



For sure it's never dull at Wealdstone! You'll be aware and will hopefully have seen by now the new Buller Stand. What a fantastic effort by so many people; whether in terms of financial contribution or the hours given in both the construction of the stand and also the many other important jobs that have happened over the course of the summer.

My last set of notes were prior to our play off heartache against Concord, which was soon followed by a meeting with the Chairman where he informed me of bad news on the budget and then six of the squad departed and all this by the end of May!

Things soon change in football and by the time we reported back with lots of new faces at the beginning of July, there was a real positivity around the place. There was an excellent attitude towards training, they worked hard and a good spirit quickly developed in the camp. With so many departures it will obviously take time for the lads to settle and blend together and there will be new dynamics developing within the group.

I would like to welcome new signings Jerome, Jey, Adam, Jack, Lewis and hope they have a long a successful stay with us. In addition, I am pleased to with the development of Reece, Ayo and Orlando who have all signed after impression in the Youth team last season. At the time of writing we are hoping that Luis, Glen and Josh will also put pen to paper after the AFC Hayes friendly on Wednesday.

Hardly surprisingly, we have seen mixed results and performances during pre-season where we have been learning and trying things with the new squad. Intentionally, we have played a number of different formations but unfortunately, we have changed the shape and balance of the side rather more than we would have liked due to injuries and unavailability.

Things were looking good after clean sheets against Hillingdon, Hitchin and Slough but as soon as we conceded against Hayes and Yeading the roof seemed to cave in on our defending! Amazingly, 11 goals followed in the next 225 minutes and most of them were individual errors so that's a habit we need to get out of our system very quickly. The good news is, that individual mistakes are a lot easier to eliminate from our game rather than a general defensive problem. Bad habits are like a comfortable bed, easy to get into but difficult to get out of.

The injury front is not looking too healthy, particularly Lewis Putman who picked up a rather nasty knee injury which looks like keeping him out for some time. It's a massive blow, as I really felt excited by the way he had settled into his new surroundings. We wish him a speedy recovery. In addition, we have now got Scott McCubbin and Esmond James out for a few weeks with ankle injuries picked up in recent games. Add that to Scott McGleish and Sean Cronin being away, it's hardly been the easiest of pre seasons, especially when Mondays final preparation game was cancelled due to a waterlogged. Let's hope we've got rid of all the bad luck before the season has started.

I'm always asked who I think will be in the mix by the end of the season. I believe it's wide open, but I am confident Lowestoft. Billericay and Hornchurch will be there and thereabouts. I think newly promoted teams like Thamesmead, Dulwich and Maidstone will be a threat and Margate, Bury and East Thurrock will be in the mix. The one to watch is Hendon who came with a great run at the end of last season and they have signed some good players in Anthony Thomas, Jefferson Lewis, Tony Taggart and Michael Duberry, I think I mentioned Concord as my dark horses at the beginning of last season.

Lastly, I must take this opportunity to say a massive thank you to everyone involved in building and funding the new stand. I thought the pitch and stand looked excellent last weekend and a credit to all those who have worked so hard to make this happen. A fantastic effort and it typifies the attitude and commitment of our supporters!

We have come a long way both on and off the pitch since our arrival here at the 'Vale' and I sincerely hope we can give you some exciting times about between now and the end of April.

Enjoy the game





Bognor Regis town Football Club was founded early in 1883 and their early years were spent playing friendly matches until they joined the West Sussex league in 1896. They enjoyed moderate success at this level, which included winning the league five years in succession in the early twenties. As a result they joined the Brighton and Hove District League in 1926, however, their stay was short as the following season they applied to join the Sussex County League where they remained until 1972.

1989/90 (2nd Round) Home W6-0

The club enjoyed mixed fortunes in this league, winning the Division 1 Championship in the 1948/49 season. Relegation to Division 2 in 1969 was to start a new era for the club. Winning their way back to the First Division at the first attempt, they went on the next season to win the Championship. This then prompted them to apply to the Southern League, which



meant they had played in 3 different leagues in 3 successive seasons! Known as "the Rocks", Bognor took their time to settle at the higher level and in the 1981/82 season were

runners-up in both the League and the League Cup, they also won the Merit Cup for the most goals scored in a season.

The following season saw Bognor playing in yet another league, the Isthmian. They were elected to Division 1 and their first season saw them promoted as runners-up to the Premier Division. Bognor's highest Premier League placing was 5th in 1986/87 and their lowest was 21st some years later when they avoided the drop due to Dagenham leaving the league and no Conference side being relegated to the Isthmian league. They were however relegated the following season and as a result spent twelve seasons attempting to escape from Division 1. After winning the Sussex Senior Cup for the first time in 1955, Bognor went on to create a competition record by winning it in five consecutive years from 1980

to 1984. They have won the Sussex County League on four occasions and in 1986/87 beat Hendon to win the AC Delco Cup. This was the first cup success for a Sussex club outside of it's own County. In 1970 a 21-year-old full back called Jack Pearce arrived in time for the 1970-71 season. That season the Rocks bounced back at the first attempt, followed the next season by winning the Division One championship title, which was rewarded with a step up to the Southern Football League. In 1976 Pearce took on the managers job at the age of just 26. Bognor were bottom of the Southern League and were struggling to survive financially and had lost all their best players but Jack Pearce managed to turn things around and as a result the job was his. This began a period of 31 years of success. They played in this league until 1981 when they switched to the Isthmian League, where promotion to the Premier Division was achieved at the first attempt. The highlight of Pearce's management career was on the 21st November 1984 when Bognor Regis beat a Swansea City side including Dean Saunders and seven Welsh internationals in a

first round FA Cup replay. Swansea had been in Division One just two years before. In the first tie at the Vetch Field they were unlucky to be held 1-1 but in the return leg at Nyewood Lane they won 3-1 in front of 5,200. The cup run came to an end at Reading, but Bognor repeated the feat of reaching the FA Cup 2nd Round the following year and again in 1988 when they knocked out Division Four outfit Exeter City in the first round. Pearce led Bognor to the second round again in 1995 and guided the club to the first round on two other occasions during their heyday in the Eighties. In 2002-03 the club finally won

promotion back to the Isthmian Premier Division, and a 10th place finish the following season was enough to claim a place in the newly-formed Conference South where they remained until the end of 2008/09 season. The best league performance came in the 2004-05 season when they finished 9th in the Conference South, In

October 2007, Pearce stood down after 31 years to look after the administration of the club. Michael Birmingham, Pearce's assistant manager took over as player manager in October 2007 and managed to save the club from relegation with an 18th place finish. He stepped down at the end of the season in May 2008 and was succeeded by ex-Havant & Waterlooville and Dorchester Town manager Mick Jenkins and his assistant Andy Awford in June 2008. After a run of adverse results they resigned on 3rd January 2009. Darin Killpartrick took over as caretaker manager. Despite a significant improvement in results under Killpartrick, Bognor were relegated to the Ryman Premier League following a 4-1 defeat at Welling United.

With an arson attack destroying the Rocks Social Club that Summer, funds were extremely limited and it was no surprise when a disappointing season 2009/10, saw the Rocks again relegated into the Ryman League Division

Police on 96 points, but with a goal difference of only 60, compared to Met Police's 61! Defeat in the play-offs against Dulwich Hamlet (who had finished 31 points behind Bognor) was a cruel disappointment.

Following such a dramatic finish to the season many doubted whether The Rocks could bounce back but these concerns were dispelled when they finished in second place, and then won promotion by beating their old rivals Dulwich Hamlet in the play-off final at Nyewood Lane in dramatic fashion, in front of over 2,000 spectators.

2012/13 saw the club begin their return to the Ryman Premier in

positive fashion, but although in the top three at Christmas a run of serious injuries to key players and a run of NINE successive missed penalties resulted in a 14th position finish at the end of the season. An appeaance at Brighton's Amex Stadium in the final of the Sussex senior Cup brought the season to an

end, with a strong Brighton side winning 4-0.

The future for the club however looks much brighter, with a new clubhouse now open, a more settled team taking shape, and a loyal support who have stood steadfastly by the club over the past couple of years.



One South, Jamie Howell, who had served the club so well as a player, stepped up as manager and with Killpartrick as coach, season 2010/11 was a significant improvement. The team failed by just one goal to immediately regain their Ryman Premier status, finishing level with Metropolitan







A youthful but hugely talented Chelsea side ran out 4-1 winners in an entertaining pre-season friendly against Wealdstone at The Vale on Saturday.

The visitors, skippered by Nathan Ake, scored twice in three secondhalf minutes to take the game just out of a spirited Wealdstone's reach.

Striker Chris Moore gave the hosts the lead from the spot, coolly slotting home mid-way through the first half, after being hauled down by Chelsea 'keeper Mitchell

Beeney.

Isaiah Brown slotted in the West Londoners' equaliser seconds before the break, before the effervescent Alex Kiwomya gave them the advantage moments into the second period.

Brown added his second and his team's third minutes later, while John Swift completed the scoring late on to give Chelsea's Under 21's a deserved victory.

Despite the away side starting with an air of superiority, it was The Stones who had the game's first chances, with Tom Pett and Scott McCubbin both forcing early saves from Beeney. However, the young goalkeeper's luck wouldn't last long, with twenty-four minutes gone the stopper conceded a penalty after grounding veteran forward Chris Moore, who duly converted with aplomb. It was deserving and somewhat fitting that Wealdstone drew first

blood, on the afternoon of the opening of their new £32,000 Bulla Stand.

immediate pressure, testing the resolve of their non-league opposition, and almost came up with an immediate response, Isaiah Brown seized on Adam Martin's error to bring the best out of Stones"keeper Jonathan North, after Islam Feruz's cross had almost crept in.

The visitors did get themselves back on level terms shortly though, and picked the perfect time to do so. With just moments of the opening half remaining, Brown stroked the ball into the net to end a fine move involving the highly impressive Ruben Loftus-Cheek and an air-kick from luckless striker Feruz.

Things got even better for Dermot Drummy's side after the

restart, finding themselves two goals to the good within just six minutes. First, winger Alex Kiwomya capitalised on Wealdstone's failure to clear a set-piece, side-footing into the bottom corner from twenty yards, before Brown doubled his tally after pouncing on a mistake from full-back James

Hammond, still reeling from

the previous goal.

With the match entering its final stages and becoming far more open, the visitors were able to secure their victory

Brown this time turned provider, running at the Wealdstone backline and teeing up central midfielder John Swift for the simplest of finishes.

Cast (in order of importance): The Pundits; The Host; The Viewers; the Fans

Saturday 8 September

Celestial's launch brings live coverage of title favourites Preston's 5-2 win over Burnley. Unfortunately the game starts half an hour late as the visitors' train is delayed. The Host and The Pundits spend five minutes hammering the train company for its lack of a Plan B, followed by 25 minutes of wondering what to say next. Preston win three more games that month, all shown live.

"This new station is only interested in the big teams," moan the fans.

Saturday 6 October

Celestial head for Anfield to see Everton beat Aston Villa 2-0 in front of the league's most fanatical support.

"Those fans on the hill behind the goal are like an extra man for their team," says The Host.

"You mean the Kop," says special guest pundit Doctor Who, wondering why the home side are playing in strange blue shirts.

Saturday 13 October

Celestial pilot a new programme called Association Football Saturday. The idea is to give goal updates from every game as they happen. The reality is a bunch of old men sit around smoking huge cigars and drinking port while waiting for a homing pigeon to turn up with the scores tied to its leg. It's deemed a critical

and commercial failure, and scrapped.

The BBC buy the rights the following week.

Monday 5 November

More innovation at Celestial, as they launch Monday Afternoon Football with West Brom v Bolton. Wanderers. Fans, left out of pocket after buying train tickets for the previous Saturday before the short notice fixture change, take refuge in the pub to watch the 2pm kick off. Albion, unfamiliar with midweek games, stick to their usual Monday training session. Sadly, an hour of billiards followed by a nine-course lunch is no match for the Trotters, who beat them 5-1.

Saturday 10 November

With Jack The Ripper having struck twice the previous day, The Host and The Pundits try to outdo each other for solemn faces as they front a programme full of "getting things in perspective" and "remembering that football is only a game".

The league programme kicks off at 2.01pm so fans at all grounds can take part in a minute's applause for the victims.

The Host says: "I think the fans have shown a strong sense of responsibility. Football was the winner today."

Monday 12 November

Preston win 3-0 at Stoke in another Monday afternoon game.

"Monday football is great for consumers," say The Viewers.

"These games are just overkill," rant The Fans.

"Celestial are only interested in the Far East market. They'll be trying to get a 23rd game off the ground next."

Saturday 17 November

Widespread hooliganism disrupts the fixture programme.

"Football was the loser today," says The Host.

"When are the fans going to show some responsibility?"

On the pitch, Villa crash 5-1 at Blackburn and now trail Preston by seven points at the halfway stage.

"Don't go away," says The Host. "It's still all to play for."

Villa's manager says: "Preston have still got to come to us and get a result. I would love it if we beat them. Love it."

Saturday 5 January

Preston wrap up the title, beating Notts County 4-1 while nearest challengers Villa lose at Burnley. Realising that they can no longer spin the title race as remotely interesting, Celestial promptly switch to the other end of the table. With the bottom four having to apply for re-election, the stakes are huge.

Saturday 26 January

Next-to-bottom Stoke visit bottom side Derby.

"This is the single most valuable game in history," says The Host. Sums in excess of £49 nineteen shillings and sixpence are mentioned.

"Pure theatre," purr The Viewers.
"Greatest show on earth."

"The game's going to Hell in a handcart," lament the fans, shaking their heads.

Saturday 9 February

Preston win their final game 2-0 at Aston Villa, finishing the season unbeaten with 18 wins and four draws from their 22 games. The magnitude of their achievement predictably provokes an intense studio discussion.

Host: "I don't think we'll ever see anything like that again."

First Pundit: "Not in our lifetime anyway,"

Second Pundit: "I reckon it will be at least 100 years before another team goes unbeaten in this division."

Host: "Well if another manager can do this he will be a legend at his club forever."

First Pundit: "As long as he capitalises on it. The last thing the club will want is him hanging around winning nothing for eight years while previously inferior teams consistently erode the competitive advantage he worked so hard to create in the first place."

"This is the single most valuable game in history," says The Host. Sums in excess of £49 nineteen shillings and sixpence are mentioned."

Second Pundit: "Yeah, he'd look like a right jerk if that happened."

Saturday 30 March

It's the double for Preston, who beat Wolves 3-0 in the Cup Final at Kennington Oval. Because it's on the rival Penny Black Sport channel, Celestial pretends not to notice.

A Penny Black spokesman crows: "The FA Cup will always be the premier competition in the world. The Viewers love it and it will never be challenged by this new fangled league, whatever name it goes under."

His Celestial counterpart writes down the word "premier" in a notebook for future reference.

Saturday 13 April

England lose 3-2 at home to Scotland, only a year after winning 5-0 in Glasgow.

"What's the point of this competition if the national team is going to flop on the big stage?" demand The Fans.

"Join us in September for the premier league," say Celestial.

rewind: ON THIS

ON THIS DAY, BY TIM PARKS

41 years ago: Bath City take the points

Saturday August 12 1972, Southern League Division One South: Bath City 3 Wealdstone 1

THIS was the toughest possible start to the Stones new season, back in the mists of time 41 years ago... Bath City away, favourites for promotion and in front of an opening-day crowd of over 3,000 at their imposing Twerton Park ground.

Wealdstone were only a year out of the amateur ranks. Our first season among the Southern League semi-pros, 1971-72, had ended in a lower mid-table placing among the clubs we had regularly laughed at in our days of high-flying Isthmian League status.... Clubs like Bletchley, Dunstable and Stevenage who had become FA Cup whipping boys for the Stones in the late '60s. Now we were facing them on the Southern

League First Division stage – and quickly realising that there were other, more powerful outfits around like Cheltenham, Kettering and King Lynn that brought Alan Humphries' side down to earth with a bump.

But, in the Spring of 1972
Humphries was manoeuvred aside and Sid Prosser – charismatic manager of the effervescent St Albans City side – installed as boss at Lower Mead. Suddenly we were playing with more purpose but this first-game trip to Bath was a huge test for Prosser's new-look side. The match report makes much of the loss of strikers Bill Byrne and Mickey Brown, but I well recall it being a case of Men against Boys as Bath took us to the cleaners.

Prosser's team selection looked a

bit naive, fielding two non-tackling wingers (Terry Dyson and Ray Whitaker) and the inexperienced reserve striker Roger Livingstone in support of the excellent George Duck (making his Southern League debut for the club). In the centre of this 4-2-4 formation were Alick Brown (another winger forced into a defensive midfield role) and John Furie, a pedestrian journeyman midfielder. The match report also mentions the selection of centre back John Pearce playing at full-back.... It had 'nightmare' written all over it and the end result was no surprise. Wealdstone: John Barr, Eric Burgess, John Pearce, Eddie Presland, Dave Cockell, Alick Brown, John Furie, Terry Dyson, Roger Livingstone, George Duck, Ray Whitaker. Sub: Dixie Hale

WHAT HAPPENED NEXT?

Bath weren't even that good, truth to be told, and finished outside the promotion places. So did we after a season of extravagant ups and downs.... Big wins at home. shocking defeats away as Prosser shuffled his pack. He got it right the following season though, as we won the Div One South title with City joining us in the Premier Division as runners-up. The good thing about Division One South of that era was that even if you got stuffed on a Saturday - there always seemed to be a midweek game against someone like Dunstable to make you feel good about yourself again. That's exactly what happened after the Bath defeat. Three-nil without trying very hard. Lovely.




▲Two goal Micky Brown (Dark Shirt) gets up to head between two Dunstable defenders





Twenty-four clubs; little obvious relegation fodder; lots of confident contenders. It's like the Lincolnshire Handicap in the days before patrol cameras, starting stalls, all-weather racetracks & sober stewards. Any of fifteen clubs might win this. Here's the lowdown on the dirty double-dozen:

11/1/21 BILLERICAY Odds: 14-1

A brief escape but, befitting Saaf Essix natives, last year's Stalag Ryman escapees are back inside. Like Paul Newman in "Cool Hand Luke." Craig Edwards is no Newman lookalike, though he'd have given George Kennedy a better scrap. He sounds bullish but certainly has a fight on his hands. A slashed budget, a summer clearout and difficulty finding sponsors suggest finances are tight. Last week's 4-0 win over Concord has raised morale after two 4-0 defeats. Only Junior Luke and veterans Glenn Poole & Dave Collis return from April. The squad looks thin. Sussex halfback Callum Dunne pitching-up locally at university is

a result, but he'll shield a defence minus departed giants Rob Swaine & Chris Wild. The late signing of line-leading behemoth Ricky Sappleton seems panicky, but he's had productive spells in the "proper" Conference.

The Blues look short of play-off standard, New Lodge's kitschy R.White's bins will be the only reminder of 1970s glory days fans get this season.

Verdict: 14th (59pts)

2/2/14 BOGNOR REGIS Odds: 40-1

The division's prettiest team last term, but teams down here need to be more "Regis, Cyrille" than "Regis Salon." Bad weather and winter pitches don't help passing football.

Goalkeeping legend Craig Stoner has retired, but Mark Zawadski is a decent replacement. There've been no other debilitating departures... yet. However, Crawley may bugger Bognor by nicking Kane Wills. A genuine Ryman Player of the Season contender, Wills will be impossible to replace. Injuries buggered Bognor last winter,

with centre-half Stuart Axten & winger Ben Johnson amongst key absentees.

Overall, it was a satisfactory first campaign back, but could've been better. The Rocks lost only three of their first fifteen and contended until January, falling away as injuries piled-up and winning just one of eleven February & March games.

Not many new arrivals, but winger Aaron Hopkinson can be lively. They're an interesting each-way price if Wills stays. Verdict: 10th (65pts)

3/5/7 BURY TOWN Odds: 14-1

A midwinter run of six defeats in eight eventually cost Bury a play-off berth for the first time since Suffolk joined the Turvian Empire. The outbreak of chequebooks plaguing East Anglia this summer did them no favours. Richard Wilkins was hopeful of signing classy centre-half Adam Tann & midfield maestro Craig Parker – long-term loanees last season – but Leiston poached both. Biggleswade & Needham have also

ram-raided Ram Meadow's dressing room.

The replacements look surprisingly high class. Stringpuller David Bridges has dropped down from Chelmsford; Ryan Semple likes playing in a hole, so it's strange he's left Corby; solid left-back Seb Dunbar has come from Leiston. Crucially they've retained Golden Boot winner John Sands, though pro clubs are sniffing, and Ryman Goalkeeper of the Year Marcus Garnham.

With the council chipping-in, this is Ram Meadow's last season, but the new stadium will host the same old Isthmian faces in 2014/15.

Verdict: 8th (70pts)

6/8/8 CANVEY ISLAND Odds: 33-1

With their cousins being moved on from the Estuary Halting Site, the Gulls are keener than ever to

escape the Ryman. Steve Tilson's Football League pedigree didn't bring Isthmian success, so he's replaced by nononsense novice Danny Heale. Heale's well-connected in Saaf Essix and knows how they like to conduct business there... so the cash has been flashed. Experienced goalie Dale Brightly replaces Ashlee Jones. Chesham's Rob Bartley & Barnet's Rio Bryan-Edwards look formidable defensive signings. The returning Matt Game skippers the side after a year's sabbatical. He'll man the engine room with ex-Met midfielder Ty Smith, who still lives in Farnborough. (Ker-ching!) Ace

centre-forward Simon Thomas has joined from Chesham and they've pinched Wingate's lively Spencer Bellotti.

Right-back Ashley Miller and flaky speedster Woods-Garness will be missed, but the Gulls look the only one of April's top ten to have strengthened. They should be around 12/1.

Verdict: 2nd (86pts)

13/16/20 CARSHALTON Odds: 50-1

"And The Lord hardened Pharaoh's heart, And Pharaoh said, "Sod this for a game of soldiers." And he skulked from the dugout, And sulked. And he said unto the Carshaltonites, "Thou shalt make bricks without straw, for I am cutting the budget." And the Carshaltonites could not make bricks without straw. And they were cast out from the Land of Premier, And they dwelt in the wilderness. And there was wailing. And gnashing of teeth. But The Lord did hear the cry of the afflicted. And he appeared to the Carshaltonites. In a white suit. And Millwall cap. And he said, "Verily hath the Thurrockites sinned greatly. And I shall strike down upon them with great vengeance and furious anger. And thou shalt inherit the AGM Cup. Like it's 1999." And there was rejoicing amongst the Carshaltonites."

Five wins from six April games saw the Robins narrowly fail in a stunning escape bid, but Thurrock's secretary reprieved them. The uncertainty over their status has caused problems. Few of

those appearing in friendlies have yet signed-up. Keeper Nick Hamann's move to Braintree is a huge blow. Marksman Nathaniel Pinney, all-rounder Ola Sogbanmu & left-back Ricardo Joseph have also gone.

They currently look weak, but Tommy Williams should be given ... enough money to keep them up.

Verdict: 19th (50pts)

9/9/17 CRAY WANDERERS Odds: 40-1

They'd won more than they'd lost at New Year, including a 4-0 win at Concord. With neither exodus nor explanation, the Wands collapsed. One point in eight games, culminating in a 9-3 shellacking at Kingstonian, had fans as convinced the object of their affections would be going down as Gillian Taylforth's husband. The run stretched to twelve points in twenty matches. Odds-on for relegation, they went unbeaten in their last four and survived.

With new stadium plans comprehensively kyboshed by the council and just a season left on their Bromley groundshare, they looked on their last legs but the predicted summer exodus hasn't occurred. Keeper Andy Walker, skipper Mark Willy and poacher Leigh Bremner all return. No eyecatching new boys, but striker Tommy Whitnell's back from Margate - a fair swap for Thamesmead-bound Mike Power. They at least look a going concern again.

Finishing halfway isn't beyond them, but the off-field situation is worrying. Verdict: 18th (50pts)

5/3/1 DULWICH Odds: 20-1

Wayward shooting by Saafeest Lahndun's yoof needs tackling. Law of Common Purpose has merit. However, Hamlet getting nine years for Meshach Nugent's inaccurate marksmanship from twelve yards was excessive. "There, but for the grace of God..." Four Amateur Cups, four Isthmian titles, a tidy ground & gates

doubling in two years to 490 last season. It's nice to see a proper club come up.

Hamlet won One South. They've arguably recruited better players. Yet they're thrice Maidstone's price. New midfielder Karl Beckford occasionally shines down here. Paul Vines is lethal when in the mood and well-paid. Dean Lodge must be serious to prioritise playing friendlies over competing in last week's World Diving Championships.

They're likely to lose Xavier Vidal to the Football League, but Erhun Oztumer, who'd be a professional if he wasn't 5'3", is set to stay. Fancy early prices have gone but if Hamlet get on a roll they could be genuine challengers. Verdict: 9th (68pts)

1/10/5 EAST THURROCK Odds: 33-1

There's only one Ryman Premier bet for anyone investing strictly on form. Figures say East Thurrock must be backed. They won just four of their first eighteen matches last season, but bagged



the last twenty-four to storm into the play-offs.

They've kept the squad just about intact, most importantly holding on to spearhead Sam Higgins. Mercurial midfielder Kris Newby, sacked after his gambling made headlines, is back & the experienced Daren Behcet replaces Luton-bound keeper Elliot Just-

Why don't I fancy them? I don't see them holding on to the squad. They were in financial trouble two years ago and FA prizemoney got them out of it. They've used the proceeds from their cup heroics on more prudent investments than Mr. Newby's selections in Ladbrokes, but they don't appear to have a backer. With larger Saaf Essix clubs likely to have more money, the squad could break up. A shame, but last season will be as good as it gets for the Rocks. Verdict: 15th (57pts)

6/2/16 ENFIELD TOWN Odds: 50-1

Some scary pockets of turbulence

punctuated Town's first Ryman Premier campaign. They looked the division's worst team for prolonged spells - notably in a six-game Festive losing streak when they leaked twenty-one

Worryingly, they haven't improved the squad. Most of last term's strugglers have returned but arguably their best player. Jey Siva, has defected to Wealdstone. Huge ex-Billericay number five Chris Wild is the most prominent signing. He'll add muscle to a defence led by captain Mark Kirby assuming the skipper hasn't had a summer accident with a "waffeur theen meent."

Another newbie, much-travelled utility man Dean Green, has plenty of Ryman Premier experience and could be a useful addition. but the natives are restless after a pre-season of experimentation & unsettled line-ups.

It's likely to be a long winter at Donkey Lane.

10/5/1 GRAYS ATHLETIC Odds: 25-1

I've not seen Grays since voting for Tony Blair was widely regarded as chic, though probably not in Grays – or Aveley, where the Blues now groundshare.

They surged to the One North title with sixteen straight wins but things have gone tits-up since. They lost their CEO. Andy Swallow resigned to concentrate on legal matters. That goes with having an ICF commandant as CEO. They lost their ground, Landlords West Ham evicted them. That goes with having an ICF commandant as CEO. They lost their manager. Hakan Hayrettin joined Luton. That goes with the A13 Corridor making Luton look like Monaco. The club seemed paralysed this summer, with players drifting away and no arrivals. Some, like Leon Lalite, have returned after trialling elsewhere. The Blues probably have a top-half budget but the fact that signing Usama Hamdan, a striker from lowly Ilford, has excited the locals doesn't indicate terrace optimism. Odds: 16-1

2-0 up at half-time at Grosvenor Vale, the wheels came off, That defeat to Wealdstone started a run of seven losses in nine. They also managed an eight-game winless streak in late winter. Gates plummeted. Fans whinged. Boss Mark Harper resigned with a month of the season left. Coaches Paul Barry & Darren Powell are now joint-managers and they've re-fitted the squad. Returning veteran Stuart Lake and feisty Tommy Brewer add midfield steel but won't solve the ballretention problem. Striker Jordan Rocastle, signed from faraway Dereham, is an interesting recruit. The biggest boost is Charlie Moone's return. He bagged 24 goals last term before a spring move to Borehamwood but found the commute too demanding. There was a lot wrong at the Beveree last season and Moone will need to repeat that strike-rate for Borough to contend. Verdict: 13th (61pts)

5/17/15 HARROW BOROUGH Odds: 50-1

Can Borough continually defy the odds? Their 2010/11 playoff season was the only time they've finished above 14th this century but they always stay up. They defy bookies' odds on a weekly basis. They beat Whitehawk and Concord and doubled Bury Town last term, but played five matches against the bottom six after New Year, losing the lot. Coach Jason Goodliffe has


left to join Stevenage, leaving boss Dave Anderson to do all the shouting himself. He'll be up to that task.

Leroy Griffiths looks an excellent signing. He's matured since his baad assed silver boots QPR days. He'll be a more positive influence for Earlsmead dressing room yoofs than their probation officers & social workers. However, he's well outside Borough's wage range and is unlikely to stick around. Some of the new boys have fair pro club CVs, but look light on experience. New goalie James Warrington is highly-rated but he'll see more unintentional comedy at the office near Brent than at Slough.

The trapdoor to Essex may be about to open.







Leafing through history by Alan Palmer

Wealdstone v Bognor

Wealdstone and Bognor Regis have met on seventeen occasions since 1972.

Our record against them is quite superb with just two defeats and a goal difference of plus nineteen. We last met on Saturday 12th January 2013 at The Vale. At the time we were going through a mini slump with no wins in our previous four matches. In front of what if i am correct was our lowest league gate of the season (396) we won 1-0 and would go on a terrific run that would only see us loose a further three league games.

The game itself was a tightly contested affair and only a great goal from Alex Dyer would eventually separate the sides.

Wealdstone would eventually go on to make the play offs and Bognor would slip back to mid table. Away days to Nyewood Lane have inevitably been productive for The Stones. You have to go right the way back to 1998 to find our last defeat.

The two away programmes i've selected for this article show that like many other clubs Bognor have experimented with programme size over the years. On the 9th of April 1974 Wealdstone were poised to win the Southern League Division 1 title when they travelled to the south coast. Goals from the legendary George Duck and Jim Godfrey secured the points and Wealdstone went on to secure the title. For this match Bognor issued the universally popular sized programme. (A5)

wood Lane, this time in the Ryman League D1. In what was a disappointing season for Wealdstone they won 1-0 with a goal from Martin Cater. At this time Bognor were experimenting with A4 sized programmes. Most collectors of football programmes universally agree that this particular sized programme is the least favoured due to the fact that it's both harder to file and keep in mint condition.

Nearly thirty years on Wealdstone were back at Nye-
