



## WEALDSTONE

Formed in 1875 and turned professional in 1971-72. Joined Southern League, Division One North before being transferred to Division One South. Gained promotion to the Premier Division in 1973-74. F.A. Amateur Cup winners: 1966-67. Ground: Lower Mead Stadium. Manager: Geoff Coleman.

READING'S near neighbours, Aldershot, now in the Fourth Division, know all about Wealdstone and the F.A. Cup. Last season the Southern League side came close to dumping what was then a Third Division outfit, out of the F.A. Cup at the first hurdle.

After a goalless first half, Aldershot finally squeezed home by the narrowest of margins, 4-3. But that was only after Wealdstone had lost their skipper and centre-half, John McCormack with a broken leg just before half-time. McCormack, the former Crystal Palace defender, subsequently retired from the game.

Six of that side are almost certain to be playing today.

They are goalkeeper, John Morton, John Watson (right-back), Bill Byrne (defender), Bobby Moss (mid-field), Ray Fulton (mid-field), and George Duck. Duck in fact scored two of Wealdstone's goals in the Aldershot game while Bill Byrne played as centre-forward.

Wealdstone have plenty of Football League experience via centre-half, Keith Lawrence and mid-fielder Danny Light. Lawrence played against Reading twice last season in Brentford's colours, but was given a free transfer in May.


Light is the man who knows what it is like to be playing for a side that produces a shock. He was in the Colchester side the day the Essex club stunned

the football world by beating Leeds United 3-2 in a fifth round Cup match in 1971.

This season Wealdstone have been having a Jekyll and Hyde season and are lying seventh from bottom of the Southern League, Premier Division. However, their 1-1 draw away to Atherstone on Saturday was their fifth consecutive game without defeat, so it looks as though the club are picking themselves up after an indifferent start.

The club's outstanding achievement was in the 1966/67 season when they won the F.A. Amateur Cup, beating Hendon before 50,000 at Wembley.

Two years ago, the club was formed into a Public Limited

Company, floating 20,000 "A" (voting) and "B" (non-voting) shares. They are in the fortunate position of owning their own ground almost in the centre of Harrow's main shopping area, and this is worth a King's Ransom. Lower Mead Stadium has a capacity of 16,000, with 6,000 under cover. They have, in fact, packed 18,000 in the ground, for the visit of Colchester in the F.A. Cup many years ago.

They have always been one of the best supported clubs in non-League football, and in their Athenian League days, gates of 8,000 were the rule rather than the exception. Last season, they had the third highest average gate in the Premier Division and should they earn a replay today confidently anticipate a gate of 8,000 for Tuesday night's replay.

Their away support is always excellent, and they should have a following of over 1,000 for today's tie.

### PEN PICTURES

JOHN MORTON (Goalkeeper)—Won an F.A. Challenge Trophy Final medal with Dartford and immediately joined Wealdstone on moving to Harrow Is Head of P.E. at a large North London School. Is not now first choice since the recent signing from Romford of Chris Lightfoot who, however, is cup-tied.

JOHN WATSON (Right-back)—An ex-apprentice with West Ham and won an England Youth cap. Has played for Durban City and in his fourth season, Rated one of the most competitive backs in the Premier Division.

LEN PRINCE (Left-back)—Close season signing from Dover, after experience with Charlton.

BILL BYRNE (Defender)—Is having a magnificent season as "sweeper" after conversion from centre-forward, in which position he tourned Japan with Middlesex Wanderers three years ago. Has revolutionised Wealdstone's defence.

**KEITH LAWRENCE** (Centre-back)—Signed during the close season from Brentford where he had a lot of League experience. Is particularly dominant in the air.

DANNY LIGHT (Mid-field)—Was in the Colchester side which beat Leeds in the Cup some seasons ago and a brilliant ball player.

BOBBY MOSS (Mid-field)—A former Barnet player and another forward converted to a more defensive role, but is quick to exploit the sudden break,

RAY FULTON (Mid-field)—Has the most educated left foot in the squad, crossing the ball with tremendous accuracy.

CEORGE DUCK (Forward)—A goal-scoring machine the envy of all Southern League clubs. In his fourth season and every season so far has been the club's top scorer. Scored 64 goals last term and is a gifted opportunist. Has taken 37 penalties for Wealdstone and only missed five of them. Joined from Southend United.

DAVE PARRATT (Forward)—Signed early in the season from Bedford Town. Is now making his mark as an aggressive centre-forward, speed being his biggest asset.

JOHN ARNOLD (Forward)—Recently back in the side after a five weeks' lay off through injury. Another player quick off the mark.

STEVE EDMUNDSON (Mid-field)—A Harrow doctor, Steve has had a lot of experience with Fulham Reserves and is an ideal utility player.

BILLY STAGG (Forward)—A product of Wealdstone's youth side, and the fastest player in the squad. Likes nothing better than to run at the defence.

ALAN FURSDEN (Defender)—Had his first outing recently after several months lay-off with a severe ankle injury which once threatened his career.

# THE TIMES THEY ARE A CHANGING

READING played their first ever F.A. Cup game in season 1877—but it was not played at Elm Park.

Despite being drawn at home to South Norwood, Reading decided to play on a neutral ground-the Dolphin Ground at Slough.

The match was played on Wednesday, 7th November 1877, but as you can see, the report in the "Berkshire Chronicle" (printed in full below), like the match, bore little relation to what we see now-

The pitch had no penalty area while the goals had no nets and a tape in place of a crossbar. The referee had to use a handkerchief instead of a whistle and had umpires, not linesmen to assist

#### READING v SOUTH NORWOOD

660N Wednesday afternoon last a match between these clubs was played on the Dolphin ground at Slough. This being the first match the Reading Club has played for the Association Challenge Cup, a great deal of interest was evinced and numerous lovers of this sport accompanied the team to Slough.

Reading won the toss and elected to kick down the hill and the game was started by the South Norwood captain kicking off. The Reading forwards, by dint of playing well together, soon drove the ball into the enemy's territory and compelled the South Norwood backs to beat a retreat.

About 10 minutes after play began Field got hold of the ball from the centre of the ground, made a brilliant run down and by a clever kick scored the first goal for Reading amid much applause from the spectators.

The ball having been kicked off again, the game became very warm and the Norwood men did their very best to retrieve their loss, which at one time they nearly succeeded in doing but for the handling of one of the Reading men, whereupon a free kick ensued close to the Reading goal, which was cleverly charged away.

good run by the Berkshire forwards, again threatened the Norwood goal, but the ball was quickly returned and White made a good shot at the Reading goal.

At half-time ends were changed, and soon afterwards,

Sillence made a splendid shot for goal, the ball going just over the tape.

Although Reading were now playing uphill, it was pretty evident to all present that they had decidedly the best of the match, and that the Norwood team had become somewhat disorganised. At this period Marks made a good run down, which brought about a corner for Reading.

Rogers kicked off and landed the ball in front of the goal and Franklin neatly obtained a second goal (the ball having glanced off H. W. Wilson, one of the Norwood men).

The remainder of the game was played with vary fortune for each side, but no other goals were scored, thereby the Reading men were left masters of the situation by two goals to none.


