





TWO WEEKS ago, we announced the thrilling news that Hillingdon had allocated the former Master Brewer site in Hillingdon for a new stadium for the Stones. Here is the Board's update.....

A new stadium and beyond

IT HAS BEEN an extraordinary couple of weeks for the football club as we announced the news that, following a year of negotiations between the club and London Borough of Hillingdon, land has been identified for a new home where we could build a stadium to enable us to pursue our ambition of playing in the English Football League (EFL).

The land, at Freezeland Way, Hillingdon, situated under three miles from Grosvenor Vale, has been redundant for a long time. It was identified as potentially suitable as it is ideally situated just a stonesthrow from Hillingdon Underground Station, the A40 and away from core residential areas. This is

undoubtedly a major step forward as we look to safeguard the future of the club and support our ongoing growth.

Thank you to everybody who has been involved so far..... the list is long but we would like to make a special mention to those local political leaders for whom decisions to support such a major infrastructure project can have implications.

Clir Jonathan Bianco, Hillingdon Council's Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Properties, Highways and Transport has been on record to say: "The council has a proud history of strongly supporting the borough's local sports clubs, including Wealdstone FC, which we know has a loyal and passionate

fanbase in Hillingdon.

"This is potentially a great win for all residents, not just for local sports fans, as the club's proposals have the potential to be a positive development that could bring many benefits to our borough.

"It's a long road ahead but we look forward to hearing more detailed plans in due course, which will undoubtedly be an exciting prospect for Wealdstone fans."

As has been made clear, no plans have been finalised and any proposals for a new stadium





would be subject to the club being able to find funding for the project, develop an acceptable plan and demonstrate a robust case that the project has significant benefits for the local community that goes beyond the core football function.

The Timetable

WITH SIGNIFICANT political and local support, the project has real momentum and our current expectation is within 12 months we will have submitted planning permission. Whilst political support is currently favourable we are all aware a general election is less than 12 months away and at this stage political support across all parties has not been confirmed.

Funding

THE INITIAL estimated cost of the new complete stadium build is circa £10m. The nature of new-build stadiums and the need to incorporate modern building regulations and the most recent disability act means that there is very little suitable at our existing stadium that could be transferred across. This would be a completely new build.

The funding for the new stadium is expected to come from a mixture of sources. We are in discussions with a number of partners around the construction of new residential units and commercial floorspace on the site. These modern and muchneeded properties will benefit from the same

outstanding location and transport links associated with the new stadium.

This alone though will not be enough to fund the stadium and we are in discussion with various grant funding bodies and local sport clubs who could also benefit from using the facility. In addition, a number of external investors have expressed an interest in supporting the development and the board are actively progressing discussions.

The future of Grosvenor Vale

RETAINING and developing Grosvenor Vale is parof our strategic vision. As was mentioned in Rory Fitzgerald's notes for the Ebbsfleet United game, we have started the process of designing the future for Grosvenor Vale and plans will be shared when we reach an appropriate point in the process.

The Vale would be an ideal facility for our training needs when the club implements our vision to go full time. The 12-acre site has ample room for an additional (3rd) Academy base as well as improved facilities for Wealdstone Youth and the wider community.

The big news though to break since our last

game here at the Vale- was of course the announcement Hillingdon Council have allocated 17 acres of land at the Master Brewer site opposite Hillingdon station to build and develop a new stadium for Wealdstone.

Whilst there are many hurdles still to cross, we may finally be getting a stadium to call our own, fit for modern-day football.

To be fair, it has been a poorly kept secret, as many people knew that this was a site that Hillingdon were interested in developing having lain empty for over two decades since the hotel closed.

Ironically it was to be developed by Tesco's, but this has never come to fruition. Wealdstone have six months, extendable for a further six months, to secure funding and to bring forward detailed plans. We have been here before of course.

When Lower Mead was sold, the developer we were partnered with were supposed to build Wealdstone a new stadium, on a site that had not been found as yet, but after the mortgage fraud that saw the demise of the developer and then the ill-fated purchase of Vicarage Road, saw the club

totter on the brink of extinction. Harrow Council finally granted permission for Wealdstone to develop PEPF with Stadia Management into a stadium and associated in getting thus facilities.

We know what happened next. far... Could we Stadia Management overspent on the site, together with their other projects, and went into liquidation/ of the holy grail? receivership. Despite the football stadium being largely completed,

the agreement with the council was that the stadium could only open once all of the other facilities were completed.

External consultants suggested that Staines Town, part of the same development project, should be completed but not PEPF - and the whole site was put back on the market by the

Despite Wealdstone partnering up with The London Playing Fields Association to complete the project, the council decided to go with another party and the rest is history. Now, I am glad that we aren't at PEPF, as I have said previously, as I don't believe the demographics of the area will support football to the level it needs to be successful. Harrow council, of whatever colour, have been unhelpful to Wealdstone at some time or another, so having a council like Hillingdon that is

fully onboard will be vital to seeing the project through to a successful conclusion. I am surmising but would think a new stadium is at least five years away and much of the funding of the complex will come from the build and sale of flats and other commercial units, in the same way as Woking's new ground development was supposed to be. There are a lot of moving parts which need to come together.

> Is the site located in the ideal place? For me, probably not as it around two and a half miles away from an area that we have made home and has welcomed us with open arms: a locality that is a football area above all.

But what were the alternatives? finally be in sight The Vale? The landlords do not seem willing to provide a long-term lease to allow it to be developed to

appropriate standards. Much has been said about West Ruislip Golf Course where the HS2 works are being undertaken, but was it ever a goer?

A new school is planned for there and could a football stadium be built to share the same space? ten minutes with...

BRANDON MASON

'I've returned to

live in the same

Watford digs...

home and so

it's like a second

good to be back'

FOR a long time (probably in the wake of the III-fated groundshare at Vicarage Road in the 1990s) Wealdstone and Watford kept their distance. But there are so many crossovers between the Stones and the Horns these days it's almost incestuous!

Just think of the former Watford juniors who

helped us to promotion three years ago: Dennon Lewis, Ashley Charles, Connor Smith and Connor Stevens.

Then there has been Andy Elefetheriou and David Sesay, while in the current squad Dante Baptiste, Mason Barrett and Dom Hutchinson have all worn the yellow & black.

Now you can add

Brandon Mason to that long and impressive list.

"I've been to watch a lot of games at Wealdstone in recent years as I've had so many ex-Watford friends with common links" says the 26-year-old left back who signed for the Stones a month ago. "And of course the gaffer (Stuart Maynard) has a Watford background and I've got him to thank for giving me a chance after being out of the game for a while".

Brandon's story is a familiar one. How many of

our talented and youthful players have found the path to first team football blocked at their EFL clubs?

There was an excellent interview with Brandon in *The Athlet-*(conline and newspaper) on the occasion of his return, with Coventry City, to Vicarage Road to face Watford in an EFL Cup 2nd round tie four years ago. Much was made of the fact that three years earlier he was the last Academy graduate to appear in a 1st XI game for the Hornets... and how the fans sang his name and 'he's one of our own'.

That game was Brandon's debut. He

came off the bench against a rampant Tottenham team in the Premier League on New Year's Day 2017.

The Athletic article says:
"The fans knew they were witnessing the introduction of a bona fide collector's item – a player who had come through Watford's academy. Since the Gino Pozzo era began in 2012 there had only been 12 in

seven years, with none in the last two. It's easy to see why Mason, who was number eight on that list, was met with such enthusiasm."

Brandon says: "That season I had been training with the first team every day and had the chance to try and impress the manager Walter Mazzarri with my dedication and intensity.

"The very first day he said he liked me a lot and that I've got something - and that he wanted to work with me and that I'd be a top player. He didn't speak much English but used an interpreter

to get that message across."

The game with Spurs was the pinnacle of Brandon's career so far.

"I was one of three academy players involved with the squad that week which narrowed it down - we knew we would all be on the bench, and



maybe even get a chance to play."

Brandon's chance came with 25 minutes to go, replacing the injured Holebas at left back and with his dad Sylvan's advice ringing in his ears ('Make that first tackle, complete that first pass,'') the 19-year-old did exactly that to spark the home crowd.

"I was up against Kieran Trippier and the thing I'll always remember was how Premier League players think so far in advance. I'd be shaping up to tackle him and he'd already be thinking of the next movement, the next pass. Spurs had Son Heung-min, Harry Kane and Dele All and I was just hoping Sonny wouldn't come across to my side.

They were some of the best

Spurs were 4-0 up after 46 minutes (Kane 2, Ali 2) so Watford won 1-0 while Brandon was on the pitch!

players in the world".

He kept his place for the next game thanks to Holebas' injury - an FA Cup 3rd round tie against Burton Albion. Watford won 2-0 and Brandon laid on the opening goal for Christian Kabasele with a low ball across the sixyard box (pictured above right).

He was fighting for a regular slot in Mazzarri's team but the pressure was all on the manager to avoid relegation from the Prem. Brandon was named in the side to face Millwall at the New Den in the next round of the FA Cup and

he was upset to be misquoted in *The Athletic* article as saying that the players 'weren't up for it'.

"We lost 1-0 but I got the impression that the club were more focused on staying in the Prem above all else" he says. With the club finally safe from relegation, Brandon made his final Watford Premier League appearance against mighty Manchester City at The

Vicarage on May 20... a game I was at.

Brandon's name seemed familiar as he performed heriocally in a bizarre starting XI. Shorn of several defenders, Mazzarri's last line-up before facing the axe saw two full backs (including Brandon) and a midfielder named in the back three. He even had two goalkeepers on the bench, but even that wouldn't have saved Watford from a mauling.

City were 5-0 up after an hour and that's how it finished, with ex-Stones Andrew Eleftheriou playing all the second half.

"That was memorable!" says
Brandon. "Andy is one of my best
mates but he's stopped playing
now - he's assistant manager at a
club in Greece. He'd suffered lots
of injuries and decided to go down
a different route... he's very into
coaching and tactics and I'm sure he'll
do well".

Brandon knew his days at Watford were numbered once Mazzarri got the push. "It was horrible for me", he says, though new boss Marco Silva almost gave him a chance early the next season against Brighton when Holebas was injured

"I got told a day before the game I was starting. I called my family. I couldn't believe it!

"But I was at the hotel on the day of the game and the gaffer pulled me aside and said I wasn't

From previous page going to play."

The reason? Watford deduced that old foe Anthony Knockaert would be starting for Brighton on the right, and Silva had decid-

ed that he wanted a more experienced player on that side to deal with the threat.

"Then, I got to the game and my kit wasn't laid out and I was told I wasn't in the squad at all. It was tough, especially with all my family there."

To compound his misery, he watched on as Miguel Britos (his replacement) scythed down Knockaert with a knee-high tackle that saw him sent off.

A loan move to Dundee United - not what Mason had desired - was next in store. And that heralded a 4-1 defeat by Falkirk as the youngster, nursing an injury, was given less than 24 hours to prepare for his debut by manager Csaba Laszlo.

Watford then decided not take up the option of an additional 12 months on his two-year contract, severing his nine-year association with the club.

His four Watford appearances may seem insignificant to some but they give him a record that stands to this day – the most games played by an academy graduate of the Pozzo era.

So how about Coventry City? I asked him. 30 games in two years and a promotion to the Championship?

It was the 2019-2020 season, disrupted by Covid and the Sky Blues pulled off the same trick as the Stones did when winning the National League South title: Coventry won League One on points-per-game.

"Yes, we had a really good side that season" says Brandon. "The standout for me was Dom Hyam, who's now at Blackburn... he was the centre-back and the unsung hero really, so consistent every week.

"But then there was Jordy Hiwula, the winger/inside forward who'd roll inside and I'd overlap. We had a good understanding. Callum O'Hare and Zane Westbrook too.... top players".

Brandon had a few assists that season but has yet to score even once in senior football.

Although he very nearly tucked the ball away when Jack Cook popped up with his winning header in injury time against Rochdale at the Vale a fortnight ago....

"Yes! I could have got my foot on it but I had



got beyond the defender and might have been offside. But I was right in line with the ball and knew it was going in... I didn't want to steal his glory!" So what are the 26-year-old's remaining ambitions? He spent time at Crawley Town in League Two after the stint at Coventry... does he still think he can

"I was brought up in Acton and my mum Angela did all the ferrying around to my youth games. I owe her a lot. I moved away when I went to Coventry but now I'm back at the orginial digs I stayed in when I was at Watford: it's like a second home and I love it there!"

Brandon has also found a promising career outside the game having just dipped into property management - and very soon development - since the turn of the year.

"It's something I've always been interested in my dad is retired now but he was a painter and decorator and is very keen to give advice. And to give advice about my performances when he comes to watch me play!"

Finally, I asked Brandon if he was aware of the importance of today's derby clash.

"Oh yes!" he said. "Connor Stevens is one of my best mates and of course he is a Barnet player now, having played for the Stones in the past. He says the rivalry is huge so I'll be doing my best to win it for Wealdstone. It'll be intense with a big crowd. I can'twait".


ford) with Woking at the end of the behind-closed doors season three years ago. So the Billericay clash is a game I'm really looking forward to.

League title in 1959 dulled the pain of Wembley defeat against Crook Town in the Amateur Cup final the same season. Two further consecutive League successes in 1964 and 1965, plus a narrow FA Cup third round defeat to Preston North End, were the catalyst for the Bees to turn professional, which they did when joining the Southern League Division One in time for the 1965-66 season. A 10-1 rout of Hinckley Athletic at Underhill in

Barnet's first game whetted the appetite for a third successive league title, and elevation to the Southern League Premier Division at the first

attempt.

Another Wembley final in 1972, a 3-0 defeat to Stafford Rangers in the newlycreated FA Trophy, and an epic FA Cup battle with Queen's Park Rangers the

following season proved to be the highlight of a quiet decade that saw the likes of Bob McNab, Terry Mancini and the mercurial Jimmy Greaves appear for the Bees, Barnet became founder members of the Alliance Premier League (later re-named the Conference) in 1979-80 but. despite new manager Barry Fry's attempts to rebuild the team, the Bees flirted with relegation almost constantly during the early part of the 1980s.

Saved from receivership, the club persuaded Fry to return to the Bees from rivals Maidstone for what proved to be a tumultuous 10 years at Underhill. After finishing runners-up three out of the previous four seasons, Fry finally led Barnet to the Football League after a dramatic 4-2 win at Fisher Athletic in their final game of the season. The Bees' maiden Football League season began with an extraordinary 7-4 home defeat to Crewe Alexandra and ended in play-off heartache, losing to BlackpoolP romotion to the third tier was achieved the following season but, following off-field turmoil in which the club escaped expulsion and lost virtually the whole playing staff, new manager Gary Phillips was unable to prevent the inevitable relegation back to the lower level.

Under Ray Clemence and John Still, the Bees quietly established themselves in the fourth tier,

twice making the play-offs, before being relegated to the Conference in May 2001. It took Barnet four vears to reclaim their Football League place as they secured the title at in Paul Fairclough's first full season as manager.

The 2008-09 season started poorly for the club and it wasn't until late September that the team recorded its first victory in any competition. Manager Fairclough subsequently brought forward his announcement to step aside and become a club director. Ian Hendon subsequently took

charge of the first team and successfully steered the club away from relegation.

In 2009-10 League status was only quaranteed on the last day of the season under reinstalled caretaker boss Fairclough.

In the close season of 2012 the entire backroom staff were released as the

club entered a new era with the appointment of Fairclough as director of football and Mark Robson assuming the role of head coach, with the emphasis very much on youth. Many of the previous season's players were also released; including skipper Mark Hughes who had scored the winning goal at Burton.

In mid-October, with the team yet to record a victory in any competition, the world-famous Dutch international Edgar Davids was named as joint head coach alongside Robson. This appointment stunned the football fraternity and attracted worldwide media coverage for the club.

Davids became a fixture in the team and soon took sole charge of team matters. Despite many impressive results, including an away win at eventual champions Gillingham, defeat to

Northampton on the final day of the season sentenced the Bees to the Conference on goal difference; the poor start to the campaign proving an impossible handicap to overcome.

There remained a mood of optimism at the club, boosted by the fact that Davids would again be at the helm for the Bees for the 2013-14 season butthe club narrowly missed out on the Conference playoffs, and Davids was replaced in the latter stages of the season. Ulrich Landvreugd and Dick Schreuder temporarily steadied the ship, before Martin Allen

returned for his fourth spell as manager and led Barnet to the Football Conference title the following season.


A bright start to the 2017 season including a narrow defeat at Premier League Brighton in the Carabao Cup and a 4-1 win away to Swindon saw the

Bees get off to a good start, but a poor run of form saw Mark McGhee replace Rossi Eames as manager in November.

McGhee was charged with appointing his successor and hired Graham Westley in January but with only 2 wins on the board in 11 games, Martin Allen was brought in for a fifth time. The Bees would win 5 of their last 7 matches but this wouldn't be enough to keep them up, relegation to the National League was confirmed.

Barnet finished the 2020/21 season second bottom and three places below Wealdstone and last season in 18th and two places below Wealdstone

Despite finishing 5th last season and securing a home tie in the Play offs the Bees fell at the first hurdle in the Quarter Finals 2-1 to Boreham Wood.

After just a single season in the National League, Barratt made the jump to League One with Southend United Barratt suffered a serious cruciate ligament injury shortly after signing for The Shrimpers and returned to Maidenhead.

26. GARY HOOPER - FORWARD

Hooper started his career at Grays Athleticnbefore joining fellow Essex side Southend United. Over the next four seasons, Hooper would make 112 appearances across all three levels of the Football League for Southend United, Leyton Orient, Hereford United and Scunthorpe United before moving to the Scottish Premier League to play for Celtic where he would win two Scottish Premier League titles and two Scottish Cups. He would play in the A-League, Indian Super League, Cypriot First Division and UAE Second Division before joining Barnet FC.

BARNET FC Greatest Seasons

CLASSIC CAMPAIGNS

Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS selects ten post-war Barnet 'Classic Campaigns'.

1958/59

Barnet reached the Amateur Cup final for the third time in 1958/59. The Bees lost 4-0 at Maidstone in their opening Athenian League match but stormed to the top of the table with nine straight wins. then trounced Walton & Hersham 7-1 and scored five times against Hendon, Finchley, Redhill and Southall as they pipped Wealdstone to the championship on goal average. Barnet defeated Sheppey United 4-0, Willington 8-4, Wycombe Wanderers I-0, Bishop Auckland 2-I and Walthamstow Avenue 2-0 in the Amateur Cup before losing 3-2 to Crook Town in the Wembley final.

1965/66

Les Eason was leading marksman as Barnet stormed to the Southern League First Division title in 1965/66. The Bees had turned professional that summer after winning the Athenian League title in the two previous seasons and kicked off with an incredible 10-1 victory over Hinckley Athletic. They dropped just one point in their opening ten games and remained in pole position with a 5-2 win at Gravesend & Northfleet, then a 7-1 victory at Sittingbourne. Dennis Roach was ever-present, while other key players included John Barr, Roger Figg and Barrie King, Barnet won the title by five points, finishing with a 5-0 win over Hillingdon.

1971/72

Tommy Coleman guided Barnet to the FA Trophy

final in 1971/72. Notable newcomers included Dickie Plume and Colin Flatt, with Barnet winning their first three Southern League games. They slammed five goals past Margate and Gravesend, finishing in fourth place after trouncing Cambridge City 8-3. Barnet lifted the Southern League Cup, beating Hereford on penalties after a 2-2

draw in the final replay,

but lost 3-0 to Stafford Rangers in the FA Trophy final at Wembley: Jack McClelland, Jimmy Lye, Peter Jenkins, Gerry Ward, Ben Embery, Barrie King, Colin Powell, Gordon Ferry, Colin Flatt, Les Eason, Dickie Plume.

1976/77

John Fairbrother scored 27 goals as Barnet swept to the Southern League First Division (South) title in 1976/77. The Bees were early pace-setters after winning six of their opening nine matches and beat holders Wimbledon 3-2 in the Southern League Cup second round. John Fairbrother netted four times in a 6-1 demolition of Poole Town and Barnet completed the double over nearest challengers Hastings United. They finished the season with a thrilling 20 match unbeaten run, winning the championship by a seven point margin. Billy Meadows' side included former First Division defenders Bob McNab and Marvin Hinton.

1990/91

Barry Fry managed Barnet to the Conference title in 1990/91. The Bees had finished runners-up in three of the previous four seasons and hammered Slough Town 6-I in their opening home match. They maintained their title challenge with seven successive wins and beat Northampton Town en route to the FA Cup third round. Andy Clarke was sold to Wimbledon in February but Barnet went top after winning 2-0 at home to Runcorn and pipped Colchester United to the title with five wins in their

last six matches. Gary Bull was leading marksman with 30 goals, while other stars included Gary Phillips, Gary Poole and Roger Willis.

1991/92

Barnet qualified for the Fourth Division play-offs under Barry Fry in 1991/92. Gary Bull and Mark Carter scored two goals apiece as Barnet began life in the Football

League with an amazing 7-4 defeat at home to Crewe Alexandra, then lost 8-4 to Brentford in the Rumbelows Cup. The Bees triumphed 6-0 at Lincoln City and soared to the top of the table by mid-November after just two defeats in 15 matches. They beat Scarborough 5-1 and remained in the promotion race for the remainder of the season, finishing in seventh position. Barnet defeated Blackpool 1-0 in the play-off semi-final first-leg but lost 2-0 in the second-leg.

1992/93

Gary Bull and Mark Carter netted 28 goals between them as Barnet won promotion in 1992/93. The most notable newcomer was former England international Brian Stein and the Bees were early pace-setters with just one defeat in their opening II games. They went top of the Third Division with a 2-0 victory at home to Rochdale in mid-December, then gained a thrilling 5-4 win over Torquay United during a 12 match unbeaten run. Colourful chairman Stan Flashman resigned and Barry Fry left to manage Southend United at the end of March, but the Bees gained four straight wins and finished third under player-boss Gary Phillips.

1999/00

John Still guided Barnet to the Third Division playoffs in 1999-2000. The Bees kicked off with a 2-0 victory at Chester and trounced York City 6-3, storming to the top of the table with six straight wins. They remained in pole position with a six match unbeaten run and won 5-3 at home to Lincoln in late January, but then slipped down the table after five successive defeats. Ken Charlery was leading

marksman and other notable players included Mark Arber, Darren Currie, Greg Heald, Lee Harrison and Scott McGleish as Barnet finished in sixth position. The Bees lost 5-1 to Peterborough United in the play-off semi-finals.

2004/05

Giuliano Grazioli scored 29 goals as Barnet stormed to the Conference title in 2004/05. Richard Graham, Dwane Lee and Dean Sinclair made their debuts as Paul Fairclough's side began with a 3-1 victory over Forest Green Rovers, racing to the top of the table after winning seven of their first eight games. Ian Hendon netted twice as Barnet trounced Dagenham & Redbridge 5-0, then they won 3-1 at rivals Carlisle United. The Bees extended their lead at the top with five successive three-goal wins and hammered Farnborough 7-1. They clinched the title with a 3-1 victory at home to Halifax and finished 12 points clear.

2014/15

John Akinde scored 31 goals as Barnet won the Conference title with 92 points in 2014/15. Martin Allen's side began with a 5-0 win at Chester and won all but one of their opening eight games. The Bees remained in pole position with Akinde grabbing hat-tricks as they beat Altrincham 5-0, Telford United 3-1 and Aldershot 3-1. Briefly displaced by Bristol Rovers in early March, Barnet regained the leadership with a 2-1 victory at Eastleigh, then demolished Welling United 5-0 at The Hive. They ended the season with a nine-match unbeaten run and clinched the Conference title with a 2-0 victory at home to Gateshead,

Grounds for optimism on land lost to its local traffic



Land on the Master Brewer site in Hillingdon - earmarked, in part, for a new Stones stadium - has a history as a meeting place for car-borne business travellers. Could it really be transformed to become a 21st century sporting hub?

So it is that the first Stones programme to carry news of a potentially era-defining new stadium project is the one for the Barnet game. Hem hem. But anyway, what should we make of this fantastic opportunity? Well, first and foremost, fulsome praise must go to all those who've played a part in getting the club to this stage. And that includes our local Hillingdon councillors, whose attitude

towards us is clearly more foresighted than those of other boroughs we could mention.

Secondly, any initial excitement at the announcement should be tempered by the more sober assessment of all that lies between now and the club potentially moving in. This, after all, is a site for which a multitude of previous attempts at development have faltered. Here's a quick site history. eighties, perhaps).

The adjacent road junction is called Hillingdon Circus because, until the latter half of the twentieth century, it was one bloody great big roundabout like many of the Western Avenue's other early junctions. It even had a pub on the northeastern corner of the site, 'The Golden Lion', which reminds me that, two junctions to the east, we still refer to Northolt's 'Target Roundabout' after the pub on that junction's corner. The Target, now a sodding Mc-

Donald's, once played a big part in the sixties and seventies British music culture scene, hosting such up-and-coming stars as Kate Bush's KT Band as well as The Ruts, who played their first gig there.

But I digress. Back at Hillingdon Circus, the sheer volume of traffic running north-south as well as east-west saw it converted to a giant crossroads in the 1960s, operating in this form into the 1990s.

From 1988 to 1991 I worked in an office at the beginning of Hercies Road, opposite the Master Brewer. My recollections are of the shops and indeed whole area being entirely subservient to this incredibly busy junction. Cars were all powerful.

Back then, pedestrians had to use a thin metal

foot bridge to cross from north to south over the A40, from Hillingdon station to the shopping parade. I remember it during rush hour, an absolute cacophony as the traffic roared off west when the lights went green. Walking over the incessant stream of vehicles below was like being on a noisy theme park ride.

As traffic volumes continued to grow, a better solution was required. Accordingly, this severely congested junction was materially improved with the building of a bypass running north and parallel to the original road.

In pursuit of the very latest in programme-only content | got on my bike and cycled over to assess the site anew. Here are my personal observations.

For nearly three decades the site has seen off various proposals for hotels, houses and, most notably yet another Tesco's, (Barnet and Tesco in a piece about a new Stones ground project? Crikey.) To these eyes, previous attempts at developing the site seem to have shown little regard for anyone arriving by means other than a car. That surely needs addressing for the combined residential / sporting use case envisaged.

A still permanently busy, multi-lane road runs over the crest of the hill down to Hillingdon Circus. Navigating it is unavoidable for supporters arriving from the station. New infrastructure - a bridge perhaps, or maybe a tunnel under the road from the station to the site? - may be needed. Residential development for the Masgenerational

Hopefully some or all of this requirement has already been factored in to works connected with the residential development.

So sure, there are challenges ahead - but the scale of the opportunity trumps them all. No doubt the move would represent another shift in the club's character and further broaden its area of influence, but it would also have an air of permanence to it. Also, the site is larger and more usable than most,

as the club's plans suggest. (Imagine, too, its potential for those coach loads of Wembley-bound supporters we currently host here at The Vale - a scheme that could be expanded in scope with the extra capacity of this development.)

So yes, we've been burnt before. But unlike other grand projects in our relatively recent past, there is a real difference with this one. Because the prize here is not just huge for the club, it's huge for the borough as well. This is a generational

opportunity to transform the expectations of a site that has, for more than half a century, been associated solely with high volume road traffic use. There is a powerful environmental and thus political dimension here. A sporting development could help change the character of the area, associating it with healthy activity while also breathing new life into its North Hillingdon location.

Developers often talk of sustaining or introducing 'vitality' to a location, and this project can deliver that in spades, not just for the local town centre but for its residents and a new generation of Stones supporters. Exciting times could lie ahead.




Christmas 1982... Enfield beaten 1-0, Barnet beaten 6-0 and life as a Stone was never better

Monday December 27th, 1982, Alliance Premier League: Wealdstone 6 Barnet 0 WHAT A TIME to be a Wealdstone fan! Newly promoted and riding high at the top of the APL, devastating football with the Cordice brothers and Mark Graves running riot... and this crush-

ing defeat of Barry Fry's side came four days before Allen Batsford took his boys to table-toppers Enfield and won 1-0!

We look back in wonderment at those days and recall how mid-table teams like Barnet were left reeling by the fast, incisive attacks that saw FIVE second half goals rip past Bees' keeper Gary Lewin. The whole season hinged, in my eyes, at the savage foul on Neil Cordice by Maidstone United's Thompson in the crunch Easter clash - we won 3-0 but the loss of Neil saw Stones weakened in midfield with a small squad, and we ended up third behind champions Enfield and Maidstone. Barnet finished back in 15th.



...while three successive NL defeats of Dean Brennan's side was amazing!

Easter Monday, April 5 2021, Vanarama National League: Wealdstone 5 Barnet I

BEATING Chesterfield and Wrexham in our first season back in the NL was fantastic, but the Easter win over our old rivals Barnet at Grosvenor Vale was probably the fans' highlight of the season.... even if

they could only watch it on the live stream. The first game at The Hive finished goalless, but I was lucky enough to be commentating at the Vale alongside our left-back legend Lee Chappell - and we were in dreamland as the goals flew in, Skipper Jerome Okimo (now with the Bees of course) leaped unchallenged for 1-0; Dennon Lewis saw his shot deflected in for 2-0 and although Courtney Baker-Richardson soon made it 2-1 the Barnet striker was then sent off on the hour mark for an off-the-ball incident. The Stones were rampant and sub Craig Fasanmade scored with his first touch before Jacob Mendy's penalty made it 4-1 and we were pinching

ourselves as the unstoppable Lewis fired in for 5-1.


THE FOLLOWING season, with crowds back in the grounds made beating the Bees a much taller order but we completed a remarkable double... 2,662 in the Vale to see a 77th minute breakaway goal from Rhys

Browne win the points.

Saturday February 12, 2022, Vanarama National League: Barnet 1 Wealdstone 3 A DAUNTING first meeting at The Hive (with all that it meant, historically) couldn't have turned out better for Stones' mighty travelling support outsinging the muted 2,248 home crowd (including 848 in the away end). The excellent Medy Elito was involved in the first two goals, Nathan Ferguson banging in from 15 yards and Josh Umerah turning in a Tavares cross for 2-0.

Richards-Everton pulled a goal back but Jaydn Mundle-Smith's first goal for the club - from a gloriously difficult annale - sealed the deal on 52 minutes.

evidence was required as to why high flying Barnet are Barclays League bound while Wealdstone are making similarly rapid progress in the opposite direction, there was ample on view at Lower Mead on Saturday.

Wealdstone's biggest crowd of the season (1556) saw the champions elect Barnet hand out a footballing lesson to Tony Jennings hapless outfit and at the same time hammer another nail in Stones' relegation coffin.

Even the introduction of two more new players - Wealdstone have now used 39 in Conference fixtures this season - did nothing to halt the slide. Danny Bailey and Greg Zacharia, both signed from Kingsbury, made promising debuts but Wealdstone now need more than mere maybes

they are to survive the drop. They opened brightly enough with the effervescent Tony Lynch a constant threat but although Tom English and Samson Olaicye both had good efforts clawed away by keeper Lomas, they were unable to make any breakthrough.

And somewhat inevitably they were made to pay in the 20th minute when Abbot forced home Codner's cross to put Barnet ahead in their first serious attack

of the game. Wealdstone wobbled visibly as Barnet suddenly snarked into life John Comfort

and a second goal came as no surprise as Abbott was given the freedom of the park to head home Stein's cross a minute from the break

A third goal just one and a half minutes into the second half erased any wild thoughts of a Wealdstone recovery and effectively ended the game as a contest. Stein again supplied the cross and Evans scored with a fine glancing header.

32 minutes and a stack of chances later it was 4-0. Stones defence failed to clear a corner, and the ball was laid back to substitute Smith who drove home a low shot from 20 yards.

Three minutes later Smith struck again, smashing home Barnet's fifth after Parsons had crashed the ball against an upright.

Evans, looking suspiciously off-side from Brown's through ball. rounded Welsh and shot home off the retreating Bowgett to make it 6-0 two minutes from time and Wealdstone's small consolation was that at least this drubbing was not Barnet's biggest win of the season. They hammered Wycombe 7-0 at Loakes Park earlier in the season.

SIX years later the turn-around in fortunes was complete. Barnet hailed the return of boss Barry Fry from Maidstone by suddenly competing at the top end of the Conference (as the Alliance Premier League was now known), thanks to new investment from owner Stan Flashman., and suddenly the local populace responded by filling Underhill on a weekly basis. I remember seeing one brilliant midweek 5-2 win over Wycombe in front of a 3,500 crowd and was blown away. As were Wycombe!

Barnet were runners-up to Scarborough in the first season of auotomatic promotion to the league (1987) and after they had crushed our relegationbound side in this game at Lower Mead (before a 1,550 crowd) they were again agonisingly pipped to the title by Lincoln.

Fry's side finally made it into the EFL in 1991, but then after 30 years of yo-yoing Barnet were back where the Wealdstone rivalry all started. Still dreaming of promotion though...

It happened 50 years ago

Part 12: This was a weekend to remember as Uri Geller and Andover cast a twin spell

This season we are reliving the extraordinary campaign of fifty years ago... which ended with the Stones' very first promotion in the club's long history and our first league title in 22 years.

Saturday November 24, Southern League Div I South: Wealdstone | Andover 5 A COUPLE of weeks ago a Chelsea side struggling for results went to Premier League table-toppers Tottenham and won 4-1. Now I'm not saying that wasn't a shock result, but Stones I Andover 5 half a century ago was far, far, more mind-boggling.

Andover were second-frombottom of the table (and would finish there) while the Stones were everyone's favourites for the title and, indeed, finished the season II points clear at the top.

So how on earth could they lose 5-1 at home to the very ordinary Hampshire side?

Perhaps the mood was set the previous evening. Most people of my generation will remember the Friday night (November 23) when,

on the David Dimbleby talk show, Uri Geller stunned the BBC audience by bending metal spoons and combs and stopping and re-starting watches... all by pyschokinesis. He claimed it was the power of his mind, and we all stared at the screen eager to unveil the tricks of this magician.

There weren't any!

It was a phenomenal TV programme... enough to make us Stones fans wonder if he'd interfered with force fields around Lower Mead to produce an equally gob-smacking afternoon just 17 hours later.

The Israeli's inexplicable trickery was literally the talk of Britain for weeks afterwards (although his supposed powers were the subject of ridicule in later years when, for some reason linked to Exeter City, he claimed that crystals positioned behind each goal would energise the Grecians and guarantee victory in a crucial Div Four game against Chester. Exeter lost 5-1).

But back to Andover. They arrived at Lower Mead as lambs to the slaughter, but on a heavy pitch and with a gale-force wind and the slope at their backs they shocked the Stones with four first-half goals.

The return game at Andover five months later saw the title-bound Stones win 3-0, and here Johnny Henderson (far right) flicks the ball past home keeper Smith for 2-0

> Every attack at the Cinema End seemed to lead to a goal (including a bizarre headed o.g. from George Duck who was far more used to scoring at the other end). Georgie did eventually pull a goal back as we drew the second half I-I... but it was just one of those games when you shake your head in disbelief and move

> I looked very hard for the usual Harrow Observer match report to flesh out my memories of the match but the journalist and print unions were talking industrial action in support of the striking miners. No Harry O added to the despair.

It was a chaotic period in our country's history as Tory PM Ted Heath battled to restore order. Who recalls the 3-day week imposed on all industry to save power? The 10pm television curfew to save electricity and the frequent power cuts? The ban on floodlit football? I remember doing my O-Level revision by candle light (very Dickensian) and of course it was a nightmare to dissemiate information at Wealdstone's level with precious little newspaper coverage

in these days before social

A week after this unexpected Andover setback we were due to take on Boston at Lower Mead in the FA Trophy... and when that game was iced off by a sudden drop in temperatures it was pretty much just word of mouth that passed on the news it would be replayed the following Wednesday afternoon at 2.15pm. Not the most convenient kick-off time!


I remember bunking off a Games afternoon at school to join the tiny attandance of 218, which is to my knowledge the smallest-ever first team crowd in the club's professional era. Maybe of all time!

Stones won that tie 6-1 on an eerily empty December afternoon, although the few of us made a bit of noise as Mr Duck rattled in four goals (inc two penalties) to put Boston (not Boston United, this was the Midland League side) to the sword. In fact it was a memorable Trophy run that year, but more of that story in a forthcoming programme....




