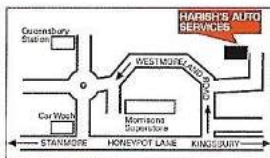

The Big Kick-Off: Stones face up to the challenge

Wealdstone kicked off the new Ryman Premier season at Hastings with a reshaped squad determined to go one better than last season's

promotion push that only just came off the rails due to a ridiculously punishing four games a week schedule at the tail end.

With at least seven new players signing up during a summer of unusually high transfer activity, Gordon Bartlett made his intentions clear early on that he is not going to accept another near miss and that the time has come to deliver.

Experience in the form of prolific striker Scott Fitzgerald and defender Wes Parker coupled with young players such as midfielder Kurtney Brooks have excited the Stones faithful. The many Friendly results have reflected the changes and reshaping that has been required but performances have gradually improved and the squad is ready to face the many challenges of a long and hard season ahead.

Sutton United under achieved last season and will no doubt be up there as one of the favourites for the title and Kingstonian will be an undoubted threat following the Borehamwood play off debacle. Tonbridge Angels also looked to have added some decent players to their squad to build on the momentum of their late charge up the table last term.

Amongst the new boys, Croydon appear to have spent the most and on players of high quality: Tom Hutchinson and former Southampton midfielder Jermaine Wright have been signed by manager Tim O'Shea adding to his already expensively assembled squad.

Last season proved once again, however, that organisation, work ethic and clever management still count for a great deal in a league that requires a physical, battling, presence and no little skill to make headway - Aveley's success last term surely proved that on a relatively small budget.

Stones have certainly built the foundations for another progressive season and we wish all the players, first team, reserves and youth every success.

Enough with pre-season Let's see where we're at



Good evening everyone and welcome back to a new season here at The Vale and the first of our midweek fixtures which will now be played on Mondays.

With the Ryman League starting late this year it has seemed the longest pre season ever with our first night back over 7 weeks ago. During this time we've trained two and occasionally three times a week, held two trialist games and played 12 friendlies, including the Hayes and Yeading game, Gary reckons he's about ready for a rest never mind start the season!!!

This seemingly hectic pre season activity has at least enabled us to look at a number of trialists and new faces; I think Gordon has said previously that we have used over 50 players in the trialist games. It would appear that many football clubs are feeling the effect of the current economic climate and there have been more players than I've ever experienced looking for clubs after being released from not only clubs at our level but from the professional ranks as well. There's been hardly a day over the last couple of weeks that I haven't taken a call on the club number from a player asking to come training, or for a trial. There was another message on the answer phone when I came in this morning (Thursday) from a player from a higher level. I know Gordon

and Fingers have had the same.

This has made for some very difficult decisions on who to sign and who to let go and there have been a few that a couple of years ago we would have been delighted to sign but the standard of player we have available to us now is much higher and so we welcome Scott Fitzgerald, Wes Parker, Sean Cronin, Dan Burnell, Kurtney Brooks, Peter Dean (returning) Jonathan North and Jon Douglas to the club and hope they have a successful time with us. There are enough new faces to have kept the coach journey to Hastings on Saturday lively as they went through the 'new boy' initiation of singing solo on their first away trip with the club!!

With so many new faces it was inevitable others had to move on and so we say thanks and good luck to Rob Fitzgerald, Adam Logie and Charlie Mpi and to Jamie Osbourne who has gone out on loan.

Of course we won't be the only club that has benefitted from new signings and indications are that the league will be very tight again with a number of us expecting to be challenging for promotion. Note that I said us, because we expect to be right up there amongst the leaders from early on with a target to gain automatic promotion! Gordon has pretty much demanded as much from both players and staff alike, he

said very early in the preparations that being nearly there, as we have been for the last couple of seasons, will not be good enough this term and spelled out exactly what he expected from everyone.

Also during pre season we have tried changing our formation and style of play, this was decided upon mainly to try and reduce the number of goals we concede, last season's tally was far too high for a team finishing in the top 6 and if we could have kept some them out who knows what might have been.

Anyway, one could argue that it hasn't been stunningly successful as we have conceded a few in our friendlies, but this was not too surprising as players get to grips with the system and with team line ups and positions changing so much not only between games but during them. We have also used different formations in the friendlies and even changed them during games, just as we might in a league game depending on different situations we may face, it is important that we are flexible and adaptable and the players have responded well to what they have been asked to take on.

We have been absolutely delighted with some of the football we have played and our ball retention has at times been excellent, what we must do though is turn that possession into goals.

Our last couple of training sessions, Tuesday and Thursday, will have been spent going through the final preparations for Saturday and tonight, we will have worked on our set pieces and positional play on the pitch, which I must say is in fantastic condition thanks to the work that Fingers has put in over the summer. Saturday's game at Hastings and tonight's against Tooting are very tough games and against opposition who both will have the same end of season ambitions as ourselves so we should be in an ideal position to judge how far we have come (or maybe to go!) after tonight.

Because I'm at the club every day I can get a 'feel' for how people see the coming season and it seems to me that everyone is approaching the season with real excitement and enthusiasm with the hope of us doing really well, and that is from everyone, players, staff and supporters alike! I know a lot of supporters were planning on making the trip to Hastings and it may have been a bit of an eye opener for some of our new players when they see and hear our fans, there won't be any other team in the league taking as many away I know!!

Anyway, let's hope we put on a show for you tonight!

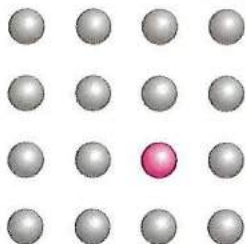

Isthmian High achievers

Lowestoft's double-century achievement of 100 goals (actually 115) and 100 points (actually 101) last season was the tenth such feat in the league's history. Of course, it was not possible in the league's early years, when it was a ten-match programme, and even if you allow three points for a win it was not until the 1963-4 season, when the programme grew from 30 to 38 games, that it could have been done.

The first team to get a theoretical 100 points were Hendon in 1972-3, the first time 42 matches were played. They won 34 games and collected 74 points, which becomes 108 if you allow three for a win. But they scored only 88 goals.

It was the following season that the league adopted three-point wins - and, for the first time, a second division - but it took a while for the first double-century to be achieved. Even the 1977-8 Enfield side, rated by many the greatest Isthmian team of all time, had only 96 goals to go with their 100 points.

There were many near misses but it was 1985-6 before the first team posted three figures in

each column. It was Wycombe Wanderers, who said farewell to the league with 103 goals and 101 points. Among the ten clubs to have done the double, two are now playing in the Football League. In 1990-91 Stevenage scored 122 goals and 107 points in Division Two North.

So is achieving the double a guarantee of future glory? Sadly, not. Of the other seven clubs to have done it before Lowestoft, two - Newbury and Yeading - no longer exist. Two more, Dorking and Chertsey, now play at Step 5, Arlesey at Level 4. Apart from the Trawlerboys, Canvey are the only ones to start this season at Step 3 and even they have had their ups and downs. Their feat, by the way, should be marked with an asterisk, as should Yeading's, because they came in 46-game seasons.

There is one particular oddity among these double centuries. Newbury (115 goals, 103 points) and Chertsey (121, 102) both achieved the feat in 1993-4, and both in Division Two. With third-placed Aldershot collecting 97 points, there is a case for declaring that division the strongest, relative to its level, of all time. Luckily for the Shots, another League-bound team, three clubs won automatic promotion in those days.

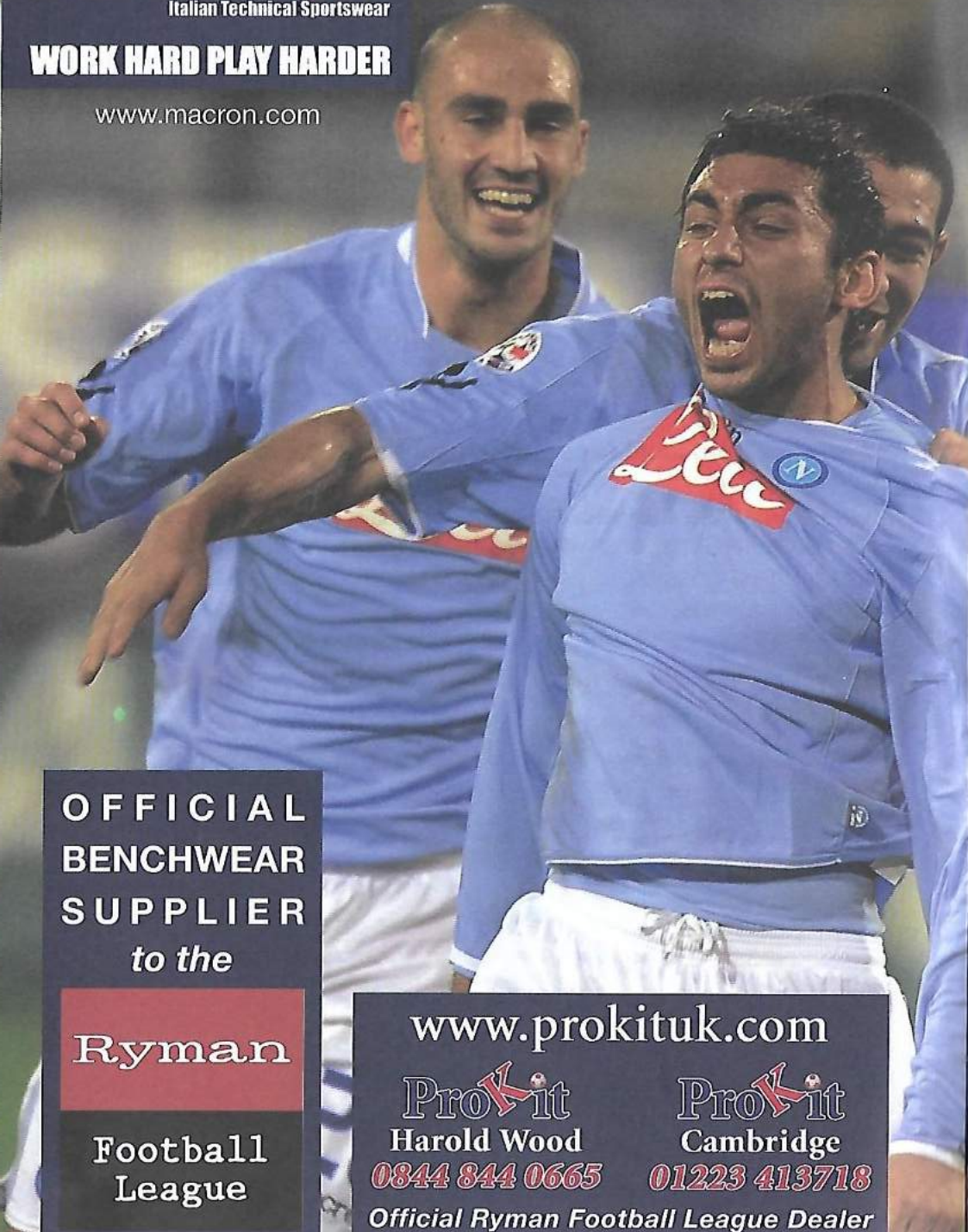

Seven Years Ago
Chesham 1 Wealdstone 3
Ryman League Division One North
Saturday August 23rd 2003

WHAT an afternoon this sun-drenched Saturday was at Chesham's picturesque ground seven years ago!

A devastating display of attacking football blew away the pre-season promotion favourites and provided the first real hint that Gordon Bartlett's Stones were capable of finally climbing out of the Ryman Div One—four years after we had been denied rightful promotion by the league.

Two great strikes from Marvin Morgan and a Richard Jolly special sealed victory while midfielder Tommy Williams seemed to have an extra spring in his step. Possibly something to do with his EastEnders actress girlfriend Michelle Ryan watching the game? Or was she there to ogle the rest of our team? Well, with Robin Tucker and Matt Carvell looking fit, Marv looking lean and mean (well, lean anyway) and Jolls yet to hit his strange peroxide stage, the only surprise was that La Ryan was the only Hollywood-bound beauty to watch the Stones that season.

Yes, this was one afternoon when we didn't fluff our lines. When you look at the attacking talent at our disposal it should have been a great season. Apart from Marv and Jolls, Mickey Swaysland and Ben Alexander were on the bench and a certain J. Beckford was awaiting his big chance in the Reserves. On our day we were brilliant, but Gordon and Leo spent all season trying to coax that genius out of an often underperforming team.

Just seven days before the trip to Chesham we had started the 2003-4 campaign with a 2-1 home defeat by eventual champions Yeading, DJ Campbell playing a starring role and eclipsing our own Jolls who missed a penalty with the scores level at 1-1. All was gloom around the White Lion, especially as a difficult start continued with a midweek trip to Tilbury ('horrible on a Tuesday night) and then Chesham. But we notched a great 2-0 win at the Docks, putting the Stones in a great frame of mind for the trip to face the Generals.

We played with pace, guile and carefree abandon to fully deserve the 3-1 win. Amazing that supporter 'Deadly' Doug Robinson fell sleep midway through the first half, dozing on the grassy terracing and prompting much hilarity from the celebrating Stones fans.. but not much puzzlement from those who had seen him sink a dozen pints of London Pride before the game.

I also missed the game and ended up getting drunk: My cousin Alex was in the final of the BBC's Fame Academy that afternoon and we were invited along for filming at Highgate - she actually won the competition and the celebrating intensified when news of our great win at Chesham filtered through.

WHAT HAPPENED NEXT?

Well, that memorable Saturday all round was a a great portent for the Stones on the road .We managed to win seven out of our

first eight away games, including a sensational 3-0 success at bogey team Thame United. Yet at the same time we failed to win ANY of our first five home games!

The duck was broken as late as October 18 when Great Wakering were spanked 5-0 at Edgware, but as that erratic form evened out we went into the new Year well placed for promotion - especially as, under the reorganisation of the non-League pyramid the following year (with a Conference North & South providing an extra tier) the top six would all find a place in the Ryman Premier, with the 7th-placed sides taking part in a play-off.

That, of course, was how we finally

climbed into the final promotion slot on that night of high drama at Dulwich. But the seeds were definitely sewn that sunny afternoon at Chesham... and then again in the return game at the White Lion when a stuttering March saw the Stones get their act together with a 3-1 win over the in-form Buckinghamshire side.

Les Terrors

Tooting & Mitcham United Football Club was formed on 11 April 1932 when a meeting took place in the Forester Arms pub in Mitcham Road, Tooting. The meeting was between two rivals clubs: Tooting Town - founded in 1887 - and Mitcham Wanderers - founded in 1912. Both played in the The London League and it was obvious to all present that two first class amateur could not exist and thrive side by side, hence the meeting.

And the first chairman of the new club? None other than the landlord of the Forester Arms, Mr John Beard.

After reaching an agreement the clubs were amalgamated with the new club initially being called Tooting & Mitcham FC. A few years later 'United' was added and TMUFC was off and running. The club originally played in white shirts but in the Fifties brought in today's black and white striped kit.

Since then, the Terrors as the club is known, have enjoyed a proud history having reached the FA Cup



proper on ten occasions. Their most famous Cup run arrived in 1959 when the club reached the Third Round. Drawn at home to First Division Nottingham Forest, they took a 2-0 lead at their old Sandy Lane ground before Forest fought back to secure a replay. A crowd of 42,362 saw Forest win the replay and end the Terrors' Fourth Round dreams before the professional outfit went on to lift the Cup that season.

The Terrors most recent Cup run came in the 2009-10 season when they reached the First Round, only to lose 5-0 in front of more than 3,000 fans at Stockport County.

The club have won the Isthmian League twice, in 1958 and 1960, and in May 2008 secured promotion to the Isthmian Premier League with a 1-0 win over Cray Wanderers at their new Imperial Fields ground under the stewardship of manager Billy Smith.

Other honours include the Surrey Senior Cup and the London Senior Cup with both being won in the modern era under Smith in April 2007.

Dario Gradi, who famously spent more than twenty four years as manager of Crewe Alexandra, is one of TMUFC's most famous former players having played for the club in the 1960s. Other big names to have played for the Terrors include the legendary Alex Stepney, Nathan Ellington, Steve Gritt and the Wimbledon's famous keeper Dickie Guy.

TMUFC are now managed by former Millwall and Sheffield United star Mark Beard, who won the FA Trophy in 2007 at the new Wembley with Stevenage Borough, took over from

Smith this May when he and his assistant George Wakeling walked out over alleged budget cuts.

A bright young manager with great coaching experience, 34-year-old Beard hired AFC Wimbledon's all time leading goal scorer Kevin Cooper as his assistant manager, to form a dream team at Imperial Fields.

The pair quickly made their mark, assembling a squad of experienced stars led by former Dartford striker Rob Haworth to help the youngsters coming out of the club's Academy system. TMUFC kicked off their first campaign under the pair on the opening day with a home game with Hendon.

Luke Gerrard, 30, is vastly experienced keeper who joined from Kingstonian in the summer. Missed most of last season through injury but the former Ks skipper is back to his best now and has a point to prove. A great shot stopper, he commands his area well and is noted for his communication skills.

Right-back Mark Waters, 26, joined the Terrors from Walton Casuals where he would have benefited from working with the likes of West Ham legend and Sky pundit Tony Gale. A tough tackler, he has a good engine to get up and down the field. Known as a great crosser of the ball so will make goals.



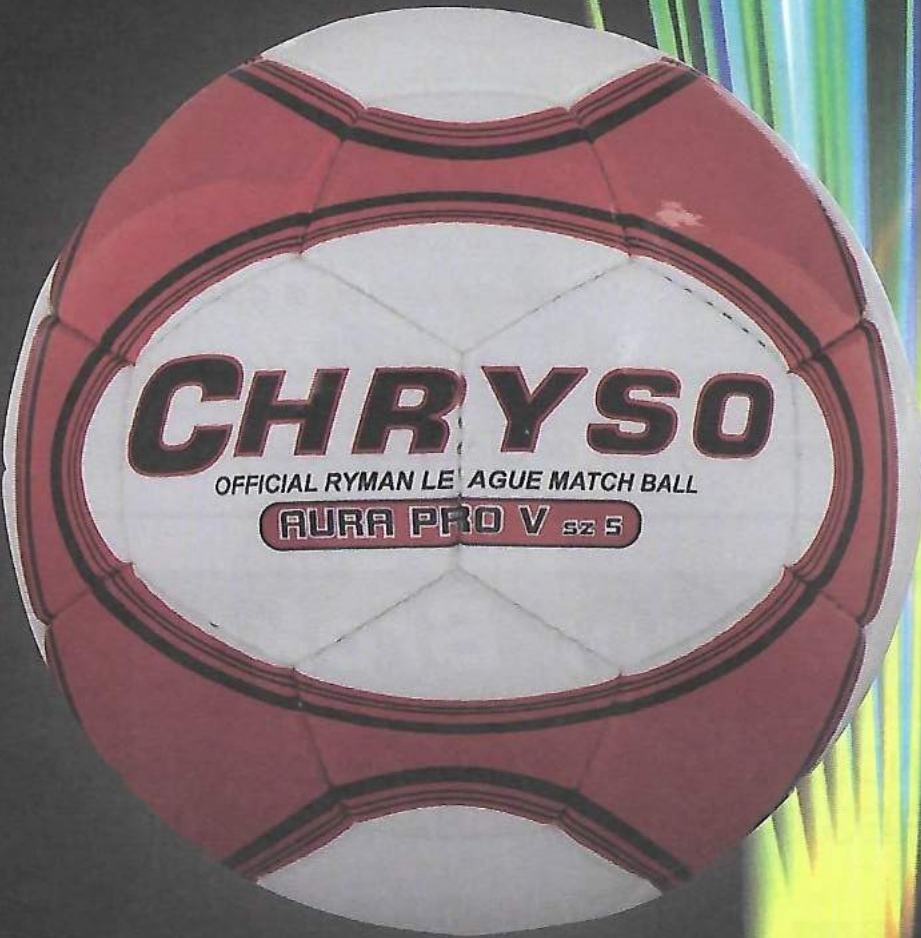

They were

mortals....
So we lost,
big time

England are out - finished, end of story. We did not go out on penalties, nor were we "very unlucky". We were well beaten by a team that were man for man better than us. The Media may cry foul about Lampard's goal, or the fact our pampered players play too much football, but isn't it time we simply faced up to the fact that actually we are not as good as we like to believe?
Football is all about reputation. We qualified from a "tough" group featuring Croatia and Ukraine - both deemed to be "tough" teams to beat. But were they really? Croatia had humbled us in November 2007 to

qualify for the European Championships but 10 months later we humbled them in Zagreb - what changed in the intervening months? Nothing much. When Wigan Athletic beat Chelsea earlier in the season at the DW Stadium did anyone really expect them to beat Chelsea again come the end of the season at Stamford Bridge? Not really, and the result showed us otherwise.
Our whole way of playing, developing, coaching, managing, and reporting on football in England is wrong. We will simply continue to suffer the pain we saw yesterday as each tournament comes around. Why? Because we are an island race and our thinking is so insular.
Who has the best league

in the world? Many will say the Premier League. Sky Sports will ram slo-mo 3D HD clips down our throat until the cows come home but we should be looking to our victors last night for the business model that works for all parties. Fans get to see their teams in stadiums designed with them in mind and prices that would make some Blue Square Conference teams blush, they get to see attacking football played by players who have been given the opportunity to develop through their youth systems. TV games are rigidly structured in advance so that every one knows who is playing when and the media knows when to start and stop building the hype and intruding.
Let's look at this youth issue again. A year ago I sat

in the Swedbank Stadion in Malmo and saw our Under 21 team under Stuart Pearce ripped apart by Germany. The star of the show that night was Mesut Özil. Since then a total of 9 of the German squad have gone on to represent the senior team and 6 of them were included in the squad for the World Cup, and 4 lined up against us last night - Özil, Kehl, Neuer and Boateng. Two goal scorer Muller wasn't even selected for the tournament!

Compare that to England. Only James Milner played a year ago from the team last night. Joe Hart was suspended and out of our squad only Adam Johnson and Gabby Agbonlahor have been included in the senior squad since. Many of the players who today play at Under 21 level in England are simply never given the chance to progress their

career at a club level. The "current" squad includes 4 players from Chelsea, 2 from Arsenal, 2 from Spurs and then the rest from around the leagues. But how much Premier League experience (or European football to say that) will the likes of Jack Cork and Bertrand get at Stamford Bridge or Kyle Walker and Kyle Naughton at Spurs?

I became a realist England fan about 18 months ago. I missed only two away games (excluding the farce in Trinidad & Tobago) in over 5 years and during that period bought my numerous away shirts, was fleeced by my own FA over things such as ticket prices (more expensive to watch a friendly v Slovenia at Wembley than the competitive game against Croatia for instance, or the 300% mark up on the home versus away tickets in Moscow in October 2007)

and even turned out on a number of occasions for the official England Fans Veterans team.

However, I was never your getting pissed in the Irish bar, singing "No Surrender" and actually thinking that our players cared about playing for their country. And I was not alone. Slowly a group of disenfranchised fans started missing games, tired of seeing the same lack of urgency and lethargy from our so called stars, who if they actually felt like it would come over at the end of the game and clap once or twice. Anyone who remembers how the players demanded a coach to take them 200 yards from the hotel to stadium in Minsk so as to avoid the fans, or the incidents after the games in Skopje and Zagreb will know they wanted no part of being in the England show.

So we cannot start to improve our prospects unless we go back to the grass roots. Developing players with the long term in mind. Allowing our home grown talent to actually play at the top level instead of constantly bringing in journeymen from overseas. Thinking about tomorrow instead of today.

But one area that has to take some responsibility for all of the media attention is the media itself. The amount of press that went to South Africa was just embarrassing. All of them are looking for a "story", an

angle that will differentiate themselves from the other hacks. So the more salubrious they can make their copy, the more they can claim it is an exclusive. As soon as the Germans were identified as our opponents you knew full well that the tabloids would start up the Jingoism machine and start pumping out references to Dads Army. Thank God we didn't get to play Argentina in the next round is all I can say as comfort.

But these newspapers are read by the fans who genuinely believe we are the best team in the World. Anyone who saw our performance against USA should have known we were in trouble. Robert Green, interestingly along with David James, is the most educated player in the squad and had the balls to come out immediately after the game and take the blame - a fact that the serious writers in the media have appreciated for years (see Danny Last's excellent interview with Henry Winter about this very subject here) but other players will go out of their way to avoid having to deal with the press.

The world and his wife were sent to South Africa but why? Why did the BBC feel the need to send their sport newreader to South Africa to tell us about Wimbledon? Why did BBC Radio 5 live base themselves out there? Its not like we could actually see them on the radio? And what was the point of Gabby Logan?

Faced with a perfect opportunity to ask Capello some difficult questions after the game on Sunday she simply asked him niceties about the weather and about why Stuart Pearce wasn't wearing the same as him like Joachim Low and his assistant had. The players were equally bored and there was simply no stories to be had. Interestingly enough if you look back to 2006 the criticism of the team was that the WAG's were distracting them. That was not the case it was just that the players were so bored and not allowed to do anything that the only thing of interest was the activities of a group of girls.

Premier League footballers today earn obscene amounts of money for what they do. There is no doubt that there are equally talented players throughout the land who for one reason or another, never get the chance to play at the top level, just like for every Robert De Niro or Al Pacino, there are actors treading the boards in local theatres who simply have not had the "shot at the big time". The players are also so regimented as to what they can and cannot do. They are young men - they want to have a beer and have a laugh not be allowed one half of shandy every other night and a 30 minute slot on the X-Box. What happens when they get together? They can hardly talk about their travels seeing as they all end up in the same

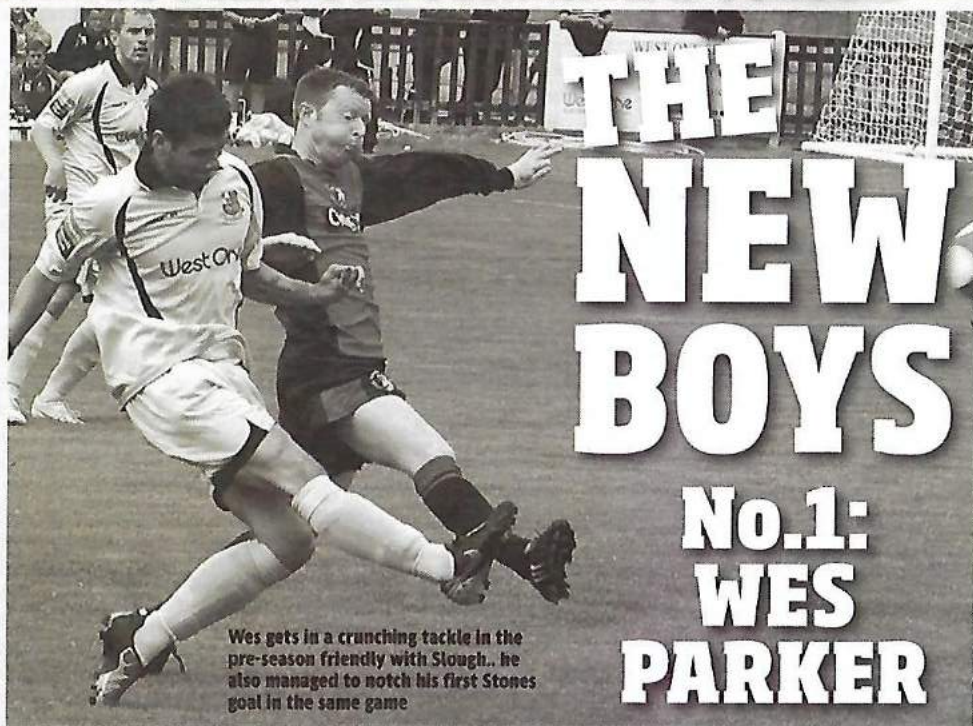
place, or places they have been out, as they aren't allowed such freedom. So does it turn into a pissing competition as to who has the best car, the girlfriend with the best fake tits (John Terry apparently is the best person to ask) or the best salary? I suspect so - and when this happens what effect does it have on your James Milner's or your Glenn Johnson's when he is playing alongside someone who is on twice as much as himself?

The FA took over 40 non-playing members in the squad to South Africa. Surely someone should have been in charge of organising some events to take the mind off the boredom that the squad faced? When the Rugby Union's British and Irish Lions tour the squad appoint a social committee from within their own number who organise all events as well as keeping an eye on everyone for tell tale signs of boredom. If a player is bored off the pitch, he sure will be bored on it too.

So there you have it....We are a nation cheated if you believe the press. But are we really? Or do we live in a false world where we hype our players up as God's and then smash them down when they appear to be mortal. We all have to take some responsibility for this - the press, the fans, the management and of course the players. So let's just move on shall we and learn our lesson and keep our traps shut in four years time

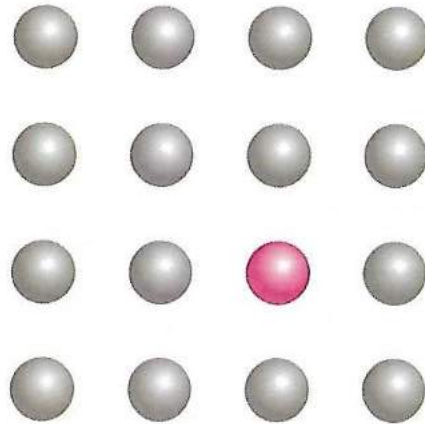

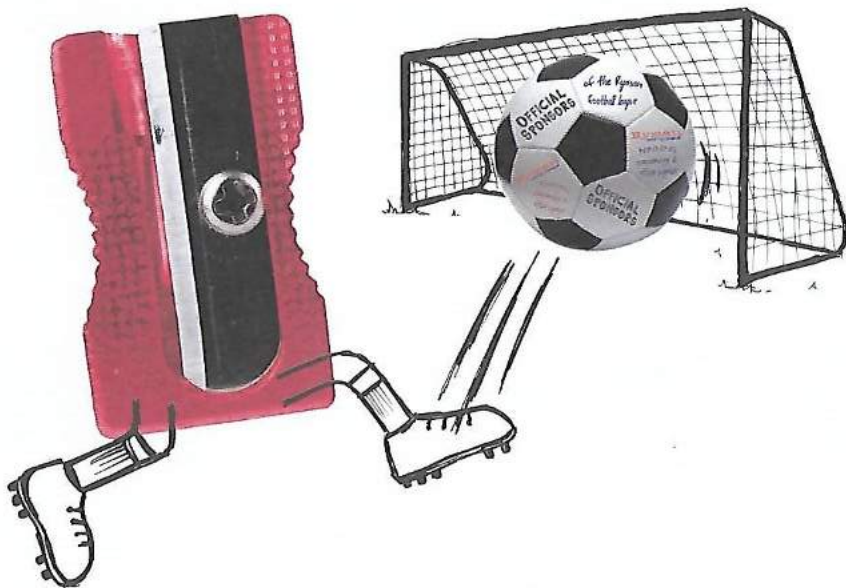

How much Stones Manager Gordon Bartlett learnt from this hard fought friendly match is uncertain but with the news that a further two players have been signed the eventual starting eleven for the big kick off in two weeks time may be becoming a little clearer.

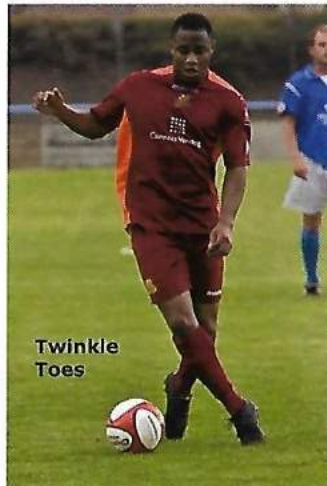

A crowd of 483 turned up at Dartford's Princes Park to see whether last season's champions, preparing for life in Conference South, could bid farewell with a trophy.

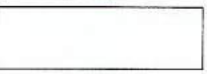
