"There is a wonderful prize at the end of it where we could pit our wits against teams at a higher level. We will certainly be giving it our best shot.'

The Stones took the lead against Concord after just 21 seconds when Alex Dyer found the net.

Wealdstone were pegged back before Richard Jolly and Scott Fitzgerald sealed their fifth win on the trot.

Bartlett, whose side hope to feature in Monday's final, said: 'We have got the momentum and have been on a fantastic run so there is no reason why we can't go to Lowestoft and get a

"We've had a tremendous run since Christmas so why shouldn't we be confident? I think we're top of all the form tables and have come from being 12th when we were knocked out of the Trophy by Newport.

"There will be a partisan crowd but we will hopefully be taking a couple of coaches to support us.'

### 'I won't be doing major surgery'

HARROW BOROUGH manager Dave Anderson does not expect to be overhauling his squad this summer.

The experienced boss had to start from scratch last year after taking over, with most of the club's players leaving, but expects to retain the bulk of his

Anderson said: "I think if we can keep the squad together and add three or four players to it I hope it won't be as traumatic as this year.

"I won't be doing major surgery. We did enough of that last year. I hope the squad will come back but like any club there will always be a couple of changes.

"I think I used more than 50 players this season and it was the hardest preseason I've faced. It was like we were doing our Christmas shopping on Boxing Day.

"It's not something I want to repeat and I feel pre-season will be easier and we will be able to control our own destiny and hopefully be on a level playing

Boro faced a relegation battle but ensured their survival before their last game of the season which resulted in a 4-2 defeat at Lewes.

Anderson's side got off to an ideal start when Jon-Jo Bates converted from eight yards out.

But four efforts from the hosts turned it around before Danny Leech headed home the Reds' second goal.

Anderson admitted his first task each year will be to ensure the team retain their place in the Ryman Premier.

The manager said: "It's been a difficult season for us but we managed to accomplish our minimum requirement which was to stay in the league

"My first job each year will be to get us to 50 points and once we get that we can determine what we can achieve.
