



From the Chairman

Good afternoon and welcome back to the Vale. Today we warmly welcome all the Ebbsfleet officials, supporters, players and management to this afternoons

Vanarama National League game.

Few teams in football have a more interesting recent history than our opponents today Ebbsfleet. They became famous to most football fans in 2007, when taken over by the website MyFootballClub with members having a vote on player selection, transfers, and all major club decisions. Nowadays they are under Kuwaiti ownership and significant investment has gone into the club as it has run up losses of well over £1m each year for the last few years. It is therefore no surprise to see Ebbsfleet up towards the top of the table a position they are expected to remain for most of the season.

This is our first dedicated "Her Game Too" fixture a voluntary campaign which aims to raise awareness and educate others on the importance of inclusivity and diversity in sport and tackle head on sexism in football. A special thanks to our very own Her Game Too ambassador Nicola Brown who has coordinated the event and you can read more about the aims and objectives of the campaign later in the programme.

It is a great pity that financial problems continue to dominate the headlines in our division. There are currently grave concerns that Southend current financial problems may signal the end for a club with such a long history. Of course, we know these difficulties only too well ourselves. It is the principal reason we as your board of directors have given our overriding focus to ensuring financial stability and sustainability.

Nothing else comes close to this – whether that be the new stadium, an extended lease at Grosvenor Vale, National League survival or even promotion, vital those all these are to the future of the club.

As a board of directors, we are aligned in ensuring that the club develops and grows in a sustainable manner. This means supporting the management team with a playing budget which the club can afford and in no way jeopardises the future of the club for short term success on the pitch.

But we must temper outright ambition with reality, and we have no right to gamble our future

on your behalf chasing the dream.

Yes – there will always be differing views on team selection and tactics, but these must be set in the overall context, just ask Southend.

For us it's been an exciting but mixed start to the season, some of the football played through periods of games has been excellent and there is a sense of disappointment that we have only 8 points at this stage of the season.

The summer for any football club is a busy period, on the playing side the most important business was delivered early with Stuart and Matt committing their future to the club and many the squad retained. As chairman I need to ensure Stuart starts the season with the players he wants, and I know he's happy with the current squad, with its exciting blend of experience and youth, as always, we are keeping a close eye on the loan market to see how the squad can be enhanced. We also saw our goalkeeper Sam Howes get a move into EFLI with Leyton Orient and of course we wish him all the best.

Preseason went well, EFL teams Charlton, Milton Keynes, AFC Wimbledon and Wycombe all came to the Vale for preseason friendlies, the squad went into the Vanarama National League season well prepared with nearly all the squad being fully fit. Our thoughts however, go to Luke Dreher who was so unlucky to break his arm just a few hours after signing a contract with the club. Luke is back doing light training and look forward to seeing him back in a Wealdstone shirt in not the near distant future.

We are delighted with the addition of the new Media Centre, and we thank Watford FC Women for their financial contribution towards it. Watford FC Women were able to complete their first season at the Vale by clinching promotion to the Womens Championship and they are now signed up for a further three seasons subject to Grosvenor Vale being up to the standard for the league Watford are playing in. If you enjoyed the Womens World Cup then do come along to Vale on Sundays to watch some top level womens football, entry remains heavily discounted for Wealdstone FC season ticket holders.

The stadium passed all the usual league, police and local authority inspections over the summer and we also managed to change our ticketing system in a seamless manner. You will have seen around the Vale new stadium information clearly

outlining what will not be tolerated in the stadium. We have a zero-tolerance policy on anti-social behaviour, the use of pyrotechnics along with any form of discrimination. We are a family club and a welcoming environment for all. Problems are few and far between at the Vale, but we have in recent months had to issue banning orders to a small number of individuals who seemed intend on causing problems with opposition fans. If you see anything that you believe is inappropriate behaviour, please report it to a steward, club official or a police officer.

My vision when I took over as Chairman was to see Wealdstone FC as much more than just a first team, and we are playing an ever-expanding role in the community. This is most visible in our partnership with Hillingdon Council where we were delighted to be selected to host a Holiday Activity and Food programme over both Easter and the Summer. As you probably know by now, the HAF programme gives children from under privileged backgrounds access to activities, hot meals and healthy eating education over the school holidays. Supporters that may have popped into the Vale during the three weeks of the summer camp would have been fascinated to see Grosvenor Vale turned into a medium sized primary school with around 100 children on site each day. What was really pleasing was to see was how the club came together to facilitate the camp, from the Wealdstone Youth in promoting the event, the management team of The Vale facilitating the children to have full use of the facilities, and of course the first team players who gave up their time to coach and inspire some of the children: Charlie Barker, Max Kretzschmar, Tarryn Allarakhia, Gio McGregor, Dante Baptiste, layden Mundle-Smith and Nathan Ferguson all got involved and I thank them for that. We counted around 30 children from the camp at the game against Dagenham & Redbridge on Bank Holiday Monday, visiting the club on matchday for the very

Many of our successful community efforts introduced last season will continue and we plan again to give away up to 2k free tickets to local school children as part of our "tickets for schools initiative", we will continue to welcome displaced Ukrainian families to the Vale and the "Ticket for Troops" initiative has already started.

As a result of the opening of the 2nd Academy site at Brunel University Sports Park, we have now taken the exciting step of introducing a competing U23's side. This completes our player pathway through our academy structure and will over time greatly assist us to fulfil our stated ambition of developing home grown talent into the first team. As the academy season gets under way, we will keep

you up to date with developments through social media and the matchday programme.

In a few weeks' time I will have a special guest Geofrey Rodgers, Vice Chancellor of Brunel University, who has been incredibly helpful and enthusiastic in making the club welcome as we settled in at the University facilities and we are exploring together many areas where Wealdstone FC and the University can work in partnership. This summer you may have seen two Brunel students working in and around the Academy and Grosvenor Vale and helping out at the first few home fixtures. The two students, Daniella Da Goia studying Sport, Health & Exercise Science and Tim Adjay studying economics and accounting, joined the Club for 8 weeks as part of the University Summer Internship Programme which aims to give students from Underprivileged backgrounds valuable work experience in order to help their employment opportunities when they graduate. They had a fantastic time and helped get the academy and the football club ready for the new season. These will be the first of many faces from Brunel University we hope to see around the club and the academy in the coming months.

We have had further conversations with Landlord KSIMCs as we attempt to work together to agree the future for Grosvenor Vale. We have their commitment that should we need an extended lease to progress through the football league they would grant it. We have therefore, in partnership, started the process of designing the future for Grosvenor Vale and plans will be shared when we reach an appropriate point in the process. With site development plans for the Vale being produced, academy expansion and greater community presence and engagement in and around Hillingdon this is such an exciting time to be involved in the Football Club.

A huge thank you to the Wealdstone Supporters Club who presented the club with a £10k cheque on the pitch during our recent fixture against AFC Flyde. The supporters club work incredibly hard to raise funds for the club both on matchday and at various events which include hosting fans of teams visiting Wembley and these events were incredibly successful this summer with fantastic reviews shared by the visiting fans.

Finally, there are many ways to get involved and support your club whether it's to give an hour of your time before kick-off, simply using our bar before and after games or attending one of the many events that take place in the Vale. Without volunteers the club simply could not function so if you are interested, please reach out to the Club.

These days, players collapse poleaxed at the slightest touch, and while it's obviously a sensible precaution for referees to stop play in the case of head injury, they seem to have expanded the definition of 'head injury' to include disturbed hairstyles.

This occurred to me at Hartlepool last week when one of our players went down in the opposition box; it didn't look too serious, but the referee stopped play on the grounds of concussion risk, blowing his whistle just as another of our players had the ball on the edge of the area, goal centre, primed to shoot.

Though, being Wealdstone he may well have swivelled through 180 degrees and launched a hundred and twenty yard pass back to Jed Ward. Oh, and then the referee restarted play by giving an uncontested drop ball to Hartlepool.

Partially in response to the Gerry Byrne incident the FA introduced substitutes, one substitute, to be used only in the case of injury. Rather obviously, managers, Don Revie prime among them, quickly educated their players to feign injury if they wanted to make a tactical change, so after a couple of years it was agreed the substitution, one, could be made

> for any reason. And that's how things stayed, quite satisfactorily in my view for the next twenty-five years.

During my formative years watching Wealdstone I got so used to

seeing 'Sub Eglite' on the teamsheet I thought 'Sub' must be the first name of the short, fat, but surprisingly talented Dutchman who'd actually played for Ajax (well, its youth team).

Anyway, it will come as no surprise that the managers who want more substitutes to use are in charge of those 'big' clubs: big name, big budget, big squad. As opposed to Wealdstone who quite recently couldn't name the permitted five substitutes on the bench to choose from. Incidentally, I watched the Eastleigh v Aldershot game on TNT Sport and was amused by pundit Adam Virgo's repeated wailing about Aldershot not having a substitute goalkeeper available after Jordi van Stappershoef was sent off (the fourth official added three minutes stoppage time just to allow for how long it took the referee to write his name) and having to make do with a couple of hapless centre-forwards between the sticks who inevitably eased the Shots to a comfortable defeat.

Fair enough, but instead of blaming Tommy Widdrington for not naming a goalkeeper among his five substitutes - I mean, goalkeepers do get injured, goalkeepers do get sent off - he laid the blame fairly and squarely at the door of the authorities for not allowing more substitutes.

In the Premier League you can now use five substitutes from nine. In the World Cup, you can have your entire squad on the bench to pick from. The substitutes bench at Wembley is bigger than the main stand at Grosvenor Vale.


Does any of this improve the game? No, of course not, it just makes matches disjointed and disrupted and now a hundred and something minutes long. Every manager, of course, thinks he's a tactical genius who thinks he can change the course of a match with an inspired substitution or five. Supporters beg to differ. What you hope is that your best eleven are on the pitch at the start of the match and are capable of playing an entire game, in which case there is no reason to think any of the players on the bench are going to improve matters.

An interesting question: what percentage of matches are won by the team that makes the most substitutions? (Don't actually expect an answer to this, though if anyone out there is lacking what most of us refer to as 'a life' it wouldn't be terribly hard to work out.)

Anyway, having previously gazed into my crystal ball and predicted the length of a match will soon be determined by an official timekeeper with a stopwatch. I have revisited my predictive talents and suggest within a few years managers will be allowed unlimited substitutions from a squad of twenty five. Not long after, players who have been substituted will be allowed to

return to the field of play. And eventually substitutions will be allowed while the game is in progress like in ice hockey. Ridiculous? Feel free to chisel 'he was right' on my gravestone.

Hendon. It wasn't until about 1960 when the likes of Bill Fowler, Charlie Townsend, Ron King, Hugh Lindsay, Matt Farrelli and the Aldridge brothers started playing that I really started to

concentrate on the proceedings, although I do remember Ted Culver and George Mowle (who played in the late 50's), and whom I played with/for at Hatch End in my late teens/early twenties. I also played for Parkfield and Wealdstone Wanderers. I did acyually have a trial for Wealdstone, along with fellow fan Ray Kemp in my early teens but wasn't good enough - although I did make the Supporters side in their early days when we played behind Harrow Weald Bus Garage in the Marathon League.

At that time Hendon were probably our greatest rivals.

the games were generally close affairs and the Final was no different. It was all very close up to half time, but in the second half Wealdstone upped the pace and their superior fitness got them to the win. The celebrations for me were long lasting not only in the Stadium but enjoying the walk down Empire Way afterwards which seemed to be owned by Wealdstone fans, with the Hendon support seeming to have melted away.

WO seasons later, another match that was memorable for me was an away match in the FA Cup against Torpoint, the far side of Plymouth. We travelled by coach overnight arranged by Barbara Robson (whom I understand might be attending today) and her mother. and at some point on the journey our coach, one of five

Taking it to the M₃

Our erudite striker/midfielder Max Kretzschmar explains the frustration of being sidelined with a recurring hamstring injury...

Hello again Stones fans!

IT'S BEEN a while since my last column and it feels like a while since our last win: that dramatic encounter against AFC Fylde. In reality, it's only been three games but it's important we get back to winning ways today at home to National League South winners Ebbsfleet.

As of the time of writing I'm awaiting scan results for my hamstring injury. It's a very unnerving and frustrating time.

I recently discussed in an interview that the player often gets criticised or bemoaned when he/she is injured.

Of course, as players we can't really control what is said about us but I feel the emotions and feelings of an injured player are often overlooked and ignored. Injuries in football I feel are like nothing in the so called 'normal' working world.

You are prevented from both working and doing the thing you love most in the world. This can't always be said of a 9-5 job. It can be a lonely time.

All I want is a definitive outcome from the scans so I can rehab meticulously for the injury and come back stronger. But realistically, that can't really begin until the results come back. Hopefully, by the time you're reading this I will have clarity.

The injury did allow me to do the live stream video commentary for the match versus Dagenham & Redbridge alongside Paul Franklin. I have some experience doing commentary in my years at Woking for BBC Surrey Radio.

That was perfect work experience for my degree in professional sports writing

and broadcasting.

However, TV commentary is a little different. Where in radio it's important to be descriptive for obvious reasons. I concentrated on bringing a player's perspective and a little tactical insight when on comms last week. I hope that came across on the highlights.

Sean, our new capture from Arbroath in the Scottish Championship (via West Ham and QPR) is the epitome of 'laid

Even breaking clear of defenders and rolling the ball across the six-yard box appears to be child's play for the 6ft 3in East Londoner.

And his first competitive goal

for the club at Aldershot - not to mention the brace he netted at Farnbrough in preseason - was simply and efficiently despatched,

"I just want to get on the pitch and play" he says. "I have to admit that I didn't know much about the club, and only recognised the Ruislip area because

of driving to QPR for training. And the Wealdstone Raider of course, does he still come to games?

"The move to the Stones came through my agent and as soon as I'd started training I knew that the style of play would suit me. We have some very good players!

"Seriously, the

way we play you have to be very good technically and it's been impressive. I like the build-up style, it's different and much better than most full-time clubs, let along part-time ones... most others play direct football and I find myself just fighting for the ball all the time".

Sean's mentor at West Ham was the former Hammers and England striker Carlton Cole, another big awkward customer who eagerly took the teenage

Sean was at West Ham from the age of six and starred in the Barking & Dagenham District team that produced such luminaries as Bobby Moore, limmy Greaves and John Terry. He

signed his first pro contract at 18, one year with an option for a further year - which was triggered as he played his part in the successful Hammers under-23

"But injuries slowed me down" he says ruefully.

West Ham released him in 2021 but he impressed in a trial at **OPR** to win a contract after scoring four goals in five games pre-season. He was a fixture in the Rs' B team, playing against other under-23s and B sides in friendlies... but then came a pars fracture of the lower spine.

"It is a stress response to overuse and it put me out for ten months" Sean explained. "Not surprisingly they released me, but Arbroath in the Scottish Championship then came in for me and I had

> an enjoyable time up there... it's very different to East London, very quiet and peaceful and I was staying in a clubhouse with a couple of other players which was an experience for me, the

first time away from home. "It is an 8-hour drive from London

though, or just over an hour by plane which I did once or twice" Arbroath, on the East coast of Scotland are one of the smallest clubs in the Scottish Champion-

ship (second tier) - and like ourselves are one of very few bart-time clubs at that level.

"It's actually more a hybrid model" said Sean. "Some players came in every day, others less frequently. The standard is probably the equivalent of the National League or League Two-I don't think there is really much different between the levels. I scored a couple of goals (against Ayr United and Greenock Morton) in a dozen games and had an assist but the back trouble flared up again and my deal ran out at the end of that season."

Shockingly, Sean left the idyllic Scottish seaside town without even trying one of its famous 'smokies' - fresh salted haddock cooked over a hardwood fire. All you need to know about... EBBSFLEET UNITED

The opposition in focus

Ebbsfleet United Football Club was born as Gravesend & Northfleet, a merger of two existing neighbouring clubs – Gravesend United and Northfleet United. Both had been playing football in the area since the 1890s, with Northfleet in particular notable as a Tottenham nursery side in the

The newly merged club formed in April 1946, moving into Northfleet's superior facilities at their

Stonebridge Road ground, with most of the directors coming from Gravesend United. The Fleet played their first ever game on 31 August 1946, against Hereford United, and ran out 3-0 winners in front of over 5,000 fans.

Despite lofty ambitions and full-time investment,

the Fleet teams of the Fleet teams of the Forties and early Fifties yielded only two Kent Senlor Cups and it was not until 1957-58 that the club tasted league success, with manager Lionel Smith's star studded and attacking side claiming the Southern

League title and scoring 135 league and cup goals along the way.

But the success did not last, and financial concerns meant that the Sixties were a torrid time for Fleet fans. Nevertheless, during this period the club enjoyed their best ever FA Cup run when

they reached a Fourth Round replay at Sunderland, setting an existing record of five months as the longest cup run of any team in the long history of the competition.

Relegation and promotion seasons came and went, notably in 1967 when the entire Board resigned en masse, leaving the club with nothing but a ground and considerable debts. Things picked up after Tony Sitford's appointment as manager in 1974, and the Fleet duly won the Southern Division utile in 1974-75.

Despite a hoped-for Premier Division title challenge over the next few years, consolidation instead followed. A brief title challenge was mounted in 1976-77, but the Fleet did take home the Southern League Cup that season, following victory over Weymouth in the final.

Fleet's decent showing over the next two season meant they qualified as founder members of the

newly created Alliance Premier League (later Conference) in 1979-80, finishing an excellent fifth in its inaugural season.

But the Eighties spelled more hard times for the club and relegation followed in 1981, and a further relegation to the Southern Division in 1985-86 meant Fleet were back in the doldrums of non-league football. Having almost gone to the wall as financial

problems beleaguered the club, a group of directors under new chairman Lionel Ball rescued the Fleet and were rewarded with a promotion back to the Premier Division in 1988-89 and a best-ever FA Trophy run, with two Conference scalps claimed along the way.

Following relegation once again in the early Nineties, the Fleet won the Southern Division by a country mile in 1993-94, with hot-shot goalscorer

Steve Portway netting goals for fun.

Another cup run followed in 1995-96, Fleet playing 10 games to reach Round 3 and lose out 3-0 to Aston Villa at Villa Park.

In May 1997, the club transferred to the Ryman Premier Division in an effort to cut travelling distances and reduce costs, and after a few seasons in mid-table, came from nowhere under manager Andy Ford to land the Ryman League Championship in 2001-02, following a nervous and titanic struggle with Canvey Island, which saw the two meet at Stonebridge Road in April 2002 in front of an official 4,068 (but probably more like 6,000) fans.

Back in the top-flight of non-league football, the Fleet had a few narrow brushes with relegation, with Andy Ford stepping down in January 2005.

New manager Liam Daish oversaw a move to full-time football and made slow but steady

progress. 2007 was the year it all changed for the Fleet. First, in May, 61 years after the formation of Gravesend & Northfleet, the club announced a change of name to Ebbsfleet United to take advantage of the massive regeneration of their locality. Then in November 2007, it was announced that the club was to be taken over by internet venture MyFootballClub.co.uk, a revolutionary idea involving paid members owning the club, voting on decisions and picking the team, a deal that was ratified in February 2008.

On the footballing side of things, the Fleet enjoyed their most memorable moment in more than six decades, clinching victory in the FA Trophy Final at Wembley Stadium, a 1-0 win over Torquay United in front of 40,186 proving enough to take home the silverware.

With hopes high for 2008-09 and the club's highest-ever playing budget voted on by MyFC members, the eventual league position of 14th was disappointing.

With the fall in MyFC membership in February 2009, Fleet faced an uncertain future, releasing almost their entire first-team squad. Liam Daish remained as manager and rebuilt a squad that almost, heroically, defied the odds but fell to relegation on the final day of the 2009-10 season.

The manager was forced to rebuild again in 2010-II as the club embarked on its first season at a lower level in nearly a decade and Fleet unexpectedly won promotion back to the Premier Division at the first attempt. It came courtesy of a third-place finish in the league and a 4-2 win at Farnborough in the play-off final.

Returning to the Conference Premier for the 2011-12 season, the club finished a creditable 14th in their first season back in non-league's top flight. The following season, however — despite much initial optimism — saw the Fleet struggle to compete and a relegation that looked inevitable from early on was confirmed in April 2013, Fleet finishing second bottom of the division, a long way adrift of safety. Off-field matters dominated, with several appeals for investment throughout the season until fans were faced with the very real threat of the club closing or taking voluntary demotion down the non-league Pyramid.

In May 2013, a purchase proposal from a Kuwaiti company, KEH Sports Ltd, was put to MyFC who voted to sell their interests in the Fleet and so began a new era for the club as it pulled back from the brink of closure. KEH - with former Charlton CEO Peter Varney as vice chair - began an immediate ground restoration programme, with the long overdue replacement of two roofs at Stonebridge Road and refurbishment of the entire stadium. Ex-Charlton defender Steve Brown replaced Liam Daish, his record-breaking eight-year term ended by mutual consent, with ex-Charlton manager Steve Gritt as assistant, while KEH promised a competitive transfer budget in a bid to propel the Fleet back towards the Conference Premier. That season Fleet were just pipped to promotion by Dover Athletic, losing the promotion final I-0. With promotion still very much a target, former Welling United boss Jamie Day took over in mid-season 2014/15. His considerable shake-up of the squad didn't quite produce the desired effect

and although Fleet reached the quarter-finals of the FA Trophy, they dropped away badly in the league to finish 8th. Former club skipper Daryl McMahon was handed the manager's reins in time for the 2015/16 season and began

with a bang, winning 10 of his first 11 matches in charge. Fleet led the league for eight months of the season but were pipped to the title by Sutton United and lost a second promotion final, this time to Maidstone United, on penalties. There was no mistake in 2016/17 with Fleet getting over an indifferent start to remain unbeaten throughout 2017. Despite

amassing 96 points, Fleet were just beaten to the title by Maidenhead United on 98 points, but erased the previous season's play-off heartache by coming from behind with 10 men to overhaul

Chelmsford City 2-1 in the final and spark joyous celebrations at the club. Off the field, the club demolished the Liam Daish Stand in 2016 to build a new £5m Main Stand and the Plough End

behind the goal will soon follow to incorporate a hotel during 2018/19 as the Fleet seek to redevelop the entire site for the benefit of the club and local community.

In our first season back at National League level, the club reached the play-offs for the first time before succumbing to eventual winners Tranmere Rovers. DarylMcMahon departed the club after three-and-a-half years in charge in November 2018, makingway for the appointment of the experienced Garry Hill who oversaw a major reshaping of the squad amid a financial restructuring off the pitch. But with Fleet rooted to the bottom in his second season, Hill parted ways with the club in October 2019, to be replaced by his assistant Kevin Watson who gained sufficient points to see the Fleet climb out of the dropzone by March 2020. That, however, coincided with the global Covid pandemic and Fleet were one of only three clubs to be relegated on points per game, our total of 0.02 points difference deemed enough to send us down.

Fleet headhunted new boss Dennis Kutrieb from Germany in the summer of 2020, who came with an excellent reputation as a go-ahead coach and had just won promotion with Tennis Borussia Berlin. He recruited a whole new side and in 2021/22 the Fleet finished in third place, making it to the promotion final where despite takingthe lead in time added on, a late equaliser and subsequent extra-time goal denied the club promotion.

The manager and his squad weren't to be denied a return to the National League for much longer, however, and the Fleet romped home to the National South title in 2022/23.

A French-born former Paris Saint-Germain youth who played five times for Mali. AHw moved to Amiens in the French second tier as well Dijon and Tours, with time in Spain and Belgium in between His first taste of English football was in 2017 with MK Dons. After that, Cissé played for Gillingham before joining Leyton Orient. A spell at Oldham Athletic was followed by a season at Eastleigh.

9. RAKISH BINGHAM - FORWARD

Bingham arrived at the Fleet in September 2020 and was top scorer last season. The forward has a strong background north of the border, having played for Falkirk, spent two seasons in the SPL with Hamilton Academical and most recently helped Dundee United achieve promotion to the Scottish Premiership.

10. CRAIG TANNER - MIDFIELD

Signed from Aldershot Town in 2021. Tanner began his career with Reading's academy and he made his debut in the Championship in 2014/15. He became a regular with AFC Wimbledon on loan in and then enjoyed a two-season spell with Plymouth Argyle from 2015-17. His next move was to the Scottish Premiership with Motherwell, He returned to England in September 2019 to sign for Aldershot Town.

II. DARREN MCQUEEN - MIDFIELD

Rejoined the Fleet for a second spell in 2022 having fired the club into the National League in 2017 courtesy of his winning goal in the promotion final. A former Tottenham youth player, he was originally signed by the Fleet after a spell at Maldon & Tiptree. Darren was capped by England C before moving on to Sutton United in 2018 and from there to Dartford. He signed for Dagenham & Redbridge off the back of that success and spent last season on loan with Dulwich Hamlet.

12. CHRIS HAIGH - GOALKEEPER

Signed from Concord Rangers in June 2021, the goalkeeper had made headlines with a man-of-the-match performance for the Beachboys in their FA Trophy Final at Wembley.

14. DOMINIC POLEON - FORWARD

Dominic has played more than 200 matches in the EFL, he signed for the Fleet in 2021. An ex-Chelsea and Southend United youth player, he was the leading scorer in Leeds United's U18s before turning out 36 times for the Whites across three seasons in the Championship from 2012-15. He spent four years in with Bury and Sheffield United on loan and then

permanently with Oldham Athletic, AFC Wimbledon and Bradford City. An undisclosed fee took him on to Crawley Town in 2018/19 after which he spent time with Newport County and Dover Athletic.

15. GREG CUNDLE - MIDFIELD

Cundle came through Gillingham's youth ranks and made his debut in 2017. He played eight times for the Gills also appearing on loan for East Grinstead Town, Tilbury, Margate, Billericay Town, Bishop's Stortford and Kingstonian. Following his release by Gillingham, he returned to Kingstonian and then East Grinstead before a move to Concord Rangers last summer but injury prevented him establishing himself in the side.

16. FRANKLIN DOMI - DEFENDER

Domi arrived from QPR in 2022 after his release from Loftus Road. The Albanian U20/21 international had been in West London since 2019 and has previous loan experience in the National League South with Concord Rangers and Eastbourne Borough. The promising young player started out with Enfield Borough

17. TOBY EDSER - MIDFIELD

Signed following a successful trial period in July 2022, Edser moved from Aldershot Town where he'd spent the last two seasons in the National League. He spent his formative years with Fulham and Charlton Athletic, moving on to Nottingham Forest on a two-year scholarship in 2018 and had a loan spell with Woking.

Signed in 2023 after departing Havant & Waterlooville. A former Sheffield Wednesday youth player, the full-back broke into senjor football at Bolton Wanderers. Loan spells for Carlisle United, Bury, Notts County and Blackpool followed before he signed for Peterborough United and then settled at Mansfield Town in 2017.

24. DAVID AMOO - MIDFIELD

David started in Millwall's youth then Liverpool, who he signed for in 2007 aged 16. He broke into the first-team squad under Roy Hodgson and played in the UEFA Europa League. He had loan spells with MK Dons; Hull City and Bury before permanent stays with Preston North End, Tranmere Rovers and Carlisle United. Amoo spent the next two years in Scotland at Partick Thistle. He has spent the past seven seasons in League Two with Cambridge United, Port Vale, Stevenage and Crewe Alexandra.

25. SHAQUILE COULTHIRST -

A February 2022 arrival signed after leaving Billericay Town, Shaq is an experienced front man who came through Tottenham's academy, earning loan moves to clubs including Torquay United, Southend United and York City. Peterborough United paid a fee to sign him permanently in 2016 and he also played in the EFL for Mansfield Town and Barnet.

26. HAYDN HOLLIS - DEFENCE

Signed from Chesterfield in 2022, Haydn played almost 140 games at Notts County in a nine-year spell at Meadow Lane after graduating from their youth system in 2009. In addition to loan spells with Barrow and Darlington, Hollis also spent half a season with Forest Green Rovers.

Tony Sitford managed Gravesend & Northfleet to the Southern League First Division (South) title in 1974/75. They started with a 4-0 victory at Andover and remained unbeaten in the Southern League for 18 matches until losing 2-1 at Ramsgate in January. Gravesend bounced back to secure four-goal wins over Crawley and Folkestone in quick succession and their only other Southern League defeat came at the end of March, losing 3-0 at Bexley. John Cowan, Phil Debnam, Colin Norman, Ken Pearce, John Thurgood and Tony Weston were everpresent as they scored 70 goals and won the title with 60 points from 38 games.

1977/78

Gravesend & Northfleet won the Southern League Cup for the first time in 1977/78. Tony Sitford's side beat Ashford Town 3-2, Maidstone United 3-2, Dartford 1-0, Nuneaton Borough 2-1 and Grantham 3-1 en route to the Southern League Cup final, beating Weymouth 2-0 on aggregate with extratime goals from Steve Brown and Brian Woolfe in the second-leg watched by 2,607 at Stonebridge Road. They were in contention for the Southern League title with Bath City and Weymouth before fading in the closing weeks and finishing fifth. Steve Brown was top scorer, while Dave Sargent and Lee Smelt were ever-present.


1988/89



Ace marksman Steve Portway scored 37 goals as Gravesend & Northfleet won the Southern League Southern Division title in 1993/94. Garry Aldous' side kicked off with a 2-0 victory at Buckingham and bounced back from a 2-1 defeat at home to Baldock to remain unbeaten in their next 25 Southern League games, with Steve Portway netting hat-tricks against Poole, Bury Town, Burnham, Salisbury, Dunstable and Braintree. They also reached the FA Cup first round proper, losing 2-1 at Leyton Orient. Matt Gubbins and Lee Turner were ever-present as Gravesend scored 87 goals, winning the championship with 92 points.

2001/02

Gravesend & Northfleet won the Isthmian League Premier Division title with a club record 99 points in 2001/02. They had a season-long battle with Canvey Island and the 2-0 victory at their rivals in January was watched by 2,111, while a crowd of 4,098 saw Canvey's 1-0 win at Stonebridge Road two months later. Other notable wins included 2-1 home and away to Aldershot Town, 6-1 at home to Croydon and 5-1 at Enfield. The 'Fleet scored 133 goals as they finished four points clear of Canvey Island. They also reached the FA Trophy fifth round and the FA Cup first round proper, losing 2-1 at Huddersfield

Town.

2007/08

The newly re-named Ebbsfleet United won the FA Trophy in 2007/08. Liam Daish's team defeated Carshalton Athletic 4-I, Dorchester Town 2-0, Weymouth I-0, Burton Albion I-0 and Aldershot Town 4-2'en route to the FA Trophy final. Chris McPhee missed a penalty but his goal on the stroke of half-time gave Ebbsfleet a I-0 victory over Torquay United at Wembley Stadium: Lance Cronin, Peter Hawkins, Sacha Opinel, Michael Bostwick, James Smith, Paul McCarthy, Chris McPhee, Neil Barrett, Luke Moore, John Akinde, Stacy Long (Gary MacDonald). The 'Fleet finished mid-table in the Conference Premier.

2010/11

Ebbsfleet United regained Conference Premier status at the first attempt in 2010/11. Owned by the web-based venture MyFootballClub, they lost just eight of their 42 Conference South games and qualified for the play-offs in third place. Michael West scored four goals as they defeated Chelmsford City 6-2 on aggregate in the semi-finals. Two further goals by West plus others from Ricky Shakes and Calum Willock gave Ebbsfleet a 4-2 win over Farnborough in the play-off final. Liam Daish's side took AFC Wimbledon to an FA Cup first round replay before losing 3-2 after extra-time watched by 2,306 at Stonebridge Road.



There had been much merriment two years before when Chic, playing in goal for the Bees at Colchester, went to gather a back pass and was struck by a small dog that had encroached on the pitch and was chasing the ball.

Brodie went down in a heap, much to the glee of ITV's Brian Moore on the following day's 'Big Match' programme, which had shown highlights of the game. But it was no laughing matter for the goalkeeper, whose professional career

A late Wealdstone onslaught almost pulled a draw out of the fire at the Suit Direct Stadium against high-flying Hartlepool United.

Cracking late efforts from substitute Olofela Olomola and Charlie Barker so nearly poached an unlikely point after a goal in each half from the prolific Tom Crawford and Manny Dieseruvwe had given the home side a 2-0 lead.

After 10 minutes of cat and mouse football Hartlepool went ahead. A low cross from the left was teed up for Crawford to crack a low right footer past Jed Ward from 16 yards.

It might have been 2-0 as Brody Paterson fired wide - and then Ward used his legs to deny Callum Cooke when a defensive mistake gave the striker time inside the box.

Stones were growing into the game though and Nathan ferguson flashed 20 yarder just too high, matched by a low effort from Pools' Cooke which Ward saved comfortably.

But as the visitors' passing game struggled to make headway against the well-drilled Pool, Cooke raced away down the left and squared the ball to the lively Crawford. He seemed certain to score but Stones' Charlie Clayden appeared from nowhere to block his shot.

The second half flared into life as Cooke's rifled 25 yarder drew a brilliant flying save from Ward. And then Stones substitute Tarryn Allarakhia was flattened on the edge of the Hartlepool box and Ashley Charles was a yard off target with the freekick.

Stones were looking to get on the front foot with

the introduction of Allarakhia clearly unner ving the home defence - and a genius turn by Tahvon Campbell on the hour gave Onaraisie his first uncomfortable moment before keeper Pete Jameson made a brave block to keep Pool 1-0 ahead.

Then after a flurry of corners, Jaydn Mundle-Smith picked out Jack Cook at the far post and the skipper's header dribbled just wide.

The introduction of former Stone Josh Umerah seemed to spur Hartlepool on and Ward saw two snap shots sail narrowly over.

The all-important second goal wasn't long coming though, Paterson breaking away on the left and his precise cross finding the towering Manny Dieseruvwe who climbed above the Stones defence to plant his 67th minute header past Ward.



28 years ago: A real A Cup classic sees the tones David slay the Goliath known as Grays DN THIS DAY 🔯 by Gordon McKay /

th September 1995: Grays Athletic (FA up 1st Qual Rd, away) Drew 2-2

IIS game was early in Gordon Bartlett's reign and me on the back of an unbeaten start to the sean. A totally new side had been put together and it as at the stage where everything was going for us. onfidence was high and the football world was irs for the taking.

Grays were in the Ryman Premier whilst we had it transferred across from the Southern League d had been unceremoniously dumped in Ryman v Three - so this fixture saw a gap of 4 divisions. This was a cracking cup tie which saw two evenly itched sides going toe to toe in the sultry late mmer conditions. A final result of 2-2 with two als from Paul Sheldrick was fully deserved and ovided great entertainment for the 291 crowd

(half of what Sudhir Rawal estimated) with most having travelled across London.

What happened next? Well, an absolutely stonking replay the following Tuesday under the White Lion Ground lights followed with the Stones winning 4-3 to complete a real giant killing.

However the euphoria of that night quickly evaporated in the next round when we lost 1-0 away to Hertford Town - a team that would finish near the bottom of our division and a team we would beat 7-0 later in the season.

This was the first crack that started to appear in this new team and by the end of the Autumn it had developed into a chasm. Once the doubts crept in it was clear things were not as they should be so changes were made but not enough to give us the season we had hoped for or indeed expected. We missed out of promotion, the very least we had anticipated.





But no matter; were were on our way to a muchneeded win and Jerome Okimo set up the rampaging Sellars for a lovely second goal on 71 minutes in front of a raucous Bulla Stand... and Ciaron Brown then headed his only Stones goal six minutes later from a Greenie corner. As we were playing home games on Monday nights in those days, we had just 48 hours to wait for our next Stones fix and Poole Town obligingly

rolled over for a 4-1 defeat with Eisa. this time, the star man. Gordon Bartlett had spotted the teenager's potential when playing for Uxbridge the previous season but was loath to play him too often, citing his youth... but he never looked back after this weekend as he became a fixture in Wilkinson's side.

It was little surprise when the big clubs came sniffing around the winger, and 12 goals and five months later he was snapped up by Shrewsbury. He is still playing EFL football six years later at Grimsby Town and we still hope that he'll 'come home' to the Vale one day!

What happened next?

Well of course this was the season of the FA Trophy semi-final run when we slalomed past Chelmsford, Wingate & Finchley, Hereford and Warrington to set up that epic

quarter-final at Billericay. The 5-2 win had us all believing in a Wembley trip only for eventual winners Brackley to prove just too good in the semis. Oh, and Bognor and Poole Town were both relegated that season while came 11th.
