For most 22 year olds, a birthday which consists of not going out with friends, avoiding alcohol and being kept away from your family for the rest of that week sounds like a terrible way to mark the occasion. For Mitchell Smith, he wouldn't want it any other way.

Smith is chasing a dream. The Harrow Weald boxer is fighting for a version of the European championship on Saturday as he builds towards a British title shot next year and, hopefully, world honours in 2016.

The English super featherweight champion saw his two-year-old daughter briefly on Monday morning, his birthday, but has only seen her four times in the last eight weeks as he chooses to live away from his partner and their children whilst he is in training. In the afternoon, family time was

Smith, who has won all nine of his fights as a professional, told the *Harrow Times*: "It was tough [only seeing his daughter for 15 minutes] but it is for the best. Being away from my family makes me a tougher person. Come Saturday nothing will stop
