

#### Lets hear you roaring tonight

appy Easter to you all and it's a warm Wealdstone welcome to Solihull Moors this afternoon. We've met the Midlanders five times in the National League and have a miserable record of one draw and four defeats... and the Stones record against the merged club's predecessors Moor Green and Solhull Borough is not a lot better!

With early printing deadlines there's no chance of talking about the much-anticipated trip to Meadown Lane on Good Friday to face title-chasing Notts County. Stones stopped the rot of three deeats in a row with that cracking 2-2 draw against Oldham here at the Vale a fortnight ago, and then of course we had four days of solid rain that saw the clash with Aldershot being postponed.

It was little short of a miracle that the Oldham match was played... and after that game, groundsman Adam Rowland and his team weren't able to get on the pitch at all (apart from in kayaks).

Hopefully its all dried out in time for today. Prior to Friday's fixtures (when Solihull were at home to Maidenhead) the Moors were one point (55) and one place (11th) below Stones in the table and Neal Ardley's side are disappointed not to be in the play-off reckoning this time around.

Both clubs are still in with a faint sniff of course, with five games now to play and next up for the Stones is the trip to face Boreham Wood at Broughinge Road next Saturday. We were beaten 2-1 at home by the Wood - and also 5-3 away in that bizarre FA Cup game back in November - so there is a whiff of revenge in the air as we make the short trip to South Herts. Our ex-winger Dennon Lewis scored twice in Wood's 4-0 win at already-relegated Maidstone last week so he'll be one to watch out for.

The postponed game with Aldershot is now on Tuesday April 18 (7.45pm) so let's turn up in force and make it a successful end to the season.

E ponders on the crazy money spent the National League (with average osses exceeding £1m)...and asks: Is it even POSSIBLE to be self-sufficient?

acclesfield - who play in the EIGHTH TIER of English football, three below the Stones - reckon that it costs them £25,000 to stage natch at that level of football.

Of course, they possess an EFL-standard ound in the Northern Premier League West, nere most clubs get a few hundred through the te while Macclesfield average just over 3,500, uch higher than they used to get in the EFL. But it's the extra costs, including a 400% inease in electricity bills, cited as to why they were creasing their match day entrance price from 2 to £17 - which has caused much consternan amongst their supporters.

Co-owner Robbie Savage, in his Daily Mirror lumn, suggested that they would have to halve eir wage bill to not increase their entrance fee. alf of their budget is still multiple times the next am in the division, which they lead by twelve ints and could well be champions by the time u read this.

We have our own fairy-tale story in the National ague, of course, little of Wrexham beating the lds to head the table with a few games to go. ne Hollywood A listers-backed side announced oir financial results for the season ended 2022 nd the numbers were simply staggering.

Revenue was up over 400% to nearly £6m, with

atch day income alone totalling 65m. Their football costs creased three-fold to just ly of £4m and they made a ss of little under £3m, which juates to £56,000 PER WEEK. put that in perspective, their


weekly loss is about SIX times our budget.

Some of their supporters have highlighted the fact that R&R have bought the ground from the university next door, made ground improvements, including spending a million pounds on the pitch - but whilst some of this, such as the pitch improvements may well be revenue, much of the rest is capital and isn't included in their reported

It seems bizarre that on revenue of £6m in the National League that you cannot turn a profit! If they can't, with all of the publicity that they receive, sponsorship deals that other clubs can only dream of, match day revenue on a different scale to evervone else, what hope is there for other clubs?

o further emphasise the differences between Wrexham and others, the FA habve this week released details of the sums spent on agents/intermediaries by clubs. It will be of no surprise that Wealdstone didn't spend a penny. Wrexham were unsurprisingly the highest in the National League at £165,000, which would have made them the second highest spenders in the league above and more than the majority of clubs in League One.

FFP does not exist in the National League nor does a salary cap (which it does in the EFL) so it will be interesting to see how high Wrexham can travel before they come across bigger clubs with more financial clout. They already have a team full of League One players, so should whizz



through League Two without too much trouble.

I don't doubt the Hollywood A-Listers, R&R, are good owners. They have done much great work in the community, have committed to rebuild the Kop which has now been knocked down after years of being condemned, bought the stadium for the club, improved the stadium, spent over £1m in transfer fees, having invested £1,200,000 in new capital and provided interest bearing loans of nearly £3,700,000. The financial statements state the "ambition of becoming self-sufficient will take some time to achieve ... "

■he big question is that whether any club can be self-sufficient whether at this level or above without a benefactor. Of course, nobody is going forego the chance to jump on the bandwagon that R&R have created.

Had they dropped their anchor at the Vale rather than the Racecourse Ground, Wealdstone fans would be grateful to be operating in financial realities that would be considerably different to what they really are at the Vale.

Thanks to Andrew Lane's in-depth research a simple review of the other NL clubs' most recent financial statements show a sorry tale of financial losses posted almost across the board. An article in the Athletic stated that NL clubs generally lose

a £1m per year, funded by investors, benefactors and shareholders.

According to Andrew's data (left), only Boreham Wood (thanks to another lucrative FA Cup run) and surprisingly Oldham Athletic posted profits. Scunthorpe United and York City did too but they were both boosted by the sale of Glanford Park and Bootham Crescent respectively. Clubs that lost less than £100,000 were Dorking Wanderers, Gateshead, Wealdstone and FC Halifax Town. Eight clubs lost more than a million, Including Barnet (£1.127m), Solihull (£1.146m), Torquay (£1.189m), Notts County (£1.691m), Dagenham (£1.746m), with Chesterfield, Southend and Wrexham all losing more than two million pounds.

To highlight the gap between us and other traditional non-league clubs, even the likes of Bromley (871k) and Woking (965k) lost stag-

gering amounts of money.

There are two clubs that have debts greater than assets in excess of £10m, Notts County at nearly £11m with Southend an eye-watering £17m - though that is from their 2019 accounts as none more recently have been filed, a sign of the troubles that they have experienced over the last few years.

t Wealdstone we run a very tight ship, with the lowest budget in the league, but we still make losses which are generally covered by new investment from our shareholders, who are almost all supporters. We actually have one of the stronger balance sheets.

In a week when the York City Trust has had to step in to pay players wages, it's hard to hear the demands from some of our fans clamouring for the next signing and wanting to see additional investment in the stadium. While I appreciate ambition should be at the forefront of everything that we do, remember that the fabled money tree doesn't exist.

Incidentally, I've now been told that the mindboggling figures for Wrexham DON'T include the money from Disney that totalled around £400,000 an episode!

Our S& C coach on why she didn't mind being called 'Momma Stone' on Market International Women's Day

can't think of anyone more deserving for the accolade of "first woman to be interviewed in the rogramme as a Wealdstone FC

And as Rachel said: "It coincides cely as a follow-up to International omen's Day few weeks earlier!" Perfect timing! It also coincided ith the home game against aidstone at the Vale... the day we ced Rachel's hometown club.

As strength and conditioning coach, e 41-year old is a key component of luart Maynard's 'back room' team -It not to be confused with the role of physiotherapist.

"The physios are amazing - and the ne invested into study and qualifications is highly mmendable, in order to rehabilitate players back functional movement - but the S&C coach is all out achieving optimum performance and reduc-

g risk of injury.

"So that covers strength programming for the m in addition to their fitness training, analysis nd monitoring of daily load as well as supporting

players in their return to play from injury."

"We only see the players a few times a week so I have daily communication with players regarding their fatigue levels and training in order to adapt gym sessions to their needs".

Nutrition also plays a part for Rachel. "It's an easy win if it's done correctly but again we have limited contact time with players. Food intake. hydration and sleep quality are the three basics

and if you have players on a full time basis it's easier to influence - as they all eat together for the majority of the time. They used to eat pizza after matches previously but now it's generally some form of chicken and rice along with their nutrition box which is provided throughout game day and training - cereal bars, bananas, Lucozade, caffeine tablets - from which the boys have their favourites they like to choose."

She certainly looks after the players- and recalls the nickname "Mama Stone" which dates back

to a reference by skipper Jack Cook on the Stonescast 85 Podcast last summer. Coach Craig Saunders' wife, Lucy, tweeted the name and it stuck.

"The running joke is people ask me if I've got kids and I say 'Yes, 20 of them!' I don't mind it, they're a brilliant bunch of lads and you have to build that connection with them in order to understand and appreciate what's going on in their daily lives.

"I joined the club three seasons ago just before Stuart & Matty took over in the toughest of circumstances, lockdown with all the restrictions we had to adhere to, and I've watched as they've recruited and built a solid foundation of players with the right attitude and ethos to fit the club."

"These are elite sportsmen and it's all interrelated... it takes a toll having a job, a footballing career and also a home life. The mental side can affect the physical, and that level of fatique can lead to injury.

"For example, we have four new dads in the squad - Jack Cook, Sam Habergham, Nathan Ferguson and also Joel Taylor -Sam had it tough with Winnie in the beginning as she was a little cryer. Not a lot of sleep in the Habergham household!"

achel has the personal experience to know what it takes to operate at elite level. As a gymnast growing up in Maidstone, she was then introduced to rugby at university and went on to join the progressive Aylesford Bulls RFC - based just outside of her hometown - as they started to win promotion upon promotion. Rachel then moved to Wasps and played Premiership and Championship women's rugby for 18 years. She also represented SE England and her county - although, as she says, the players weren't paid and all had full time jobs.

"I worked in sales for Coca Cola, ran nightclubs and bars and qualified as a personal trainer in the background out of pure interest but then, when I retired from playing in 2018, the Wasps Director of Rugby discussed my options for the future. I didn't see myself being a rugby coach ... but I loved my strength and conditioning sessions and was passionate about being able to influence an athlete's performance. There are clinic rooms and a gym above Wasps

HQ at Twyford Avenue in Acton run by an external business. I proceeded to work there, training and treating people whilst gaining work experience and qualifications in S&C and sports therapy... then Gary Anderson and Optima took over the business there. He had brilliant experience and a background in football and with Olympic sports, and before long Dean Brennan (then Wealdstone boss) approached him to put a performance team together at the Vale in 2019-20.

"Ellie Pritchard, also working for Optima as a sports therapist, came across with me and Gary and it was a great opportunity .... though of course Gary then went with Dean over to Barnet which left me and Ellie holding the reins.

"It was challenging, that Covid season, with all the distancing and restrictions but in 2021 the club employed us directly - then Ellie left for a great job at a private sports school in Mill Hill!

"Getting hold of a new physic in mid season was always going to be hard but we managed to find MO (Michael Owen) bringing him on board from Woking"

Now Rachel is splitting her self-employed time between private work as an S&C coach, fitness instructor and sports masseuse.

. She has to keep Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays clear for the Stones but is also studying hard for a degree-equivalent qualification in strength and conditioning... which may one day lead to a job in a full-time environment.

"Hopefully with Wealdstone!" she says.

o did she have any affiliation to Maidstone

United in her youth? "Definitely not, although my brother lan was a decent footballer in the Army, who I looked up to. He is known as 'Hillsy' and his friends turned up for the game at Maidstone this season and gave me a call-out of 'Little Hillsy' as we were coming off the pitch."

"The first profes-



sional game I ever saw was probably at Upton Park but my brother is an Arsenal fan and there are a number of Gooners at Wealdstone, including the chairman Rory and a lot of the players much to Max's dismay. He follows Chelsea".

There is a real warmth among the whole squad and the backroom staff, fostered by selfless work and commitment across the board.

"There's nothing part-time about being part-

time" she laughs. "From the players turning up early for training to work on their conditioning, to the phenomenal commitment of Stuart and Matty and the management team, to people like Lynn and Pam this season who have taken on the players' catering

"We get great feedback from players arriving from other clubs. They love it here. We all do."

unday mornings in the late 1960s would see me dashing downstairs in order to snatch up the delivered Sunday Times before either my mum or dad could grab it. My purpose was to extract the sports pages and set about reading

Michael Parkinson's eagerly awaited weekly column on either football or cricket.

In his musings about football he often looked back at his formative years some 20 years earlier either playing football or watching his beloved Barnslev and his hero. Skinner Normanton, a sort of Willie Watson of his day.

His description of the players of that time has stayed with me. He described the goalkeeper as being muscular but not musclebound; full backs as short, squat men with prison haircuts, no-nonsense faces and fearsome legs; the

centre half as being the tallest man in the side, with a forehead hammered flat through contact

> small and fast, the left winger bandy-legged and tricky; the centre forward wore the desperate. haunted look of a man who was expected to run through brick walls and be roundly abused if he shirked doing so; while the inside-forwards invariably wore their hair a little longer than the rest and carried with them an air of intellectual superiority, like grammar school boys playing in a pit team. Viewing film footage of matches from the 1950s, and his descriptions are not far from

My big brother, Barrie, took me to my first Wealdstone match on the 15th April 1963

with a thousand muddy footballs; the wing-halves as the frighteners, invariably built on the lines of dance-hall bouncers; the right winger was always

even allowing for literary licence,



could find). It was an Athenian League encounter against FA Amateur Cup finalists, Sutton United, and my memories are too vague to say whether or not the players resembled those of Michael Parkinson's recall.

Bill Fowler was an athletic and agile shot stopper. Full backs John Low and Roger Good didn't particularly have the air of convicts about them. John Ashworth was probably the tallest man in the team, but had a normal shaped head and was a stylish and skilful defender. Half back Dave Richards fitted the bill, being pugnacious and aggressive. Wingers Arthur Peel and Viv Evans were both quick and clever, but bandy legged? I have no idea.

Certainly Charlie Townsend and Hugh Lindsay had the air of footballing intellectual superiority about them. Centre forward Clive Jones was no battering ram, and all I really remember about Ken Merry was that he was losing his hair.

hile I remember little about the players or the game, the atmosphere and occasion has never left me - a big crowd of at least 2,500 and a sense of aggression, not from chanting youngsters, but from men of all ages spitting

trying to deter Wealdstone attacks.

It was an atmosphere you could cut with a

I can still hear the roar of approval when an over-tolerant referee finally booked England amateur international right back Derek Gamblin for his 100th or so foul on Viv Evans. My Arsenal supporting uncle had previously taken me along t Highbury a couple times, and even to a North Lor don derby at White Hart Lane, but those games had not grabbed me in the way Wealdstone v Sutton United did. The cloying atmosphere of suppressed violence was cocaine to me as a 10 year old. It was the football equivalent of Long Covid. I caught the bug and have been unable to shake it off.

I've been lucky. The subsequent 60 years have allowed me to see the club win almost everything meaningful it has won in its 124 year history. I wasn't vet born when it lifted the Athenian league title in 1952, but I was at Wembley to witness our winning the FA Amateur cup in 1966, the Southern League South championship in 1974, the Southern League in 1982, the non-league double

in 1985, the various championships and promotions under Gordon Bartlett's stewardship that culminated in promotion to the Conference South in 2014: and I was still alive and just about compos mentis in 2020 when we won the National League South title and promotion to the National League top level.


ut supporting a proper club like Wealdstone is as much about failure and misery as it is about joy and success. I also witnessed the catastrophic 1987/88 season of three different managers and relegation for the first time in the club's history; the sale of

our spiritual home, Lower Mead, in 1991 and the financial disaster of the two-year stint at Vicarage Road that resulted in the club going into administration.

I attended home and away during the extraordinary two years based at Yeading, during which we on occasion fielded players who (it seemed) had barely seen a football, let alone kicked one in anger. I followed the club to Edgware and the voluntary double relegation we took for the privilege to play there.

For my sins I was even persuaded to take on the Club Secretary role briefly while we were at Northwood - when we were so skint that poor old Gordon Bartlett would lose out on players he hoped to sign when they were offered an extra liver to turn out for Chertsey Town or Epsom & Ewell. Desperate times. How Gordon managed to field competitive teams at the time was a mystery to me then and remains so to this day.

he move to Ruislip has of course been one of solid and continuing progress, with no little success. As I recently sat amongst the 10,000 plus spectators at Wrexham's Racecourse Ground to see our team perform brilliantly against a team largely made up of players culled from higher divisions, I ruminated on where we now were compared to my earliest games following the club. Physically the players are probably different to those of 60 years ago, and they certainly bear



little resemblance to Michael Parkinson's eleven. You rarely see a player carrying any "timber". There's no half-time fag: Heaven knows how Vic Schwartz would manage now.

Players are sleek and athletic, and play the game at a phenomenal pace. With the professional academies having been around for a while now, the players being produced who drop to our level have great touch and skill (what the pundits boringly term 'technical ability').

To a degree, for me and perhaps others of my vintage, where we are now seems all a bit surreal. While we can be playing at home every other week in a traditional non-league ground in a traditional informal atmosphere closely associated with non-league football - and can replicate that

when we visit Maidenhead, Dorking and to a lesser extent at Boreham Wood, Woking, Bromley and one or two others - we also are transformed to a different football planet with visits to Wrexham, Notts County, Chesterfield, Oldham, Southend, Scunthorpe and many others. We have one foot in non-league and one foot in the big league.

often read with interest the excellent discussions on the Stonesnet Forum about where fans wish us to be. Is there regret at us effectively leaving behind our traditional non-league roots or do fans see us as driving forward to

establish ourselves in the full-time EFL?

It's a difficult discussion to have. Like almost everything in football outside the Premier League where they openly speak of "product" rather than football, genuine fans of football clubs like ours are driven by love of their club, ambition, history and tradition.

I look at and marvel at where we are. Compared to 1963 we are in a smaller stadium and probably averaging crowds just a little lower than we were attracting in what was the tail end of the post-war attendance boom years for football. The standard of football generally is now better and certainly quicker than 60 years ago.

Wealdstone were then competing in the unofficial second division of southern amateur

football along with familiar opponents such as Enfield, Hendon, Barnet and Sutton United, but also teams like Redhill and Walton & Hersham. Grosvenor Vale is a cracking little ground – higgledy-piggledy, eccentric, welcoming, and in the right circumstances able to provide a terrific atmosphere. In reality it is barely fit for purpose for the National League, located in the middle of an inter-war residential estate, with only one entry and exit point to the site and rudimentary facilities for both players and spectators.

he most practical solution would be to move the club to a more accessible site and into a purpose-built modern stadium. The alternative would be to secure a long lease for The Vale and develop the stadium to EFL standards, although the entry/exit problem would remain and successfully obtaining council approval for major developments might be tricky. I know some would welcome our having a stadium something along the lines of The Hive which possesses every facility one could imagine, and I fully appreciate why they do so, but for me it is absolutely soulless and I struggle to make a link between the team that plays its home matches there and the club that used to ply its trade at Underhill.

For me the second option is the more attractive as it retains the emotional link to the club I have supported for so long. But I have now turned 70 and the future of the club belongs to the new, younger generation of Stones fans. It is for them to decide where they want the club.... not grumpy old farts like me!

### **THE MOORS**

Solihull Moors FC is a merger between the former Solihull Borough and Moor Green football clubs.

Solihull Borough was formed in 1953 by Joe McGorian and the Club was originally known as Lincoln FC. Borough progressed through the local leagues before joining the Midland Combination

in 1969, where they spent 22 seasons, eventually resulting in promotion to the Southern League. In 1989 the club was forced to sell it's Widney Lane ground to property developers but after a proposed relocation fell through, a ground-share was agreed with local neighbours Moor Green - this was to last for ten years until the purchase of Damson Park in August 1999.

Moor Green was formed in 1901. The rst ground was on a part of a farm in Moor Green Lane, Moseley. Their ancestral home, The Moorlands, was acquired in 1930, and was situated in Hall Green, a suburb of south Birmingham. The 2003/4 season was a momentous one for Moors gaining a place in the newly formed Nationwide Conference North; However, the inaugural season was to prove a traumatic one with the devastation caused by two arson attacks at The Moorlands in January 2005, when the main stand and clubhouse were gutted leaving the club homeless. Moors thus became tenants of Solihull Borough at Damson Park.

With both clubs struggling to secure gates big enough to sustain the two teams, the merger of both seemed an obvious way forward and formed in the summer of 2007, Solihull Moors Football Club became one of the youngest clubs in senior English football. The new club took the place of Moor Green in the Blue Square Conference North. Bob Faulkner, the Moor Green manager was given the job to take the new club forward, but Borough Boss Mickey Moore would return in the new club's hour of need.

THE ARMCO AREI

For their first season Bob Faulkner ran with much the same team as the last Moor Green outfit and the Moors first competitive game was a 1-1 draw at home to Barrow AFC on August 11th, 2007, with a 90th minute equalizer from Darren Middleton, earning him the accolade of scoring the first league goal for Solihull Moors. The first win came two weeks later with a 3-1 home victory over Gainsborough Trinity, but the remainder of the campaign proved a struggle with the team rarely out of the bottom six in the league table. Survival was confirmed after the 40th league game of the season with a memorable 2-1 victory at Blyth Spartans on the penultimate Tuesday of the season.

Birmingham and Solihull Bees became tenants of the club during the 2010 close season and would play their rugby matches on either Fridays or Sundays.

During the summer break before the 2011/12 season Mickey Moore decided to take up an offer from Mans eld Town and Marcus Bignot, ex Crewe, Bristol Rovers, QPR and Millwall was announced as his replacement a week later.

2015/16 saw 11 new signings with Vanarama National League experience and it was clear as early as the pre season friendlies that this could be the squad to take us up to the National League and did so winning the title three weeks before the end of the campaign.

2016/17 and our first season in The National League saw a different looking squad than the one expected following the winning of the National North and at the end of October Marcus Bignot suddenly quit the club to take over at Grimsby. The void was lled by Liam McDonald a 31 year old who had successfully cut his managerial teeth at Redditch and Hednesford. There was much to learn and the path was rocky but survival was ensured in the penultimate game of the season which saw Moors nish in sixteenth spot with 54 points. Off the pitch The Automated Technology Group Stadium was brought up to National League standard.

2017/18 saw a miserable start to the season as we propped up the league. Liam McDonald made

way for Richard Money, but he quit after just 20 days before Mark Yates took over the reins with Tim Flowers as his assistant.

2018/19. Before a ball had been kicked in anger Mark Yates left to take over at League Macclesfield. Seamlessly Tim Flowers stepped up to the lead role and Gary Whild as his assistant. Several key signings have been mad to strengthen the squad and there was an air of expectancy around the club as it embarked on third year in the top-flight. Indeed, it turned out to be quite the season, as Solihull Moors made club history by gaining their highest ever league nish. The team nished second, just three points behind eventual champions Leyton Orient. The season didn't quite have the fairy tale ending as AFC Fylde defeated Flowers' side in the play-of semi- nal. Moors ended on 86 points, narrowly missed out on an FA Cup third round tie against Blackpool and reached the FA Trophy quarter-

In January 2020, Tim Flowers departed with the club sitting just outside the play-off places. Gary Whild and James Quinn took temporary charged of the side while the hunt for a new manager began.

In February 2020, Jimmy Shan was appointed as the new manager of Solihull Moors with Richard Beale coming in as his number two but as we entered 2021, Moors went on a poor run form and dropped down the table. In March 202 this signalled the end of Jimmy Shan's reign as he departed the club with assistant Richard Beale. Moors wasted no time in appointing form manager Mark Yates on a short-term contract until the end of the season.

Solihull finished the 2021/22 season in 3rd place when despite a 3-1 semi final victory over Chesterfield, the Moors lost 2-1 to Grimsby after extra time in the Play Off Final.

#### 3. BEN COKER - DEFENCE

Coker began his footballing career with Cambridge United and Northampton Town, before being picked up by Colchester United in 2010 following an impressive spell at Bury Town. The vast majority of Coker's experience within the Football League came at Southend United during a six-year period where he made more than 200 appearances.

#### 4. DAVID DAVIS - MIDFIELD 5. CALLUM HOWE - DEFENCE

Howe was one of the stand-out defenders in the division in 2018/19, helping Harrogate Town on their way to a place in the play-offs. A former National League winner in 2016/17 with Lincoln City, Howe has also featured for Southport, Eastleigh and Port

#### 6. ALEX GUDGER - DEFENCE

Alex signed from Brackley Town prior to the start of the 2018/19 season. Alex progressed through the youth ranks at Nuneaton as they won promotion to the Conference but is was at Rugby Town that he made his mark

#### 7. JOE SBARRA - MIDFIELD

Former Moors loanee Joe signed permenent terms with the clun in 2020. Sbarra began his footballing career through the youth academy of West Brom before becoming an academy graduate at Burton, making his senior debut on the final day of the 2016/17 season.



#### 8. CALLUM MAYCOCK - MIDFIELD

Maycock was given his first-team opportunity by Coventry City after initially joining the club as an apprentice in 2014. HE made his professional debut for the Sky Blues in November 2016. He played 32 times whilst on loan at League Two side Macclesfield Town in 2018/19, before playing regularly for Leamington in the National League North last season.

#### 10. JAMEY OSBORNE - MIDFIELD

Solihull-born Osborne came through the youth ranks at Hednesford Town. After a spell at Redditch United, he joined Moors in April 2016. He moved onto Grimsby Town halfway through the campaign but happily for Moors returned on loan and then permanently at the beginning of 2018.

#### 11. RYAN BARNETT - MIDFIELD

Moors were delighted to announce Ryan's return to the club. The 21-year-old penned a two-vear deal following his departure from Shrewsbury Town. The exciting young winger enjoyed a short loan spell with the Moors last season, which was unfortunately cut short due to an eye injury.

All good, right? Well, hang on a second. For one thing, much of this new merch is not affiliated to the







## 24 years ago: The hammer blow at Canvey as Ryman League KO our promotion on a technicality

FURY AS HOME FANS SING 'LET'S ALL LAUGH AT WEALDSTONE

Saturday April 10 1999: Ryman League Division One: Canvey Island 4 Wealdstone 2 henever accusations of 'bitterness' are levelled at supporters of our football club, even now, I believe you can point the finger at this game almost a quarter of a century ago.

And I don't mean the sort of bitterness that follows a travesty of a penalty award, or missing out on promotion on goal difference.

I mean the sort of bitterness that is engendered by witnessing deliberate manipulation. By seeing your club stitched up. Losing a new stadium. And, in the process, missing out on a whole generation of supporters.

Let me take you back to the turn of the year 24 years ago, with Wealdstone ground-sharing at Edgware Town's quaint White Lion ground following a decade of mismanagement.

We'd lost our

iconic Lower Mead ground; embarked on a suicidal groundshare at Watford's Vicarage Road; bailed out of there and shared at dismal Yeading; and then almost gone under, but for the club taking voluntary demotion from the cripplingly-expensive Southern League to the bottom rung of the Ryman Isthmian League.

And then the upward climb began. Promotion from Ryman Div Three; then promotion from Ryman Div Two. The crowds were slowly coming back and. on the horizon, the prospect

(after ten years of patient negotation) of a new

> ground at the Prince Edward playing fields site in Canons Park... barely a mile from our temporary home at Edgware FC.

t was all quietly exciting. At Christmas 1998, manager Gordon Bartlett (who had only joined the Stones in 1995 on the promise of a new stadium) had seen his team safely to

mid-table in Division One and it was decided to cut the playing budget to concentrate funds on the new ground at PEPF.

But that would take at least a couple of years to complete and so the club enquired as to what grade certificate the club would need for promotion to the Ryman Prem.

According to the Stones' Elmslie Ender fan-

zine at the time "The League management committee rubbished the ground and said that it would not even currently qualify for a Grade C, let along the Grade A needed for promotion, and without a C grade we wouldnt even be allowed to stay in the Ryman League the next season".

This concentrated minds, thousands of pounds that were supposed to be diverted to establishing infrastructure at PEPF was spent on new turnstiles, fencing and general sprucing-up of the ramshackle Edgware FC - a tremendous effort co-ordinating directors, supporters and contractors ( similar to the renovations at the Vale almost 20 years later) paid off with the award of the B certificate with a few weeks to spare before the April 1 deadline.

With the team now winning games and one of the three promotion places suddenly a possibility, Wealdstone then asked the league what was required to gain an A grade... and t answer was, actually, not much mo A few more seats, segregation and new turnstile.

But the clock was ticking.

et us allow The Elmslie Ender' Sudhir Rawal to take up the story, as printed in the fanzine

"It was a very tight schedule - I'm not sure of the exact timescales bu there were about ten days to get th work completed and nearly all was place when Alan Turvey, the Rymar League chairman came for his Apri inspection.

"The major work required was cov for the extra seats, installed in two rows at the front of the main stand, and the club were just installing a temporary cover (which would have been okay for the time being, according ing to Mr Turvey) when they were to that if a proper, permanent cover w in place by the time of the League management committee meeting or April 9 that would be better, and acceptable."

The Stones were on a storming ru with 11 wins and a draw in 12 gam as the day of trip to league leaders Canvey Island - 24 hours after the management meeting - dawned. But

still no word from the the Ryman League to co firm that the club had received the A grading.

Then the whispers began. Canvey were leak ing news that Wealdstone had not met the deadline. Word came though that Bishops Stortford knew. But our directors were told no

On the pitch, the Stones continued their rec brilliant form to go 2-0 up with two smart finis es from Brian Jones but word must have got to the players as they failed to perform after the break and slumped to a 4-2 defeat... the only loss they'd suffer in the last 19 games.

It was heartbreaking.

The decision by that committee ( with representatives from Enfield, Oxford City, Hitchin, Staines, Heybridge Swifts and, er Harrow Borough) put the club on its knees for half a dozen years but it wasn't deserted by the loyal core of officials and fans.

Having climbed above and beyond the Ryman League, this is now our reward and it tastes sweet, Canvey Island, it tastes very sweet.

first Prem season and had been pushing for the title at the end of 1975.

Chairman David Martel wielded the axe and manager Eddie Presland was gone, sacked

behind the stand at Hillingdon Borough after a spineless 4-1 defeat. It was a sign of his ambition that the highly regarded Nuneaton boss Geoff Coleman and his No.2 Alan Fogarty were parachuted in ... and the duo's first game in charge (four days before this clash with Dunstable) saw a 2-0 success at Weymouth. This was little short of a miracle as it was Stones' first away win of the season - and we finished with skipper Willie Watson playing in goal after keeper John Morton was carried off injured.

Two of Dartford's most influential players in their title winning season 12 months before had also signed: midfielder Danny Light and winger Kenny Halliday. Light was a revelation (and scored from 20 yards at Weymouth) as these successive wins hoisted Stones to third from bottom above Cambridge city and Stourbridge. But three would be still relegated and indeed, we would have fallen through the trapdoor had not Dunstable announced their resignation from the Southern League at the end of the season.

The Bedfordshire club had over-extended themselves under the management of Barry Fry. He had lured stars like George Best and Jeff Astle to wear the red shirt of Dunstable and now they were penniless and desperate. We certainly played them at a good time - they played like

men under a death sentence and although Stones' confidence was fragile we scored three times on a bone-hard surface to snatch three priceless points. That, and Dunstable's demise, was enough to keep us up!




