

Let's hope it's catching!

It was a crucial three points for the Shots with Torquay (five straight wins) looking likely to overhaul and dump them in the bottom four... but their 1-0 win at the Vale plus the Seagulls defeat at Chesterfield mean Torquay are now favourities to join Yeovil, Scunthorpe and Maidstone in regional football next season.

From the Gaffer

Thanks to you all

It's incredible how fast this season has gone. Getting beaten 3-0 at home in the last game of pre season feels like yesterday. To think of the season we've had since then, is simply amazing. We've topped the table for a period, we've spent large periods in the playoffs or around them, and we've taken some huge scalps in the likes of Oldham Football Club whilst playing some high level football.

When we came into this club 4 seasons ago, to think we'd be at this point so quickly, would have been simply a farfetched dream. To have done it in the manor in which we have, dominating possession and scoring some incredible team goals, makes us so proud as a management team. At the start of this season, if you told us we'd lose Josh Umerah and Rhys Browne, yet get better, we'd have all laughed. But together we have achieved it when others would have found excuses. That's testament to how well all the staff, players, fans, board and the whole club have done and we owe them all a huge amount. Not even for one moment this season have we had to worry about relegation. which will to be the envy of many huge clubs in this league that are spending astronomical amounts in comparison.

The back end of the season hasn't quite panned out as we'd have liked, but there's many reasons why. If you had said at the start of the season, that a part time team, would be in and out the playoffs up until the final 9 games of the season but come up a bit short eventually, you'd say that's understandable and expected. That's exactly what's happened,

but in a weird way, coming up short of getting in the playoffs is an incredible achievement for everybody at the club. These players are going to work all day, finishing at 5pm, driving over an hour to training to start at 6.30pm, then training intensely, going home to sleep and then getting back up for work at 6.30am. I don't care who you are, that as a human being is draining and eventually takes its toll. Then you factor in the travelling that gets done for away games, and really, we should be saluting these players for what they've achieved for the football club.

This season, we've come up short solely on quality at times in relation to how much we've dominated games, but we can stomach that as Wealdstone Football Club. We can't afford to pay the money that needs to be spent to attract game defining players to our football club. We're a club that has to manufacture it, which is the hardest thing to do in football, and we managed to do it with Josh Umerah and Rhys Browne, and its what we will keep trying to do with this group. We turned Brownie from a winger, into one of the most sought after centre forwards in the league. That inevitable meant that the time came where the club couldn't keep hold of him or Josh any longer. So falling short on quality, in this league, is always going to happen the whole time we are where we are financially. That's why as a management team, is so important to strive for consistently good performances. Good performances enable a group that lack a little bit of clinicalness, to have more bites of the cherry. If we stopped performing well, we'd go from creating 7 or 8 opportunities a game, to 2 or 3, which means

we're giving players less chances to convert. So when you hear us say, even after losses, that performances are so important, that's why. We can't ever guarantee the outcome of a game, no manager can, but if we can tactically set up better than other management teams, it'll always give our players the platform and foundations to overachieve.

Our goal at the start of the season, was to stay in the division. If that was by one point or one goal, it would be another incredible achievement, so to be sat here at the end of the season, even mentioning the playoffs, means we've over achieved more than any other team in this league, and probably every other league up to the Premier League. The brutal reality is that on what we pay, the contact time we have, and the facilities the players have access to, means that the disparity between us and the next closest teams like Aldershot, Dorking or Maidenhead, is monumental. We've had to play teams like Notts County and Chesterfield, without a training session. In no other league would you find that sort of gap. So to say we've come up short of quality, is probably incorrect, as we've surpassed our objectives by a long way, but it shows the standards we set ourselves and how hungry we are to achieve and get better.

The biggest thing we now need to do as a club is manage expectations. Next season, we will still have pretty much the same model and resources that we did when we entered this league, so our expectations need to align with that. We as a management team will always try to keep that in sync via fans forums or interviews, but if you as fans can police that, the whole club stays aligned and together. We've all seen the huge teams, with ten times the resources we have, end up relegated or totally out of business. We're no exception to that, so we must make sure that the expectation of stay up by one point again, is still the general consensus. If we do that, the club remains positive, even in the tough times and allows us to keep trying to overachieve and bring success to this football club. Gradually, if the club continue the good work they're doing off the pitch, which there's lots of, we'll be able to start to bridge the gap and in turn, increase expectations.

Finally, I want to say a huge thank you to the



fans. In our time here, the level of understanding and the appreciation of the football we've played has gone to a level that we'll be eternally grateful for. Boreham Wood away was a brilliant example that. It would have been easy to let the emotions closing a game of football show, but instead the far clapped the players because they appreciated a team that even on a bad run, was giving everythin for the football club. Things like that show how far we've all come and make our challenge of lifting the players again as a management team that bit easier.

The impact you've made on this league on our travels shows you the passion and the love you all have for this club. You've out-sung some of the biggest teams in the leagues and you've lifted the players when they've needed you most. You've shown a level of class that is hard to find at other clubs and a shining example of that was at Notts County away. We will always be so grateful for all of you whether you follow us round the country, or whether you support us in other ways. The Oldhar and Gateshead away days stand out the most for us, and to share the celebrations with you guys wi always be special. Hopefully in exchange for your time, money and support, you've seen a team tha have mirrored your efforts out on the pitch.

We've got a lot to be proud of at this football club, and I'm sure we will have many more special memories to share.

Thank you to all the fans, the staff, the players, the board, the volunteers and everyone else at the football club. The journey continues..

Chairman's Update

eed afternoon and a warm welcome to the players, officials, and supporters of Darking Wanderers in what is the battle of the two part time teams in the National League.

Today is our designated "Club Day" on our final Baturday home fixture, and we will be welcoming over 50 former players and officials to enjoy the occasion which will include post-match the traditional end of season celebration in The Vale as the end of season awards take place.

Unfortunately, we enter the final weeks of the season at the wrong end of the form table incredibly frustrated by several postponed games here at the Vale that have disrupted Stuart's preparations and stopped the group from gaining any king of momentum.

However, we mustn't let short term frustration stop us celebrating what has been an incredibly successful season for Wealdstone FC both on and off the pitch. Success on the pitch means this will be the fifth year in a row we have seen year on year improvements in our final league position indeed this will be our highest overall league finish since the Mid 1980s, player availability is becoming a problem as we lose players on International duty, Captain Jack Cook received a National League player of the month award and Sam Howes was selected for England C.

Whilst the top of the table battle between Wrexham and Notts County has been gripping we must not forget that at the start of the season Wealdstone were many pundits' favourites for the drop so to be fighting for the top 10 shows what an incredible job Stuart, Matt, the playing squad, and support staff have done. To see 4 full time outfits, including Scunthorpe who have suffered the dreaded double drop from EFL2 to the NLN, in the relegation places really underlines the competitive nature of this league and shows what a season we

Attendances remain around 15% up compared with the same fixtures last season and it was fantastic to break the attendance record twice this season memorably when Wrexham visited in November and again in March when we hosted Barnet in front of the BT cameras when we had over 3000 in the ground. This will be the 7th season in a row attendances have grown year on year

and its amazing to consider that we are now averaging around three times the attendances the club was achieving in the last decade or so at the our historical home of Lower Mead back in the 1980s.

Our tenure at the Vale is secured for the next three years after a lease extension was signed in March. Another short-term lease wasn't the outcome we wanted as this prevents us from accessing both FA grants and from investing our own funds in improving the facilities but the alternative to not signing would have been to lose our place in the National League. However, conversations continue with the landlords and they have at least shown a level of commitment to Grosvenor Vale by investing in the return of cricket to the site. Boris Johnson remains involved, and we have further meetings diarised with the landlords and the former PM to keep moving the conversations forward. As I said in January so many things we want to do as a club remain on hold until the long term certainty on our home is resolved.

Our community efforts have gone from strength to strength where we have given away over 1500 free tickets to local school children as part of our "tickets for schools initiative", we have welcomed displaced Ukrainian families to the Vale, given 100s of tickets to members of the armed forces through the "Ticket for Troops" initiative and welcomed multiple groups from nearby RAF Northholt. We have a huge waiting list of children looking to get on the pitch to be Mascots and we have recently introduced Ball Boys/Girls onto the pitch. We have a growing partnership with Hillingdon Council and we were delighted to welcome so many youngsters over Easter to the Vale as part of the councils HAF programme, combining football, hot meals and healthy eating education. Many of those children will be coming for the first time to the Solihull game and I hope we give them a warm welcome. As a club Wealdstone FC is making a real impact in the local community and that's without mentioning the independent Wealdstone Youth which is without doubt one of the most successful junior outfits in and around London.

The Wealdstone FC academy, which offers football and education opportunities for 16- to 23-year-olds, has doubled in size this year. The academy is now operating out of two fantastic sites at Harefield Academy and Brunel

University. Next year it will be even bigger and early indications suggest we will have around 150 boys signed up for the various programmes on offer. It will not be long before some of these boys start to break into the 1st team. Our Academy at Brunel University will also be offering degree courses for the first time in September which means that children who start with the fantastic Wealdstone Juniors soccer school at 4+ could stay with us right through to completing their degree in their early twenties!

Interest in Wealdstone FC is steadily growing in the media and within the local business community and this year we achieved a record level of corporate sponsorship including record levels of matchday corporate hospitality revenue as we invested in improving the facilities to enable us to offer more spaces and a more premium service.

I feel the matchday experience in The Vale Social Club has improved this season especially in the quality of the beer served. The club remains an incredibly important source of income for the club and thanks largely to the efforts of Bar Manager Sarah Gowdy and her fantastic team revenues have almost recovered back up to pre covid levels.

With so many positive things happening in and around the club it is sometimes difficult to comprehend that we remain a part time football club playing in a full-time league. Operating on a part time budget in financial year 2021/22 the club reported an operating loss of c£80k and it is likely that we will report a similar if not slightly greater loss for 2022/23 as improved gate receipts and commercial income gets swallowed up by the growing costs of keeping the ageing Grosvenor Vale fit for the National League. As has been recently reported we pay little, or no agent and transfer fees and as a board we support Stuarts playing budget with every penny we raise along with additional contributions from directors and supporters where there are simply not enough pennies in

To be able to maximise the playing budget we are entirely dependent on volunteers and local sponsors who carry out much of the activities required at either cost price or in some instances at a loss and for this we are incredibly grateful. To all who have contributed to this record breaking season I thank you and I would like to make special mentions to Adam and his amazing team at the Turf Doctor for their tireless work on the pitch, all the media team (including the commentators on the streaming platform and those who contribute to the matchda programme), all the matchday volunteers who do such an effective job of getting everyone into the ground quickly and safely, Fingers our rather unique Club Secretary and finally Richard our GN who somehow pulls everything you've just read about above together into a coherent plan. Our Independent Supporters Club are working harder than ever to raise funds for Stuart and the playing Budget and I thank all that are involved in fund raising with a special mention to those on matche selling 50 / 50 draw tickets and to James Klarfeld and all those that support him in organising music nights and other events such as arranging the us of The Vale for other clubs playing at Wembley.

So on to next season where planning for the 23/24 season is already well underway. The team will look fantastic in our brand-new home and 3rd kits which are to be released shortly. A couple of weeks ago we were delighted to announce that season ticket prices for the 2023/24 season were to be frozen at 2022/23 levels. Our season tickets remain terrific value and works out at c£1 per game for an adult season ticket and £8 for a concession. As a football club we are not immunto the rising cost of living and as a result we have announced that the price of individual match tick will be rising next season by a few pounds acros most categories.

We have also relaunched the Wealdstone FC membership programme which gives supporters the chance to purchase shares in the club as we as purchase a season ticket. Various levels of membership are available depending on the leve investment you would like to put into the club. M details of both the season ticket offers and the Membership programme are available in the ma programme, online or look out for the flyer that h been distributed at recent home games.

Finally, If you are interested in getting more actively involved for the 23/24 season then please reach out to any of the directors or Richard our General Manager.

Enjoy the game and I wish you all a happy summer break and I look forward to seeing you back at The Vale for the start of the 2023/24 season.

s we reach the dying embers of the season, it is always worthwhile reflecting on the campaign that has just gone by. As supporters, we would have been ecstatic with 20th and confirmation of another season in the top tier of non-league football.

As I write after the Solihull postponement, we are twelfth having sustained a run that took us to the very edges of the play offs. We have slipped back a tad, having had heady thoughts of sneaking into the play-offs - but we should still finish higher than we did last season, continuing the progress made year on year.

The management team would have had their own points tally which in all likelihood may have had a six in front of it. Whether we get there or not will depend on if we can stem our late season run when wins have suddenly become

far more difficult.

Has the fact that we were more or less safe at the start of March seen the intensity in our performances dissipate? Or the fact that baby blues has affected our defence where

we make at least one major clanger per game? Regardless of that, the season as a whole has been a wonderful success. I think that there isn't necessarily a standout player this season shows how well the squad have done as a whole. A team game rather than individual success.

At the start of the season, we were firm favourites to go down. Not only to slip through the trap door, but to be rock bottom. We haven't even been close to the relegation zone, let alone been part of the conversation for the second year on the spin and great credit goes to the management team and the playing squad for that.

no, what have been then highlights. For me, some of our football at times has been fantastic. Sambastones has on occasions lit up the National League - the evening when we plaved

former Premier League Oldham Athletic off the park at Boundary Park, scoring a stunning goal in the process, will live long in many people's memories. Our home support is growing, best average gates since we turned professional, with an ever-growing youth, cementing the brilliant work in the community that the club has

done so well. Twice this season we have broken the record crowd at the Vale, including our first 3,000+ league gate since 1975. Our away support, whilst not as big as last season on average, continues to get rave reviews from the Belts in particular.

We once again took more away fans to the Cuckoos than we averaged at home in our double year! Big followings went to Woking, Notts County, Wrexham and York among others, and another huge away support will travel to Southend on the last day of the season.

Last minute winners, away from home in particular, are difficult to beat for the sheer jubilation and we had not one but two. York was utterly brilliant, whilst Torquay was just a matter of time, both former Belts undone deservedly so.

Notts as a day out was just fabulous. Another sun-kissed Easter Friday, same as Southend last season, pubs aplenty, so many Stones around the town, the Canal House taken over. Shame the result wasn't what we would have wanted, but it was a fitting day for the home club on a day filled with sadness on the passing of their CEO. Our fans fully paid their part in honouring his memory.

Whilst crowds are getting big and bigger, the atmosphere at home is patchy best and pretty poor at worse. When we were the lower leagues, the Vale was a hostile place to come with much less than half the crowds v get now.

o, what does the future bring. We have fantastic management team and we nee to match their ambitions in progressing on year, moving away from being the only trul part-time team with the smallest budget in the league to either a hybrid or full-time model, bu doing it in a sustainable way.

Whether that is here at the Vale or elsewhe don't know, but if it is away from here, then th appears to be only one site that would still tap the market that we have sown so well. We sh be looking to continue to expand our support and target average crowds of 2,000. But there much to be pleased about at the progress the is making. Some will say it isn't quick enough it is steady and sustained and the board should be commended for that. A great year!





WANDERERS

orking Wanderers Football Club is a professional football club based in Dorking, Surrey, England. Affiliated to the Surrey County Football Association, they are currently members of the National League, the fifth tier of English football, and play at Meadowbank.

The club was formed in 1999 and initially played in the Crawley & District League. After their first season in the Crawley League they switched to Division Four of the West Sussex League, winning the division at the first attempt. In 2001–02 the club finished as Division Three runners-up, earning a third consecutive promotion. After winning Division Two in 2003–04 they were promoted to Division One, and a third-place finish in Division One in 2005–06 saw them promoted to the Premier Division.

In 2006–07 Wanderers won the West Sussex League's Premier Division, clinching the title with a victory on the last day of the season. As a result, the club were promoted to Division Three of the Sussex County League. They went on to win Division Three in 2010–11, earning promotion to Division Two. A third-place finish in Division Two the following season was enough to see them promoted to Division One. However, the league initially denied them entry to the division as their ground was not deemed to meet the necessary requirements. However the club appealed against this decision to the Football Association, who overruled the decision after an independent ground



grading

visit confirmed that the ground reached the mandatory standards for Division One football. Although the team initially struggled in Division One, finishing third-from-bottom in 2012–13, they finished second in 2014–15, earning promotion to Division One South of the Isthmian League.

In Wanderers' first season in the Isthmian League they finished as runners-up in Division One South, qualifying for the promotion playoffs, going on to lose 2–1 to Faversham Town in the semi-finals. The following season saw them finish second again; in the play-offs they beat Hastings United on penalties in the semifinal after a 1–1 draw, and then won again on penalties against Corinthian-Casuals in the final following a 0–0 draw, earning promotion to the Premier Division. In 2018–19 the club won the Premier Division by a margin of 22 points, earning promotion to the National League South for their first time in history.

Following the curtailment of the 2019–20 season due to the COVID-19 pandemic, they

were

placed seventh in the league table (decided on a points-per-game basis), qualifying for the promotion play-offs. After beating Bath City 2–1 in the quarter-finals, the club lost 3–2 to Weymouth in the semi-finals. The 2020–21 season was made null and void following a vote by member clubs of the National League, Dorking were sitting top of the league at the point the season was ended.

In the 2021–22 season Wanderers won their first Surrey Senior Cup Final, beating Kingstonian 5-4 on penalties after a 1–1 draw. In the 2021–22 season Dorking finished second in the league, going on to defeat Ebbsfleet United 3–2 in the play-off final, earning promotion to the National League for the first time in the club's history.

The club initially played at Big Field Brockham, before moving to the Westhumble Playing Fields on London Road in 2007. The ground had a small seated stand and covered standing on one side of the pitch, with the remainder being uncovered; Floodlights were installed in 2012. In July 2018 the club relocated to a refurbished Meadowbank

ground, which had previously been home ing F.C. prior to their disbanding. Their firs at Meadowbank was a friendly match aga Sutton United on 17 July 2018.

Meadowbank had become the home grof Dorking F.C. in 1953. A 200-seat stand built on one side of the pitch around 1956, covered standing area built on the other. A covered standing area was installed behin goal, with the other end left open. Howeve were forced to leave the ground in 2013 af it was shut down for failing to meet health safety requirements. Prior to Dorking Wand moving to the ground, it was upgraded to in a 300-seat stand, two covered standing are a 3G pitch as it was converted to a commu sports facility at a cost of £5m. The Surrey Football Association also moved their head to Meadowbank when it reopened.

In February 2020 the club announced the planning permission had been granted to up Meadowbank Stadium to a Grade B status. July 2020, the stadium passed the Grade B assessment. By September 2020 work had completed on a new seated stand and a ne covered terrace both at the east end of the taking Meadowbank's official capacity to 3,4






World of Ba

Can there ever be such a thing as 'too much' football? It feels like we'll be answering that question soon enough

s we come to the end of what's been a pretty wonderful season for England's most highly placed semi-professional football club (I mean, come on, where IS the national recognition of this feat?) it's time to once again welcome the short respite that the summer allows for us to recharge our batteries and, as they say, 'go again'. Feels more than a bit weird to be saying that in the middle of April, but of course these days even a 46 game season needs to be scheduled to end early in order that we can fit in the play-offs.

So that's what this column is about, really: the growth not just in number of games, but ways of watching said games, and the question to be answered - are we headed towards 'peak' football?

As of this season pretty much all top level nonleague has been fashioned into 24 club divisions. and thus 46 matches per season. In the professional game, only the Premier League has fewer than 24 clubs. So there's 'mission creep' in terms of total matches in a season, for a start.

Then there are the play-offs, which for most organised football leagues have become the true 'knock-out' matches of our time. But it's not as if actual cup games have been eliminated to accommodate them. The FA Cup feels as if it's been relegated to some old-fashioned quirky 'other' competition, but it's still there, as are the various league and county cups.

So then, already that's more league matches and potentially more knock-out matches at club level. What of international level? Well, we now watch a 24 rather than 16 team Euros, and have done since 2016. And in 2026, we've just had it confirmed that the World Cup in the US, Mexico and Canada will comprise a whopping 104 matches instead of the 64 we've been used to since 1998. Forty more games!

Then there's what's available to us on screen. Back in the 1970s, the best you could hope for was

two hour-long magazine programmes, Match of the Day on the BBC and The Big Match on ITV. At least with the latter you could be sure of seeing some of your local clubs by virtue of independent television's local network affiliations. Big European games were exotic fare, medium-wave quality commentary over grainy, slightly out of alignment colour. The very idea of high definition was once the most dramatic technological change of the day. I recall in Tottenham Court Road staring in awe at an impossibly large 40 inch TV showing the all-new high definition' football. Look, I thought, you can even make out the names on the shirts.

Today? Well, you can watch whatever you fancy, really. All those elongated European club tournaments, all the internationals, all the international leagues and tournaments too; and all of it presented in high definition, right down to our level and beyond. Hell, we can even stream our own matches, even the 3:00pm kick offs, rather than go to all the fuss and bother of actually walking through a turnstile.

Double trouble

There is also that other revolution in football currently changing the landscape: the women's game. Gender parity within the sport means that this branch of football on its way to becoming, within the decade, just as routinely broadcast as the men's game, with a marked effect down and across the pyramid. And so - where is it all going to go? There's clearly an appetite. refreshingly so, with England set to go the World Cup in Australia this summer as one of the favourites. Even four years ago, that would have seemed an extraordinary thing to be talking about. And already, the women's Premier League and FA Cup games are broadcast live



on TV, with audiences growing appreciably. Currently, it seems that most women's teams do not share their male counterparts' stadiums, but how sustainable is this with crowds growing at such a pace and in need of accommodation? And if clubs do end up hosting both men and women's matches at their main stadiums, what will this mean to the debate over the use of plastic pitches? As for broadcast, let's take gender parity in football to its logical conclusion: not 46 but 92 league matches a season. Double the Cup games, double the internationals, double eveything ... phew!

The game's a bit special

With so much football so much of the time, what we can easily lose is that sense of occasion; the 'otherness' of a big game being a bit special, for whatever the reason. When it's football followed by football and yet more football, can the matches meant to stand out from the others really do so? Toby used to make full-scale enamel badges for the visit of a single league club, for crying out load (AFC Wimbledon, 2005/06). And then there were the badges for those big FA Cup games agasinst Rotherham, Colchester et al. But today, in just three short seasons we at Wealdstone have gone from marvelling over being a live televised game against some or other BELT to having our matches broadcast live on a Saturday 3:00pm as a matter of course. Truly bonkers.

Where once a big match was just that, now we can keep a live stream of a match on in the background on your phone because it's dinner

time and it's rude to both speak with your more and see Spurs succumbing to Sporting Lisbon the second, third or even fourth tier of Europe club football.

As common as running water

Football is thriving. Premier League clubs are falling over themselves to expand their stadiu capacities, but it goes much deeper down the pyramid than that. I mean, we had more than this season for the visit of Barnet, while in ger non-league clubs of all stripes are reporting s extraordinary crowd figures. It's an extraordin time for the sport, however and wherever you sume' it. And yet it can also feel as if we're he for some kind of absolute maximum level of for in just a few years' time.

The sport feels as if it is going through som similar to what the music industry went through the early 2000s, when it moved from one-off t actional access to a new realm of constant dr always-on subscription. In some ways, profes football matches have become like your favour music acts too; far easier to access from the fort of your home, but far more expensive at t level to watch in person.

For now, football is bountiful and in rude he with more and more people accessing more a more matches. This is good to know as we he off into a summer break which, with the Wome World Cup, will have an international tournam just as all summers will have from hereon in, way, here's hoping that we don't reach satura level any time soon. The best of summer brea you all, see you here again for 2023 / 2024.





Fulham manager Roy Lester hopes that his side will move to Lower Mead.

"The ground itself has a Rugby League feel about it," he said: "I was very pleased. This place is ideal for Rugby League.

"We feel there is scope for both football and rugby here, If we can see both teams doing well I do not think there will be any problems whatsoever."

Thirteen years ago, our first brush with the play-offs...but it was a game too far

Thursday April 22 2010. Ryman League Prem: Wealdstone 2 Tonbridge 1

HAT a crazy end to the was! We played 20 games in 54 days, about one every two and a half days, as a long FA Cup run and a long wet winter - forcing postponements - forced the Stones to shoehorn just too many games into the last couple of months.

Gordon Bartlett's excellent book about that season, 'Off the

Bench', highlighted the week of this Tonbridge game in particular. An unexpectedly long run in: in this Thursday night the Ryman League Cup added to the problems. We actually reached the final (in another week of four games) and had to play 120 minutes against Leatherhead before losing on penalties. And then had two players red-carded in the final just when we dreaded suspensions to our flagging squad!

Fortunately, the astute GB had captured 18 year-old striker Matt McClure (right) on loan from Wycombe Wanderers and his goals revived our play-off



hopes. He netted twice at Horsham in a 3-1 win and bagged both

win over play-off rivals

Tonbridge at the Vale. Two days earlier we had snatched a point from Champions Dartford in a valiant show at Ruislip, thanks to a late Alan Massey goal. Tonbridge were on a great late run and we were almost out on our feet! They took the lead but McClure levelled with a volley from a Lee Chappell long throw.

And as Gordon describes in his book (above right) it was another Matty Mac strike of pure quality - similar to Nathan Ferguson's 25-yarder at Scunthorpe - at the bottom end

of the Vale that saw us take all three points and kill off Tonbridge's play-off dreams.

We then had to win our final game, two days later and again at

Then a long throw from Chaps, knocked down and Matt McClure equalised from yet another voltey. The fans were fantastic, really getting behind us as they knew exactly what was at stake. Then, three little incidents that helped us. Chaps gave the ball away in his own half and Tonbridge squandered the opportunity. A free header from a corner crashed against the crossbar and finally, we presented them with a breakaway from our sloppy throw in and we

Three basic errors in the last ten minutes of the half which thankfully didn't cost us. We used them to highlight the importance of concentration at half time have to mention half time as it was so important to the rest of the game. We felt their bench were very uplight and it was transmitting the pressure and anxiety onto the players. We tried to be exactly the opposite. As we came in at half time I wanted everything to be nice and relaxed so I took my time and let all the boys sit down. It was all quiet - except that we could hear their manager ranting and raving. I slowly poured and sugared my tea then said 'just listen to that. That's desperation. They are under so much pressure. With their run, they are expected to do well tonight. We are going to relax, keep things tight and maintain our discipline. I highlighted the problems at the end of the half and then added that we should look to get strikes in early on goal as their keeper was spending a lot of time off his line.

Well, blow me down, the first ten seconds of the second half, young Matt McClure picked the ball up from the kick-off ran a couple of yards and drilled one into the top corner. We were 2-1 up. Ten seconds. It was very early to score and I wondered if we could hang on but we did. We detended superbly with great discipline. The anxiety from Tonbridge became more and more evident and they went from playing the ball wide and forcing us back to lumping the ball down the middle. It was a valuable lesson. You want people to be 'up for it but sometimes it can go loo far the other way. We were totally drained but delighted with the result. On to Saturday, one game, ninety minutes, could we do it again? Carshalton needed to win to ensure safety, we needed to win and hope one of three other sides dropped a point to get us into the play-offs.

> the Vale v Carshalton - and hope fifth placed Kingstonian failed to win their last game - to extend our season. But it was a game too far. Carshalton had a week to prepare for the match and they were 4-1 up at half time with a hat trick from Byron Harrison (who we had tried to sign) and another from a certain Richard Jolly.

Ross had come on and won a penalty, which Dennon converted in dramatic style (the ball hitting one post and rebounding into the roof of the net off the other one) for a final 3-1 scoreline. 
