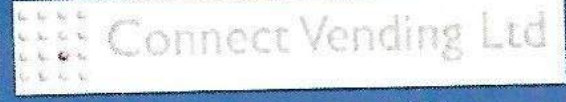

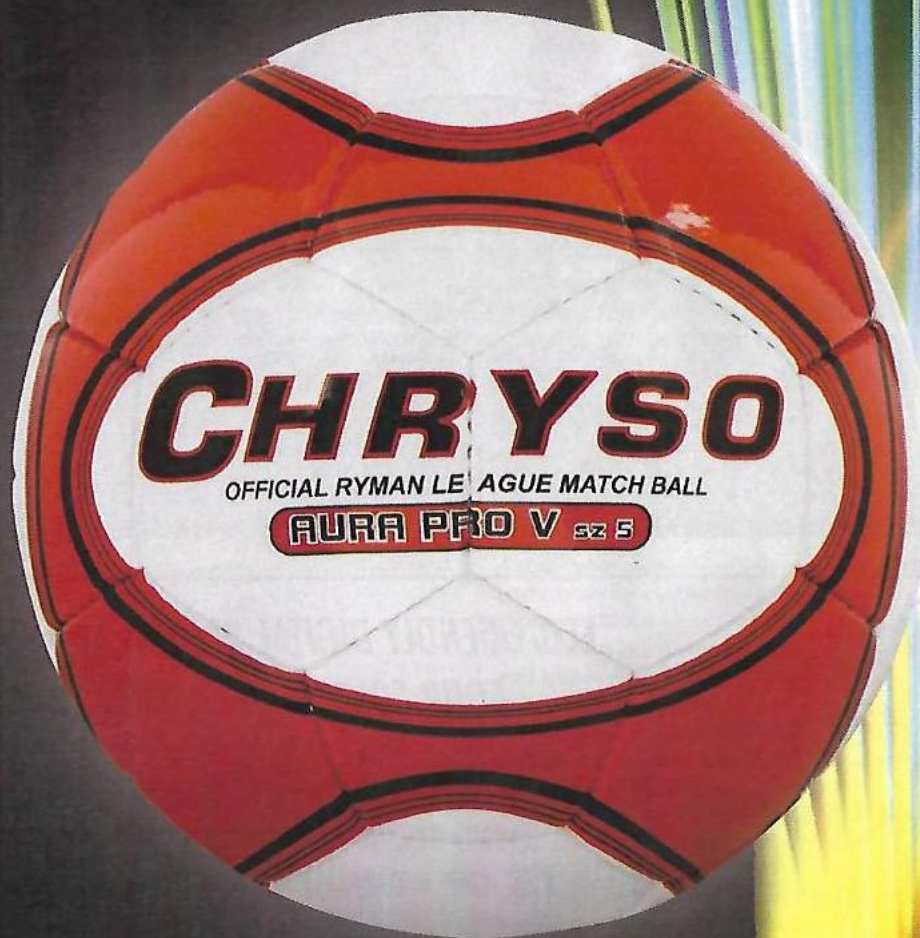

Dont leave it to somebody else

Good evening and welcome to tonight's Ryman League play-off semi-final against Concord who return to us less than a month after our dramatic come back in the closing minutes of our recent league encounter. Down to 10 men midway through the first half, Concord lived up to their growing reputation of being a fit strong side with a tremendous spirit and togetherness in their camp. Quite simply they were better than us, but as we all know, football matches are not always won by the best team over 90 minutes. Somehow we managed to conjure up two very late goals from Esmond James and Tom Pett to 'nick' all 3 points.

I would like to extend a warm welcome to Danny, Glen, the players and officials from Concord who must be delighted with their achievements so far this season. I have a lot of respect for both Danny and Glen for their hard work and their coaching ability which has already been rewarded by reaching the semi-final of the Essex Senior Cup, winning the Ryman League Cup with an excellent win against recently promoted and highly talented Dulwich Hamlet side and now reaching the play-offs in only their 3rd season in the Ryman Premier.

Not only have they developed into a very successful outfit, but they have been very clever in the way they have portrayed themselves.

Danny fully admits he has tried to create this image as they don't get a great following and he works hard at developing that team bond with an 'us against the world' mentality. Those words are often heard booming from the dugout along with the encouragement and cajoling of his players and reminding the opposition to 'witness their fitness'. I recently watched them at Kingstonian and even the small group of fans have bought into the image by singing 'we are just a pub team from Canvey'. It reminded me of our FA Trophy run last year where the Cambridge United fans labelled us a 'Tinpot' club prior to the Quarter Final tie. We used it to our advantage. It helped galvanise everyone together and we promptly won it! With both teams riding high and vying for promotion, it was understandable tensions were running high at the time of Concord's last visit here. With so much at stake, sometimes emotions get the better of us whether it's on the terraces, in the dugout or even on the pitch. We all have a duty to behave in the right manner and I think a few people have admitted that maybe they stepped over the line that night. I am sure everyone will show a little more respect and discipline this evening.

With so much going on in those

last few minutes it came as a bit of a surprise when the referee told me after the game that he had sent their skipper Nicky Cowley off for an incident involving myself. It was my first experience of such an incident in my long managerial career and immediately told the referee that he was mistaken. No doubt Nicky was angry and upset but I categorically denied he tried to head butt me. He wouldn't do that to an old fella like me!!! No seriously, I spoke to both Nicky and Danny afterwards and promised I would write to the FA to try to overturn his dismissal. My philosophy is to try to show everyone respect and treat other people the way I would expect to be treated. I'm pleased to say justice was done and the case was dropped, but ironically, Nicky is suspended for tonight's game after reaching 10 bookings. Fortunately, we decided to leave Sean out against Cray when he was on 9 bookings otherwise we may have been in the same boat.

I am proud and been delighted with the attitude of our players especially after our defeat at Hampton recently. With Margate in particular and so many teams faltering towards the business end of the season, our response to that result has been outstand-



ing. Three clean sheets, seven points and so nearly sneaking that second spot. We have made changes to the shape of the side on numerous occasions recently and this has proved the adaptability and strength within our current squad. We have switched from 4-4-2, 4-5-1, 3-5-2 and 4-3-3 and the transition from one to another has been fluid and given us a lot of options as we head into the play-offs.

After 42 games we have managed to finish one place higher than last season, we have conceded less goals (less than a goal a game for the second season running), won more matches and finished top of the 'home' league record. A home semi-final was important so now let's go and finish the job!

I am writing these notes after our successful awards night at the club on Saturday and just wanted to add my personal congratulations to all the prize winners, especially Sean Cronin who walked off with both the Players Player and the Supporters Player of the Year awards. Well done mate.

As this is probably my last notes of the season I would just like to say a brief thank you to many people, without whom we would struggle to run at all, let alone so efficiently. I must start with the management team of Leo, Gilly, Micky and Jason for their tireless support and hard work throughout this season. Our

physio team of Gary, James, Chris and Sam. Reserve team coaches John and Murph, our successful youth set up with Stanmore College where James has done so well and not forgetting Wayne has had such a tremendous year with the ladies team. Pauline and Graham Smith for their work in the little boardroom and looking after the mascots, along with Alison, Paul, Henry and Pauline in the main boardroom. To Jez and the supporters club for their financial backing and general support. Mark for his fantastic production on our match day programme. Steve Wicks, Don Cross and our match day stewards, the tea bar staff, the club shop, cleaners, the clubhouse staff and everyone else who have given this club it's heartbeat back here at the Vale. To the board for their backing and support and of course you fans who have been outstanding once again this season. Crowds of 800 in our last two home games is testament to how far we have come in recent years and every one of you deserve a 'pat on the back' for your individual efforts to bring this club back to the brink of success. Even the Wealdstone Raider is doing his bit to get the club noticed. Thank you all.

Tony 'Kitman' must get a special thank you. His banter and abuse around the dressing room will be sadly missed and I'm sure we all

My last thank you is to 'Jolls'. How will we be able to replace him? 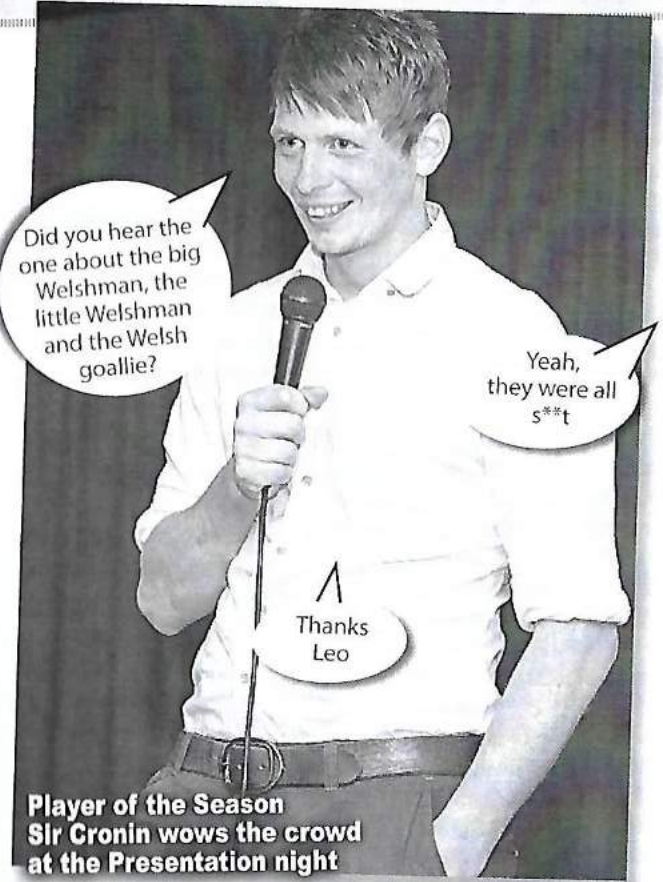
We obviously finished the campaign with a routine win against Canvey who in all honesty had a good go first half but soon threw in the towel when Jolls fired in from two yards!

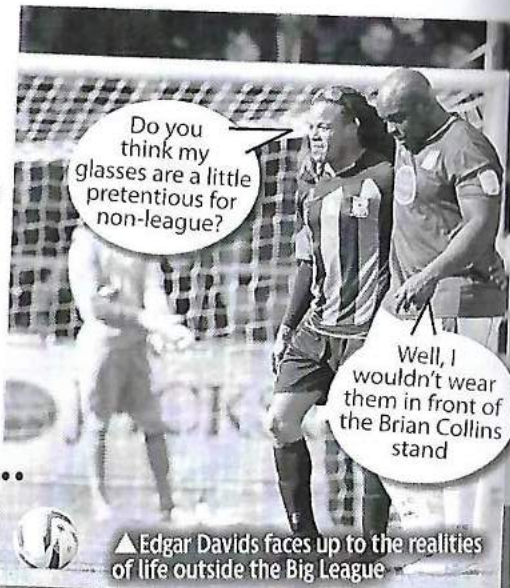

Ninety minutes into that first game, those hopes and dreams have either taken on the mythical proportions of legend, or they lay, alongside the tears of the faithful, slowly seeping into the gutter.

A similar start to the 'real' football of the season splits the fans into two distinct camps, the pessimist who sees only the slowly and not so slowly sinking ship, where even an away win at the league leaders is just papering over the cracks of a tumultuous demise and the lesser spotted optimist; "There's still time" their battle cry...The Transfer Deadline. For those it affects, seemingly offering some

salvation and an almost cast iron guarantee that after a rough start, a couple of new faces can come in and still have the time to turn the dirge into success.

By October, the season's mold will in many cases have been cast. Dreams and aspirations are replaced by reality. A few beers with your mates rather than the five hour round trip in the rain becomes the choice of the aptly named fair weather supporter though the truly hardy long terms fans may combine both (many a good awayday spoilt by the football!), even at this early stage trying to pinpoint where for the vast majority of clubs, it all went wrong. Even those that profess

their honest opinion that survival is their aim for the forthcoming year surely must have aspirations above that lowly plateau? What is the point of existence if the peak is aiming for eighteenth? Do you remember who was eighteenth in the last Grand National?

The early winter for the unfortunates is often spent considering who the next Manager will be, quickly followed by the bar-room opinions of how good or bad he is and if he is or isn't the right choice. For some, it actually makes no difference as despite another potential trading blitz in January, most of what is either available

of can be afforded is of similar or lesser quality than that which is incumbent – and he'll need to move a few of those on to reduce the wage bill. Supporters now enter the hopeful phase; They'll see names and hear rumours of the next transaction that will turn their winter of discontent into spring smiles and a swift climb up the table – safe in the knowledge that there's always one dark horse that makes a late run.

That probably means that for every one, there are a dozen that stumble on regardless, their season turning more miserable with every goal conceded, each ricocheting like a bullet in a tin can around the net, making sure that everyone in the ground is fully aware of impending doom.

By March, as if to put a brave face on the likely fate, thoughts turn to the next season and how the youngsters will come through and how it'll be so much better as these lads will all have a year of experience, we'll have better luck and less injuries and we're still better than whoever. It's almost the same at every level, for every club. The lucky few pick up a medal, others enter the shotgun lottery that is the sudden death play-offs (where the high increases in intensity – a whole season's passion compressed into one or two

games) whilst the low of defeat seems less intense, somehow softened by the "at least we got to the play-offs" and for some "its probably more than we should have expected" spoken quietly among groups of friends at the post-mortem.

There remain however two positions that no club would really want to fill.

The two that fall from the Football League to the oblivion in which the vast majority of us - the underclass apparently - survive year on year – Non League. It's stigma that (apparently) strikes fear into the hearts of many – even many of those who follow the clubs that have previously filled one of the inglorious positions at the bottom of Division 2 (4) - those whose fans over following years that will still consider themselves a league club (and just visiting). Well, welcome to reality.

This season the top seven positions in the Football Conference were filled by former

League clubs and there were six more lower down the table, two even managing to be relegated. Only two of those thirteen will this season attain the level their fans believe they deserve – those that remain, that is. The longest serving 'ex-league club' is Glossop North End, relegated from the Football League ninety nine years ago, never since to return and now at level 9 – The North West Counties League. The club has far outlived the thought that perhaps they were too good for their level. The disappointment long past, now with fans that just like the rest of us hope and wish and pray in equal measure for the delights that the end of this season or the start of the next will bring.

Spare a thought, then for Barnet, the latest member of the too good to go down club, about to embark on a non-league future, in a new Borough (ours) in a new ground (ours). I wonder what the odds are that in the not too distant future they'll be in another Division (ours). We must remember to wave when they go by....

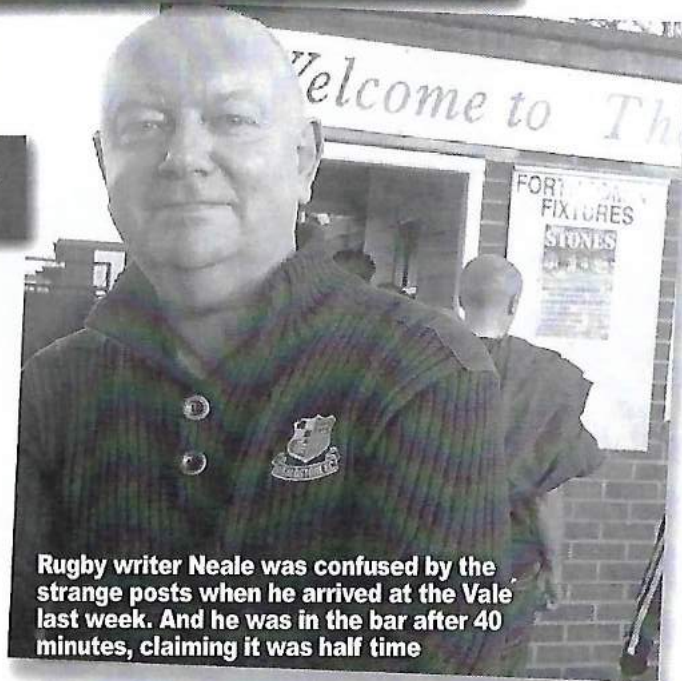

2002 World Cup (sensational crowds, 'Beanie' will say the same); Mexico 4 Brazil 3 in the 2000 Confed Cup final, at the Aztec again; and best of all, Boca Juniors 3 Cucuta 0 in a Libertadores Cup semi-final

about five years ago. Boca has the finest atmosphere of in any ground in the world, but take a tin hat with you! I also saw El Salvador beat Mexico 2-1 in a World Cup tie in 2009 and that was pretty wild, too!

And most memorable Wealdstone game?
 Gloucester away in the 81-82 Southern League cup final (Was right behind that wonderful Stuart Pearce volley); plus Enfield away in the Trophy semi

in 84/85 was simply outstanding; plus beating Braintree 6-0 in front of a fired-up 'Kennel' at Edgware in 96/97; oh, and the Rotherham FA Cup tie a couple of years ago. I missed most of last season's Trophy run but I'd say the game at Newport was pretty memorable, just because we were there.

What really gets your goat watching football?

Watching so much top level rugby you get to realise what a bunch of tarts some pro footballers really are... so footballers feigning injury, diving and rolling around are high on my list. Not too keen on all-seater stadia either. I know about Hillsborough but if the Germans can handle safe-standing, so can we.

The cynic in me says the clubs simply don't want it because they'd have to reduce their prices. That's another thing... the price of pro football. Ridiculous! And Sky... you'd think football never existed before 1992!

Have you ever played the game yourself, and memorable moments?

Had trials with Stoke City and Wrexham but wasn't good enough. After I moved to London in 1980, I started playing for the railway football team at Euston (where I met 'Hughie' Marshall, who introduced me to Wealdstone. Damn you, Marshall!), then joined SFC Wealdstone where I was part of a formidable strike duo with one Tim Parks.

Any suggestions to

improve your Stones - watching experience at the Vale?

Two covered ends is a must. If the lease on the ground gets extended, a fund should be set up to make that a priority. We need a new Elmslie End... preferably two!
Favourite Wealdstone line-up? Christ, now you're asking! I'm going to cop out on that because I simply haven't seen enough of the team over the last 10 years to make a reasoned judgment. I don't think you can look past the double-winning team, though, with Stuart Pearce, Steve Brown and Simon Garner thrown in. Richard Jolly would have a shout, too.

Favourite Stones strip?

I'm a staunch blue and white quarters man.

Best non-League ground you've visited?

Back in the day, you'd say Altrincham was a fine ground, but it looks very old and tired now. Scarborough was good, too, and Boston United. I'd have to say Rushden & Diamonds, though, we played there shortly after it was built and it's very good. Shame they went bust!

Best stadium you've EVER visited?

Easy: 'La Bonbonera' in Buenos Aires, home of Boca Juniors. Just shades the Aztec.

What are your expectations for the Stones for this season?

Not given me much scope there, have you! If we win tonight, I'd like to think

How does the current programme compare with others you see/ been involved with? Different class. Production quality just goes up and up and the content is always improving.
What has been the most readable/least readable Fan in the Stand so far? 'Hughie' Marshall... the man's just sheer class!

What do you think of the bars and catering at The Vale?

Getting better, but if you want to see one of the best tea bar/ dining arrangements for a club of similar size, go to Bedford Rugby Club.

There they do sit down meals with waiter/ess service for £5! A lot of semi-pro rugby clubs do meals - nothing special, just basic things like pie and chips etc - and I've always wondered why non-league football clubs don't do it.

Have you visited the clubshop?

Yes. Costs me a fortune!

Finally, where do you see the club in five years time?

Ah, the age old question! I'd like to think we could get to the next level and hold our own. Anything beyond that is down to ground, money and ambition. But I'd love to see Gordon Bartlett managing us in the Conference Premier... he deserves that chance!

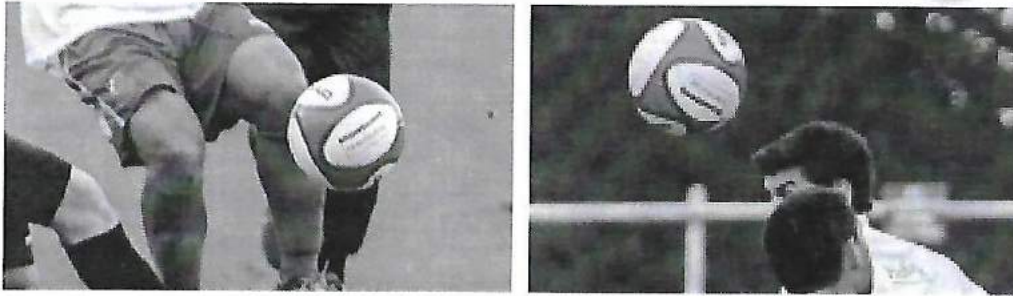

Lowestoft in the week; Wes Parker and Tom Pett were both missing through injury, so in came Darren Locke and Richard Jolly, with the latter partnering Chris Moore up front as Manager Gordon Bartlett reverted back to a more familiar 4-4-2 formation. It was the visitors who

had the first chance of the afternoon with just three minutes on the clock when big defender Cliff Akurang saw his acrobatic overhead

kick sail just wide of the post. At the other end Moore tried his luck hitting an effort from the edge of the box following a neat lay-off from Jolly which was straight down the throat of former Wealdstone 'keeper Ashlee Jones. Stones were then dealt a blow on nine minutes



when a late challenge from Tommy Kavanagh on Scott McCubbin resulted in the Wealdstone man having to withdraw with what was later confirmed as ankle ligament damage. The home side were now starting to have the better of the play, Alex Dyer picking out Moore in the box who fired just wide.

Moore was proving to be a real handful for Canvey, and he had another effort eight minutes later; turning

smartly on the edge of the box before unleashing an effort which was well saved by Jones. The Gulls had their first effort on target nine minutes before the break when Kavanagh tried his luck with a vicious effort from 25 yards which was beaten away by Rikki Banks.

Stones looked to take advantage of a strong wind behind them in the second half, and they almost took the lead just two minutes after the restart when Lee Chappell got down the left before firing over a cross to the far post where Elliot Godfrey was just



unable to make enough contact to turn the ball home. Wealdstone struck on 50 minutes. Godfrey swung over a corner which was flicked on by Peter Dean to the waiting Jolly who made no mistake as he turned the ball home from close range in what was a trademark effort from the veteran striker. Jolly came close to adding a second on 67 minutes when Dyer's mishit shot found its way into the path of the Wealdstone number 10, however he could only fire wide from an acute angle. The second arrived two minutes

later; Jolly again demonstrating the intelligence and awareness which has made him one of the top non-league strikers over the years as he chased down a short back-header from Richard Orlu before finishing smartly first time past the onrushing Jones. Overall a comfortable afternoon for Wealdstone against a Canvey side with nothing to play for, although they did have a chance to make for an interesting finish in the final minute when the ball dropped to Bradley Woods-Garness, but he could only fire wide.

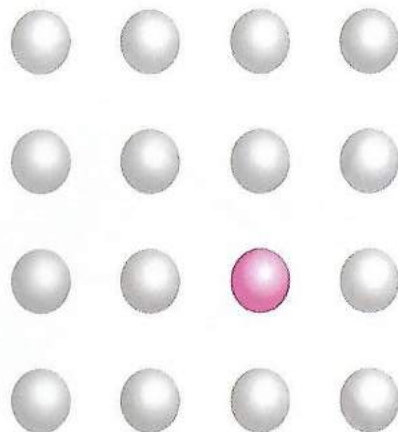

Something had to give in this Middlesex Cup semi-final as two unbeaten sides met for the chance of appearing in the final. However it was a very strong Enfield side that took the spoils in a thrilling 3-1 victory over Wealdstone at Grosvenor Vale.

Stones will feel a little disappointed that they didn't give Enfield more of run for their money, but can take some comfort in the thought they gave the strongest side they have played in recent times a few scares, and will learn from the experience.

It only took Enfield 10 minutes to open the scoring. A driven corner was met at close range and hammered home giving the Stones keeper no chance. Enfield with their tails up were pushing for a second, but the Wealdstone defence stayed resolute to keep the side in the competition. After a jittery 25 minutes Stones started to get a foothold in the game with both Lauren Simmons and Danielle Forde getting some joy down the right flank making Enfield creak under pressure.

However, just as Stones looked as if they were going to pull a goal back, they were hit with a sucker punch just before the end of the half. A speculative punt from 30 yards up caught keeper Robyn Tillyer in no mans' land as it bounced over her before nestling in the back of the net. It was a cruel blow for Wealdstone that knocked the stuffing out of them just when they were in the ascendancy.

A shuffle of personnel at half time saw Wealdstone come out with a much more attacking formation, looking to take the game to Enfield. With a cavalier attacking shape there were spaces at the back for Enfield to exploit and they nearly did so early in the second period. Three times Tillyer was called upon to make important close range saves to keep Stones in the game. Slowly Wealdstone were beginning to make inroads at the other end, but often found them stopped dead by the very impressive Enfield defensive unit. Stones came close on several occasions, but the turning point was after 75 minutes when a lobbed ball from Nicola Dixon looped over the visiting keeper only to bounce off the top of the crossbar. It was a moment that summed up Stones luck on the day.

Only a few minutes later with Stones desperately throwing caution to the wind trying to get the breakthrough to get them

Saturday May 1st 1982, Southern League Division One South: Wealdstone 3 Ashford Town 0

THIS was a special, special afternoon for Stones fans both young and old... for it was the first time since 1955 that we had won a league Championship on our own soil, and remarkably that is still the case today!

Our subsequent title wins - the 1985 Conference (won 1-0 at Kettering) and the 1977 Ryman Div

Three (won 3-1 at Northwood) - and the 1974 Southern League Div One title clinched at Gravesend - were glorious afternoons, but it's not quite the same as winning a pot on your own ground.

Those with long memories will recall that the real turning point came just two days before the visit of Ashford. Hastings United had matched us stride for stride at the top of the SL South table, and when the two sides finally met at Lower Mead that Thursday night it

was a fantastic game in front of a near-2,000 crowd, settled by two late goals from Alan Cordice who devastated the Sussex side 2-0.

And so we needed just a point from the penultimate game of the season to officially win the league... and the single promotion spot back to the Conference. Mid-table Ashford provided sterner than expected resistance, but Ray Knowles, Paul Bowgett from the spot and the uber-popular Roy Davies sealed a wonderful day.

Celebration as champagne Stones win promotion

Wealdstone 3, Ashford 0

WITH one foot already in the Alliance Premier League thanks to Thursday's great winner chief Southern League rivals Hastings, Wealdstone crossed the border back to non-league soccer's elite and clinched the South Eastern championship against Ashford on Saturday.

It was a day of celebration for supporters and players like us 'Stones, needing just one point to secure the title, tore down their Kent visitors after encountering stubborn early resistance in a game affected by the strong wind.

There were no surprises beforehand as manager Allen Burford stayed with the same twelve who did him so good against Hastings two days earlier, Gary Birchouse on the substitutes bench with Neil Cordice ill not ready to play.

Ashford's goal looked to have divine protection for almost the match as a combination of hard-to-believe misses and and covering from an oft-packed visiting defence saw a pointless first half.

When Roy Davies shipped in a fine cross from the left after minutes skipper Paul Bowgett stooped to send a scorching header that had goal written all over it until powered away by Ian O'Neil, entrenched on his own goal line.

Anguish

Other 'Stones first half raids proved similarly fruitless but no less easy to excuse.

Another Davies cross found the on-rushing Alan Cordice yards the far post, but his final effort went tamely into the net of keeper Carmen. Then when Davies muffed a cross into the side netting the anguish showed on the faces of Birwright, Cordice and Knowles — all waiting in the centre.

But Ashford's biggest let off was still to come as 10 minutes in the interval, a deft touch from Cordice sent Davies flying clear on a diagonal path to the near post. However,

with just the advancing Carmen to beat Davies, perhaps trying to squeeze the ball between keeper and post, sent a wild shot spiralling over the Elmshie Stand.

After being helped somewhat by the breeze in the first half, Ashford began to show signs of cracking after the break and when Carmen let a harmless looking ball slip through his hands in the 64th minute he sowed the seeds for the goal which was to set 'Stones on a championship-winning path.

As Roy Davies' very deep corner came across, out of reach of the waiting attack, it looked as if Ashford were going to get away with it again, but Ray Knowles had spotted the gap and he sent a high floating ball into the roof of the net over the despairing defence from 20 yards.

Conjured

Ashford fell away after that. Three minutes after the goal Alan Cordice streaked goalwards and, just to keep on a par with most other Southern League defenders this season, Ashford's Hogben brought him down as he raced into the area.

Penalty ace Paul Bowgett blasted the spot kick high into the left hand corner, only for Essex referee Henley to order it to be retaken, presumably for encroachment.

Unruffled as ever, Bowgett this time sent the ball low and to the right, but with exactly the same effect for his 27th goal of the season.

Not to be outdone by his defence, keeper Carmen rushed out in the next minute to take his turn at bringing down the feet-footed Cordice. No penalty this time though — just a booking.

With the game as any sort of contest over, it only remained to be seen if 'Stones could put the icing on the championship cake by scoring 100 league goals in a season — Howgett's penalty being the 99th of the campaign.

The answer came via Roy Davies, who atoned for that earlier miss when conjuring up an extra magic moment in the dying minutes, sending a cross from the left that the hapless Carmen could only help into the roof of the net.

All that remained as the final whistle went was for 'Stones ever faithful band of supporters to cheer the players back to the dressing room; but, crowd pleasers to the end, they returned for one last bow, and so too match shirts to the frenetic supporters — mementoes of a triumphant season.

Meet the Beach Boys

Concord Rangers originated from a team of boys headed by Steve Lant. They played friendly matches during 1966 on a pitch along the Canvey Island seafront close to the Concord Beach hence the name Concord Rangers and the nickname The Beach Boys.

1967 – Albert Lant, Steve's father and current Club President became the team manager and took the club into competitive football. The Club joined the Thundermite Boys Football League.

1973 – Concord joined the Vange and District League and during this period they won several league and cup honours.

1979 – Concord became the first winners of the Essex Sunday Junior Trophy managed by current Secretary Chris Crierie, with a 4 – 0 win over Bishops Park from Brentwood, the final being played at Tiptree FC.

Saturday football was introduced to the club when Concord joined the Mid Essex League and played their home games at Waterside Farm on Canvey Island.

1985 – Concord secured some land at Thames Road, Canvey Island, the club developed the clubhouse and ground with Jack Smith, current treasurer being the mastermind behind the project, he

organised the funds, labour and materials and worked many hours himself on the site. A special mention goes to the late Clive Smith (Jack's brother) without Clive's machinery and labour Concord's pitch would not exist also Martin Gill, Steve Barnes, Brian Godfrey, Lee and John Slater, Rob Fletcher (Electrics) all contributed.

1988-1989 Concord joined the Essex Intermediate League and was Divisional League and Cup Winners.

for two years. Antony Smith is the current Chairman and is very hands-on in his approach, under Antony's guidance the Club has seen fantastic progress these past few seasons both on the playing side and also on the development of the ground.

2007-08 Concord Rangers 40th Anniversary season
Danny Scopes and Danny Cowley become joint managers and managed the team in this important year for the Club and they had a magnificent year, Concord ended the season winners of the Essex Senior

League. Gordon Brasted Memorial Trophy winners and were Essex Senior League Cup Finalists. Concord also reached the Qtr-final of the FA Vase this season before losing 1 – 0 to Lowestoft Town who went on to reach the final which was played at Wembley Stadium.

Concord's Danny Heale won the Don Douglas Trophy for the second time as the Leagues top marksman scoring a magnificent 46 goals and setting an Essex Senior League record.

Club President, Albert Lant won an outstanding achievement award from the Essex County Football Association for 40 years unbroken service to Concord Rangers.

2008-09 Having gained promotion from the Essex Senior League we would have been happy with a mid table position at the end of our first season in

the Ryman League Div 1 Nth. The Management team of Danny Scopes and Danny Cowley managed to get the best out of our players and we achieved a Play-off position having finished 5th. We then went on to beat East Thurrock Utd, who had finished in 2nd spot 1-0 in the Play - off semi-final, Danny Heale scored a magnificent goal to put us through to the final and play Waltham Abbey. Concord was only 10 minutes away from playing in the Ryman Premier League this season having gone one up through Fabien Batchelor but Waltham Abbey's Harry Elmes scored in the 80th minute to take the game to penalties which we finally lost out 5 – 4.

Took the helm at the start of the 2007/08 season alongside joint-manager Danny Scopes and hit the ground running with a league and cup double; taking the club to within 2 games of the FA Vase final at Wembley. After suffering the heartache of a play-off final defeat on penalties to Waltham Abbey in the club's first season in the Ryman Div 1 North, as well as suffering a narrow defeat to Blue Square South outfit Chelmsford City in the club's first ever Essex Senior Cup final appearance - the duo got their 2nd promotion in 3 seasons at the 2nd attempt, rounding off with a play-off final win over Enfield Town in the 2009/10 season. A superb first season in the Ryman Premier saw the 'Two Danny's take the club to within 2 points of the play-offs over the course of 2010/11. After a disastrous start to the 2011/12 campaign, through sheer determination; they managed to pull the side back to a respectable 14th placed finish. This season will be Danny's first in sole charge of the team, and following some impressive close-season signings; will be looking to build on platform that has been set.

Nicky Cowley – Player/Coach

Having been with The Beachboys since early 2008, Nicky's high-energy performances and never-say-die attitude from central midfield embody the spirit of the club, and his contribution to the club's progress from the Essex Senior League to Ryman Premier has been incredible.

A tough tackler who has also chipped in with his fair share of goals over recent seasons. Appointed as player/coach at the start of this season, Nicky's experience will add an extra dimension to the management team, and he will be keen to pass on his knowledge to some of the younger players in the squad.

Luke Chambers – Goalkeeper:

Recent loan signing from Southend United, played for Wales at Under 16 Schoolboy level in the Victory Shield then progressed and played at Under 19 International level. Started his professional career with Arsenal and once released was snapped up by Southend United.

John Easterford - Defender

An old fashioned; no-nonsense centre back, John was part of Concord's Essex Senior League double winning side in 2007/08; after winning the treble with Brentwood Town the previous season. Leon Gordon – Midfield

Age 28; Signed from Canvey Island FC in January 2013. Leon came through Canvey's Youth and Reserves, Leon made his debut for Canvey in November 2004 and then made over 250

appearances and scored 47 goals. Leon joined Concord in January 2013 and came off the bench to make his debut in the 4 – 0 win over Bury Town.

Danny Glozier - Defender

A confident full back, with a sweet left foot, Danny is a penalty specialist who is adept in both attack and defence. Dominant centre-back who has become integral to The Beachboys impressive progress since signing initially on-loan from Welling United in late 2009. Talented winger who numbers among his former clubs. A new signing, who has played under Beachboys assistant-manager Glen Alzapiedi before. Will add some much needed quality to the right hand-side, and scored a superb solo goal against Southend United in pre-season to mark his arrival in some style.

James White – Midfielder

23 year old imposing central midfielder. Debuted in the Ryman 1 for Great Wakering at 16 years of age, going on to join Dartford FC, where he had an impressive spell – before joining Thurrock FC last year; where he spent most of his time turning in impressive performances at centre-back. Aerially dominant, and a great passer of the ball, James is a superb capture for the club.

Had an impressive loan spell

James Elmes – Midfielder

A cultured central midfielder, James joined Concord at the start of the 2010/11 season from Waltham Abbey, where he scored some impressive goals despite Abbey's relegation following a play-off win the previous season against, ironically, Concord Rangers. Spent time with Arsenal and Barnet as a youngster and possesses solid technical ability with a good range of passing, contributing numerous goals and assists over the past two seasons, notably a 25-yard strike in a derby win over Canvey Island at Park Lane.

Tony Stokes – Forward (C)

Free-scoring midfielder turned forward, who joined his local club at the start of the 2010/11 season. A graduate of West Ham United's academy, Tony also spent time in Hungary with Ujpest FC, where he played in the Europa League. Returned to England in 2010 and was offered the chance to renew his love for the game with The Beachboys, an opportunity he took with both hands. Had Football League scouts flocking to The Aspect Arena during the 2010/11 campaign with 25 goals in all competitions, and follow-

ing Hartlepool FC renege on their offer of a trial, agreed terms to stay with Concord and turned in another goal-laden season despite missing the first 8 weeks through injury.

Jason Hallett – Forward

A powerful striker who joins from local rivals Canvey Island FC after scoring 15 goals last season. Made a big impression at Canvey during their debut season in the Conference National, scoring 8 times, and had a spell with Chelmsford City before returning to Park Lane. Will give some real competition to Harry and Tony, and has turned in some impressive performances in pre-season so far.

Adetayo Osifuwa – Midfield

Joined Concord in August this year, Ade is comfortable on the ball and has blistering pace. Previous Clubs include, Arsenal. Southend Utd, whilst at Southend Utd Ade played for their Under 18's when he was only 15 years of age.

Matty Fry – Defender

Age 22: Joined Concord in December 2012 and made his debut when coming off the subs bench in the 4 – 0 win away against Bury Town. Matty signed for West Ham and was captain of their Youth team in the 2008/09 season, he also played ten times for West Ham reserves in that season. 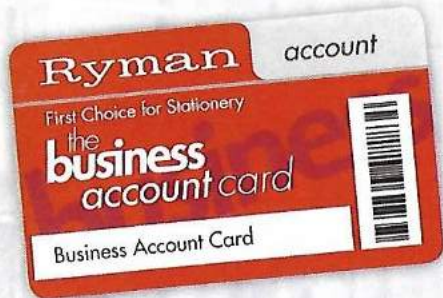

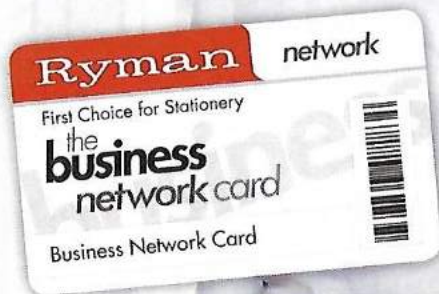

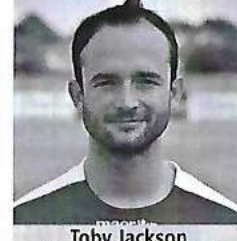
