing a home derby in front of live cameras is never a great look, but the club and ground looked splendid packed to the rafters. The Holywell/Bulla stand was teeming with youth... remember how we craved to bring down the average age of our supporter base? The bars were heaving from well before two o'clock, struggling to cope with the numbers of people wanting a drink, and it continued until late into the evening, despite the defeat.

The first thirty minutes or so we were by far the better side. Dominating proceedings, hitting the bar, but as seems to be so crucial for us, we needed to get the first goal to set up the game. Despite our dominance, that goal never came as the team from HA8 came back into the game as the half wore on. All square at the break with everything to play for, but all the plans set in the interval were thrown away as the away side took the lead just moments into the half. The ball was sloppily given away and then a clinical bit of finishing. It was a half chance but also shows what a forward on bundles of money can do for a team. Their second was again sloppy defending but clinical finishing. Ultimately the difference between the teams was that ability to put

the ball in the onion bag and their greater physicality. I thought the new lad from Cambridge, Lewis Simper, did well, but our international absentees,

together with the loss of Brooklyn Ilunga (whose pace and drive got the team much further forward at speed) and Miguel Freckleton who returned to his parent club on the off-chance that he might have had to sit on the bench v Spurs (now joining Yeovil on loan) have been crucial.

The play-offs are gone, but it is important that the season doesn't just slip away. We have a tough run in for sure, but can we fashion a few wins to ensure a top half finish that we deserve?

n this feature in the Barnet programme you will have seen the mention of Stones fan 'Big Dave' Jones taking an overnight commercial coach to and from Torquay to keep his run of consecutive Wealdstone games going. What is even more remarkable is that Dave (pictured below) doesn't

drive, long ago picked up his bus pass, but still manages to keep his long 'unbeaten record' which by the end of this season will have reached 450 games! (excluding the behindclosed-doors season of course).

here was a recent announcement by the FA that contracted players in the Nation League would no longer be paid - or at very least have reduced income - if they suffe an injury. Under the new rules, players suffer an injury will only receive their full wages for weeks in the national division and six weeks regional division, thereafter they will go onto statutory sick pay of £99 a week...

Football has always had different rules. In real world of employment, almost all business will have sick policies that have restricted pay ments after a period of time... they span from generous provisions to statutory sick pay kick in as soon as it is allowed. Whilst clubs may t the new rules, as there is an opt-in whereby can disregard the new contracts provisions, I see players only signing for clubs that will wa the new provisions. I am not sure these new tracts will have much teeth.

The 'Elmslie Ender' was among the first wave of football club magazines when it replaced 'Long Ball Down the Middle' as the Wealdstone fanzine in the mid-1980s. LBDTM's forerunner 'Wealdstone Whispers' was famously the THE very first football fanzine in Britain when it was published in 1971

'm afraid we can't claim Lewis Simper as One of Our Own. That honour belongs to Ely, in Cambridgeshire, where our new loan midfielder was born and Cambridge United whom he's supported since childhood.

In fact, If I was writing this for the Cambridge programme I'd be very, very proud of the youngator who first pulled on a United shirt at the age of seven.. and whose family have followed United for over 50 years.

"Yes, I've been involved with the club forever" laughed the 21-year-old as he recounted being talent-spotted playing youth football in Ely. "I went to St John's Primary School and then Ely College and went on trial 14 years ago when I was a kid. Then I progressed through the development centre and the Academy... which was very exciting as I've been watching games at the Abbey Stadium with my dad and my brother since I was a kid".

Lowis's dad Karl played for Ely City and also Southern League Cambridge City in the 80s and 909 while his brother Jamie also plays for Ely. And Karl's dad Eric also turned out for Ely and Cambridge City in the past!

Cambridge obviously think a lot of their locallyborn star as he signed a new three-year-contract last summer. It will keep him at the League One club until 2025.

"I've played 11 times for the first team, mainly in League One and a few in the EFL Trophy and Papa John's trophy... and got my first goal for United in that competition when we beat Ipswich 1.0 at The Abbey earlier this season".

How did that go in? I asked him. "Well, I came off the bench at half time and had a go from the edge of the box... a low skidding shot that went in off the post. That's right up there in my stand-out moments!"

He came close to a goal on his Stones' debut again Barnet last Saturday, a dipping 25-yarder that beat Bees' keeper Laurie Walker but bounced back into play off the crossbar. "That would have been a great time to score, just before half time, but I really enjoyed the game. The difference in standard between the National League and League One is not that pronounced.. the main difference is that if you lose the ball or make a mistake it's instantly punished in the EFL."

Lewis thought his breakthrough moment in the United first team was at the start of this season

when he had a run of half a dozen games.

"I made my League One debut at the end of last season, a 2-1 win over Morecambe, but before Christmas 2022. I felt like I was a genuine part of the first team. It was really beneficial for me. I also hit the crossbar in the game at Sheffield Wednesday in front of 26,000 but we lost 5-0 and began to struggle a bit. The manager brought in a couple of players and I went out on loan to Woking early this year to get a bit of game time".

But with Woking galloping along in the National League there wasn't a chance of establishing himself in Darren Sarll's side.

"Within four days of me returning to Cambridge I had a call from the gaffer here, Stuart Maynard, who was keen to add me to the squad ... it was a no-brainer as I know the sort of football that Wealdstone play and my strength is keeping the ball and

looking for openings to score".

What did he know about the Mighty Stones? "Hahaha, very little really although I went out on loan to Concord Rangers in the National League South in 2021 and Ashley Charles was also on loan there ... and they also had Danny Green who was of course at Wealdstone for a long, long time. He is a very good technical player".

ewis's travels also took him to Yeovil on loan for a short spell - where he played ■alongside Sonny Blu Lo-Everton - but it was the half-season at Concord that brought about the 'weirdest' moment in his football career.

"It was a strange one, but the season before I was at Concord - the Covid-curtailed season - they had reached the FA Trophy final against Harrogate but it was postponed because of the pandemic.

"It was then played 12 months later at Wembley but still behind closed doors, and the club were allowed to field three players who hadn't helped them reach the final. I was one of those chosen. I didn't feel I'd done much to warrant a place in that sid but it was still a great experience to play

in that stadium, on that pitch even if you couldn't have any family or friends along Concord also fielded Jack Cawley (who

had just completed the National League season as pretty much ever-present in the Wealdstone team) as he had signed for the clu from the Essex side the previous summer and was a bona fide member of the team who had reached the final.

And here's a little Fun Fact: Because Harrogate had won the National League title in the Covid-affected season, they became the veryfirst Football League club to play an FA Trophy match, let alone the final. And they won it, 1-0!

And here's (maybe) another Fun Fact: Lewis Simper was in the stands at the Abbey Stadium as a disappointed 10-year-old, watching with hi family, when Wealdstone pulled off that FA Trophy quarter-final giant killing in 2012. Two goals from Richard Jolly sealed the 2-1 win.

"Is that true?" asked Lewis. "That Wealdston won at the Abbey 11 years ago? Well I don't know if I was there but I saw all the games at that time. Maybe I've wiped it from my memory SUPPORTER PROFILE: MATTHEW SPREADBURY



I think the mentality and togetherness of everyone at the club to just push and put in as much effort on and off the pitch is something that other clubs in our league just do not have.

Finally, where do you think Wealdstone FC will be in the year 2025? I really see us competing for the top spots and play-offs of the National league in the next few seasons. This season especially,

the club has shown that we can hold our own and really maintain a position in and around the top 7. It's important that the fans continue to support the club home and away as I think it genuinely has an impact on the performances on the pitch. Wealdstone will go up. Up the Stones!

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

THE SHOTS

n March 25th 1992, Aldershot FC became the first Football League team to fold during the season since Accrington Stanley in 1962. From the ashes came phoenix club Aldershot Town, who were formed on April 22nd 1992 and managed by ex-Aldershot FC centre back Steve Wignall.

The "new" Shots began life in Isthmian League Division 3 and opened the 1992-93 season in a carnival atmosphere at the Recreation Ground against Clapton, Braces from Mark Butler and Steve Stairs secured a 4-2 win in front of 1493 fans, which was more than watched their predecessors' last home game at the same ground. The campaign finished with the Shots as champions by a commanding 18-point margin, whilst strikers Mark Butler and Steve Stairs scored a combined total of 62 goals in all competitions.

A second successive promotion (via a third-place finish) followed in 1993-94 together with a run to the FA Vase quarter-finals.

Steve Wignall departed in January 1994 to take charge of Division 3 side Colchester United and was replaced by ex-Nottingham Forest winger Steve Wigley. Despite a strong finish to the 1994-95 season, the Shots missed out on a third successive promotion on goal difference. Following fifth- and seventh-place finishes over the next two seasons, Wigley left to take up a post in (former club) Forest's youth set up in the summer of 1997.

THE EBB STADIUM

Following a spell under the caretaker management trio of Andy Meyer, Mark Butler and Joe Roach, Enfield boss George Borg was appointed in September 1997 and his first season yielded increased crowds and the Isthmian League Division 1 title. In 1998-99, the Shots won both the Isthmian League Cup and the Hampshire Senior Cup. In 1999-2000, they retained the latter trophy, won the Isthmian League Charity Shield and ended the campaign as runners-up to Dagenham and Redbridge in the Isthmian League Premier Division.

A fourth-place finish was claimed in 2000-01, whilst November 2001 saw a club record crowd of 7500 fill the Rec for the 6-2 defeat by Brighton and Hove Albion in the FA Cup first round. Following a run of poor results and pressure from fans, Borg resigned in mid-January 2002.

Borg's assistant Stuart Cash took temporary charge before Terry Brown left his post at Hayes in late March to come to North East Hampshire, thus beginning a five-year love affair with the Shots fans. Following a thirdplace finish and a third Hampshire Senior Cup win in 2001-02, the squad was overhauled and, having attained top spot in mid-November 2002 the Shots remained in top spot to claim the title and, with it, promotion to

Football Conference; they also retained the Hampshire Senior Cup.

Disappointment followed in 2003/04, when the Shots were beaten on penalties by Shrewsbury Town (after a 1-1 draw) in the play-off final at Stoke City's Britannia Stadium.

More play-off heartache was experienced in 2004-05, this time in the shape of a shoot-out defeat at Carlisle United in the semi-finals. The next two seasons were disappointing for the Shots (13th and ninth places respectively being secured).

In March 2007, Terry Brown resigned to take care of his wife, who had been ill for some time. Assistant Manager Martin Kuhl took caretaker charge for the remainder of the season.

in 2012-13 Former Rotherham United boss Andy Scott was brought in but couldn't stem the tide and relegation back to the Conference Premier (the club's first such event) was confirmed at end of the season as the Shots eventually finished rock-bottom of the table.

On May 2nd 2013, just five days after their relegation from League 2, Aldershot Town officially entered administration with reported debts of £1.4 million.

hastily-assembled squad (some of whom v signed in the hotel the night before the sea opener at Grimsby Town)

On July 31st 2014, Aldershot Town announced that they had paid off all of the debts, which enables them to exit the ausp of the CVA after just 12 months - a massiv years ahead of the required date! The icing the cake came with the additional news that club had made "a modest profit" in the first of trading under the new owners.

The 2015-16 season was another one of disappointing performances with the Shots finished the campaign having scored just 23 home league goals, equalled the club recor for fewest home league wins (7) and most h league losses (12) as well as setting new clu records for most league losses in a season and lowest average home league attendanc (1607); the season was also the fourth in succession in which the aforementioned cro figure had dropped.

A new-look side for 2016/17 secured fifth in the table and a Play-Off semi-final agains Tranmere Rovers. Unfortunately, The Shots the home leg 3-0 but at least restored a great deal of pride with a battling 2-2 draw in the Prenton Park return.

In 2017-18 the squad picked up where the left off and spent the majority of the season challenging for the title eventually finishing 5 the table losing to Ebbsfleet in the play offs.

2020/21 saw the Shots placed 15th & 202 placed 20th.

Over the summer of 2022, Mark Molesley together his squad for the coming season ar wins were garnered over Boreham Wood, B. and FC Halifax Town before the team began to slide down the table, ending in Molesley's dismissal after a 2:0 FA Cup qualifier defeat at Chelmsford Town. Academy manager Ros McNeilly was put in caretaker charge and af run of five wins from eight, was given the rol a permanent basis, until the end of the seas

Re-election and of course relegation! It's the Rs-end of the Alphabet today

ood afternoon all and today it's the turn of R to be put through the alphabetical wringer.

R is for RE-ELECTION, the method by which Football League clubs used to preserve their status at the expense of ambitious non-league clubs. That was the case until automatic promotion was introduced in the 1986-87 season. This was of course two years too late for the Stones - I wonder how much our recent history would have differed had this been introduced earlier? As it happened, our Lower Mead ground did not meet the minimum requirements, but would money have been spent had it been in place beforehand?

For the younger audience, the basic principle was that the Football League clubs would vote whether they were happy to vote one of their own



clubs out of the league in favour of something new and different, in essence it was the classic Turkeys voting for Xmas situation, it was rarely going to happen. Clubs lying in the bottom four of the fourth division would be the subject of the Re-election process.

Much as in the way that Eurovision voting is to say the least suspect, then dodgy deals and handshakes between member clubs to make sure they voted for each-other and harnessed support from elsewhere was the order of the day. The result was that things barely ever changed.

As it happened in our title winning year, neither 2nd placed Nuneaton or 3rd placed

Dartford met the ground criteria either, so 4th placed Bath City went into battle for RE-ELEC-TION with Northampton, Stockport, Torquay and Halifax. They scored 8 votes out of 208 available and that was that, as predictable as was the case most years.

Roll on to 2022-23 and because Notts County and Wrexham are doing so well, the predictable BELT clamour for more automatic promotion places is at fever pitch. If only the old boys voting act was still in place then they wouldn't be here in the first place. You shouldn't have agreed to automatic promotion chaps!

ntrinsically linked therefore to Re-election is of course RELEGATION. Wind back to the start of this season, and for some and maybe the vast majority of our supporters, success for 2022-23 would be achieved by avoiding Relegation. For those with long memories, the Relegations that we have suffered from this league are painful. In 1981 we had a very good team, there was no way we should have gone down, but go down we did on the final day of the season at home to AP Leamington who survived by virtue of the most unlikeliest of wins at Lower Mead. Compare that

with 1988 when we simply very poor, the club was in decline and just five league wins all season tells its own story.

So the fact that we are comfortably safe going into the final stretch of this season has certainly meant a stress-free time for us. Who'd swap places for those involved in the fight at the bottom? It's nice to be looking up! There's still some work to do for our visitors today but I think they'll be OK. The original Aldershot club when in the Football League survived the RE-ELECTION process on multiple occasions.

n the subject of RELEGATION, it does look as if we are going to be joined in the National League next season by ROCHDALE. Ten points


adrift of safety with just eight matches remaining it's looking rather bleak for 'The Dale'. So anoth new ground tick is on the horizon for the Stone hopefully on a Saturday.

Unlike neighbours Oldham, Rochdale does have a train station and this is a good thing. Ro chdale have played at their Spotland ground fo over 100 years, and hold some rather interesting records if Wikipedia is to be believed. Firstly, th have played the most seasons of any club in th English Football League without reaching the to two tiers or being relegated to non-league - thi is their 95th season. Their run of 36 consecutiv seasons in the bottom division between 1974 a 2010 is also a record to be proud of. They survived several Re-elections (see above), includi by just a single vote ahead of Altrincham in 197 80 after a 2nd successive bottom place.

RUBBISH has featured before, but only in th context of team performances, some of the wo of which were during our Yeading years. Today we'll focus on a few other varieties, starting wit the litter version of Rubbish.

Sam, have a word with Brett the kit man! Red is unacceptable. Don't we have a nice yellow kit for when we face the Yeovils of this world?

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
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












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
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Bideford, beautiful Bideford

One man's footballing story about two golden opportunities missed, never to arrive again...

hat were YOU doing on October 30 1973? Well obviously most of you whipper-snappers weren't even born. Or even a glint in the eye of your parents/grandparents.

But I raise the date because that was the day I thought I'd missed out on the chance of ever going to Bideford FC.

Why Bideford? And where on earth is it, I hear vou ask?

Well, it's in a rather lovely part of North Devon, the sort of seaside nirvana that the BBC eye up when they are about to commission a new crime series where no crime is committed, apart from seagulls nicking the odd chip.

And back in 1972, when I was 14, we went on

a family holiday just around the corner in Combe Martin - a holiday branded on my mind due to the rash decision to buy a bright red pair of trainers in the local sports shop. I quickly realised that my school 'mates' would ridicule the outlandish shoes and spent the weekend pre-return to St Nicks feverishly trying to colour them black with

Airfix paint... which didn't work, obviously. The nickname Scarlet O'Hara didn't wear off half as

Anyway, back to 1972 and that summer, with Stones transferring across to the Southern League in only our second season as semi-pros, we had some interesting new opponents to add to the whole list of never-before-visited clubs.

First it was Stourbridge in the West Midlands, Kings Lynn in Norfolk and Barry Town in South Wales - and now Tonbridge in Kent, Bognor Regis in Sussex, Bath City and Minehead in Somerset and Bideford in Devon.

When you're a young teenager away travel is fraught with problems - shyness, not wanting to

travel on a supporters coach among strangers, and the impossibility of long-distance train travel (even if your parents were happy to wave you off on a ten-hour adventure).

But Bideford was tempting. Fellow oldie fan Nick Symmons has told me how he caught a train to Exeter, then the local bone-shaker service to Barnstaple and finally a bus to Bideford, nestling on the Cornish border in the far south west. He can't remember how he got home!

That was beyond my gumption. And last week I set about wondering where I was when the Stones set off to play their only two away games at Bideford.

The Devon side were serial Western League champions but had resolutely turned down the chance of joining the Southern League due to travel costs. We had beaten them 4-0 at Lower Mead earlier in the season but by the time we were due to travel to Devon for the return - Saturday January 20, 1973 - Bideford were in third place and looking realistic



prospects for promotion to the Southern Prem.

Stones were in eighth place having fallen victim to some ter rible away results while walloping teams at home... this was around the time we beat Bexley 5-1, Salisbury 4-0, Ashford 3-0, Crawley 4-1 and Gravesend 4-2 in successive home games.

So was it the fear of another disappointing away defeat that prevented me from going to Bideford? Well, more likely it was the offer of using my Uncle Terry's Chelsea season licket for the visit of Arsenal... both he and my grandad were long time Blues fans and I was at Stamford Bridge that afternoon. Chelsea were beaten by a single Ray Ker nedy goal and it was a miserable

afternoon when my Grandad's transistor radio informed us the Stones had gone down 4-1 the same afternoon.

o... that was the 1972-7 Bideford game. What we my excuse for the follow ing season?

That is harder to explain will the Stones riding on the coal tails of early leaders Poole Tow and Waterlooville as the teams met at the Sports Ground on September 20. It was late sum mer. What could have been nic than a trip to Devon?

Well sadly this time I succumbed to the lure of Queens Park Rangers, my other 'second club'. They had just been promot from Division Two and Gordon Jago's team was a thrilling blend Stan Bowles, Dave Thomas, Dor Givens and Gerry Francis... they were about to take the top flight by storm and I thoroughly enjoye being buffeted by big, swaying crowds on the school End terrac as Rangers put the established

Last time the teams met it was at Lower Mead in March 1974 and this corner from Paul Fairclough (now the England C manager) swung under the bar to set up a 3-1 win

a dank, grey February afternoon when I pulled into the club car park, with the backdrop sound of seagulls and a salty tang in the air.

The big, undulating pitch was being carefully mown and the vast, towering floodlight pylons conferred a far loftier status on the stadium than that of level four in the non League hierarchy.

I wandered around the terraces. This spacious, oval ground has a capacity of 6,000 and it was easy to imagine four figure crowds thronging the stands as they went on FA Cup runs in the past. Back in '73, soon after facing the Stones in that tight goalless draw, they were beaten 2-0 at the Sports ground by Bristol Rovers of Division Three.

> I stuck my head inside the clubhouse, just as a fellow in his 60s was leaving.

"Are you a long-time Bideford fan?" I asked him, noting his sweat top with its 'Robins' badge.

"That I am" he confirmed. "Tourist are you?"

I told him my story. He seemed bemused. "Come all this way when there's no game on? We've got Willand Rovers on Saturday but I'm not confident ... every game is a struggle this season. We'll be lucky to stay up".

e told me that the better players at step three and four were all based around Bristol and it was hard to convince them to make the two hour journey "unless you've got loads of money, which we don't".

"How are the crowds holding up?" I asked him. "Only 200 or so ... of course when we have a big cup game they all turn up, saying how they love the club and then you never see them again".

He was genuinely interested to hear the Wealdstone Story of progression over the years. And he knew all about the 1970s and the endless hours of travelling to London, Sussex and Kent.

"I don't know how clubs like Truro and the Cornish clubs manage it. Just be thankful your Wealdstone are in London and in the middle of things with plenty of players all around... it may seem idyllic here, and I don't deny I love living here, but in football terms it's hopeless!"

And with that sobering thought I got back in the car. But still dreaming of one day seeing the Stones facing the Robins in this Devon paradise.


