

Day of Destiny: one final push

ood afternoon Ladies and Gentlemen, and welcome to this afternoon's Southern League Premier game against Corby Town. May I extend this welcome to both sets of matchday officials and wish them a safe and pleasant journey home.

Lets get straight to the bone, this afternoon is massive. Absolutely massive. I really shouldn't have to elaborate much more, but just one glance at the league table will explain why I have started off this editorial in this rather drastic manner. With two games to go after this afternoon, a win for Wealdstone could put us within a point or two of maintaining our Premier League status. A defeat, depending on how other results go in the other leagues, could mean our fight for survival is out of our hands.

And there's also the fortunes of our opponents to consider. At the time of writing, they lie on 36 points and are within a whisker of relegation, but I can guarantee they will be fighting tooth and nail to preserve their status. They can still reach 42 points, of which depending on how the other leagues pan out, could be enough points to survive. A victory for Wealdstone today would condemn Corby to a relegation position.

Our previous game this season against Corby saw the Stones come away with a 4-2 victory. Corby scored an extremely early goal within 60 seconds and although Stones equalised within a few minutes, Corby pretty much had the upper hand for the first half. The second half was one way traffic though as Stones roared into a 4-1 lead and

And win we did, by 4 goals to 0! Last weekend's away trip to Gloucester was a truly fantastic occasion. Glorious mid 70s temperatures, some fine pubs, a large away following and a professional performance from the players saw the Stones grab a crucial 2-0 victory.

The one thing we have in our favour, is that we seem to have built up some momentum in the past few weeks, and are generally playing with a settled side, a reasonable amount of confidence and with plenty of passion. This is in complete contrast to the previous two seasons where we

seemed to be hanging on to the ropes for dear life come the final few games.

I am hoping today that I will see lots of faces who have not attended for a while. Its no secret that attendances for home games have been disappointing to say the least. But lets hope a number of lapsed supporters turn out and encourage our players onto a much needed win!

Thoughts for the summer? Work restarting on the ground at PEPF, and a deal that will allow Wealdstone a bright future. This has to happen sooner rather than later, as there's clearly a feeling that the club will sink beneath the waves if we have to continue to groundshare for much longer. Fingers crossed that come next season, work will be underway and the weeks will be counting down to our arrival there.

Speaking to Wealdstone fans, it is clear he remains in high esteem. I have no doubt the supporters and players will silently reflect with Paul during these very sad times. Paul made 210 appearances for us between 1997 and December 2001, and his commitment was never questioned. This season he has made few appearances due to injury, but with his situation we can but pray things work out for his family.

The Opposition

Men of Steel

Since 1935 the former rural village of Corby had been represented in the United Counties League by steelworks side Stewarts & Lloyds - hence the club's nickname of the Steelmen. But by the end of the 1947/48 season it was decided that the new town of Corby had grown sufficiently enough to support an independent football club and Corby Town was born.

Local MP William Montgomery was elected chairman - a position he had previously held with S&L and former Millwall, Dundee and England player Reg Smith was appointed player/manager.

Corby Town played its first game against Wellingborough Town at Occupation Road - home until 1985 - on Saturday, August 21, 1948 and began with an impressive 5-1 victory in front of a crowd of 2,300.

Reg Smith departed just a month into that first season for family reasons, however and results were generally disappointing until Wally Akers was given the manager's job in the summer of 1950.

The United Counties League championship was then won in style in both 1951 and 1952 by a side skippered by the imposing Scot Jimmy Strathie and with ace goalscorer Ernie Middlemiss setting a club goalscoring record of 135 in 136 games which was to last for more than forty years until being broken by David Hofbauer.

This success prompted a step up to the Midland League and in their first season Corby were pipped to the championship by Nottingham Forest Reserves. The Steelmen spent the next five seasons in the Midland League and

although they were never able to match that initial success they did have their moments.

In 1954/1955 they reached the First Round Proper of the FA Cup for the first time losing 0-2 at home to Watford before a crowd of 6,763. The following season two products of the club's youth system -Andy McCabe and Len Chalmers - were transferred to Chesterfield and Leicester City respectively for fees totalling almost £2000. And in 1956/57 Corby won their home league encounter with Gainsborough Trinity by a club record 14-0!

The year of 1958 was a momentous one for the club. Floodlit football came to Corby when an All Star XI took on the Steelmen in the inaugural game under lights and in March it was announced that the club was joining the Southern League. In May it was revealed that former Manchester United, Derby County, Leicester City and England inside forward Johnny Morris was taking over as player/manager.

During his three years in charge Morris brought a number of well known exleague players - including his former Manchester United and England colleague Henry Cockburn to Occupation Road. But this policy almost bankrupt the club and at the end of 1960/61 he was informed that he was not having his contract renewed for financial reasons.

Morris was succeeded by ex-Corby player Tommy Hadden and under his clever management and astute chairmanship of Fred Deely things improved both on and off the pitch. Promotion to the Premier Division was narrowly missed in 1963/1964 - when the capture of the Merit Cup as the Southern League's highest scoring team was some consolation - but the following year they achieved promotion to the top flight. During this period the club made several applications for Football League membership and in 1966 actually picked up one vote!

In 1963/64 Corby were knocked out ot the FA Cup in the First Round by Bristol City and the following season they were defeated at the same stage by Hartlepool United, In 1965/66 the Steelmen overcame that hurdle at home to fellow non-leaguers Burton Albion and in the Second Round faced Luton Town at Occupation Road. Hopes of an upset appeared to have been dashed when Luton earned a 2-2 draw with a late disputed penalty but on the most glorious night in the club's history a goal by local boy Maurice

Goodall gave Corby victory over the Hatters at Kenilworth Road in the replay. In the Third Round a trip to Plymouth Argyle resulted in a 0-6 thrashing and in general the club's fortunes have been on a downward ever since.

Corby were relegated from the Premier Division in 1968 and remained in various forms of Division One until earning a place in the new-look Premier Division in 1982. The Steelmen were relegated again in 1990 - by which time they had moved to a new home at the multi-purpose Rockingham Triangle sports complex - but bounced back after just one season as Midland Division runners up and Merit Cup winners.

In 1992/1993 under the management of Elwyn Roberts and with an experienced side which included Steve Collins, Gerry McElhinney, Bryn Gunn and skipper Dougle Keast they finished third in the Premier Division but just two seasons later following a cash crisis which had threatened their very existence they were relegated and ever

since have struggled to stay in the Southern League.

It appeared that the battle had been lost at the end of 1997/98 but Corby were handed a late reprieve and switched to the Southern Division for the first

The 2000/01 season saw Corby finish in a respectable mid-table position but they struggled in their next season, and only managed to hold onto their Dr Martens league status by the skin of their teeth. Following the departure of Eddie McGoldrick senior player Wayne Spencer took over as manager and on a very dramatic last day of the season, bottom of the table Corby, gained an unexpected home win over Eastbourne Borough to leapfrog Wisbeach Town and condemn the 'Fenmen'.

This season, a poor start to life in The Premier Division resulted in Rob Dunion losing his job in December 2006, being replaced by former Steelmen captain Dougle Keast in the position...

The Opposition

Ian Pledger

An experienced and well travelled goalkeeper who signed for Corby from Southern League Premier Division rivals Stamford AFC in January 2007. He has also played for Blackstones and Wisbeach Town.

Mark Burrows

A 6'4" tall centre half who was born in Kettering on August 14th 1980. 'Buzz' started his career as a trainee with Coventry City and captained the 'Sky Blues' youth team to victory in the FA Youth Cup in 1999. He wasn't given the opportunity to show what he could do at senior level, however, as Gordon Strachan released him on a free transfer to Exeter City in July 2000.

Mark did gain Football League experience with Exeter, but he returned back to his Northamptonshire roots when he signed for Rothwell Town in September 2002. Just a month later he was on the move again, however when he joined Kings Lynn, 'Buzz' remained with The Linnets until early in the 2004/05 season when he had brief spells with both Arlesey Town and Histon, before signing at The Rockingham Triangle for the first time in December 2004.

After seven appearances he moved onto Hemel Hemstead Town, the following month however in early February Rob Dunion brought Burrows back to

The Steelmen, where he helped the side to promotion.

Next came a step back into full-time football with Nationwide Conference North side Kettering, where he struggled to break into the first team, once again leaving and opting for a return here in September 2006.

Dom Hallows

A versatile left-sided player who was signed by Rob Dunion from Stamford last season. He was previously on the books of Nottingham Forest and Leicester City, before making over 100 appearances for Grantham Town.

Scott Goodwin

A vastly experienced midfield player who signed a contract with The Steelmen in June 2006. He has previously played for Coventry City, Shepshed Dynamo, Grantham Town, Hednesford Town, Hereford, Kettering Town, Gravesend & Northfleet, Tamworth, Canvey Island, Bishops Stortford, Nuneaton Borough, and Rugby Town. He was appointed club captain when Dougle Keast took over as manager at The Rockingham Triangle.

Chris Goodman

A popular midfield player who signed from Sutton Coldfield Town two seasons ago. Coventry born Goodman has previously played for Bedworth United, Rugby United and Racing Club Warwick. He made his

100th Corby Town appearance in December 2006.

Steve Towers

A highly talented midfield player formerly of Oadby Town and Rothwell Town. He joined The Steelmen in the summer following an impressive season at Cecil Street where he was The Bones top goalscorer in last years Southern League Eastern Division campaign.

Scott Musgrove

Stamford born player who signed for his home town club in July 2006 after a year as a professional with Cheltenham Town. Previously an academy player with Norwich City and Stoke City. Plays on the left of defence or midfield. Signed for The Steelmen in March 2007.

Chris Gray


30 year old central midfielder who signed from Coalville Town in January 2007. He has also played for Hednesford Town and Sutton Coldfield Town during his career.

Chris Difante

20 year old striker who signed from Rothwell Town in February 2007. He was previously wit Kettering Town, where he scored a quick hat-trick on his Rockingham Road debut. He also scored on his Rockingham Triangle debut in our defeat to TeamBath.

Wealdstone middle east peace mission

Over land and sea, to Israel

Peter John-Baptiste reflects on his experiences with following England around the globe, and the pride with seeing Wealdstone linked with the national team.

HAVING GROWN UP AS AN ENGLAND FAN in the 70s and 80s there weren't always too many opportunities for me to be 100% proud of our support. The press reports always seemed unfavourable and as a football and England mad youngster it was always hurtful and disappointing to read and see the press reports. Once I was old enough and could afford to go away with England I soon realised that there were many friends to be made and great places to see. The football however.... well..

Over the past few years I've been fortunate enough to be involved in a few of the activities that have been put on around some of the England away games and have been more than happy to take part and in some cases help out (as long as it doesn't impinge on any time I can spend at a nearby bar).

A couple of the highlights for me have been a school visit in Lisbon in 2004 and a brilliant kids football tournament in Manhattan during England's USA tour in the summer of 2005.

Unfortunately I couldn't get over to Israel for England's Euro 2008 qualifier on March 24th but luckily Wealdstone FC were well represented at the children's tournament the day before the game.

Football4Peace is a sports based co-existence project for Jewish and Arab children that has been running in towns and villages of the Galilee region of Northern Israel since 2001. They organised the tournament the day before the game in Tel-Aviv for 16 teams of mixed Arab and Jewish boys and girls and required shirts for the children to play in.

I heard about this through an England

supporting friend of mine and approached the Wealdstone board who were keen to get involved. Wealdstone were the only club to provide 2 kits, home and away, and bearing in mind the list of clubs involved included Premiership clubs Manchester United, Aston Villa and Reading as well as a set of England shirts donated by the FA that was quite something. This was something that made me very proud when I had the pleasure of going to FA headquarters and presenting the shirts, shorts and socks to England manager Steve McClaren. Great credit must be given to our sponsors CAMS Associates who provided the kits free of charge.

By all accounts the tournament was a great success and even though Wealdstone didn't win either the boys tournament, Norwich took that title, or the girls tournament, England 66 won that one, our girls did scoop the Fair Play award. A Jewish and a Muslim girl in full Wealdstone kits were presented with their award by former West Brom legend Brendan Batson.

A couple of quotes from the kids involved:

"Wearing this shirt is a big honour." Ila Zur, 11, Mishmar Ha'am.

"Playing for peace is the best thing you can do with football!" Shanti Rossik, 12, Ramat Menashe.

"It's a tournament, it's fun to play together...these Wealdstone shirts are really comfortable and look great" Eden Itach, 10, Maagan.

England's fans coming to see more than iust their team

A group of England fans will be the first organized group of soccer supporters to visit Yad Vashem after they arrive this week for the Euro 2008 qualification match against Israel on Saturday.

On Friday, the London England Fans supporters group will visit the Jerusalem Holocaust memorial as part of their "fan-friendly" campaign, which will also see them supporting a 16-team children's soccer tournament on Friday afternoon in Tel Aviv with teams made up of Arab and Jewish children.

Organized by Football4Peace, an organization that uses sport to bring children from different communities together, each team will be outfitted in English club shirts ranging from Manchester United and Tottenham Hotspur to Wycombe Wanderers and Wealdstone.

On Friday morning, the fans will travel to Yad Vashem where they will lay a St. George Cross wreath with two cards from the supporters reading: "Never Forget" and "Never Again."

When England played Poland in 2004, England fans laid a wreath at Auschwitz, as they also did during last year's World Cup in Germany, when they visited Dachau.

Mark Perryman, convener of London England Fans, said: "Israel is in the news every day for all the wrong reasons, terrorism and war. Yet it's a country immersed in history. We wanted to use the trip not just to see England win but to spread some fan friendship, and when we lay a St. George Cross wreath at Yad Vashem, the Holocaust Memorial, honour the memory of the human horror of the concentration camps."

Playing for peace in Israel

Friday, 23 March 2007

When England visit Israel on Saturday, all thoughts will be on three crucial UEFA EURO 2008™ qualifying points. But the day before a group of England fans are aiding an event with resonance well beyond the field of play.

Fans' gift

Football for Peace (F4P) is a sport-based co-existence project for Jewish and Arab children that has been running in towns and villages of the Galilee region of Northern Israel since 2001. To coincide with England's game with Israel it is organising a tournament in Tel-Aviv involving 16 mixed teams containing more than 200 Arab and Jewish boys and girls. Fans of 13 sides, from Premiership sides Manchester United FC, Aston Villa FC and Reading FC to non-league Wealdstone FC - the first club of England Under-21 coach Stuart Pearce - donated football shirts to national team manager Steve McClaren at Football Association (FA) headquarters last Thursday to be used in the tournament.

McClaren's backing

"I'd like to congratulate the fans on a fantastic initiative," McClaren said. "It's great to see the power football has to bring people together. England fans have done some really positive things in recent years to build close links with other countries." Supporters' group englandfans are also involved in a number of other activities in Israel

over the weekend, including a visit to the Holocaust Memorial Yad Vashem and a match against fans of Hapoel Bnei Sakhnin FC, who in 2004/05 became the first Arab side to play in the UEFA Cup.

F4P is an initiative inspired by experiences in South Africa and Northern Ireland where grassroots sport helped cut across cultural boundaries. Originally called the World Sport Peace Project, it was based on an idea of Baptist minister Geoffrey Whitefield and former athlete David Bedford, and was developed by the University of Brighton's sports department, which has a global reputation in researching sport and society. It began with a week-long coaching camp in the Arab town of Ibillin in 2001, though a bus bombing caused the cancellation of Jewish participation.

Annual camps

Since then annual camps have been held with children from both communities and British coaches, and now more than 1,000 participants each year take part in F4P events. There are four principle aims: to provide opportunities for social contact across community boundaries, to promote mutual understanding, to engender in participants a desire for and commitment to peaceful coexistence and to enhance soccer skills and technical knowledge. In aid of the latter goal, 35 coaches from the Arab and Jewish communities in the northern Galilee region visited England earlier this month for a training week ahead of the F4P tournament.

Gazi Nujidat from the Israel Sports Authority, who help co-ordinate the project, is in no doubt as to the benefits of these events. "At first you see some distance between the children, but with time they get close to each other," he told uefa.com. "There is more understanding. And through the year we keep the activities going. One of the co-ordinators in the Jordan valley told me that one [Jewish] parent phoned to say they were so thankful for the opportunity of taking part in the project.

Barnes role

As well as helping with the tournament, the FA have been dealing with Israeli community projects since

November 2004, when it was involved in a conference in Tel-Aviv tackling racism in Israeli football. It has taken part in events each year since, and in 2006 former English international John Barnes officially launched the Kick Racism Out Of Football campaign there, and he will be present at the tournament today. Nujidat said: "We are so thankful to Brighton University staff, the British Council and the FA for their support of this special event. And the children are so excited to see who will get which club shirt and to showcase their activities."

Opportunity

The university's Professor John Sugden, one of the founders of the project, added: "This is a fantastic opportunity for us to raise the profile of what has grown to be one of the biggest cross-community programmes in Israel. There will be huge media interest in England's vital qualifier. Having the F4P festival the Friday before the game, supported by England's fans with their flags and mascots, will give us the chance to show a really positive side to English football and its fans, as well as send a strong message that there is a genuine willingness in Israel for different communities to work toward reconciliation and peaceful coexistence through sport."



A draw wasn't what was needed, unfortunately

Steve Paull watches as Stones fail to press their advantage

WITH WEALDSTONE ONLY managing a draw in this game, their premier division status next season is balanced on a knife edge. Drawn games at this stage will simply not be good enough.

Stones were playing against a strong wind in the first half, and largely because of this, Mangotsfield enjoyed a huge territorial advantage. Apart from one shot from Horgan which hit a post early on, this advantage was completely wasted as numerous long distance efforts at goal were hopelessly off target. Wealdstone, with their isolated breakaways, looked much the more potent.

Debutant wingback Marcello Fernandes with a deflected low 25 yard strike had keeper Book scrambling across his goal and Theo Robinson almost broke the deadlock when he made himself a little space, but the advancing Book was alert enough to block the shot. On another day a penalty shout when Robinson was downed by a challenge from Ball would have been answered in the affirmative, but I suggest all square at half time and now playing with the wind at their backs would have pleased Wealdstone.

And as expected Wealdstone were much more of an attacking force in the second half. Fernandes, with another low shot from distance tested Book once more, as did an effort from Graeme Montgomery. Robinson's shot with 63 minutes played was heading for the corner of the net until a full length fingertip save kept it out at the expense of a corner. However from that corner, taken by Scott Donnelly, Simon Martin, rising at the

near post, headed his first goal in Wealdstone colours.

I don't know what happened now but Weald-stone were unable to press home their advantage and it was less than ten minutes later that Mangotsfield equalised. Paul Smith could only parry a low shot from the edge of the box and not deflect it sufficient distance away from goal. Claridge was first to the ball to score from close in.

At the moment confidence in the Stones camp is very brittle and following this equaliser heads seemed to drop a little. In the closing 15 minutes, despite top scorer Dean Papali being brought on for Montgomery, it was the visitors who were most likely to score next and Smith, with excellent saves from French and Cornwall, who retained Wealdstone's point for the draw.

Ref was heart of trouble

Again Wealdstone gave away points to a team they could and should have beaten and had to be thankful for a stoppage time equaliser for a point. I haven't had a reason to criticize a referee for many weeks, which is good, but after this game I have now.

For me Mr Russell was the worst official since the days of that great incompetent Warren Atkin. It is fine booking people for kicking the ball away, (although after only nine minutes and with the game scoreless I cannot see how it can be time wasting) but again it is all to do with consistency and Russell failed to spot Clevedon players doing exactly the same thing on more than one occasion.

His sending off of Chris O'Leary was even worse. If a player choses to take a quick free kick how can an opposing player FACING THE WRONG WAY retreat quickly enough? I am not even sure that Russell saw the incident, (and for that matter one of his kicking the ball away bookings) he only saw the aftermath.

But on a more composed note Wealdstone gave away three goals and keeper Paul Smith must hold up his hand and say that he maybe, perhaps should, have kept out all three.



A bright start against poor opposition saw Wealdstone take the lead after 19 minutes. A series of 1-2s between Theo Robinson and John-Joe O'Toole opened up the Clevedon defence and saw the latter hook the ball in from 15 yards from the former's cross. Very neat. but Robinson missed an easier chance soon after when firing over the bar from just six yards out. It was to prove costly as Symons with a turn and shot equalised and Smith seemingly slow to get down

For once Wealdstone heads didn't drop and a long range effort from Scott Donnelly skimmed the bar before a lovely piece of skill from Robinson, lifting the ball over his man and shooting past Greaves in the Clevedon goal, put the Stones back in front. Again Wealdstone failed to go two goals ahead when, just before the break, Donnelly's curling free kick was inches wide of a post.

This was to prove costly as the Wealdstone that

came out for the second half appeared to have left all of their good first half approach work in the dressing room. Panic and lots of defending was the norm now and it was no surprise that Clevedon soon equalised, although Scott's cross-shot did not appear to have sufficient power to beat a goalkeeper.

Russell added to Wealdstone's woes when he sent off O'Leary and from the retaken free kick Shepperd's shot smacked against the crossbar. Two minutes later Symons with a header that was only fust above Smith's head gave the visitors the lead and with Stones now badly misfiring going forward, that was how it looked like it would stay.

Donnelly was off target with a couple of long range efforts, but it was four minutes into added time when his left wing corner was met by a powerful header from O'Toole and 10-man Stones had rescued a point - but is it good enough in the long run?



Stones overcome usual jitters in decisive victory against Banbury

Steve Paull watches as Wealdstone push to a clinical finish.

This most welcome and deserved victory at least preserved Wealdstone's premier division status into the last four games of the season. Anything less than maximum points here would have left Wealdstone with almost no hope of avoiding relegation. Now there is at least a chance, and a welcome boost in goal difference for the side that has conceded the most goals in their division this season.

A guiet and even start gave the impression that one goal would probably

decide this fixture. Theo Robinson tested the Banbury goalkeeper, ex-league veteran Alan Judge, early on, and soon after the keeper allowed the momentum of making a catch to take him out of his area with the ball. The referee only saw fit to issue a yellow card when

numerous examples of red cards for this are issued every season.

Whatever, Andre Delisser took a curling free kick just after the half hour mark and the faintest touch from Theo Robinson was enough to give Wealdstone the lead. Banbury continued to pass the ball nicely in midfield but for all their pretty approach play seemed to be little threat in attack.

Four minutes into the second half Scott Donnelly flicked a ball John-Joe O'Toole's pass and Dean Papali raced clear of a square defence. The shot wasn't the best but it had sufficient force and direction to give Stones the luxury of a two goal cushion.

This season's script says that at this point Wealdstone get the jitters. Concentration lapsed in the defence and Mitch Swain somehow kept out an effort from Blossom, then Gardner headed over. True, Donnelly volleyed a part-cleared corner just wide, but then

Delisser made a goal-line clearance after Gardner had rounded Swain and looked odds-on to score. There were similarities between that second and the third Stones goal in the 70th minute when Donnelly hoofed the ball forward and Papali raced clear again.

This time the finish was clinical and the relief immense. Banbury were a beaten side, although both Baird and Pond got in shots that just cleared the bar. The last Wealdstone goal was scored in added time when, following a melee in the box, Robinson's determination and toe-poke forced the ball in.



Speaking of next season, it's going to be tough financially regardless of whether we are in the Southern League Premier, back in the Rymans Premier, or relegated into one of the feeder divisions. We need to try and re-generate the club in many areas. Your Board have been busy in recent times and no doubt announcements will soon be made, Hopefully, we will be bringing you some good news about Prince Edward Playing Fields - amongst other things.

We can only fall into the bottom three if the teams beneath us win all their remaining matches and we are ahead of the 4th bottom teams in both the Ryman and Northern Premier Leagues. It's in our own hands.

Lastly, don't forget the End of Season Presentation Evening which is going to be held at Broadfields on Friday 4th May. Tickets are £15 (this includes a bar-b-q) but anyone buying a Season Ticket for next season before this date will get a free ticket.....as well as the early bird discount.......what a bargain!





Stones step up a beat in third home draw

Graham Hall clipped the feet of Melton to concede a penalty and although Mitch Swain, also returning to the side following a broken finger, saved Frew's spot kick, the ball rebounded favourably for the taker and he smashed the loose ball in.

There now came the period where Stones were at their worst and the

visitors their best. Frew put another chance wide and an excellent fingertip save from Swain to turn over a header from Melton kept Stones in the game. Wealdstone chances were very rare-only a Clark long range free kick testing Howie.

But after the break it was a completely different story. Theo Robinson tested Howie early on then Clark fired just over again, before the equaliser just after the hour. One of a string of dangerous long throws into the box from Lee Chappell was headed on by Chris O'Leary and Papali with a quick turn and shot found the net.

Graeme Montgomery smacked an effort against Howie's bar soon after, and as Wealdstone stormed forward whenever possible, Robinson's shot from wide on the right was going in before Howie clawed it over. Still Wealdstone pressed for the winner, Blois was fortunate to see his desperate defensive header clear Howie's bar and Papali headed a corner just wide.

It was only in the latter stages that the visitors got near the Wealdstone goal and Swain with another acrobatic tip over from a Crane header kept the score level. It would have been cruel but not unusual this season if O'Halloran's 94th minute effort had found the net but it went just wide.

So Wealdstone continue to pick up points in their battle to retain their premier division status, but with one win in ten league games now, is that going to be enough? A victory or two somewhere is vital.





Fortunes sink again as Stones lose to Hemel

Steve Paull sees Wealdstone concede after scoring

Wealdstone's hopes of winning the battle against relegation took another dent as Hemel Hemstead, in the end, comfortably won this contest. But hopes in the Stones camp must still be alive as they competed well against promotion chasing Hemel and if defensive lapses can only be eliminated there might still be hope.

Against all pre-match predictions Stones took an early lead. Only two minutes had elapsed when a long throw from Chappell was fumbled by the Hemel keeper Smith and Dean Papali turned and lashed the loose ball in from close range. A good penalty shout for a foul on Robinson might have given Stones a second goal and made the game really interesting, but the referee was unimpressed.

Wealdstone led the game for half an hour. On the whole this period was trouble free for Stones. Only once did Mitch Swain make a save, although Edgeworth did shoot just over on

occasion. Hemel's Yeboah can take a throw-in that outdistances Chappell's and reaches the penalty spot. One of these missiles was to give Hemel their equaliser when defender Wild headed it in. A Dean Clark free kick headed back across goal by Fergus Moore led to Ben Martin putting a great chance over.

This miss was to prove costly as Hemel were ominously starting to get into their stride. Brennan and Herron both went close before the home side took the lead in first half stoppage time. Stones lost possession on the edge of the Hemel box, and with so many players out of position a quick break led to a Sippetts curling shot putting Hemel in front.

Only a goal behind at half time was a cause for optimism in the Stones camp, but the third Hemel goal a minute after the restart, and it's nature, dented what confidence Stones had. Herron, on the right wing, checked back and crossed

with his weaker foot and somehow his bobbling low cross eluded everybody and went in at the far post.

Stones were deflated and Hemel content with what they had achieved until a 75th minute strike from Theo Robinson after Graeme Montgomery had chased down a 'lost cause' to cross, gave Stones renewed hope.

It seems that so often in recent weeks Wealdstone have conceded very soon after scoring - which is exactly what they did here. Two further minutes had elapsed before a Hemel free kick into the Stones penalty box broke favourably for Edgeworth to hook it in. In the minutes remaining Brennan fired wide before the fifth Hemel goal from Thomas came in added time after a quick breakaway. Wealdstone:







Tuesday, February 18, 1997, Icis League Division Three: Wealdstone 6 Braintree Town 0

AN AMAZING night at the White Lion ground that personified exactly what you can achieve as a football team with guts, determination and desire. The Ryman Div 3 title was narrowing into a two-horse race between ourselves and Braintree, and "The Iron" had bragging rights after winning the first game in Essex 2-0 just before Christmas.. but when they swaggered into the White Lion ground they were surely unaware of the hostile reception that awaited them. Stones had waited two months for revenge and, backed by a frenzied crowd of over 400, tore into them right from the kick-off. The Essex title pretenders were outclassed in every area of the pitch, with skipper Fergus Moore here, there and everywhere in fist-pumping action.

Braintree were hanging on after just ten minutes as two shots were cleared off their line, but Bryan Hammatt opened the scoring with a clinical finish inside the box... and centre-

back Roy Marshall bulleted in a header from Steve Bircham's cross to makie it 2-0 after just 20 minutes. Having seen some indifferent displays that season against poor sides, we just stood there open-mouthed as the Stones swept forward with a display of crisp, assured passing. Our devastating attacks soon brought a third from the brilliant Terry Hibbert.

The normally-assured Braintree were all over the place. Into the second half and a long-ranger from the inspired Fergie was only half-saved and Simon Garner knocked in the

rebound... we were looking like netting from every attack and Hammatt and Tony Smith wrapped up the win, Braintree just praying for the final whistle.

Saturday May 4 1985, Gola League:

Kettering 0 Wealdstone 1

UNBELIEVABLE, you may be thinking, that the win that clinched the Stones greatestever honour, the non-League title, ranks only 4th in the list! Many people would have this as the Numero Uno in Wealdstone history and, in many ways, they would be right. But, like quite a few that season, this wasn't a great game. The Stones simply rolled up their sleeves in true Brian Hall fashion and set about collecting the three





points that would clinch the 'Conference" title ahead of the final game, a tricky trip to Barnet two days later. Five days after that, of course, was the Trophy Final at Wembley and we didn't want to have anything hanging on the game at Underhill.

It was a nervy afternoon for the 400 or so travelling fans, stretched out in a blue and yellow swathe behind the Kettering goal. just willing the ball to go in. We had to wait until the 78th minute when Dennis Byatt (truly magnificent on the day without his suspended defensive partner Paul Bowgett) powered in a freekick to the back of the penalty box. It beat a cluster of defenders to where Andy Graham was waiting for a trademark strike.... a sharp, angled volley that beat home keeper Boyd to the far corner. The crowd erupted in relief,

and 15 minutes later Kettering chairman John Murphy was handing the Gola League trophy to a jubilant, be-suited g e t t Our chairman Alan Clifton had travelled to the League secretary's home in Kent before the game and smuggled the trophy, ahead of time, to Kettering for just this eventuality. Not a great game then, but a moment in history for the club and rightly revered.

Saturday April 2 1983, Alliance Premier League: Maidstone United 0 Wealdstone 3

JUST ABOUT the best performance I've ever seen from a Wealdstone side. We've maybe had more passionate, tougher, more uncompromising teams but we've never had a BETTER team (though I never saw the great amateur sides) than this XI that stepped out at Maidstone's big old London Road ground this Easter Saturday for a game that would go a long way towards shaping the destiny of the Alliance Premier League title.

Or so we thought. As it turned out, we faltered after this glorious afternoon (three draws and beaten at home, crucially, by Eddie McCluskey's Enfield) and Maidstone and Enfield passed us on the final straight to set up a two-way fight for the championship. The Es finally won it by a point on the last day of the season.

But it might have been us. Oh, how it might have been us. They were both bloody good sides too, but I still maintain that the Wealdstone side so painstakingly assembled by Allen Batsford was better.

apart from Hastings United, who had won something like 20 consecutive games to cling to our coat-tails, level on points, going into the final week of the season. This truly was a gargantuan clash. Only one team would be promoted to the Conference, and we were desperate to reclaim our rightful place among non-League's elite. A place very well-earned by our fabulous side of this era (much the same as that outlined in the game at Maidstone, No.3 in this list) that had proved irresistible all season.

But if any team would be able to resist us, it would be Hastings. They were formidable at the back and potent up front, and in Matt Stock they possessed possibly a bettter midfielder than our own Robin Wainwright... But "Throbbin Robin" was determined to win his own personal battle as we started like men possessed.. despite having played four games that week and won them all. My recollections of the game are hazy. Bowgett and Byatt immense at the back. Stuart Pearce striking fear in Hastings hearts with his foraging forward runs. Alan Cordice, partnered that season by Ray Knowles, threatening to tear them apart. Eventually, that is precisely what happened. Cordice put away the first, and then, with a crowd close to 2,000 packed in the Cinema End, came close to finishing the contest so many times in the second half as Hastings held on. Finally, Knowles won a knock-down and Cordice slapped in the rebound to spark amazing scenes.

We officially clinched the title with a 3-0 win over Ashford two days later, but this was a heavyweight showdown in the Ali-Frazier mould and, thankfully, it was the Stones who floated like butterflies and stung like bees to end the season a crucial one point ahead of Hastings. Quite a battle.

No. 1 Monday May 3, 2004

Ryman League Play-off:
Dulwich Hamlet 2 Wealdstone 2
(Wealdstone win 5-4 on penalties)
YES, YES, I know what you're thinking...

how can this be considered a league match when it was a one-off, play-off game? But technically it WAS a league game and I gloriously pronounce it as such, largely because it was such an awesome night and the rightful winner of any poll! I hardly need to outline the events that led up to the Stones needing a play-off, as it is such recent history. But basically, we began the season in the Ryman League Div One North, knowing that (because of restructuring and the formation of a second tier to the Conference) a place in the top six would ensure Ryman Premier Division football in 2004-5.

Promotion would be particularly sweet as we felt we had been cheated out of automatic promotion to the Premier Division five years before.

But although we started the season well enough, and held a place in the coveted top six for most of the winter, our season fell apart in February and March with just one win in eight games and the side dropping to 12th in the league. Very strange, when you think that we fielded such luminaries as Marvin Morgan, Richard Jolly, a young Jermaine Beckford, Martin Carter and Gary McKeown.

But we got our act together when all appeared lost, a run of just one defeat in nine games in April rocketing the Stones into sixth place. Disaster, though, when we lost 2-0 at home to promotion rivals Hemel Hempstead and dropped to 8th... though we had a back-door entry to the Premier Division up our sleeves, with news that, if we finished 7th, there would be play-off with the team who finished seventh in the Ryman Division One South.

We still had to win our last game, at East Thurrock on May 1st, to steal into 7th place, and a 2-0 victory catapulted the Stones into this play-off just two days later at Dulwich's Champion Hill ground. The Hamlet had home advantage as their playing record over the season was better... but with over 300 Wealdstone fans present that Monday night, it seemed more like a home game. Dulwich had ended the season in great form

and threatened to overwhelm us with Omari Coleman and Craig Dundas a constant threat. But Andy Carter, with one amazing triple save, and Dave Ryan were outstanding and it was the Stones who went ahead after 30 minutes. McKeown's freekick was punched out by home keeper Seuke as far as Martin Carter, whose clever chip from 35 yards sailed back over the stranded keeper and into the net. With the Stones fans in raptures we should have made the game safe in a tremendoius 20 minute spell, Marvin Morgan bringing a great save from Seuke before Jolly's sharp turn and shot hit the far post. Then Ryan blazed a volley from 20 yards that the home keeper somehow kept out.

Into the second half and slowly Dulwich fought back. Now it was Andy Carter's turn to deny Coleman (twice) and Dundas before a Coleman cross-shot was slid home by Charley Side for 1-1. We were rocking and it all seemed horribly predictable when, with just 10 minutes to go, Carter again saved from the livewire Dundas only for Coleman to hammer in the loose ball. 1-2. But cometh the hour, cometh Dave

Ryan. He had a huge performance this night, and delivered with an 86th minute freekick on the edge of the box after Morgan had been brought down – for a penalty, we thought at the time. Ryan's low drive beat Seuke to an ear-splitting roar of relief from the visiting fans. 2-2!

Extra time, as so often, was a battle of tired limbs. Carter again saved from Coleman, while Jolly and sub Ben Alexander had half chances, and it was trepidation that greeted the final whistle... with the prospect of a penalty shoot-out for a Stones side that had missed SEVEN out of ten penalties in the course of the season! We all packed in behind the goal, Stones fans one side and Dulwich the other and good-natured banter broke out. We were resigned to defeat. Hamlet were confident. and they had brought on regular penalty takers Lee Akers and Meshach Nugent late in extra time for just this eventuality.It was Akers who stepped up to take No.1 for Dulwich. Goal. Then Dave Ryan, so magnificent in the 120 minutes, took our first spot-kick and shot feebly at keeper Seuke. Saved.Our whole season seemed

encapsulated in that moment, with penalty misses dogging our efforts since August. That made eleven penalties and just three scored. On the terraces, we just shrugged our shoulders and accepted the inevitable. It had only been a couple of seasons since we lost to Enfield Town in the Middlesex Charity Cup Final on penalties... and indeed, a year or so before that had drawn with Wembley in the Middlesex Cup and lost 3-0 on penalties, and looked ripe to repeat that unwanted record.

Sure enough, Dulwich score their next and we are 2-0 behind, and even when Danny Butler rams one in for the Stones it seems pretty irrelevant. And so it goes on, Dulwich beating Andy Carter with Teutonic efficiency and (remarkably, we start to realise) the Stones respond with a couple of beautiful spot-kicks of our own from Tommy Williams and Gary McKeown. But it still left Dulwich just needing to convert their final penalty to win promotion, and Nugent stepped up (rather cockily, I remember thinking) to settle our fate. Time seemed to freeze as he ambled forwards, attempting to dummy Andy Carter, and then struck fractionally under the ball, which climbed, and climbed and climbed, seemingly for the roof of the net. My thoughts were scrambled in that nanosecond. He's really got under this one. Carter's nowhere. It's going in. Numb realisation. Hang on, the ball's still climbing. **** me! It's hit the bar! And bounced

Nugent hangs his head in disbelief. Carter, face full of dust, looks behind him and realises he's not heard the rustle of ball on net. He jumps to his feet and clenches his fist while, all around, men in blue are tasting salvation.

Jesus, we all think, we can actually save this now. Just keep our nerve. Martin Carter still has to put away our final penalty to force sudden death and people are afraid to look as he runs up and carefully places the ball high to Seuke's left. 4-4! We are now jumping around, total bags of nerves. How must the players be feeling,


gathered in their tight knot in the centrecircle? Suddenly the pressure is on Dulwich now... we all feel it, their fans feel it, their players are palpably feeling it and when their defender David Moore walks up to take their sixth penalty he looks like a condemned man.

Andy Carter bounces on his goalline. He's guessed wrong every time so far, but the odds must be working in his favour soon... YES! Moore hits a tame penalty to Carter's right and he falls jubilantly on the ball! All the noise is now coming from the Stones fans. We can't believe it. How can the whole mood of a game, a whole season, change in the space of a few minutes? But then we as shushing ourselves, urging quiet as Richard Jolly, one of the best strikers but worst penalty takers in Wealdstone history, comes forward for the defining moment. Richard Jolly, who had cost us a point with a soft penalty miss in our very first game of the season against Yeading, Richard Jolly, who had then taken one at Berkhamsted but cost us two points when the keeper saved.


Richard Jolly... who was now our hero as he banged the ball hard and high into the net to leave Dulwich on their knees, and everyone else in ecstasy. We did it! We did it!
