Scott McGleish - 100 Up!!



Congratulations to Scott McGleish who recently made his 100th competitive appearance for the Club in the match against Dartford when he came on as a substitute. During his 100 matches that he has played for Wealdstone FC Scott has scored 43 goals. Scotty made his debut for us in March 2013 away at Margate where we won 4-2 and he rippled the onion for the first time. During our Championship season of 2013/14 he top scored with 28 goals.

Today Wealdstone FC officials, players and supporters will pay their respects to those who have fallen fighting for their country in the great wars and the recent conflicts, where the scars are still seen and cut deep.

A wreath will be laid on the centre spot and a minutes silence observed for the fallen prior to kick off.

The teams will be led out by Stones fans Chief Petty Officer Andy "Gibbo" Gibbs currently serving in the Royal Navy and Retired Soldier Darrell Bennett who saw active service between 1990 and 1997 in the Royal Corp of Signals seeing service in Northern Ireland and Belize.

Gibbo is a bit of a fundraising legend having raised just under £400000 for the charity Help for Heroes in the last 6 years whilst maintaining a high tempo front line job in the Royal Navy.

His 28 years service has seen him serve in many hot spots of the world including 5 trips to the Arabian Gulf on various tasks post Gulf War 2, involved in extraction of British nationals from Beirut in 2006 and embargo operations in the Adriatic during the Former Yugoslavia conflict in 1993, 1995 and 1996.. 



Royal Blue Review WHO ARE WE?

Trials, tribulations and a small amount of success against the odds over the last 116 years has produced a club that we are all fiercely proud of here at Wealdstone



ver the years there have been a number of Wealdstone players who have gone on to make the grade in the Football League, the two most famous being Stuart Pearce who joined Coventry City in 1983 and Vince (Vinny) Jones who joined Wimbledon three years later. Both players went on to represent England and Wales respectively in full Internationals. A more recent success story is that of Jermaine Beckford, So where did it all start?

Wealdstone Football Club as we know it today was, it is generally agreed, founded at the beginning of the 1899/1900 season. The club was however short-lived and a report headed "Defunct" appeared in the local paper for October 20th 1906

stating that, due to a sad falling-off of interest among both players and fans. the committee was disbanding the Club completely.

It wasn't until the 1908/09 season that the Wealdstone Football Club came into being again. The Club closed down for the duration of the First World War (1914-1918)

A new ground called Lower Mead. situated between

town centers was ready for the 1922/23 season. At the time of moving to Lower Mead the Club joined the Spartan League, spending six seasons in that league before joining the Athenian League for the 1928/29 season.

In June 1942 Wealdstone met RAF (Uxbridge) at Wembley Stadium in the final of the Middlesex Senior Red Cross Cup. Their opponents included nine professional Football League players but it was the Stones who won the cup, 5-2 after extra time.

In October 1946 the Club were involved in the first televised football match, the BBC showing part of their Athenian League match at Barnet, Wealdstone also took part in the first two "live" FA Cup ties ever to be seen by viewers

when the whole of their victories over Edgware Town and Colchester United were televised by the BBC in November 1949, Later that month Wealdstone met a Football League side in the FA Cup for the first time when they were beaten 1-0 at Port Vale in the First Round Proper. In 1964 the Club left the

Athenian League and joined the Isthmian League for the first time. Two years later they beat fellow Isthmian's Hendon 3-1 in the FA Amateur Cup final at Wembley Stadium to bring the trophy to Lower Mead for the first and only time.

In 1971 Wealdstone left the ranks of amateur football and turned professional, joining the Southern League, Since

then four major league championships have been won by the first team as well as five cup competitions.

During the 1977/78 season Wealdstone played in the Anglo-Italian Tournament, A 4-2 victory over Paganese was followed by a 1-0 defeat against Udinese, the eventual winners of the tournament, both these matches taking place at Lower Mead. The Club then visited Italy only to lose 1-0 at Reggiana and 2-0 at Arezzo.

Wealdstone were in the Club's history in

1980/81 but the following season they won all five trophies on offer in the Southern League to return to the Conference at the first attempt. The 1984/85 season was to be the Club's most successful when they became the first of only three clubs so far to achieve the non-league "double", winning : the Football Conference and FA Trophy in the same season. To complete a "treble". Wealdstone also won the 1984/85 Middlesex Senior Challenge Cup beating Enfield in the final.

Unfortunately at the end of the 1990/91 season the Club had to sell their Lower Mead home in order to stay in existence. The company handling the sale of Lower Mead went into liquidation and, after lengthy court proceedings, the Club received only a fraction of the sum Tesco's had paid for the ground. An agreement was entered into with Watford FC to share the lease on their Vicarage Road ground and the 1991/92 season was to become the first of seventeen seasons ground sharing with another club. Their stay at Vicarage Road lasted for just two seasons before the Club: decided to move out and for the 1993/94 & 1994/95 seasons Wealdstone ground shared at Yeading FC.

The 1995/96 season began a new era for the Club as they left the Southern League and rejoined the Isthmian League which they had last played in in 1971. They also changed grounds once again, moving in with Edgware Town FC who had agreed to share facilities at their White Lion Ground.


Wealdstone had to start at the bottom of the Isthmian League (effectively demoting themselves two divisions) the 1996/97 season saw Wealdstone win the Division Three championship and in 1997/98 they made it two promotions in successive seasons when finishing third in Division Two. The Club should have been promoted for a third season running in 1998/99

after finishing third in Division One. However, a couple of ground improvements required at Edgware to obtain the necessary "A" grading for promotion to the Premier Division were not completed until six days after the April 1st deadline. The Club eventually gained promotion to the Premier Division at the end of the 2003/04 season after meeting Dulwich Hamlet in a promotion play-off encounter.

For the 2005/06 season Wealdstone started a three year agreement with Northwood FC to play first team matches at their Chestnut Avenue ground then in January 2008 the Club had the opportunity to take over our current Grosvenor Vale site, then the home of Ruislip Manor FC. A dedicated band of supporters worked extremely hard to bring the stadium up to the standard required by the Isthmian League so that, from the start of the 2008/09 season,



: Successive seasons at The Vale have seen the Club proposer both on and off the field, the 2010/11 season saw the Club achieve a 4th place finish in the League. but they were then beaten in the play-offs 2-1 away to Lowestoft Town. They also reached the semi-final of the FA Trophy having accounted for a number of Conference National (Barrow, Dartford & Cambridge Utd) sides on their journey before bowing out over the 2 legged semi-final to Newport County

The 2012/13 again saw the Club challenging for promotion and again missing out via the play-offs this time to Concord Rangers. However the 2013/14 saw the Stones finally achieve promotion when they won the Ryman Premier League sealing the Championship with a hard fought 1-0 away win at Margate on the 15th Apr 14. Last season, despite a difficult start Wealdstone eventually finished their first season in the Conference South in a very credible 12th place. feel free to join us for the



ATTY Harriott enjoyed probably the most sensational debut in Stones history at Ebbsfleet last Saturday.

With his first touch, after just two minutes, he controlled a half-cleared corner 25 yards out... and with his second touch he rifled it unerringly beyond home keeper Brandon Hall and into the top corner!

"Yes, it was the best goal I've ever scored and it was fantastic for me in my first game" said Harriott on Monday. still buzzing after his two-goal showing against the league leaders.

"I scored 11 last season from midfield. and I've now got five this season, and most from the edge of the box, but normally I hit them into the bottom corner. To be

honest, I thought it was going to smack the crossbar and come out.

"I was overjoyed when it went in, and so pleased for the fans".

Harriott, 23, explained that it was the big Wealdstone following that persuaded him to ioin the club from Hemel Hempstead.

"I played against the Stones three times last season for

Hemel - the 2-2 at Grosvenor Vale, the 1-1 at Hemel and the game that was frozen off with Hemel 3-0 ahead. That was a strange one!

"At each game the Wealdstone support was massive. So impressive. Before I signed for Hemel at the end of 2014 I was playing for Hayes & Yeading and, although I was injured. I

against The Fleet. And he played a hugely influential 71 minutes in his favoured central midfield position before making way for Matthew Ball.

"I love to play a more advanced role, and we have the players to hurt teams going forward, Bradley (Hudson-Odoi) and Shaun (Lucien) were terrific on Saturday and I'm looking forward to playing a full part. The manager, Gordon, emphasised what a tight-knit group of players we have here - younger players looking to get back into the League, and a few older ones really enjoying playing for this ambitious club - and I think I might be around for a while".

The quick-footed Matty began

his career at Luton as a youngster before Sheffield United enticed him to Yorkshire for three years. Then came a move to Northampton in League Two.

"It was a classic case of a new manager coming in and having his own ideas about the players he wanted. Aidy Boothrovd had me in the team and I enjoyed some really enjoyable games, against the likes of Portsmouth at Fratton Park.

"Then he was replaced by Chris Wilder and I didn't get a look-in. I went to Hayes & Yeading on loan, and then permanently but it was only for six weeks before I joined Hemel. Hemel played a good,

passing game that appealed to me but there was a difference of opinion with the manager there, purely on a professional

"I only needed to meet Gordon Bartlett to know I'd made the right decision to come to Wealdstone. He showed me around the club, and although I was aware of the club's history he spelled out how passionate and ambitious everyone is. Already I love it here.

"All we need now is to get every game videoed. I couldn't believe there was a ban on cameras at Ebbsfleet... I score a goal like that but I can't even brag about it!"





What do Colchester United, **Wycombe Wanderers** and Wealdstone have in

common?

Il three have won the non-league double. The only difference between the trio is that we were a semi-professional club rather than a former football league side with a full time team. No doubt the former duo will argue that the quality of the teams were higher in the professional era, but winning the double when the players held down full time real jobs was some achievement.

I know Colchester the town pretty well. I used to act for a big employer in the town called GFM and they had/ have many links with the football club. The company's owner Peter Sakal is a great friend of the club and has a box at the new stadium. whilst their former chief executive later on moved to GFM. She was one of few women to have a leadership role at a football club. I also recall well our last trip to the Essex military town. A four nil stuffing in the second round proper back in the eighties. Stones had beaten local rivals Enfield after two replays but floundered at Laver Road on the back on some strange team selection, the highlight that day was the superb away following, touching nearly a thousand which the local

I am sure the 70k in compensation will sooth the way along though. Interestingly enough whilst FCUM have had this hoo ha over the game being moved to accommodate TV, in their planning regulations for their new stadium, they have to move games to

Sundays if Manchester City are playing at home and have already had a televised game on a Friday before!

Fortunately, whilst most at the Vale were disappointed with not getting a live game, being the lead game on Match of the Day tonight and hosting the iconic Football Focus will go someway to compensate for missing out. It will bring a huge amount of exposure to the club. I am looking forward to Dan Walker interviewing the Raider and Fingers (might need a translator) and asking Ginge on his opinion of all things red.

I wonder if Mark Chapman from the Beeb will be in town. He's a local, sort of, as whilst working down south. he lived on the Hill and his kids attended Orley Farm. Chappers isn't the only local on Auntie's team as our very own Rob Notham will hopefully be on duty around the ground. A loyal Wealdstone fan for many vears.



aving a bit of a keen interest in history with WW1 being a favourite subject matter of mine since I'd been in school a trip to Ypres in Belgium. encompassing seeing some of the battlefields and excavated trenches, had been on my bucket list of things to do for over 25 years.

I'd also wanted to witness the playing of The Last Post which takes place at The Menin Gate in Ypres every night at 8pm and since the centenary commemorations of WW1 over the past 12 months or so my desire to visit the region had increased. I'd missed out on being part of a team from my workplace who were lucky enough to take part: a suitable 2-3 days to go across to Belgium I in the deinstillation of the ceramic poppies at The Tower of London in November 2014 as I had been in Glasgow watching England beat Scotland 3-1 (Ha Ha!).

Because of this I was determined to actually do something to be able to pay my respects to : those who had served in that awful conflict.

Whilst I was on the train to the away match cemetery, which is clearly visible on the route from London. For those unaware, Brookwood cemetery http://www.brookwoodcemetery. com/ is the largest cemetery in Western Europe and also houses the largest amount of military personnel burials in the UK. This is due to the fact that several of the soldiers who came back mortally wounded from both world wars were buried there. Brookwood is also famous as being the place where the Last Post was sounded for 4 years from 1940 to 1944 while Belgium was occupied by Germany during WW2. Seeing this cemetery from the train, with the rows and rows of neatly spaced headstones of the war dead,

gave me the kick up the backside I'd needed to finally look into booking a trip to Ypres after all these years. On the train home from Farnborough I chatted to Jim Wiseman, who as well as being a Wealdstone fan of many years standing is also a former Royal Navy sailor

and has an extremely good knowledge of the WW1 sites as he has visited the region many times. He gave me a bit more info on Brookwood and recommended a few places to visit in Belgium. My mind was now made up, I was going to go this summer.

After doing a bit of research online to find came across this website www.lastpost.be

Browsing through this website I discovered that Thursday 9th July would be the 30,000th time that The Last Post would be played since it had first been played at the Menin Gate in 1928. This seemed like a perfect time to go across and I booked both eurostar and a hotel for myself and my other half to visit at Farnborough in April we passed Brookwood: Ypres between 7th and 10th July. Also, whilst browsing this website I realised that you could request an opportunity to lay wreaths/flowers at the Menin Gate during the ceremony. I thought this would be a nice gesture if I could do this on behalf of Wealdstone FC so I filled a request form in on the website, not really expecting to be accepted. Like the rest of the country between 1914-1918, World War 1 touched Harrow and also affected the Wealdstone football team. Ten former and current (when war broke out in 1914) Wealdstone players were killed during WW1 and I thought this would be a good chance for myself to represent the club and pay our respects and gratitude to them. To my suprise

within a day I received an email back saving we had been accepted for the Wednesday 8th July ceremony and would need to report to the Menin Gate at 7.30pm on that date. In the meantime, prior to my trip I booked a tour of the battlefields online and also ordered a poppy wreath from the British legion website. I also bought a couple more WW1 books on the region to add to my collection and tried to fill any gaps in my knowledge of the Flanders region and it's WW1 history. Having thought that I knew a bit about the war and it's affect on the Ypres/Passchendale area in general, I found that in reality I actually knew very little and looked forward to trying to actually put some clarity to the events in that area and what the soldiers and civilians went through by seeing the region for myself.

Prior to leaving for Belgium I also did some research into looking into the Wealdstone players who had died in both World Wars as I wanted to attach sheets of laminated paper with their names and details to my British legion wreath that I was going to lay at the ceremony as well as to a bunch of fresh flowers that I would buy locally in Ypres. Luckily, due to the excellent work of those who had researched the Wealdstone FC history book that was published in 2003 I found details of the players and filled in their military history from the information that had been published on the www.wealdstonefc. co.uk/forum previously I also managed to find in the history book photographs of five of our players who had died in WW1 as well as a photo of Charlie Bunce who died in Malaya in WW2

Prior to going over I got as much advice about what to see there as I could from Roger Slater and Mike Vincent who was there in 2014. They were both very helpful and I was fairly happy that I'd cover all I needed to see when I was over there. Tuesday 7th July finally came and off we went.

Ypres (or leper to give its Flemish name) is a very pretty little town but the vast majority of the buildings are 90 years of age or less due to the city being flattened in WW1. On our first day we spent a relaxing time with no tours planned and that evening I went down to The Menin Gate to see the Last Post being played and get a feel for the ceremony. I

was praying I did it justice the following day. There was quite a crowd there watching as tourists were arriving in numbers from all over the world that week for the 30,000th ceremony on the Thursday.

Wednesday morning we made our way to the bookshop in the city centre from where our tour was to take place. Our guide met us and took us off in the minibus along with 4 other people. Our first stop after approx 5 minutes was Essex Farm cemetery and the first aid posts, or dressing stations as they were known, near the northern Ypres salient battlefield. It was near here that Major John McCrae wrote the famous war poem 'In Flanders field' after two of his close friends were killed.

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row. That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders fields.

This poem is one of the main reasons

the poppy became synonymous with the

struggles of WW1. The poem was used by both the British and Canadians in a huge drive to recruit new volunteers. We entered the dressing station bunkers and our guide gave us details on the numbers and types of casualties that would have been treated there. The 2nd battle of Ypres from April 22nd to May 25th 1915 was the first place where poison gas was first used and several of the first casualties from this new weapon were brought to these very first aid posts. It was an extremely dark and eerie place to be and you can only imagine what

the walls of those small bunkers could say if

only they could speak....

He says the proudest moment so far in his career was his Football League debut for Stevenage. While representing Northern Ireland, Matt played against Paul Pogba who was then at Manchester United. He owns his own football coaching company together with team mate Matt Bevans.

MATT BEVANS:

A composed and intelligent right back. Matt joined 'Stones this summer having previously made his Football League debut for Oxford United. He started his career at Watford.

DALE BINNS:

A fast, experienced wide man, Dale joined Wealdstone from Sutton to play in front of the legendary Stones fans. He used to go to Lower Mead with his family as a youngster. His most memorable moment in football was winning the FA Trophy with Stevenage at the new Wembley in 2008.

Gordon is a school teacher, having previously played for Portsmouth, Denver Dynamos (USA), Brentford, Slough Town and Haves - and then, as a manager, took Hounslow Town to promotion and League Cup success, led both Southall and Yeading to FA Vase finals at Wembley, as well as gaining two promotions to accompany four County Cup finals with Yeading. Gordon joined Wealdstone in June 1995 and up to the end of last season had been our First Team Manager for well over 1,200 matches alongside his assistant, Leo Morris. During that time the pair have guided there Stones to four promotions and the winning of the Middlesex Charity Cup final in 2004 and 2011. In season 2011/12 they led the Club to the Ryman League play-offs, the FA Trophy semi-finals and the Middlesex Senior Cup final. And then, In 2013/14, they guided Wealdstone to win the Ryman Premier Division and promotion to the National League South - as well as the Middlesex Senior Cup final. 

Strikers seek success via the PlayStation 4 NPL Queensland semi-final play off

ealdstone's furthest flung fan is Brisbane school teacher Rob Read. This week his ongoing look at football in Australia takes in Brisbane's 'other' team, the Strikers

For the second of my match reports from non-league Brisbane I'm at Perry Park, the home of the Brisbane Strikers. It's a pleasant evening in inner-city Bowen Hills where I'm here to watch the PlayStation 4 NPL Qld semi-final play off between the Strikers and Redlands United. This is the traditional format 2nd vs 3rd game, although the Strikers would feel hard done by as they were denied the opportunity to win the Premiership and therefore have a 1st vs 4th semi. The Strikers are resplendent in yellow shirts with natty blue sides, yellow socks and blue shorts; Redlands in





all red, with black horizontal bands across the shirts.

Compared to Brisbane
City's stadium this is much
more industrial. A grass bank
at both ends, one nestling
under trees and 2/3 of the
other being the undercroft
of a large, bland building
(the local YMCA). There is a
decent stand taking up one
whole side of the ground (The
Bill Waddell Stand) which
tonight houses a few hundred



supporters on natty patterned blue and yellow seats. This is complemented by a bar and canteen on the upper level, which has a good view of the action. The other side of the ground has nothing much, a couple of miniature stands, seven advertising hoardings and a crude gantry for the camera – the game will be live streamed by the league for those that can't (be bothered to) make it.

\$5 - or considerably less

As the ground has a fence around it there is an admission charge of \$5, mainly because it's a semi final. Apparently the club does sometimes charge for entry, but only when they have a volunteer to collect money at the gate, which isn't often. Being a Saturday night I'm guessing the game is the first part of a night out for some, as the aroma of talcum powder and perfume reminds me of being on the Underground escalators whenever the Rugby League grand final was on at Wembley.

When you consider that the Strikers have previously won the National Soccer League title, the national precursor to the A-League, in 1997 (and plenty of other trophies as two cabinets can attest), it seems like a bit of a comedown from

those heady days when the team won 2:1 against Sydney United in front of a remarkable 45,000 crowd at Lang Park, current home of the Brisbane Roar and where Australia's international matches are played (occasionally). The fact that the Strikers applied for the Brisbane berth in the new national competition, but were denied due to another consortium having a better financial package, must rankle as the Brisbane Roar went on to win three A-League titles in four years just over a decade later.

The first half is a fairly even contest, with plenty of corners at both ends in the first 15, Redlands preferring the near post flick-on (Wealdstone FC circa 78-9 were good proponents of this but Redlands can't get it right) while the Strikers aim for their large, powerful #10 at the back post.

Five minutes from half time and a potential psychological killer blow is dealt by the away team with a spectacular, Andy Grahamesque over-the-head volley from the edge of the area from Redlands' #13 that flies into the top right hand corner of the net. The Strikers had been marginally on top as the half came to a close, and it will be interesting to see if the side that finished the season 44 points ahead can rally in the second 45.

For the second half kick off I've got my chips and stubby (beer) and I'm sitting with the Ultras, or whatever the home support are called. There's certainly more passion here

than at Brisbane City, with banners and friendly repartee with visiting players. This is much more akin to Lower Mead or the Vale and makes the experience all the more enjoyable. The Strikers are working hard, with stout defending by the Redlands #7, with his Paul Waites-esque 80s wedge haircut, easing the pressure, but with twenty to go it's all Strikers aside from the occasional foray from the visitors. But three forwards against seven defenders isn't going to work, until ... it's a penalty! And the banners are waving with fifteen to go as the penalty is dispatched with aplomb. Five minutes to go and it's still predominantly three against seven in the box, but with added brown pants time when the visitors venture upfield on the break.

Great Strikers pressure, and a vocal home support creates an electric atmosphere as a Strikers forward shoots low from the edge of the area...and hits the post, the ball bouncing back into the goalie's grateful arms. So, extra time here, and the spectre of a penalty shoot out

makes me reminisce about the last one I saw with the Stones in the 1982 Southern League Championship decider against Nuneaton Borough. The legend that is Alan Cordice won the game that evening with a cheeky penalty into the top corner. Those were the days!

Into the first period of extra time, and a challenge similar to Bishops Stortford against Jefferson Louis, but this time no penalty (although it looked legit). Five minutes to go until a shootout, by then at long last it's a second for the Strikers as at long last a ball is threaded through to the Strikers' #8 at the back stick who slides it under the keeper. The Strikers slow the game down with long balls down to the corners followed by the obligatory leaning on the corner flag, then three peeps and the Strikers are through to the Grand Final.

So the better side won, and sadly no second live penalty shoot out in a little over 30 years for me. The Strikers went on to narrowly lose the Final to a goal two minutes from the final whistle (sound familiar?!?)

Welcome 'The U's' **COLCHESTER UNITED**

olchester United have been at their new stadium for nearly a decade, but their history stretches all the way back to the 1930s, with a proud heritage of representing the town in professional sport

both in Colchester itself and

around the country.

Over 800 players have represented the team through those 70+ years. many of whom have been born in the town. And things have come full circle in recent years, with the club having their eyes on a bright future with a very local

The U's have invested heavily in the years to come, moving into their own purpose built training ground facility in 2013, which cost £3.5m as the club looked to provide its players with 'best in class' facilities to prepare for those all important games.

And, having moved into their brand new Weston Homes Community Stadium in 2008. the club are arguably in their strongest position in those 75 years since the club's

formation in 1937.

Back in the years just before the start of the Second World War, Colchester United was formed as the football folk of the town decided that they wanted to try to bring professional football to north Essex

The U's - then known as the Oystermen in reference to the main product of the town's port heritage superseded the amateur side Colchester Town and moved into Layer Road, the club's home for the next 70

It was another thirteen years before the U's attained Football League status and with less than 70 years in league, they are one of the younger clubs in the four divisions.

Two years prior to entering the Football League, they had caused a cup upset by beating Bradford Park Avenue, becoming the first non-league side to defeat top division opposition and that was to be the pre-cursor to an even more memorable giantkilling.



1971 was probably the year where the U's arrived on the global football landscape, as Dick Graham's team of older players caused one of the biggest FA Cup upsets of all time, when they defeated Don Revie's Leeds United by a 3-2 scoreline

Leeds were the undoubted top dogs, both nationally and at European level, but they were swept aside by a courageous performance by Graham's men. Such was the scale of the upset that Dick was someone who the national press would contact to talk about the result each year until his recent sad passing.

A series of promotions and relegations were to follow in the years to come, but it looked like the U's stay as a Football League club could be at an end when they slid out of the Fourth Division in 1990

At the time, the Vauxhall Conference was less well established division and. having just missed out on an

immediate return in 1991. Roy McDonough's men swept all before them a year later to land the Conference and FA Trophy double.

That was the club's first ever visit to Wembley, but they were to reach the Twin Towers twice more before the 1990s were out. First was a narrow defeat on penalties - to Carlisle United - in the Auto Windscreen Shield, before a year later, David Gregory's penalty was enough to defeat Torquay United and send the U's up to the then Division Three.

Having been happy to stay in the division for the next few years, the arrival of Phil Parkinson as U's boss


took things onto another level and, after a couple of years of building his team, Parkinson took the U's into the second tier for the first time in their history in 2006.

Hull came calling for the ambitious manager and it was left to his number two. and current Welsh U21s boss Geraint Williams to take the U's into their new adventure. He succeeded - taking the U's to a club high finish of 10th, with a chance of the play-offs still realistic on the penultimate day of that season.

The U's suffered from second season syndrome though, and fell out of the Championship as they were relegated in their : manager Tony Humes.

: last season at Layer Road.

The first few years at their new stadium saw them flirt with the top six, but recent seasons have seen the club take a brief step back whilst they plan for a prosperous future on the pitch. Plenty of hard work is going on behind the scenes to set the club up with a team of players that has a strong local core and a desire to drive the team up the league in the future. Last season, Academy graduates made 122 appearances in the first team and the 2015/16 campaign looks like the U's youngsters will beat that total, with the team enjoying a positive start to the new season under

Sam Walker - Goalkeeper A firm favourite with the U's fans, the towering keeper was an ever present for the U's in 2013/14 and only missed two games in 2014/15.

Tosin Olufemi - Defender Began in the youth team. Made his debut at Bury in a League One game in 2012/13 and added fourteen more appearances in 2013/14. before an Achilles rupture ruled him out for most of the 2014/15 campaign.

Frankie Kent - Defender Young centre half who was the captain and a mainstay in the youth team's league and cup success in the 2013/14 season. Made his U's first team debut in the 13/14 campaign at Walsall, Frankie established himself as a genuine first team contender in 2014/15 before injury cut his

The 29-year-old arrived having played just short of 50 games in the Premier League for Wolverhampton Wanderers. George has also played for Nottingham Forest and Bristol City, before joining Oldham Athletic last season

Alex Gilbey - Midfield

Alex has looked a natural at first team level since making his debut at Northampton in the Johnstone's Paints Trophy in October 2012. Scored his first goal for the club against Wolves at Molineux in March 2014 and he is now a key part of the U's midfield.

Owen Garvan - Midfield Owen signed for the U's at the end of the August transfer window. The twenty-seven year old has put pen to paper on a contract through to January. after being released by Crystal Palace in the summer. He made over eighty appearances for the Premier League side. and has spent his entire career in the top two flights of English football.

George Moncur - Midfield West Ham midfielder who joined the U's on loan until January just ahead of the 2014/15 season opener against Oldham Athletic, before converting his move to a permanent one in November of 2014. His run of goals towards the end of the season secured a dramatic race for safety. Having got that season under his belt, he'll be looking for more goals in 2015/16. Marvin Sordell - Forward Ex Wealdstone Loanee Marvin joined the U's in early September to complete boss Tony Humes' hunt for a new striker. Despite still being only twenty-four, the former Watford trainee has made over 170 career appearances, the majority of which have been in the top two tiers of English

football Callum Harriott - Forward 21-year-old Callum joined the U's on loan until January. The tricky wide man has spent

He remained with Wrexham following his retirement from playing in 1999, remaining with the club until 2001. Tony joined Colchester United's Centre of Excellence in the summer of 2009, and remained in the same position for five years. helping guide the U's under-18 team to a league and cup double during the 2013-14 season. Following Joe Dunne's departure as Colchester United manager in September 2014, Humes was promoted to first-team manager.

Joe Edwards - Midfield Joe joined the U's after four years with Yeovil Town, a period in which he helped them up to the Championship for the first time in their history.

Gavin Massey - Forward Former Wealdstone Loanee Gavin has gone on to be a key member of the U's side as he has developed his game during his time at the club, and his contribution to the team has been acknowledged by his fellow pros, picking up the Players' Player of the Year in two of the last three seasons.

Sammie Szmodics -Midfield

Another who has been with the club all the way through the youth system. The energetic forward broke into the squad during pre-season ahead of the 2013/14 season. Sammie went on to be a regular in the first team last season.

Macauley Bonne - Forward Scored on his home debut. coming off the bench to head home the winner against Peterborough United on his eighteenth birthday. Got his second goal for the club on his first ever start.

Tom Lapslie - Midfield Tom made his first team debut in January 2015, coming on as a substitute in the FA Cup game away to Cardiff City, before making a string of important first





Two previous FA Cup clashes with Colchester and the score is balanced at one win each...



WHO'D have thought it? In the Stones 115-year history we've played 14 FA Cup matches against pro clubs from Football League ranks, including today. When you think that there are 48-odd to choose from the lower divisions, we've now been drawn to play Reading three times and today's opponents Colchester United another three times... although admittedly when we first faced United they were a Southern League side.

In our last programme we briefly covered the 1949 meeting with the Essex glantkillers. Lots of extra material has cropped up so here, firstly, is the full story of that famous clash, followed by the not-somemorable 0-4 defeat at Layer Road in the Second Round in

The Wealdstone FC Handbook for the club's silver jubilee season, 1950-51, was full of the drama of the club's FA Cuprun that season. We met Colchester in the final qualifying round, and this is what the book had to say...

Heroes: Stones' goalscorer Bill Saunders (top) and keeper Danny Wiltshire (above) The draw was eagerly awaited, and what a draw it was!—Wealdstone v. Colchester United, Wealdstone having been drawn at home for the first time in the competition. Of the teams in the draw for that round, Wealdstone had been paired with a side renowned for its cup-fighting qualities and one always likely to account for the very biggest of the professional clubs.

This is what Stanley Mortensen, the Blackpool and England forward, thinks of Colchester United. Writing in his book, Football is My Game, Mortensen, referring to his club's F.A. Cup campaign in the 1947-48 season, says: "We were lucky at the start of the competition. First we drew Leeds United at Blackpool... Then we drew Chester, a Northern section side, and another four-goal win put us into the last 16. We began to think of Wembley, and on the Monday we sat with our ears glued to the wireless to hear our fate in the draw. And it was—Colchester United at home: the team everyone was talking about. This non-league club had given the knockout blow to First Division Huddersfield Town and Second Division Bradford. In each case they had played at home on a small ground.

"Yet as time went on towards February 7th, an astonishing war of nerves was opened on us." Stanley Mortensen continues: "Ted Fenton, the Colchester player-manager, watched us play, and was said to have evolved an 'M Plan'—the plan to stop Matthews, Mortensen, and McIntosh. Nobody can estimate the effect of such fore-match chatter, or how many cup-ties have been won by a well-organised campaign to shake the nerves of the other fellows. It's part of the game—one of the things the complete player has to master.

"The nerve-war was so intense," Mortensen writes, "that eyen our supporters began to wonder whether this team of part-timers could pull off another surprise win. Colchester United made elaborate arrangements to bring their supporters by road, rail, and air, and, of course, we were never allowed to forget that they trained on oysters! If ever a team had a cold war waged against them, it was Blackpool. And things were not improved on the day of the match by the noisy enthusiasm of the trippers from Colchester, who, after seeing the sights of Blackpool, arrived early on the ground and let us all know what they thought about the coming duel.

"We survived it all, our manager reminding us, as we went on to the field, that our opponents were probably much more anxious and nervous than we had any cause to be. This boost-stuff can be a two-edged sword."

And so in the 1949-50 season, Wealdstone had drawn Colchester United and the war of nerves in the F.A. Cup. But the effect of the nerve-war on the Wealdstone players was, apparently, very different from that on the Blackpool players two years earlier. Ted Fenton certainly spoke freely and confidently to the Press of his team's chances of success, but, in the dressing room at Lower Mead on training nights, Charlie Barker and his colleagues were also evolving plans.

The day—November 12th—dawned dull over Lower Mead and district. Heavy rain fell just before the kick-off, and, although it had been expected that a record attendance would be registered, fewer than 10,000 spectators were present to witness the match. But the game was seen by others, for the B.B.C. television cameras were in action for the entire match; in fact, viewers joined the crowd at Lower Mead half-an-hour before the kick-off.

Although Wealdstone supporters ran on to the field from all directions without a moment's delay, it was good to see that the Colchester players were still able to be the first of so many to offer congratulations to the home side.



Stones blasted in first half

A DISMAL first-half performance saw Wealdstone how out of the FA Cup in this second round tie at Fourth Division Colchester.

Their misery started as early as the fourth minute as Colchester took the lead and from then it was all one-way traffic.

The normally sound Stones defence was found wanting as they falled to deal with Colchester's set-piece moves — moves that brought them three of their goals.

Their first was a personal tragedy for Stones' keeper Bob Iles. A long throw on the right by Perry Groves was fleked on by Keith Bowen and there seemed no danger as the ball came straight at lies. But, somehow, the ball evaded the keeper's grasp and squeezed between his legs to settle in the net.

That was the beginning of the end for Stones. Just eight minutes later, Stewart Houston, the former Manchester United defender and now Colchester's pinyer/coach, added the account. Steve Leslie's corner was back-heled by Tony Hadiey to Houston, who made no mistake from the edge of the sky-yard box.

After 22 minutes, Stones found themselves three down. Bowen was left unmarked on the near post to head home a Leslie corner for his second goal of the game.

The Colchester centre-forward, overshadowing his 17-goal striking partner Tony Adoock, completed his hat-trick two minutes from the break to kill off the game as any sort of a contest. Groves went past Gary Donelhas and Chris Dibble with a run that took him into the box, before pulling the ball back for Bowen to Ilaish off the move.

Stones' only threatened once in the first-half when Mark Graves met a Denish Byatt free-kiek on the volley, only to see his effort flash just wide. The only other flast-half incident was a booking for Stones' Donellan. The full-back had his name taken for showing disent after a free-kiek was awarded against him.

The second-half saw the start of a aplitted Stones revival, as they began to take the game to their League opponents in an attempt to make the secondine more cospeciable. And that attempt very nearly paid off as Stones won six second-half corners. From one, Alan Cordice just failed to get the field-ing touch as Colchester's 'keeper Alex Chambersian failed to collect the half-

Stones' best chance came after 64 minutes. Alan Cordlee outpaced the Colchester defence to poke the ball past the advancing Chamberdain. But, as the ball trickled towards an empty set. Houston managed to get back to clear.

The second-half also brought a booking for Stones' skipper Paul Bowgett. He was lucky to stay on the field after flattening Sieve Wignaif in an off-the-hall incident.

Colchester only threatened twice after the break. Both were clear cut chances, but Adcock and then Roger Ochorne, scorer of Ipswich's FA Cup winner against Arsenal five years ago, shot wide. The last way went to Stones, however, with Brian Greensway shooting just wide from a Nell Cordice croit.

Wealdstone can have no complaints about the score, they can also have few

complaints about the support they received. The hundreds of Stones' faithfuls who travelled down to Layer Road gave them trenendous support. They refused to be downhearissed by Colchester's four-goal burst and most of the noise from a 2,693 crowd came from the Westistone end.
