

- Carrying items which may be considered a danger to others, including cans, bottles, or glasses containing alcoholic beverages;
- Throwing any article onto the field of play;
 Climbing floodlight pylons, fences, stands or any structure or building;
- Using obscene or bad language likely to cause offence to others;
 Using violence of any nature.
- 2) No spectator ball games.
- 3) The consumption of alcoholic drinks is permitted INSIDE the social club bar and boardroom areas.
- 4) Vehicles parked on the Grosvenor Vale site are at the owners' risk.
- 5) Wealdstone Football Club supports the FA's campaign on pyrotechnics (e.g. flares and smoke bombs). Any misuse of such items in and around the Ground will result in those responsible being asked to leave the Ground and, in line with football authority guidance, may result in a report to the Police, potential prosecution and a ban from the Club of up to three years.

And many great memories, as always: Joey Turner's last gasp winner at Bath City capped off a memorable day; and I thought the matches at home to Gosport and Havant and away at Bromley, Basingstoke and Whitehawk we're all very enjoyable. I must also pay tribute to both Jonathan North who has had an outstanding season as well as to Jefferson Louis whose performances have quickly turned him into a terrace hero.

As always at this stage of the season there are several people who deserve recognition. Firstly I want to thank Stuart Coutts and Connect Vending who have been valued Club Sponsors for the past five years. We part on great terms and hope Stuart will stay involved with the Club in some fashion going forward. The pressure is on all of us to find new sponsors and I've written about this elsewhere in the programme.

I want to publicly recognise Jeremy Albert who is standing down from the Wealdstone FC Supporters' Club Committee after many years great service.

It is quite incredible how hard Gordon works and I wish all the management team every success over the next few years.

To Howard and the board, well done for keeping this club going. It is some achievement you guys have overseen since the move to The Vale. Mr Rumens - I will miss our frantic telephone calls! Thank you for all your help with dinners and other commercial activities.

To my brother Dave and the rest of the committee, I leave you guys in good shape. Keep the hard work going, we are lucky to have you all on the committee, it is thriving at present. Also, good luck to Alan Palmer who takes over organising coach travel.

Finally, to you, the supporters, without doubt the most loyal, passionate bunch of fans at this level of football. I'm just the one that organises stuff - it's you guys who make it a success. Thank you for all your help and contributions.

FAN IN THE STAND: GORDON HILL.. THE WEALDSTONE RAIDER

We're all aware of the Raider's story... but did you know he was arrested that night we won the double in 1985?!

T seems rather apt that the subject of our final Fan in the Stand this season is the man who has single-handedly put Wealdstone's name on the lips of the nation.

And, of course, today's opponents are Whitehawk - the South Coast club where Gordon Hill, aka the Wealdstone Raider - came to National prominence two years ago after a video of him 'offering out' a taunting home fan went viral on You

The world and his wife now knows of The Raider. Many Premier League football fans even think our club is known as the Wealdstone Raiders!

But is Gordon Hill really a fan? We put him on the spot and found out guite a few things about the 49-year-old builder that nobody has yet uncovered...

Name: Gordon Hill

Where do you live: Pinner, the Cannon Lane end, but I grew up in Harrow Weald. Went to Mountview School (which has since been closed) where a lot of the boys followed Wealdstone.

First Wealdstone game you went to? It was the Anglo-Italian tournament game against Udinese at Lower Mead in March 1978, when I was 12. I wanted to go to an Arsenal game but my dad said he'd take

- and I loved it! I was hooked on the atmosphere behind the goals. the snarling and the passion. And Udinese were horrible b*****ds! We lost 1-0 but Wealdstone were the team for me after that.

Who persuaded you to go to Wealdstone? Well we went to games with the other Mount-

> view boys, but mainly it was my mate Dave Butler who was the really keen one. We used to go home and away in the 1980s. He still goes to games now.

> > How do you fit Wealdstone in with your working and private life?

Well, I missed quite

Wealdstone instead, the local team : a few years when I was working as a builder, often six days a week. I couldn't get to games and just got out of the habit really. Then when the club moved to Ruislip, Grant McCann kept on and on at me to come down the ground, so I turned up for the Rotherham game in 2009 and fell for the Stones all over again.

Do you follow any other team?

Yes, Arsenal when I was younger. Me and Dave used to make a day of it - we'd get a Red Bus Rover and hop on and off buses until we got to Highbury. It took a flaming age! But we left early in the morning and going to the big games was easier in those days, you'd just pay your money and go in.

The last time I saw the Gunners was last season in the FA Cup Ouarter-Final when they beat Everton 4-1 But quite honestly I'd rather

go to the Stones - it's a real family atmosphere at the Vale. I took my friend Sam along today (the Ebbsfleet game) and she enjoyed it so much she's bringing her son along next week.

What are your favourite away trips to watch the Stones? Blimey there's been some good ones.... I always enjoy Margate, and I've been down the last three or four

times we've played there and it's always a good day out. Plus my sister lives down there, with my nieces and nephews, so I stay over and make a family weekend of it. Lowestoft was memorable too. with that great pub The Triangle. And Bath this season was a great day out, with all the kids wanting me to sign things and the video team coming down with us. That was a decent pub too!

Most memorable game you've EVER been too? That would be the FA Trophy Final in 1985, seeing the Stones win at Wembley was amazing and we had a good drink all day long. In fact, I had a bit too much and got in an argument with a policeman at Harrow Met station on the way back to the club afterwards. He arrested me and I was in custody for an hour and a half! But I got back to Morritts later on to join in the celebrations... not that I can remember much of it. Dave was with me when I got arrested but he got away with it - he always did! 



FANS' HIGHLIGHT OF THE SEASON

E asked our fans for their highlight of this memorable first season back in Conference football. And they said....

Sudhir Rawal: Joe Turner's goal at Bath. Fantastic day out, Raider Mania in full flow, over 250 Stones fans on a pre-Xmas drinking session and then the last minute winner to send the hordes into ecstasy. The Bath footage of the goal is wonderful. Brilliant noise from our fans leading up to the goal. Jolly's burst throw. the rising anticipation, the keeper's fumble, Jolly's lay-off and then Turner's unerring shot from outside the box into the net and the joy and elation on the terraces!

'Deadly' Doug Robinson: As I am living in Hemel, the best moment of the season for me was when the ref abandoned the first game at Hemel's Vauxhall Road ground, due to a frozen pitch. The Stones were 3-0 down at half time and it could easily have been worse. The obviously correct (but brave) decision taken came as a real 'Get Out Of Jail Free' feeling for the very large Stones contingent... but less so for the Hemel fans, who felt they had been unjustly robbed. Pure Joy!

Kevin Williams: Two McGleish moments for me. The goal against Havant should have nicked it but it wasn't a winner. And, although it didn't bring three points, it felt like a turning point in the season; a Monday night against one of the league's front runners, under the lights... it was a special atmosphere at The Vale. The other, and the "winning" moment for me, was McGleish v Concord. This was against an outfit we perennially fail to beat so it was extra special when you consider it

Steve Williams: Got to be Scott McGleish's winner home to Concord 22 November, our first home win in the Conference South. On the morning of the match my dad passed away at 94yrs. He was first taken to watch the Stones by his dad who played for 4 seasons for the club in the middle 1920s. He would always ask me ...'Did they win today?' Thanks to Scott McGleish they certainly did!!! Brilliant!!

Tim Parks: For me, having looked

forward to seeing the Stones play a league game at St Albans for over 40 years, our 3-1 win at Clarence Park was nirvana. And I'll love Jefferson Louis forever for the two goals he scored that day.

Roger Slater: Chelmsford, singing in the rain on a Monday night to turn the season around.

Jez Albert: My highlight is the Joey Turner winning goal at Bath in

December, that moment encapsulates everything that this football club is about... total passion and commitment from the players and especially the fans, it rounded off one of the great WFC away days

Martin Allen: Bath City away.. a ground we had visited many times in the past which didn't seemed to have changed since our last visit. A Christmas atmosphere. Loads of fans travelled. Numerous pints were drunk. A party atmosphere, capped when Joey Turner scored the last minute winner. As the ball went in I jumped on Sudhir who was standing in front of me and we both fell to the floor as the rest of the fans celebrated!

Plus **Concord away** for a strange reason! Me and my wife Syl got to the ground early and went into the bar where the players were sitting waiting to get changed - Syl's favourite player James Hammond had been missing for the past month but was back into the squad today. She went up to him and said James I am so glad that you are back in the squad'. He looked confused but then I realised that she was

speaking to Michael Malcolm! My wife is of West Indian origin and she'll never live that one down!

Farnborough 1 - 4 Wealdstone



Wealdstone romped to another impressive away victory, this time to a struggling Farnborough side that will now need something of a miracle to survive relegation from the Vanarma Conference South.

It is very rare in the tough environs of the Conference that Stones will come up against a side that looked out of its depth but sadly for Cherrywood Road outfit this was the case on Saturday. But as the football cliché goes: you can only beat what it put in front you and Wealdstone certainly did that with some style particularly in a rampant and totally dominant first half in which Stones excellent keeper Jon North even saved a penalty.

Big striker Jefferson Louis was again the focus of attention and he blitzed the home side out of sight hitting the net twice in the first seven minutes and then claimed his first Stones hat-trick on the stroke of half time. Louis has now scored 8 league goals since his slow start in Stones colours but his performances since the end of January, however, have been nothing short of sensational. He is clearly enjoying his football again and that can only be good news for Stones fans. Even so the match was not without cost as energetic and influential midfielder Luke O'Nien will be ruled out of Easter Monday's big clash at The Vale with Ebbsfleet with a nasty looking shoulder injury. Better news though is that Scott Davies should be available on Monday following his foot problem sustained against Gosport three weeks ago but fellow midfielder Mickey Corcoran, absent on Saturday is side-lined with a hamstring.

Stones Manager Gordon Bartlett was delighted with the three points: 'We set ourselves a target of achieving 50 points and we have now exceeded that and we are now only two points behind Ebbsfleet. We dominated completely in the first half but were sloppy in the second as we became too comfortable; we will push on and aim to finish as high as possible' Louis blasted home from an angled drive after only 3 minutes and his second arrived four minutes later after young keeper Magnus Norman saw his clearance charged down by Matt Ball and when the former Boro midfielder rolled the ball across the goal Louis nipped in to tap home for the simplest of goals.

Farnborough tried hard to turn their possession into a threat but the Stones defence stood firm and restricted the home side to a few half chances. Louis netted again late in the first period following a super Stones build up and it was game over. Stones had even been able to survive a penalty kick on the stroke of half-time when North saved superbly from Jamie White for a killer psychological blow.

The second half was only three minutes old when Scott McGleish headed home from a Ball corner and then the game petered out as a spectacle but there was time for some petulance from the home side as the experienced Jamie Hand was sent off for a second bookable offence. White did grab a late, late consolation for Boro from a flowing move but by then the game was well and truly lost.

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE by Howard Krais

Making progress on our vision for the future

In January I launched our vision for the next ten years. Over the past three months I have been pleased by the response. There has been good engagement from all quarters of the Club; many individuals have come forward to find out more and in some cases to offer their help and there is work underway across a range of projects, some of our progress since January is summarised below.

General direction

I have had a number of conversations with a range of supporters and others interested in our future. This must continue. I remain very keen to hear from as many people as possible about where they see the Club going. Whether you are a long-term supporter or someone who has joined us much more recently we want to know what you want for the Club. We also want to hear from others who have a more passing involvement with the Club, such as some of our local residents, sponsors or other stakeholders. If you are interested, have a view or want to find out more please let me know and I'd be happy to schedule some time.

Expanding the team - marketing and commercial

As we think about both short term and long term needs it is clear the Club needs to make a major step forward in the way it markets itself as well as how we drive greater income streams. We have been meeting a number of people recently and shortly we will look to announce new teams for both marketing and, critically, commercial.

We had already offered the commercial role to one person from outside the Club but he decided at the last minute not to come as his current employer made him a muchimproved offer. I remain encouraged by the people we are meeting and hope we will have someone appointed to this position very shortly.

We say goodbye to Connect Vending after five years as our Club Sponsor. Now we need to find new sponsors - both those who are interested in longer term partnerships and those who simply want a programme advert or to be match sponsors. If we are to compete at this level over the longer term, as well as to start to fulfil some of our wider ambitions then we need to bring considerably more money into the Club. I've said we haven't done well enough on this over the years and we need to do much better.

Marketing is another area where we can up our game. Lots of people have plenty of good ideas about what we need to be doing to better market ourselves - but as some have realised - ideas are the easy part. We need a clearly defined marketing strategy and we need people who are able to carry out those plans.

For example, if we are to develop deeper relationships with local schools then we need people who are available to make those relationships work, be available to work with teachers and ensure these relationships can be delivered in an organised and value added way. I am hopeful that with some of the people we have met recently we will shortly have the resources to develop this further.

Community

Much of the thrust of our Vision document was based on deepening our links with our local community. Therefore I was delighted when we recently submitted our first application for funding to the Conference Trust. We have applied to support two programs - one that involves teaching football and Maths, initially in year 3 primary schools, and the other aimed at the opposite end of the age spectrum is focused on developing a Walking Football scheme for the over '50s.

We see this as a start and while we wait for the Conference Trust to tell us whether our application has been successful this is a commitment we intend to develop as we go forward. My thanks to Nick Symmons who has driven this forward and you can find out more about this in the article elsewhere in the programme.

One Club

As well as developing what we do in the Community I talked a lot about the importance of creating 'one Club'. This is probably the area where we have made the most progress. We have had several discussions with Youth Club chairman Jay Hogg and have a great base to move forward on.

I am delighted that we are hosting Youth Tournaments on the main pitch over the next two weekends and this morning we should have seen first team players and coaches taking sessions with some of the Youth sides, with some of the stars from those sessions taking penalties at half time today. We plan plenty more in the future and this is an area that is very exciting for us.

Digital excellence

We have a great opportunity to develop our approach to how we communicate across digital media. Craig Whitehead has stepped forward and is leading a team to develop a social media strategy to make sure we have a team of people to properly integrate our activities across several platforms including Twitter, Facebook, Linked In, Instagram and You Tube. We hope to have this up and running before the start of next season.

Developing the facilities

As many know we recently achieved confirmation of our B grading, having put in place what was required to satisfy the Football Association grading team. As we look forward we will make our investment decisions across the whole site especially where they maximise income. This may mean people should not be surprised if any improvements are focused more on the Social Club rather than in the stadium this summer - though please note any decisions are still to be taken.

Plenty of other things are going on and as stated earlier I'd be delighted to listen to the views of anyone who would like to get involved. This is truly your opportunity to have your say about the direction of the Club so please take it.

inhabitants (at the last count) would I'm sure be pleased to see you. From there, its cross country to **Davie's** Town, Vancouver, British Columbia, home of the cities gay community and it's the heartland of Vancouver's annual Pride Festival.

Take a jaunt across the border to warmer climes, to take in **Parker**, Colorado. Original an ancient Indian hunting ground, the community has built up around a Post Office, opened in 1862, one famous former resident? John Beck, a gold prospector – though unlikely to be he of the cold showers at Cambridge United!

Then a ramble onto **Hamblin**, an unincorporated community (whatever that may be) in California. Not one for the surfers either due to the location - and the fact that the water supply for the 38 homes comes from a well that ran dry in 2014. From then on, a short drive to Corcoran, California, most famous as the site of the California State Prison, home to a number of notable inmates such as Charles Manson, Moving around the state, we come to Watts, now a district in Los Angeles, it was until 1926 a city in its own right, and, as we have a few buffs among the fans, you may be interested to know that Watts Railway Station is on the National Register of Historical Places. Putting our best foot forward, the next stop is Hickey. Tennessee. Now hickey isn't at all famous for anything - in fact, it probably has the least written about it of any place to be found on the internet....one thing that did pop up? Its actually in Putnam County, Tennessee! A quick flight across the country and you get to Wright, Florida. It's the 147th largest place in Florida (out of 919 listed) with a population of around 24,000. where apparently nothing has ever happened and no-one famous has ever come from there! Continuing the tour of less than famous places, next is **Cronin** Brook Heights, Massachusetts. So famous, the only thing I could find out is that the Hawkeye Landscape Corporation is based there! Still, nearby is Gill, Massachusetts, a town that lies in a wide, irregular bend of the Connecticut River as it makes an abrupt turn northwestward in its

southern course at the mouth of the Millers River, but to be fair, nothing much ever happened there either. In fact, there's a few places in the US where no much seems to happen - Lucien, Oklahoma is another, though it ranks third in the most diverse population in Oklahoma - and that must tell a story as only 89 people live there!

Time to move on again - to the village of **Godfrey**, Illinois. Originally called Monticello, the village of Godfrey was named after Massachusetts sea captain Benjamin Godfrey, one of the community's first settlers (probably left as nothing much seemed to happen in Massachusetts....). Located just 30 miles north of (Jefferson) St. **Louis**, Godfrey is poised for development with the extension of the I-255 corridor.

St Louis is a big, bustling centre forward of a city originally names after Louis IX as it was 'claimed' by the French in the late 1700's, there's plenty for a sports fan on tour as well, as the Blues, the Cardinals and the Rams provide the local entertainment all, year round!

Travelling north to complete the US journey, we find a little place called **Bartlett**, Ohio. One of fourteen places (eleven starters and three subs) called Bartlett in the USA, this one is on Wolf Creek which itself is spanned by the Shinn Covered Bridge which should be worth a visit for it's name alone.

From here on we'll need some flights, so what better route to take than through **Morris** County, New Jersey. 25 miles west of New York, its 500,000

residents forming the sixth wealthiest county in the USA. A flight to sunnier climbs sees an arrival in **Brown**'s Town, St Ann, Jamaica, an agricultural centre (and I'm not casting aspersions here) it's where the Ugli Fruit was found in 1914 growing near the town.

Changing country again, a flight to a European Pearl - Venice - or at least nearby, where we come to Camping Village Jolly - everything you could want from a campsite (not on Canvey for a start) and a water bus ride from Tronchetto island or, for the buffs again, only a short bus ride from Venezia Santa Maria Novella Train Station. We're not quite at the bottom of the barrel, but we're getting close....and this barrel is in New Zealand, to be precise, Johnsonville, a suburb of Wellington, at the top of the Ngauranga Gorge. It was initially called Johnson's Clearing 'founded' by Frank Johnson and it was an independent town until 1954.

A NEW INITIATIVE TO GET WEALDSTONE INVOLVED IN THE LOCAL COMMUNITY

Help the Stones to a share of £20,000 Conference grant.. and walk back to happiness!

HE STONES are hoping to apply for up to £20,000 worth of funding from the Football Conference Trust by establishing more activities in the Harrow and Ruislip areas.

And you, the fans, can play a major part – and get a little fitter in the process!

Part of Chairman Howard Krais's vision for the club's future, outlined at the annual general meeting, is to get Wealdstone more involved in our local community. And we can now access grant funding through the Football Conference trust which receives £2million a year from the Premier league and the Professional Footballers association. National Conference members can apply for grants up to £25,000 a year and north and south clubs £20,000 these amounts forming 75 per cent of the money to be spent by each club on the activities – with the remaining 25 per cent raised by the club or through outside sponsorship or donations.

Wealdstone have thus formed the 'WFC Foundation Trust', with initial aims to formulate and run some community activities. In the longer term it aims to become a registered charity to undertake these activities. It is being headed up by former club chairman Nick Symmons, while former club secretary Mike Fishman takes on the same role within the trust and supporter Frank Funnell has agreed to take up the role of Operations Director.

This team have put together outline plans to apply for grant funding to run a few pilot initiatives over the next few months, and we'll shortly hear whether



these grants will be funded. The two initiatives that are going to be piloted are as follows....

Stones soccer in Schools

A SIX-WEEK course aimed at primary year 3, comprising of a series of paired mathematics and football related activity sessions. Teachers will be delivering the mathematics lessons and Wealdstone FC players/coaches delivering the activity sessions.

This course is being developed in conjunction with a primary school in the Harrow area. If the pilot is successful it is hoped we will be able to persuade local schools in both Hillingdon and Harrow boroughs to run these six week courses at minimal cost to the schools. It is hoped that the club will in time be able to offer similar type courses in literacy and healthy living to local schools.



Walking football for the over 50's

THE second initiative relates to the older generation – you may well have seen the Barclays advertisement on television, showing men over 50 playing the new game of walking football. The participants have to be at least 50, and no running or passing over head height is allowed.

The sessions will take place at the local Hillingdon leisure centre in Uxbridge, with a daytime sessions and an evening session each being an hour in duration. The pitch is across a quarter of a full size third generation surface.

Once again these sessions will be run and administered by Wealdstone FC players and coaches. We would love to see some of our supporters take part in... so come on you old SFC players, it's time to get your boots down from the loft and show us those silky skills!





ACK for the final time this season is your magnificent 'Progwatch' feature... for the uninitiated, an unbiased, totally objectional (sorry, objective) look at what our Conference South colleagues have to offer their fans in terms of a matchday magazine.

Here at WFC Programme
Towers we love these little, A5sized objects of desire. That's
why we put so much effort into
producing a range of news and
features to please our demanding readers - and that's why we're
rewarded with probably the best
programme sales outside the Conference National.

Did you know that every club HAS to produce a matchday programme? I've a strange feeling that the reason is more about providing a promotion vehicle for the league's sponsors than a genuine desire to get clubs to provide spectators any more than the absolute basics... but why don't more clubs make an effort? An up-to-date league table must be a basic pre-requisite of a programme but a couple of clubs haven't even provided this. What's next - leaving out the teams?

With the proliferation of online material, not to mention immediate updates of results and tables, the only thing to prevent programmes becoming utterly archaic is to make them relevant and interesting. How many Stones fans have you heard saying that they don't bother buying away programmes any more?

No surprise really. Why would you fork out £2.50 to buy a glossy mag with nothing in it that you hadn't read before? An awful lot of our supporters do (including me, mainly to compile this feature), just to keep a memory of the Stones' progress through the divisions but it's not difficult to offer something that people actually want to read.

don't want to unfairly pan Basingstoke Town. Oh, well maybe I do, because once again a club ripped off us mug punters. A glossy cover and reasonable design. Buy me, buy me it says... and then, er, b****r all. All shiny shoes and no socks, as my aunt used to say. Two pounds fifty! You could buy those matching shiny socks for that.

What really made me laugh (ironically) was that the sole interesting article in their programme, a page 'Introducing Ken Gaunt', a semi-retired journalist in his 60s who has ended up living in Basingstoke after a career spent

covering sport from Chesham United in 1968, to the Cloughie Years at Forest and Liverpool at Hillsborough, through to World Cups and the 2012 Olympics.

Clearly an interesting man. He says he 'is now happy to raise Basingstoke FC's profile after moving to the town for family reasons'.

But did he actually write anything to improve this lamentable issue? Did he ****!

The Dragons actually set a new low water mark with only three pages of original content in this 32-page programme: A lame 'From the Manager' plece by Jason Bristow and a motley collection of 'Club News'. Oh, and that Ken Daunt teaser. Otherwise, a dozen pages of stuff I'd already seen online, plus a couple of pages introducing their own players.

Well, I suppose they had a lot of newbies in to see the Raider:)

Havant and Waterlooville

THERE were a couple of things I really liked about this programme. First, its size. Who says bigger is always better? The Havant issue is **Continued overpage**

two-thirds the size of this programme (is that A6 size? Or A5.3?) and is necessarily scaled down compared to your average match magazine. Not a bad thing when so many productions are stupidly overblown.

But then, as you get beyond halfway, it suddenly dawns on you that this programme is not just physically small. it's very small on content too. I mean miniscule. Just two pages of original content (and small pages, let's not forget) mean that I'd leafed through this issue in little more than ten minutes.

Shame, because if the content matched the original design this could be a real contender.

Highlight: feature by the club's chaplain, which wasn't actually very interesting or enlightening.

CONCORD RANGERS

MANAGED to overlook this programme earlier in the season, and that's easily understood. Lots of pages, colourful, in-your-face but seriously lacking in finesse. Would that bother the Beachboys? Definitely not!

Again, pretty thin on content with the highlight 'A Fan's View', commentating on Concord's last two games at the Vale when they avenged an unlucky 2-1 defeat in early 2013 by beating us by the same score in the Ryman play-off semi-final.

For some reason, Concord felt we'd be interested in reading seven pages of their own club history. And there was a heavy suggestion of cutting and pasting in their club notes, with us 'being accorded a warm welcome for this evening's game'. It was a Saturday afternoon!

FARNBOROUGH

ONCE again, a glossy, well designed production with barely any content. What do these clubs do, hand a fat cheque to a print/design shop with the remit that "Oh, and only give us a couple of pages to fill with words, okay mate. You do the rest, fill in the formatted results and sponsors page. League table? What, do we have to update that? No, can't be arsed, leave it out".

Actually, in Farnborough's case I'm surprised they can find anyone to print their programme. I seem to recall that the last time we played there, their printers had to chase them for the whole season to get any payment at all. Let's hope their current printers have insisted on cash up front.

Highlight of this very thin magazine (with just those two pages of original content) is the manager's page by the fantastically delusional Spencer Day, and then a pious 'Chaplain's Page' which is extraordinarly ironic for a club who have previously thought 'Christian principles' to have been the head-teachers at a C of E college.

Oh, you know, not bad. Fair to middling

So here we are, entering April in a rich vein of form and up for the fight in order to, er, to... no, hang on, wait a minute - can this be right? You mean to say we're safe? We honestly, seriously can't go either up nor down?

Well, that's a turn-up for the books. Because, just to be clear to all you Wealdstone newbies over recent seasons (and a very good afternoon to you all) can I just point out that this is far from normal? We're Wealdstone - and as a rule, we just don't do mid-table mediocrity.

Problem is, in pretty much every season since we came to The Vale we've had one or other extreme of the table to think about - and mostly we've had promotion on our minds. We've been knocking on the door of Conference South pretty much ever since we set foot in Ruislip. and there are precious few of you who need reminding of the last-day failures to reach the play-offs, the last-day failures having reached the play-offs to then reach the play-off final, and so on and so forth.

Point is, we were fighting until the bitter end. So for today, in what has got to be the earliest end to our season at home for many a year, it's going to be difficult to avoid a certain sense of 'is that it'? We'll have no last-day, nerve-jangling clock countdowns to concern



us this season. It's all a bit... well, middling.

In early April, the normal state of affairs for the Stones is typically one of wildly overoptimistic anticipation of wildly over-pessimistic anxiety. We're either making a bid for the play-offs or busily looking up the competition's remaining fixtures to see what we still need to do to stave off relegation.

Middle of the Road

Let's at this stage be clear for our first season at Conference South level, finishing in a firm mid-table position is a BLOODY GOOD THING. Gordon and the management team have proven just how good they are at re-moulding an entire squad in mid-season, and there have been some superb displays as we've acclimatised to the rarified air of Tier 6 football.

In fact, speaking of Conference South, the competition is now in its eleventh year - and we've found ourselves fighting to go up or stay up in most years since its introduction. (I note it's to be rebranded as 'National League South' next season - that's surely the very definition of an oxymoron. If it's a national league, it's surely just that. But that's by the by.)

In fact, Season 2003/2004 represents one of just two seasons in my living memory where finishing mid-table was an exciting proposition. And here's why.

The formation of Conferences North and South occurred for the start of season 2004/05. In the season leading up to its introduction as the new sixth tier Conferences North and South, Wealdstone were playing in Tier 7 - or more specifically, Isthmian Division

1 North. That was one of two Isthmian divisions, North and South, that fed up in to the Isthmian Premier Division, one of three premier divisions at the time - Isthmian, Northern and


Southern - feeding directly into

a single Tier 5 Football Confer-

ence. (Come on, pay attention!)

Conference kerfuffle

The introduction of Conference South meant we would effectively be relegated to Tier 8 if we didn't finish reasonably well in Isthmian Div. 1, because clubs from the Northern. Southern and Isthmian Premier divisions were being taken to form the new Conferences North and South. Naturally, with clubs at premier division level being taken, there was a knock-on effect in the lower divisions. In fact, it was a brilliantly organised restructuring with the clear aims published at the beginning of season 2003/2004. Being Wealdstone, we made this hard on ourselves by failing to finish in the top half (which would have ensured our place in the new Tier 7 Isthmian Premier Division). On the last day, we finished in 13th. But because of the way the divisions above were being structured, this meant a playoff against the team finishing in the same position in the Isthmian Div 1 South. Home advantage was to be with the



club with the best league record out of the two. Needless to say, we couldn't event manage that. And so it was, a little over 48 hours after we secured our playoff spot on the Saturday away at East Thurrock, we reconvened on a May Bank Holiday Monday evening at Champion Hill in South London for a single, season-defining play-off match against Dulwich Hamlet. A tense 2-2 draw was finally settled on penalties, Richard Jolly scoring the decisive penalty that in many peoples' eyes saved this club. What did this mean? We'd won the play-off, but what it meant was that we survived, not that we went up. Had we lost, we'd have dropped down to Tier 8. Now, THAT's how you finish

Now, THAT's how you finish a season. The only other time when finishing mid table was that exciting was way back in 1979 at the formation of the then Alliance Premier League

(now Conference - sorry,
'National League') when finishing 15th turned out to be just

enough to get us into the new national structure. We got relegated for the first time in our history just two seasons later, and then went on a run of form through the eighties that left us with no mid table mediocrity until season 1985/86, the year after having done the double. Since then, I count seasons 1988/89, 1989/90, 1990/91 and 1992/93 as probably the longest stretch of consistent mid-table finishes in our history. After that came enforced demotion, the many early years of promotion success under that new Bartlett bloke and many a season looking down rather than up. So now, here we are, back in mid-table. And it feels good. Odd, but good. Here's to looking upwards again in 2015/16.

THE HAWKS

TODAY WE WELCOME WHITEHAWK TO GROSVENOR VALE

Founded in 1945 as Whitehawk & Manor Farm Old Boys, the club joined the Sussex County League in 1952-53 and after finishing third in their inaugural season, were runners-up for three successive seasons from 1954-55, and never out of the top five before changing their name to Whitehawk FC in 1960. In 1961-62 Whitehawk won the first of three Division One titles. The following season the competition was abandoned due to bad weather, but 1963-64 the Hawks retained the championship, finishing three points clear of second-placed Lewes. The next three seasons however, were nowhere near as successful, and the club found itself relegated at the end of the 1966-67 season, only to make an immediate return as Division Two champions in 1968.

The next nine years saw Whitehawk continue to compete in the top division, until they were relegated for a second time in 1976-77. This time they were to spend four seasons in Division Two, before winning promotion as champions in 1980-81. In 1983-84 Whitehawk won Division One for the third time, and also enjoyed a good run in the FA Vase before losing at Corinthian Casuals in the 4th Round. 1986-87 saw the Hawks finish as runners-up to Arundel. whilst the club enjoyed by far its best run in the FA Cup in 1988-89, going out in the 4th Qualifying Round to Bognor Regis Town after a replay, having previously drawn at Nyewood Lane, 1993-94 was another good season for the club. Finishing the season once again as runners-up, this time to Wick; and also having their best ever run in the FA Vase: reaching the 5th Round before going out of the competition to Boston. Hawks won the Brighton Charity Cup for three consecutive seasons in the late 1990s.

Having only finished outside the top three once in the past five seasons, the Hawks have now established themselves as the 'nearly' club of the Sussex County League, a title that has also been extended to cup competitions. 2002-03 saw the club once again finish in second place, this time to runaway winners Burgess Hill Town. A comparatively modest 8th place followed the

next season, but in 2004-05 the Hawks regained their position amongst the leading clubs in the League, finishing just a point behind runners-up Rye & Iden United.

The two sides also met in the final of the John O'Hara League Cup and the Hawks emerged as 4-3 winners. However, they were later found to have played an ineligible player in substitute Bertie Foster and therefore Rye United were awarded the trophy.

The Hawks were quietly fancied to do well again in 2005-06 but could only manage 3rd place again behind champions Horsham YMCA and Ringmer. Having been stripped of the League Cup the previous season, their misfortune in cup competitions continued as they reached the Final again, and also the RUR Charity Cup Final, but lost both, to Shoreham and Hailsham Town respectively.

Season 2006-07 began as a two horse race in the eyes of most pundits with Eastbourne Town likely to be the club most likely to deprive Whitehawk of the championship. Despite the Hawks taking four points from the two League encounters it was Town who prevailed by a single point as both finished the season strongly, hoping for the other to slip up. That Whitehawk finished II points clear of 3rd placed Arundel will have been of little consolation. It was a similar story in the domestic cup competitions as the Hawks were

beaten once again in the Final of the RUR Cup, this time by Chichester City.

It was another hard-luck story in the FA Vase as well after Whitehawk had fought their way to the quarter-finals and found themselves at home to favourites Truro City. As 1,009 spectators filled the Enclosed Ground, Truro won through with a controversial[citation needed] winner late in the game.

However, the league title success that had previously eluded them, finally came their way in season 2009-10 and with it, came promotion to the Isthmian League Division One South for the first time. Season 2010-11 was their debut season at this level and despite being in the title race for the majority, had to settle for third place and with it, a place in the end-of-season play-offs. The play-off semi-final ended in disappointment for the Hawks as after a 2-2 draw with Leatherhead at the Enclosed Ground, the Surrey side progressed at Whitehawk's expense, courtesy of a penalty shoot-out. They completed a league and cup double the following season (2011-12), finishing as league

champions and beating Crawley Down 2-1 in the Sussex Senior Cup. They were promoted to the Isthmian League Premier Division. They had hoped to play the 2012-13 season at the Withdean Stadium but this was blocked by the Football League. The club achieved back to back promotions in the 2012-13 season after winning the Isthmian League Premier Division.

For the 2013-14 season, the club intended to change it's name to Brighton City, but this move has been put on hold for the time being and the club remains as Whitehawk FC, at least for the 2013-14 season.

REWIND: 30 YEARS AGO

A dip into Wealdstone folklore..
those incredible eight days in
1985 that won Stones the Conference title

N two days time it will be an astonishing 30 years since the Stones effectively booked their place at Wembley to set up the historic non-League double.

Yes, three decades since the blue and vellow army marched on Enfield's Southbury Road ground for the first leg of the FA Trophy semi-final. Three decades since a superlative performance, and goals from Neil Cordice and Andy Graham, snatched the 2-0 away win that saw us through to Wembley after a nerve-jangling 1-0 defeat by Enfield in the second leg. Three decades since hundreds of

Stones fans danced on the streets of EN1, finally recognising that football's first-ever Conference-Trophy double could actually be on the cards.

But we're not going to trot out the old cuttings from that day. Oh no. Even more importantly, we have uncovered a stash of press reports which record the famous five-wins-in-eight days in March 1985, which set up the possibility of the club getting anywhere near the Gola (Conference) league title.

The Stones had triumphed against all odds when winning the

Southern League South title three years earlier despite a monstrous backlog of games. We played 21 matches in 47 days in March and April - unbelievable! - and lost just two of them, and in that mix was a five-wins-in-nine days spell as Allen Batsford's side played Saturday, Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday. Monday, Wednesday, Saturday for two gruelling months.

But these epic games in March 1985 will live longer in the memory. It was played against a backdrop of largely unfair criticism


The weekend 'double-

This Sunday morning clash was only agreed the previous weekend - and it caused a bit of a quandary for yours truly, who was then secretary of SFC Wealdstone, the supporters' Sunday football team. We were chasing the Marathon League Div 4 title and had also run out of spare dates.

The league were less than helpful, "This is a Sunday morning league so you'll have to play at 10.30 like anyone else" said the intransigent League secretary when I asked if we could move it to an afternoon kick-off. Our players were adamant that they didn't want to miss the Stones game - every single one was a die-hard supporter and even now. 30 years later, all but a few of that team can still be spotted at the Vale.

So I phoned the secretary of our opponents

(108 Sports Club) to ask if they would mind switching to a 3pm start and they agreed... it was just a matter of then pleading our case to the Marathon League and happily they relented. Sunday soccer is just the tonic

ALAN Cordice shot Wealdstone to the top of the Gola League with his second goal of the weekend at Lower Mead on Sunday. He struck with the vital goal after 32 minutes to knock the wind out of a Scarborough side that was still buzzing from a splendid victory at Enfield the previous day, writes Paul Jacques.

It was Wealdstone's first Sunday fixture since March 1974 when a crowd of 1,300 watched them beat Poole Town 3-2 in their Southern League Championship season. Indeed, it was Alan Cordice who proved to be the thorn in Scarborough's side, Harry Duan, Graham Harrley and Kenny Dennis were all booked for fouls on the Wealdstone striker as Scarborough's frustration became more evident.
