Olympic champion launches Swimathon

Goodhew added: "It's going to be a busy few months coaching, and taking part in the Swimath-on squad 5k team challenge. The squad provides a fantastic opportunity to bring together swimmers of all abilities and demonstrate to the thousands of people taking part in Swimathon every year that anyone can achieve their goal regardless of their ability, while raising funds for Marie Cure Cancer Care as they smash their target.'
